# Introduction

At Washington Community Alliance (WCA), we are working to make Washington State a truly representative, multiracial social democracy. Together with our network of more than 70 community-based organizations – the majority of whom are led by and working in communities of color throughout the state – we organize to achieve fair representation in elected office and ensure working class communities share in the prosperity all of us build. Our Data Hub program supports our partners' civic engagement work throughout the year, including voter registration, legislative advocacy, voter education, and get-out-the-vote (GOTV) programs. This support includes providing access to Washington State's voterfile; training campaign and field staff on evidence-based best practices for engaging different groups of voters; and developing accessible and intuitive tools and resources to guide data-driven strategy.

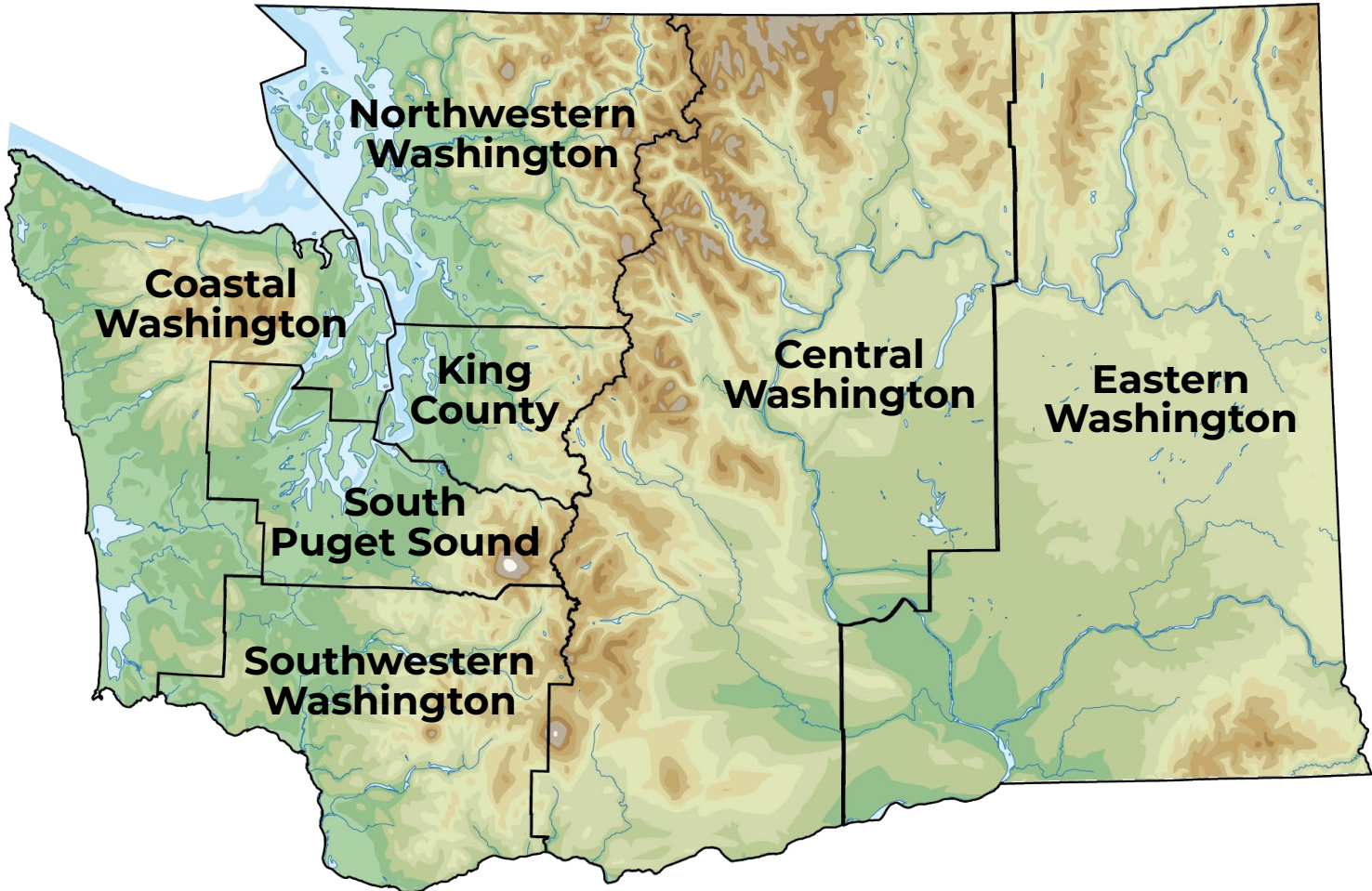
This report was developed with WCA's vision in mind, to increase accessibility of election data and provide a comprehensive analysis of Washington State's General Election in 2023. In the first section (Chapter 1), we discuss the composition of Washington State's electorate and analyze how trends in voter registration are leading to an increasingly diverse electorate; analyze voter turnout across Washington State's elections in 2023, with a particular focus on the 2023 General Election; provide a breakdown of the voter outreach work done ahead of the 2023 General Election, including a comparative analysis of the efficacy of different outreach methodologies; highlight the successes and lessons learned from nine different Data Hub partners ahead of the 2023 General Election; analyze the results of key ballot initiatives and municipal races that were on the ballot this cycle; and present a brief look ahead to Washington State's elections in 2024.

In the second section, we break down the 2023 General Election across different regions of Washington State, including Eastern Washington (Chapter 2), Central Washington (Chapter 3), Northwestern Washington (Chapter 4), Coastal Washington (Chapter 5), Southwestern Washington (Chapter 6), the South Puget Sound (Chapter 7), and King County (Chapter 8). Within each of these chapters, we first analyze regionwide trends in voter turnout across key demographics, then provide in-depth reporting on the composition of the electorate and results for each municipality in Washington State. These chapters are organized alphabetically, first by County and then by city/town/school district. Easily navigate to a specific municipality of interest by using your computer's "Find" feature with the specific name (Mac: command + F; Windows: CTRL + F). To complement the analyses and reporting included in this report, be sure to check out WCA's [General Elections Dashboard](#), an online interactive tool for visualizing election results. Simply choose the year, position, and layer (e.g., "County" or "Precinct"), then watch results populate across the map. Clicking on any area will display a popup of results for that particular area. If you have any questions about any analyses or data sources included in this report, be sure to scroll to the very last page of the report to read about the underlying Methodology.

Our work at the Data Hub prioritizes accessibility and empowerment of small, community-based organizers, so as always, we encourage you to share this report with anyone in your network you think could find it useful. 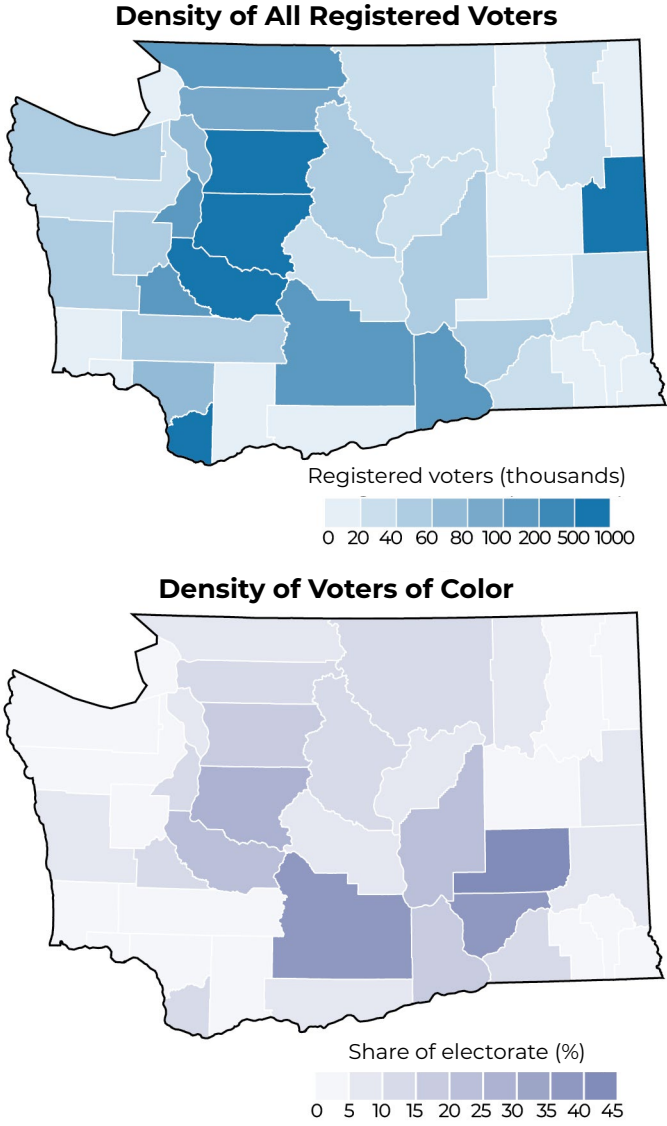
# Washington State

## Washington's electorate

Washington's electorate currently includes more than 4.7 million people, including 119,811 people who registered to vote for the first time in 2023, a relative increase of +2.7% from 2022. The current electorate is more than 80% White, with BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) accounting for just 18% of all registered voters. However, the proportion of people of color in the electorate varies considerably by age group: voters of color make up just 8% of the electorate over the age of 65, but more than 27% of the electorate under the age of 35. This is in accordance with national demographic trends, where younger generations are increasingly racially diverse compared to older voters. Newly registered voters in Washington are also more racially diverse compared to the overall electorate, with people of color accounting for more than one-third of new voters in 2023. Notably, in July of 2021, Washington's voting eligible population was estimated at around 6 million, suggesting that there could be upwards of 1.3 million eligible, unregistered voters throughout the state.

Given Washington's diverse topography, it is unsurprising that the electorate is unevenly distributed throughout the state: nearly two-thirds of all voters live along the Puget Sound, while fewer than one-quarter live east of the Cascades. People of color account for more than 25% of the electorate in King County and Central Washington, but less than 10% of the electorate in Eastern Washington, Coastal Washington, and Southwestern Washington. Voters of color are also heavily concentrated in incorporated communities throughout the state (cities and towns), accounting for 22% of the electorate in those communities but only 12% of the electorate in unincorporated areas (large swaths of rural land) of the state. Young voters are more evenly distributed throughout the state, accounting for 30% of the electorate in King County, 20% of the electorate in Coastal Washington, and 26-27% of the electorate in all other regions. Similar to voters of color, however, young voters are heavily concentrated in Washington's cities and towns, comprising 29% of the electorate in those communities compared to just 23% in unincorporated areas.

Washington's electorate also differs considerably in overall voting habits: of the last four general elections

(2020-2023), 26% of the electorate voted in all four elections ("Super Voters"), 17% voted in three elections ("Frequent Voters"), 42% voted in one or two elections ("Infrequent Voters"), and 16% did not vote in any election ("Non Voters"). The majority of "Frequent Voters" voted in both recent national elections (2020 and 2022), with more voters in this group staying home in 2023 than in 2021 (53% vs 41%), consistent with national trends in voting behavior showing particularly low voter turnout in the year prior to a presidential election. "Super Voters" are overwhelmingly White (93%) and older (median age: 64), whereas "Non Voters" are more racially diverse (34% people of color) and younger (median age: 35). The

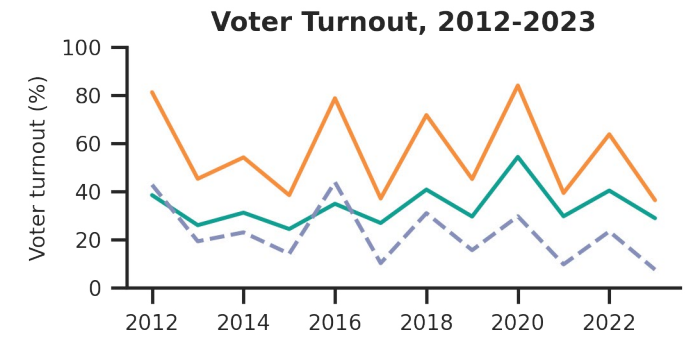
oversized impact that "Super Voters" have on electoral outcomes is evidenced by the 2023 election results: more than 70% of all votes this year came from "Super Voters", emphasizing the disproportionate impact that older, White voters have in Washington state.

## Voter turnout

Across the four elections held in Washington in 2023 – February's Special Election, April's Special Election, the August Primary Election, and the November General Election – 2.1 million Washingtonians (44.5% of the electorate) voted at least once. This included more than 170,000 individuals who voted in at least one Special Election but not in either the Primary or General Election. Interestingly, the turnout gap between this year's Primary and General Elections was just 7.5%, the lowest of any election since at least 2012. Rather than alluding to a relatively more engaged electorate overall, this difference lies largely in lower-than-expected turnout in this year's General Election.

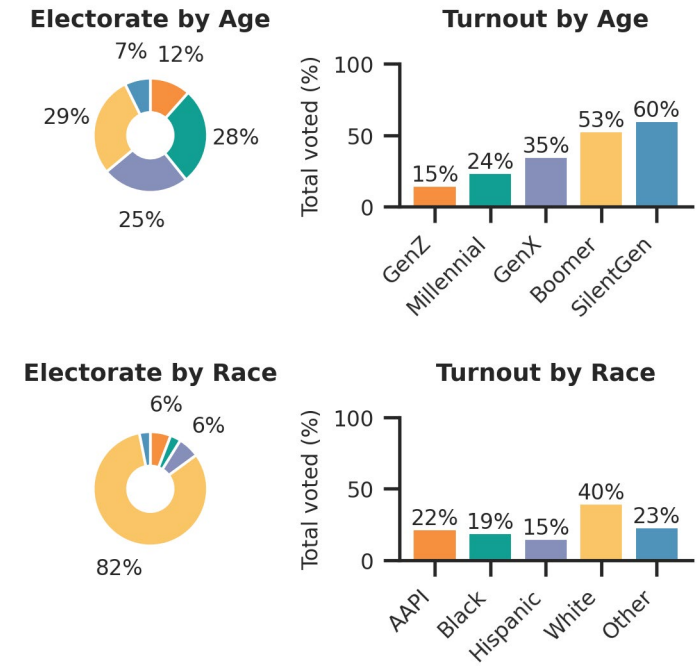
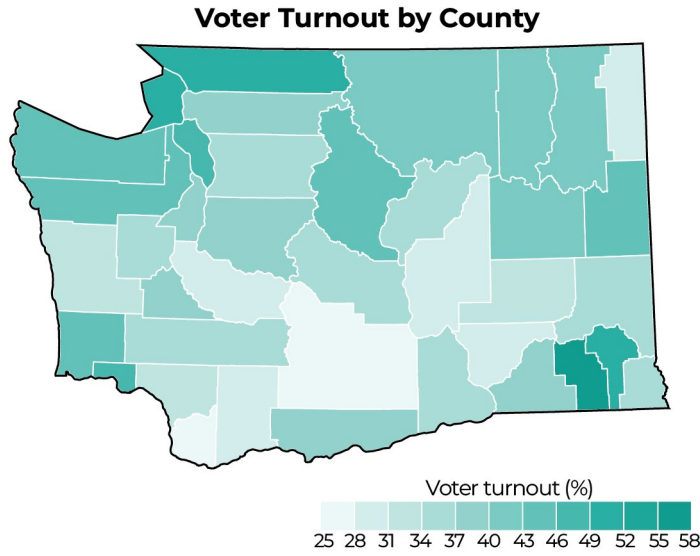
In fact, more than 18% of all voters who voted in the Primary Election this year did not vote in the General Election (n = 200,054). These voters were heavily concentrated in King County (40%) and were both younger and more racially diverse than the 1.7 million voters who voted in the General Election (+12.4% more voters under 35, +5.6% more voters of color). Fewer than 10% of these voters received any outreach from our partner organizations in the three months leading up to Election Day in November, emphasizing the critical role that sustained, regular outreach can play in mobilizing lower propensity voters. These voters sitting out the General election led to an electorate that was less progressive, allowing more moderate and conservative candidates to win in the General Election this year.

1,727,451 Washingtonians cast a ballot in the 2023 General



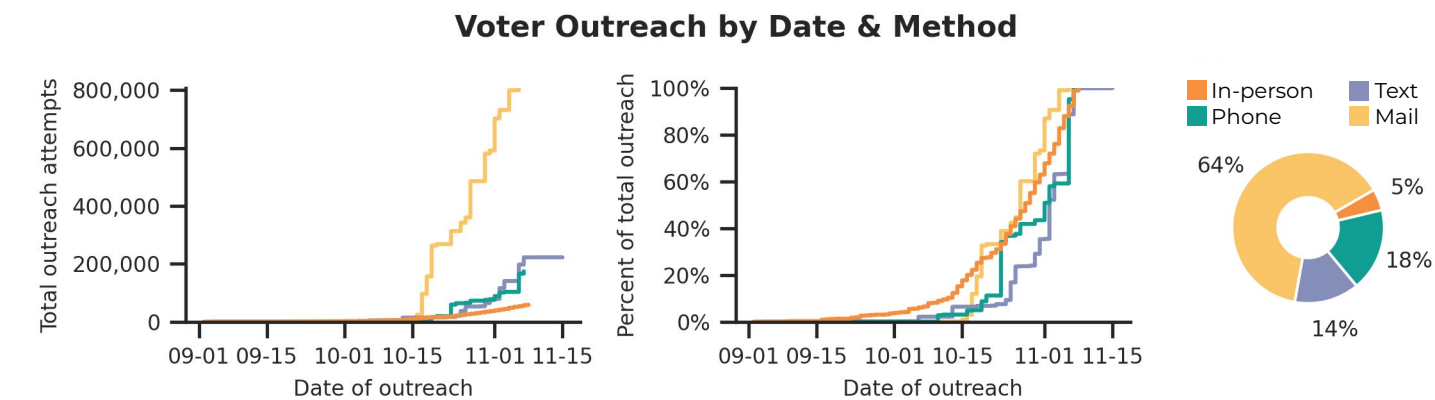
**Fig 2** Voter turnout by year. Green: Primary Elections; Orange: General Elections; Purple: Difference, General minus Primary.

Election – an overall turnout rate of 36.6% and a 2.2% decrease from the 2019 General Election. Turnout was 13% higher than the 2023 Primary Election, with similar proportions of people who voted in both the Primary and General elections this year (n = 913,994) and people who only voted in the General election (n = 813,457). Turnout among different demographic groups in the 2023 General Election followed the same trends that we've seen in recent years, both in Washington and nationally. Turnout increased linearly with age, with lowest turnout among GenZ'ers (15.2%) and Millennials (24.2%) and highest turnout among Baby Boomers (53.2%) and SilentGen'ers

(59.6%). Similarly, turnout among White voters (40.5%) was nearly double that of all races (AAPI: 21.7%; Black: 18.7%; Hispanic: 15.0%). Turnout in this year's General Election also varied fairly significantly across regions, ranging from 29.2% in the Southwest to 40.5% in the Northwest. Not surprisingly, this difference also varied by race: the turnout gap between White voters and voters of color was largest in Eastern Washington (+26.7%) and Central Washington (+26.2%), and lowest in the South Puget Sound (+19.0%) and Southwest Washington (+17.1%).

## Voter outreach

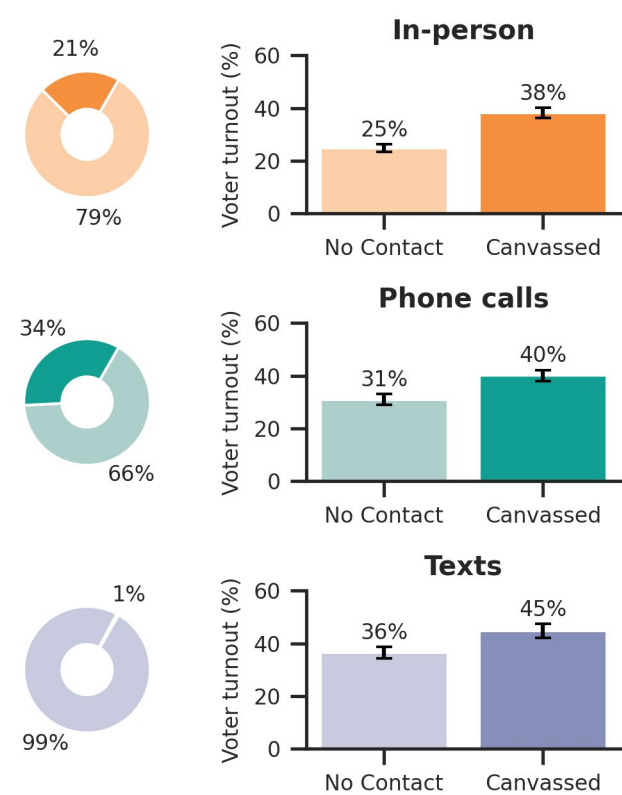
WCA's Data Hub partners had an exceptional year of voter outreach, making more than 2.5 million contact attempts – more than double the network's total outreach in 2022. This included advocacy throughout the legislative session, mobilization during special elections in February and April, registration and education programs throughout the summer, and persuasion and mobilization work during the Primary and General elections. In total, we supported 29 community organizations working in all 39 of Washington's counties in 2023, with the overarching goal of engaging and mobilizing a young, multiracial coalition of voters in support of progress.

From mid-August to mid-November alone, our partners made nearly 1.3 million voter contact attempts, including 58,569 door knocks, 807,098 mailers and postcards, 174,518 phone calls, 222,830 texts, and 41,077 digital ads. While programs ranged from voter education and mobilization to persuasion, the common throughline was the positive impact on voter turnout. Overall, turnout of voters who received any outreach leading up to Election Day was 7.6% higher than turnout of voters who did not receive any contact (43.3% vs 35.7%), and the difference in turnout between voters who were canvassed vs not contacted

was significantly different for in-person, phone, and text programs (all  $p < 0.0001$ ). In other words, the increase in turnout had a less than 0.01% chance of happening by chance, and was very likely a result of the outreach itself.

Importantly, the contact rate – the percentage of outreach attempts that led to an actual conversation with a voter – differed dramatically across contact methods and demographics. Across all voters, phone calls had the highest contact rate at 34.2%, with 1 in 3 calls leading to a conversation; in-person canvassing had the second highest contact rate at 20.8%, with 1 in 5 door knocks leading to a conversation; and text messages had the lowest contact rate at just 0.5%, with 1 in 200 messages leading to a conversation. Text programs are typically used as a way to more efficiently reach large numbers of voters, yet these numbers underscore just how ineffective this method of outreach can be at contacting voters. For example, it would take 200 texts to reach the same number of voters as knocking 5 doors. Although the contact rate for in-person and phone canvassing to voters of color or young voters was comparable to the overall electorate, texting was particularly ineffective at connecting with these voters: text messages to voters of color had a contact rate of 0.3%, with 1 in 300 messages leading to a conversation; and text messages to young voters had a contact rate of just 0.2%, with 1 in 500 messages leading to a conversation.

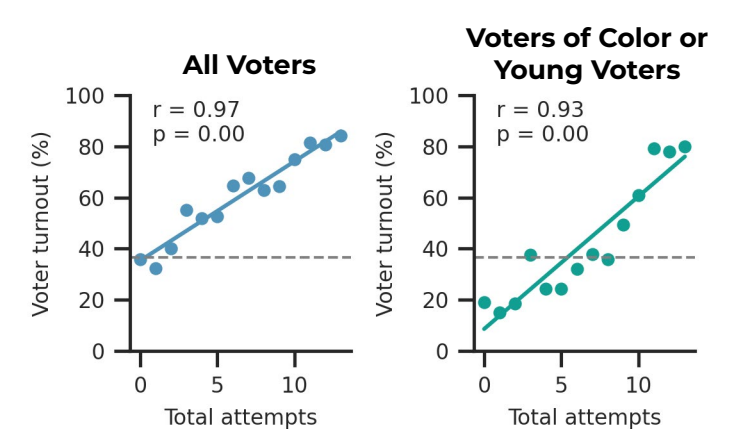
In-person canvassing led to the highest increase in voter turnout, with 13.5% higher turnout relative to the overall electorate and 6.9% greater turnout relative to voters who were canvassed via other methods. In-person outreach was particularly effective at mobilizing young voters and voters of color: relative to voters who received no outreach at all, in-person canvassing led to a 25.1% increase in AAPI turnout, a 23.3% increase in Black turnout, an 8.6%

increase in Hispanic turnout, and a 13.7% increase in turnout among young voters. Surprisingly, some texting programs had profoundly positive impacts on turnout, but this was largely dependent on the design of the texting program. Turnout among voters who were actually canvassed via texting – those voters who engaged in a conversation or responded to a survey question – was 36.1% higher than among voters who received a single message, either because they did not respond to start a conversation or because the message itself was written as a passive one-off communication.

Similar to in-person outreach, successful text canvassing was extremely beneficial for mobilizing young voters and voters of color: relative to voters who received no outreach, text canvassing led to a 44.3% increase in AAPI turnout, an 18.7% increase in Black turnout, a 34.4% increase in Hispanic turnout, and a 33.4% increase in youth turnout. Phone calls were modestly effective at boosting turnout, with 2.1% higher turnout relative to the overall electorate and 2.9% higher turnout than voters who received no contact at all among voters who were canvassed over the phone. Unlike other methods, the efficacy of phone calls did not significantly differ across demographics.

The efficacy of outreach at mobilizing voters was significantly and positively correlated with the total outreach that individual voters received. Put simply: the more outreach an individual received, the more likely they were to vote. Across the entire electorate, individual contact attempts led to a 3.9% increase in turnout: relative to voters who received no contact, turnout was 3.9% higher for voters who received one attempt, 7.8% higher for voters who received two attempts, 11.7% higher for voters who received three attempts, and so on.

Additionally, the relationship between total contact attempts and voter turnout was even stronger among voters of color and young voters. Overall, turnout of these voters increased by approximately 5.2% per contact attempt, with turnout of voters of color and young voters who received at least four contact attempts surpassing mean voter turnout in 2023. Surprisingly, this effect was independent from both the method and result of individual outreach attempts. In other words, whereas a single contact attempt is more effective when using direct canvassing tactics (e.g., in-person canvassing), layering outreach attempts across multiple strategies can be equally or even more effective. For example, sending a voter a postcard and text message encouraging them to vote is more effective than just sending a postcard, but less effective than adding in-person canvassing on top of the postcard and text message.

Together, these data highlight the power of relational organizing and conversation in mobilizing voters, particularly those who have historically been



underrepresented and disengaged. Although inundating voters with as much variety of outreach as possible and maximizing the amount of outreach is one viable strategy for mobilizing voters, prioritizing authentic conversations via direct, relational outreach can be equally or even more effective, with far fewer total outreach attempts. In other words, smaller and/or resource-scarce civic engagement programs would benefit from focusing on having a smaller number of high quality contact attempts with voters, whereas large, resource-rich programs can employ a plethora of contact attempts, with the assumption that the cumulative impact of all that engagement would likely lead to more engaged voters.

Partner highlights

Throughout 2023, 29 WCA Data Hub partners were actively involved in voter outreach, ranging from civic engagement and voter registration to persuasion and GOTV. To offer some insight into the breadth and depth of the work our partners did this year, we wanted to highlight some of these programs. Rather than covering every program done by every partner this year, we focus primarily on organizations that stood apart from the rest, either due to the methodology of their programs or the scale of their impact. This includes a successful ballot initiative campaign in Spokane, deep canvassing of voters of color in Pacific County, youth-focused outreach in North Central Washington, and in-language outreach to Hispanic voters in South King County and Yakima.

Justice Not Jails

The Justice Not Jails coalition (JNJ) was formed by a group of community organizers to develop and advocate for policies related to criminal justice reform, behavioral healthcare access, and public safety in Spokane County. JNJ’s work in 2023 was centered around Spokane County’s Measure 1, a ballot initiative that would have enacted a sales tax to pay for two new jails. Rather than just opposing Measure 1, the organizers used this campaign as an opportunity for long-term movement building and centered impacted people, including a decolonized campaign leadership comprised of those who have been impacted by the carceral system.

JNJ fostered a network of staffers, volunteers, and community partners with common goals and values, building capacity to continue the work beyond 2023 and to grow into a statewide coalition. The campaign emphasized hiring people impacted by incarceration, compensated organizers fairly for their time, and ensured

that canvassers built skills they could use when working on future campaigns. The campaign also organized canvasses every weekend for supporters and volunteers with a special focus on looping in impacted folks, and provided compensation as needed. Weekend canvassers were followed by bbqs and other gatherings, providing a space to build community among supporters.

In addition to in-person canvasses, the campaign organized both phonebanks and textbanks for canvassing the community: JNJ organized weekly phone banks for volunteers; encouraged impacted folks to participate and compensating volunteers fairly for their time; and paid interns at Peace & Justice Action League of Spokane (PJALS) – a JNJ partner – made calls and sent texts every Friday, emphasizing outreach to very low propensity voters. Since many impacted supporters were not able to attend canvasses or phone banks during scheduled times, a central location was chosen each day for disbursement of walk lists and materials, allowing supporters to canvass folks in their community on their own schedule.

JNJ’s direct voter outreach work prioritized reaching out to voters who have been disenfranchised – whether through the legal system, or through historic lack of engagement and/or representation. This outreach centered on educating voters about the carceral system and other systems of racism and oppression, and having honest conversations about alternatives to mass incarceration for improving public safety and the lives of community members. JNJ also used persuasion programs to oppose Measure 1, including mailers and a combination of broadcast, cable, streaming, and digital ads.

In total, JNJ made 277,927 outreach attempts to 93,613

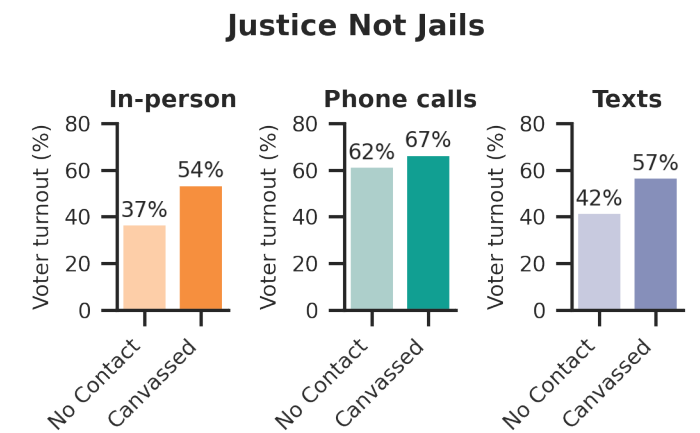


Fig 7 Impact of Justice Not Jail's voter outreach in the 2023 General Election by contact method. Left: in-person canvasses; Center: phone calls; Right: text messages.

unique voters in the 90 days leading up to Election Day, canvassing more than a quarter of the electorate in Spokane County – more than any other WCA Data Hub partner in 2023. This included 17,845 door knocks, 39,530 phone calls, 22,552 text messages, and 197,271 mailers. JNJ’s direct voter outreach work was extremely successful: 73.2% of voters canvassed by JNJ voted in the 2023 General Election, compared to just 43.2% of all voters in Spokane County. The relative increase in turnout among canvassed voters was highest among those canvassed via in-person outreach (+17.0%), followed by voters who received text messages (+15.2%) and voters who received phone calls (+4.2%). The impact of JNJ’s work is evidenced by Measure 1’s resounding defeat: Measure 1 failed 63.3% to 36.7%, with 99% of precincts voting against it (447 vs 4). JNJ’s work in 2023 is a prime example of how organizations can successfully organize around a ballot initiative, and should be used as a template for groups planning on organizing around initiatives in 2024.

Latino Community Fund

Latino Community Fund (LCF) identifies, shares, and advocates for successful initiatives in the Latino community; cultivates a generation of new leaders; supports cultural and community-based non-profit organizations; and works to improve the quality of life for all Washingtonians. LCF fosters a vibrant community through civic engagement, healthy families, and arts and culture initiatives tailored to address the specific needs of Latinos. LCF has been a long-time partner with WCA and has developed their civic engagement program across the state over the past several years. In 2023, LCF prioritized two GOTV programs, targeting Spanish-speaking voters in South King County and Yakima.

In South King County, LCF made 16,385 contact attempts to 8,443 voters across Kent, Burien, Renton, and SeaTac. This included 16,273 phone calls, which had a 3.8% contact rate and led to a 1.7% increase in voter turnout (12.4% vs 10.7%); and 112 door knocks, which had a 25% contact rate and led to an 8.3% increase in voter turnout (17.9% vs 9.6%). In Yakima, LCF made 1,697 contact attempts to 1,467 voters, primarily in Yakima’s 1st and 5th city council districts. This included 742 phone calls, which had a 17.8% contact rate and led to a 4.2% increase in voter turnout (17.1% vs 12.9%); and 955 door knocks, which had a 20% contact rate and led to a 3.9% increase in voter turnout (12.1% vs 8.3%). Notably, LCF’s work in 2023 was the largest in-language GOTV program carried out this year within the Data Hub, with Spanish-speaking volunteers

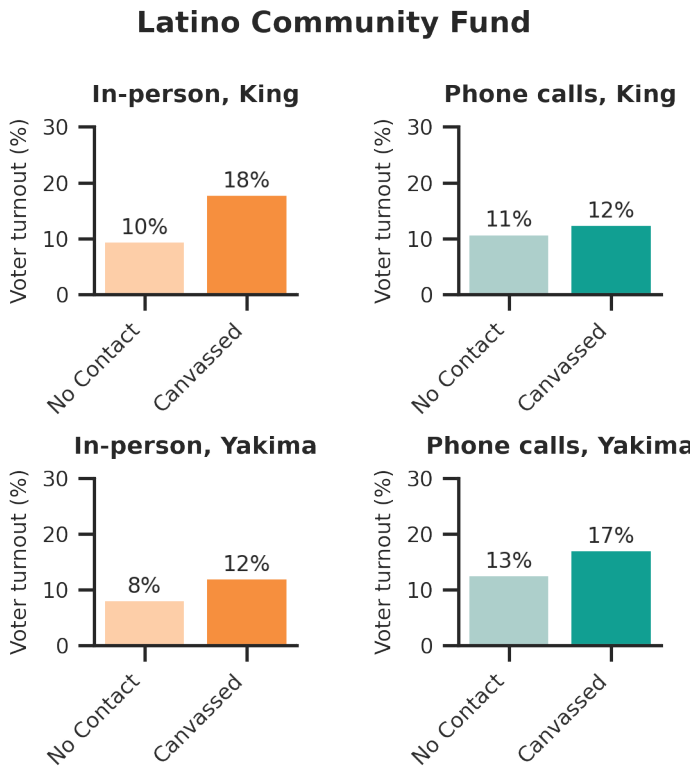


Fig 8 Impact of Latino Community Fund's voter outreach in the 2023 General Election by contact method and location. Top-left: King County in-person; Top-right: King County phone calls; Bottom-left: Yakima in-person; Bottom-right: Yakima phone calls.

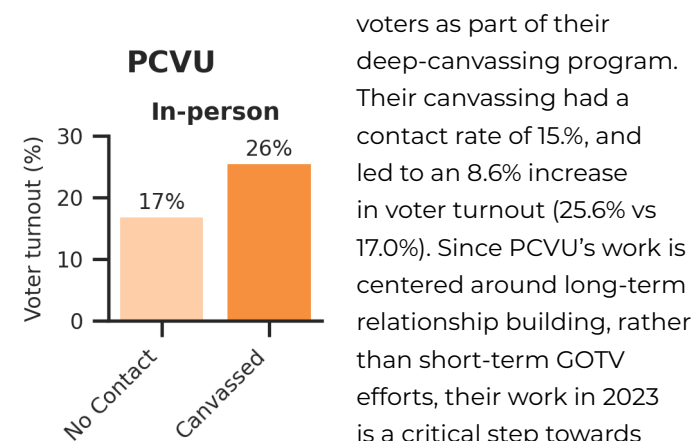
canvassing Spanish-speaking voters directly. This was only possible due to LCF’s work going back to 2020 to increase self-reported language preference for voters in South King County and Yakima, and is a prime example of how long-term data collection can lead to impactful engagement with voters.

Pacific County Voices Uniting

Pacific County Voices Uniting (PCVU), is a BIPOC-led organization on the edges of Willapa Bay in Southwest Washington, focused on increasing civic participation and building political power for communities of color and other marginalized communities in Southwest Washington. PCVU prioritizes deep-canvassing through trusted messengers to educate and engage their communities in civic life. PCVU has been building their civic engagement strategy over the past few years and they saw a significant impact in their work in 2023. Their deep-canvassing strategies included conversations on race and ethnicity, identifying top issues faced by members of their communities (including housing, healthcare, education, and immigration), and building relationships with community members living with disabilities as a part of their larger advocacy work centering disability justice.



PCVU's work in 2023 prioritized outreach to new and disengaged voters of color. In the General Election alone, their team made 1,570 contact attempts to 1,234 unique

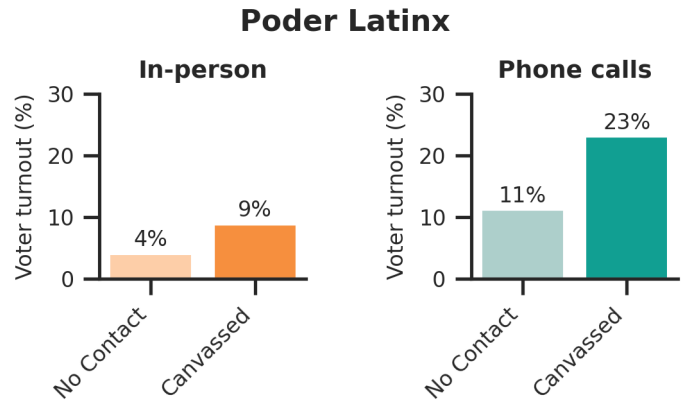


**Fig 9** Impact of Pacific County Voices Uniting's voter outreach in the 2023 General Election.

**Poder Latinx**

Poder Latinx, a national organization committed to empowering the Latinx community as influential decision-makers in the democratic process, has been a dedicated partner since 2022. This year, they concentrated on developing their Washington civic engagement program, specifically focusing on voters in Sunnyside and Yakima. In Sunnyside, Poder Latinx collaborated with a coalition of organizations to implement a targeted GOTV program, reaching out to Spanish-speaking and lower-turnout voters through canvassing and phone calls. Additionally, they directed their efforts toward engaging young Spanish-speaking voters in Yakima District 1.

Overall, Poder Latinx made 8,238 voter contact attempts to 7,814 unique voters in Pasco, Sunnyside, and Yakima,

including a combination of GOTV phone calls and in-person canvassing. Their GOTV phone program made 6,736 phone calls with a 3.6% contact rate, leading to a 12.9% increase in voter turnout (23.1% vs 10.2%). Their in-person work led to 1,502 door knocks with a 16.4% contact rate, leading to an 4.8% increase in voter turnout (8.9% vs 4.1%). Their door-knocking script included issue and language identification, improving their data and understanding of the Yakima and Sunnyside Latinx community for future civic engagement programs. Poder Latinx also worked in collaboration with other Sunnyside organizations to host ballot parties for community members to learn about issues and candidates on the General Election ballot and fill out their ballots.

**Randomized Controlled Trial: GOTV in Sunnyside, WA**

As Washington state's Voter Activation Network (VAN) administrators, a key piece of the work our Data Hub team does is to evaluate the efficacy of various types of direct voter outreach so that we can provide evidence-based recommendations for future work. In 2020, as the COVID-19 pandemic swept across Washington, many organizations shifted their energy and focus away from direct, in-person canvassing to indirect canvassing, particularly texting and mailers. Two years later, in the 2022 midterm elections, the need for social distancing and alternative outreach strategies had largely waned, yet organizations continue to prioritize these other outreach strategies over in-person canvassing. Especially from a resource scarcity perspective, this makes sense – a small group of volunteers can reach thousands more voters in a single evening if they are sending text messages or mailers instead of knocking doors.

However, emerging evidence suggests that not only is texting largely ineffective for mobilizing low propensity voters, but there may also be other unintended consequences. For example, if a voter receives a text message from a community-based organization with the same urgency message (e.g., "This is the most important election in our lifetime") that they are getting from national political parties, candidates, and other groups, they may end up losing trust in that organization and even the voting process at large. Whether mailers – a different form of indirect voter outreach – are similarly ineffective at voter mobilization remains largely untested, particularly in Washington state.

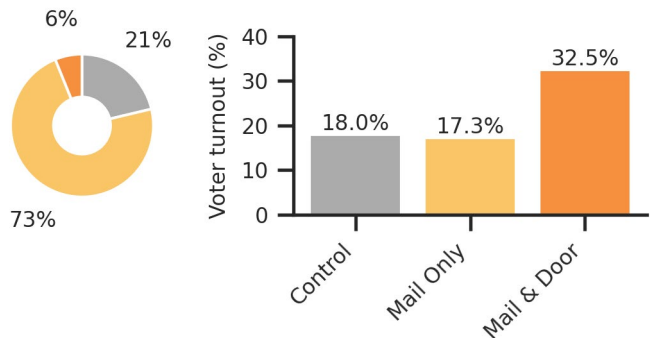
This year, the Data Hub team collaborated with a group

of organizations – including Nuestra Casa, Poder Latinx, Washington Conservation Action, ELLA, and Common Power – on an experiment to compare the effectiveness of two different voter outreach programs in Sunnyside, WA. The electorate in Sunnyside is majority Hispanic (>70%) with a median age of just 40 years old, and turnout in Sunnyside is consistently among the lowest in the state. Thus, our target voter universe for this experiment was young Hispanic voters who had voted in no more than two of the last four general elections (2019-2022). Texting and mailers were the predominant forms of outreach used by Data Hub partners in the 2022 General Election, and while data is emerging on the inefficacy of texting as a voter engagement strategy, less is known about how effective mailers are at mobilizing younger voters. Thus, our team designed a randomized-controlled trial (RCT) to answer two questions: (1) are mailers – a passive, indirect form of voter outreach – an effective tool for boosting voter turnout, and (2) does in-person canvassing – an active, direct form of voter outreach – have an additive effect on boosting voter turnout?

We started out by dividing our universe of voters (n = 3,891 total individuals) into a control group (n = 1,200) and an experimental group (n = 2,691) that were age-, race-, and sex-matched, to ensure that any effects we identified were not due to innate demographic differences. A subset of voters in the control group (n = 473) ended up receiving GOTV calls and texts from other organizations in our network, so those voters were excluded from all analyses.. All voters in the experimental group received two mailers, including (1) a formal positive social pressure piece encouraging the individual to join their community in being a voter, and (2) a postcard urging the individual to return their ballot by Election Day, with details on how to vote by mail and where to return ballots. In addition to mailers, voters in the experimental group received in-person outreach from canvassers and volunteers using a GOTV script that focused on asking voters to make a plan and pledge to vote. Canvassers also invited individuals to attend community events, such as ballot parties. Importantly, all mailers and scripts were bilingual, with copy and content in both Spanish and English. Voters in the experimental group were subdivided into two final groups: (1) "Mail & Door", including any folks who were successfully canvassed by in-person outreach (n = 209); and "Mail Only", including folks who were never actually contacted with in-person outreach (n = 2,482).

Across the three groups, voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was comparable among the control group (18.0%)

and the "Mail Only" group (17.3%), suggesting that mail alone is not an effective method of mobilizing young voters in Sunnyside. However, there was a significant increase in turnout among the "Mail & Door" group (32.5%), with significantly higher turnout compared to both the control group (p < 0.0001) and the "Mail Only" group (p < 0.0001). In other words, there is less than a 0.01% chance of the observed increase in turnout among the "Mail & Door" group happening randomly, so we can confidently conclude that the increase was due to the outreach to the voters in that group.

Together, these data points suggest that (1) mailers alone are ineffective for engaging young Hispanic voters in the Yakima Valley, but (2) in-person outreach has a strong positive impact on increasing turnout among these voters. Importantly, this RCT had a relatively small sample size and focused only on a single subset of voters in one community in Washington, so caution should be used in interpreting and applying these findings elsewhere. Nevertheless, these results offer much-needed insight into the effectiveness of different outreach strategies for mobilizing a young, racially diverse electorate, and should be taken into consideration when developing outreach programs in 2024 and beyond.

**Rural People's Voice**

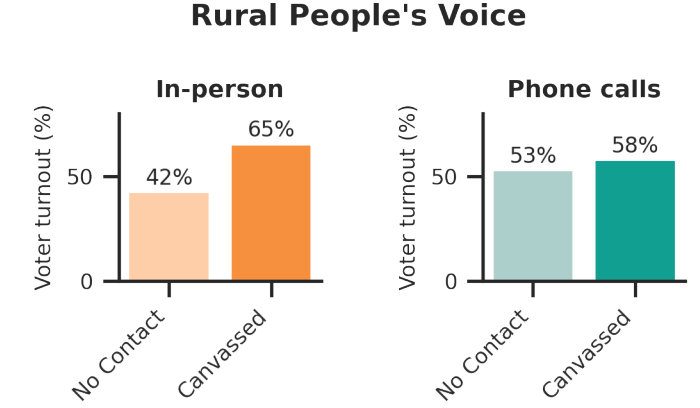
From the Olympic Peninsula and Puget Sound to the Cascades, Columbia River Valley, and Palouse, Washington is an expansive, diverse state. Historically, voter engagement efforts have focused on densely populated urban areas, with little-to-no outreach to voters in rural areas. Rural People's Voice (RPV) is one of the few organizations in Washington state that is explicitly focused on electoral organizing in North Central Washington (NCW), including Chelan, Douglas, and Okanogan counties. RPV's work encapsulates long-term relational



organizing, fostering relationships across communities and looking several years down the road, rather than prioritizing short-term electoral wins and traditional GOTV canvassing. In 2023, RPV's electoral organizing work involved two programs: a youth internship program, and direct candidate programming.

RPV's ten week youth internship program encouraged young people from NCW to reclaim democracy and shape their future, helping to build up political infrastructure in NCW and strengthen the electoral organizing power of young people across the region. 2023's cohort included ten youth from Omak and Wenatchee, and prioritized five key outcomes: **Build Analysis**: developing the ability of young people to see their experiences within a larger political and economic context and to harness their ability to affect positive change through shared learning, mentorship, and direct work; **Strengthen Campaigns**: providing direct on-the-ground support for aligned electoral campaigns and long-term community organizing efforts (e.g., canvassing, tabling, texting, community events, block parties), prioritizing engaging individuals and communities and helping to elect great candidates; **Turn the Rural Narrative**: conveying a unifying rural narrative through doorstep conversations, community events, social media takeovers, and candidate support; **Activate Voters**: registering new voters (young people, recent citizens, working class folks, and Hispanic voters) and stewarding them to become active and engaged voters; and **Develop Long-term Leaders**: building a pipeline for youth in the community to become staff and committed volunteers within their programs of interest, from leadership development programming to community-based recruitment and retention.

RPV's direct candidate work in 2023 included a combination of in-person canvassing, mailers, and texting, focusing on races across NCW. This included supporting candidates in Omak, Tonasket, Oroville, Manson, Wenatchee, and Methow Valley School Districts; candidates in Cascade Medical District (Leavenworth); and candidates in Tonasket, East Wenatchee, and Twisp city council and mayoral races. Of the 15 candidates RPV supported in 2023, two lost their races by >10%, three lost by <100 votes, and nine won their races. This included the re-election of Maria Iniguez to Wenatchee School Board District 2 – recently redrawn to become a heavily conservative district – by just 19 votes. In a region where the margin of victory is often just a few votes, RPV's work underscores the importance of turning out every voter.

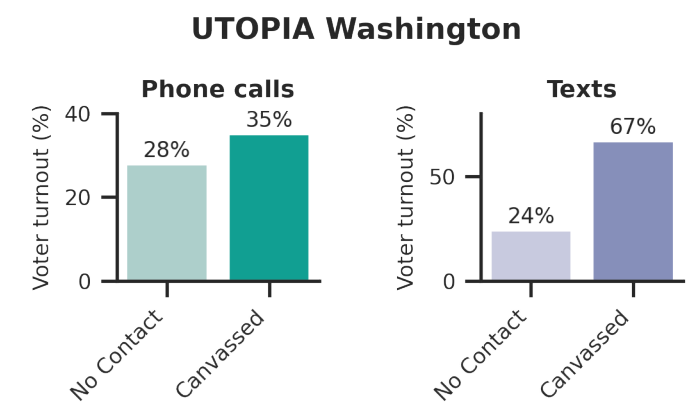


**Fig 12** Impact of Rural People's Voice's voter outreach in the 2023 General Election by contact method and location. *Left*: in-person; *Right*: phone calls.

RPV made a total of 23,952 contact attempts to 16,509 unique voters in NCW, reaching more than 16% of the overall electorate in a region historically ignored by electoral organizers. Overall, turnout of voters canvassed by RPV was ~6.5% higher than turnout of the overall electorate in NCW. The most effective outreach was in-person canvassing (+22.9%), followed by phone calls (+11.7%), mailers (+6.5%), and texting (+4.3%). RPV's impact on turnout was greatest among AAPI voters (+29.5%), Hispanic voters (+10.4%), Millennial voters (+10.3%), and GenX voters (+10.2%). Additionally, turnout of newly registered voters canvassed by RPV was 6.0% higher than among newly registered voters who received no outreach, emphasizing the critical importance of engaging with new voters beyond the time of registration.

**UTOPIA Washington**

United Territories of Pacific Islanders Alliance Washington (UTOPIA) is a queer and trans people of color-led, grassroots organization that works to address basic needs, build pathways toward new expanded career and life opportunities, foster a sense of common purpose, and advocate for social justice, education, and overall wellness among members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. UTOPIA Washington's mission is actively replacing systems of oppression with ecosystems of care and safety for all our communities through Black and Brown organizing, prioritizing land and bodily autonomy, and reclaiming cultural narratives. UTOPIA Washington has been developing their civic engagement and voter outreach program since their inception, and this year, their team trained eight new volunteers for their civic engagement work, focused on outreach to low propensity, LGBTQIA+ supportive voters, particularly voters of color.



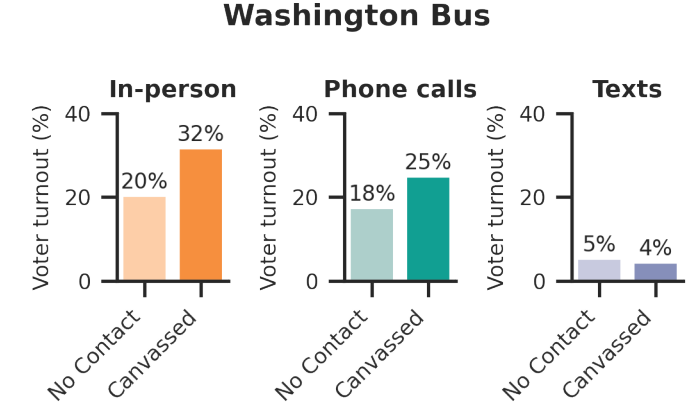
**Fig 13** Impact of UTOPIA Washington's voter outreach in the 2023 General Election by contact method and location. *Left*: phone calls; *Right*: texts.

In 2023, UTOPIA's civic engagement program included phone calls to voters of color in King County during the Primary Election, and phone calls and texts to voters of color in King County during the General Election. During the General Election alone, canvasses and volunteers made 4,118 contact attempts to 3,735 individuals, including 3,806 text messages and 512 phone calls. UTOPIA's phone program was particularly effective, with a 66% contact rate and a +10.7% increase in voter turnout (35.1% vs 24.4%). However, as with other programs discussed above, UTOPIA's texting program was largely ineffective: although turnout of voters successfully canvassed via text message was 66.7%, the texting contact rate was just 0.08%; in other words, volunteers only received responses from 3 out of 3,806 text messages that were sent out.

**Washington Bus**

Despite odd-year elections typically getting less attention than even-year elections, organizers at the Washington Bus spent the entire year engaging young voters across the state. Their work included (but was not limited to): civic education work in during the summer encouraging participation in the Democracy Voucher program in Seattle; voter mobilization work in early September in support of renewing Seattle's housing levy; independent expenditure work in Yakima; and coordinated work across Washington in support of progressive candidates for local office.

From mid-August through Election Day alone, WA Bus made 98,883 contact attempts to 89,075 individual voters; this included 80,820 text messages, 14,667 mailers, 4,413 door knocks, and 198 phone calls. Rather than focusing on persuasion outreach to likely voters, the Bus spent the time leading up to Election Day canvassing segments of

the electorate that historically have the lowest turnout: 64% of contact attempts made by the Bus were to BIPOC voters, and 56% were to voters under the age of 35.

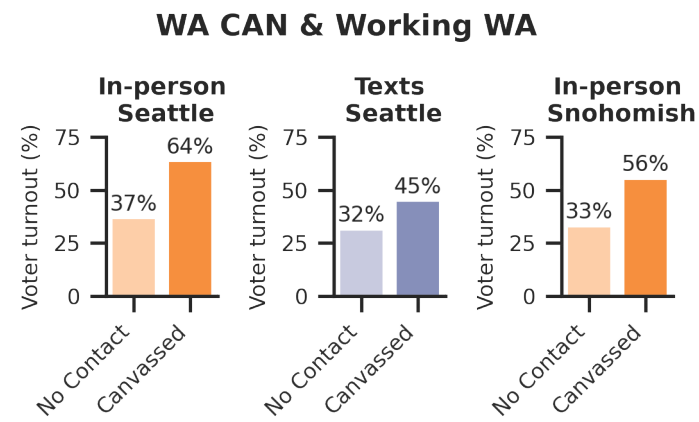
Of all the work done by the Bus in 2023, their coordinated work throughout the state and IE work in Yakima offer particularly valuable insight into how outreach can mobilize young voters of color. In Whatcom County, Spokane, Tacoma, and Burien, the Bus used a variety of tactics to mobilize young voters. Overall, in-person canvassing had the largest impact on voter turnout (+9.3%), phone calls had the second largest impact (+8.4%), and text messages had a small, adverse effect (-1.0%).

Similar to the RCT coordinated by WCA in Sunnyside, the IE work done by the Bus in Yakima involved two components: a mailer sent to the entire universe of voters, and door knocks made to a subset of that universe. The impact of these programs on voter turnout was comparable to what was seen in the Sunnyside RCT: turnout of voters who received mail alone (n = 13,553) was 13.3%, while turnout of voters who received in-person outreach in addition to the mailer (n = 2,075) was 27.6% – an increase in turnout of more than 14%. Taken together, these findings further highlight how effective in-person canvassing can be at mobilizing young voters and voters of color, while also showing how ineffective indirect outreach methods (texting, mailers) are at engaging the same voters.

**Washington Community Action Network & Working Washington**

In the 2023 General Election, Washington Community Action Network (WA CAN) and Working Washington collaborated on two GOTV programs: one in Seattle's 2nd City Council District to support Tammy Morales and

counter the outsized influence of outside organizations (e.g., the National Association of Realtors); and the other in Snohomish County's Public Hospital District 2, to support Deana Knutsen and to activate voters in a race that received very little attention. Both programs targeted voters in the New American Majority (people of color, single women, and folks 18-34 years old) with GOTV messaging. In total, WA CAN and Working Washington made 12,202 contact attempts to 10,286 unique voters, including 9,570 in-person canvassing attempts and 2,732 text messages.

Overall, both of these programs were highly successful at mobilizing these voters to participate in the 2023 General Election. In Seattle, turnout of voters who were successfully canvassed was 26.9% higher than voters who were not canvassed (63.8% vs 36.9%), and turnout of voters who were successfully sent text messages was 13.5% higher than voters who did not receive texts (45.1% vs 31.6%). Similarly, in Snohomish County, turnout of voters who were successfully canvassed was 22.4% higher than voters who were not canvassed (55.5% vs 33.1%). Importantly, both Morales and Knutsen won their races, with Morales winning by fewer than 400 votes, highlighting how critical Washington CAN and Working Washington's targeted outreach was.

### Election analysis

Despite being an odd-year with relatively low voter turnout, Washington voters delivered a number of progressive victories in 2023 through ballot initiatives. Voters in Seattle passed ballot initiatives to create a new social housing program, to fund mental healthcare access, and to renew the existing housing levy; voters in Bellingham passed a ballot initiative to increase the

minimum wage; voters in Bellingham and Tacoma passed ballot initiatives to expand tenant protections; and voters in Spokane County and Puyallup defeated ballot initiatives that would have funded construction of new jails.

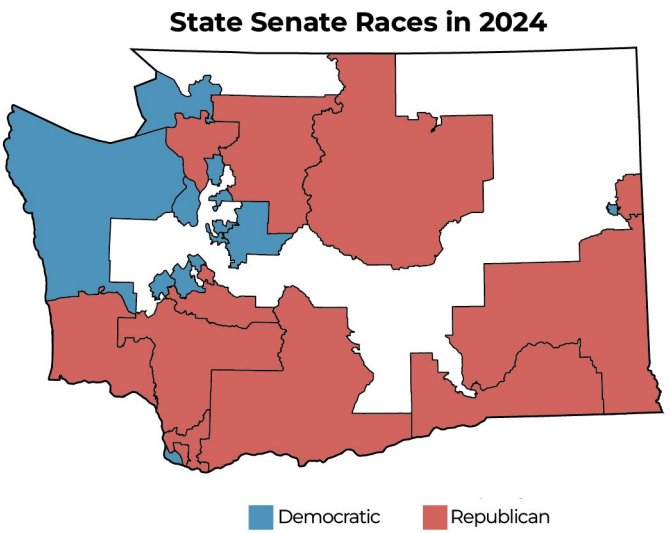
The power of ballot initiatives at mobilizing progressive voters was very apparent in the 2023 General Election. Turnout in municipalities where progressive ballot initiatives passed (Bellingham, Puyallup, Seattle, Spokane County, Tacoma) was 9.8% higher than in places without any initiatives on the ballot. This effect was particularly apparent for voting blocs with typically lower turnout: in places where progressive ballot initiatives were victorious, turnout was 9.8% higher for AAPI voters, 6.3% higher for Black voters, 10.8% higher for Hispanic voters, and 11.2% higher for young voters, relative to places without any initiatives. These findings are consistent with research from our team, the Ballot Initiative Strategy Center, and others that progressive policies are generally far more popular than progressive candidates, and having these types of policies on the ballot can lead to engagement and turnout of young voters and voters of color.

In this year's General Election, voters cast their ballots primarily in municipal races, including 49 countywide seats, 181 mayors, 1,312 city council members, and 1,199 school board members. While 57% of these races were contested (i.e., had at least two candidates on the ballot), the final vote margins separating the 1st and 2nd place candidates were generally not very close. Just 16% of countywide races, 3.9% of mayor races, 4.9% of city council races, and 4.4% of school board races had final margins of ≤5%. Moreover, incumbents outperformed first-time candidates and challengers at every level, with 91% of incumbents winning their races. Even in contested races, incumbents had an advantage, receiving on average of 9.3% more votes than other candidates.

In Washington's two largest cities – Seattle and Spokane – this year's election results could not have been more different. In Seattle, two of the three incumbents running for re-election – Tammy Morales in District 2, and Dan Strauss in District 6 – were the only two progressive candidates to win their races, with moderate candidates sweeping the other five districts, flipping Seattle's City Council from a 6-3 progressive majority to a 6-2 moderate majority, with mayor Bruce Harrell set to appoint councilmember Teresa Mosqueda's replacement in early 2024. In Spokane, however, progressives won the race for mayor, city council president, and all three city council

districts, moving Spokane's local government solidly to the left. While many factors likely contributed to these diametrically opposed outcomes, one stark difference lies in voter outreach. Data Hub partners canvassed more than 56% of the electorate in Spokane, but just 16% of the electorate in Seattle. A similar contrast can be found in city council races in the Yakima Valley. In Yakima, all four progressive candidates lost their races, while just a few miles down the road in Sunnyside, all four progressives won their races. Again, the most obvious contrast between these two cities was voter outreach: in Yakima, Data Hub partners canvassed just 24% of the electorate, compared to 57% of the electorate in Sunnyside. These results highlight the importance of outreach for mobilizing a progressive electorate, a lesson that should be front-of-mind going into 2024.

Next year, Washington's electorate will make a number of major decisions about Washington's future, and weigh into some key decisions about the future of national politics in the U.S. All statewide executive positions – including governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of state, commissioner of public lands, insurance commissioner, state auditor, and secretary of public instruction – will be on the ballot, and Governor Jay Inslee's retirement leaves the possibility of a hotly contested race for the highest office in the state. All state representative positions will also be on the ballot, along with 26 state senate seats – including 13 seats held by Republicans and 13 seats held by Democrats. In addition to the U.S. President and Vice President, all ten of Washington's congressional seats will be on the ballot next year. The narrow victory of Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (CD-3) in 2022 and the retirement of Derek Kilmer (CD-6) pave the way for several extremely competitive races in 2024 that could influence control of the currently four-seat majority in the U.S. House of Representatives.

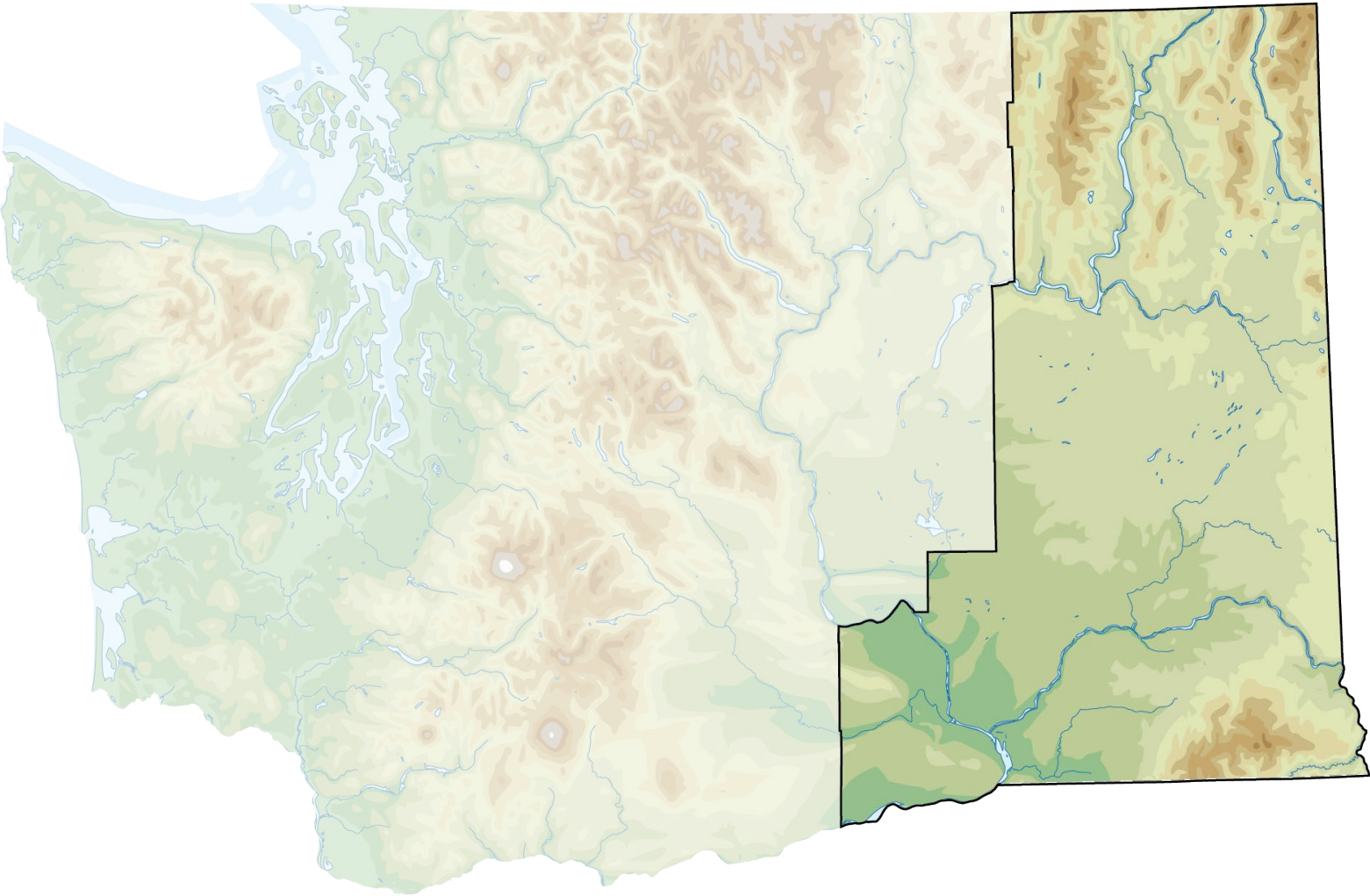


**Fig 16** Washington's State Senate seats that will be on the ballot in 2024, colored by the party affiliation of the incumbent.

In July 2023, a federal judge ruled in favor of Hispanic voters in the *Palmer v Hobbs Voting Rights Act* case, asserting that state legislative districts in Central Washington – the 14th and 15th legislative districts – violated the voting rights act by denying Hispanic voters the right to have representation in the state legislature, deciding that the districts must be redrawn ahead of the 2024 elections. This change is likely to impact the majority of legislative districts in Central and Southeastern Washington, so voters across southern Washington will once again be voting in new legislative districts next year. The court is set to finalize these new lines before the end of March 2024. The 2024 elections will be the first time Hispanic voters east of the Cascades will have the power to elect two state representatives and a state senator to the state legislature, though given trends in voter turnout across Central Washington (e.g., >20% higher turnout among White voters compared to Hispanic voters), these races will likely be highly competitive.

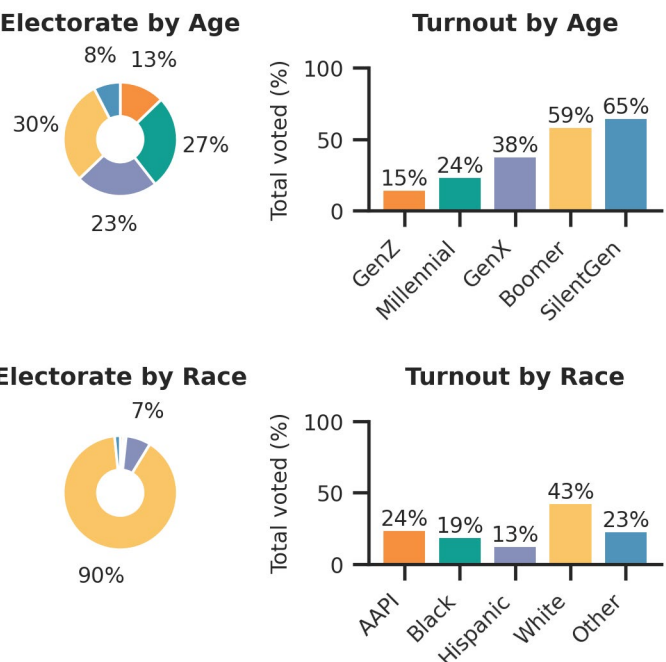

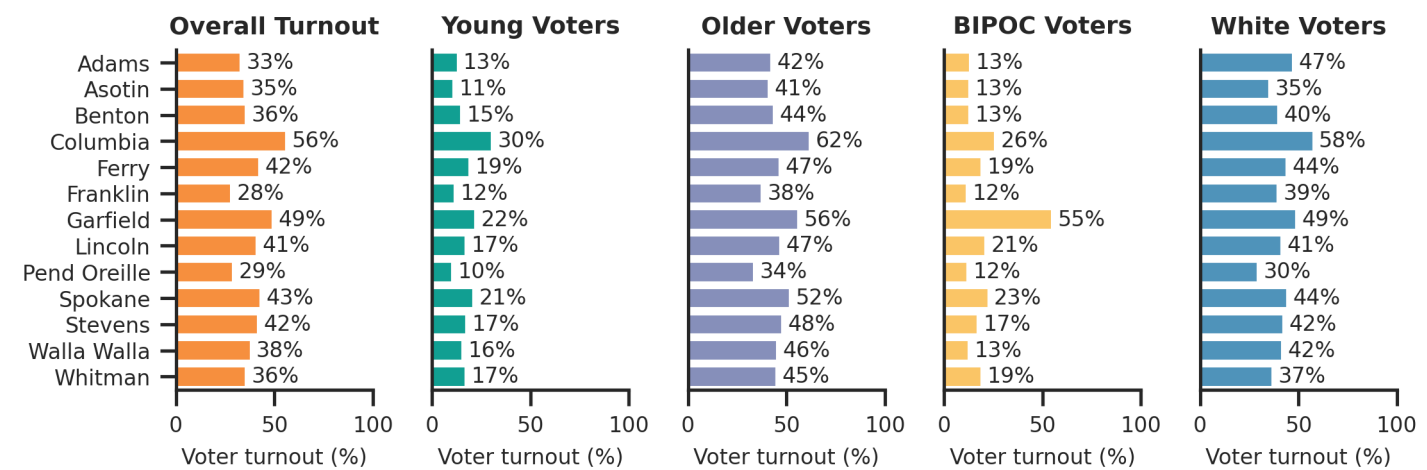
## Voter turnout & outreach

There are 665,387 registered voters in Eastern Washington, including 14,643 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 39.7% – the second highest in the state. Across Eastern Washington, voter turnout was highest in Columbia County (56.2%), Garfield County (49.1%), and Spokane County (43.2%), and lowest in Franklin County (28.3%), Pend Oreille County (29.1%), and Adams County (33.0%).

Young voters make up 27.8% of the electorate in Eastern Washington (184,968 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.8% lower than older voters (18.2% vs 48.0%). The electorate in Eastern Washington is the third least racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for just 10.3% of all registered voters, and turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 26.7% lower than White voters (15.8% vs 42.5%). From mid-August to mid-November, nine WCA Data Hub partners were active in Eastern Washington, making a total of 583,436 contact attempts to 138,635 unique voters (~0.88 attempts per voter). This included 19,283 door knocks, 111,852 phone calls, 46,023 text messages, and 381,485 mailers.

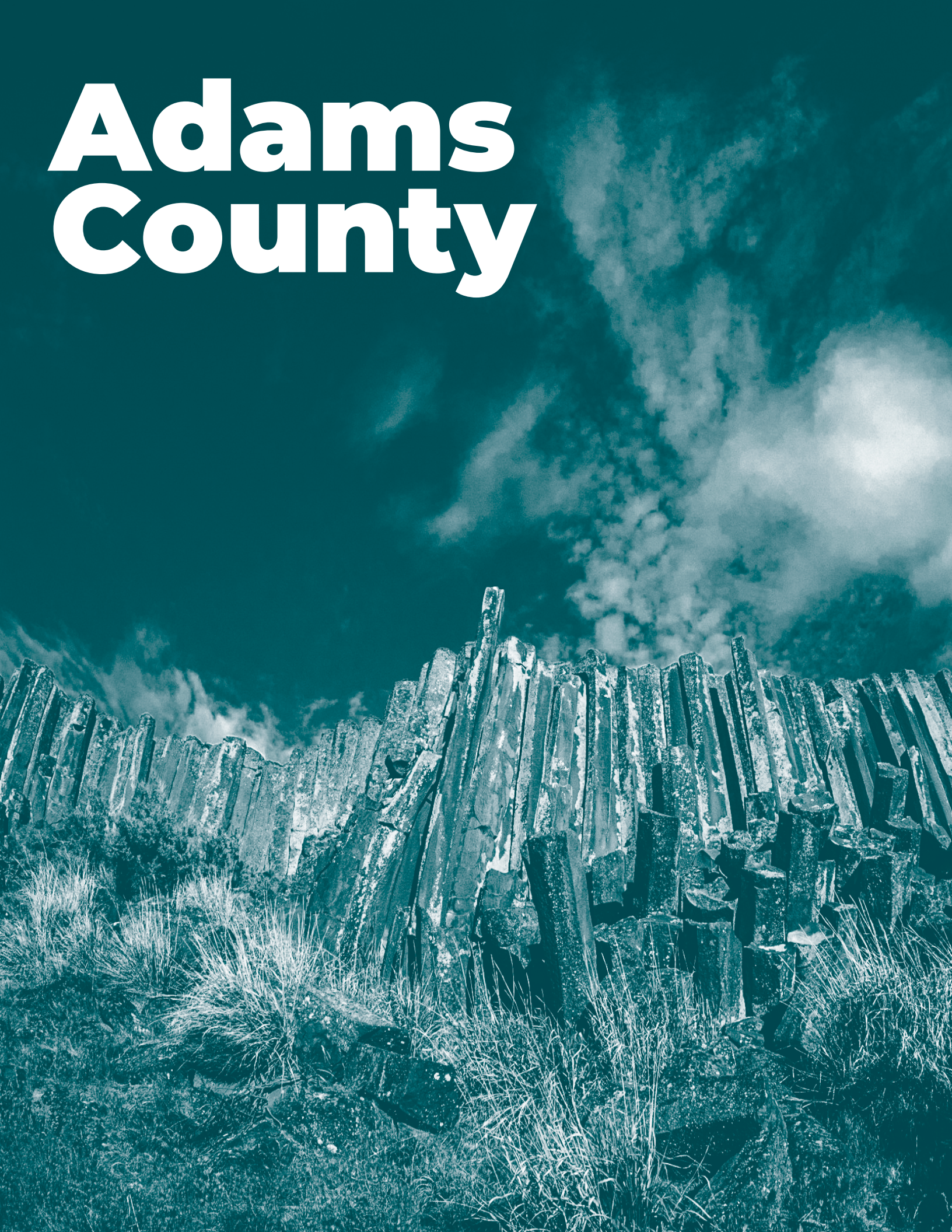


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Eastern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.



**Fig 2** Voter turnout by county in Eastern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.



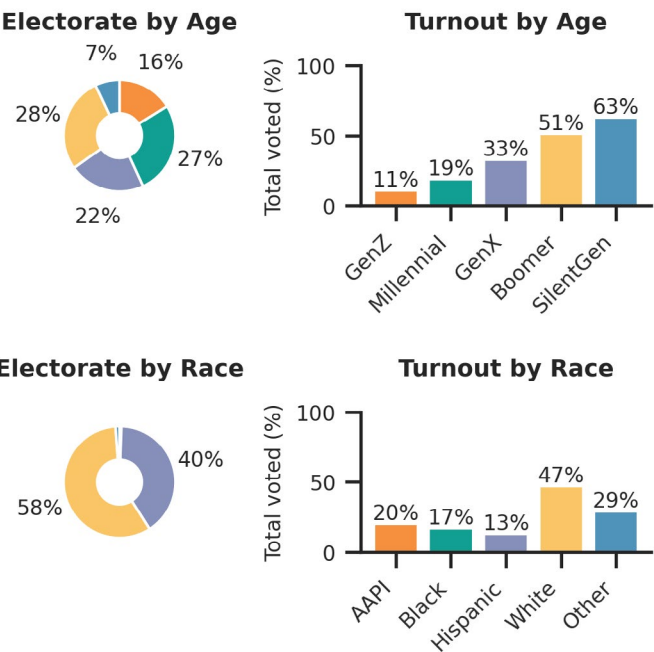

### Voter turnout

There are 7,767 registered voters in Adams County, including 140 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 32.9%. Turnout was 10.4% lower than the 2019 General Election and 20.6% lower than the 2022 General Election. Young voters make up 32.3% of the electorate in Adams County (2,512 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.3% lower than older voters (13.1% vs 42.4%). The electorate in Adams County is 42.1% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 34.1% lower than White voters (13.2% vs 47.3%). There were no countywide or county council races on the ballot in Adams County this year.

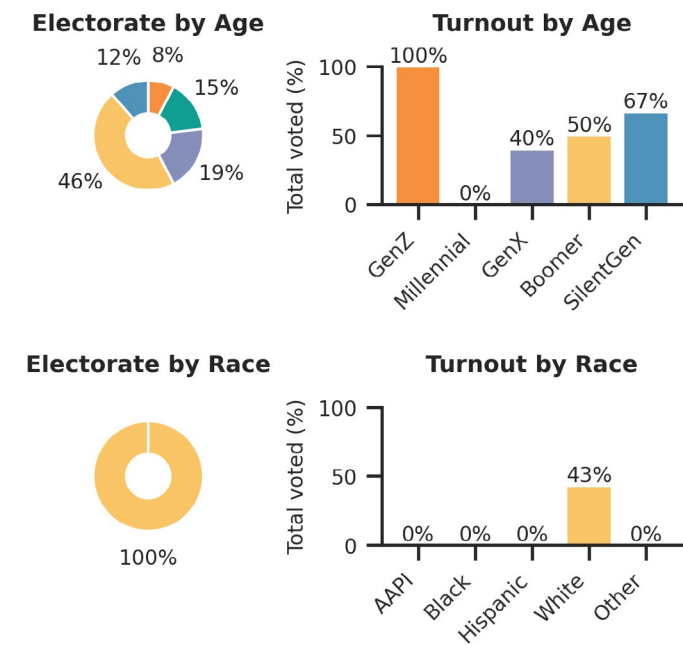


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Adams County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

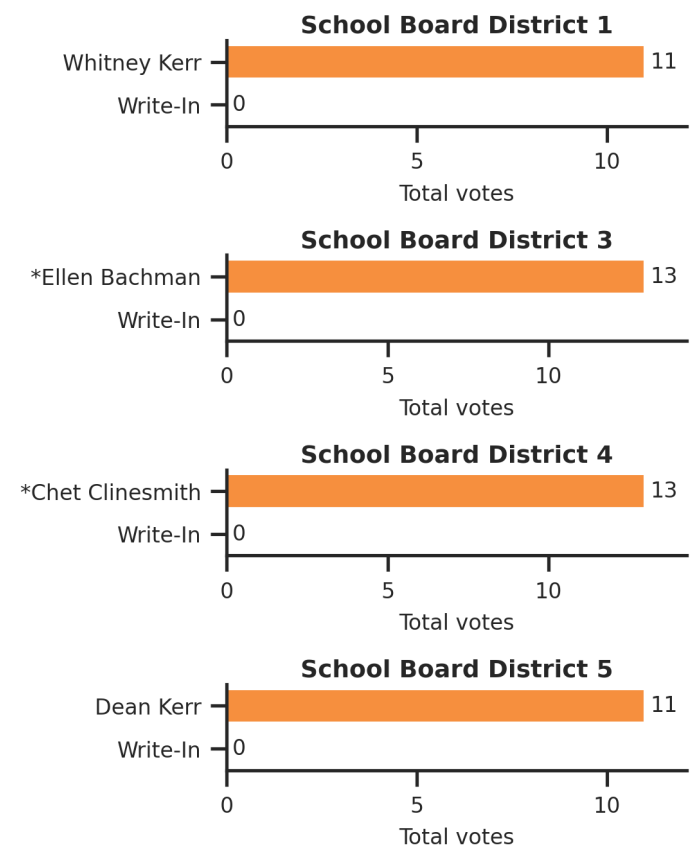

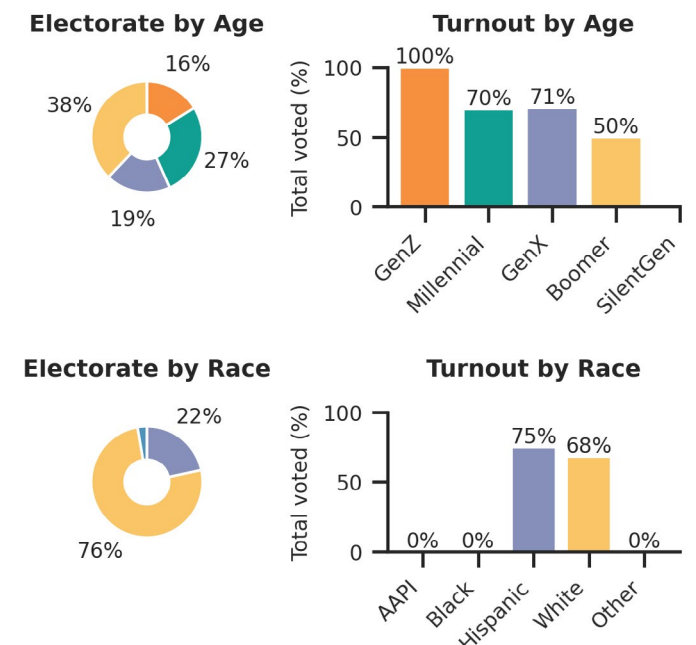

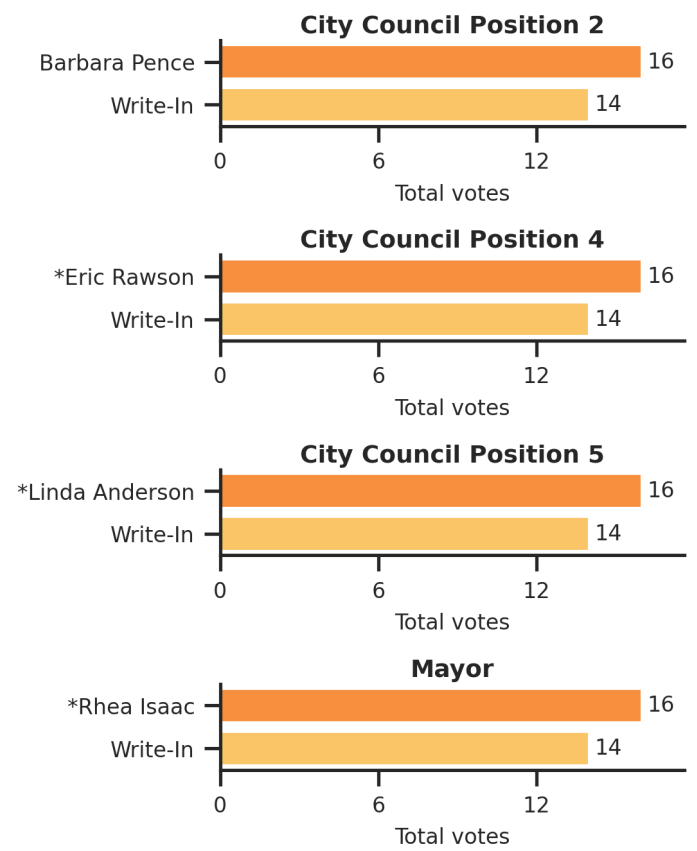

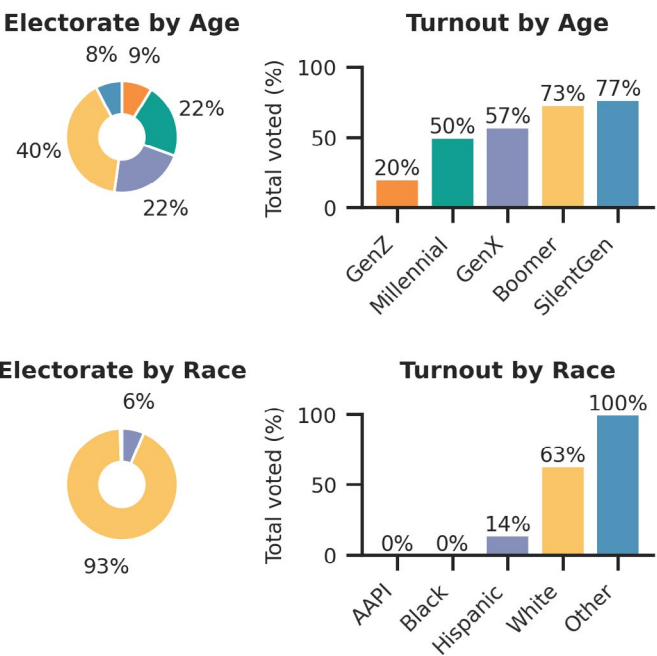

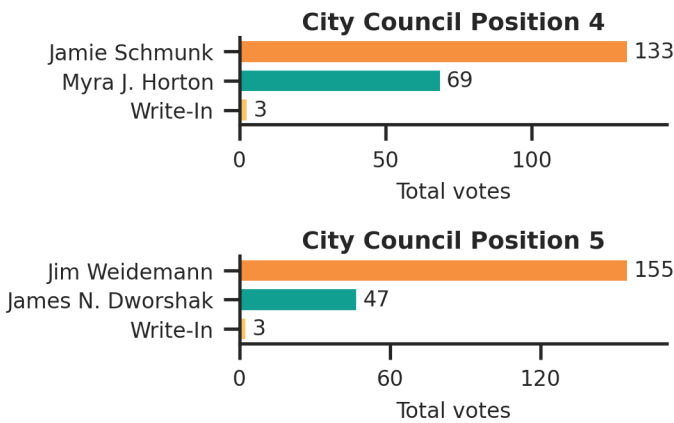

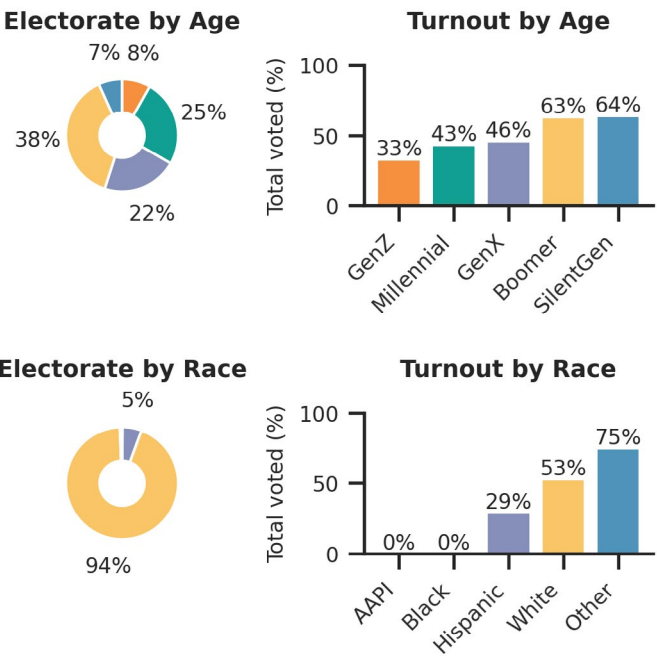

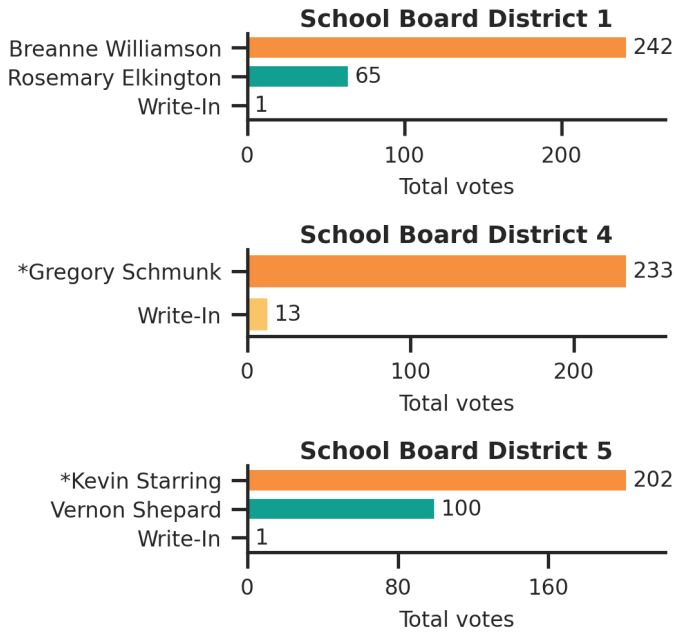

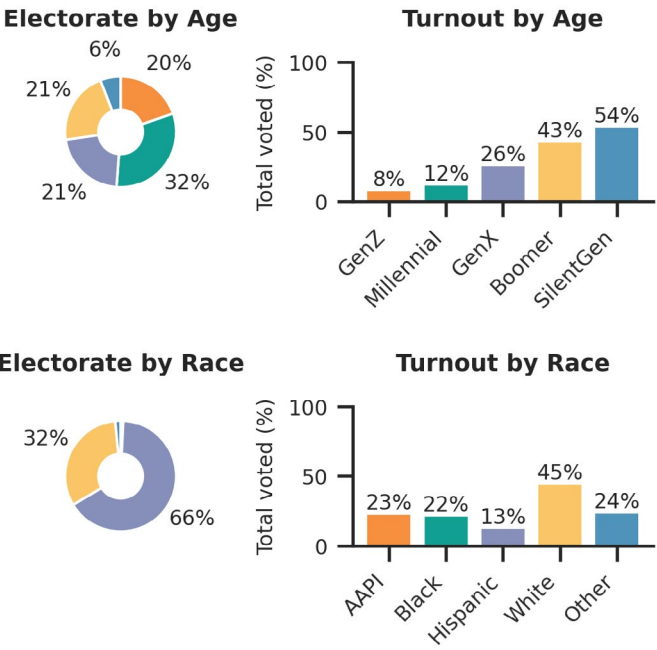


**Fig 2** Election results in Lind School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

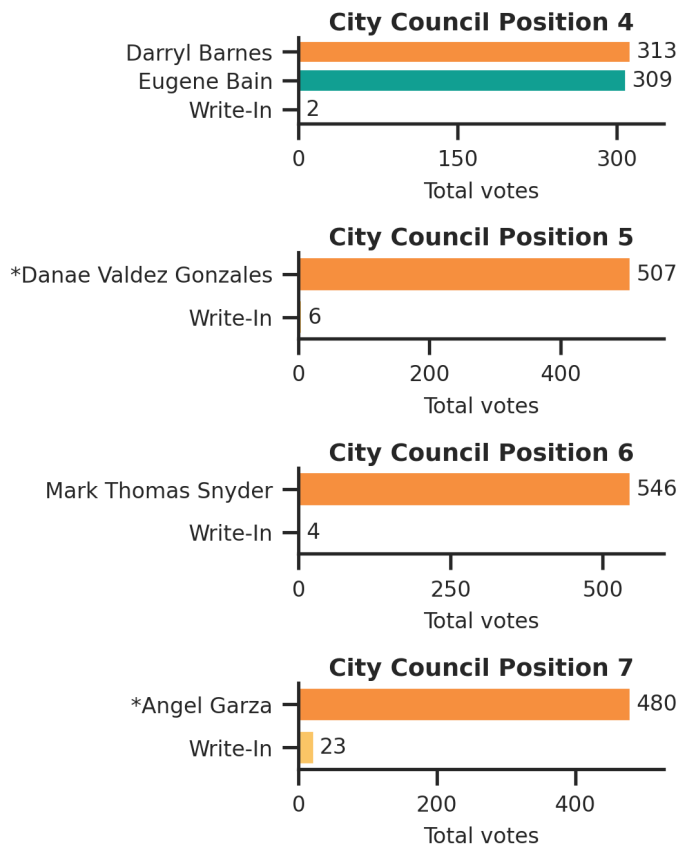

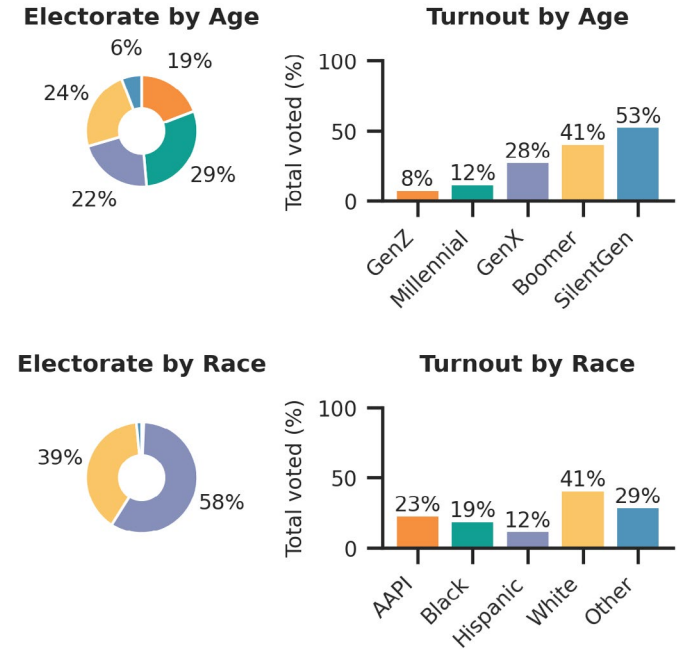

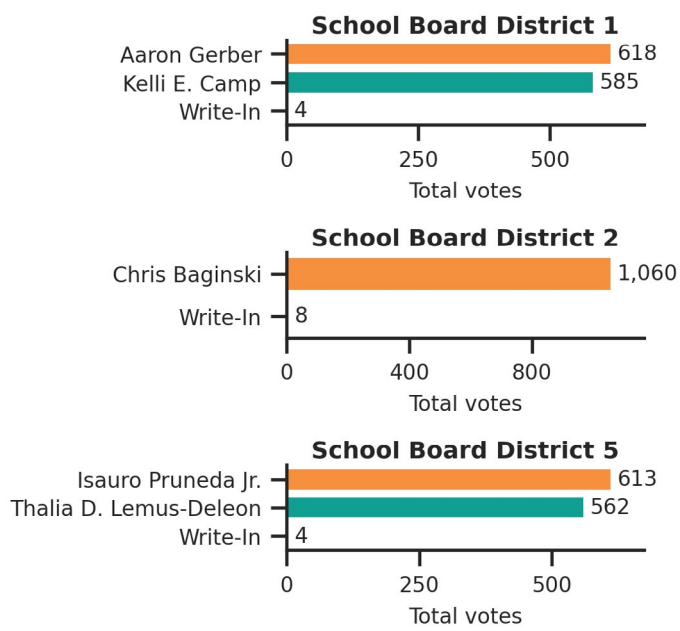

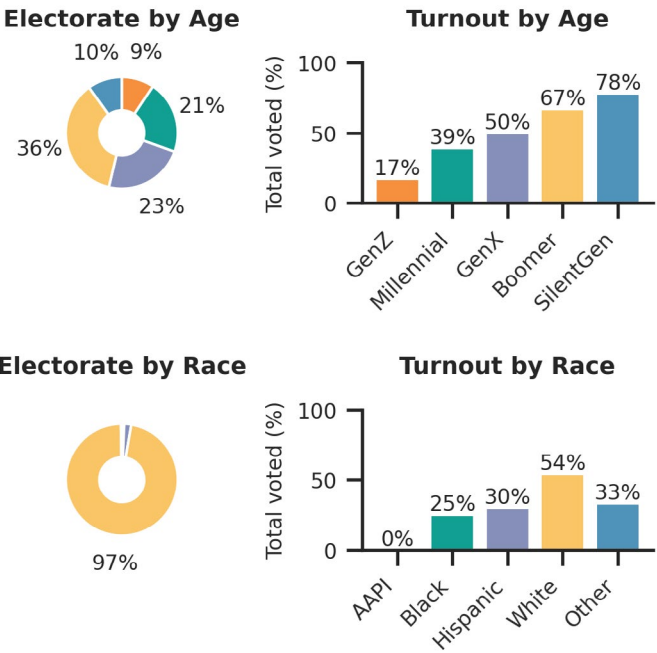

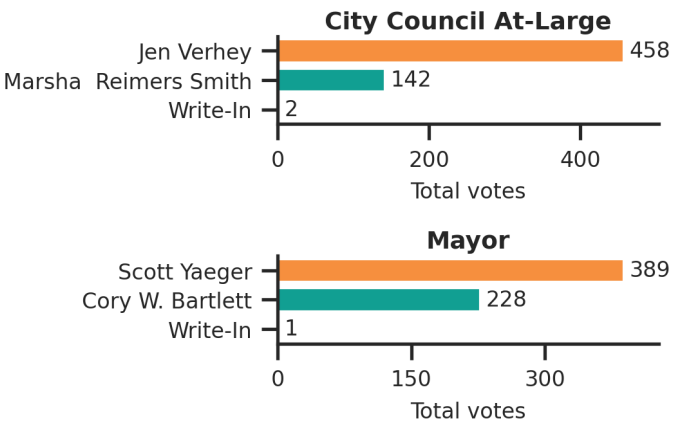
There are 1,132 registered voters in Ritzville, including 24 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 53.7%. Young voters make up 20.9% of the electorate in Ritzville (237 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 35.4% lower than older voters (25.7% vs 61.1%). 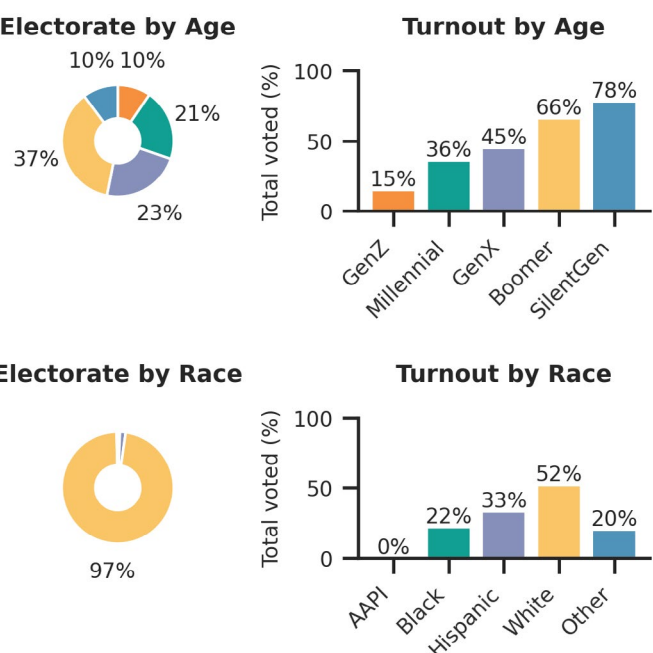

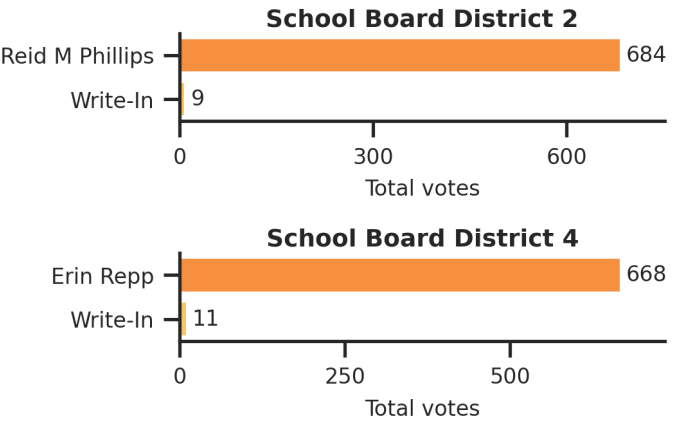

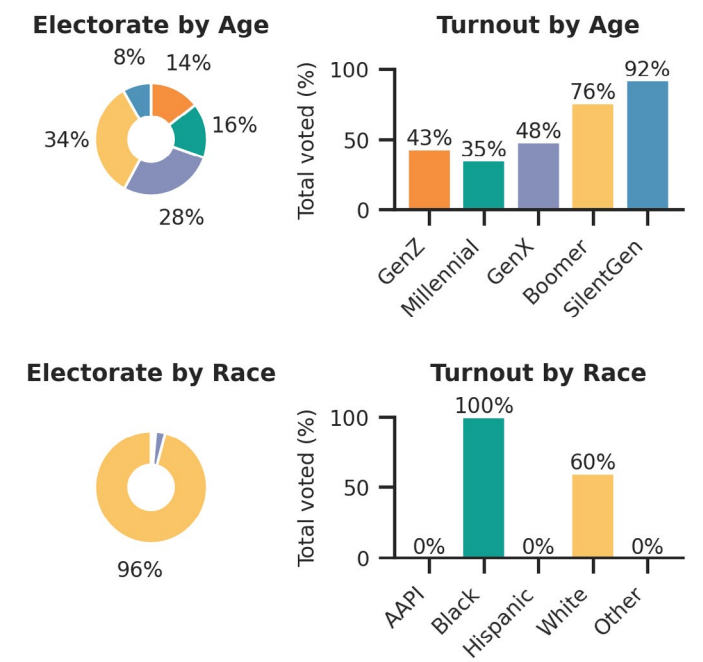


**Fig 2** Election results in Ritzville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

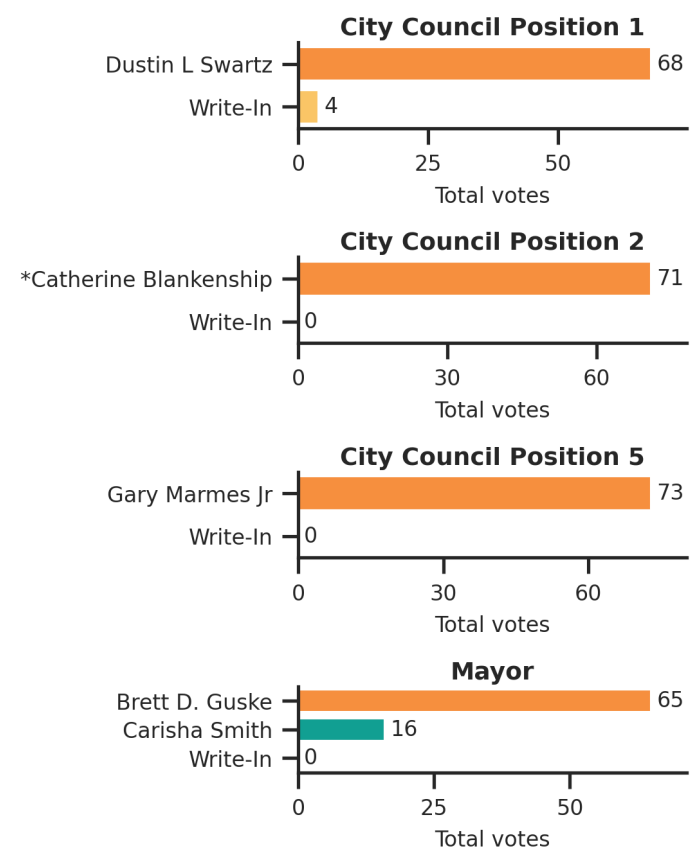

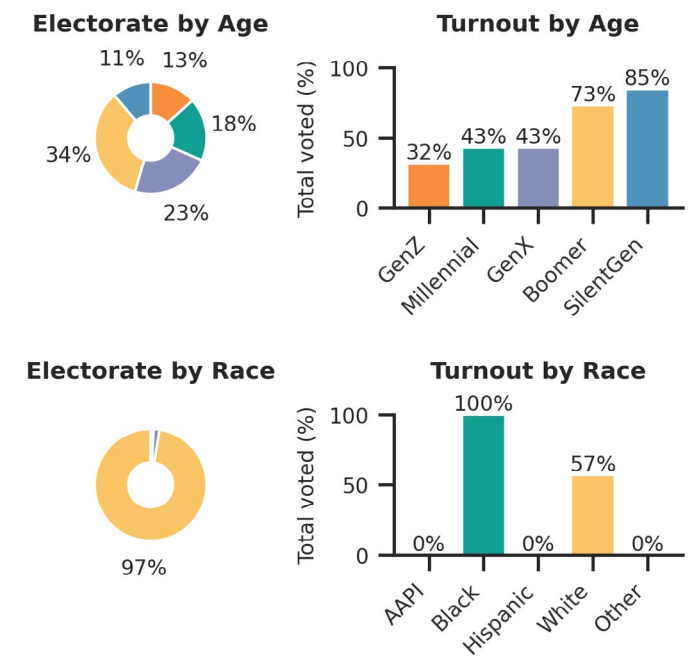

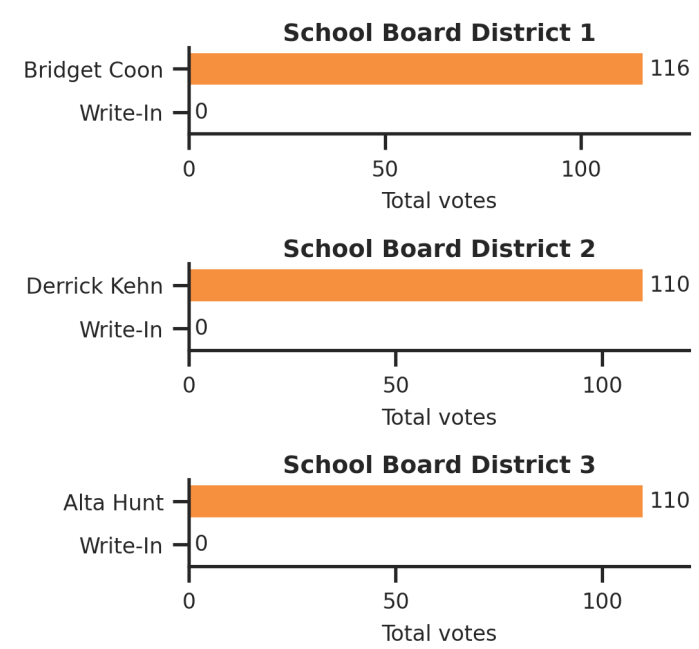

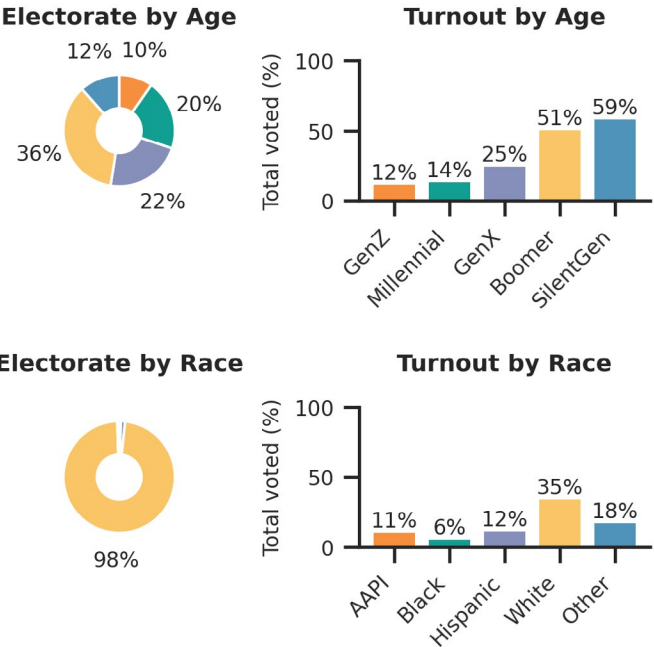


**Fig 2** Election results in Washtucna School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

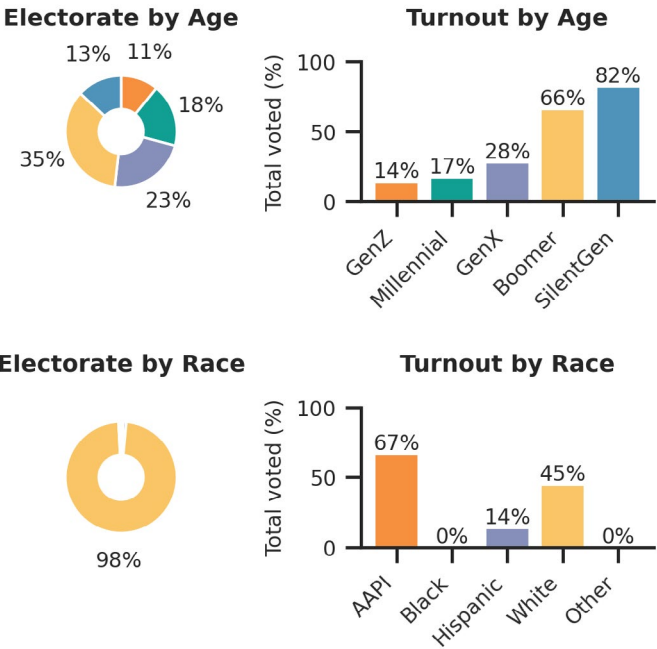


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Asotin for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

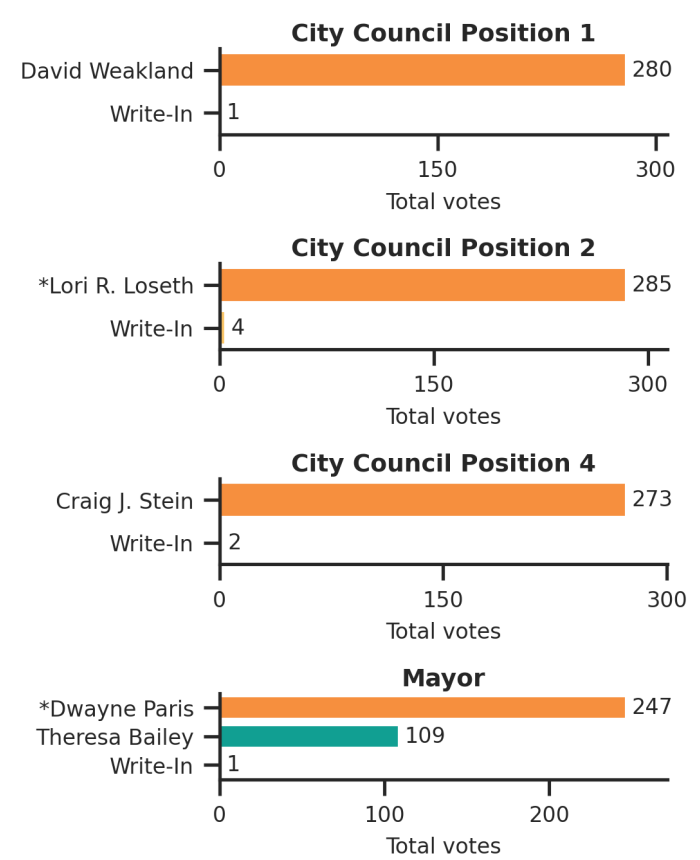


Fig 2 Election results in Asotin for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

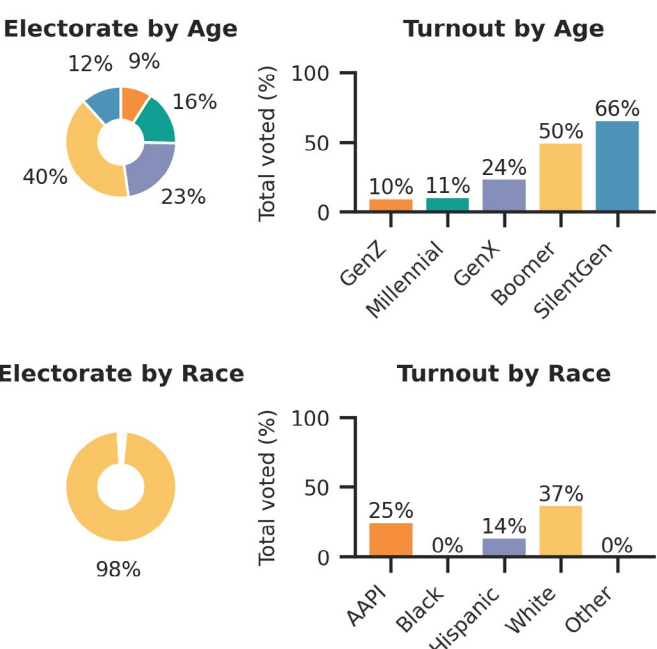


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Asotin-Anatone School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

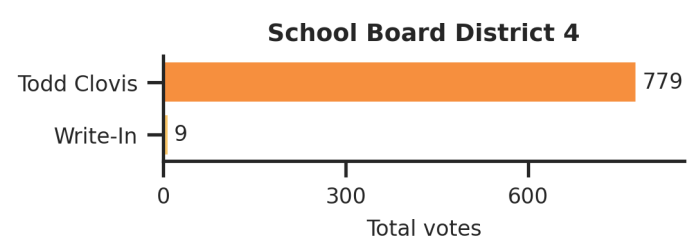


Fig 2 Election results in Asotin-Anatone School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

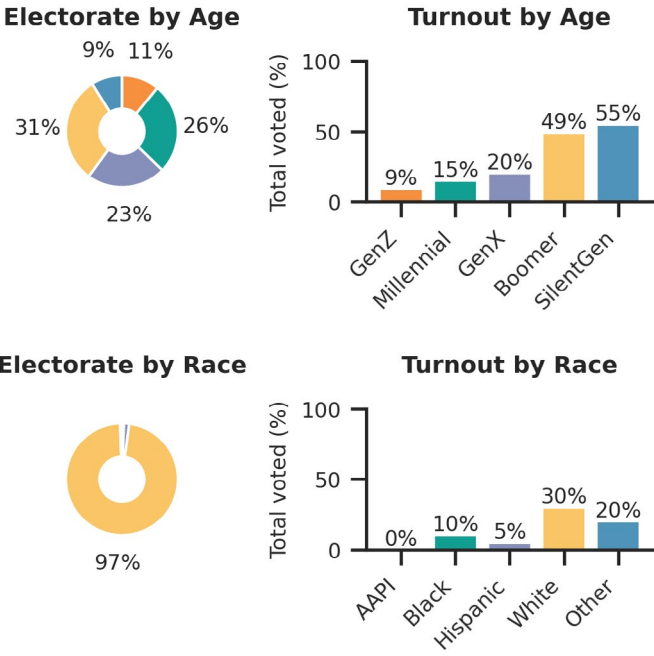


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Clarkston for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

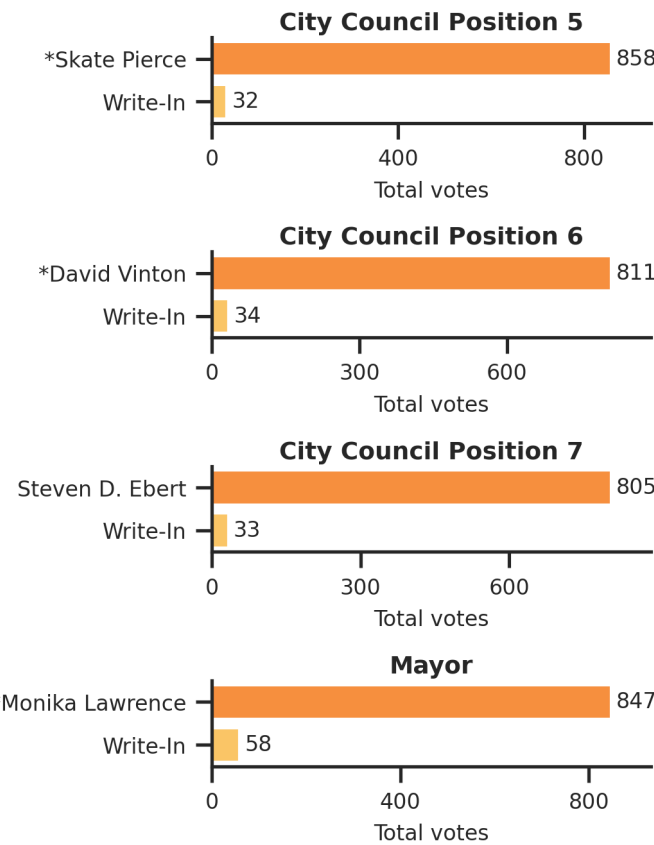


Fig 2 Election results in Clarkston for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

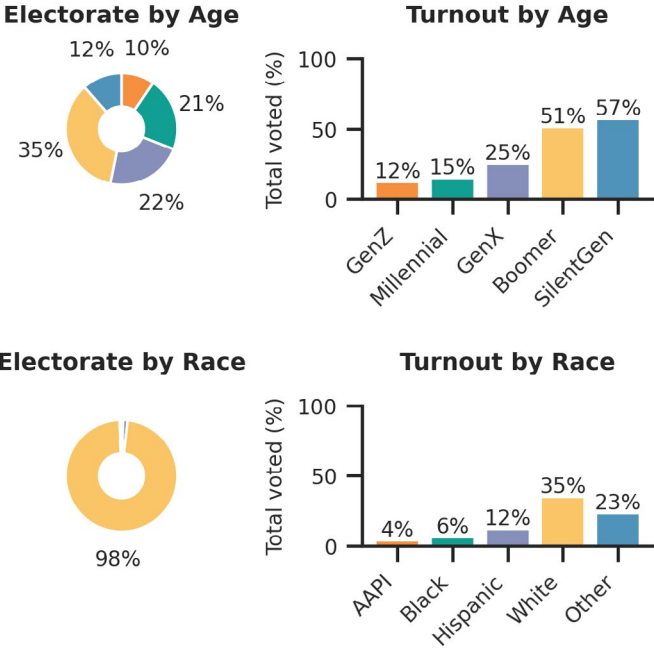


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Clarkston School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

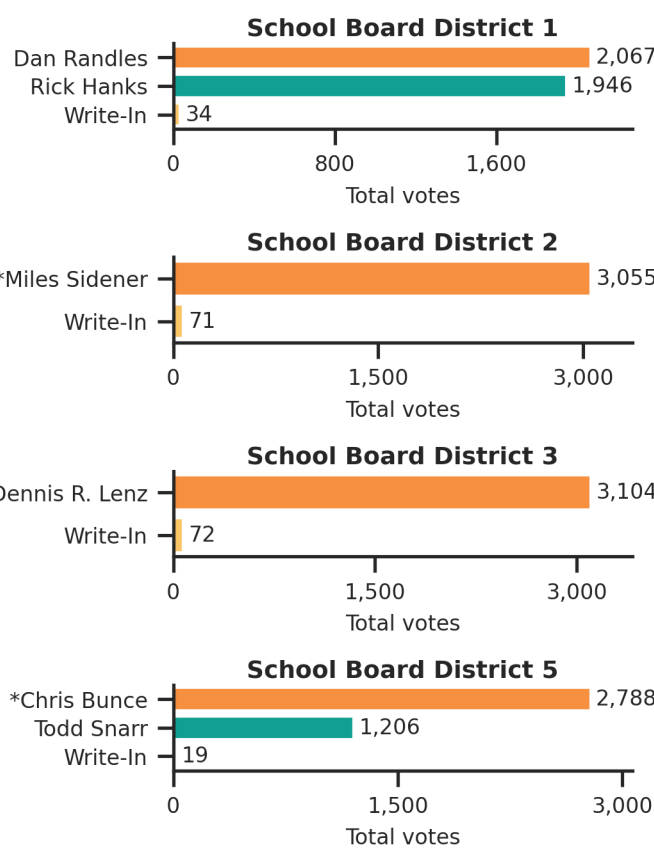
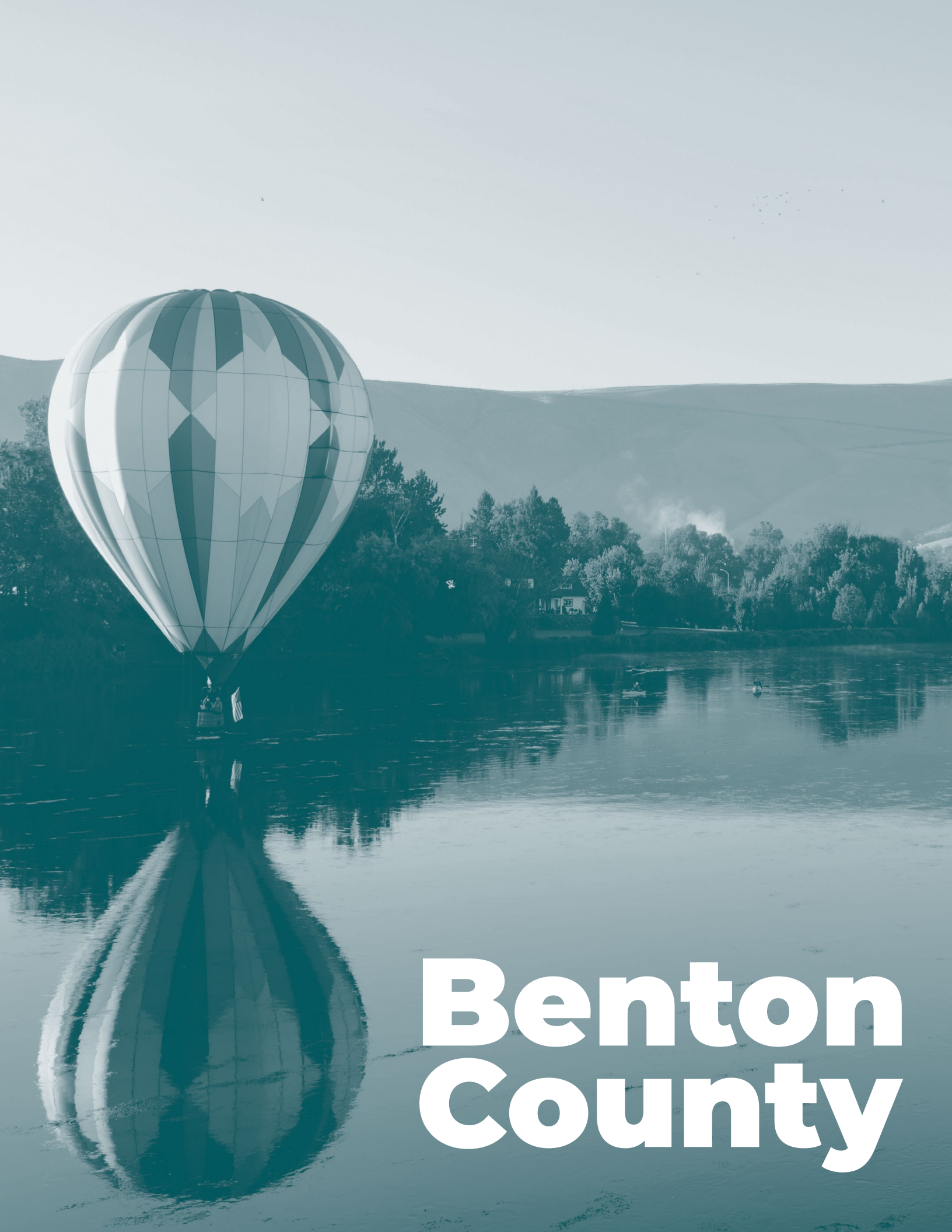


Fig 2 Election results in Clarkston School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





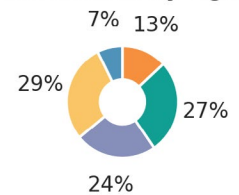

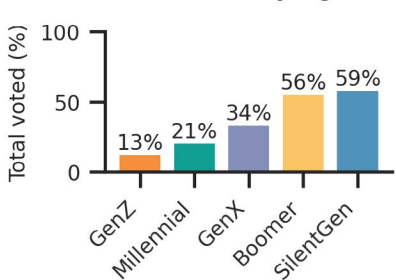

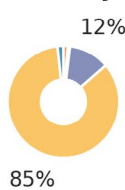
Electorate by Age



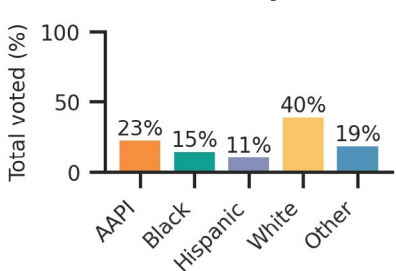

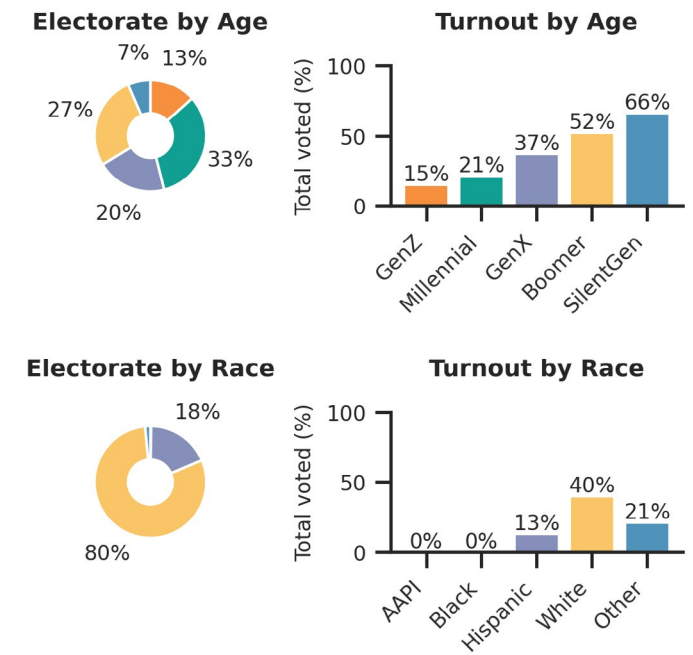


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Benton City for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

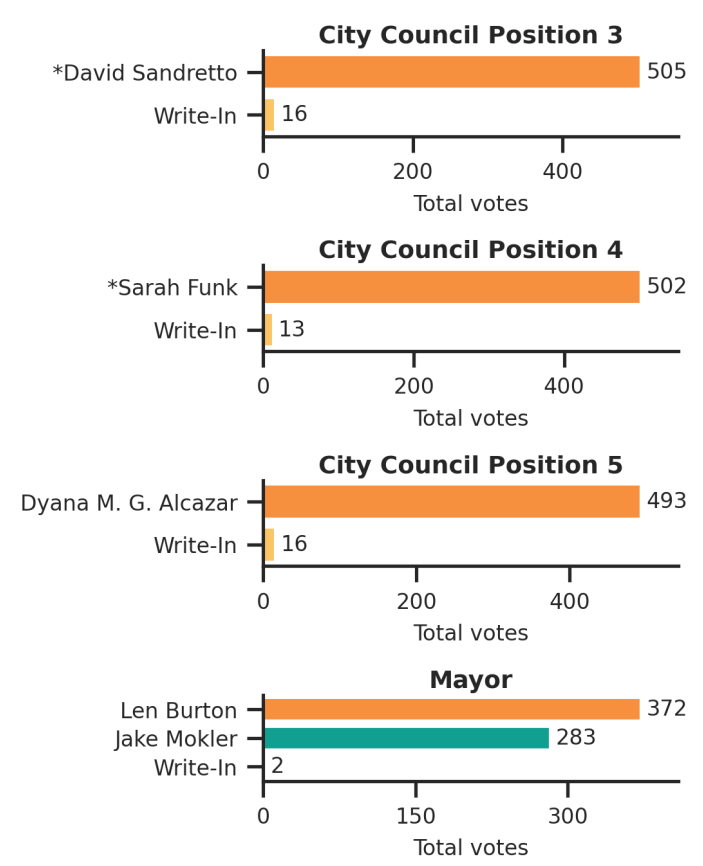


Fig 2 Election results in Benton City for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

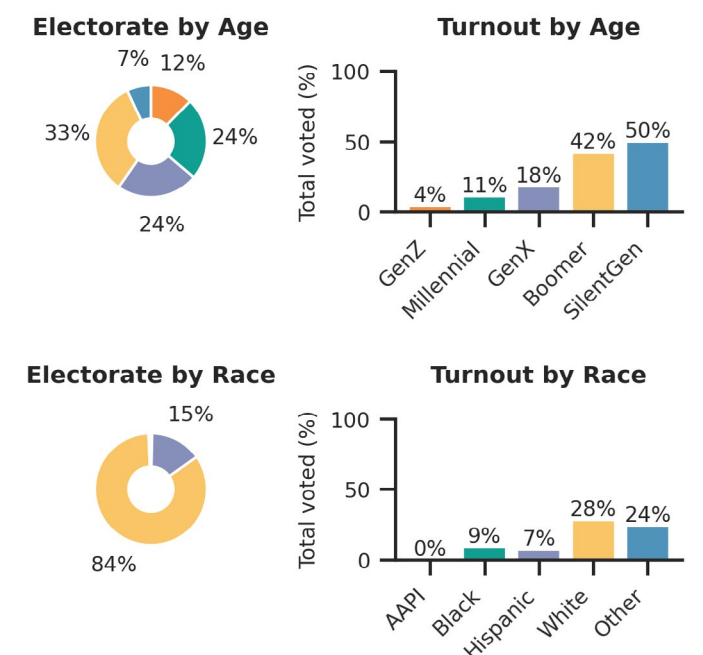


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Finley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

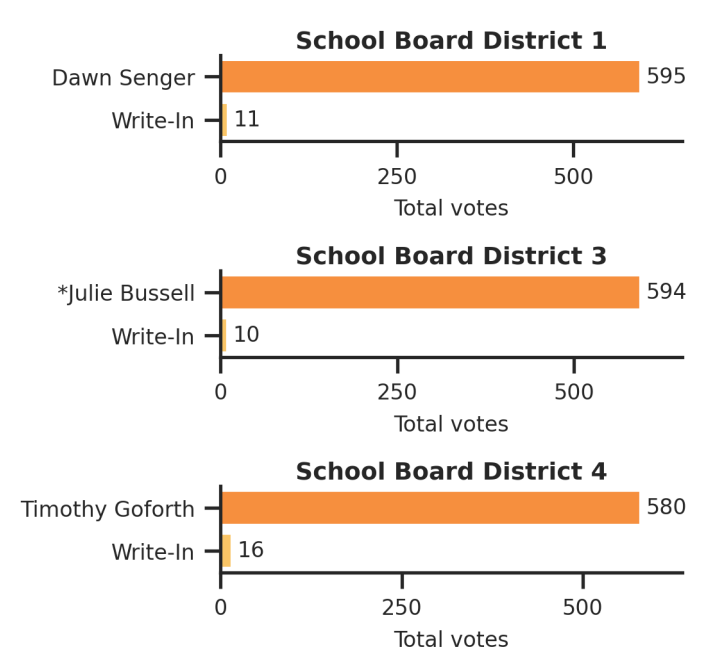


Fig 2 Election results in Finley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

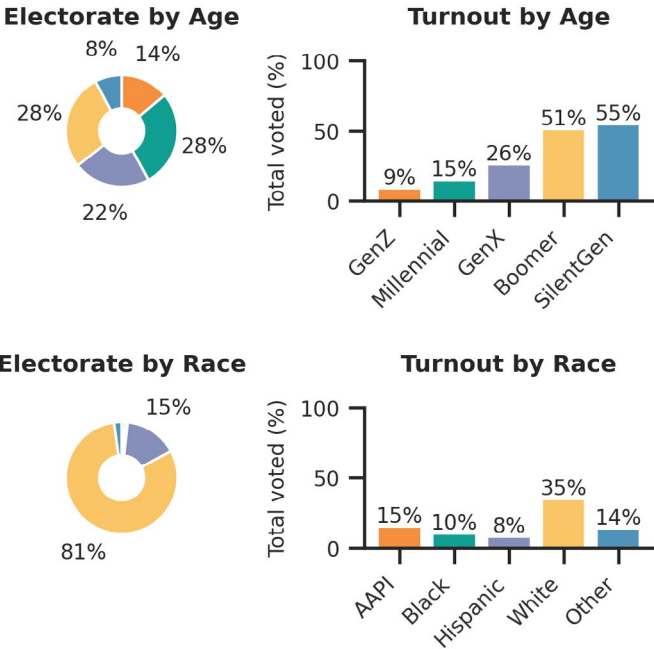


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kennewick for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

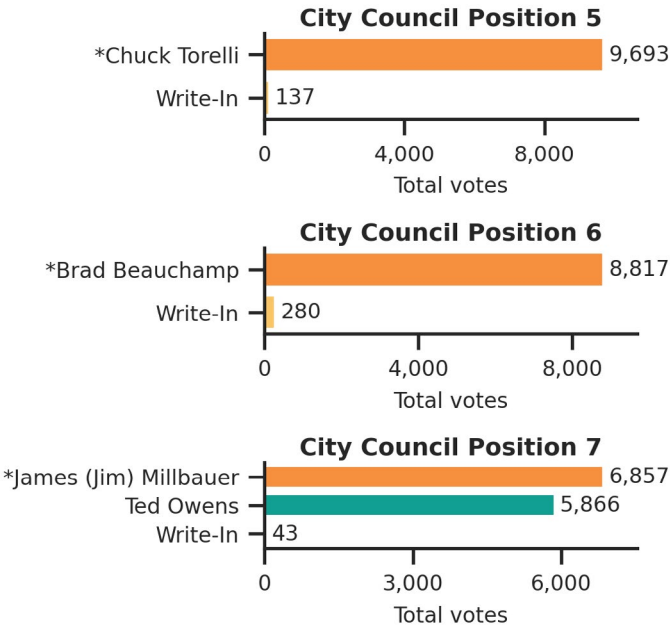


Fig 2 Election results in Kennewick for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

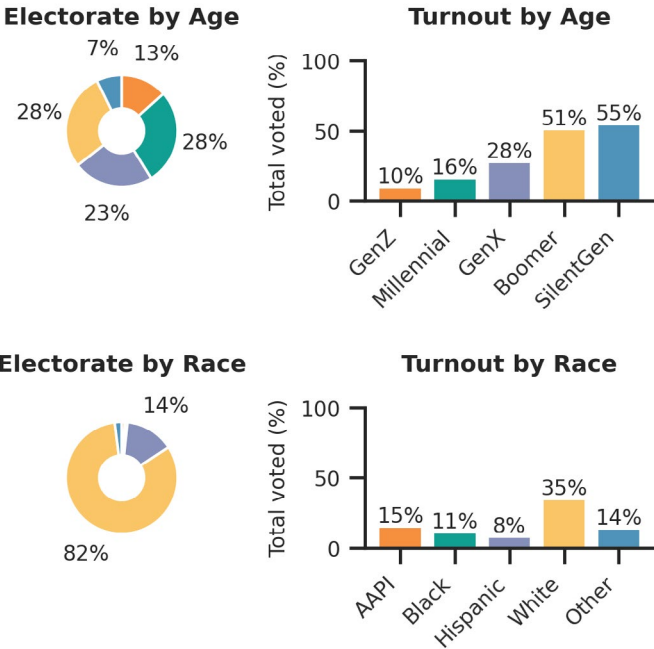


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kennewick School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

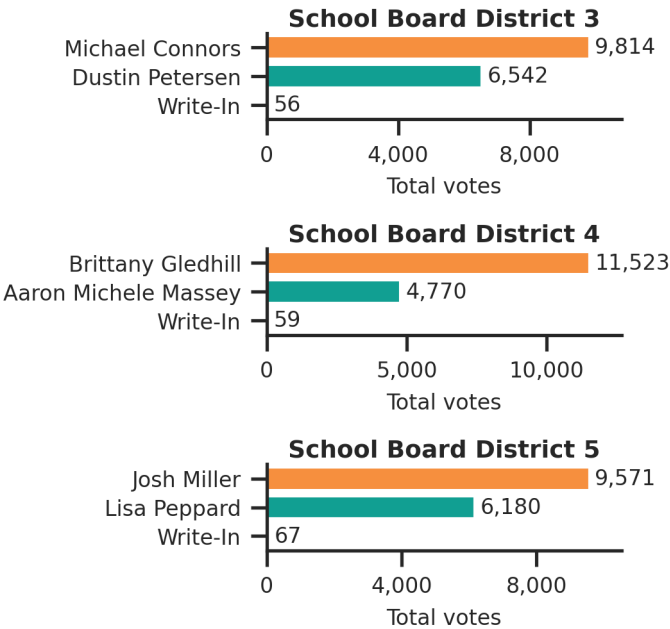
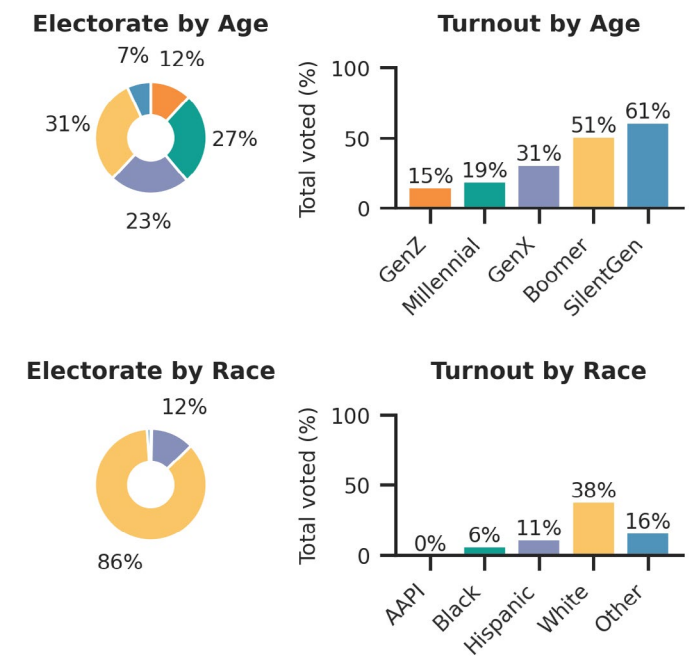


Fig 2 Election results in Kennewick School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

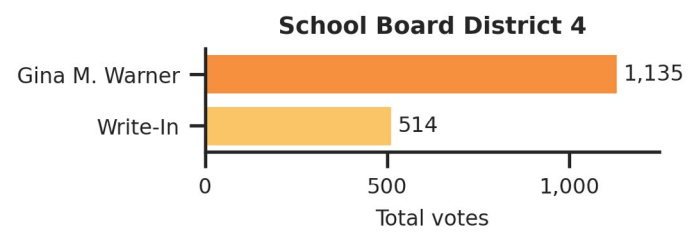

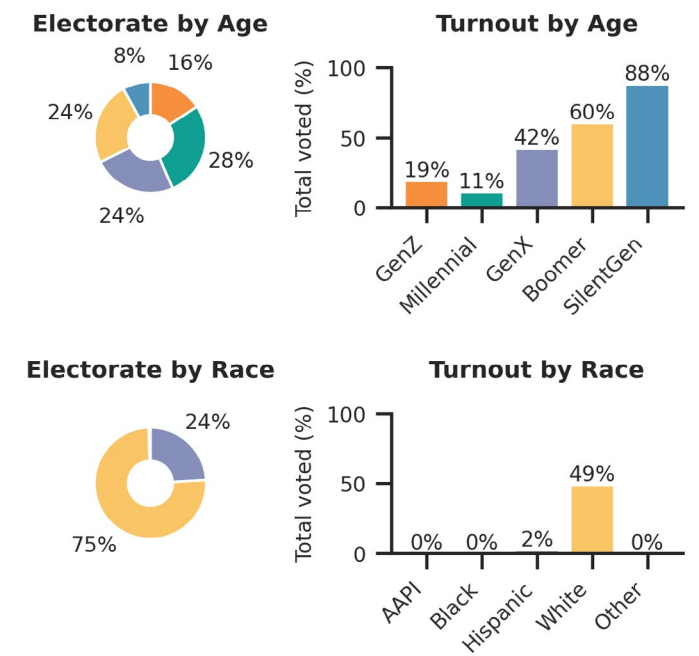


**Fig 2** Election results in Kiona-Benton City School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents

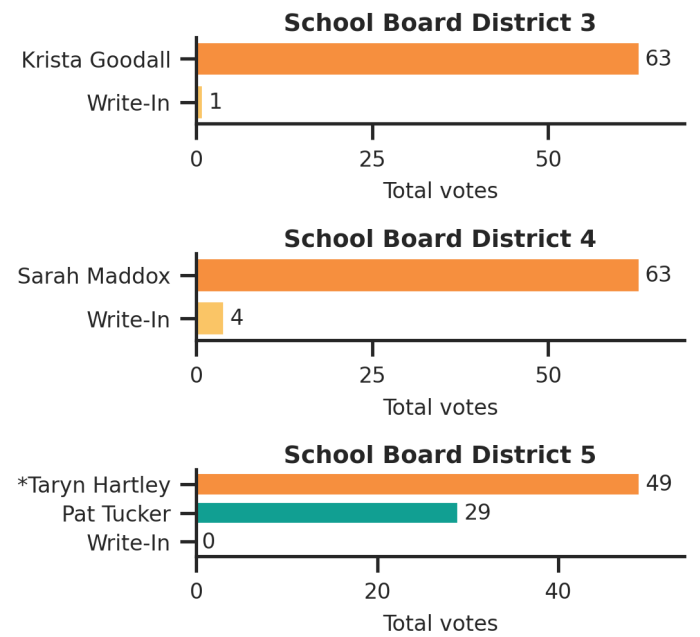

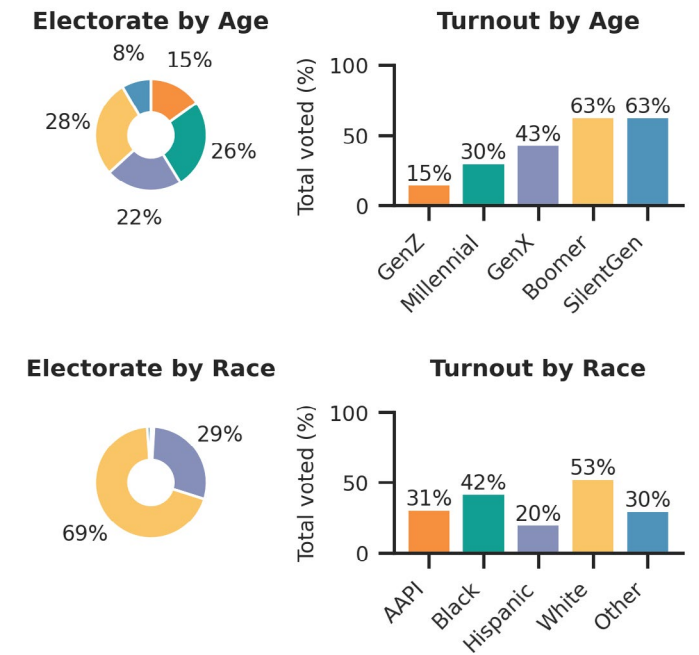


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Prosser for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

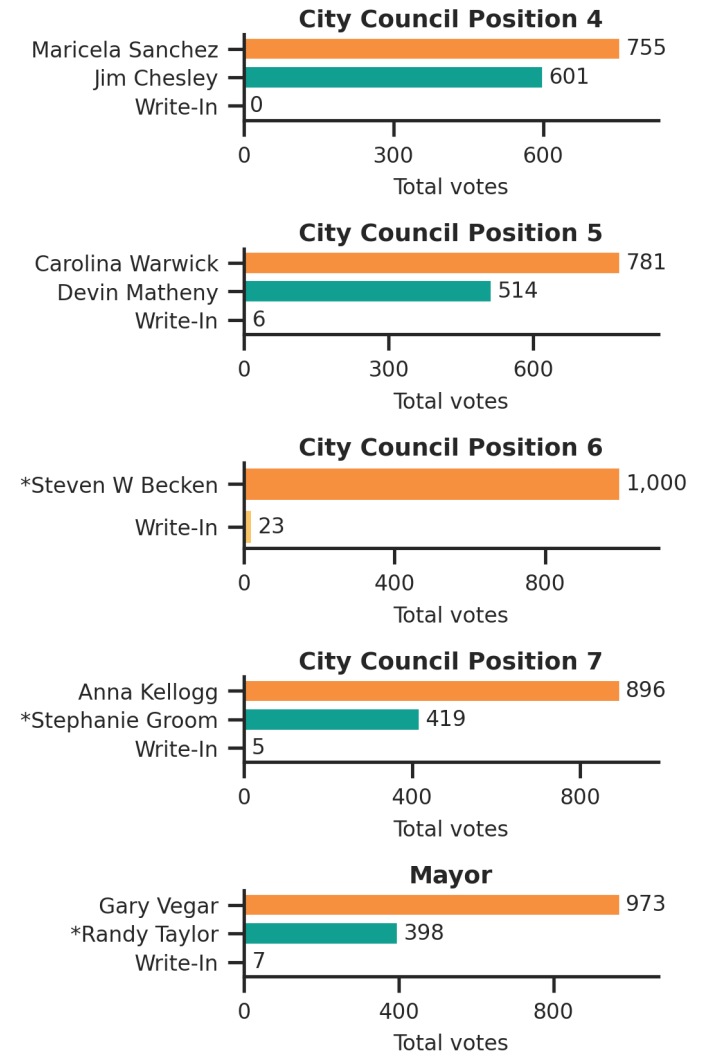


Fig 2 Election results in Prosser for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

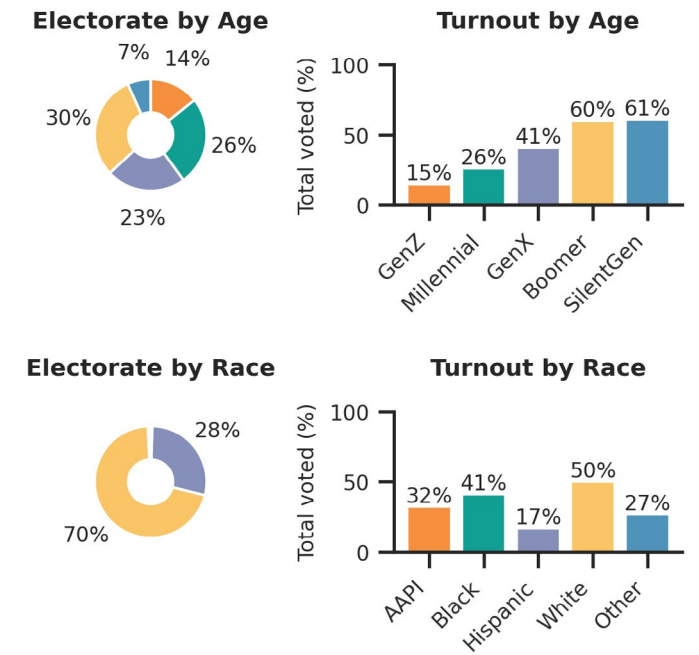


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Prosser School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

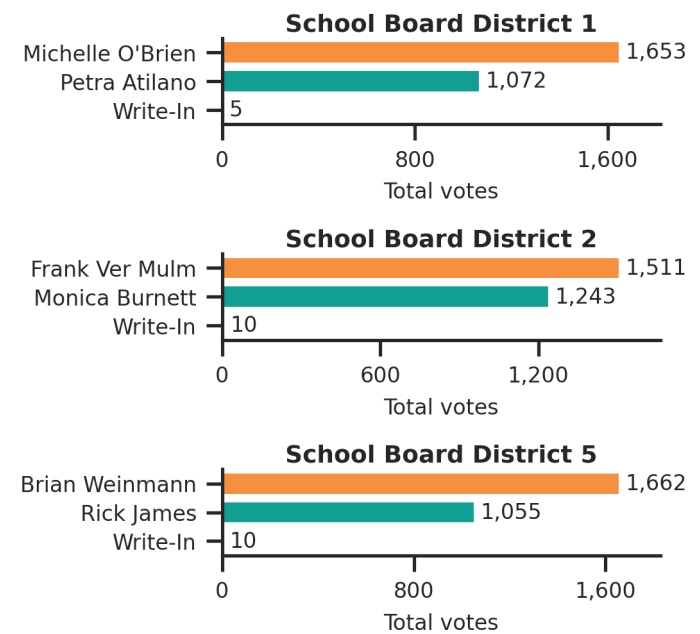


Fig 2 Election results in Prosser School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

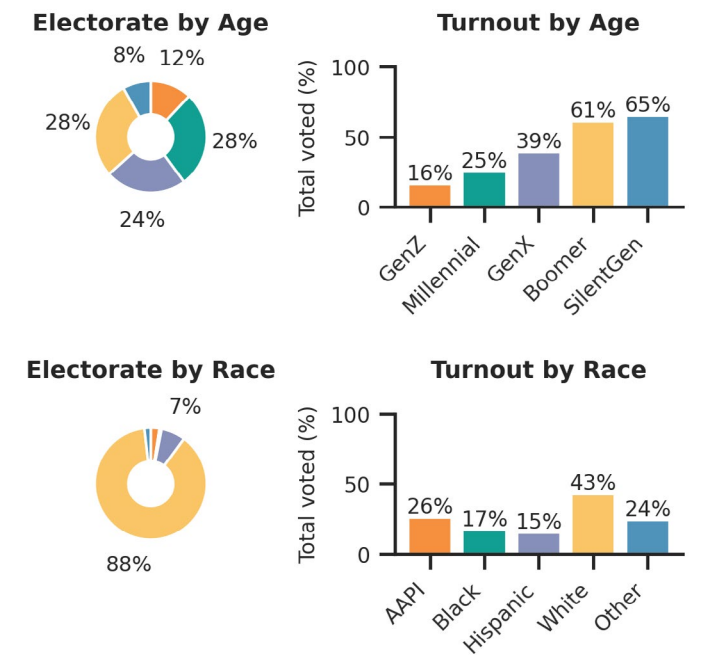


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Richland for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

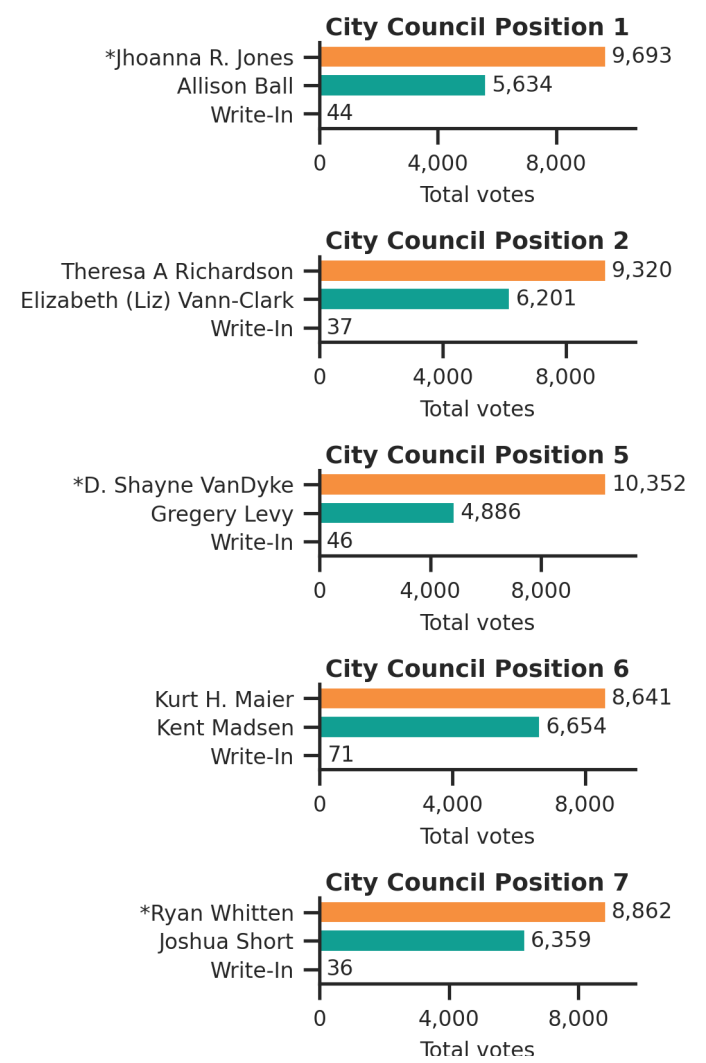


Fig 2 Election results in Richland for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

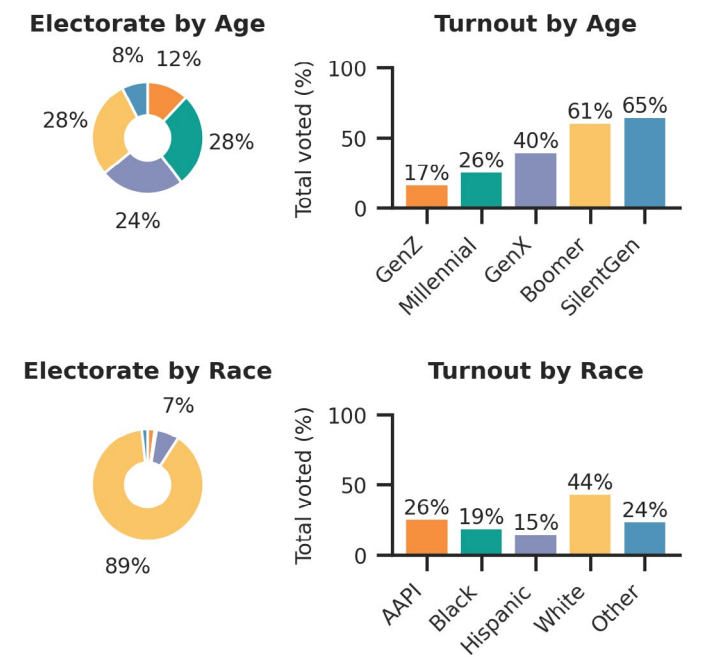


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Richland School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

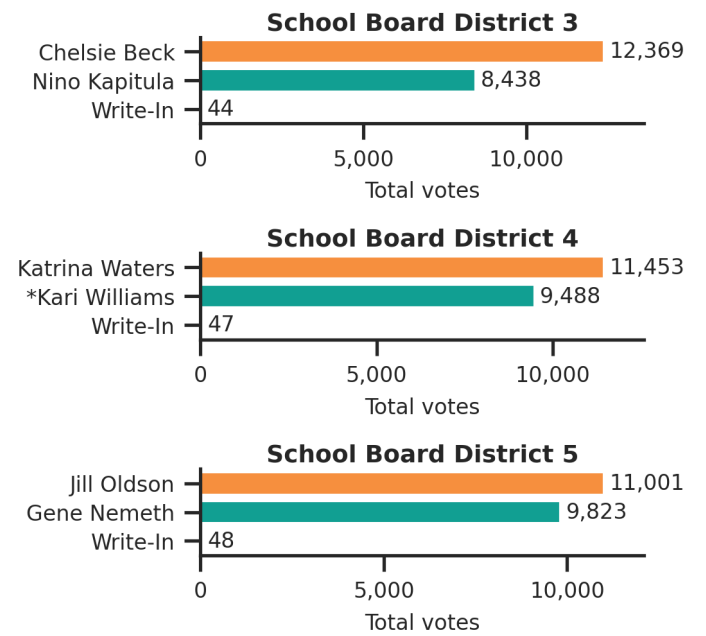
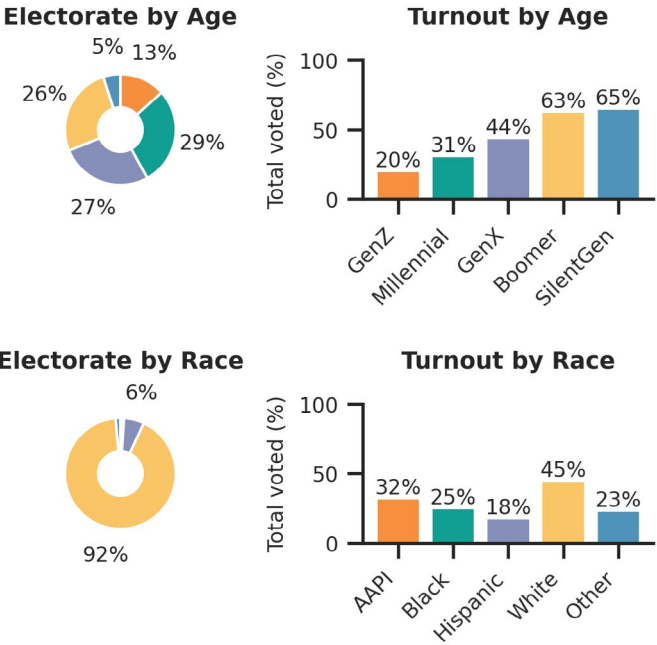


Fig 2 Election results in Richland School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

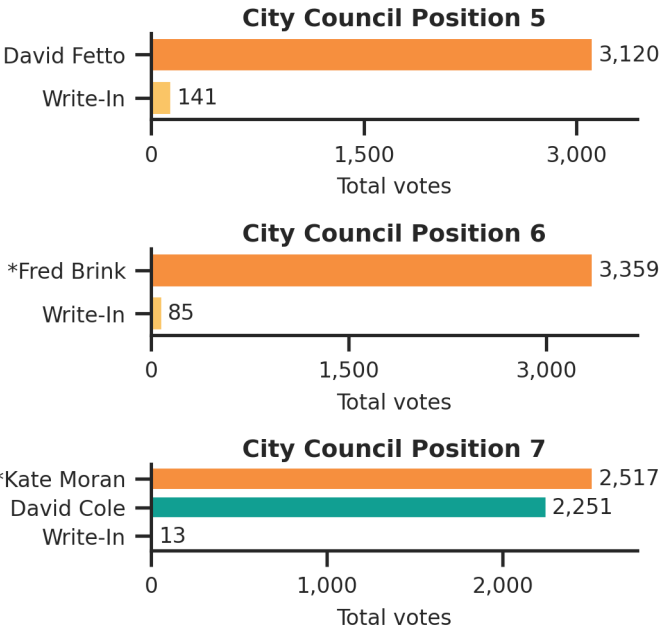

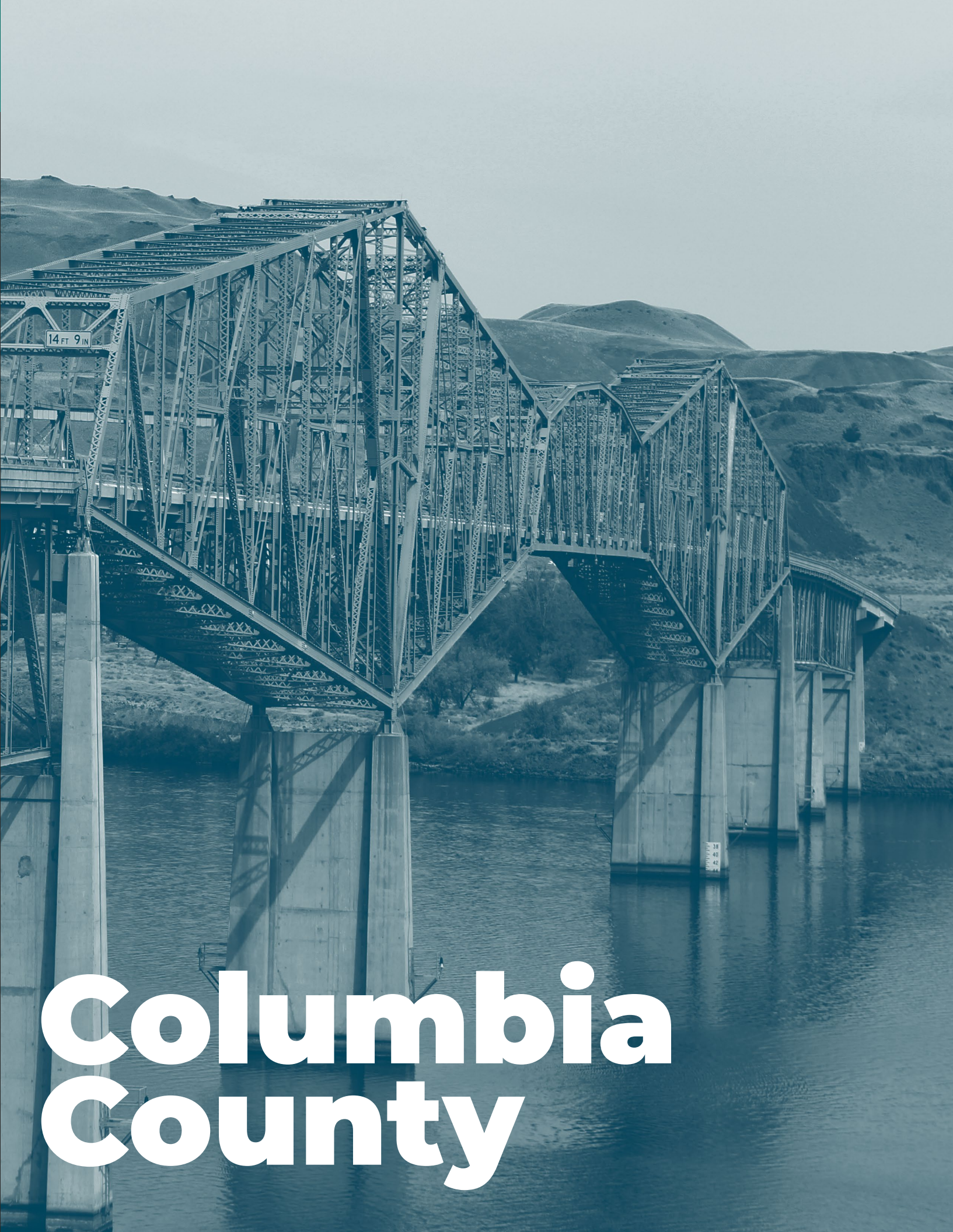
**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in West Richland for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

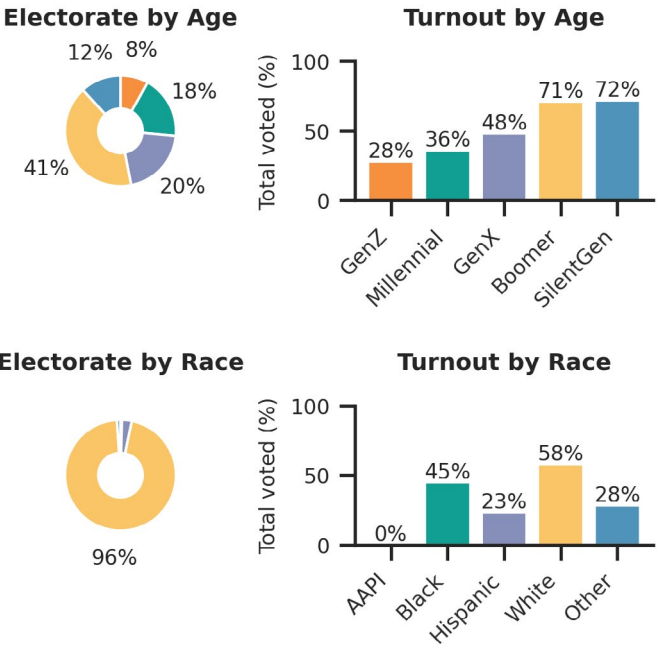


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Columbia County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

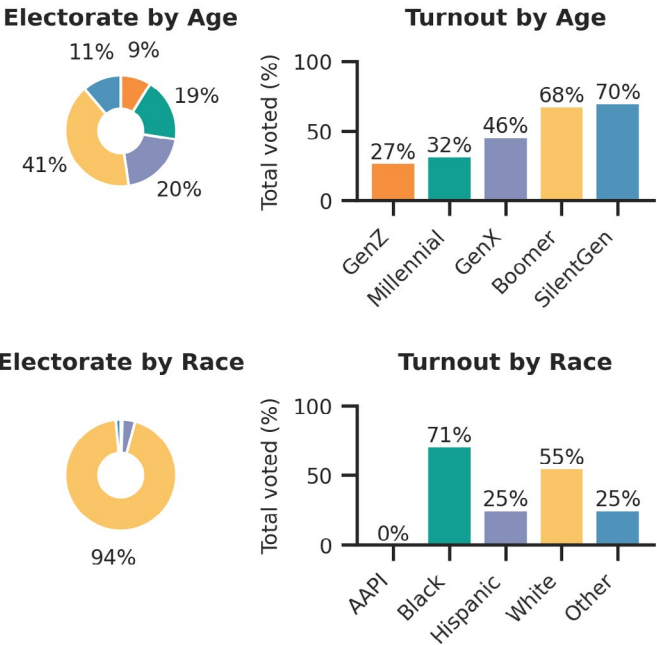


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Dayton for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

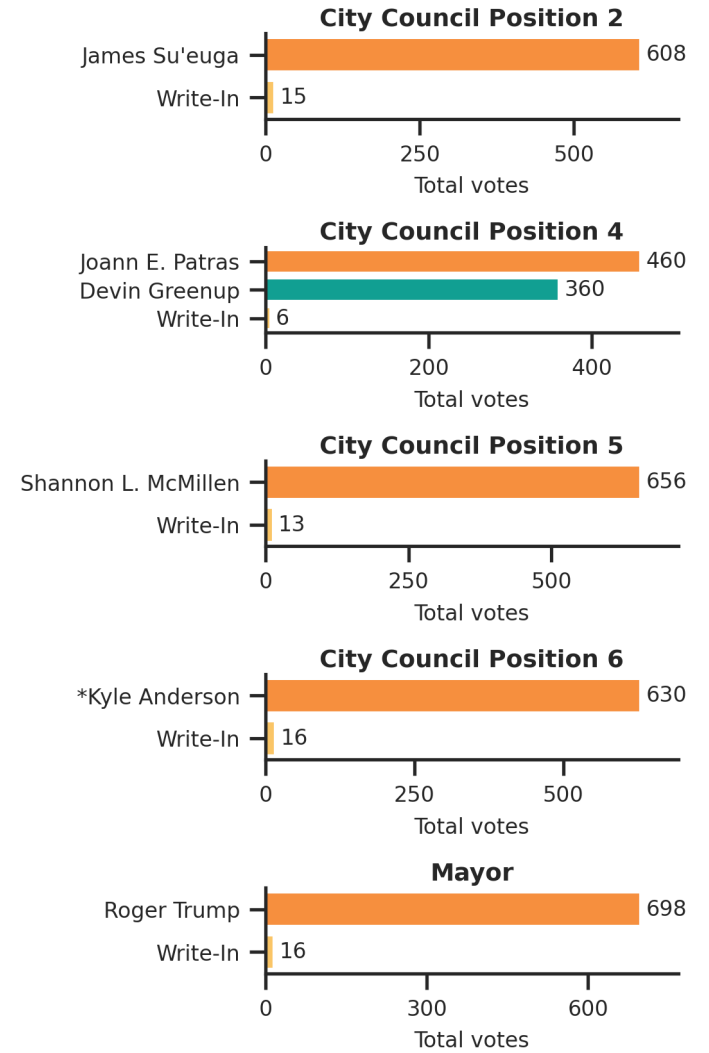
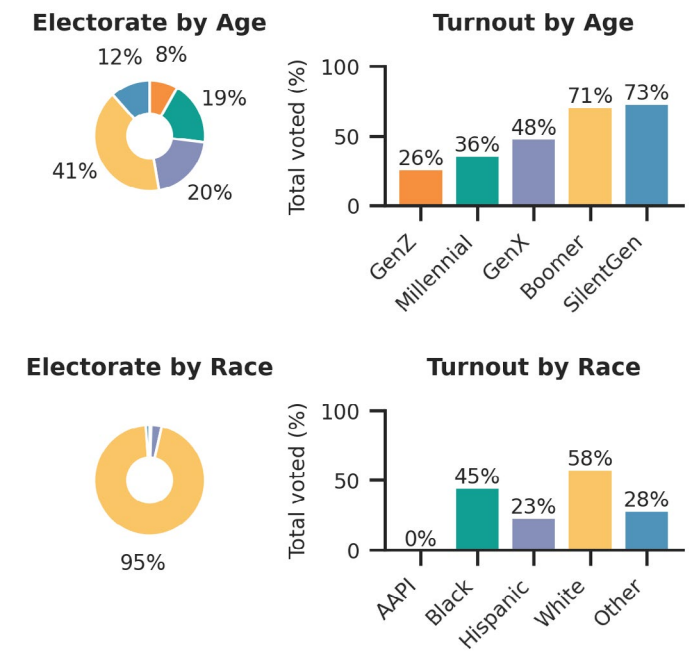


Fig 2 Election results in Dayton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

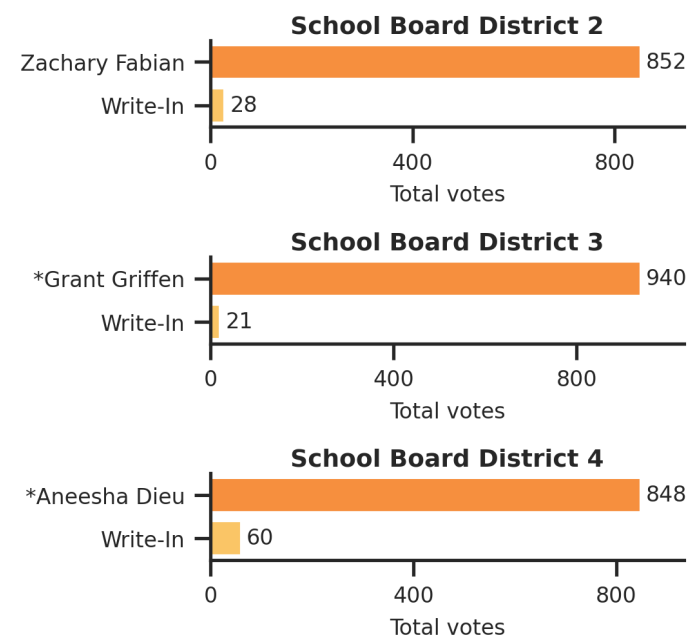

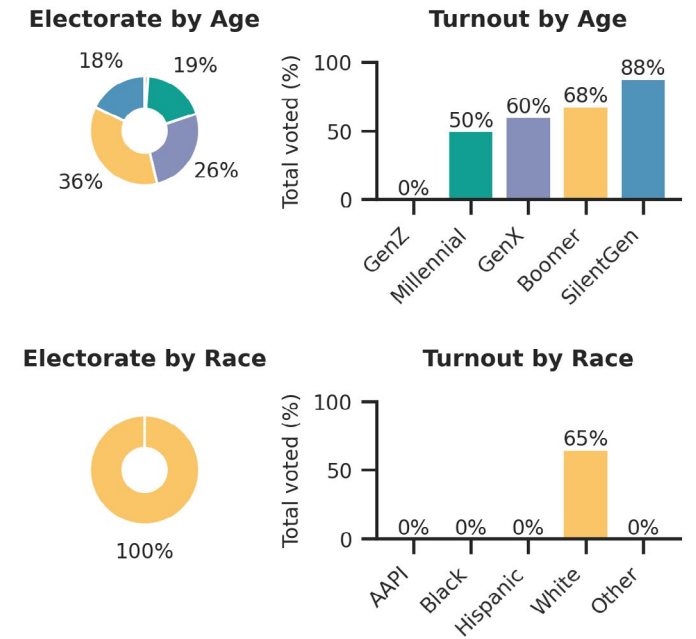

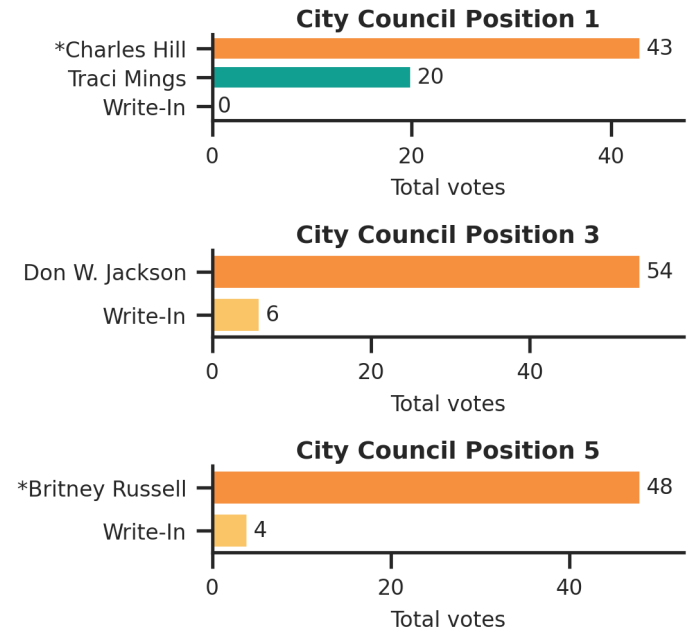

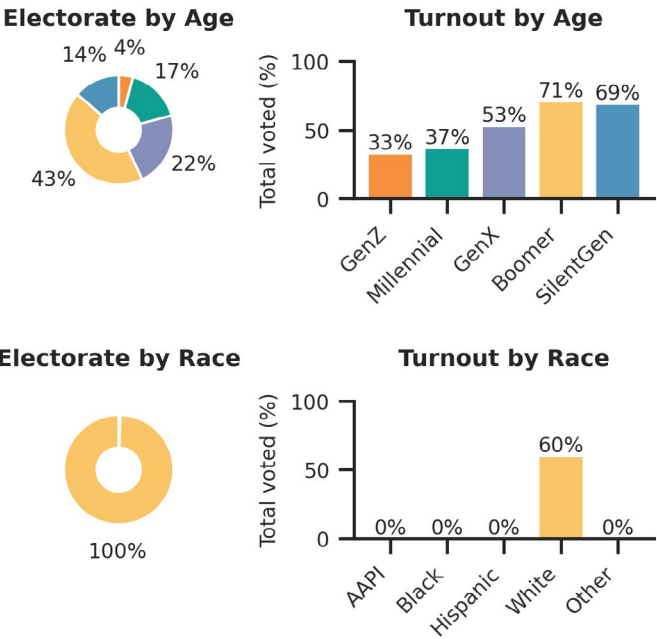
**Fig 2** Election results in Starbuck for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

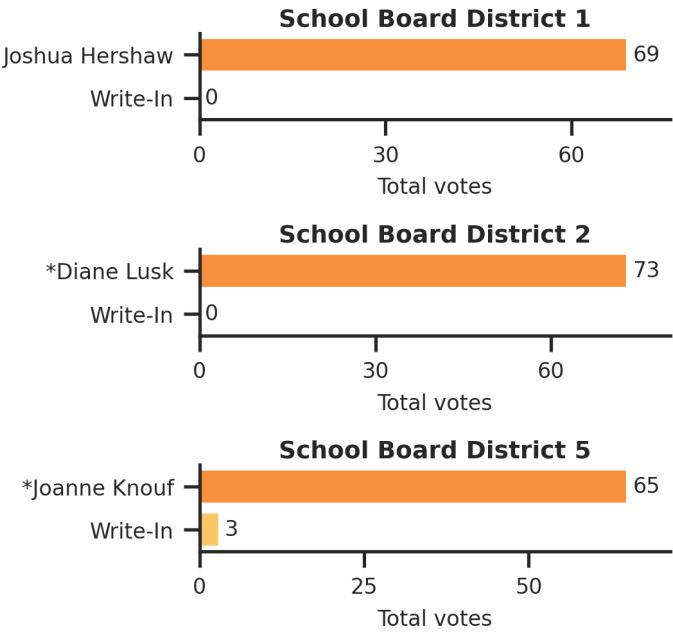

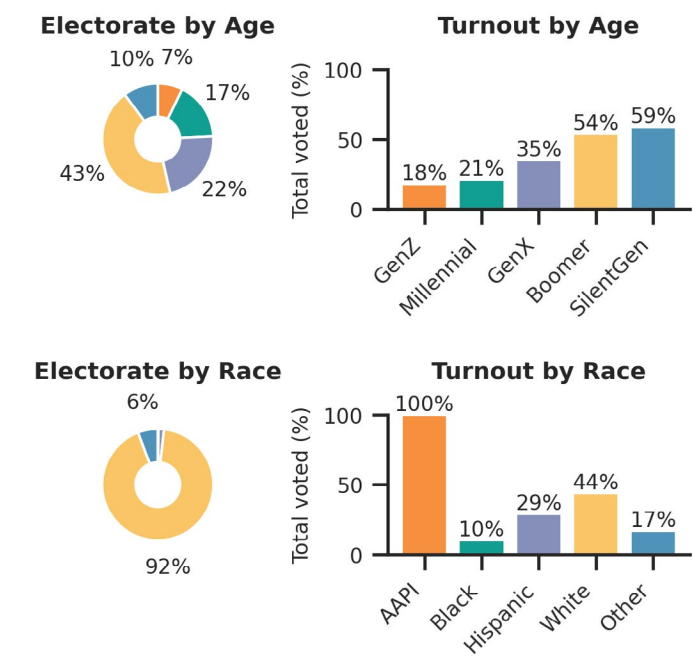


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ferry County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

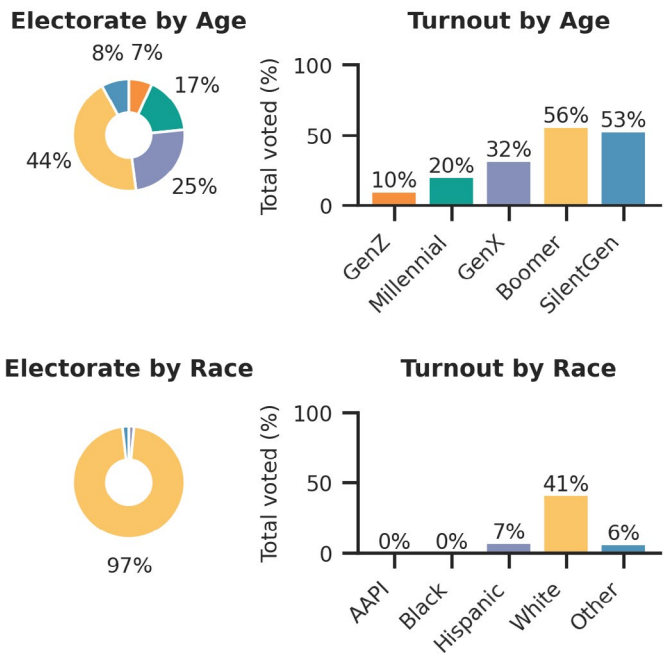


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Curlew School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

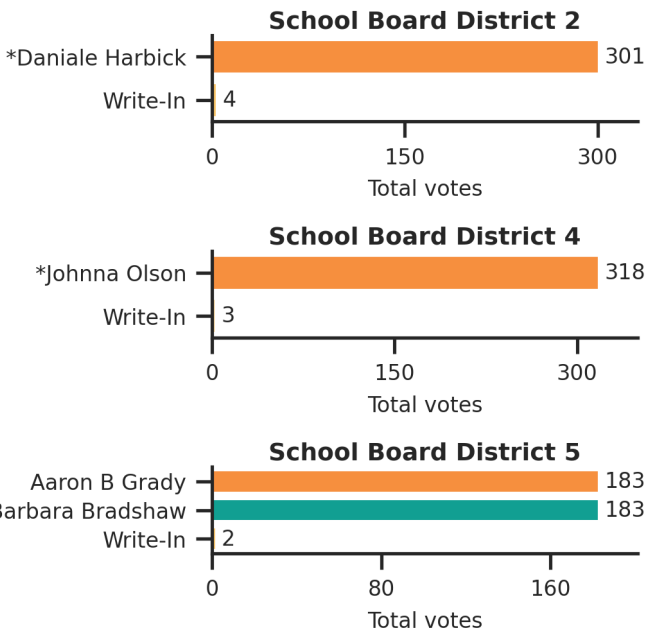
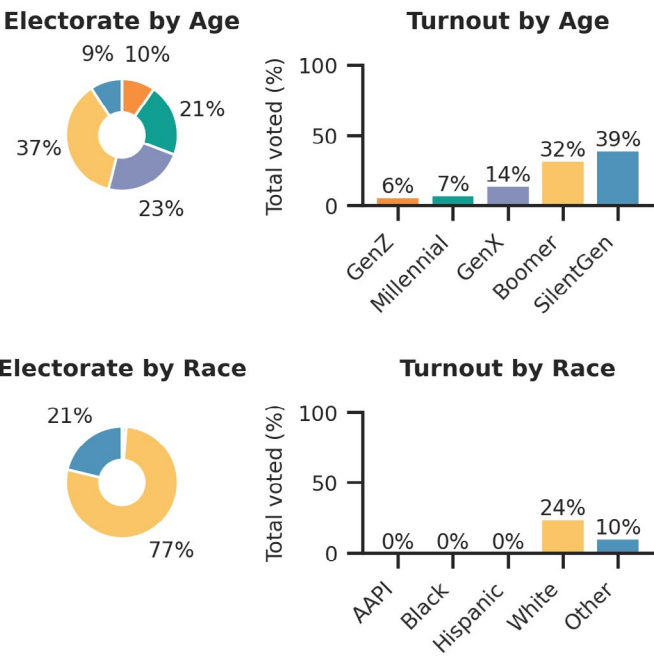


Fig 2 Election results in Curlew School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

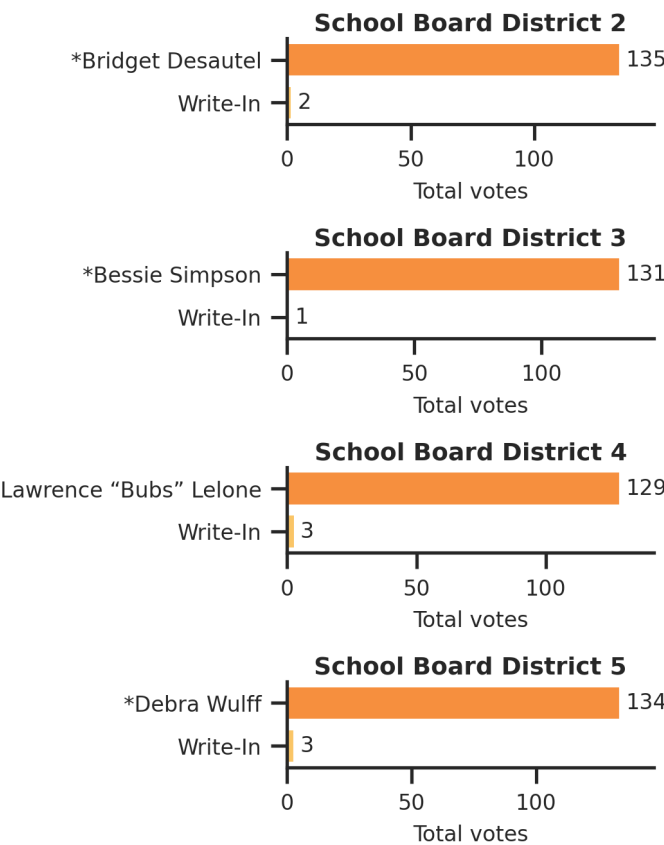

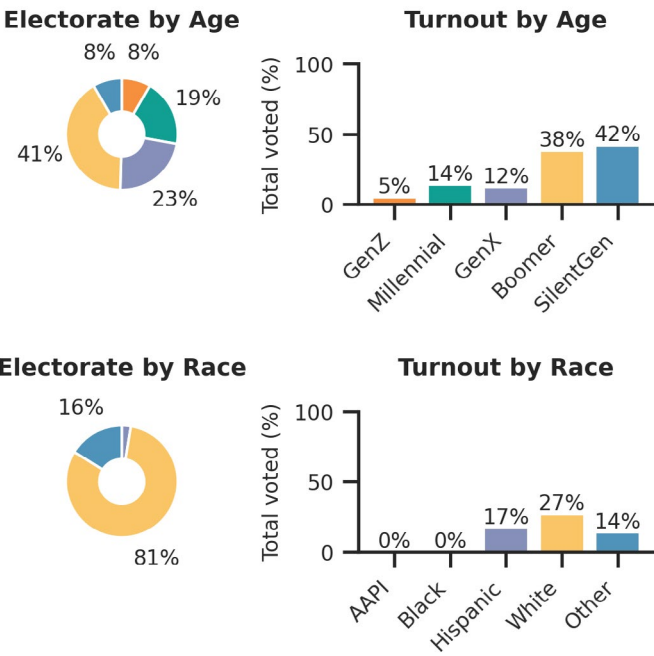


**Fig 2** Election results in Inchelium School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

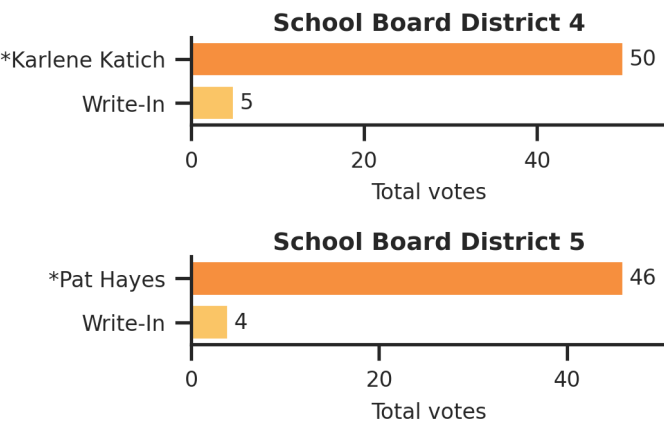

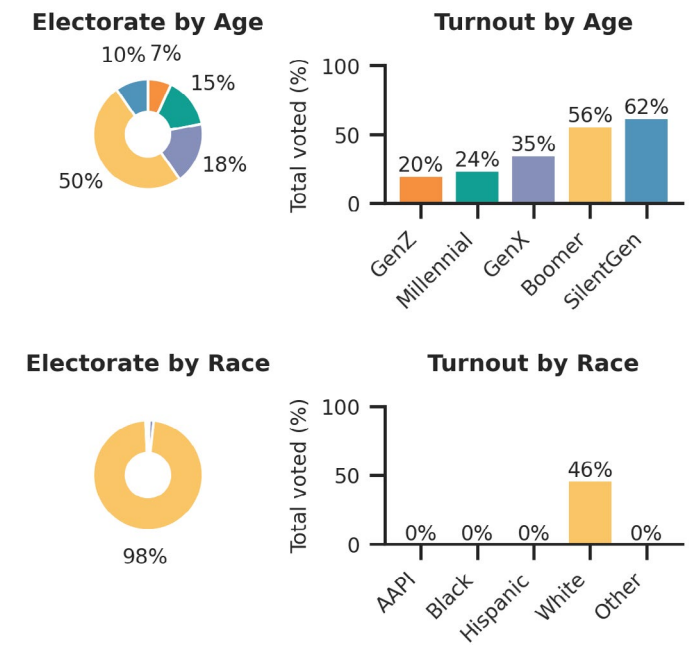


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Orient School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

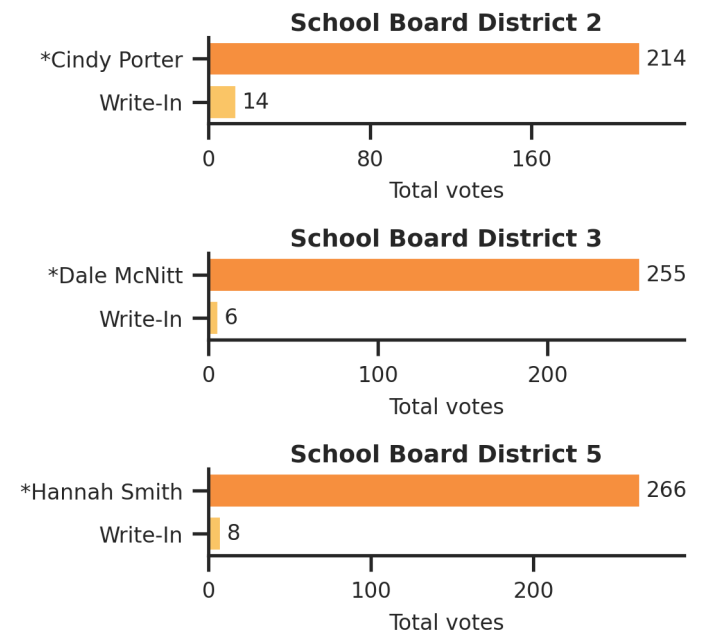


Fig 2 Election results in Orient School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

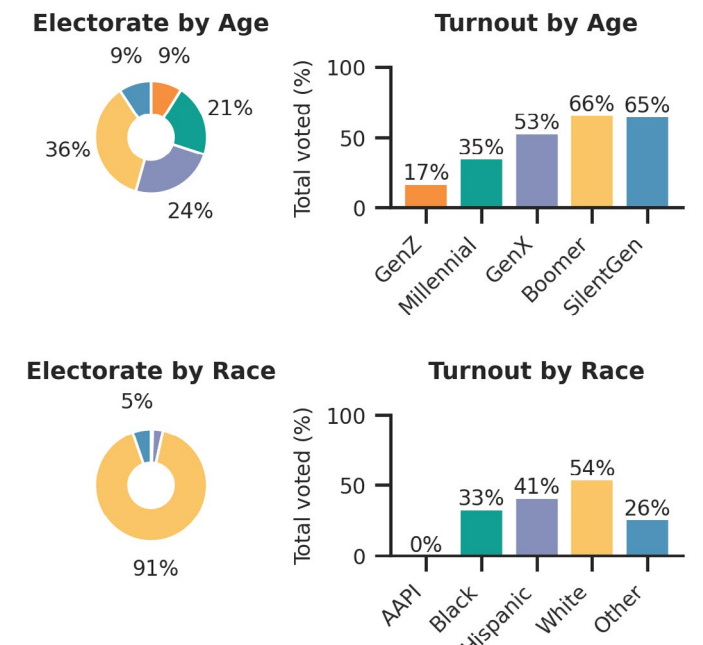


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Republic for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

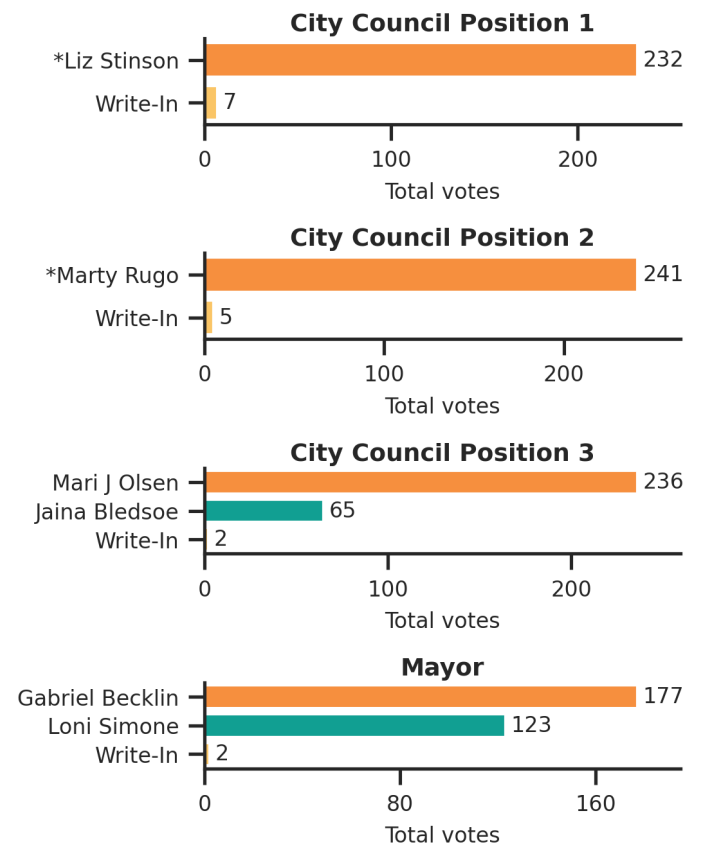


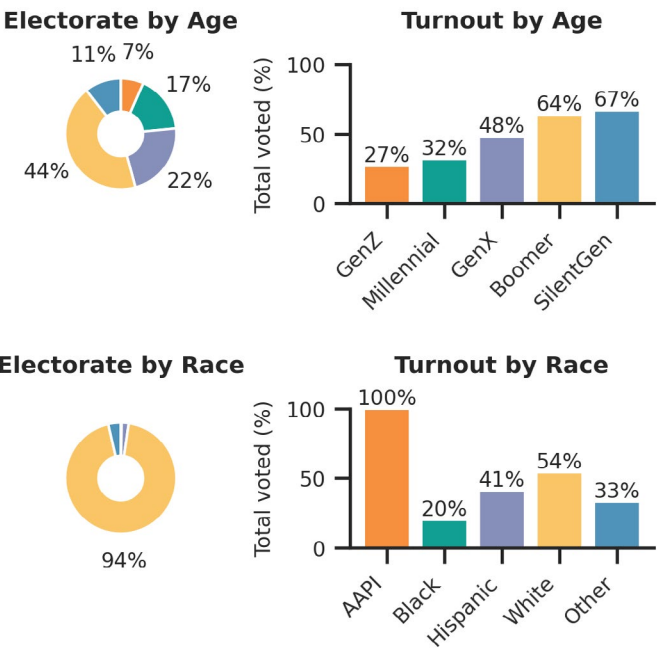
Fig 2 Election results in Republic for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

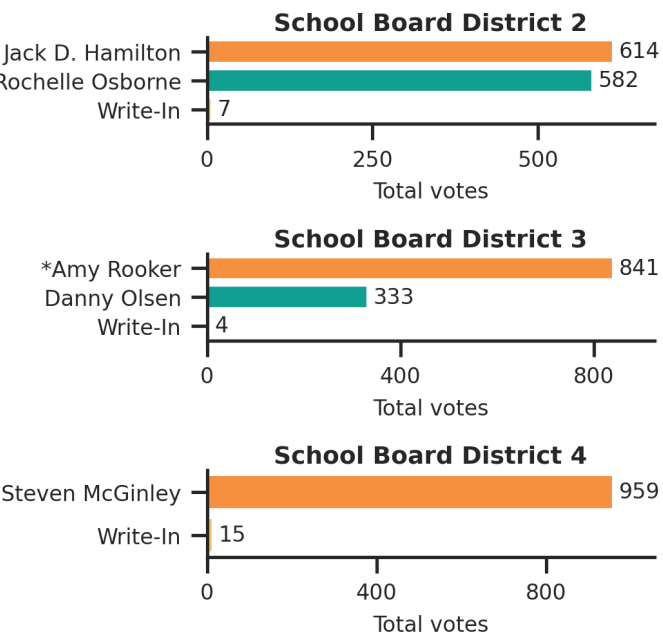

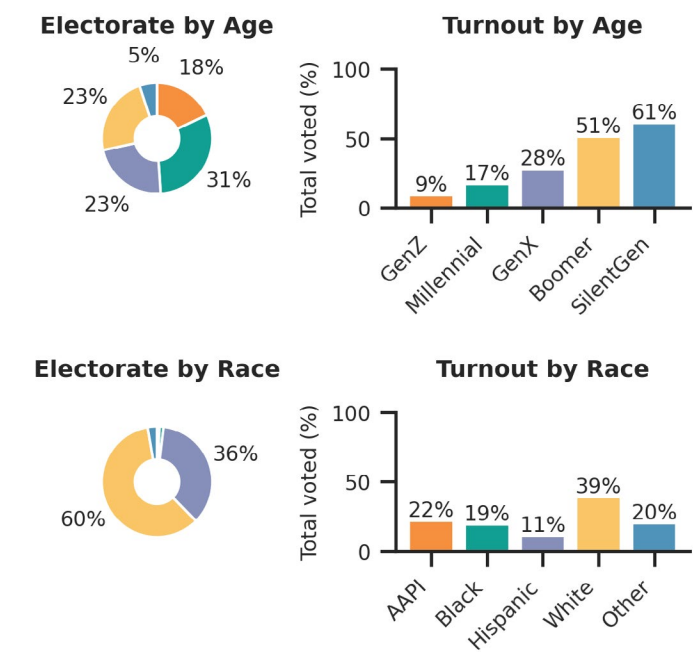
**Fig 2** Election results in Republic School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

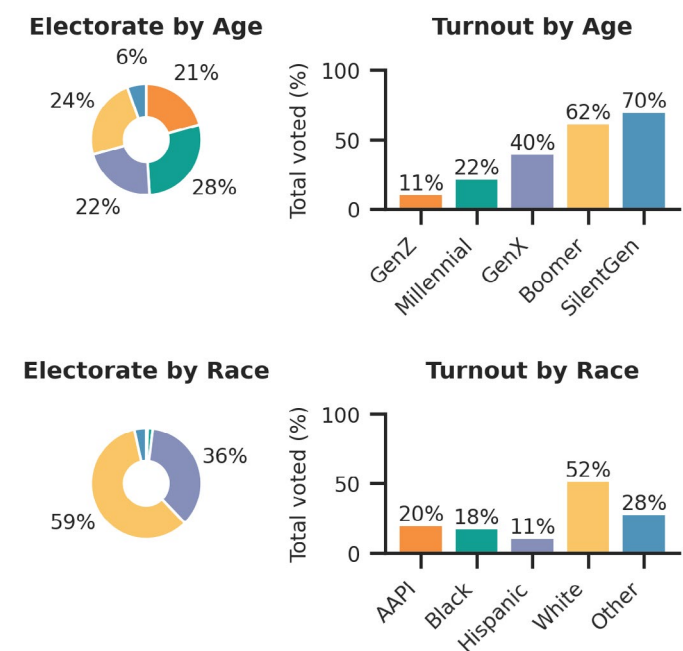

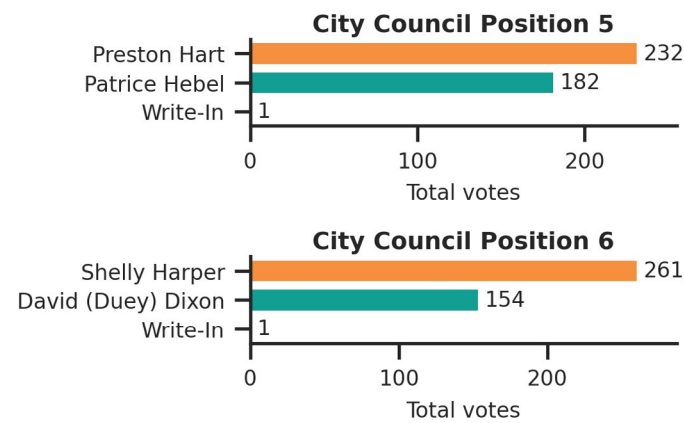

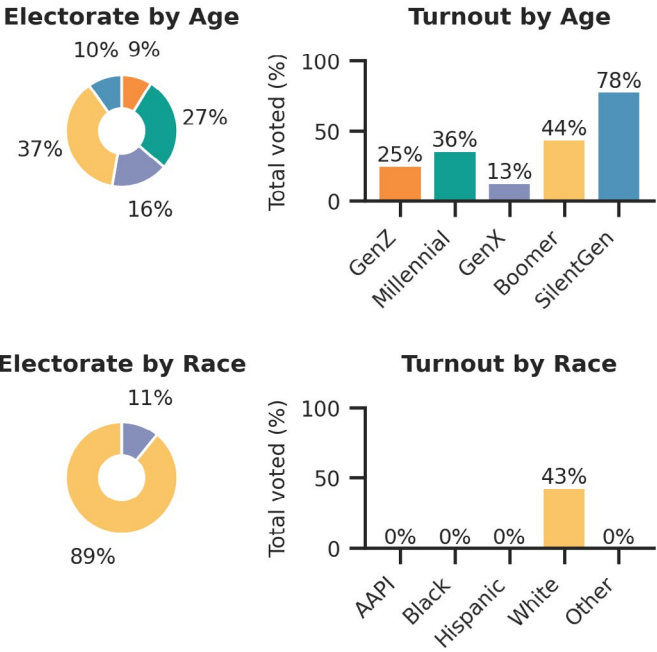


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kahlotus for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

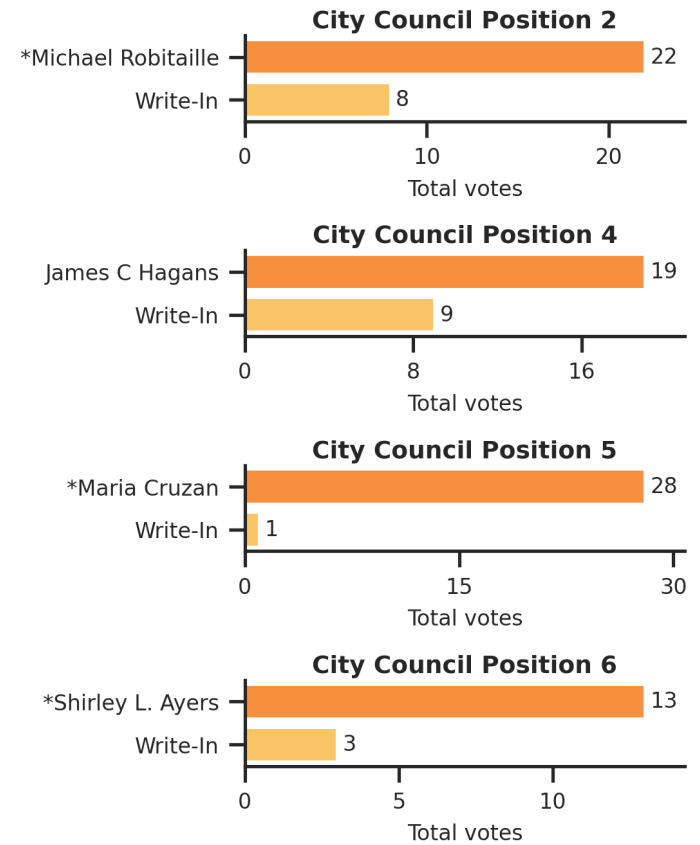


Fig 2 Election results in Kahlotus for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

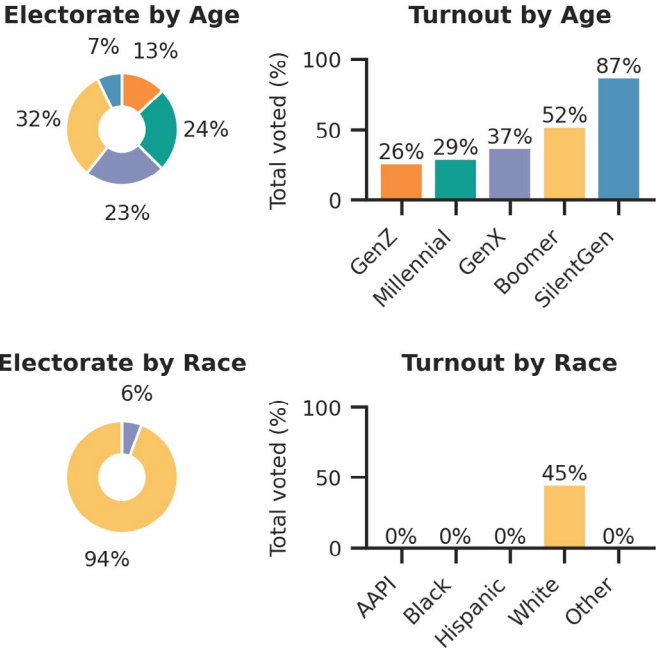


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kahlotus School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

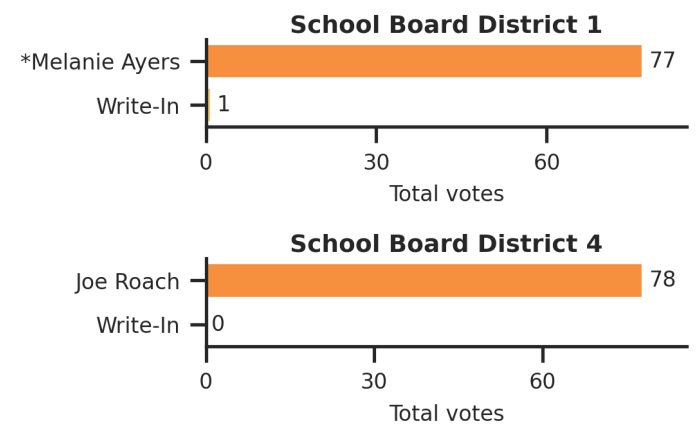
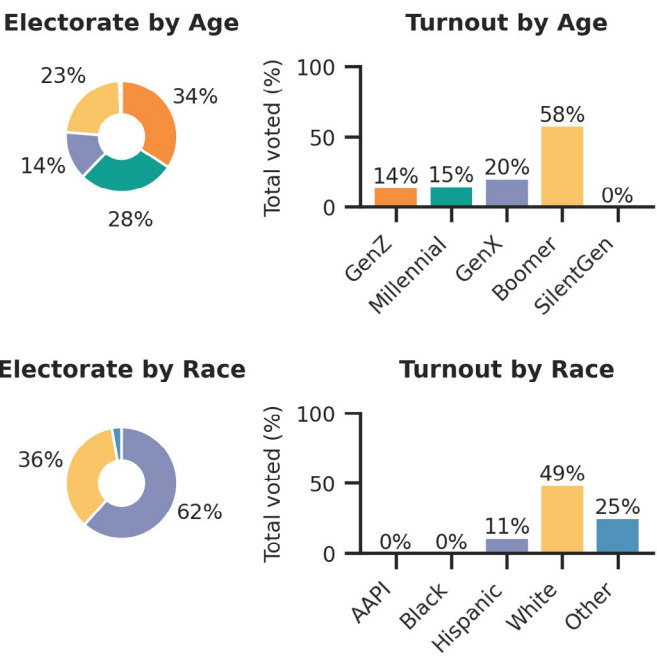


Fig 2 Election results in Kahlotus School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

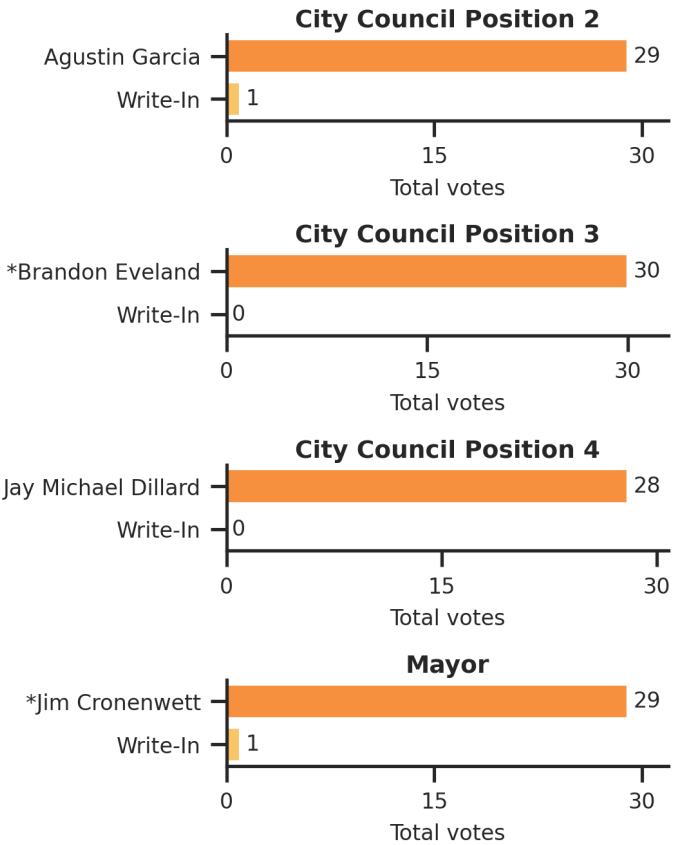

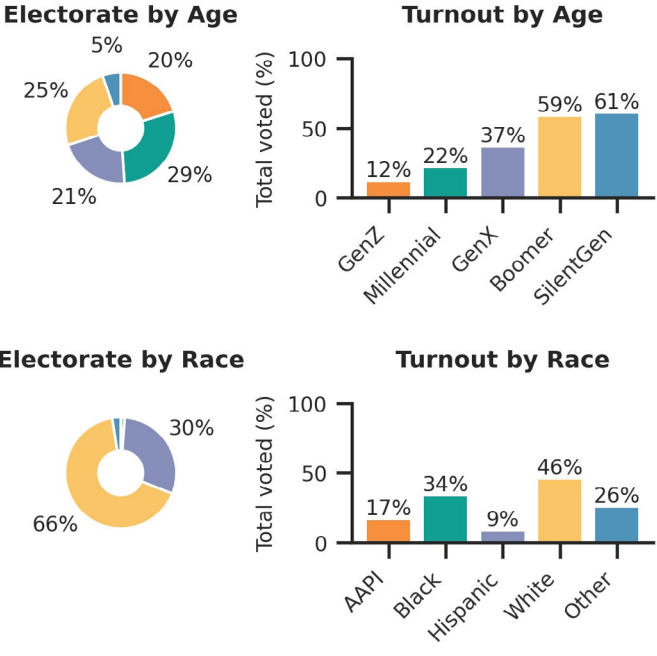

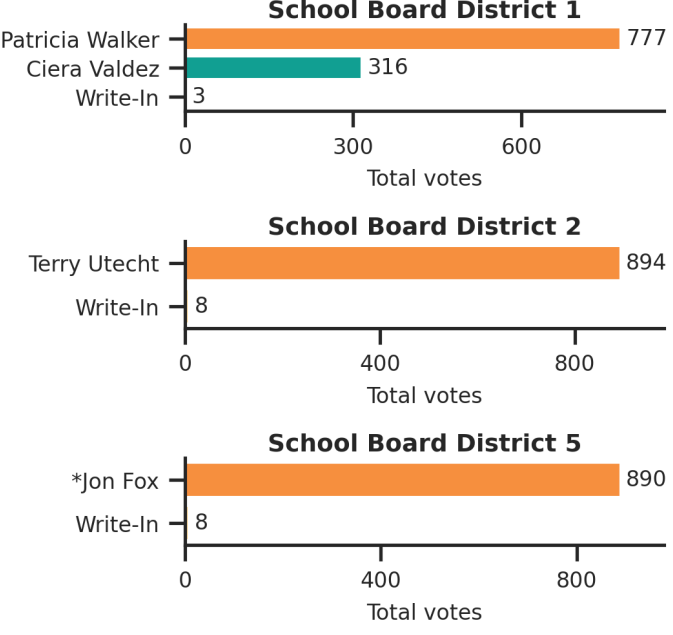

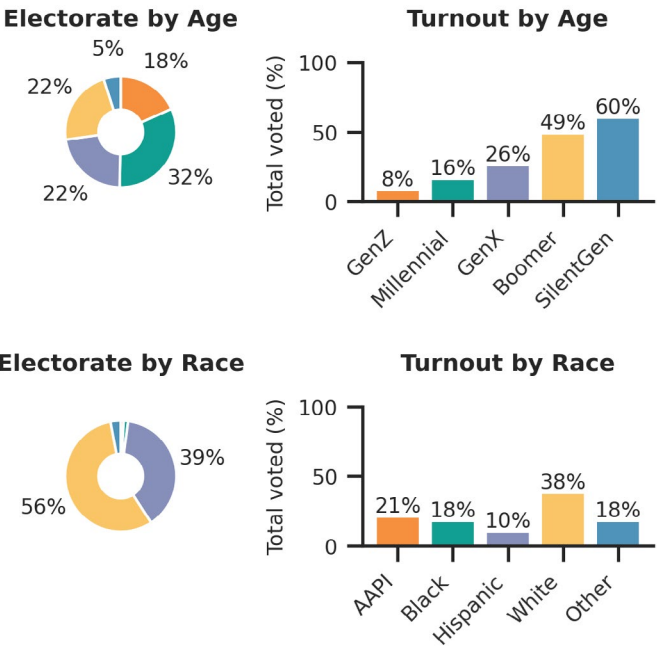


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pasco for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

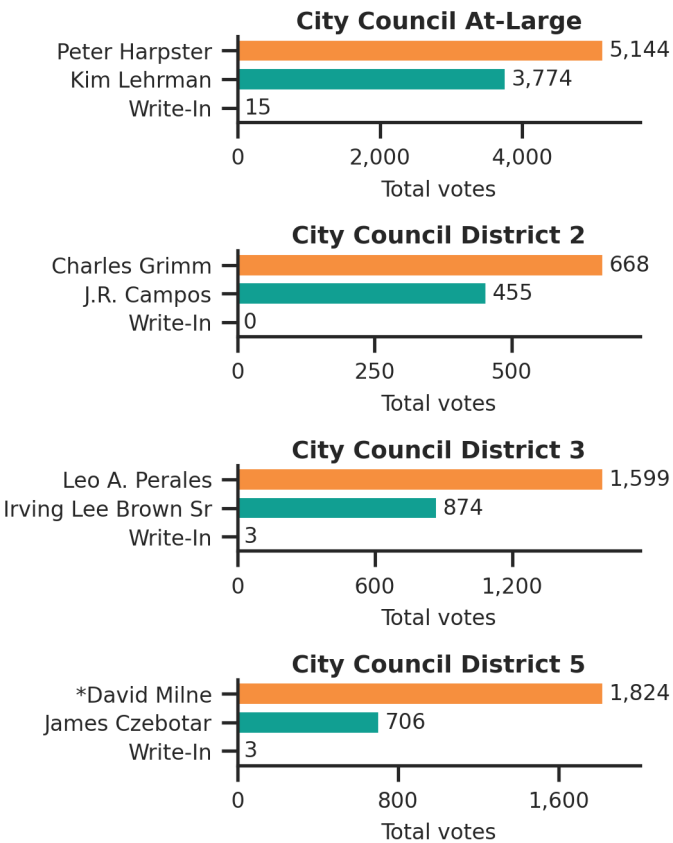


Fig 2 Election results in Pasco for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

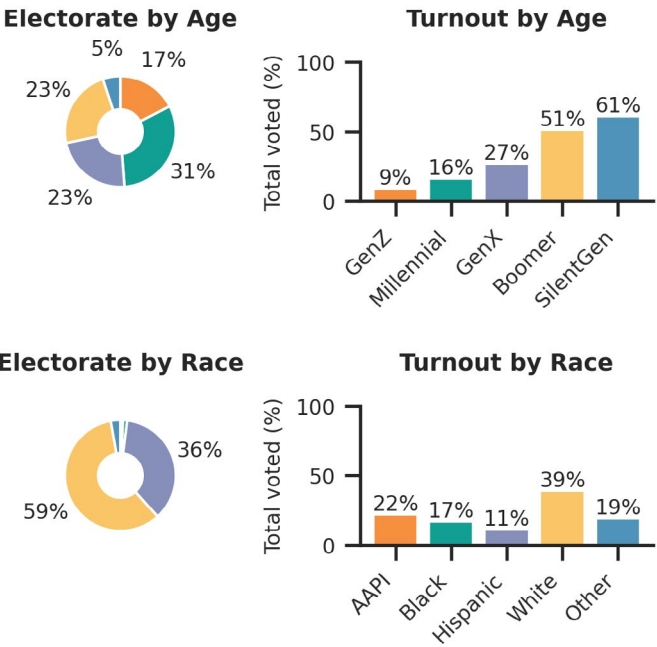


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pasco School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

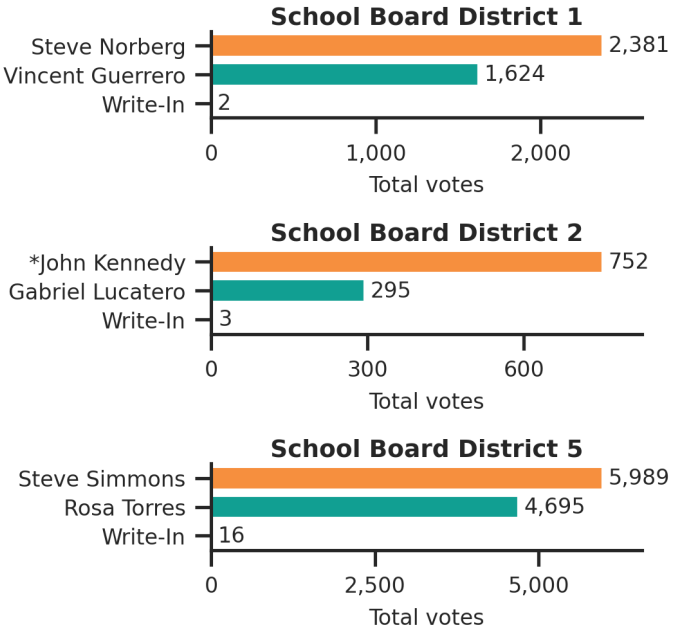


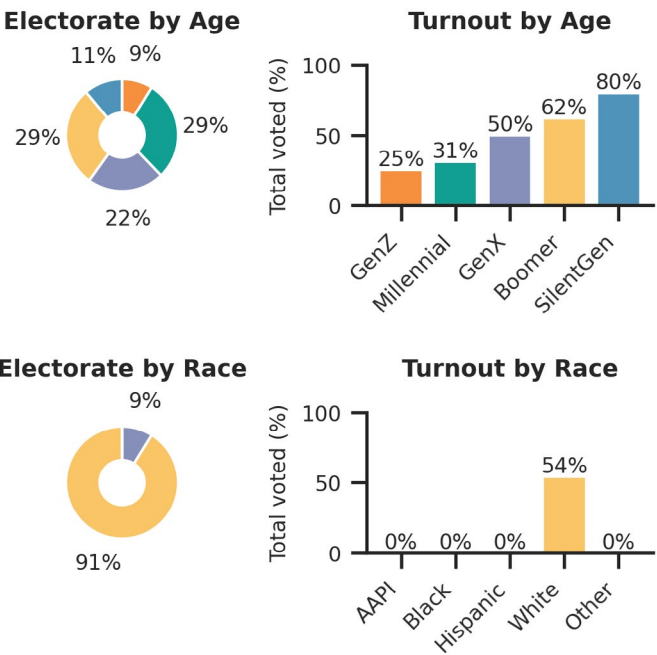
Fig 2 Election results in Pasco School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

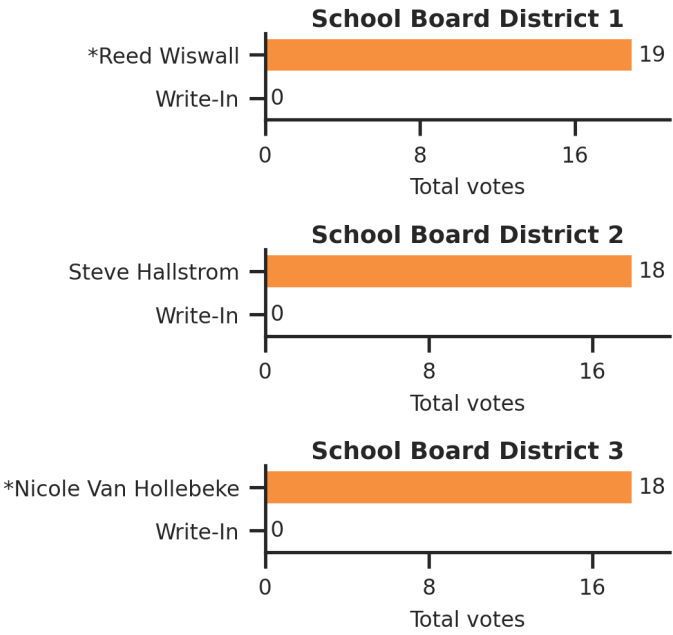

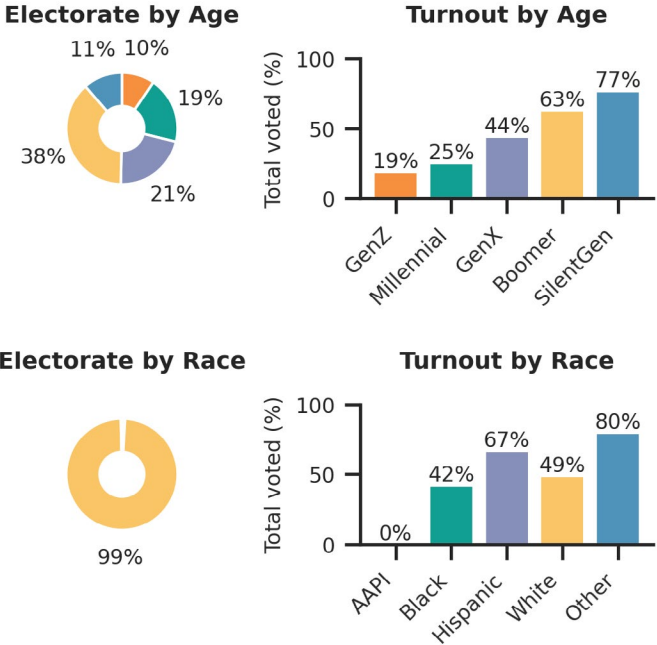


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Garfield County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

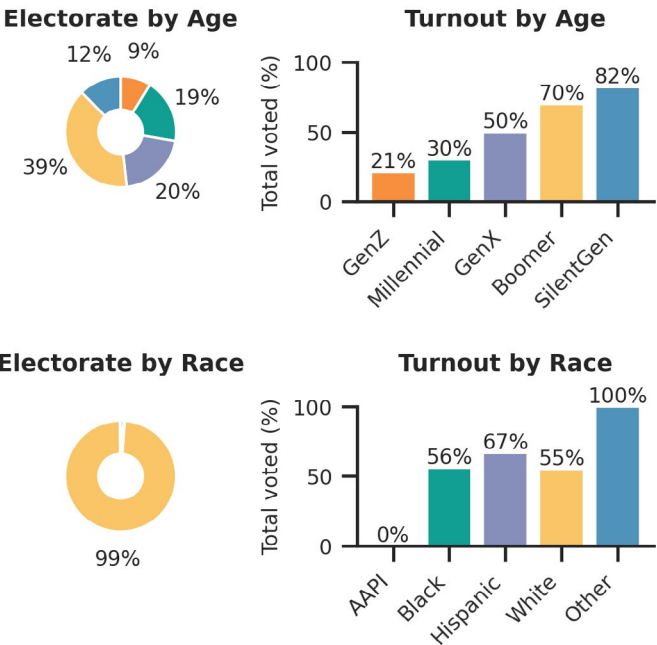


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pomeroy for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

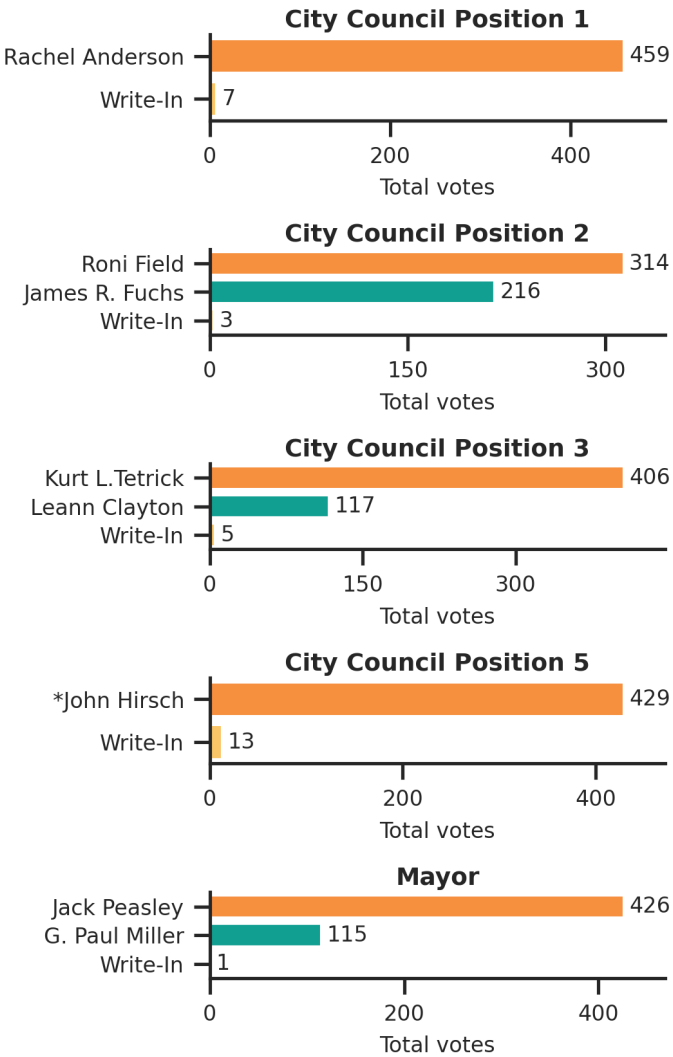


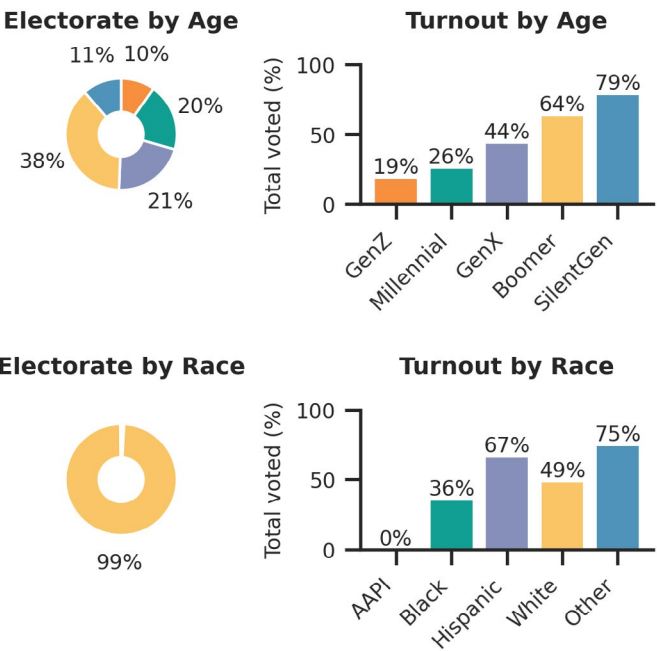
Fig 2 Election results in Pomeroy for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

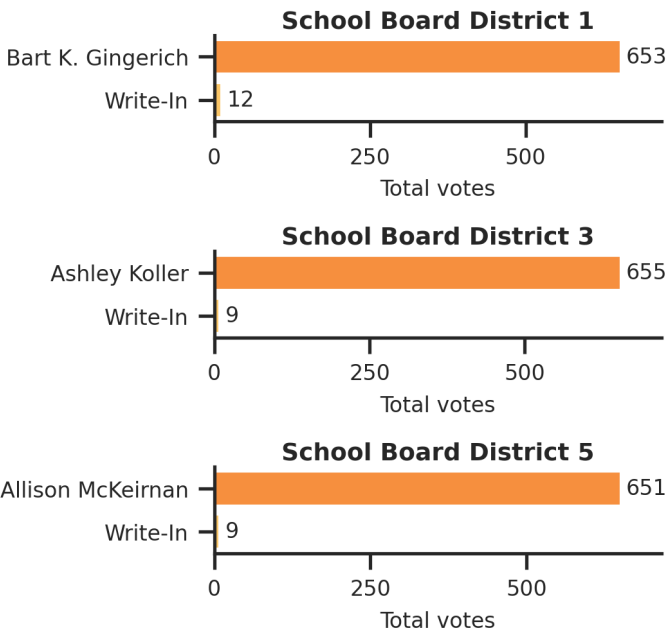

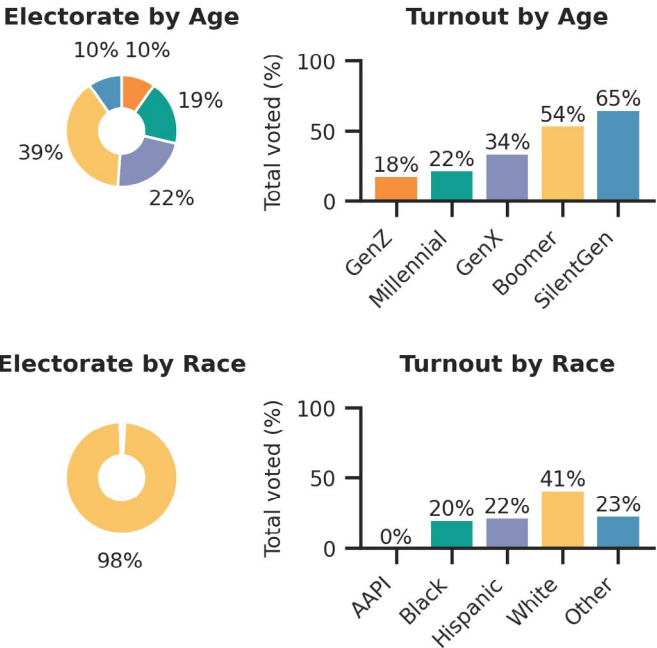
**Fig 2** Election results in Pomeroy School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

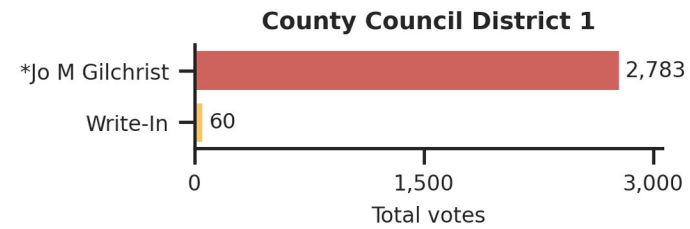

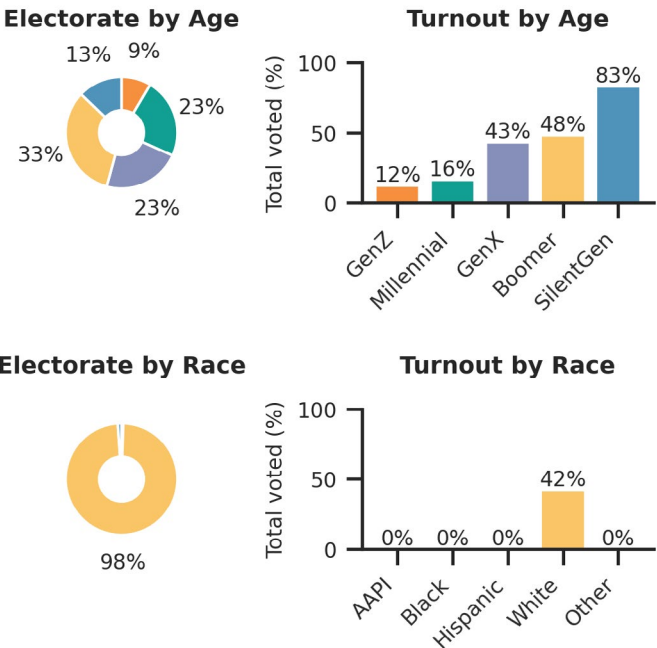

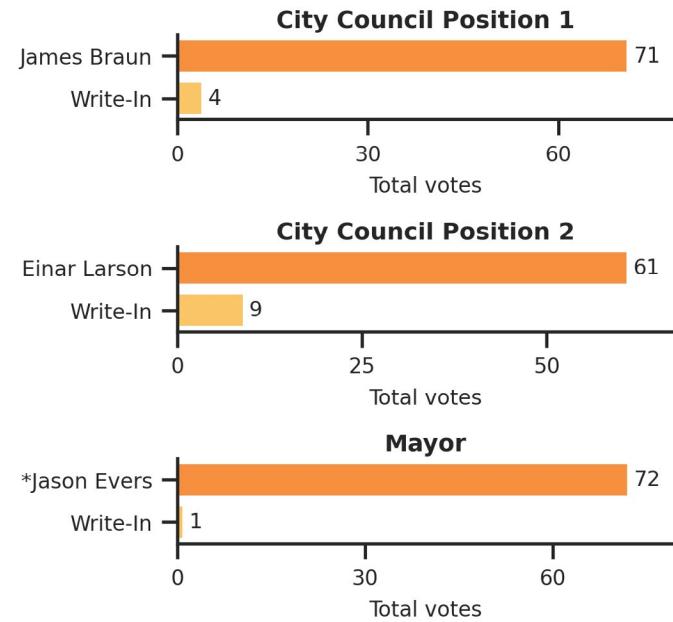

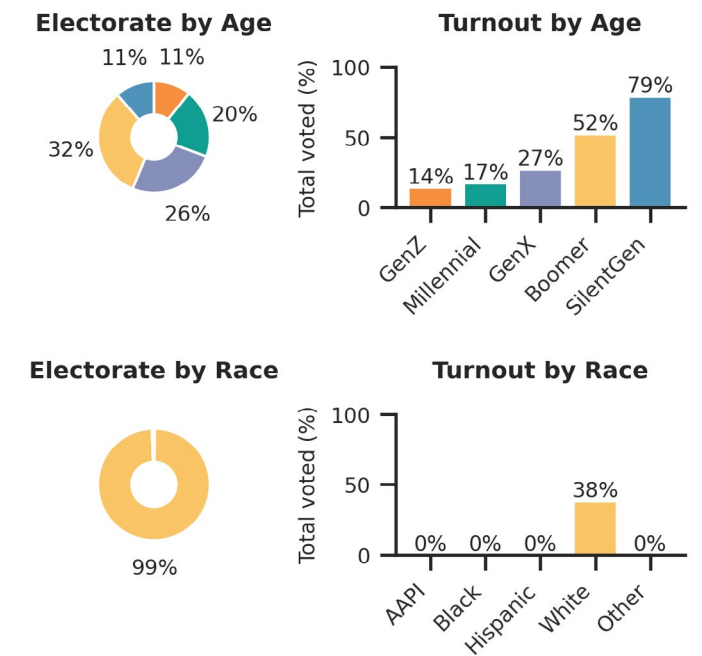


**Fig 2** Election results in Almira for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

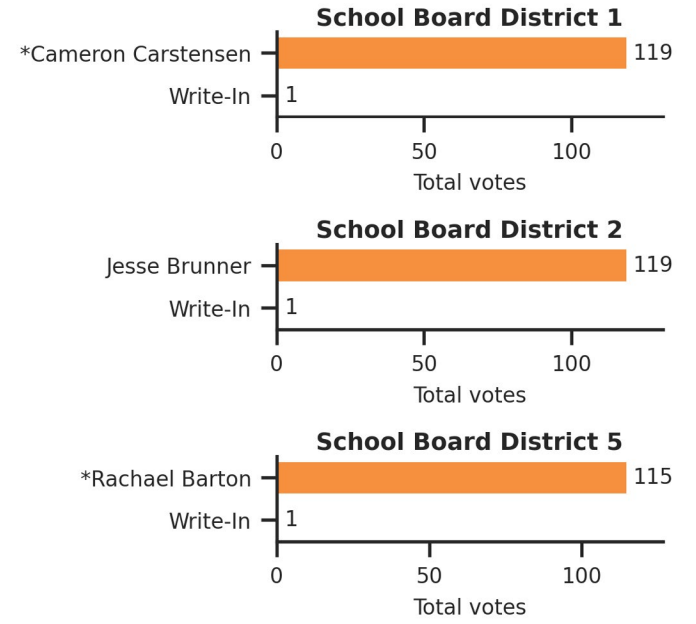

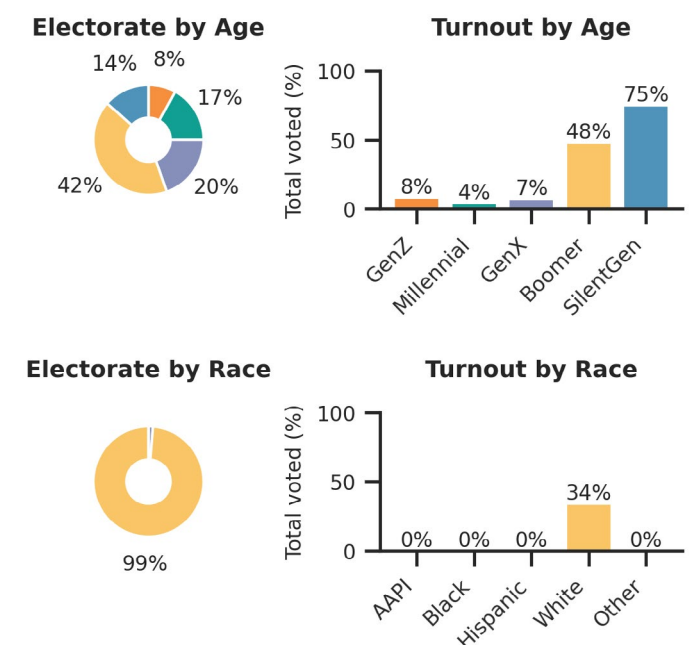

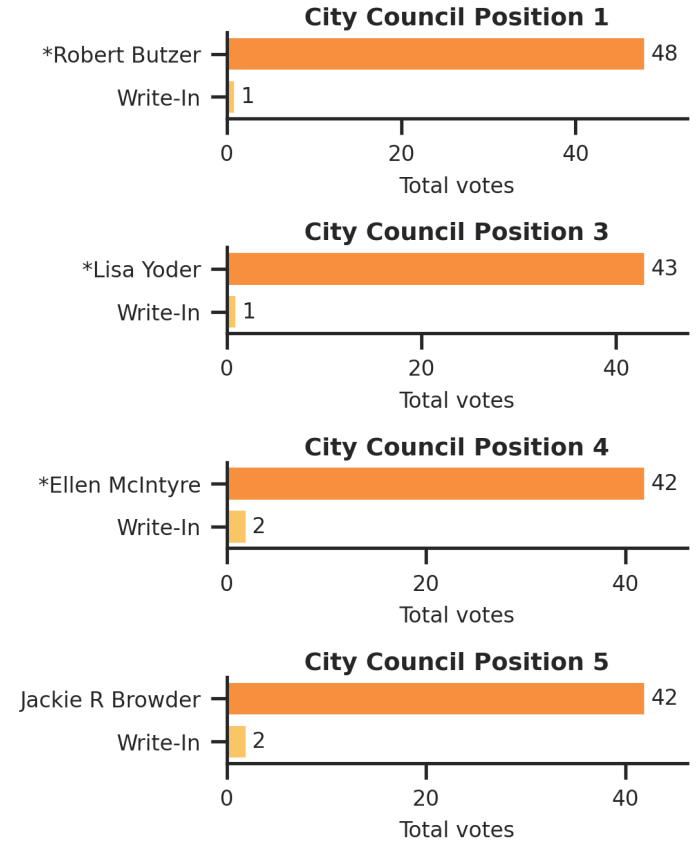

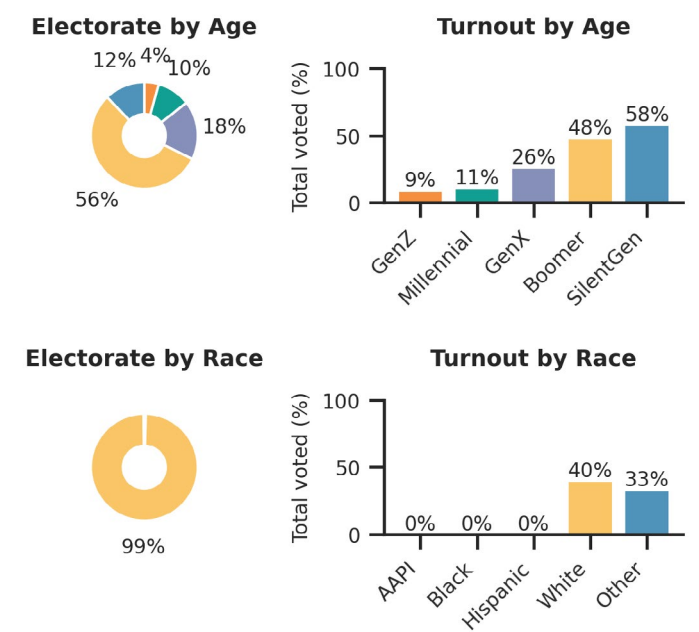

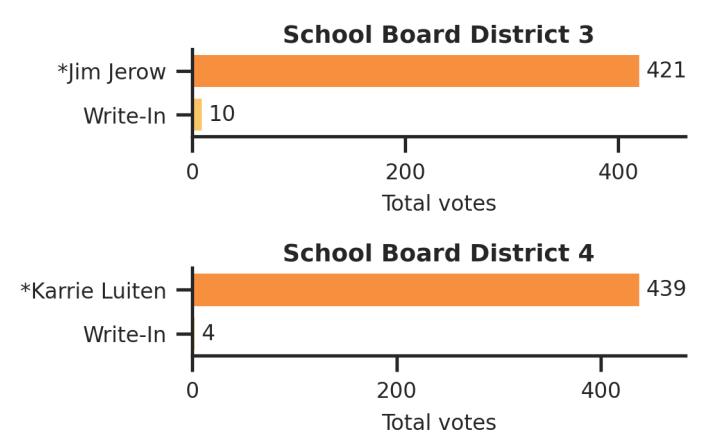

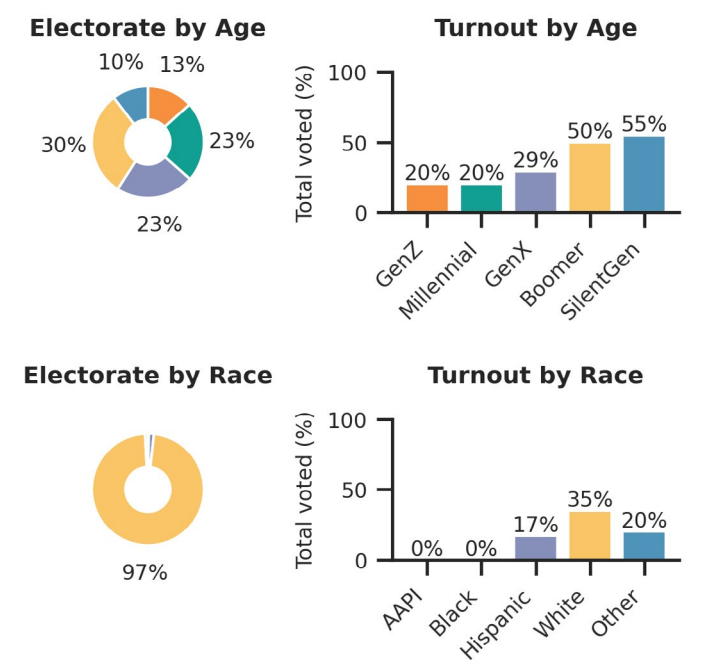

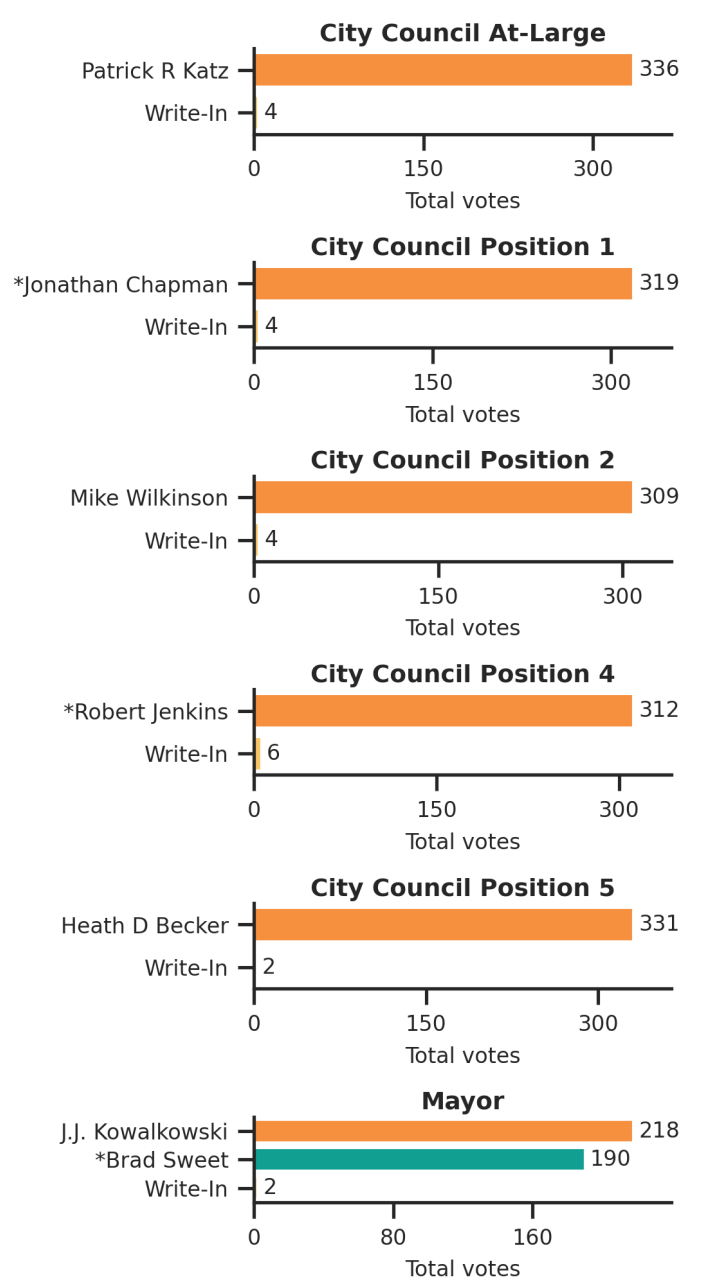


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Davenport for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

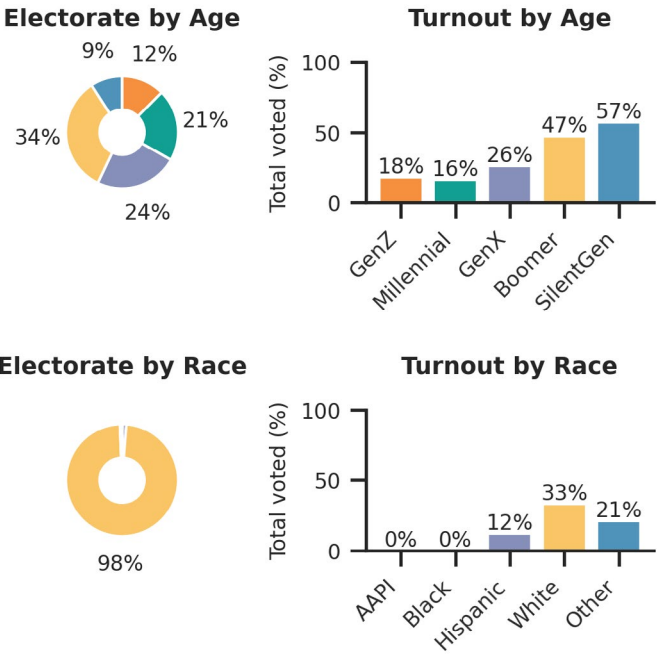
**Fig 2** Election results in Davenport for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

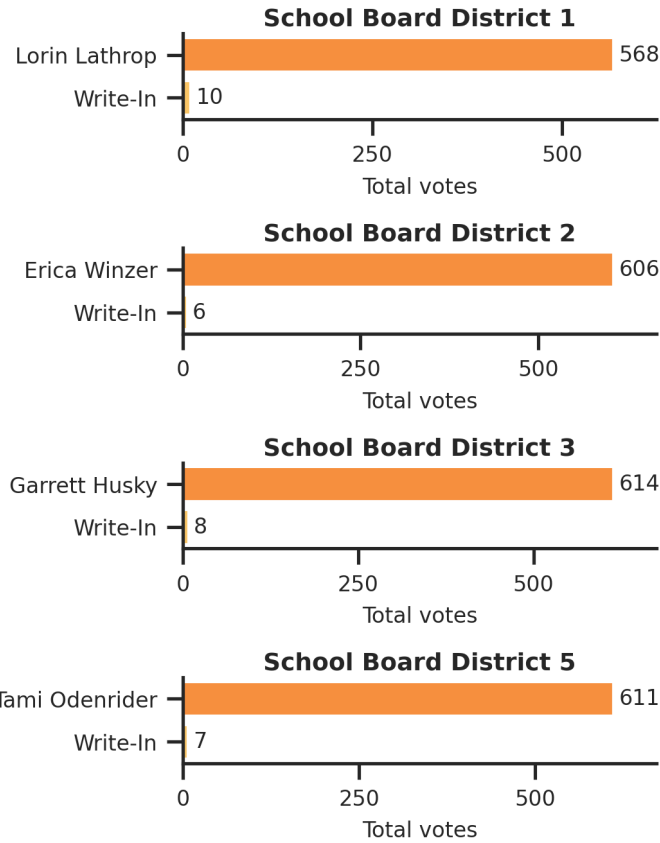

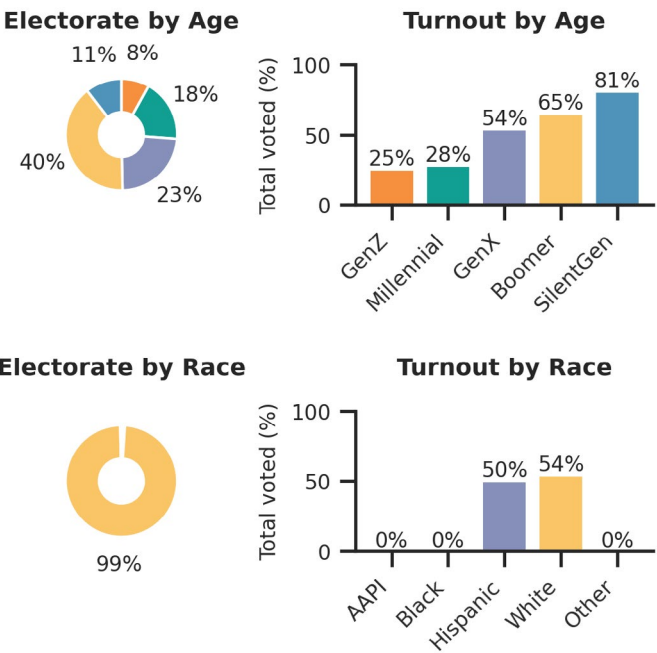


**Fig 2** Election results in Davenport School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

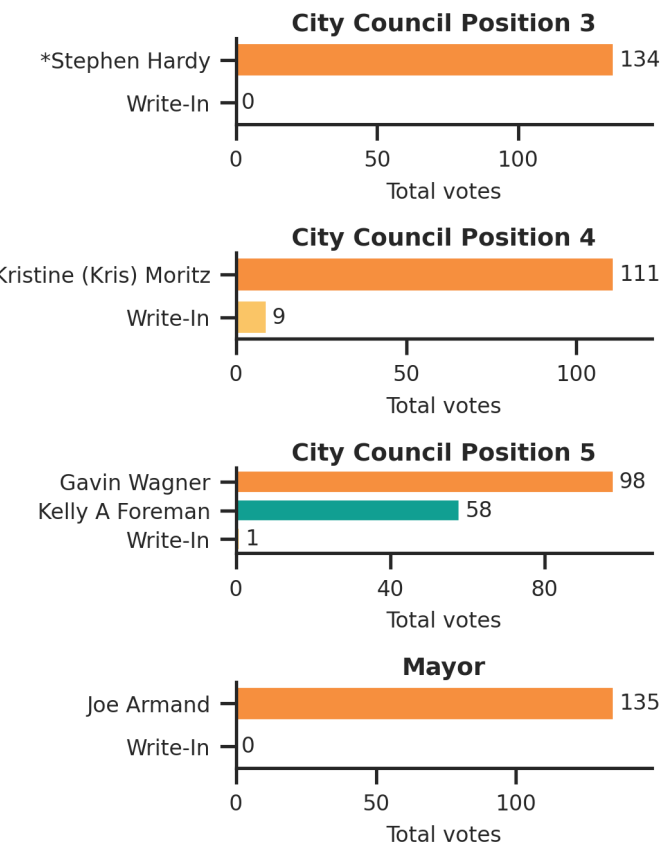

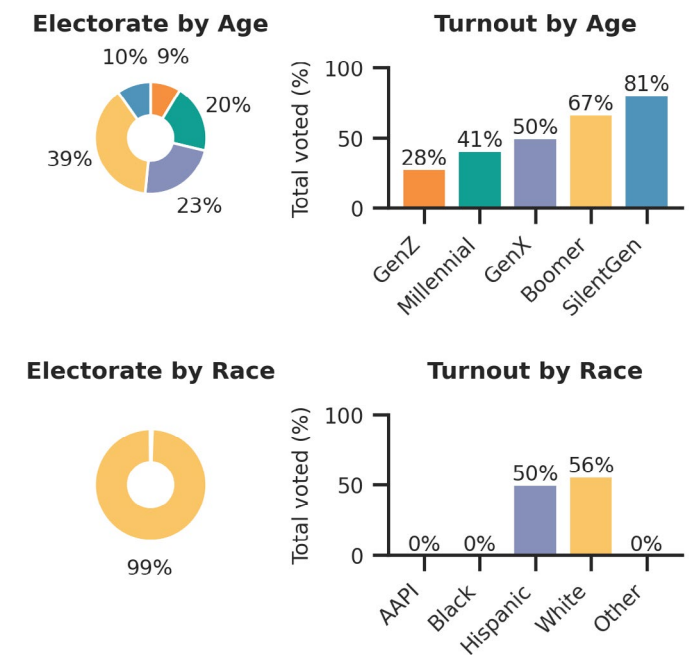
**Fig 2** Election results in Harrington for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

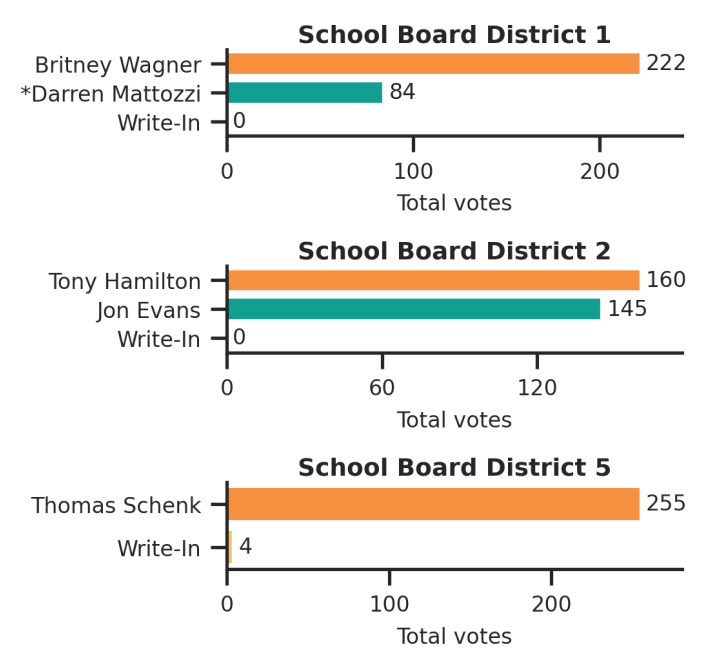

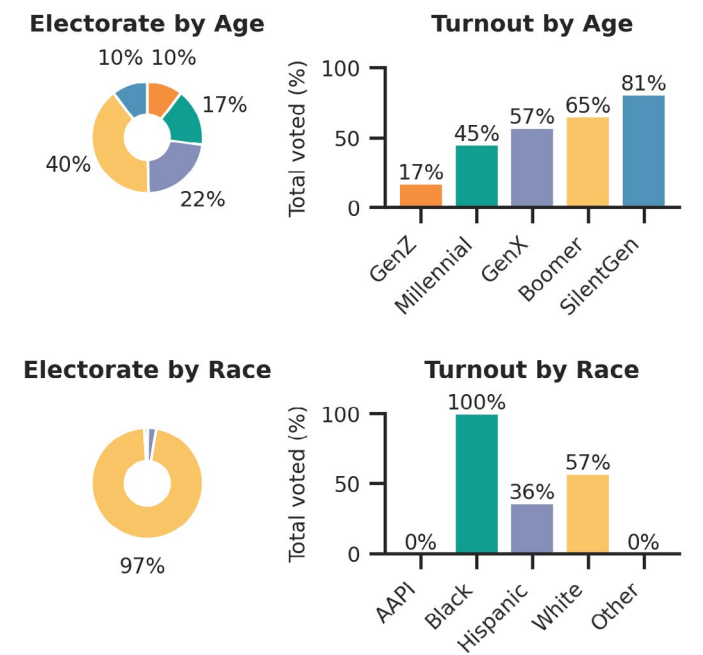

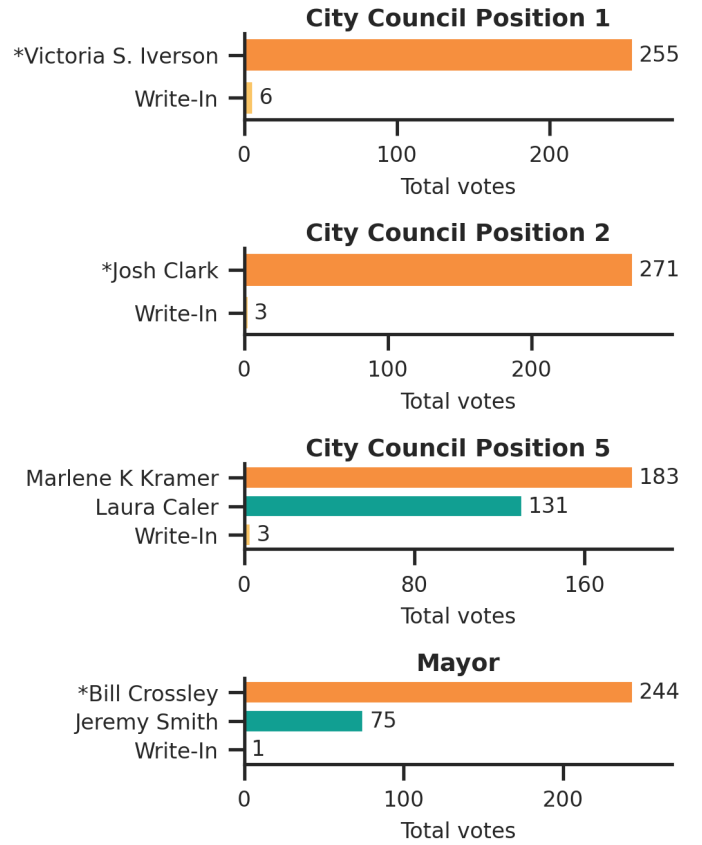

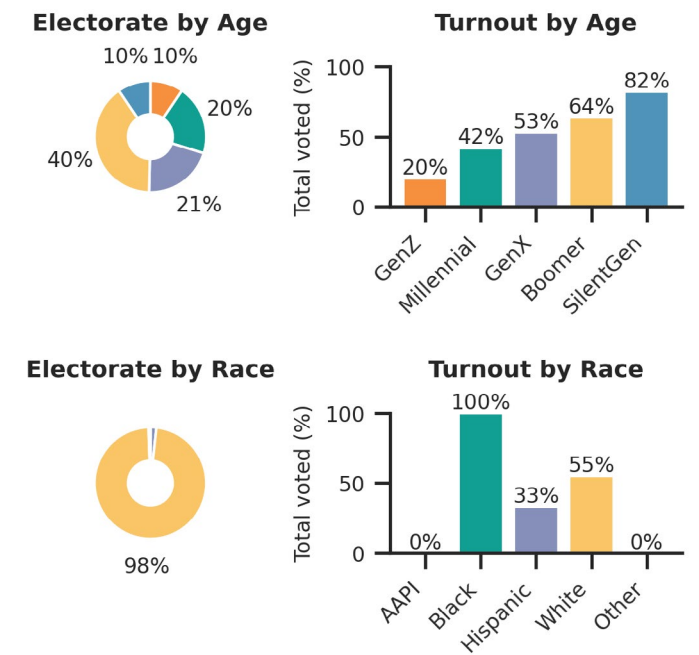


**Fig 2** Election results in Odessa for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

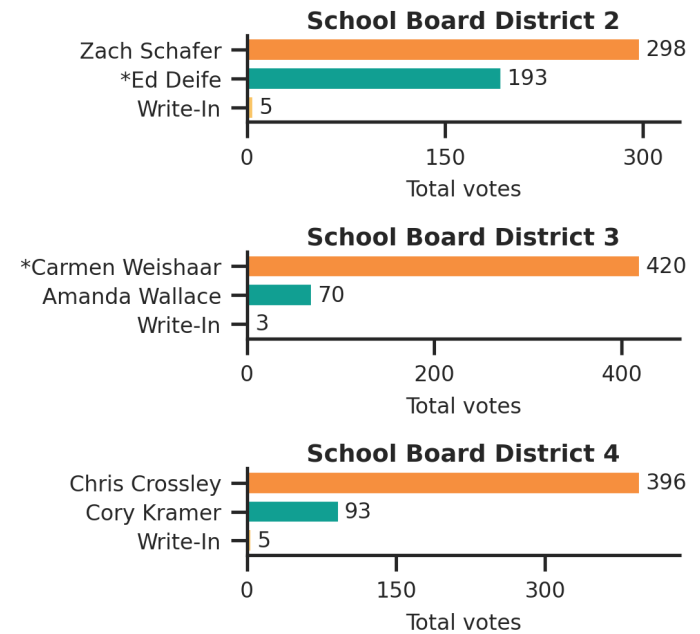

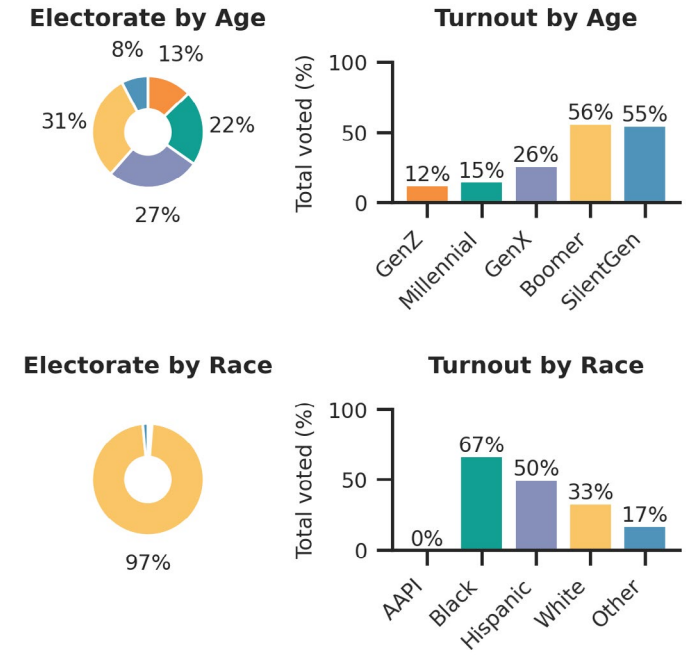

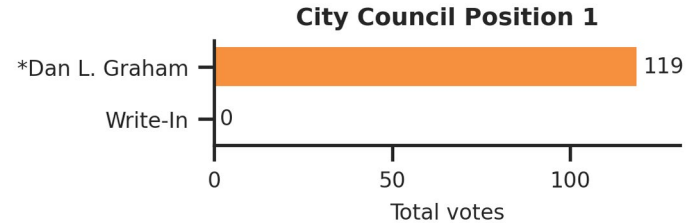

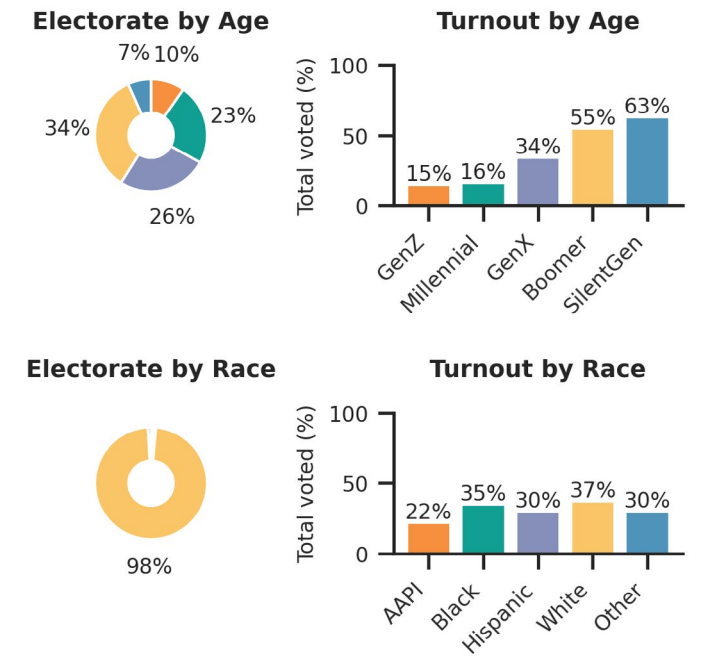


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Reardan-Edwall School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

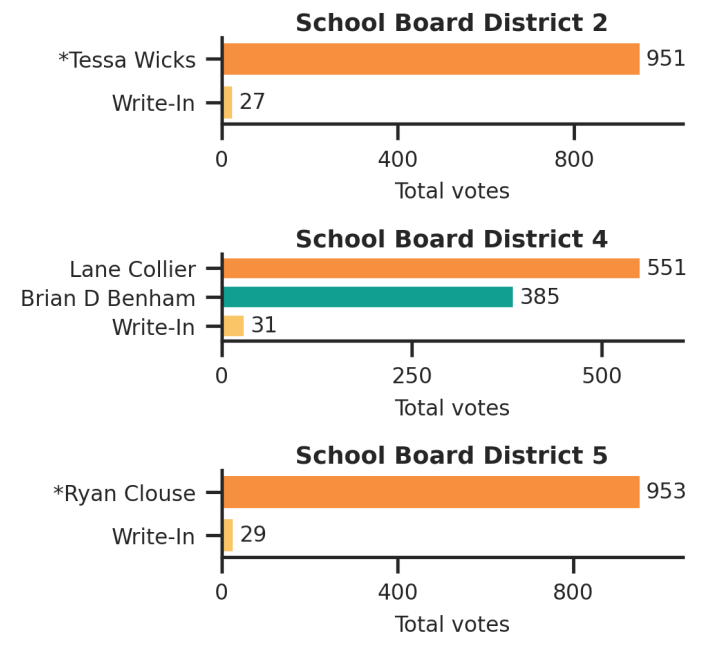


Fig 2 Election results in Reardan-Edwall School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

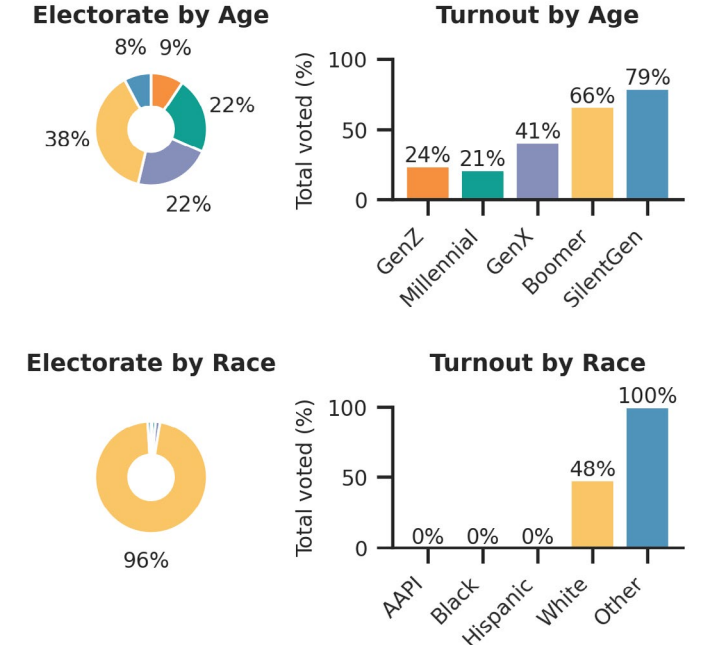


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sprague for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

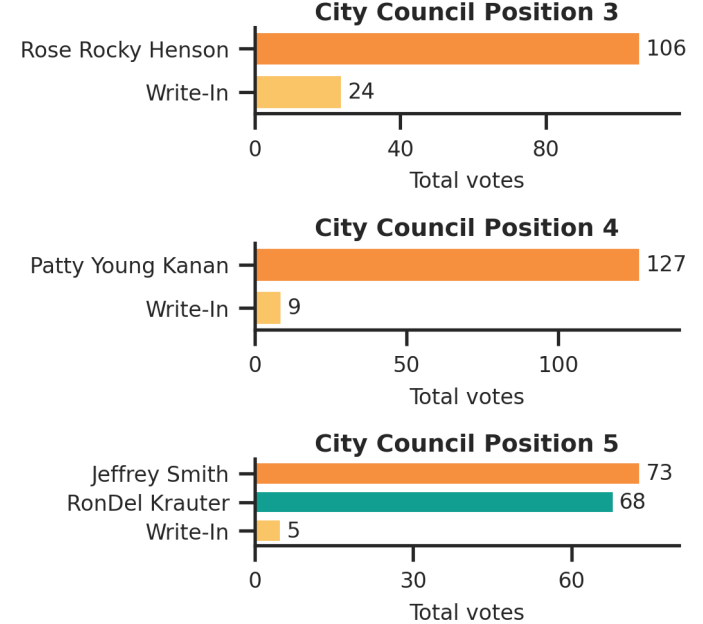
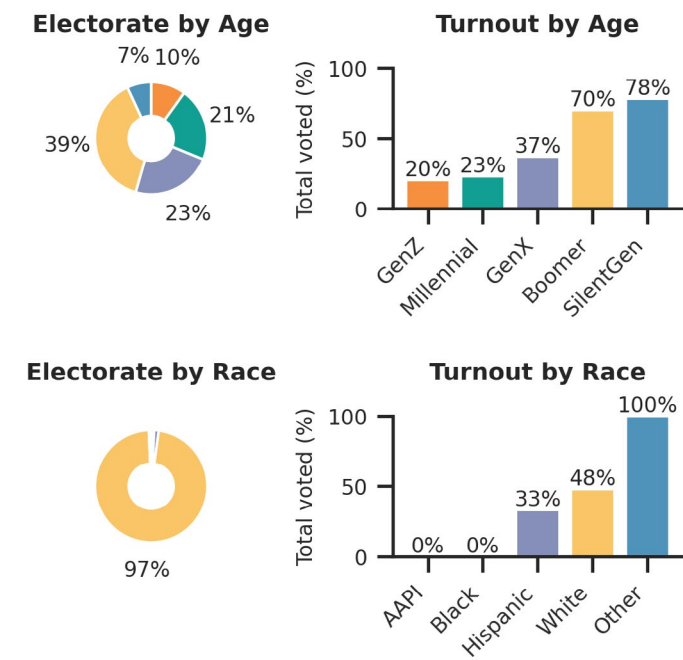


Fig 2 Election results in Sprague for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

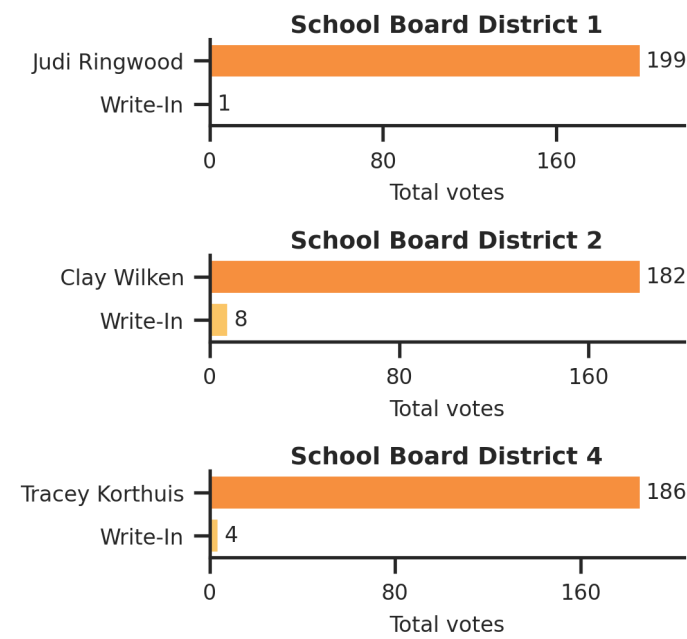

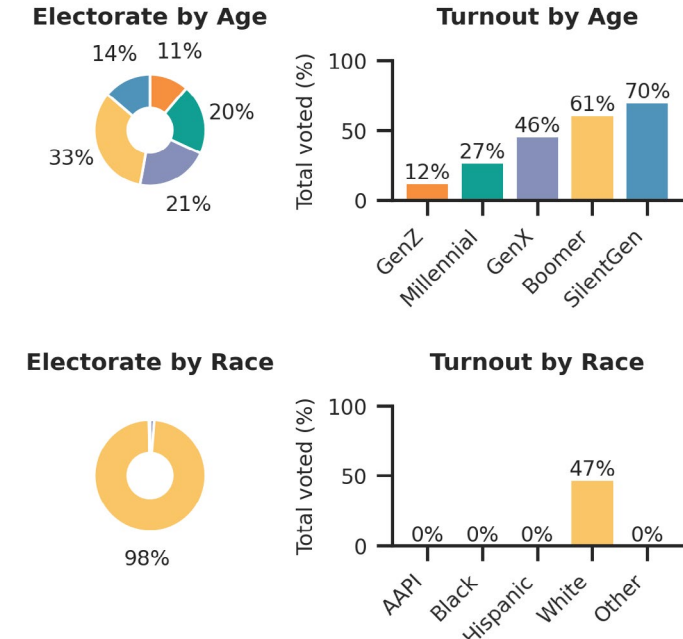

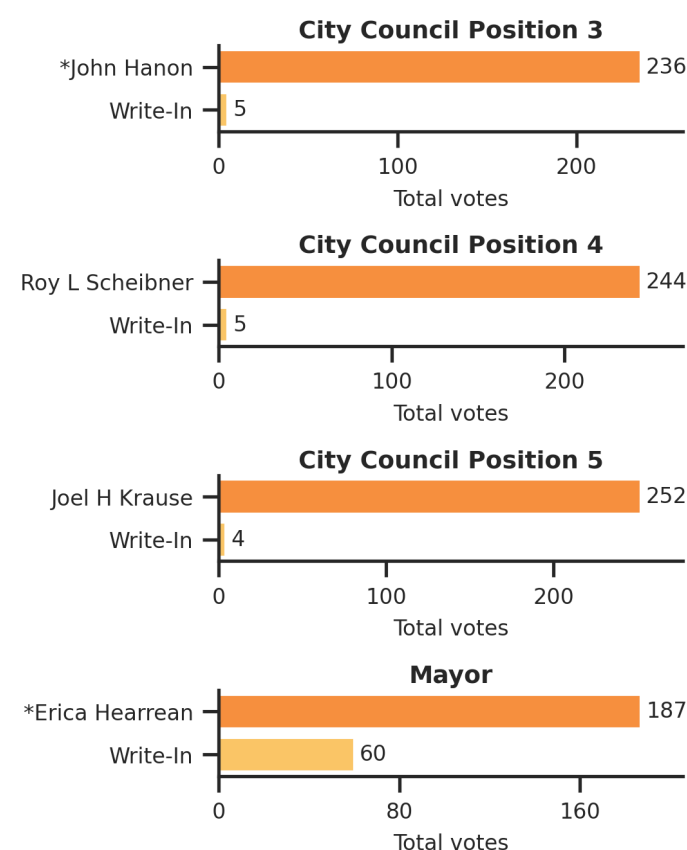

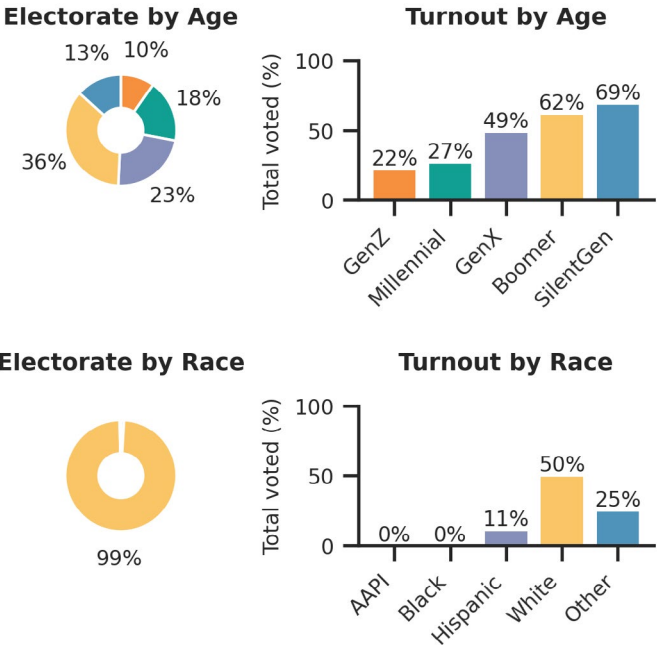
**Fig 2** Election results in Wilbur for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

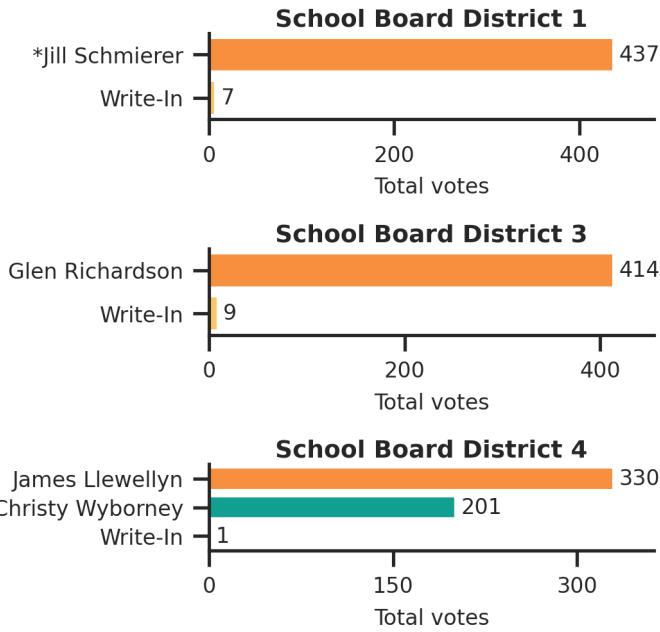

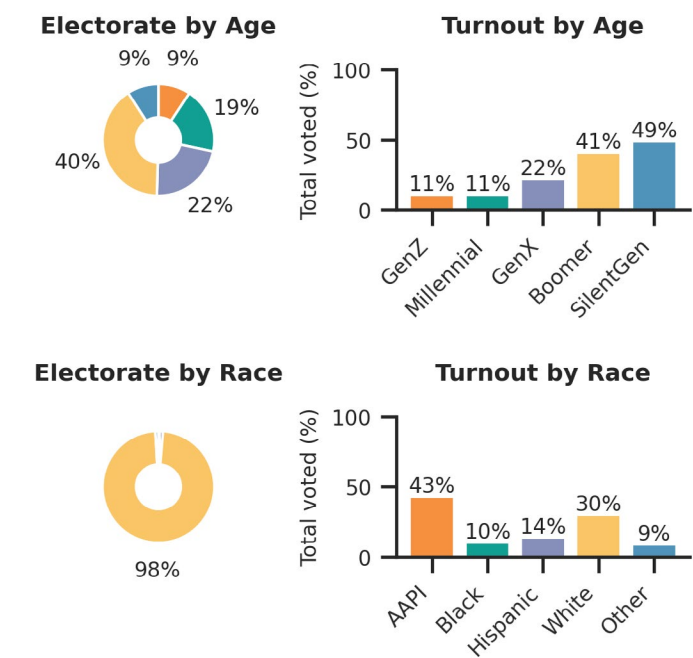


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pend Oreille County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

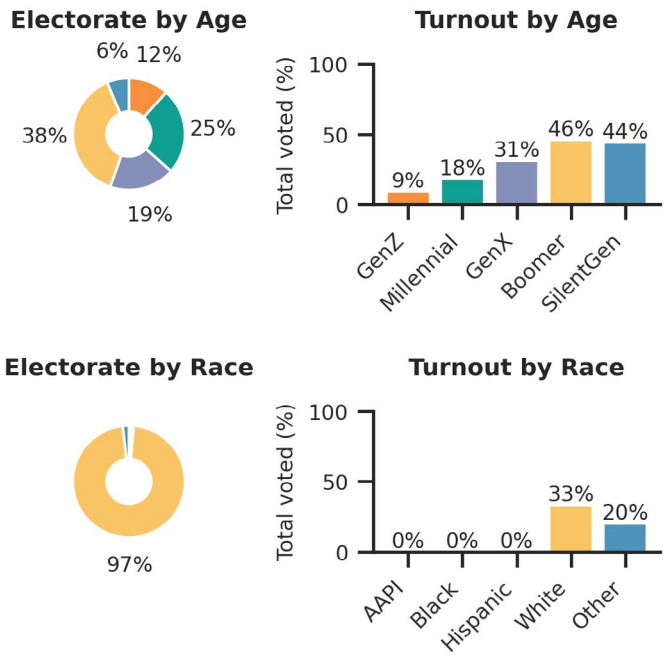


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cusick for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

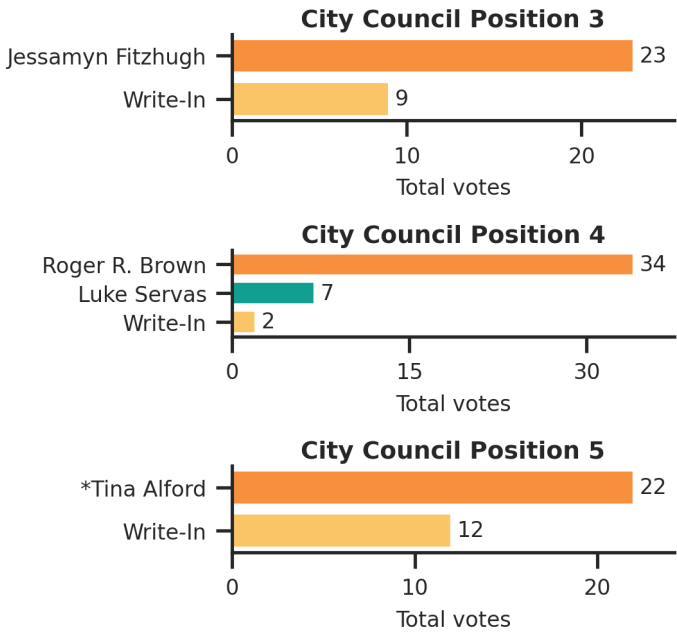
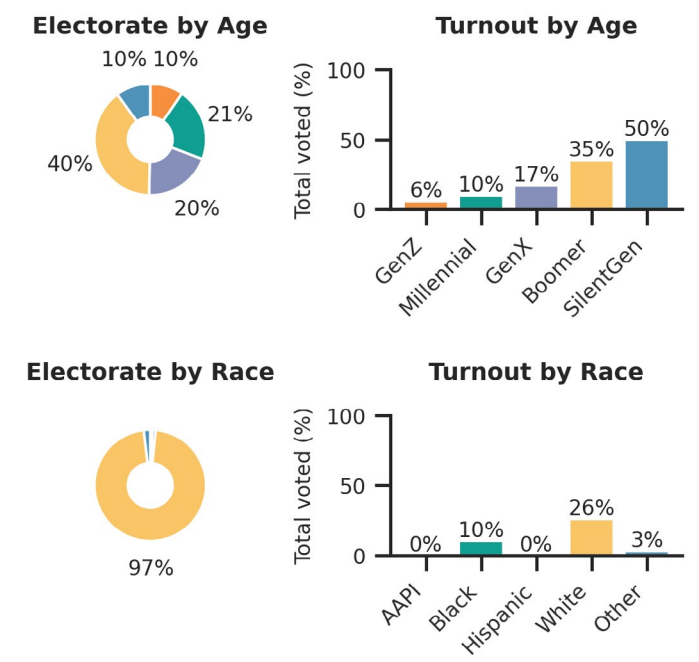


Fig 2 Election results in Cusick for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

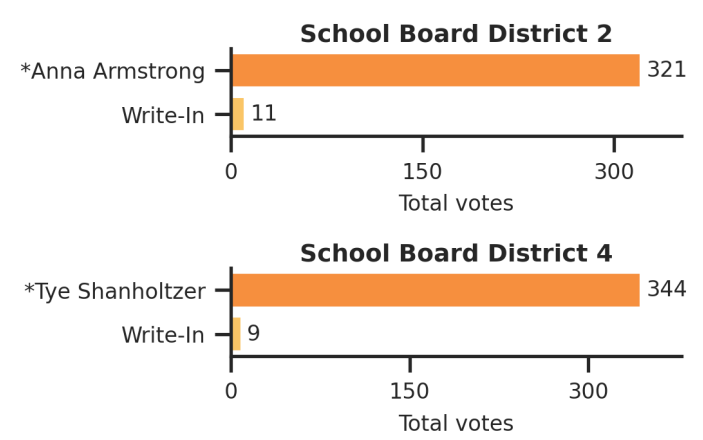

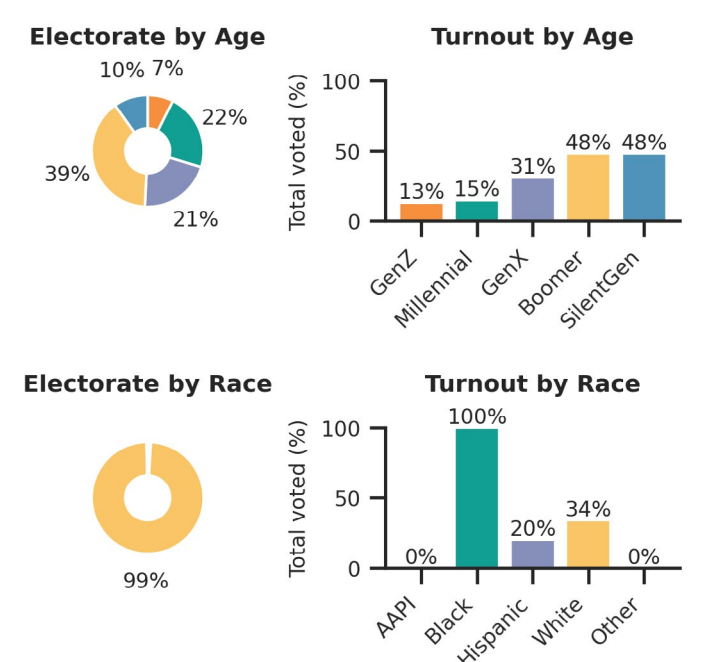

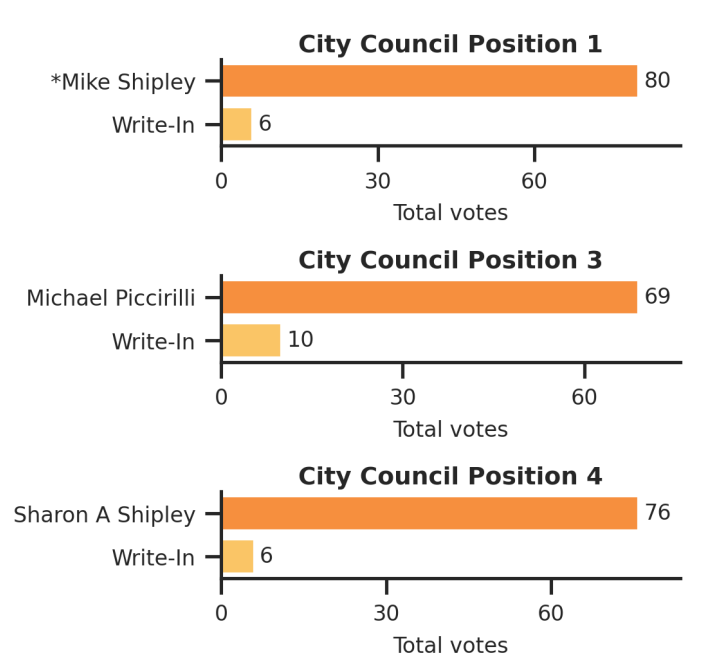

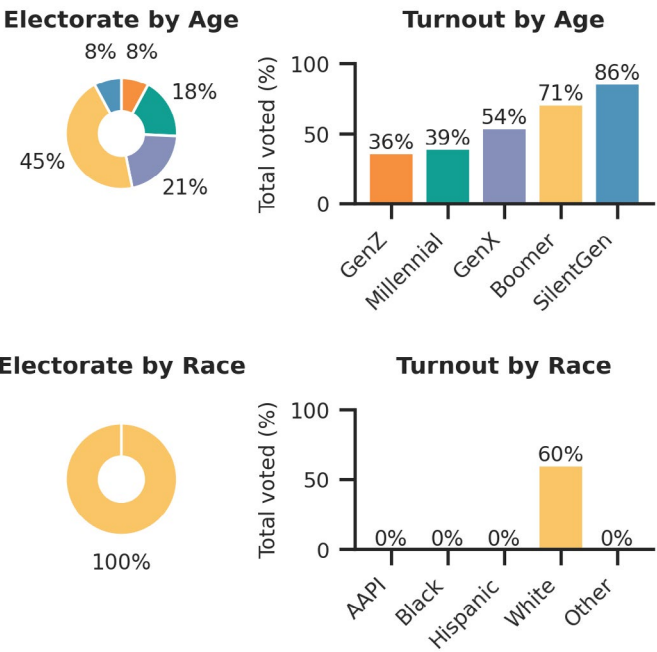


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Metaline for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

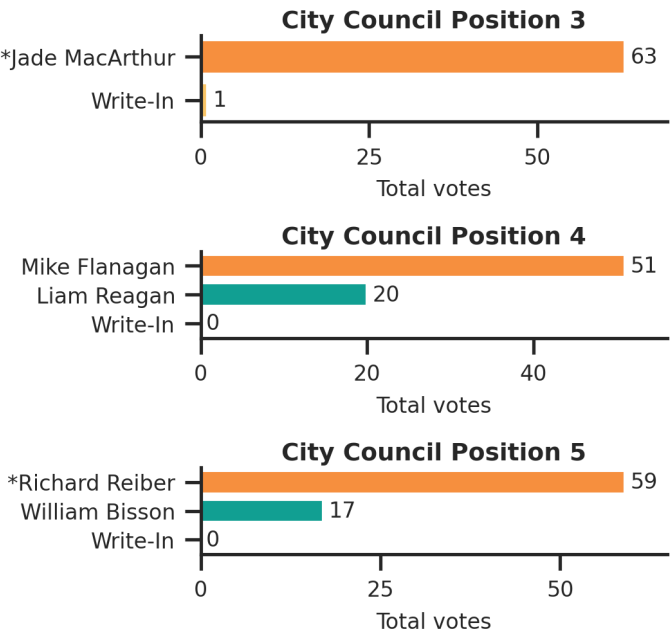


Fig 2 Election results in Metaline for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

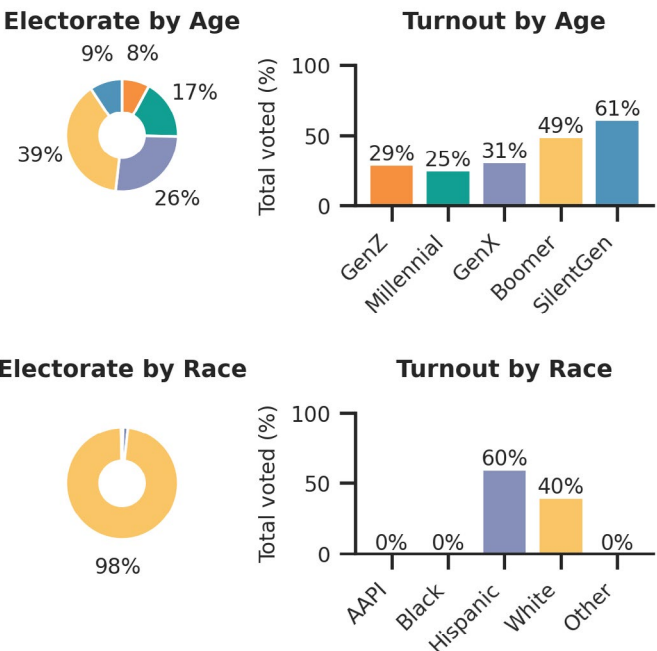


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Metaline Falls for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

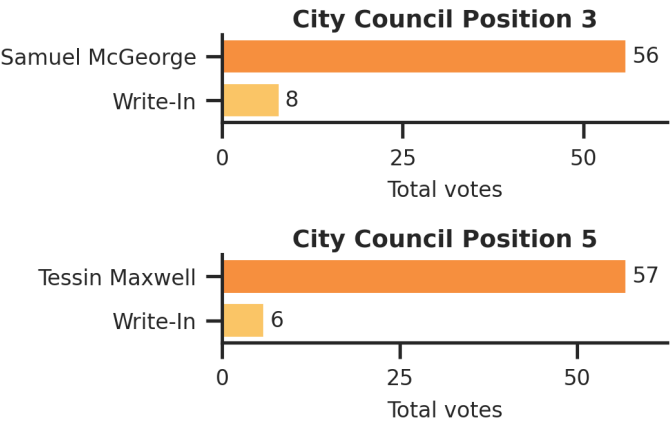


Fig 2 Election results in Metaline Falls for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

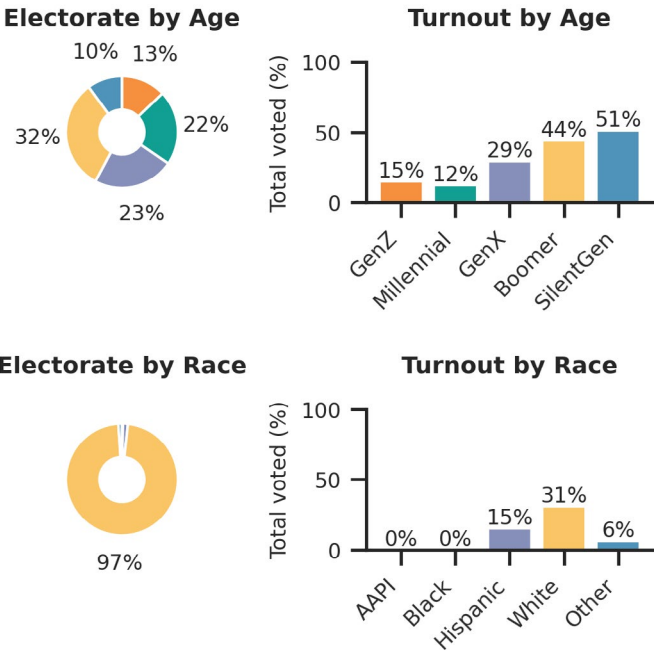


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Newport for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

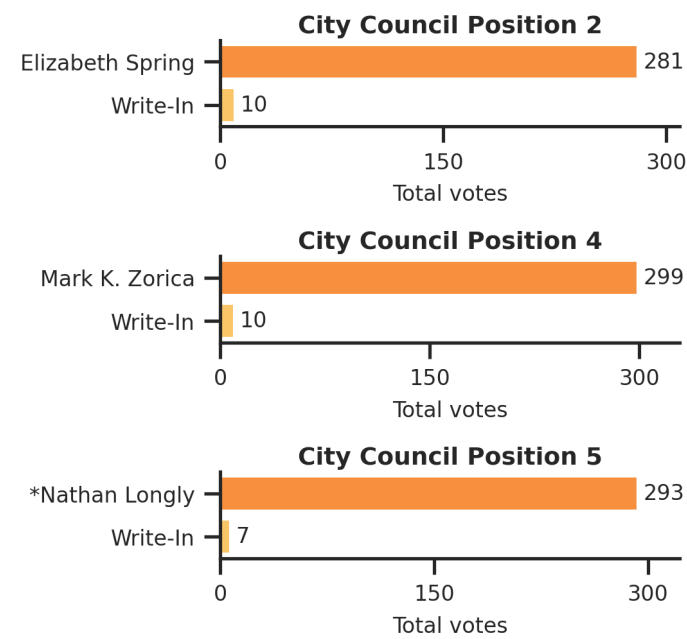


Fig 2 Election results in Newport for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

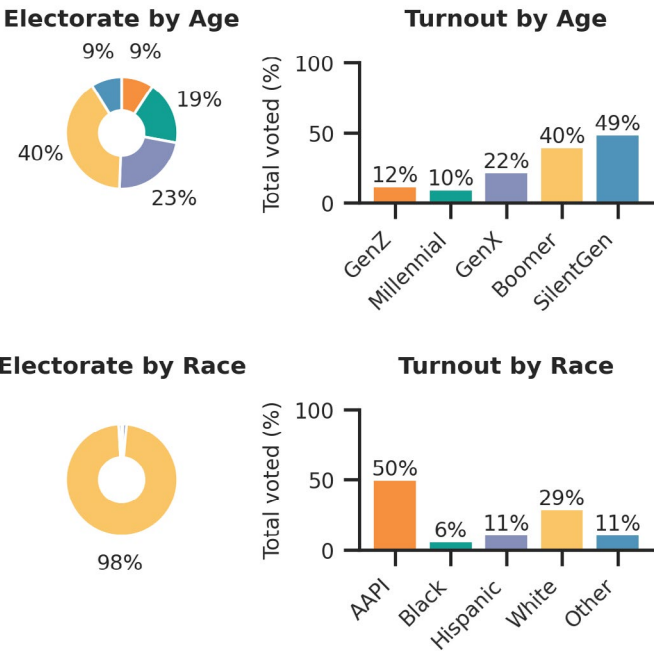


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Newport School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

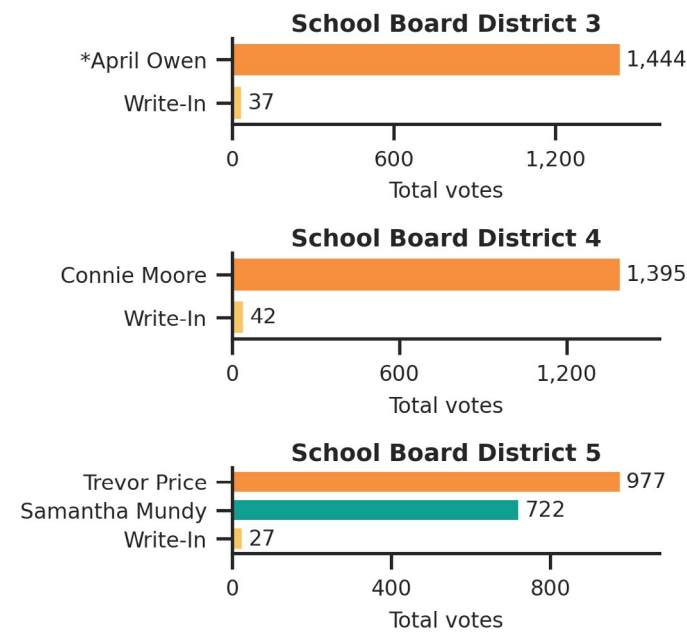


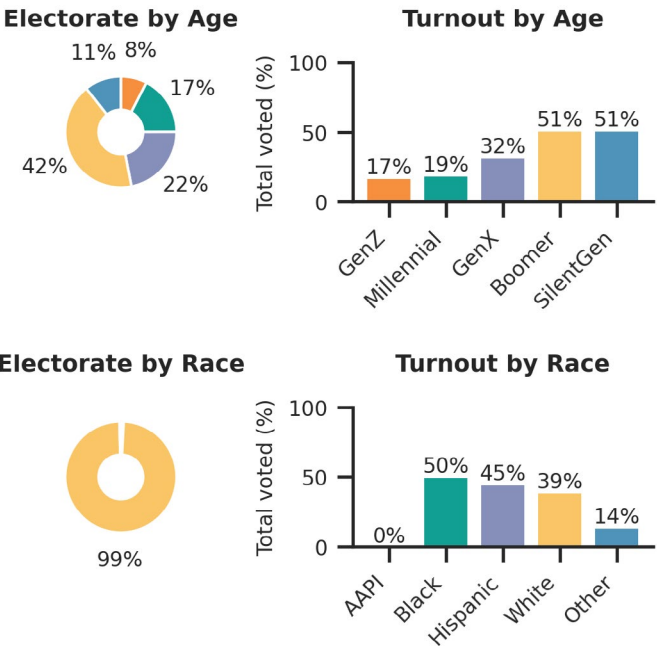
Fig 2 Election results in Newport School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

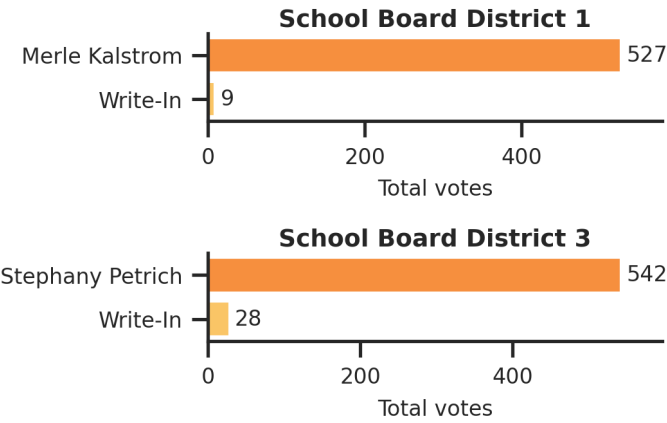

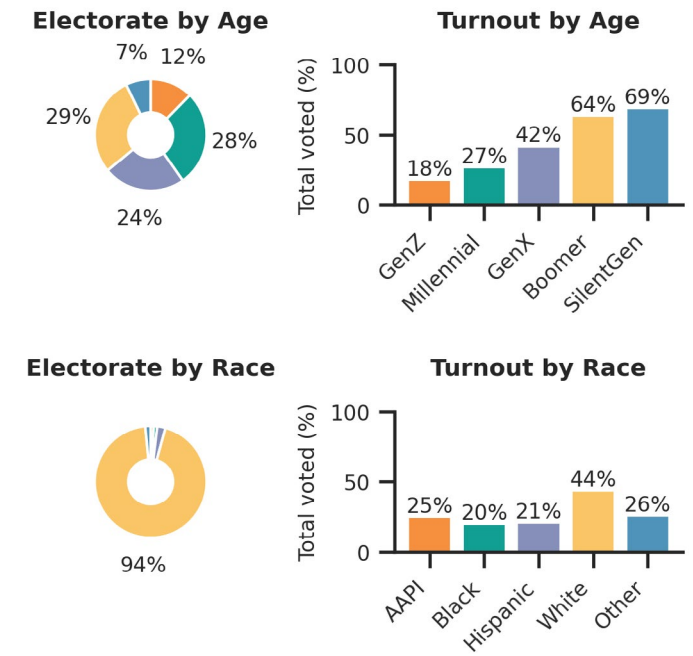


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Spokane County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

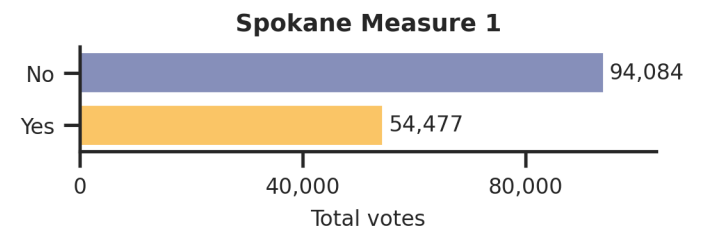


Fig 2 Election results in Spokane County for the 2023 General Election.

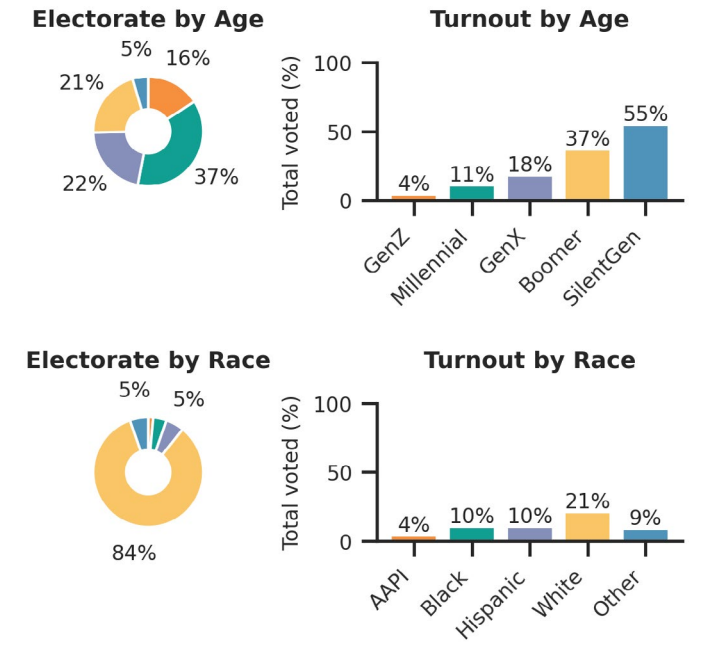


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Airway Heights for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

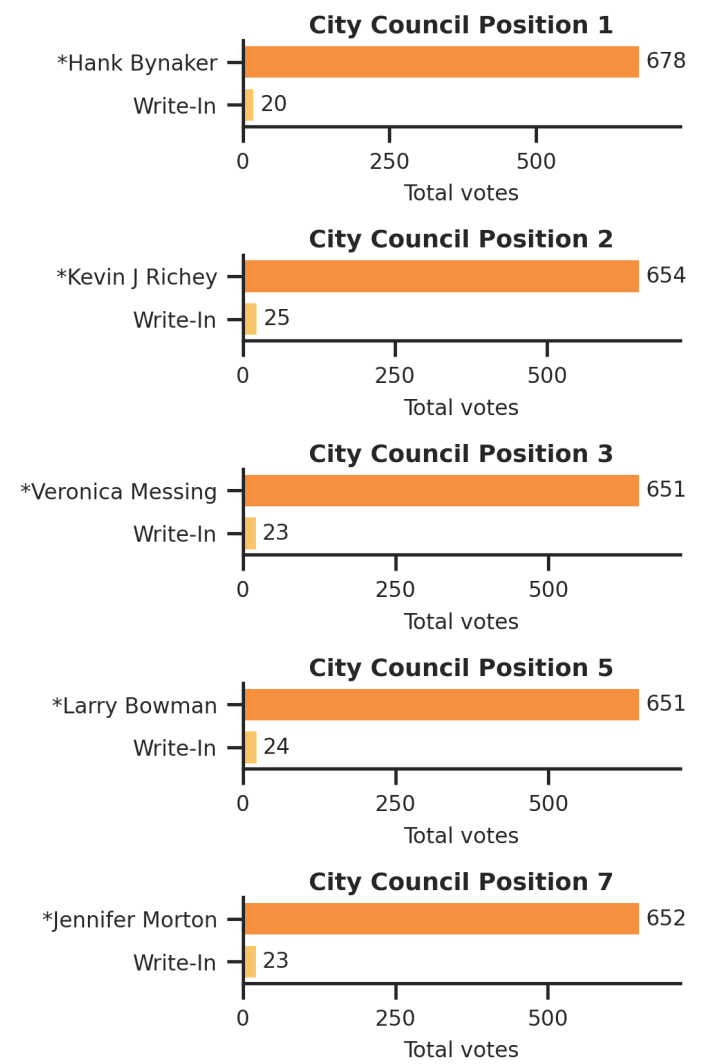
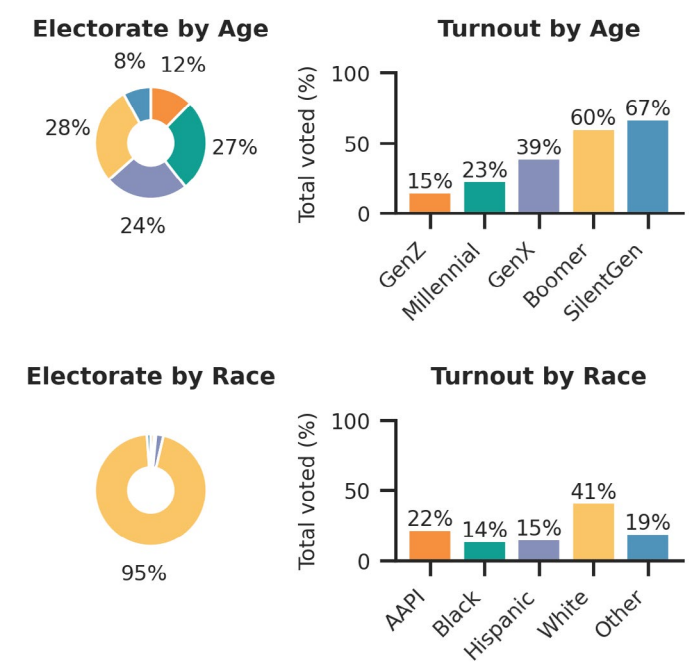


Fig 2 Election results in Airway Heights for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

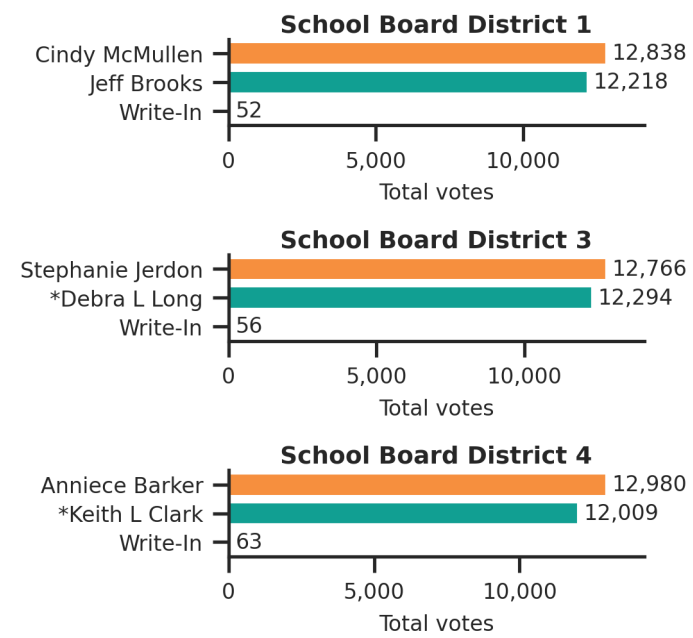

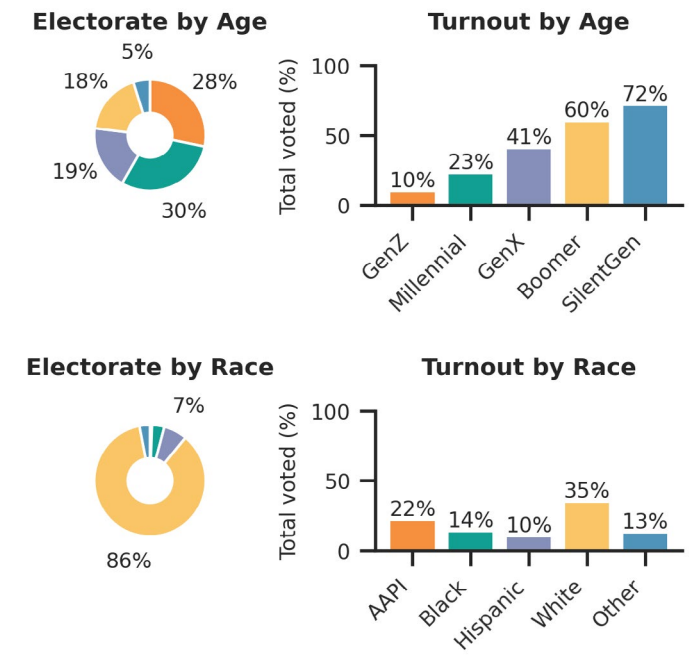

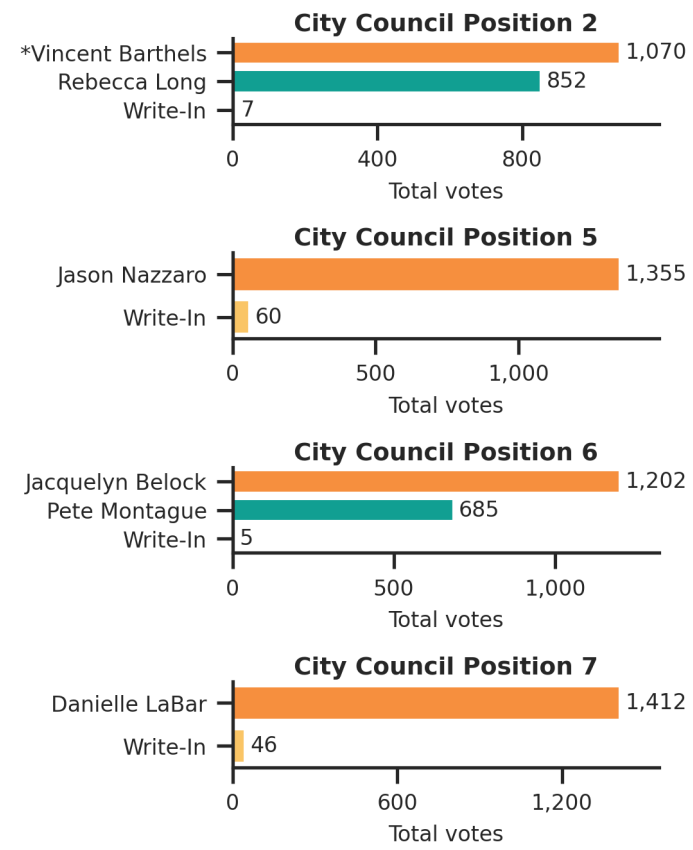

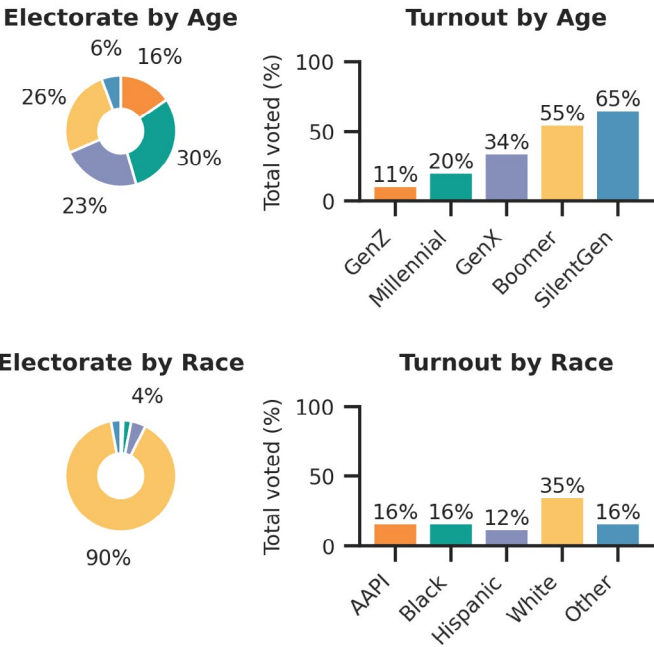


**Fig 2** Election results in Cheney for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

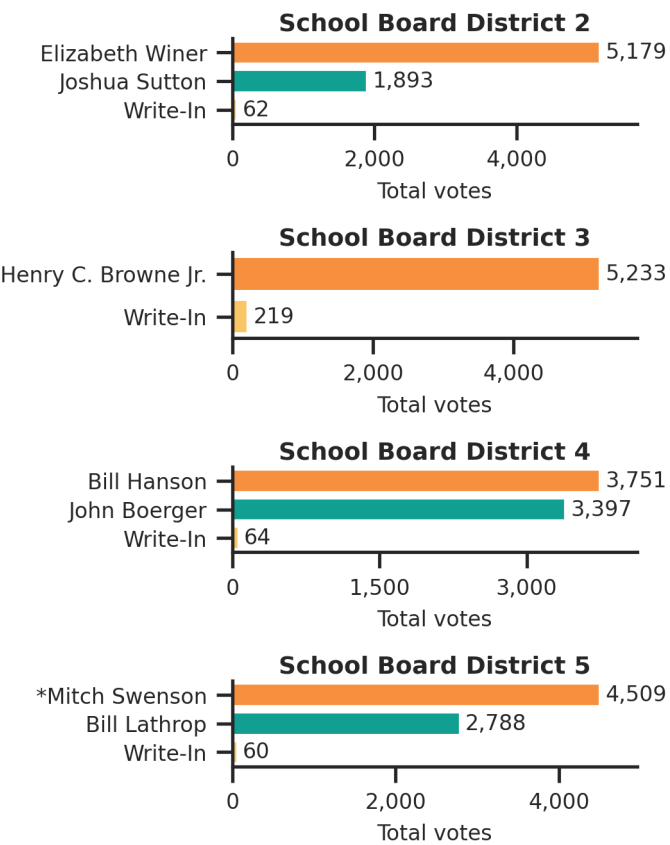

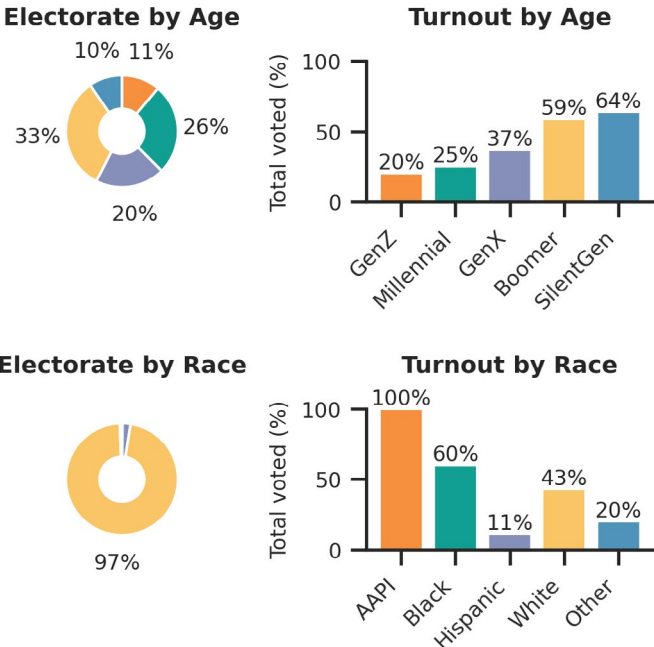


**Fig 2** Election results in Cheney School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

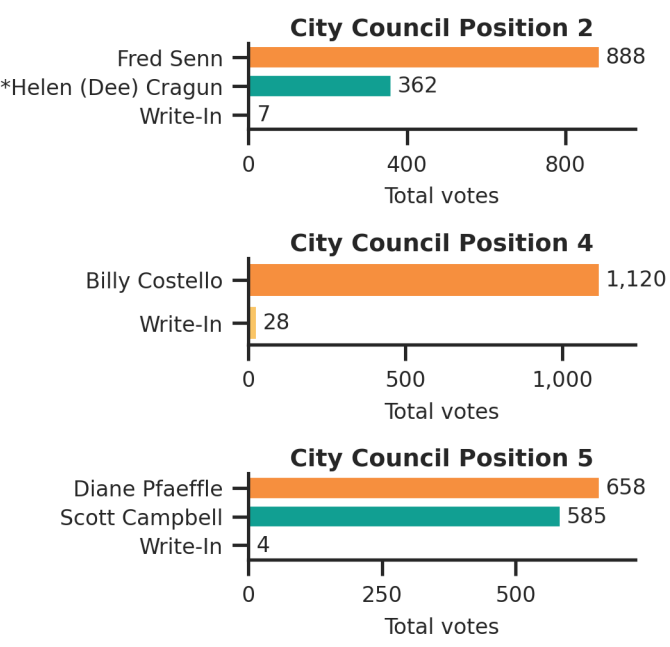

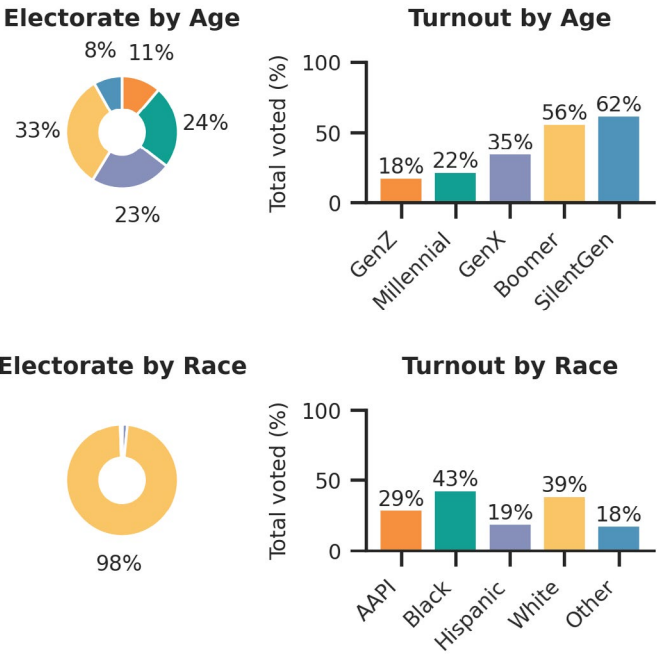
**Fig 2** Election results in Deer Park for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

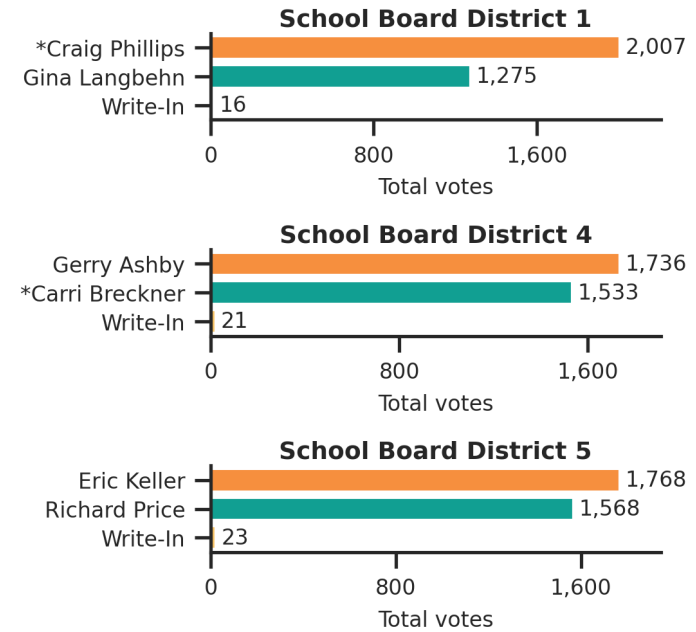

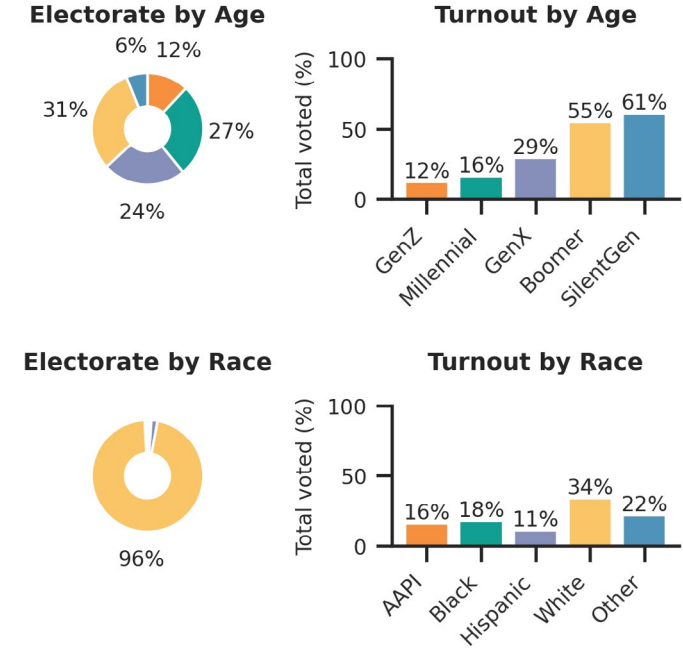


**Fig 2** Election results in Deer Park School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

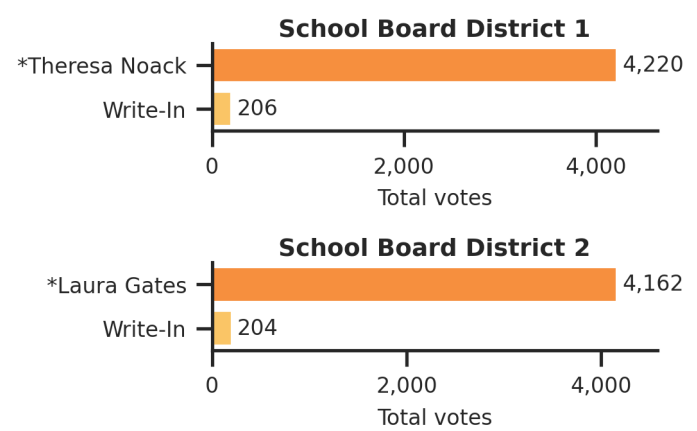

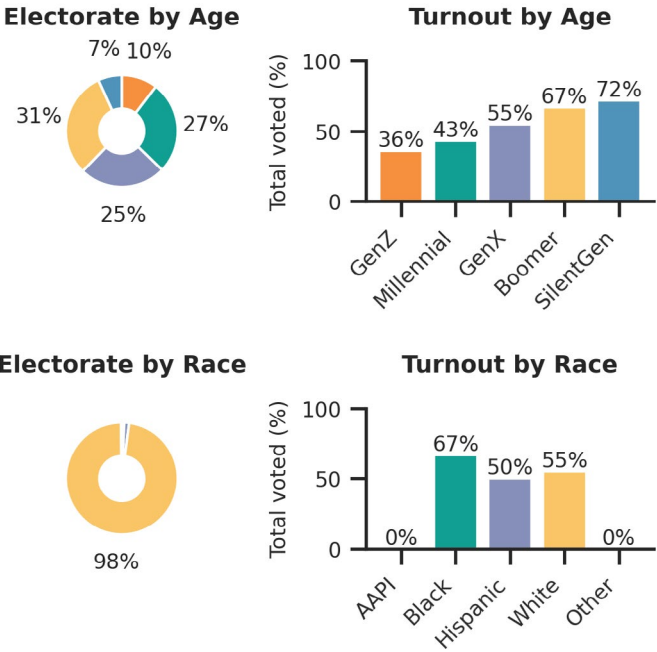


**Fig 2** Election results in East Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

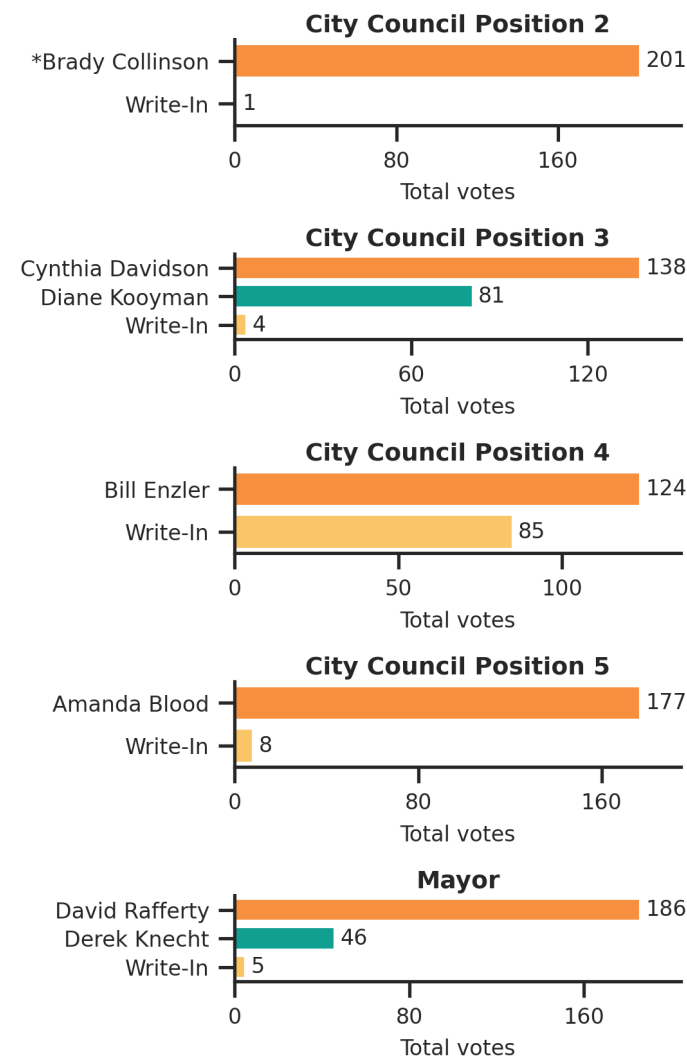


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Fairfield for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

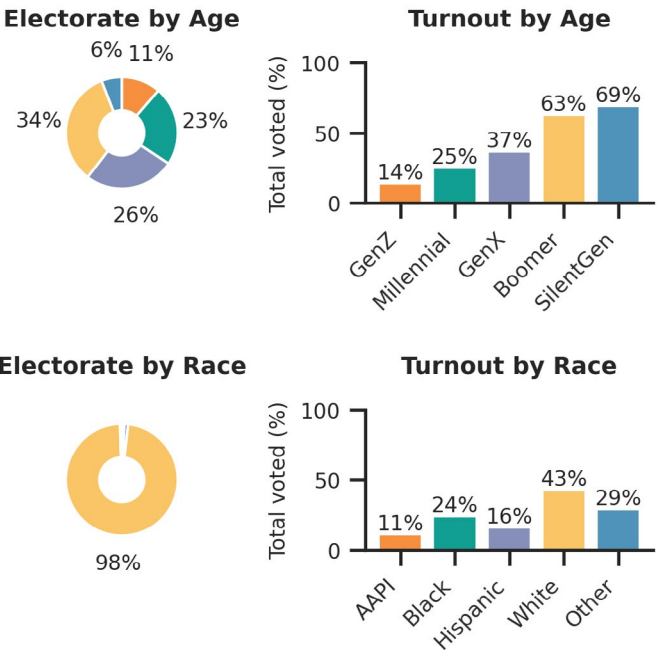


**Fig 2** Election results in Fairfield for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

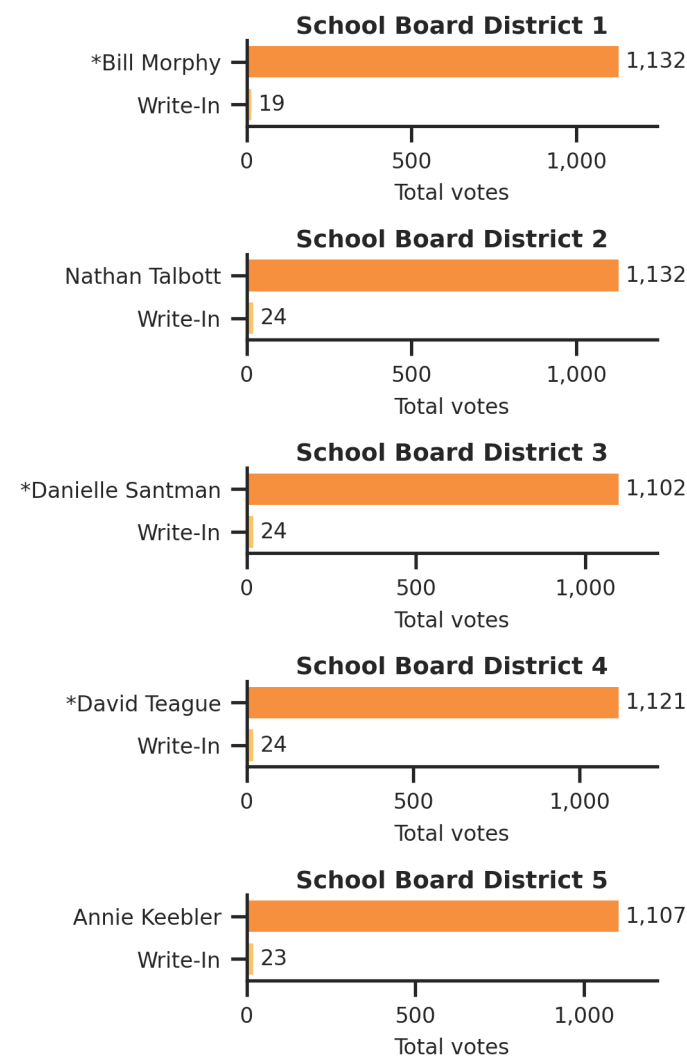


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Freeman School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

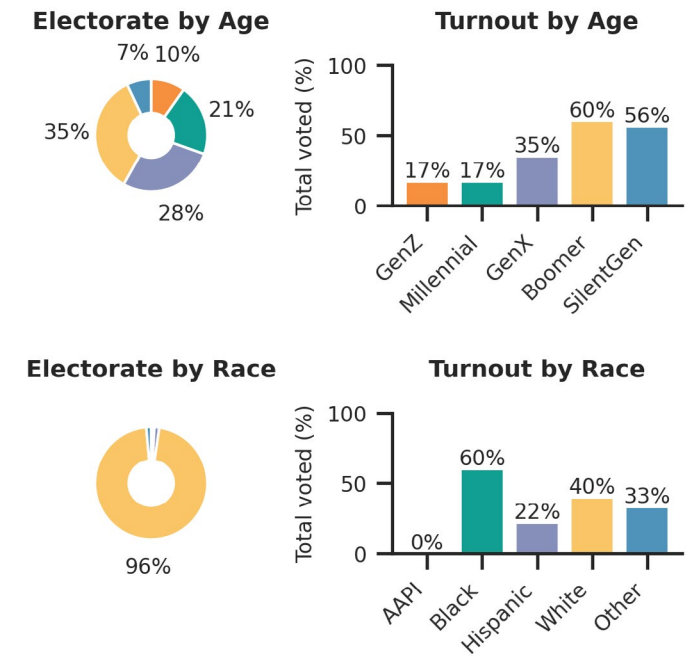


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Great Northern School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

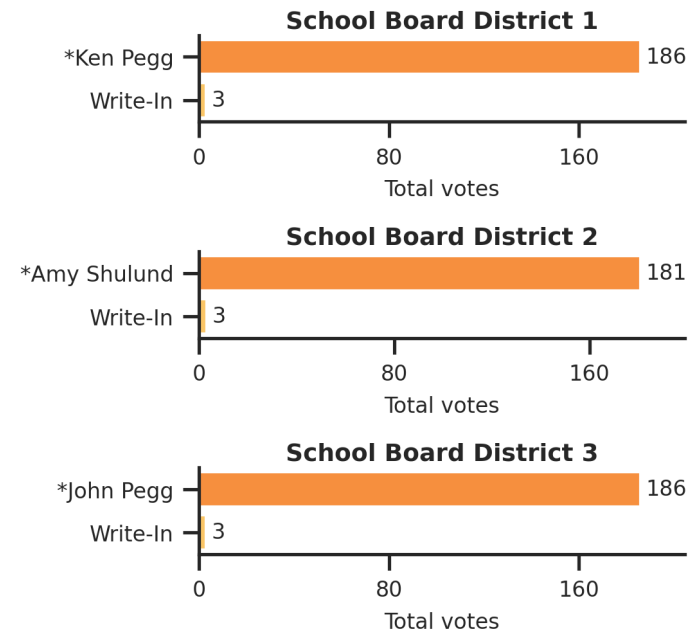


Fig 2 Election results in Great Northern School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

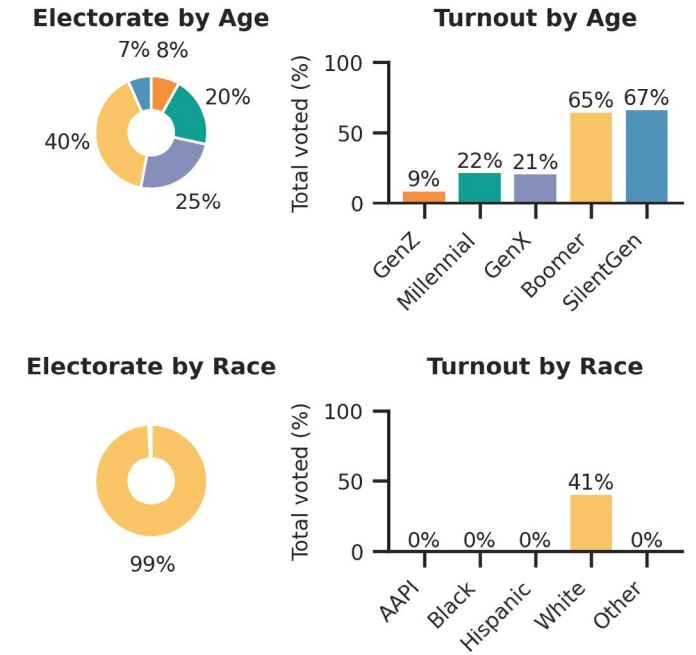


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Latah for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

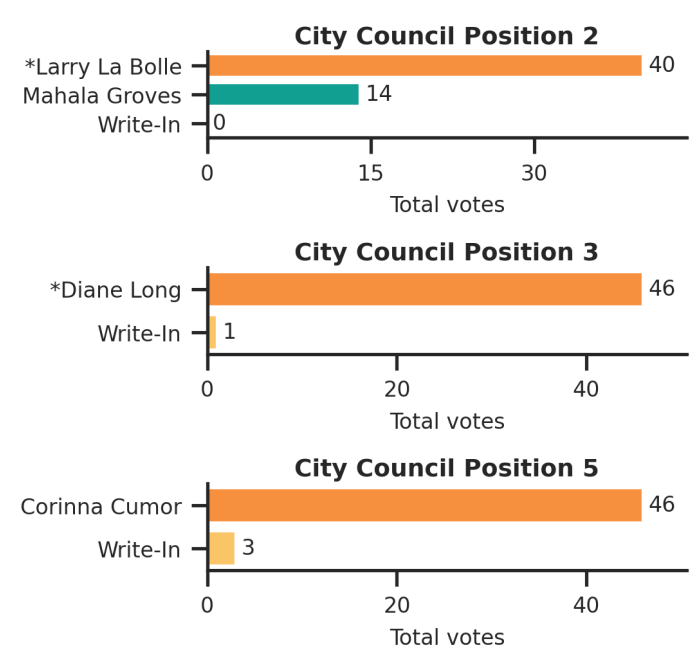
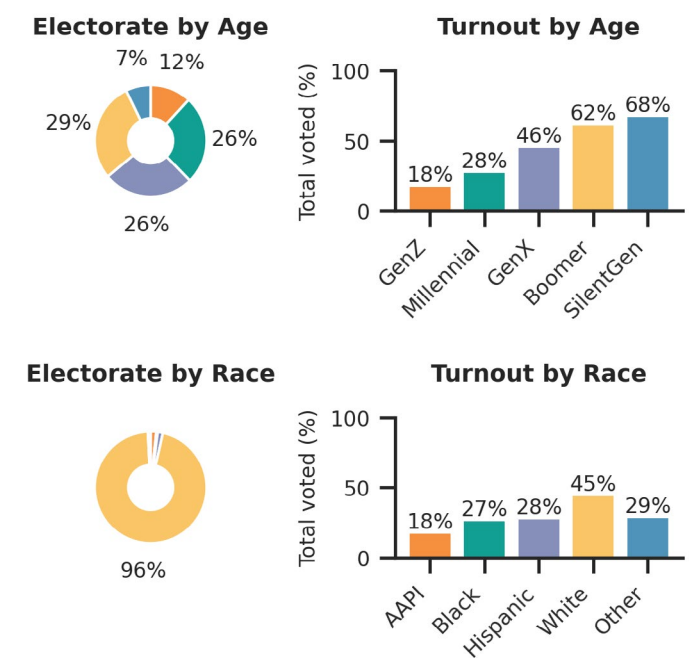


Fig 2 Election results in Latah for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

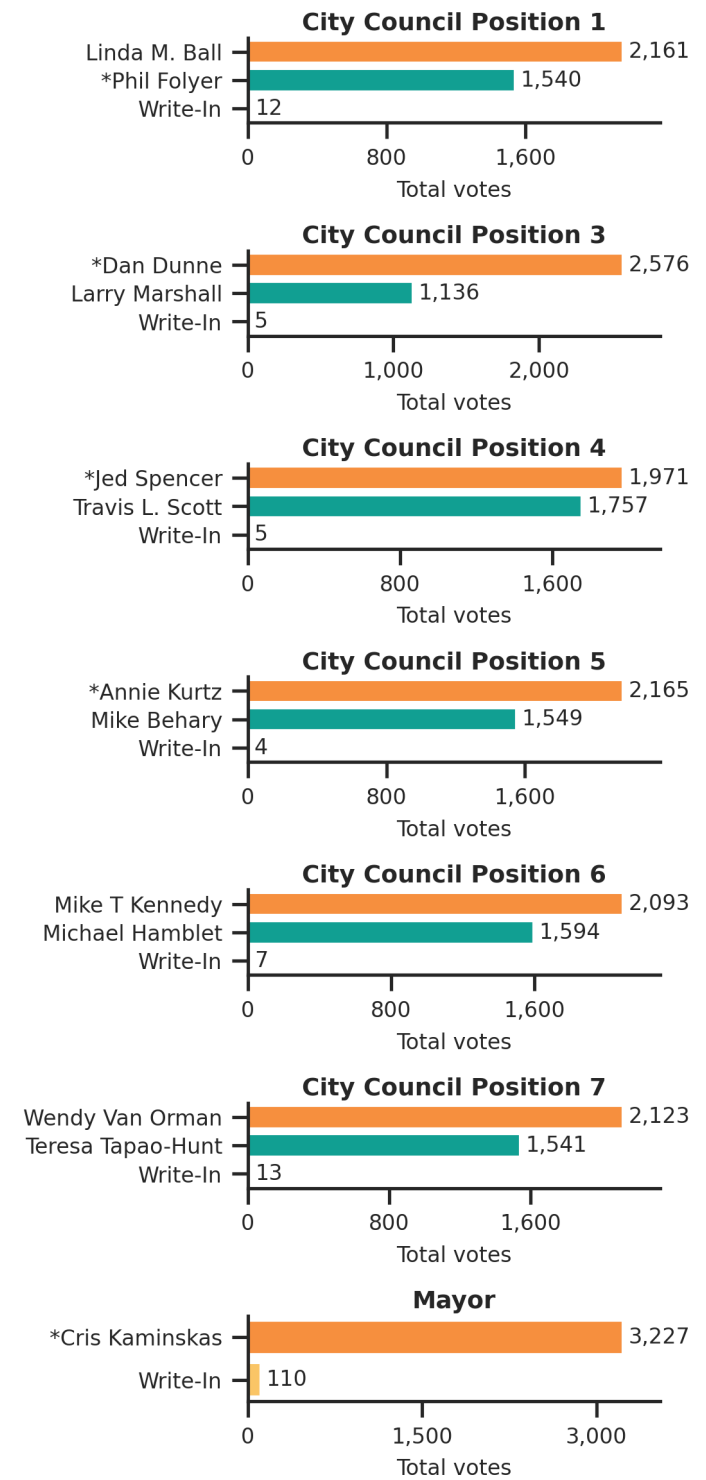


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Liberty Lake for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

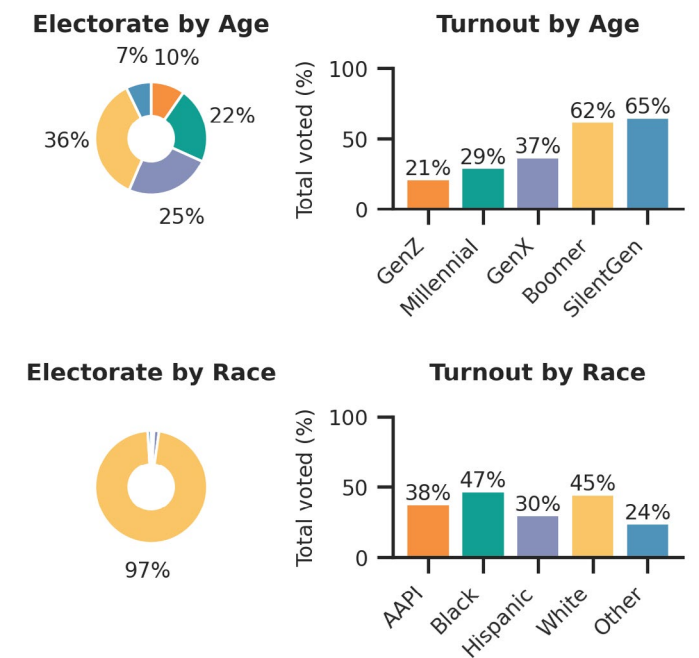


**Fig 2** Election results in Liberty Lake for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

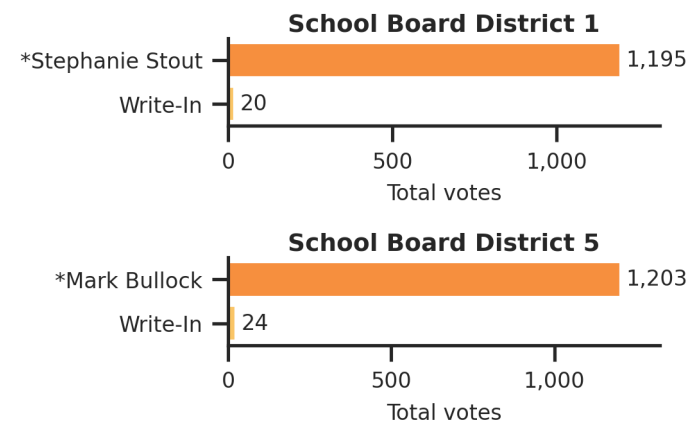

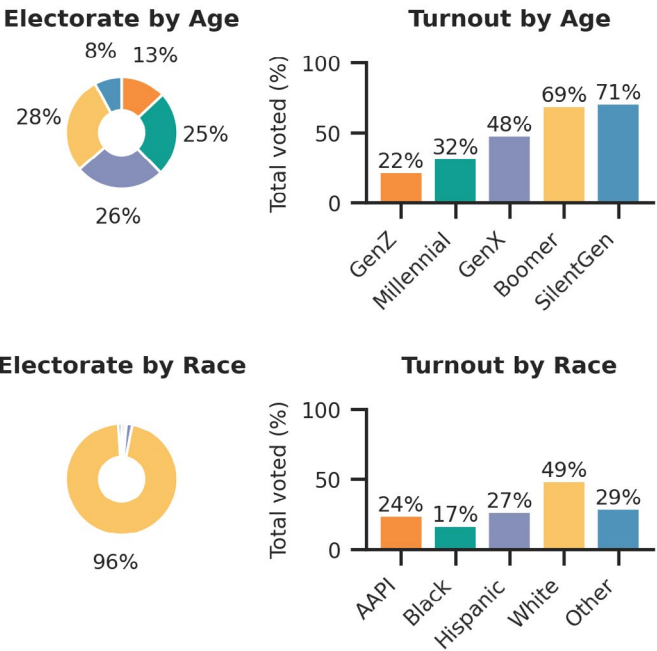
**Fig 2** Election results in Liberty School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

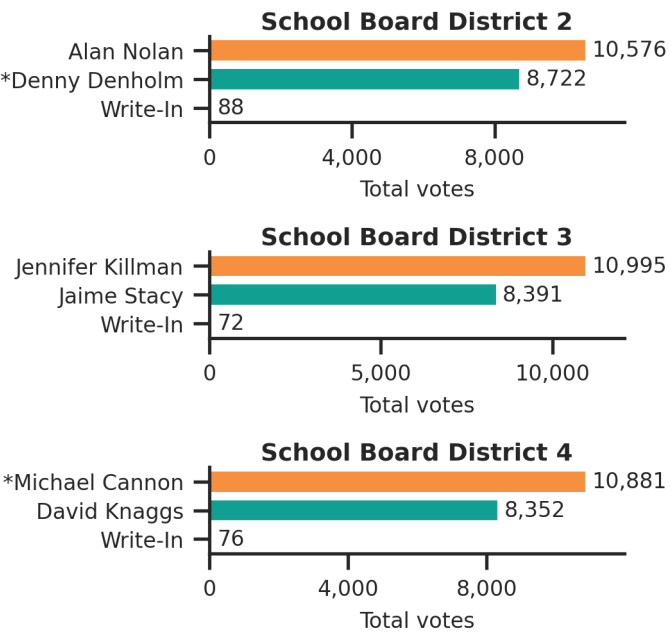

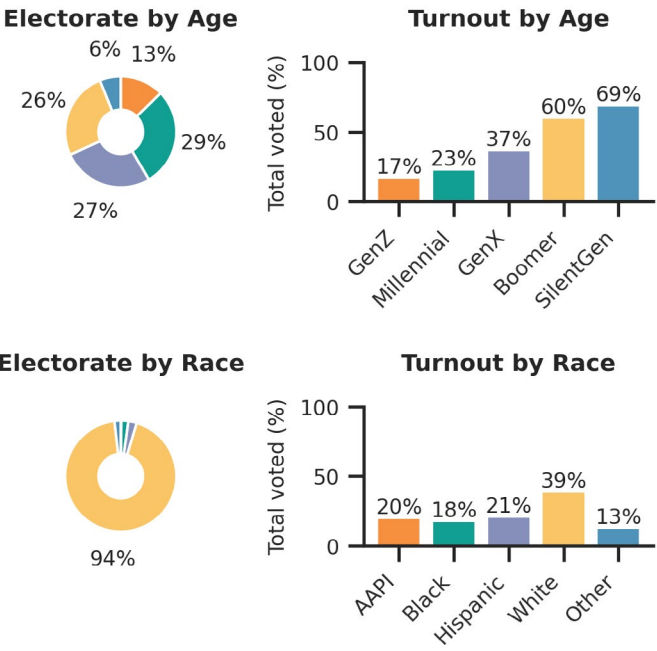


**Fig 2** Election results in Mead School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

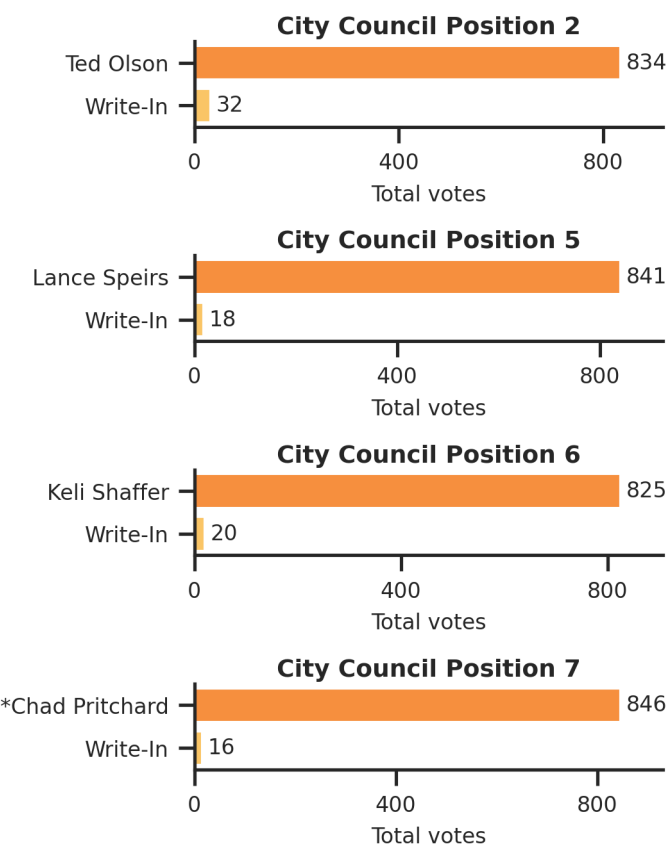

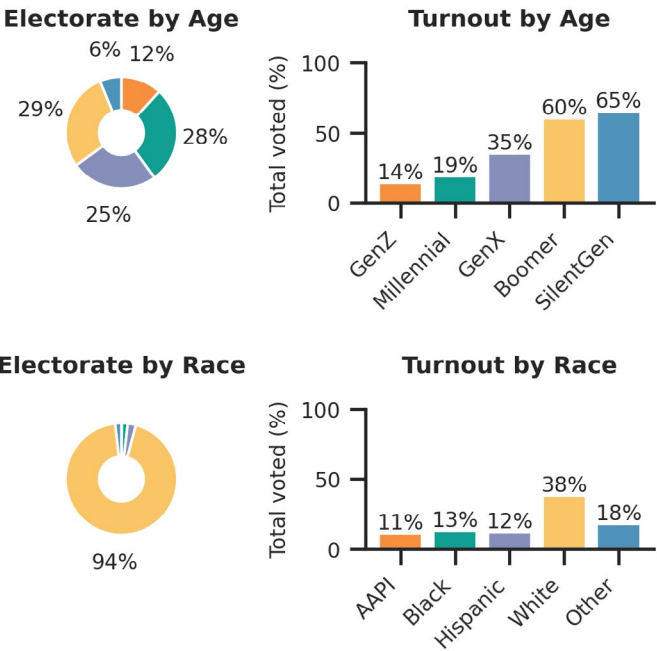


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Medical Lake School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

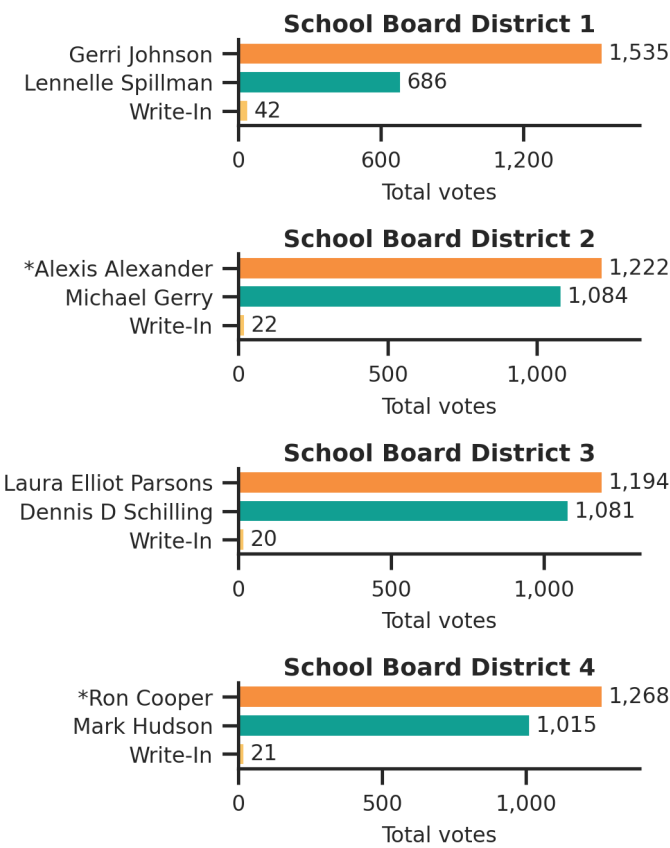


Fig 2 Election results in Medical Lake School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

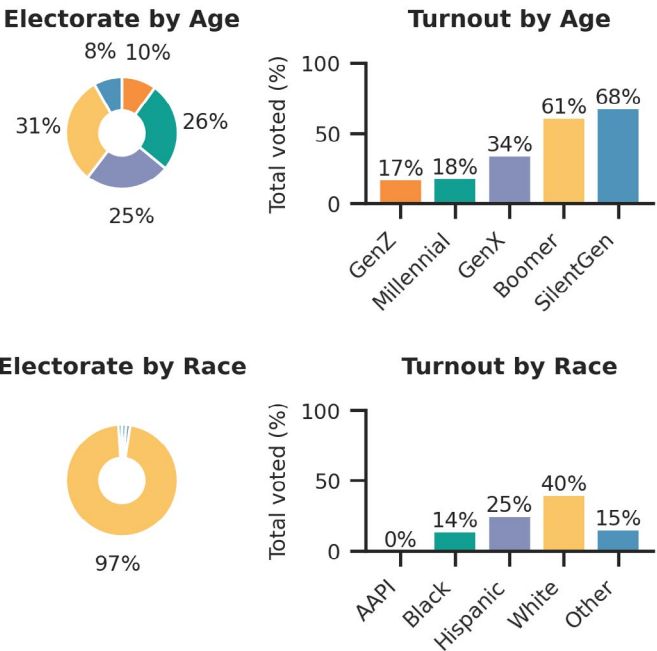


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Millwood for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

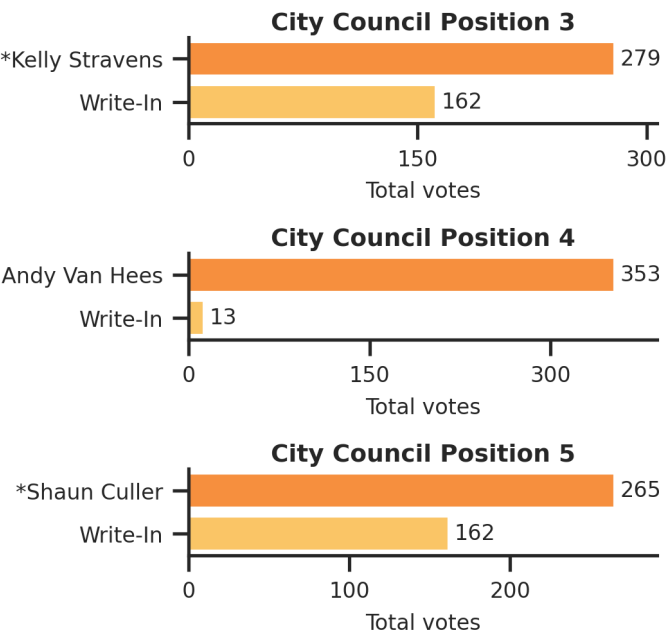


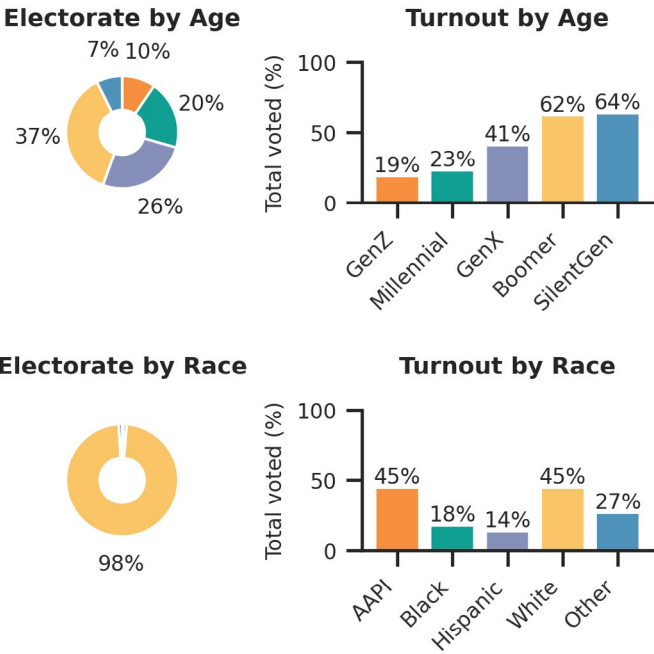
Fig 2 Election results in Millwood for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

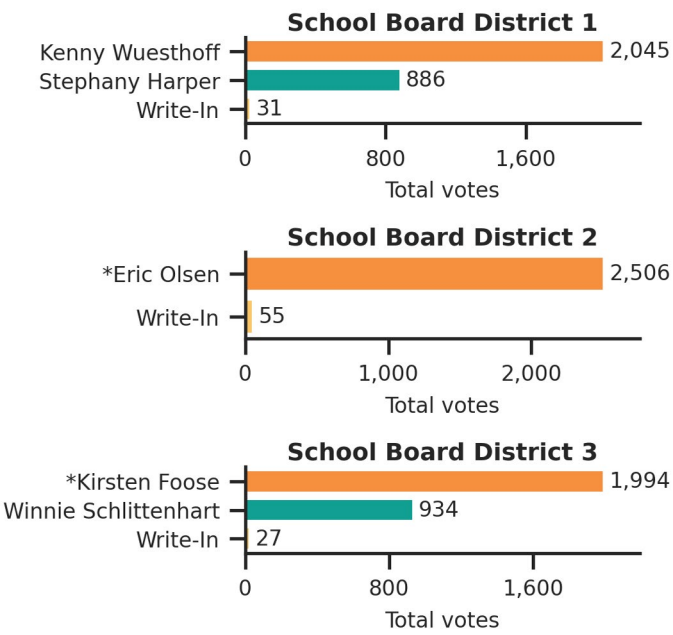

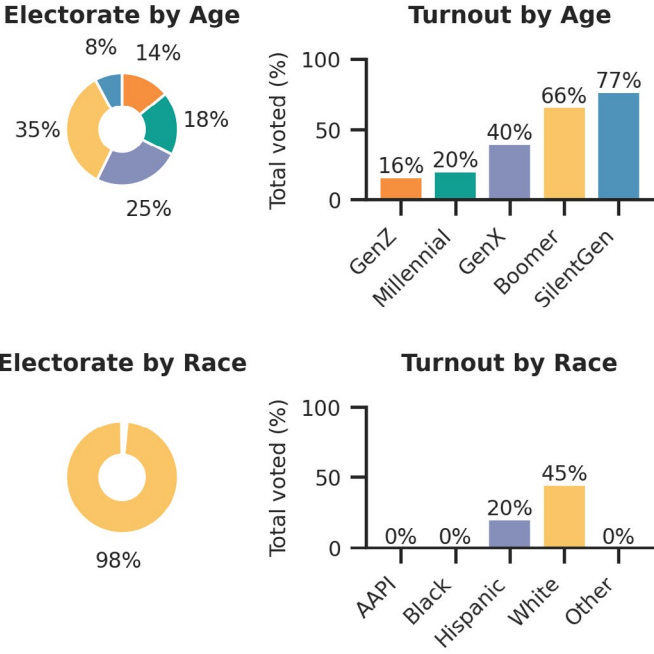


**Fig 2** Election results in Nine Miles School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

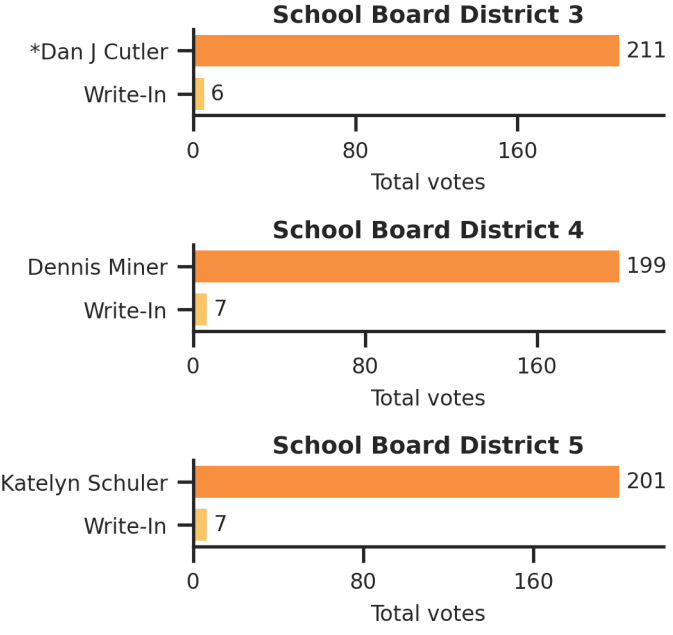

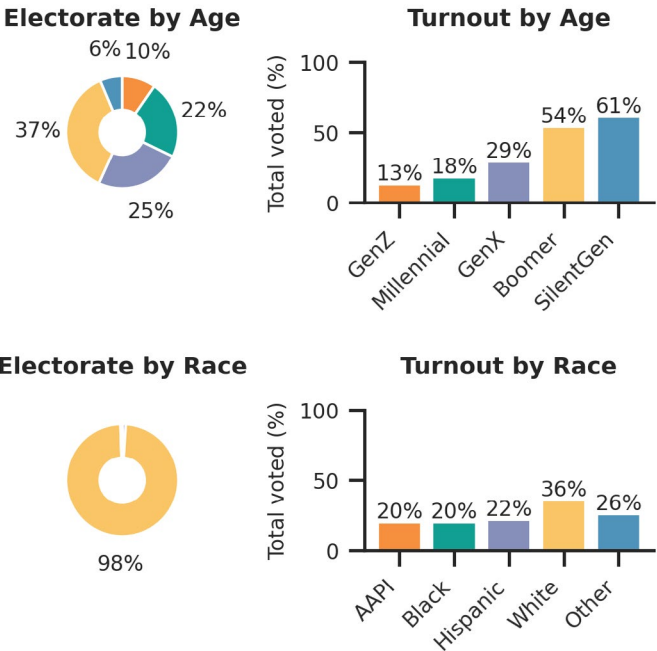

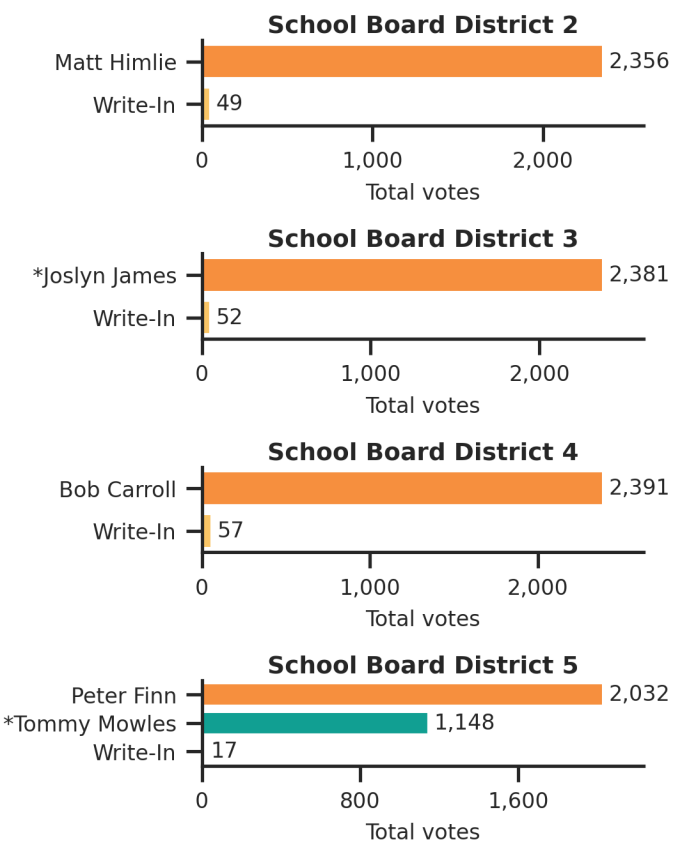

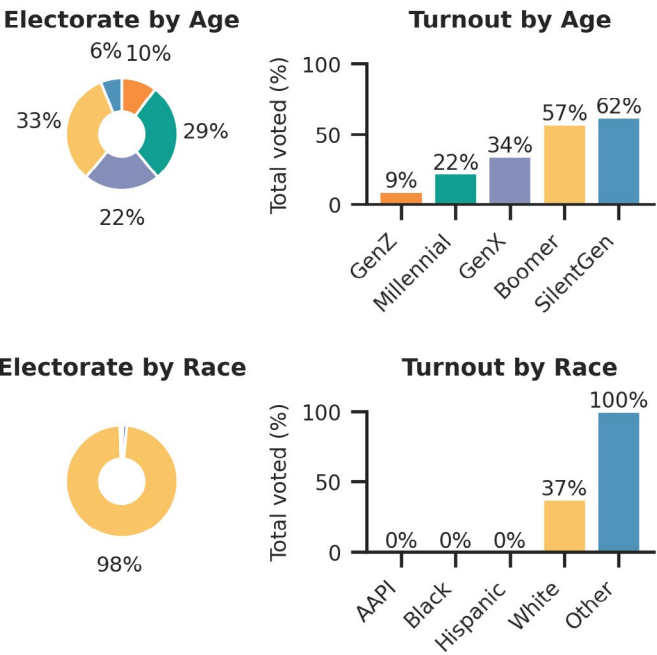

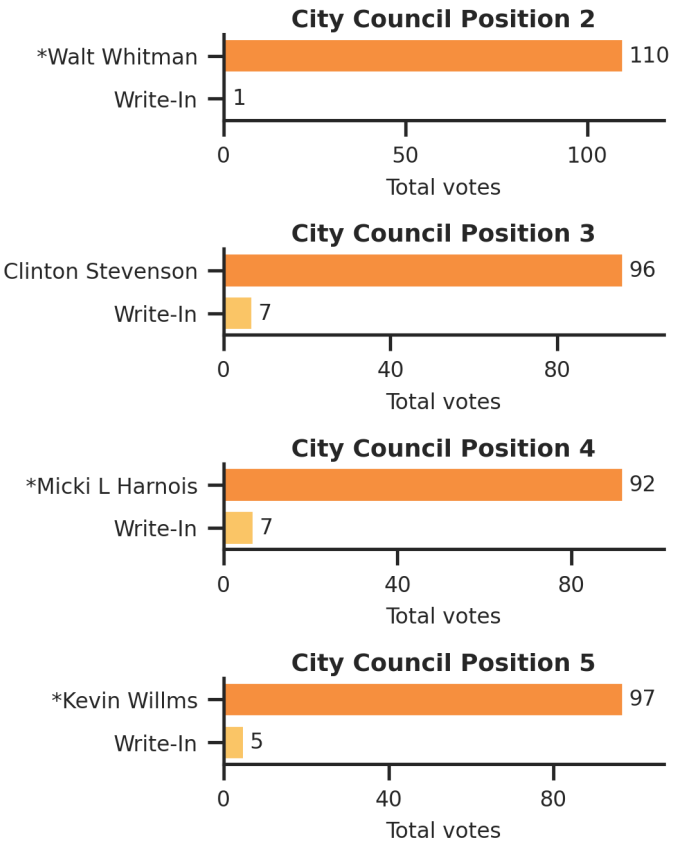

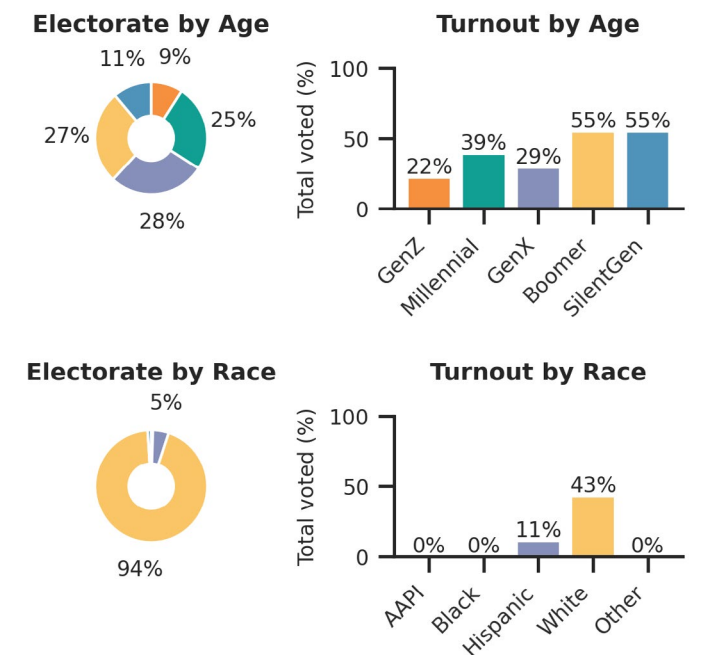


**Fig 2** Election results in Rockford for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

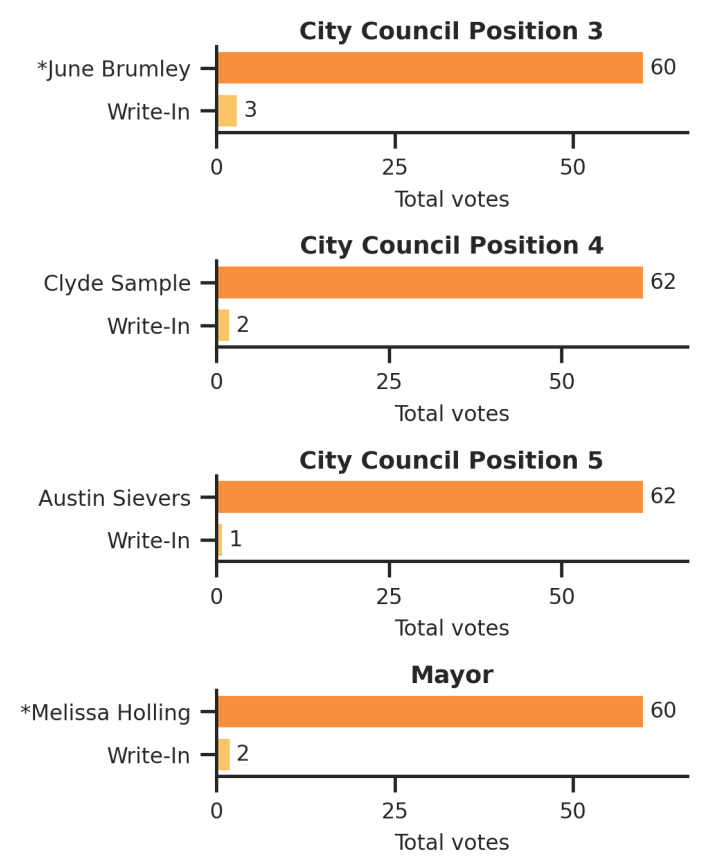

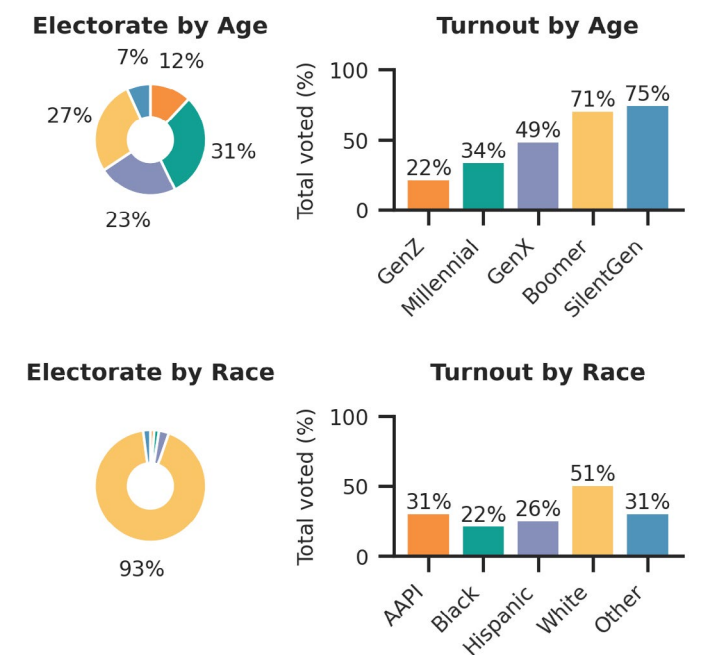

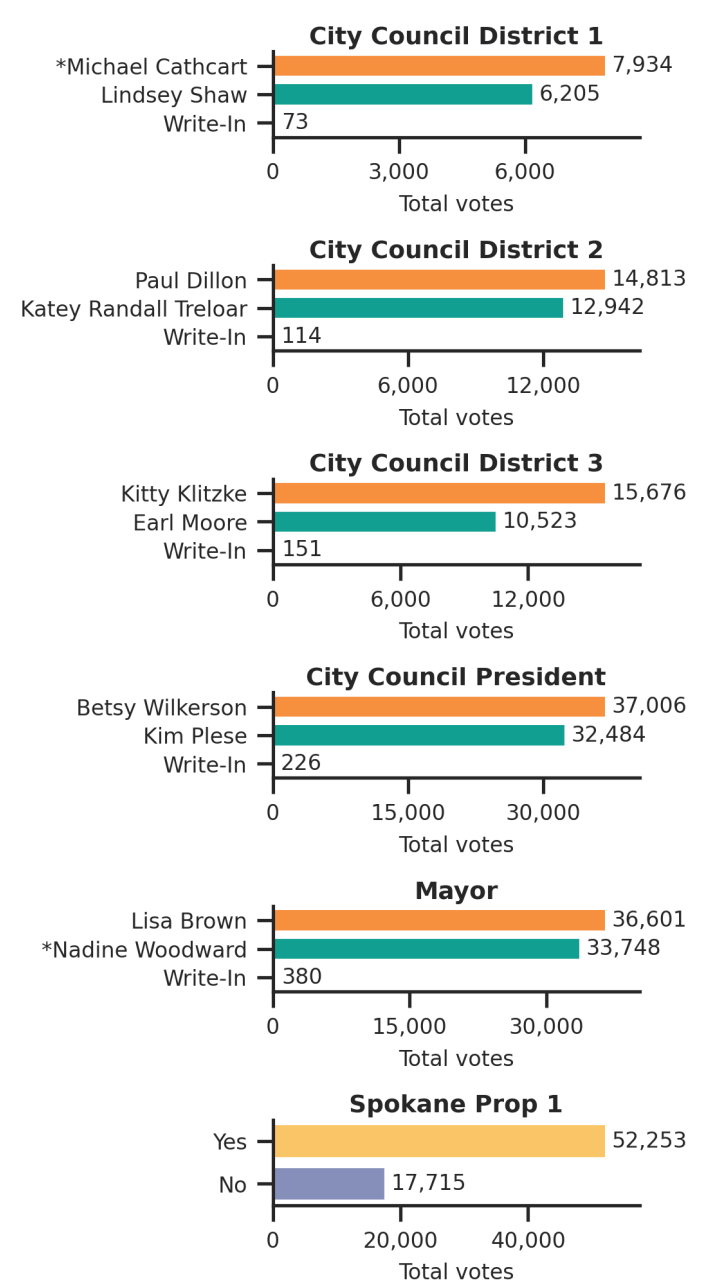


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Spokane for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

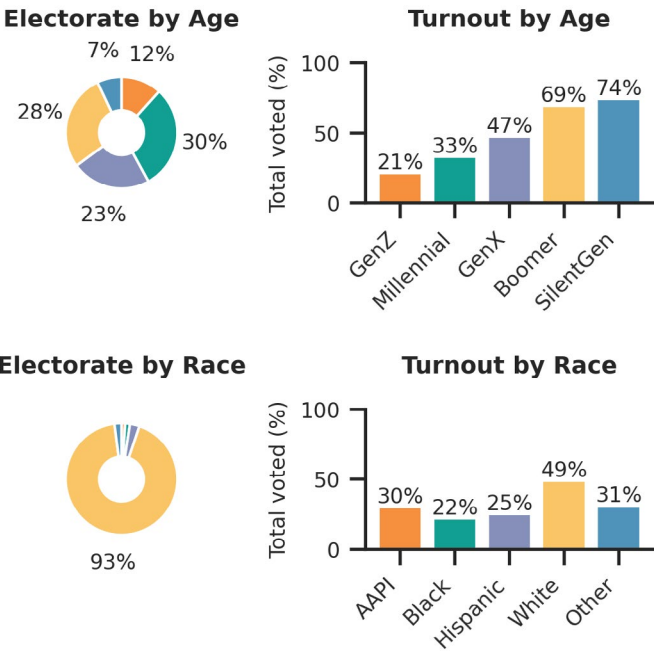

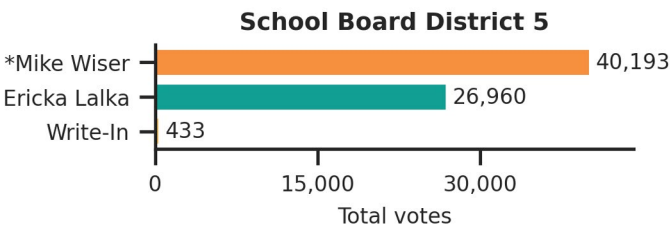

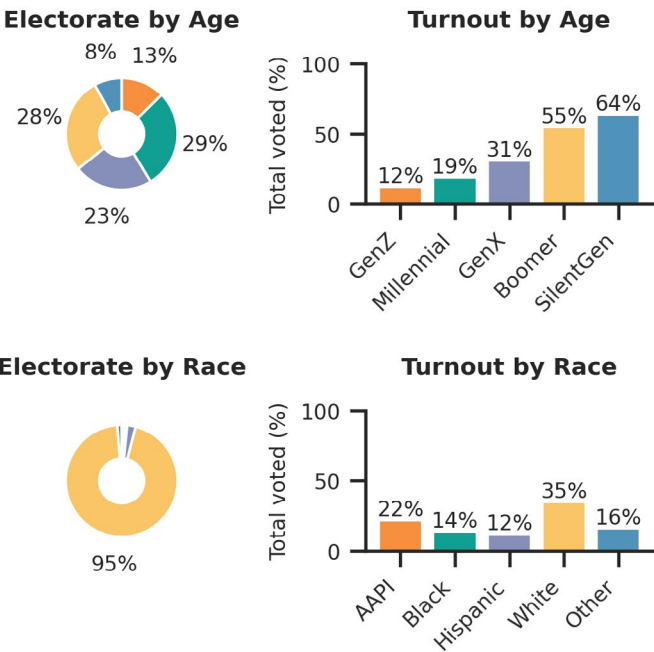

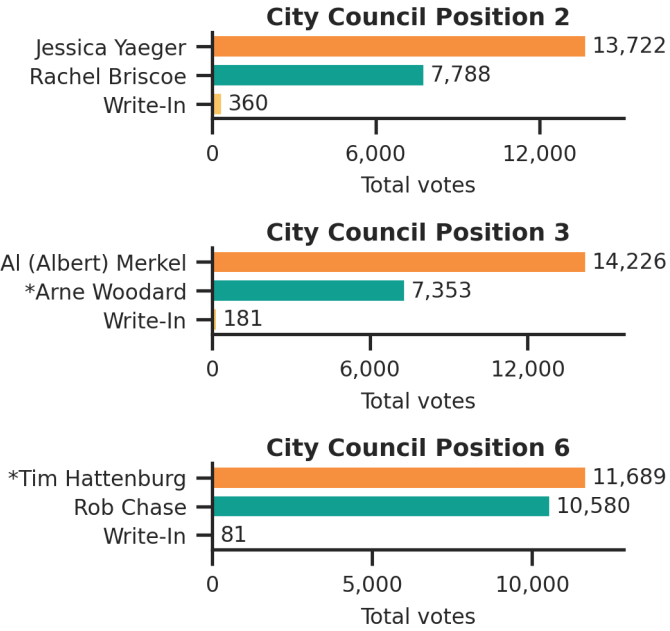

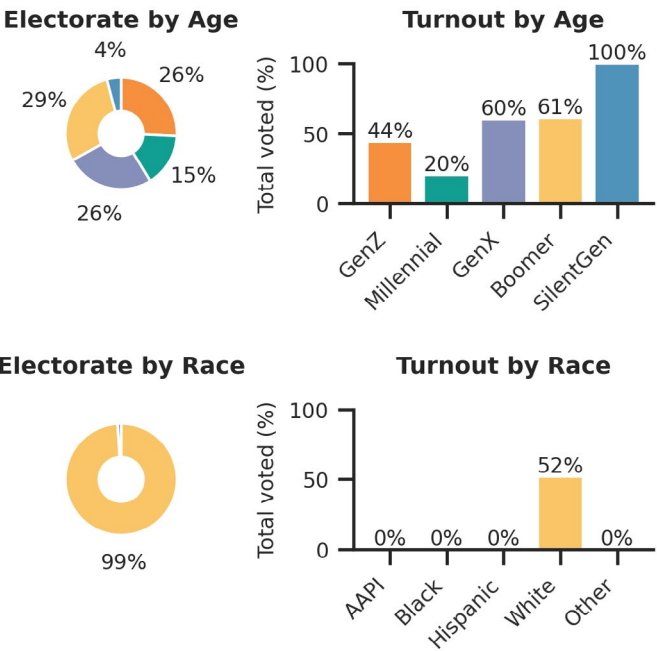


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Waverly for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

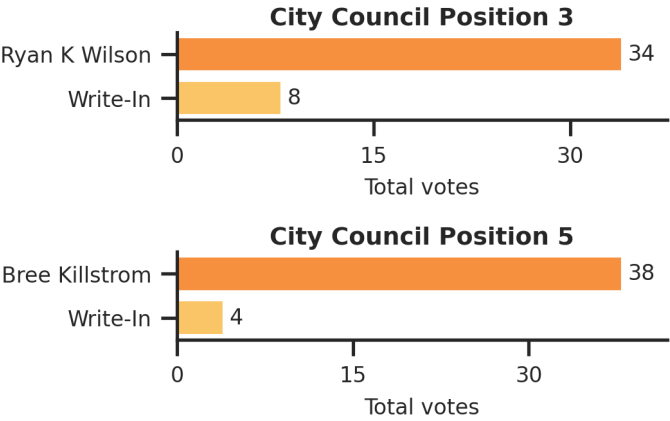


Fig 2 Election results in Waverly for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

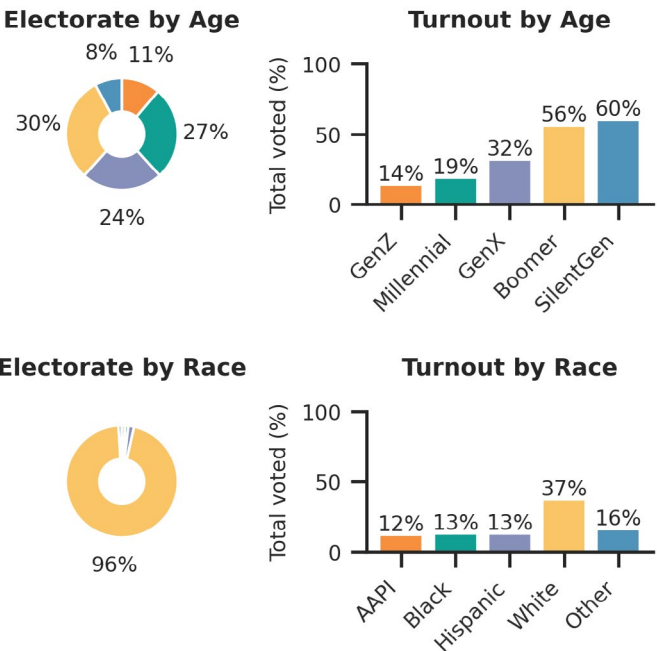


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in West Valley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

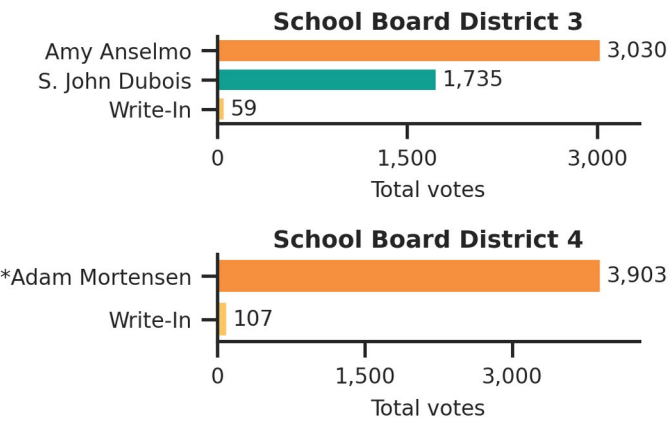
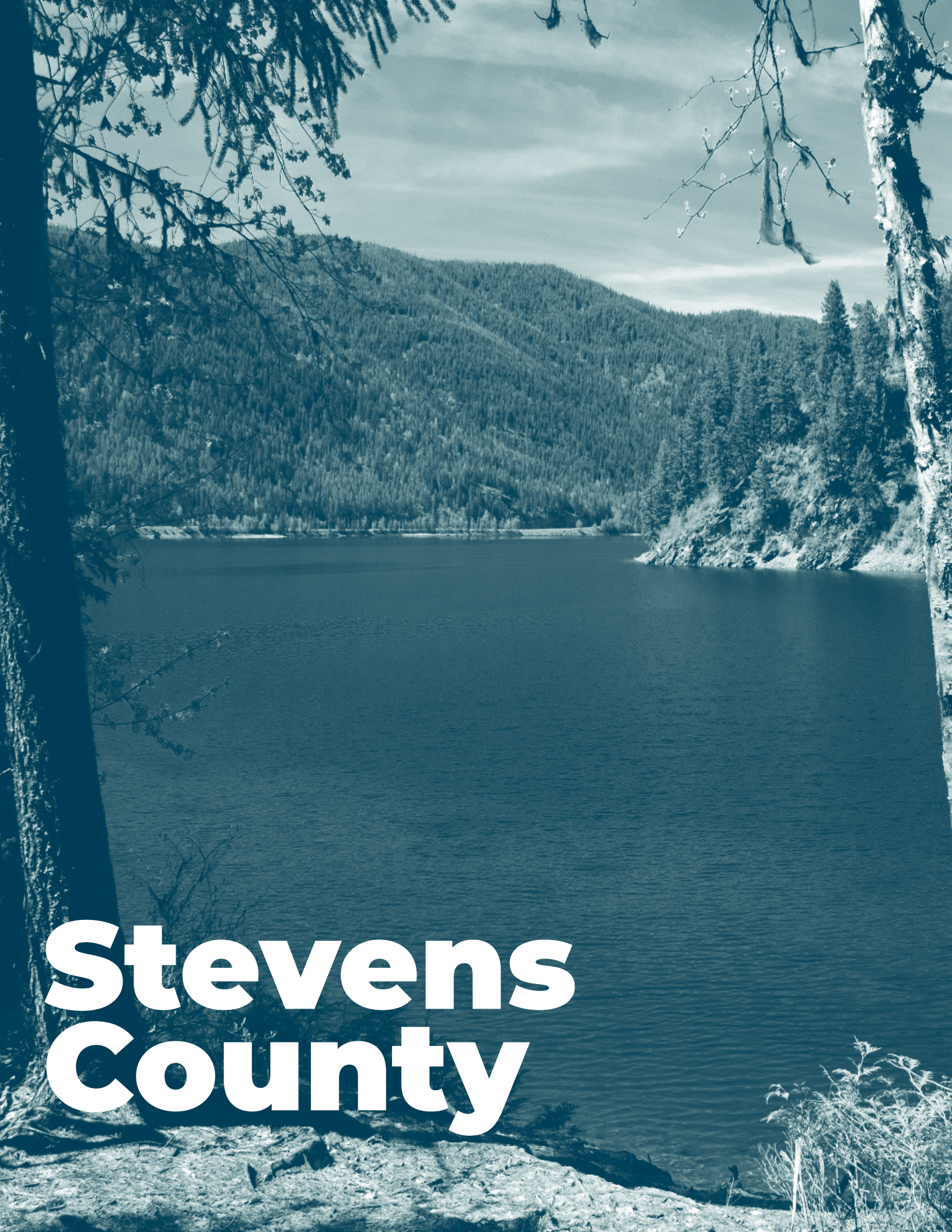


Fig 2 Election results in West Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





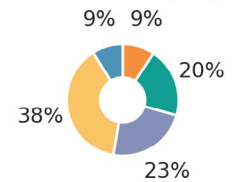

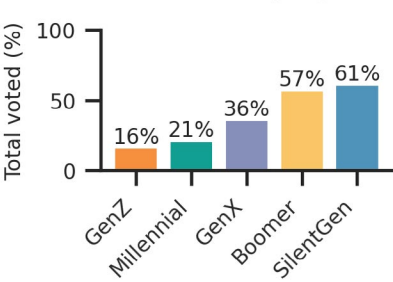

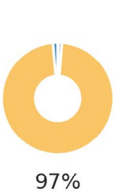
Electorate by Age



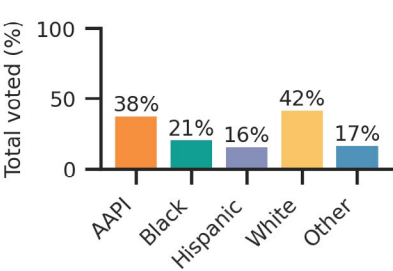

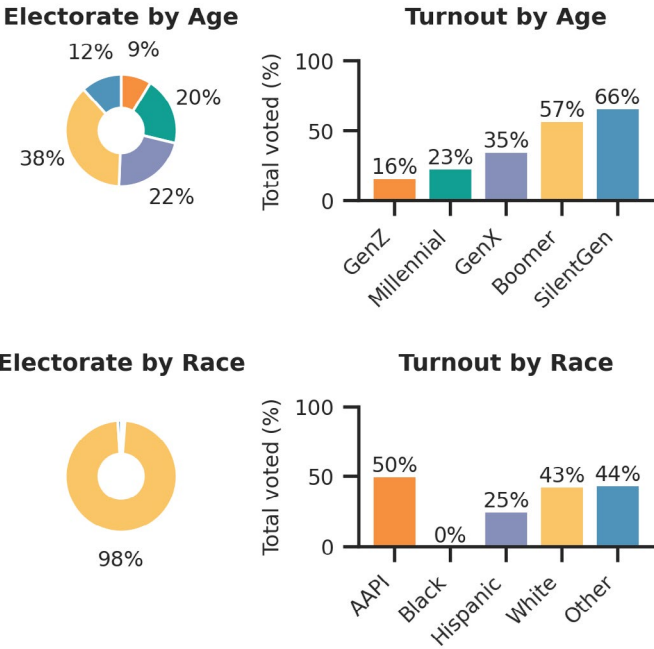


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Chewelah for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

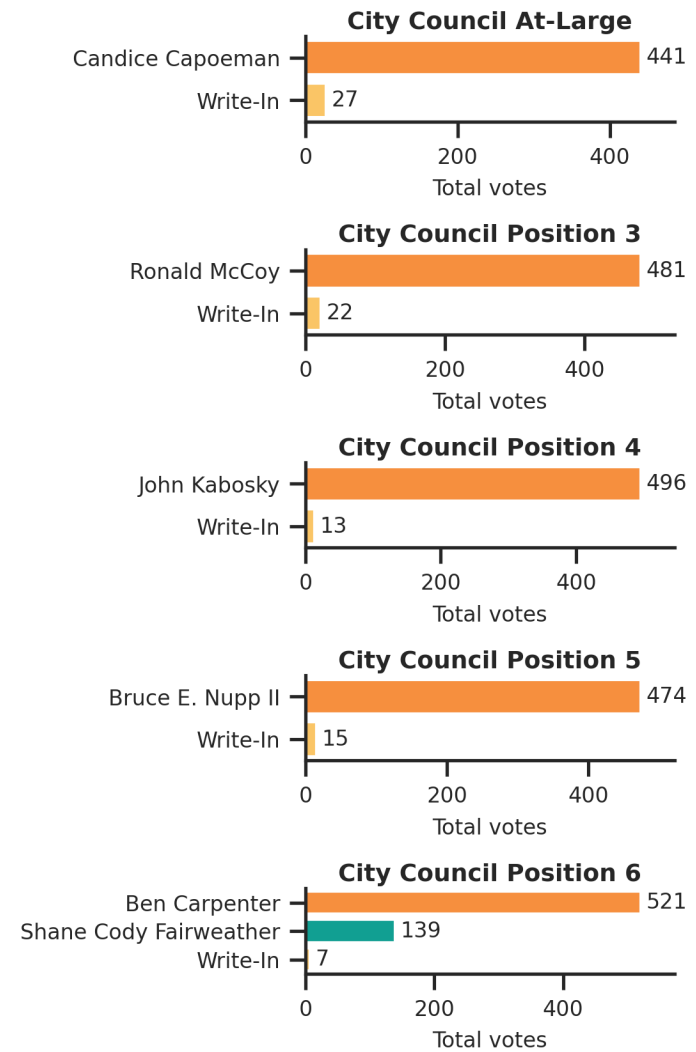


Fig 2 Election results in Chewelah for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

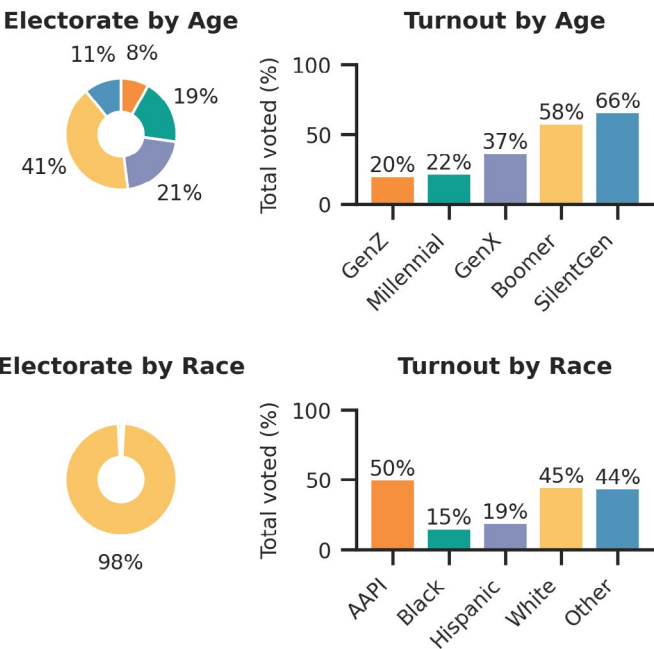


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Chewelah School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

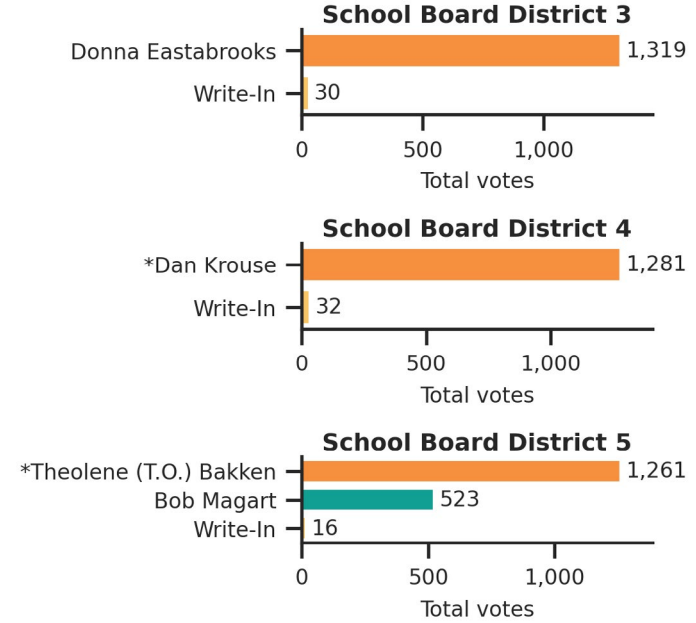


Fig 2 Election results in Chewelah School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

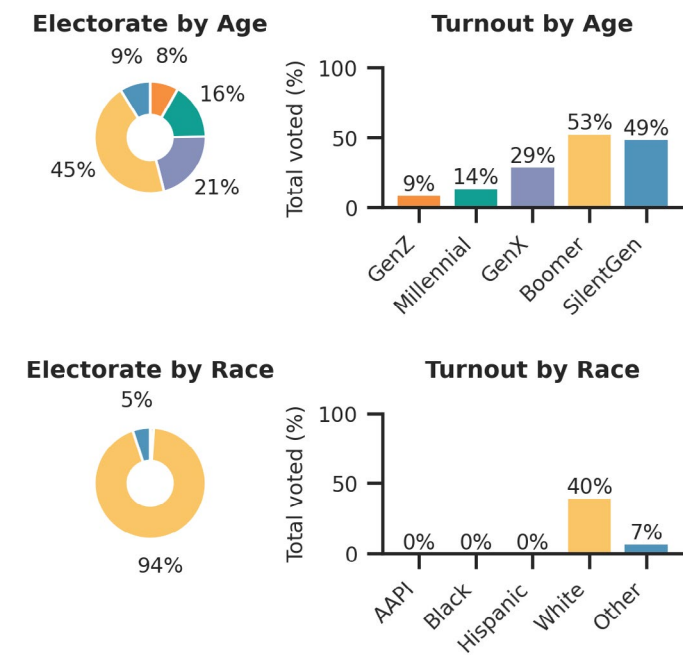


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Columbia School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

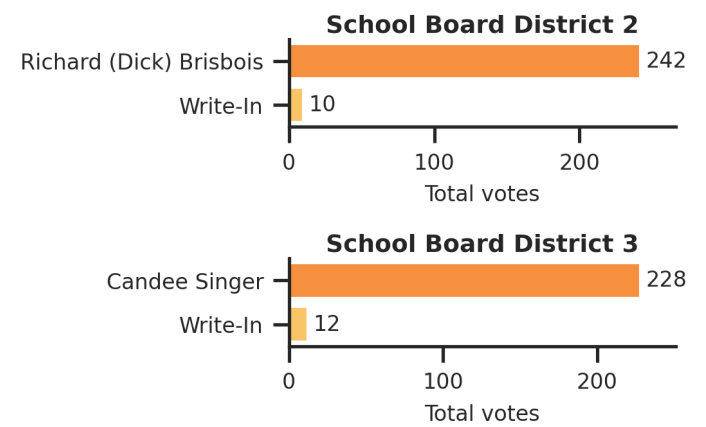


Fig 2 Election results in Columbia School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

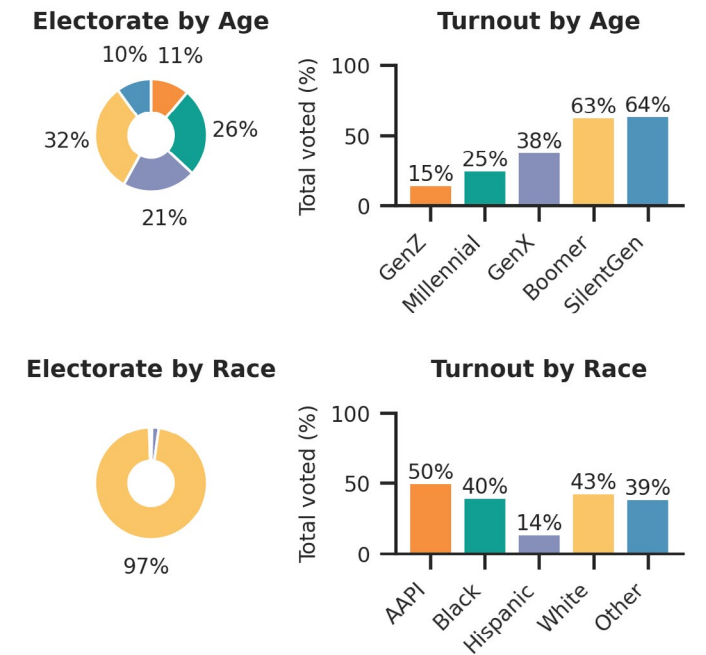


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Colville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

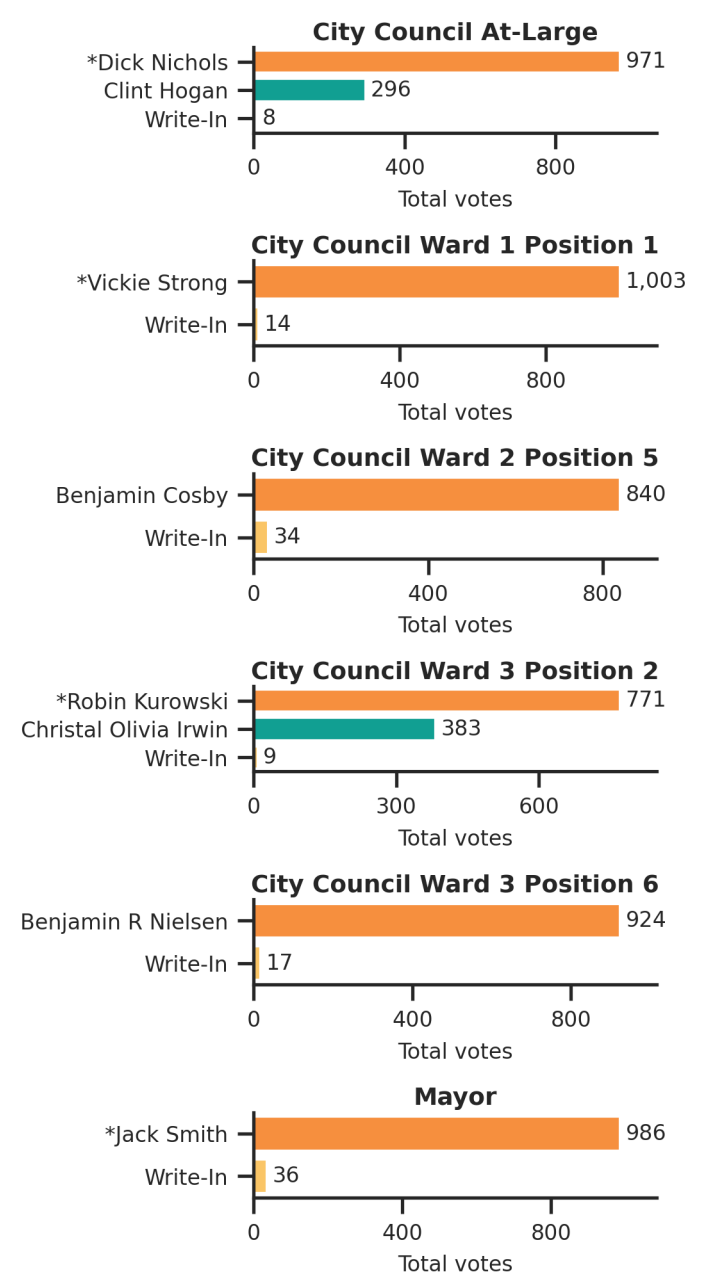


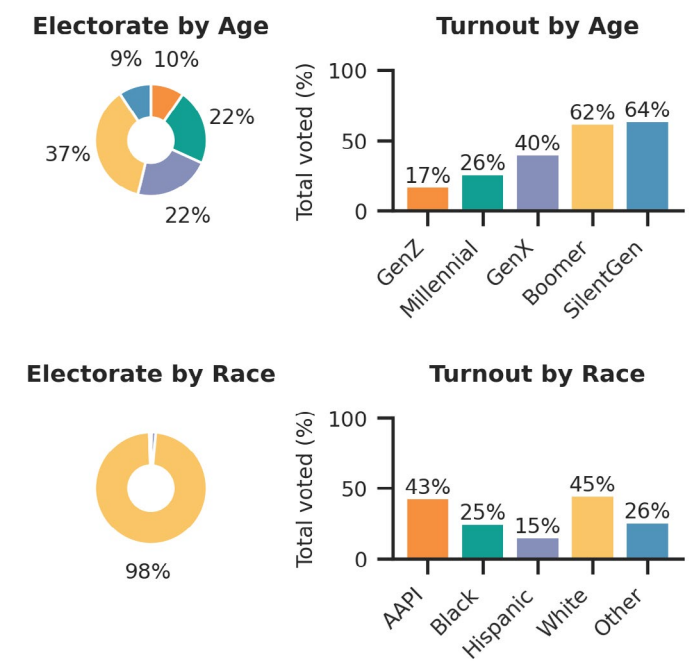
Fig 2 Election results in Colville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

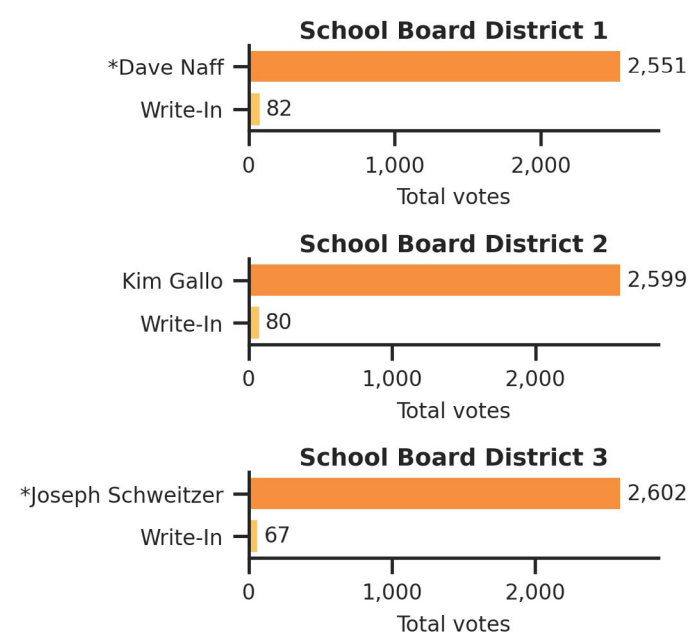

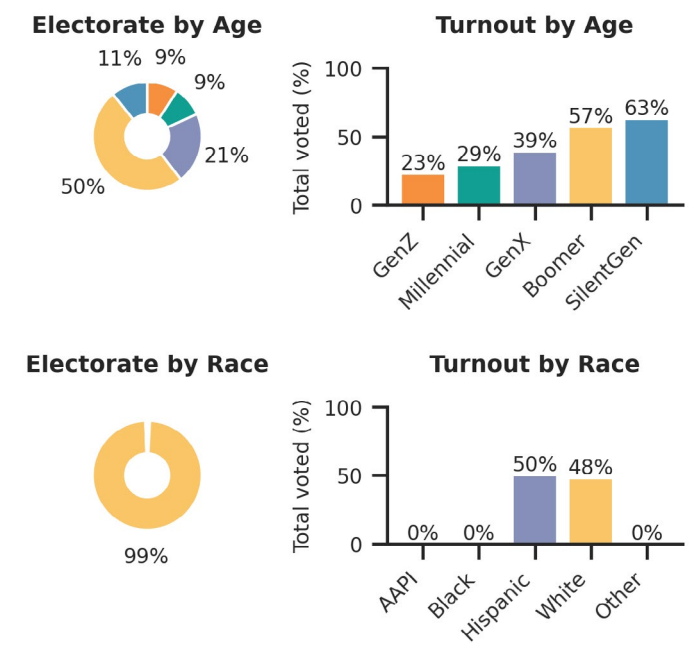


**Fig 2** Election results in Colville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

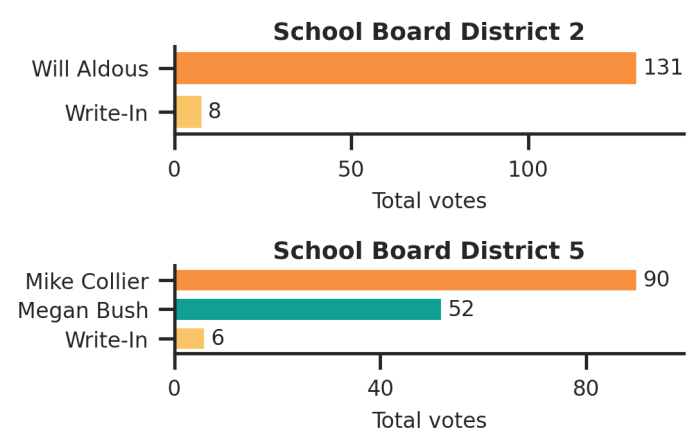

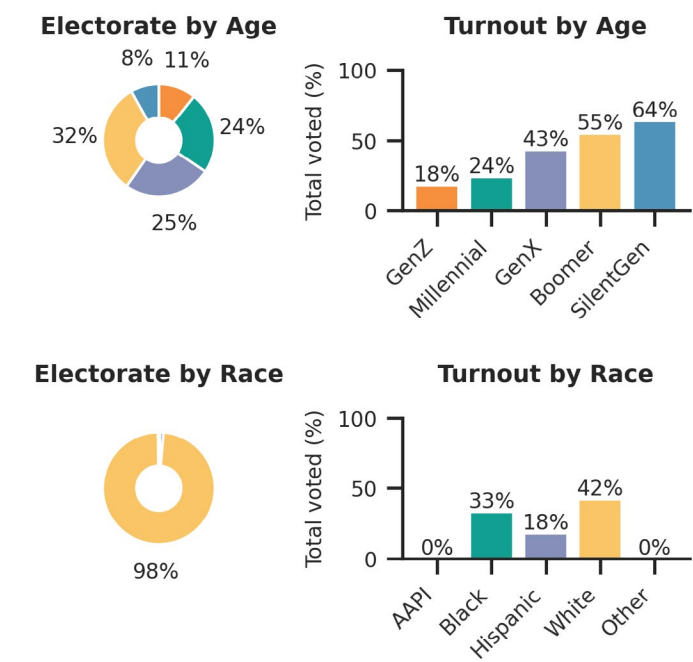


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kettle Falls for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

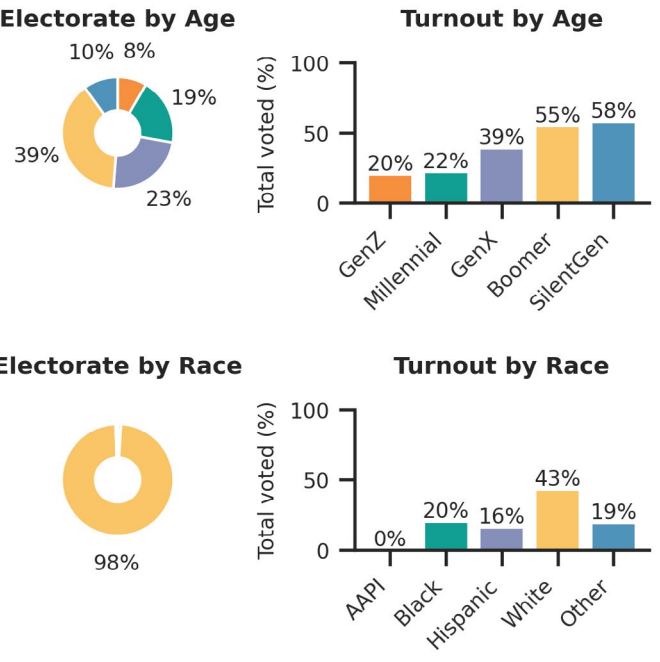


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kettle Falls School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

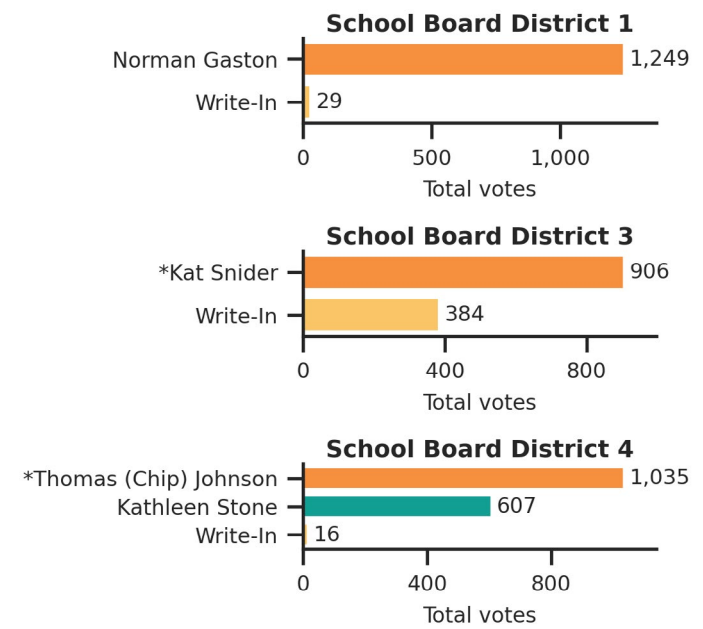


Fig 2 Election results in Kettle Falls School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

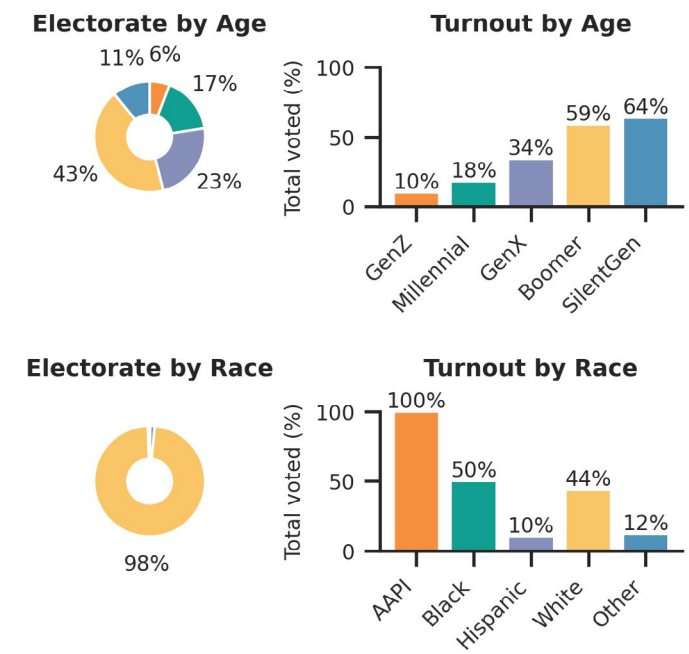


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Loon Lake School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

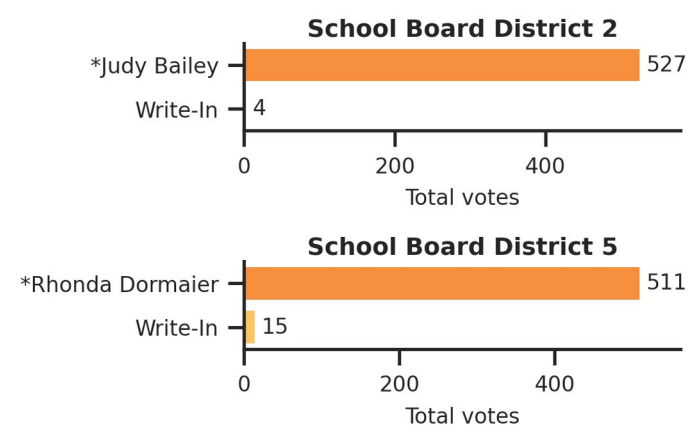


Fig 2 Election results in Loon Lake School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

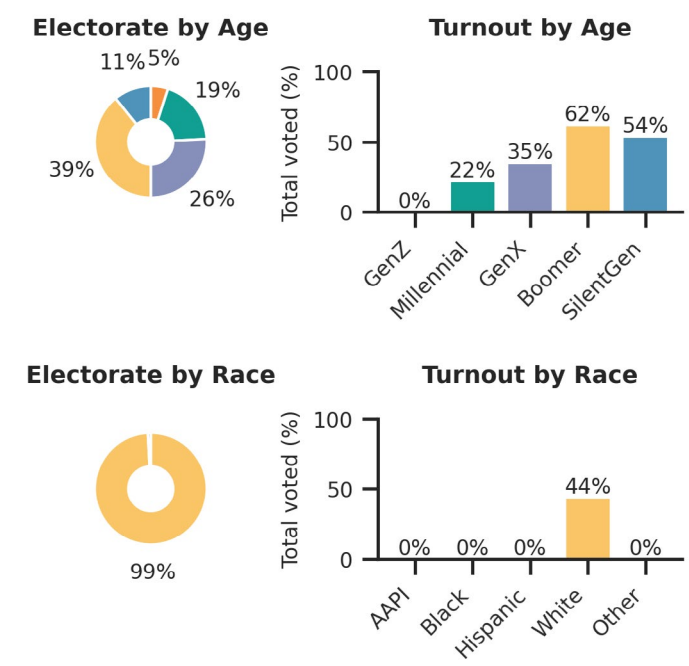


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Marcus for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

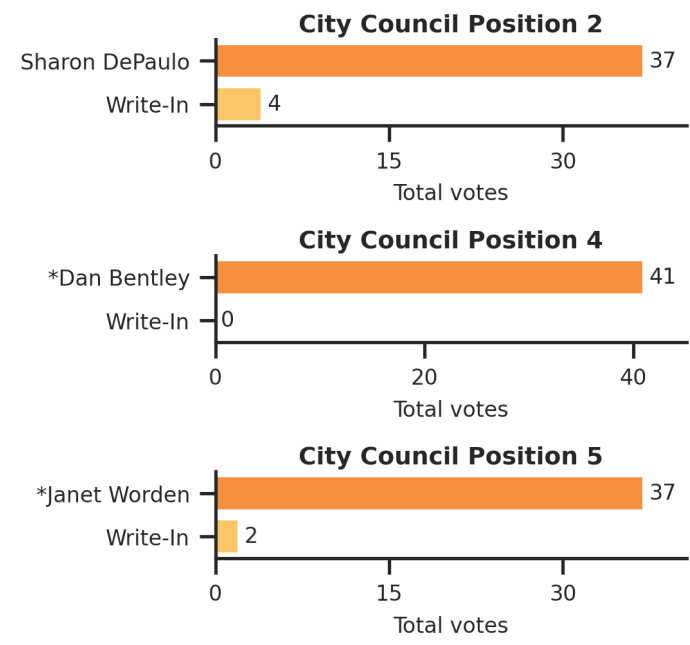
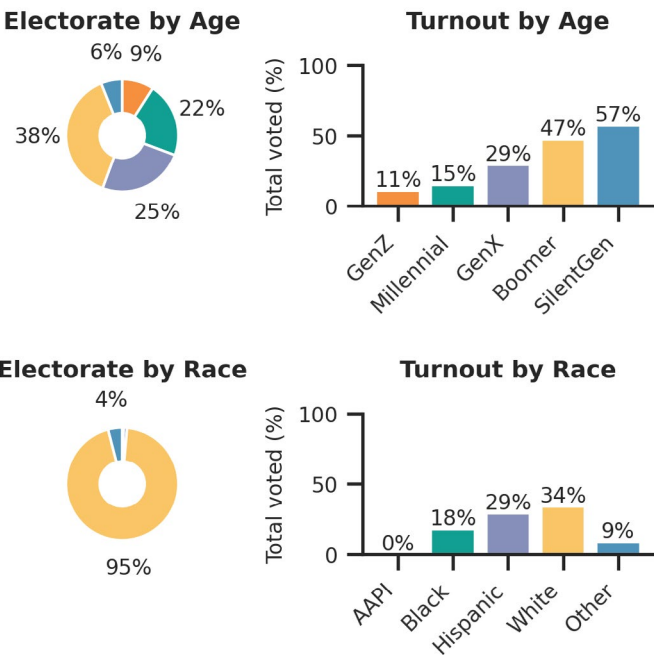


Fig 2 Election results in Marcus for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

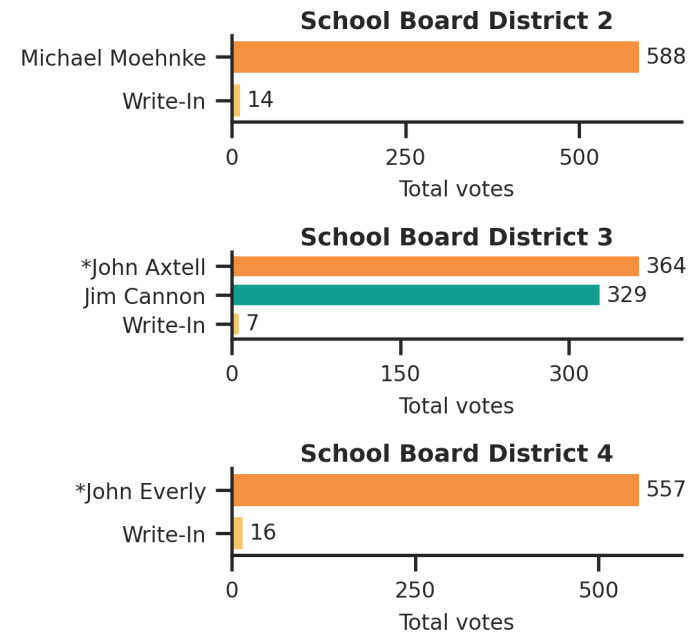

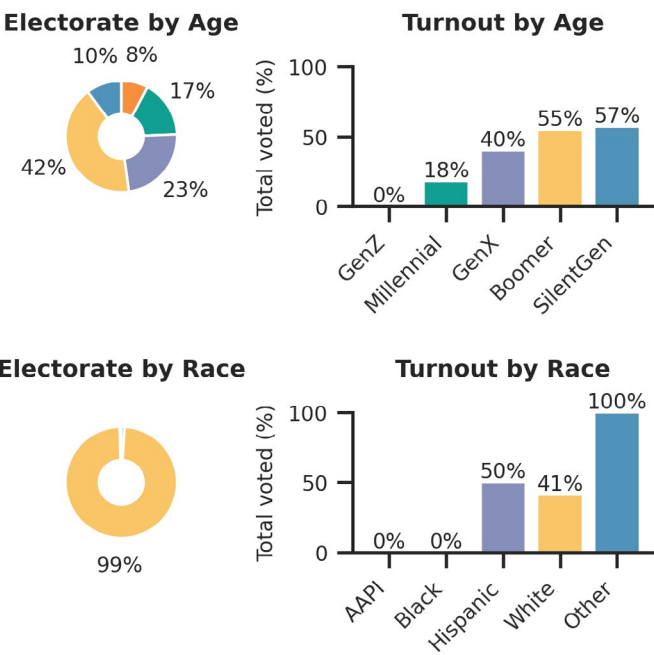

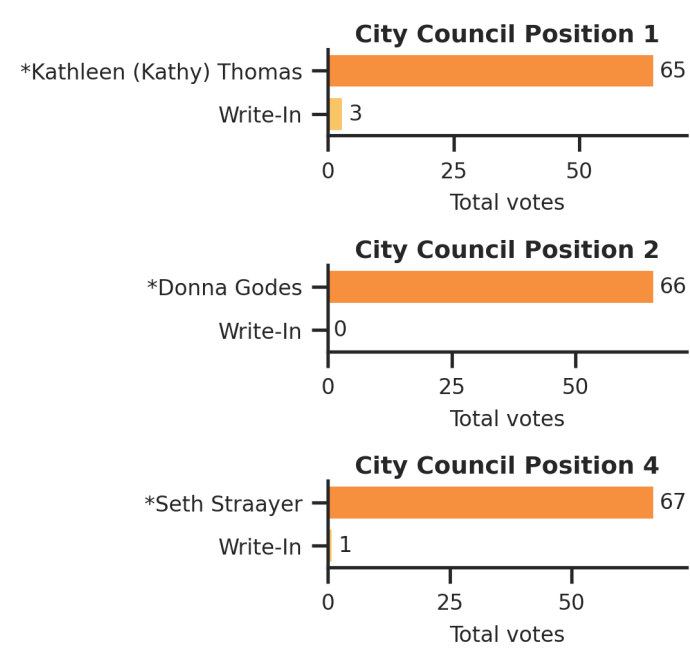

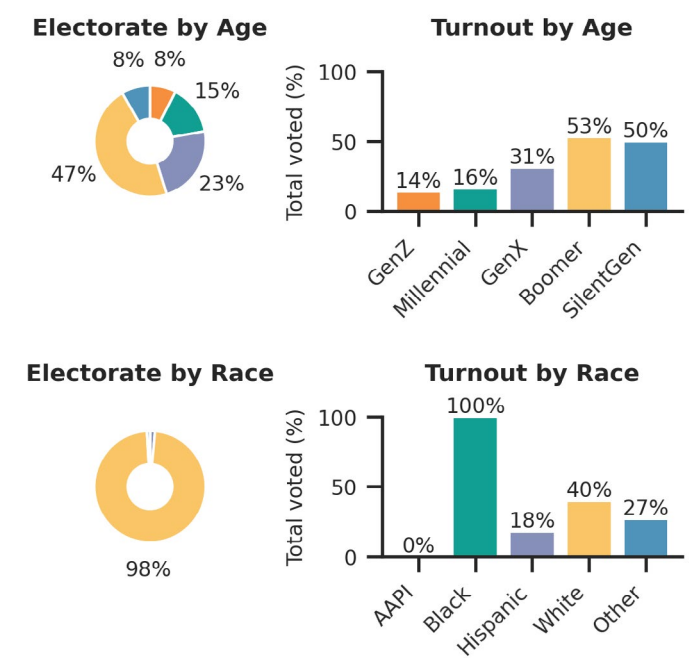
**Fig 2** Election results in Northport for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

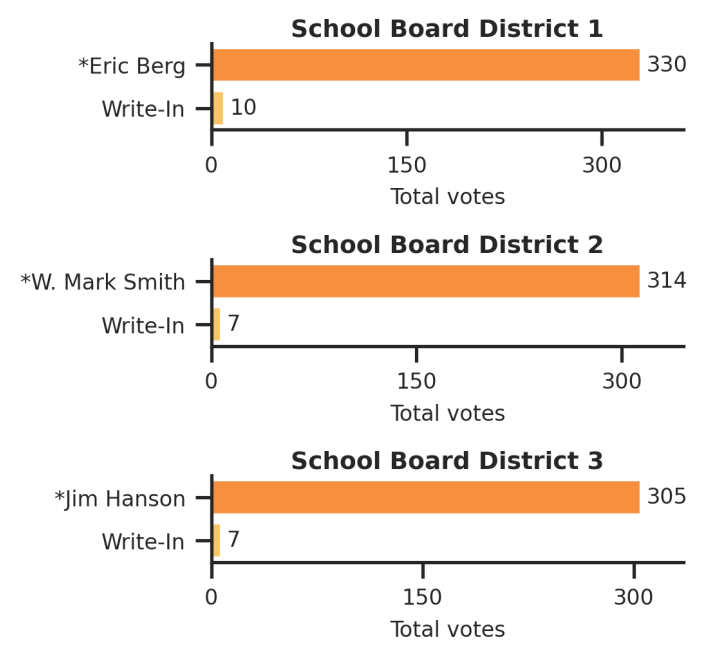

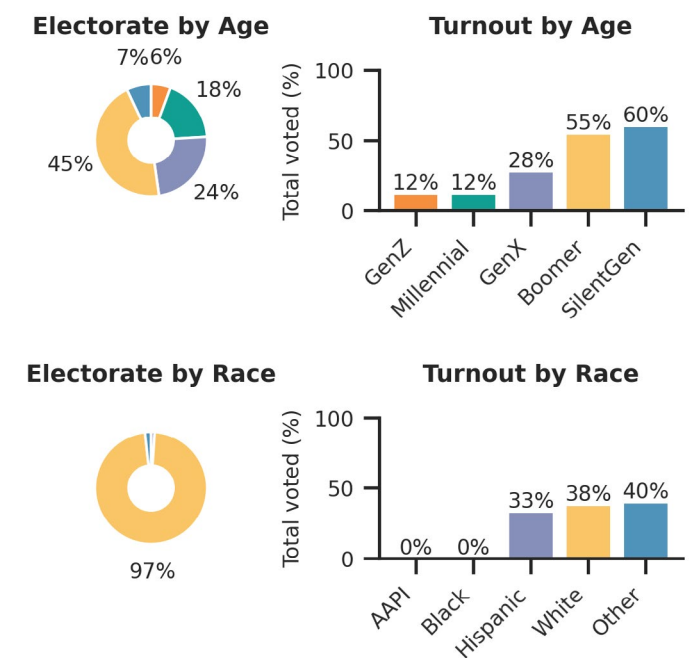


**Fig 2** Election results in Northport School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

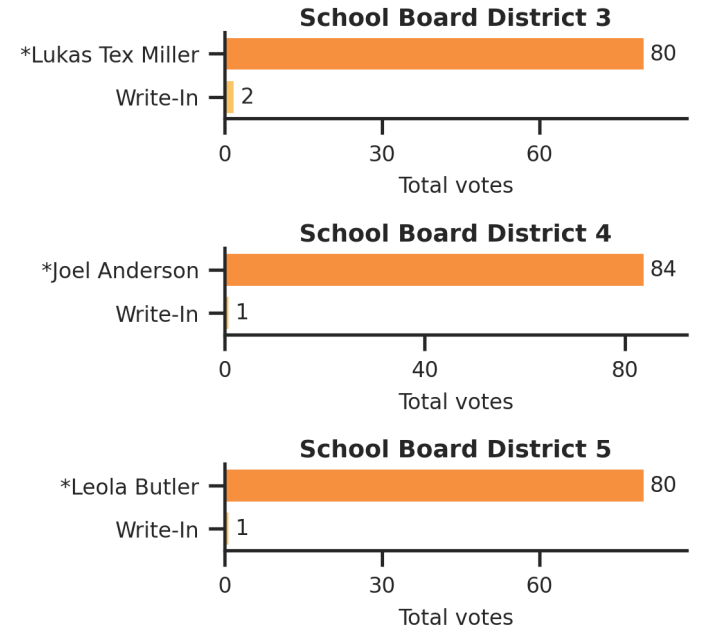

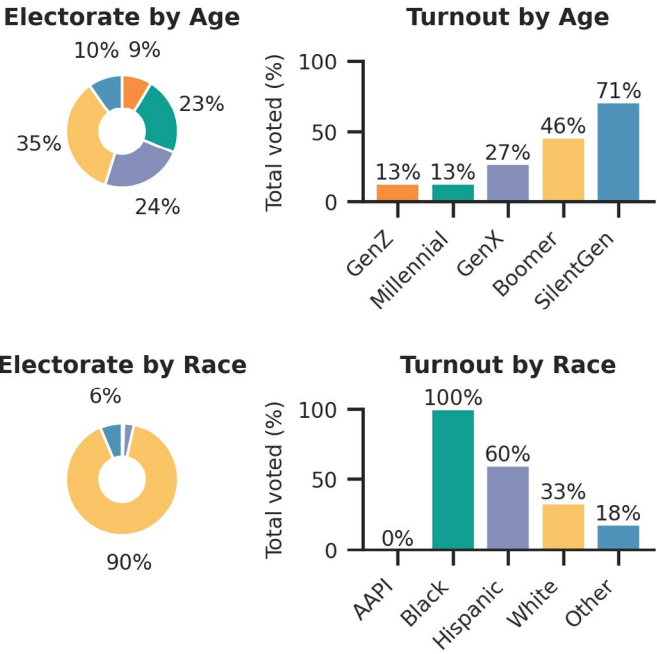


**Fig 2** Election results in Onion Creek School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

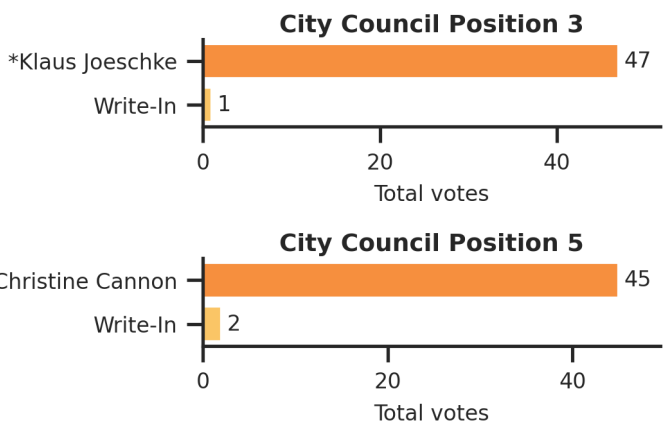

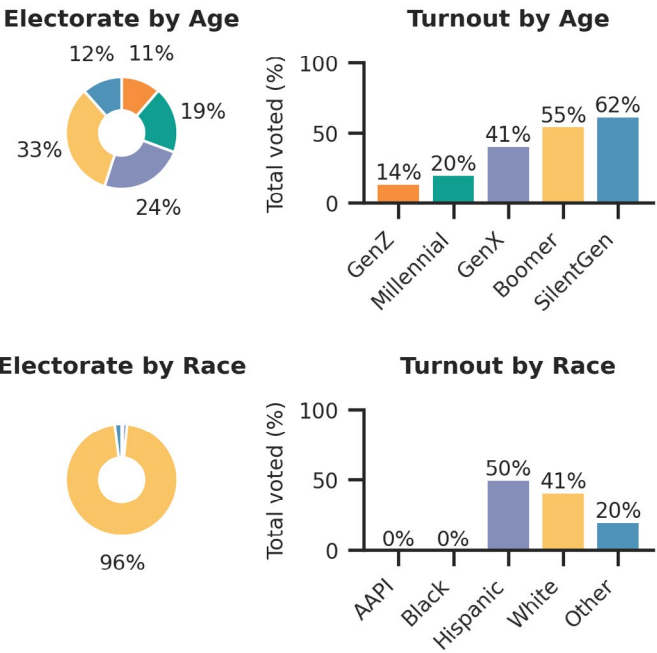


**Fig 2** Election results in Springdale for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

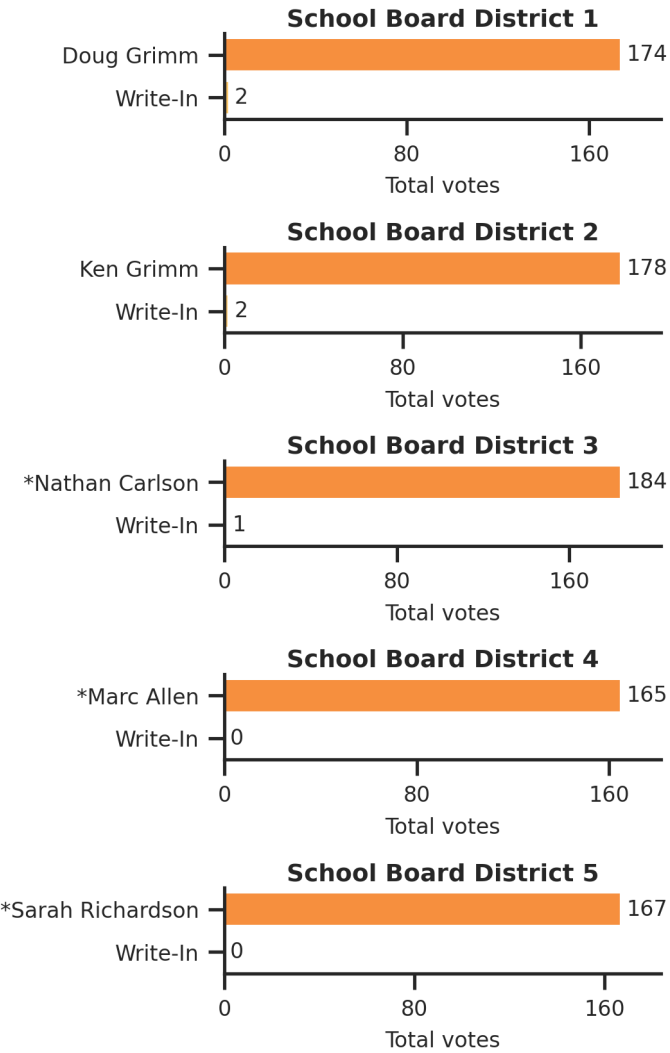


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Summit Valley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

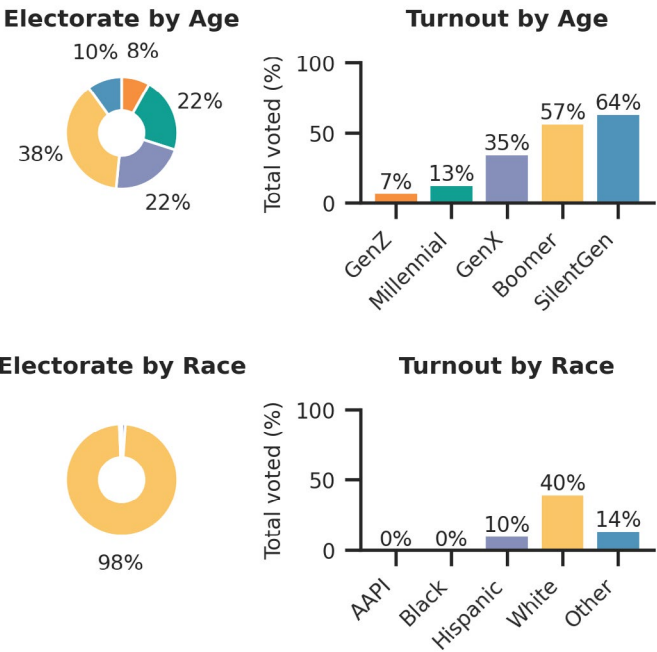
**Fig 2** Election results in Summit Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

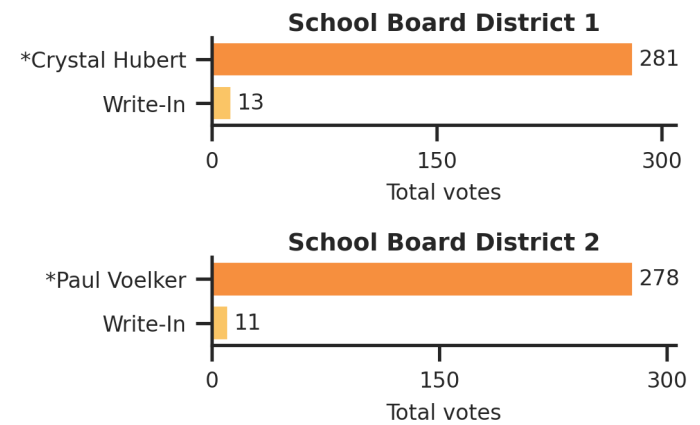

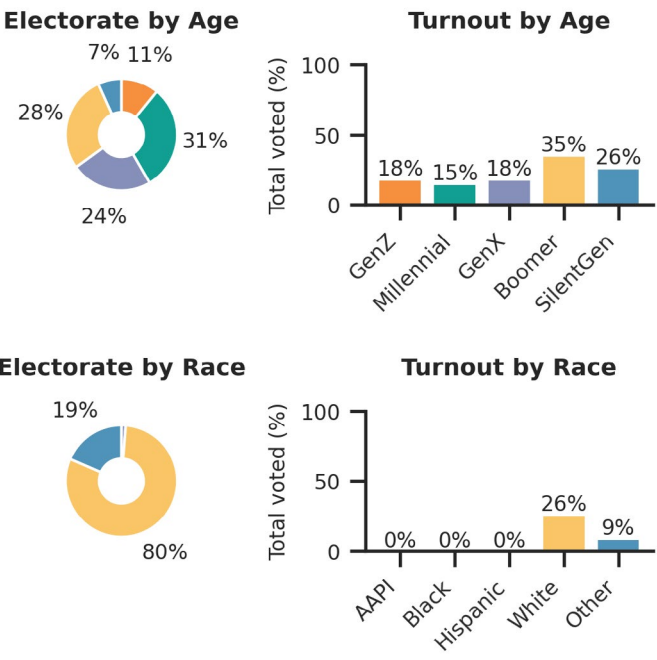


**Fig 2** Election results in Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

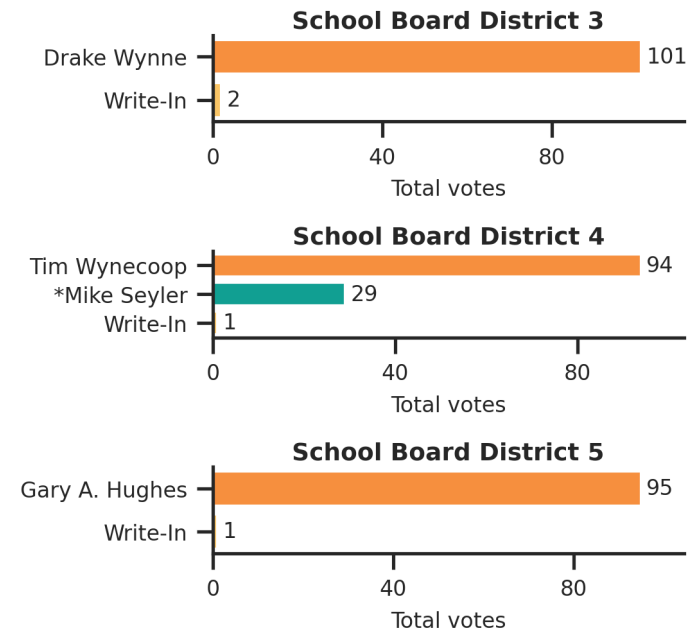

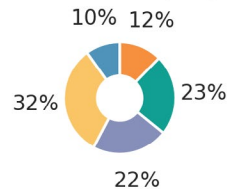


**Fig 2** Election results in Wellpinit School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

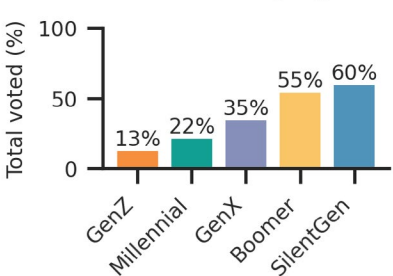

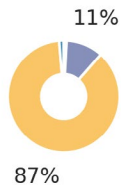
Electorate by Age

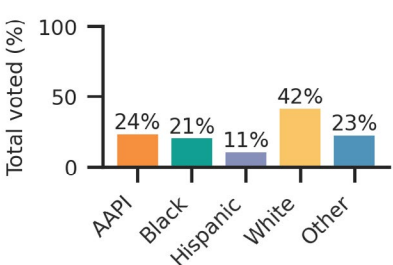


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Walla Walla County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

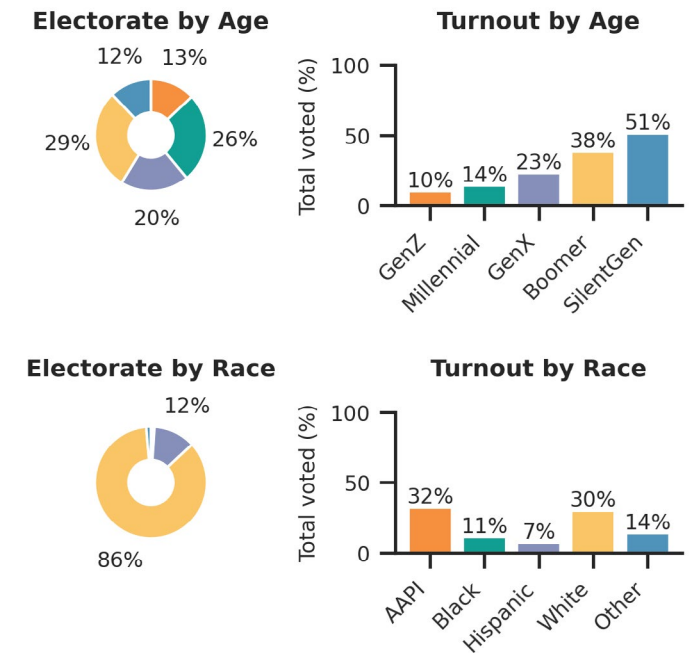


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in College Place for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

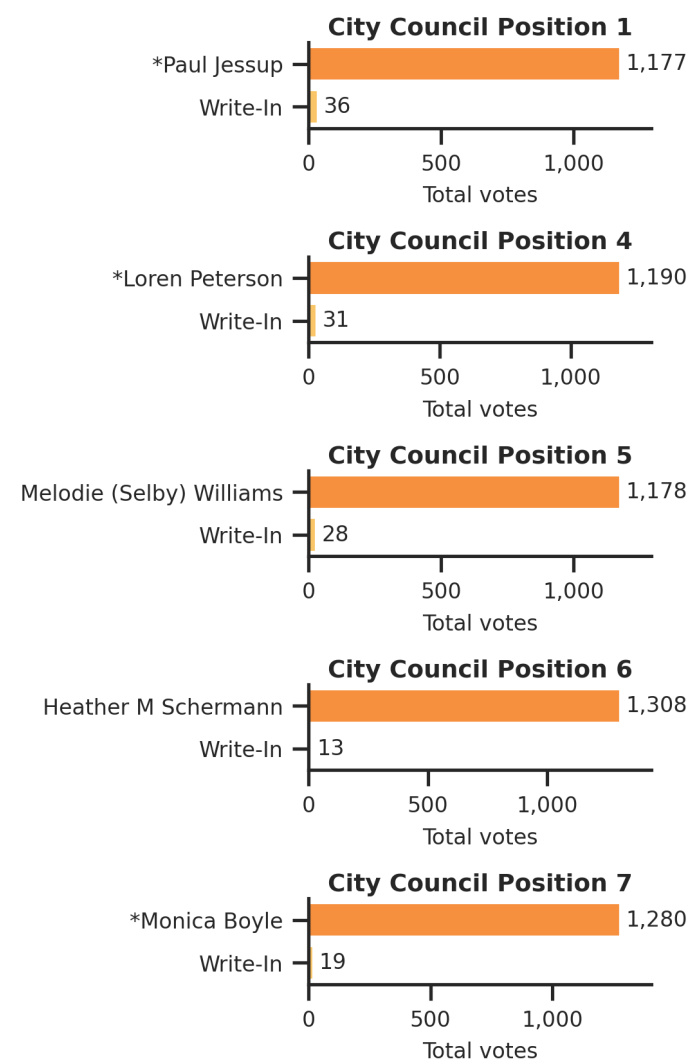


Fig 2 Election results in College Place for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

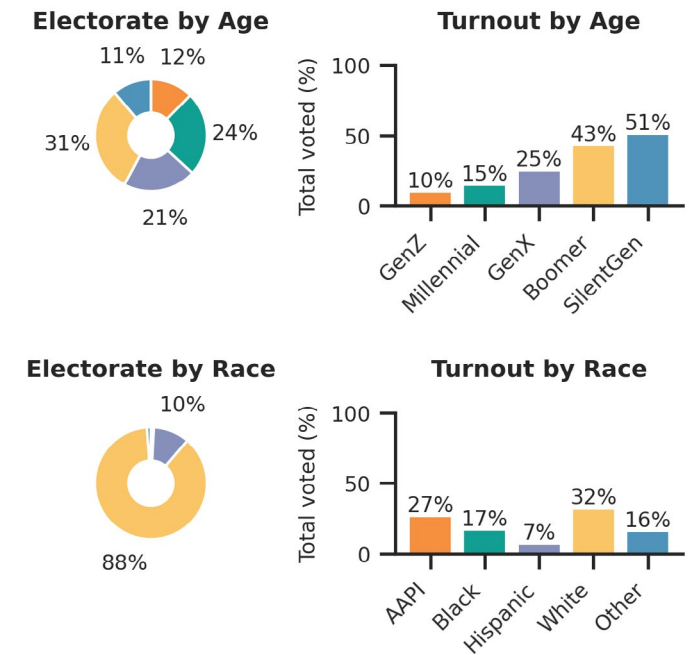


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in College Place School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

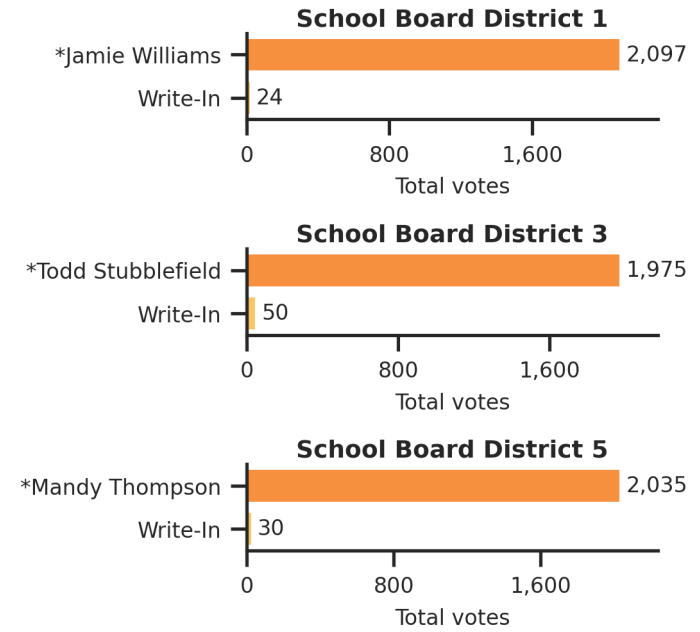
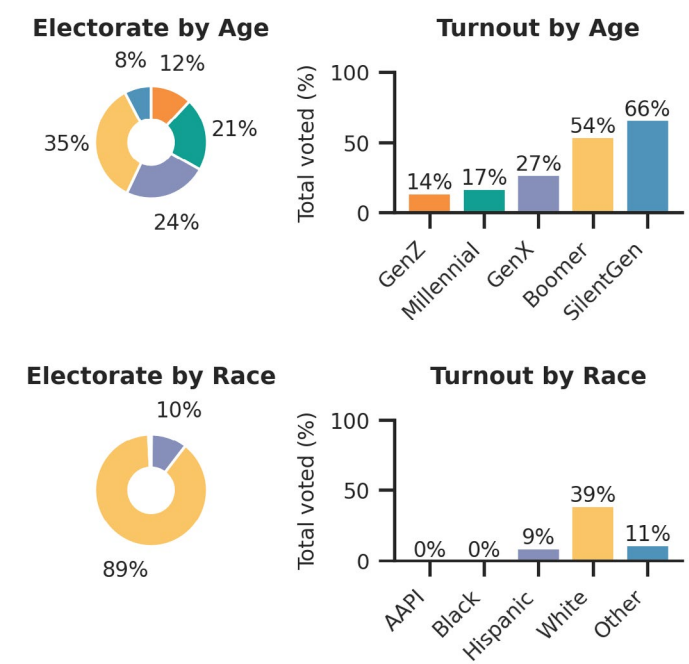


Fig 2 Election results in College Place School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

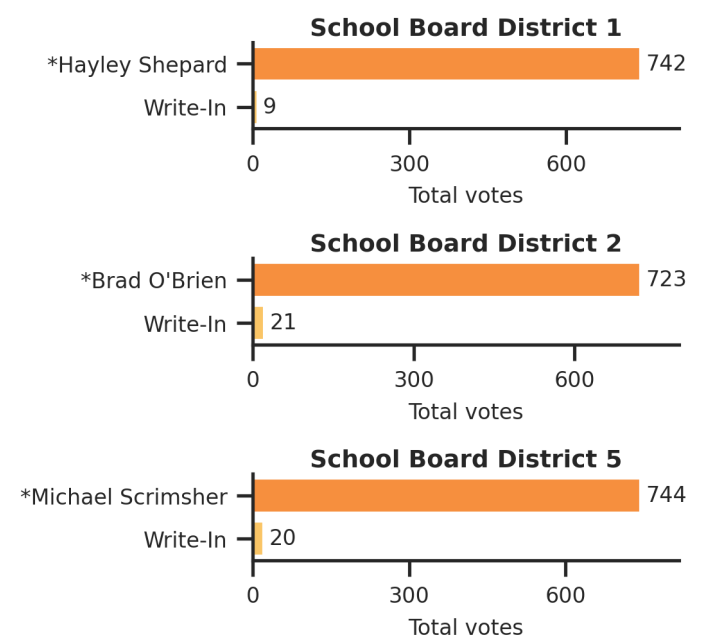

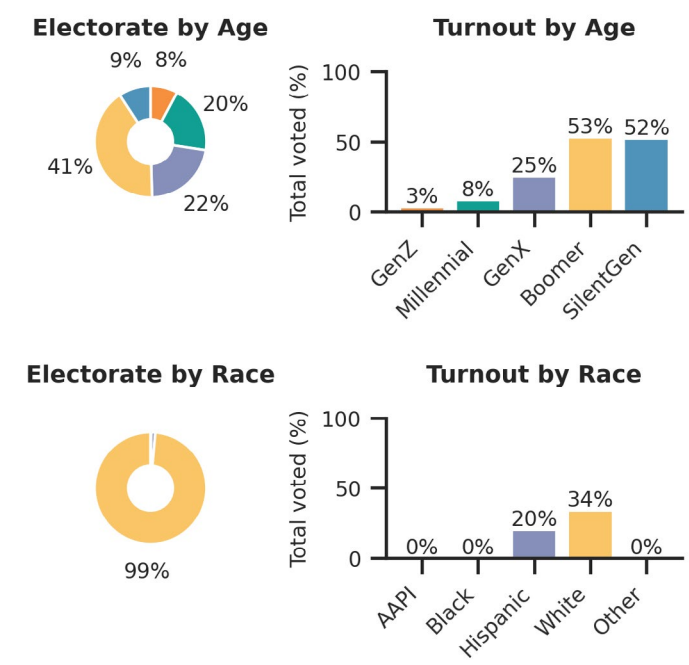


**Fig 2** Election results in Columbia School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

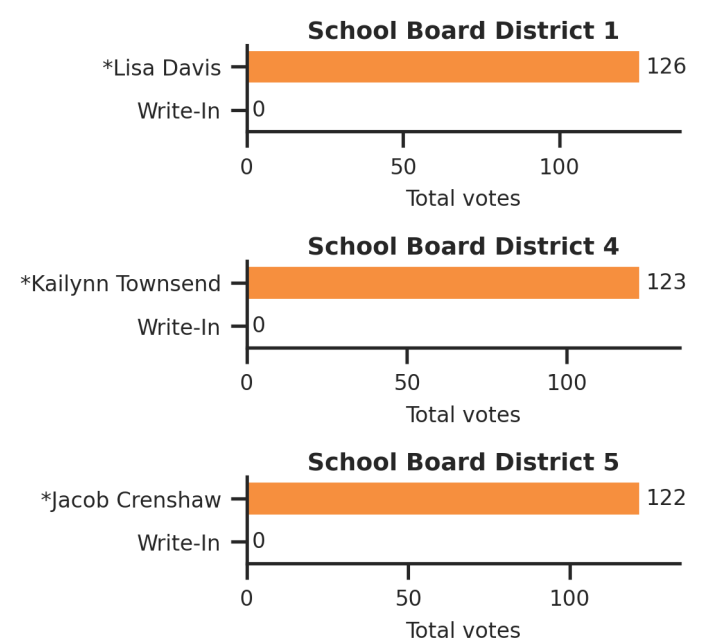

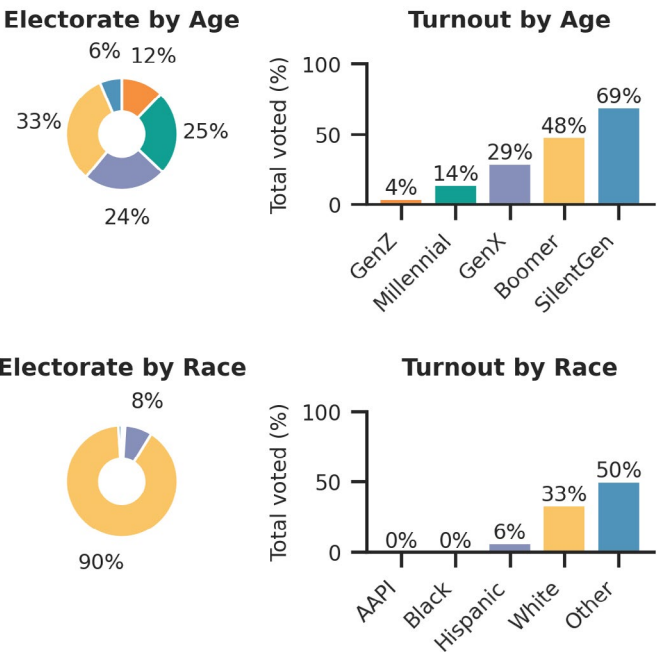


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Prescott for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

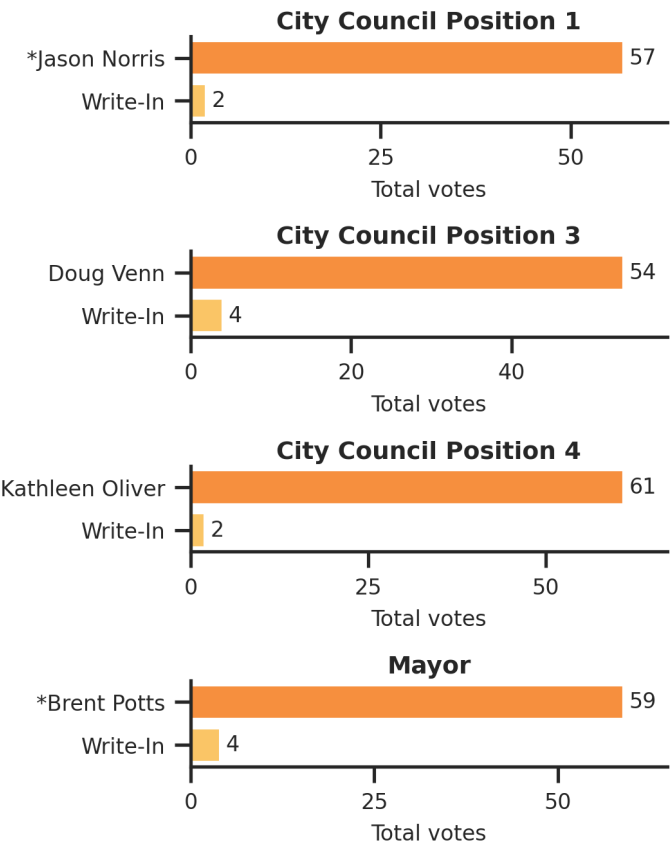


Fig 2 Election results in Prescott for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

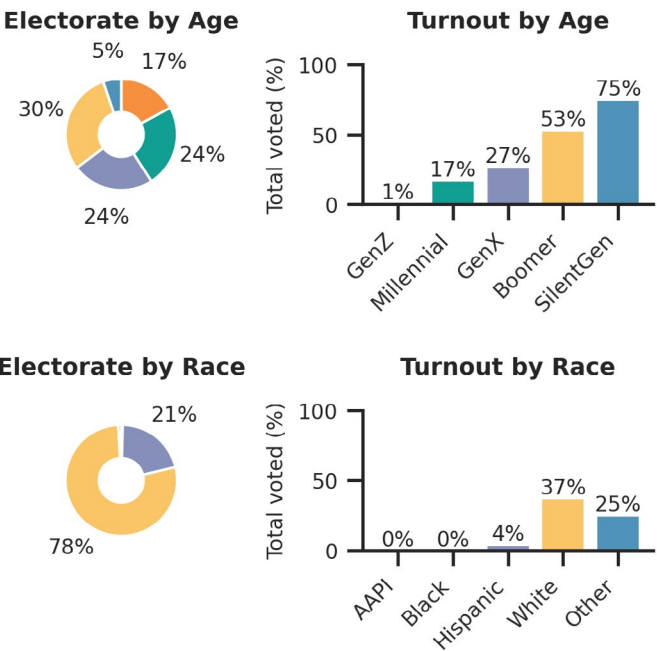


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Prescott School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

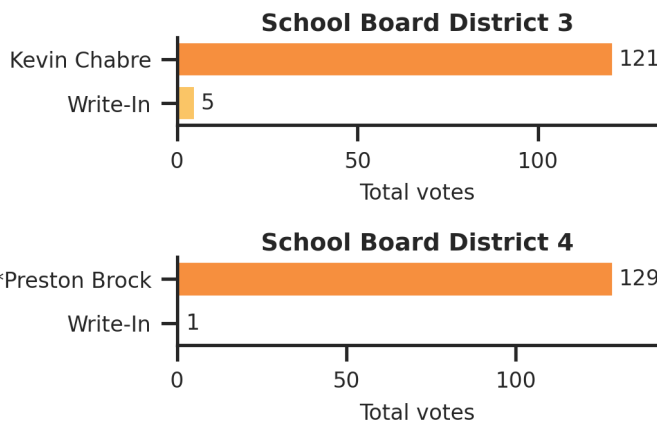
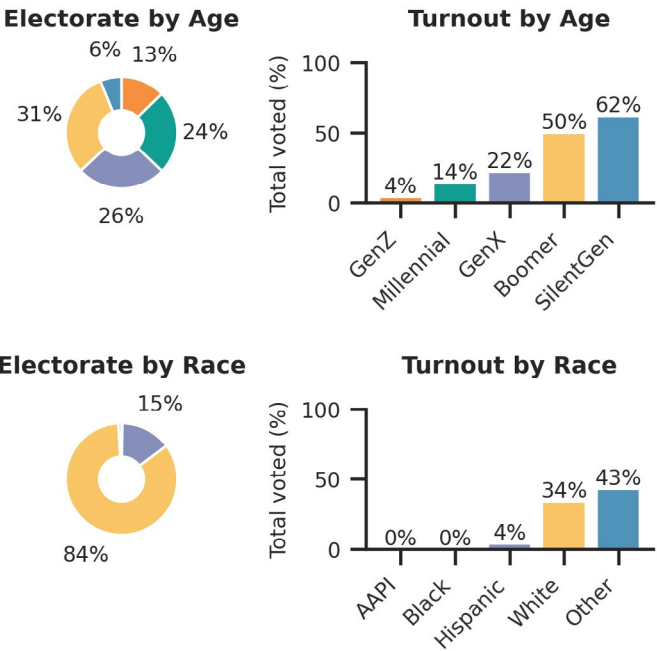


Fig 2 Election results in Prescott School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

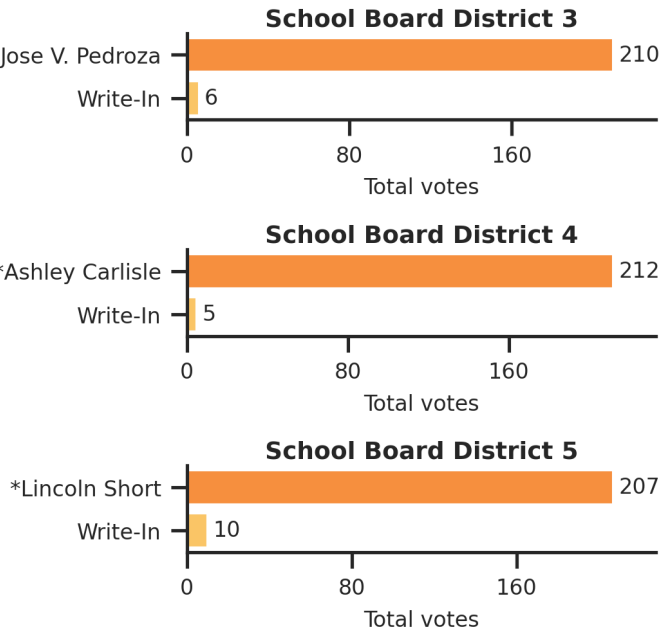

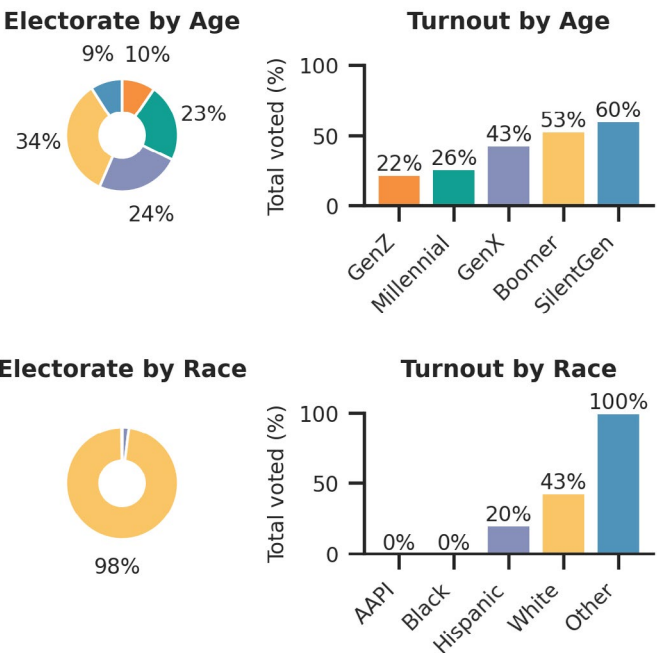

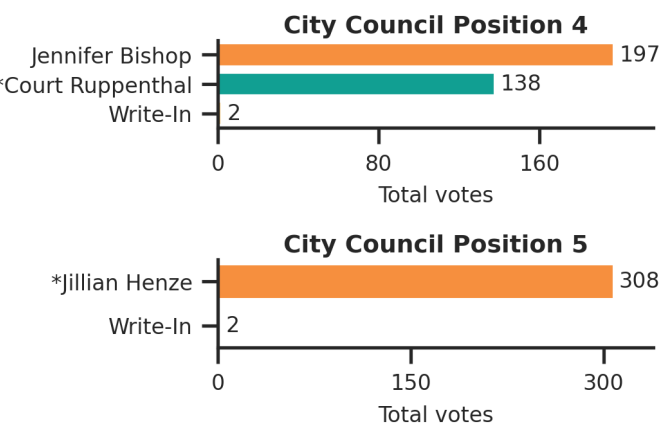

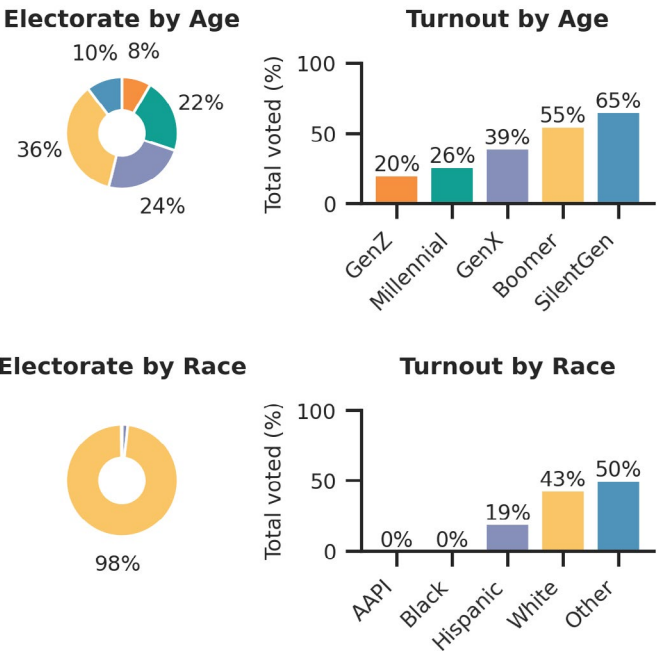


**Fig 2** Election results in Waitsburg for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

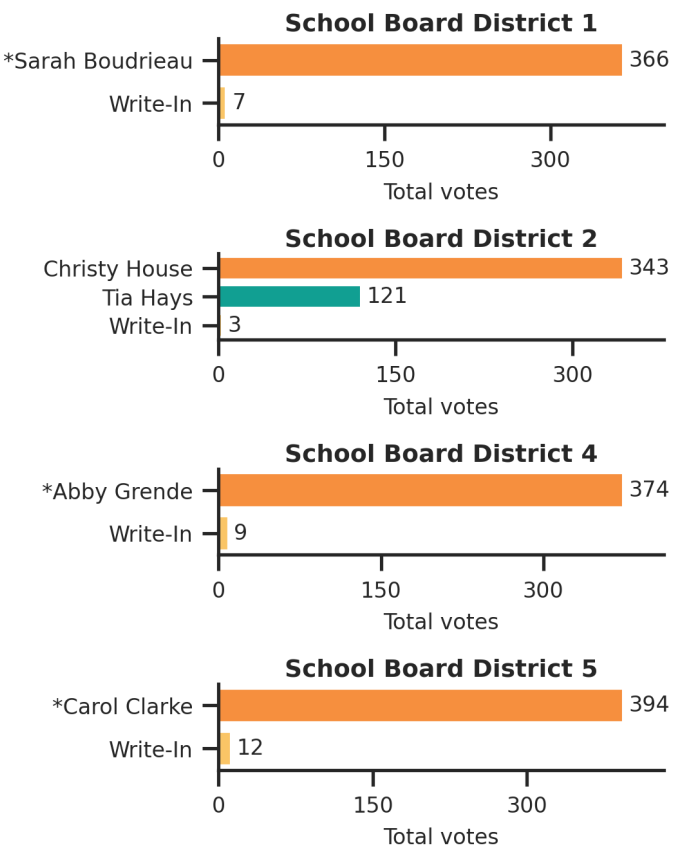

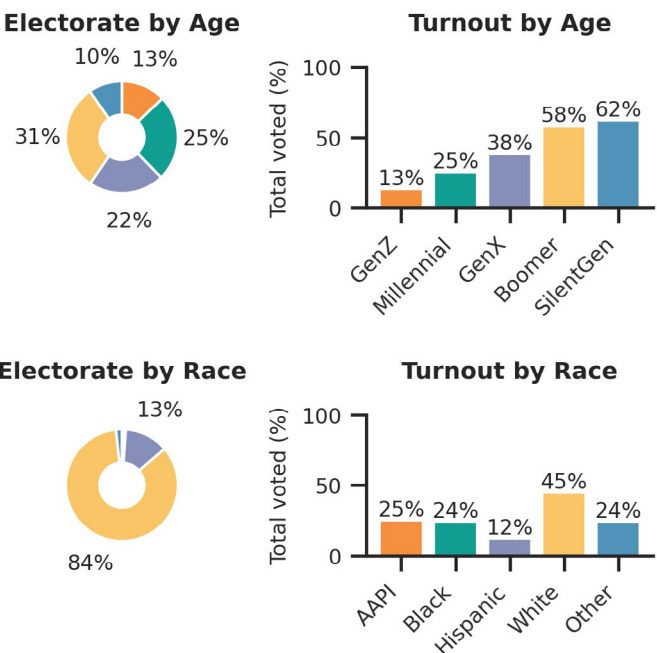

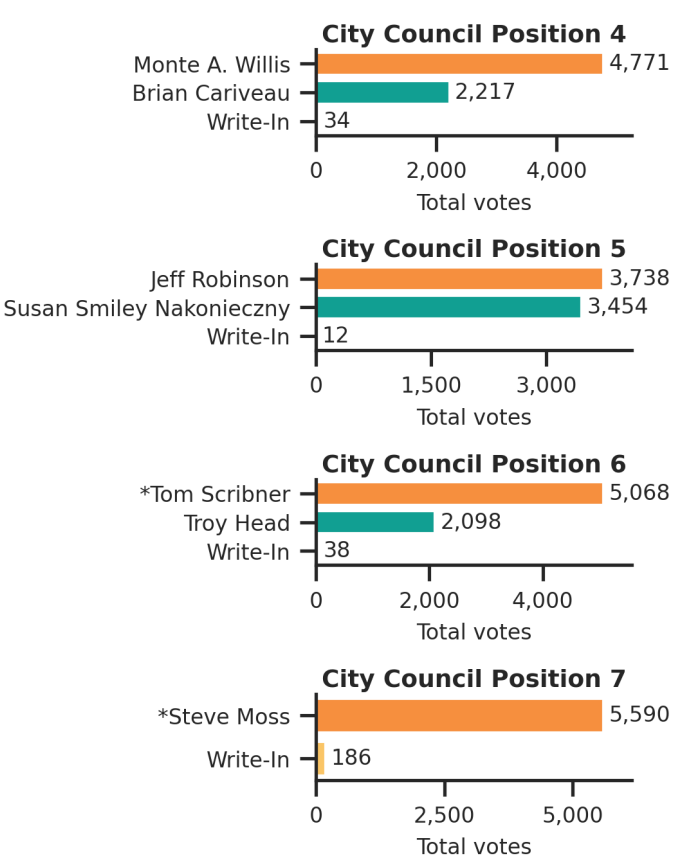

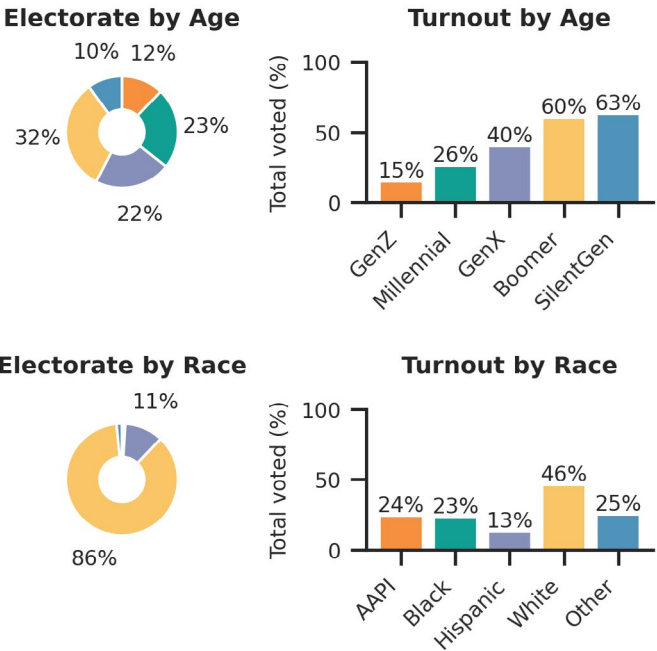


**Fig 2** Election results in Walla Walla for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

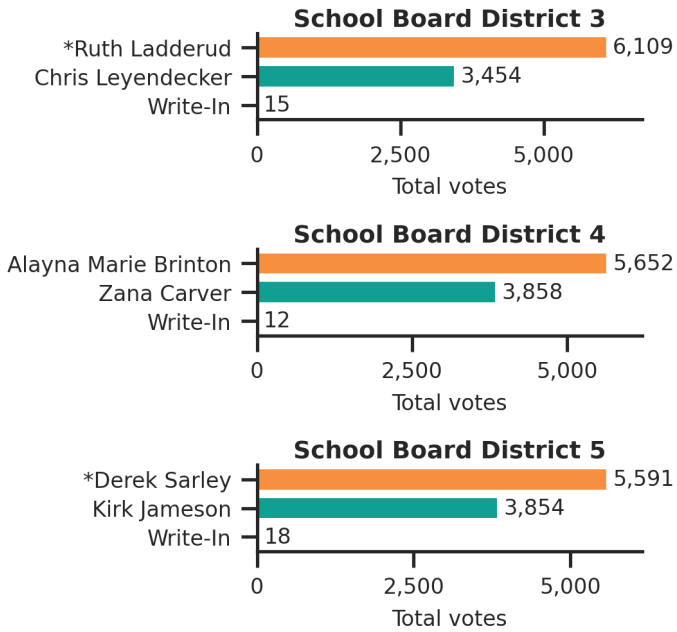

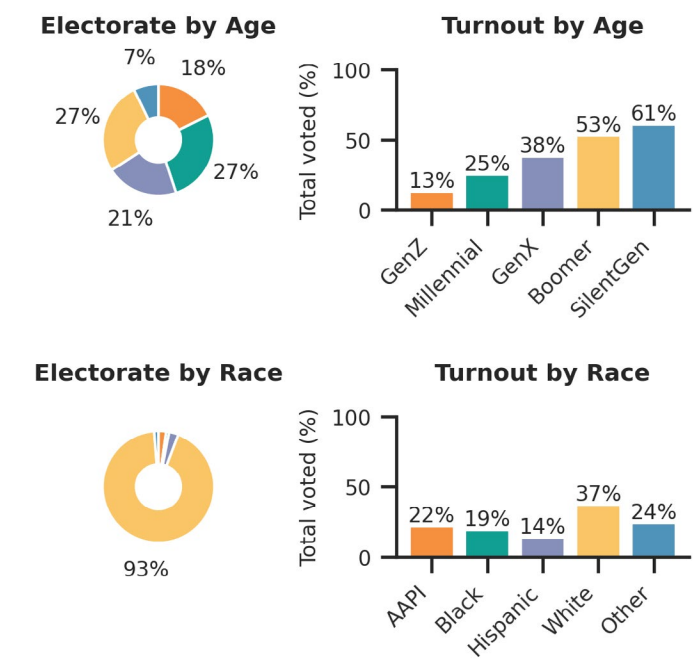


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Whitman County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

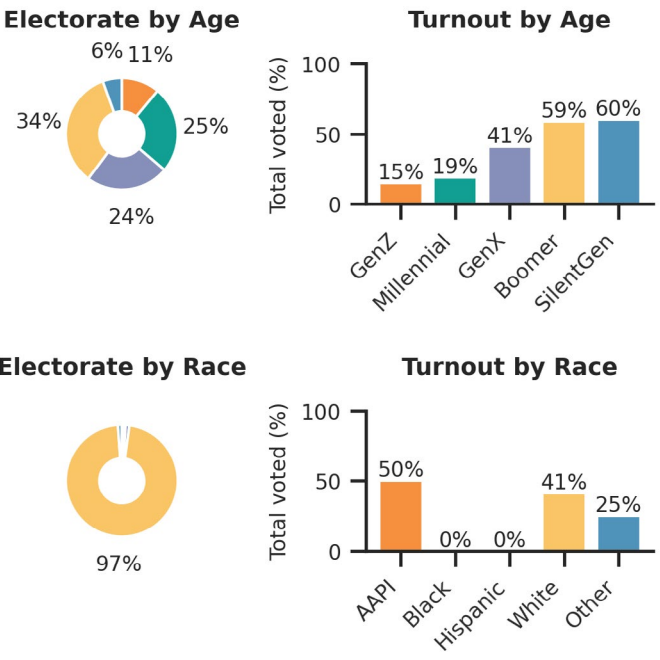


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Albion for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

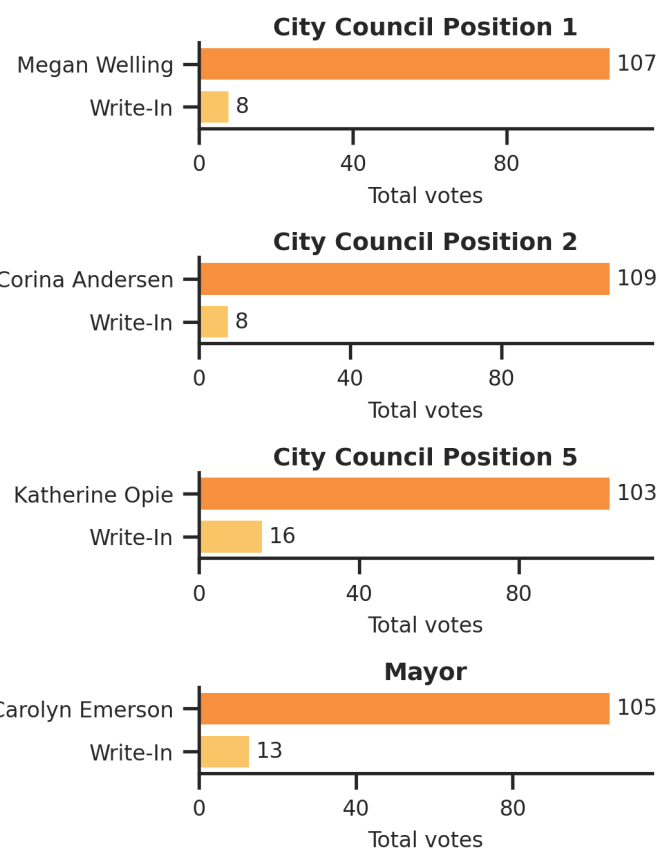


Fig 2 Election results in Albion for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

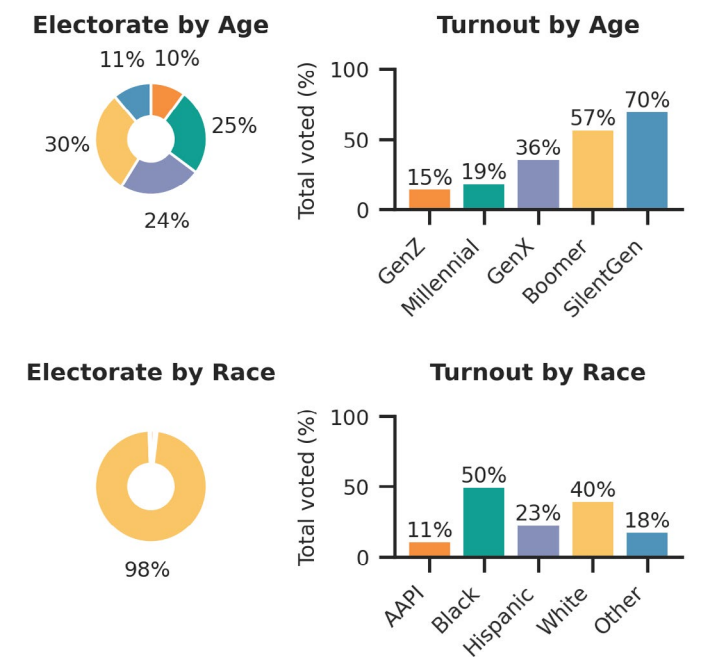


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Colfax for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

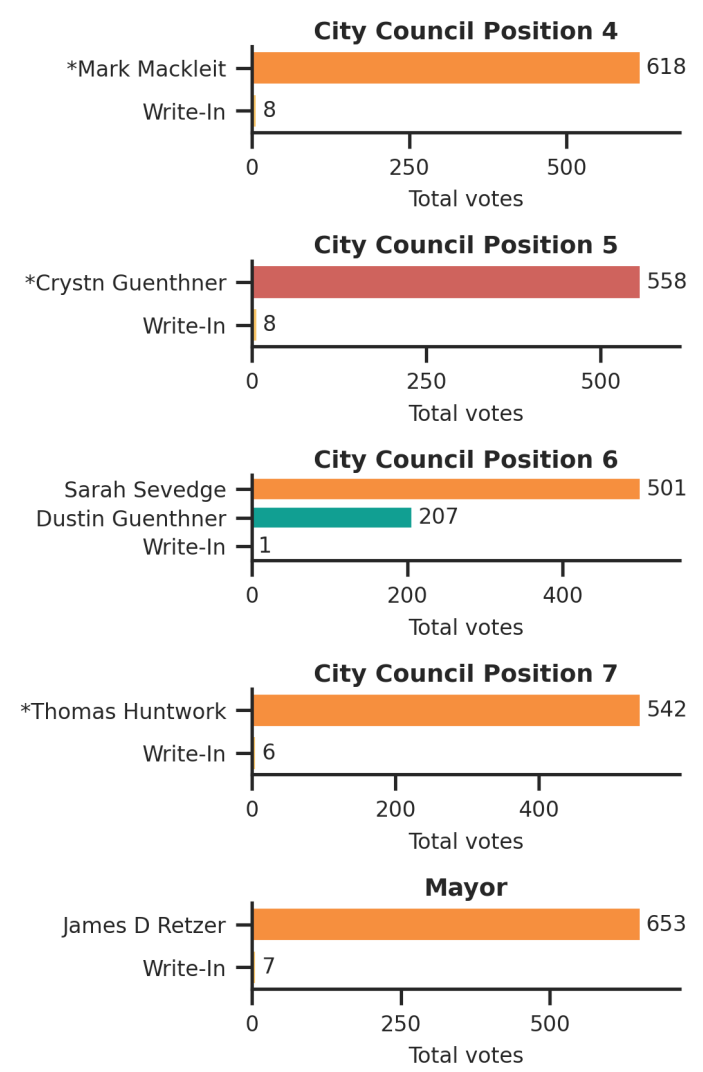


Fig 2 Election results in Colfax for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

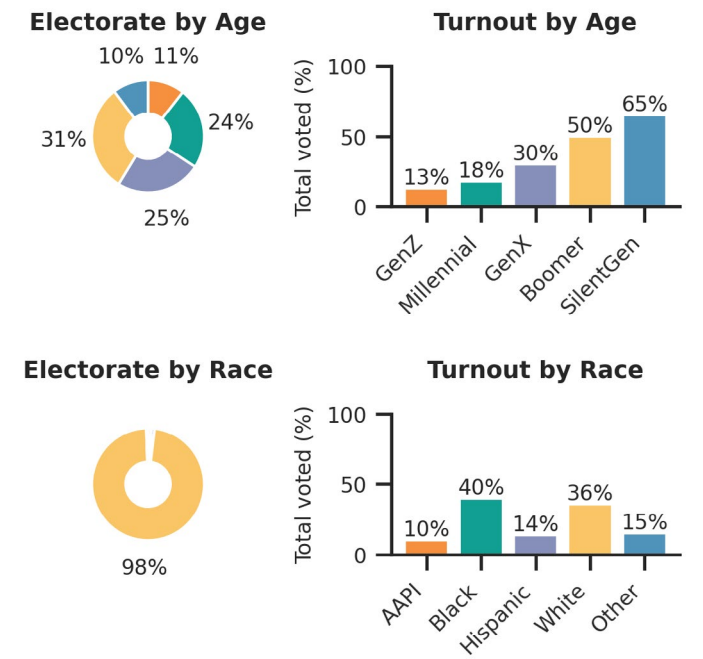


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Colfax School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

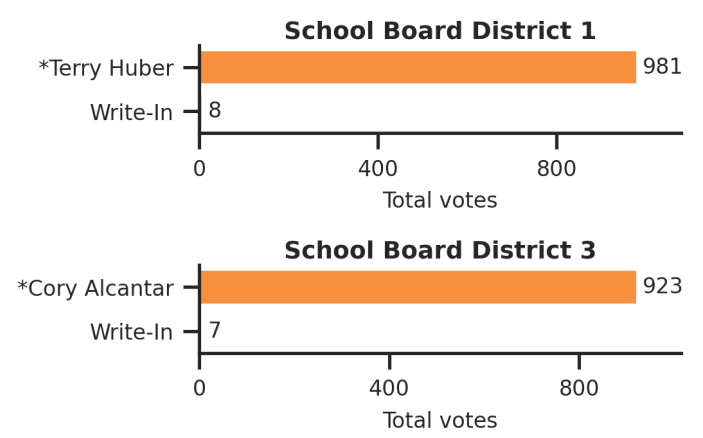


Fig 2 Election results in Colfax School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

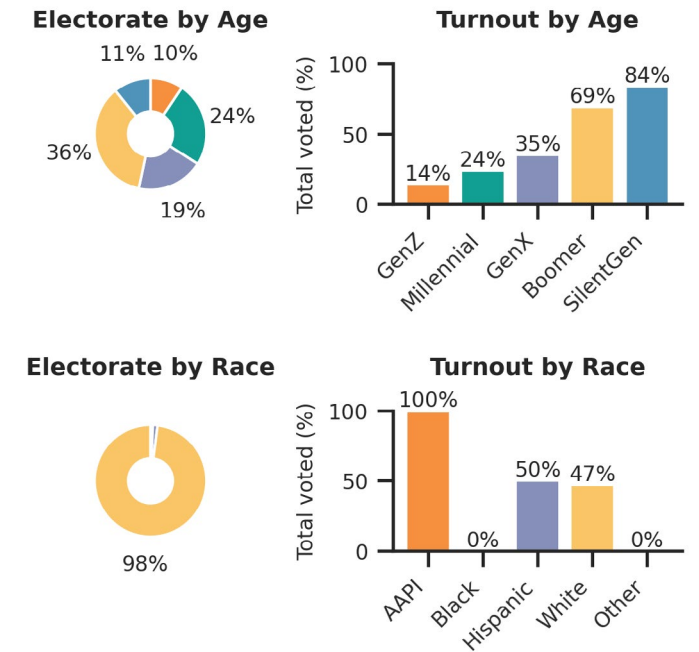


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Colton for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

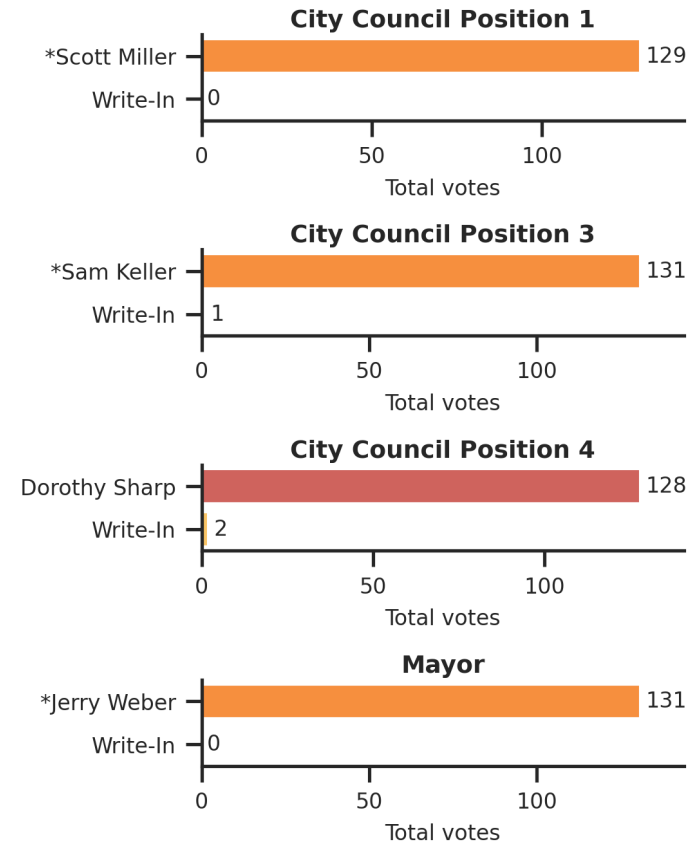


Fig 2 Election results in Colton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

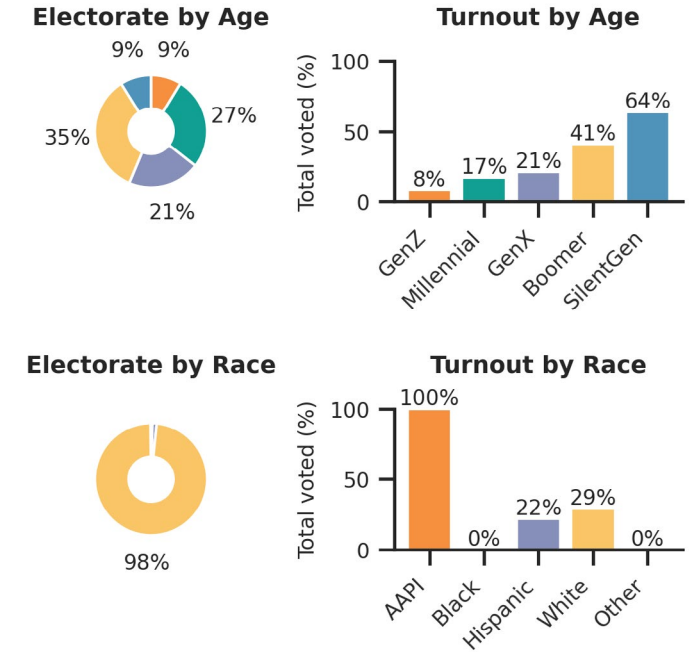


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Colton School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

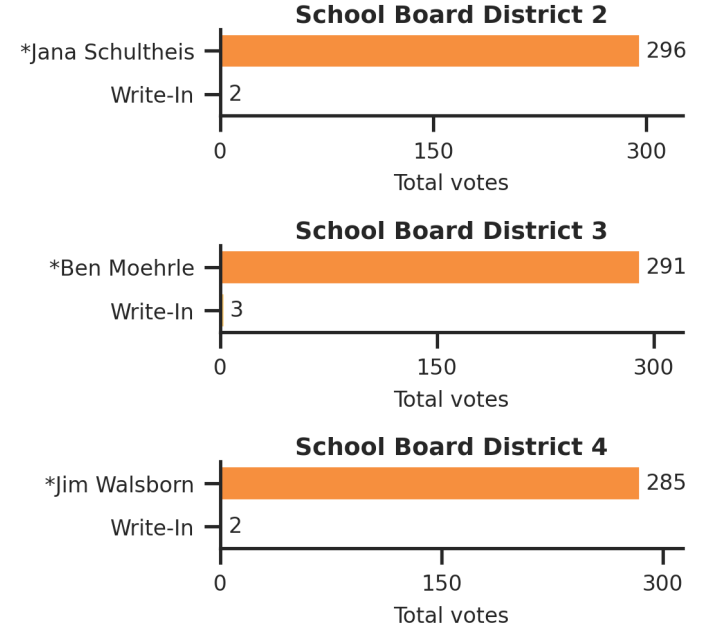


Fig 2 Election results in Colton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

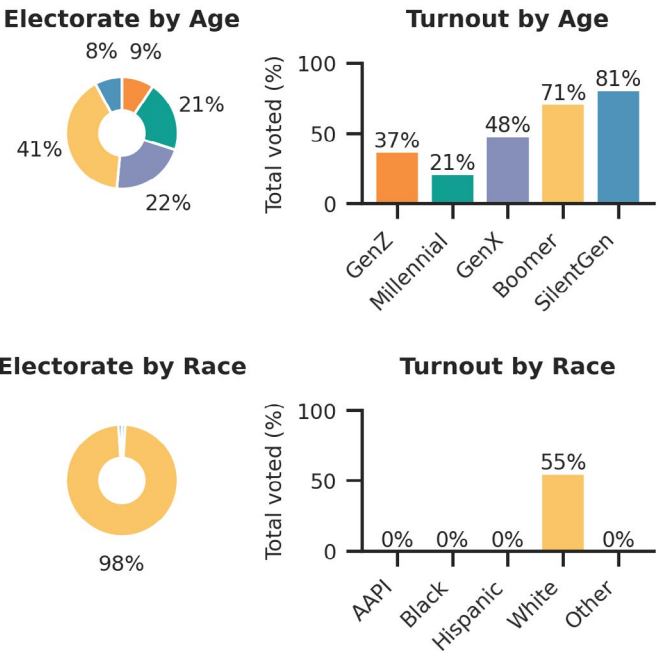


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Endicott for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

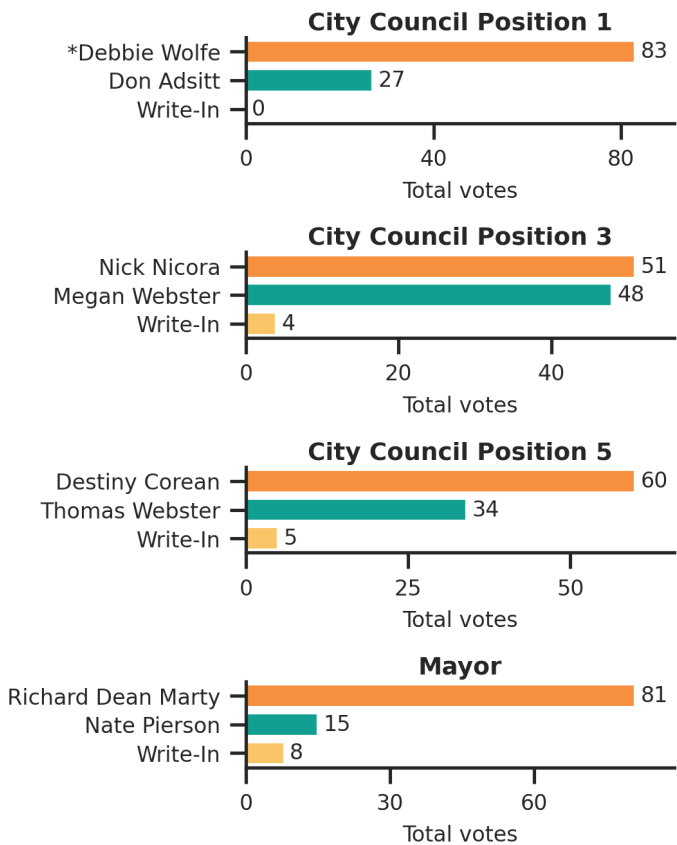


Fig 2 Election results in Endicott for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

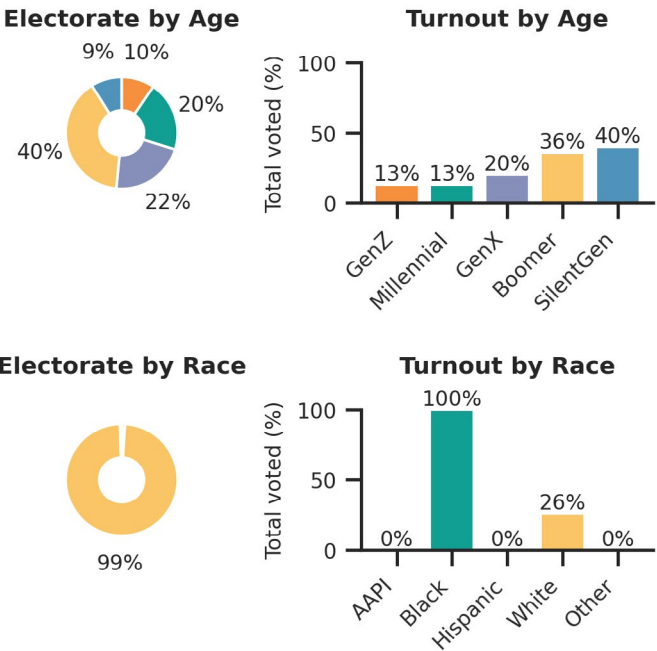


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Endicott School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

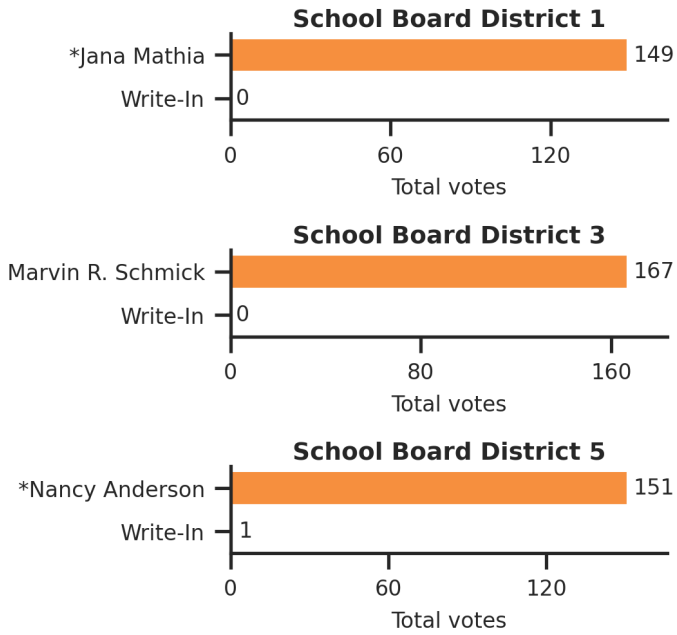


Fig 2 Election results in Endicott School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

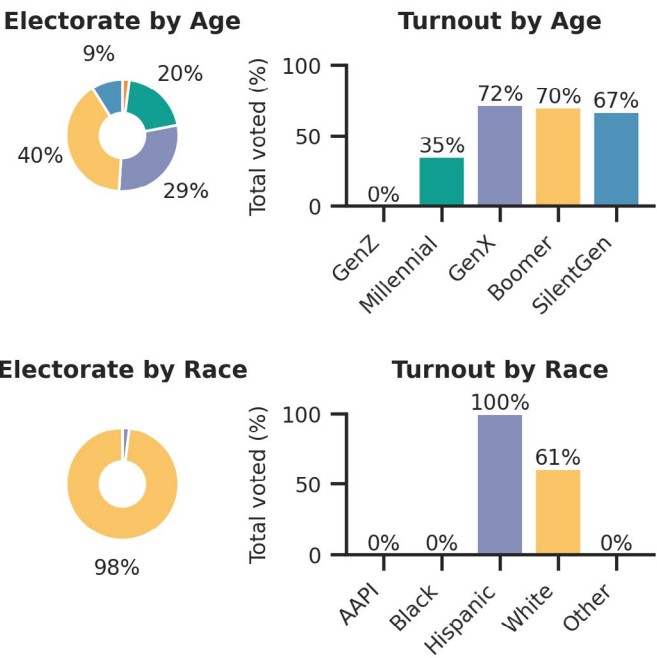


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Farmington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

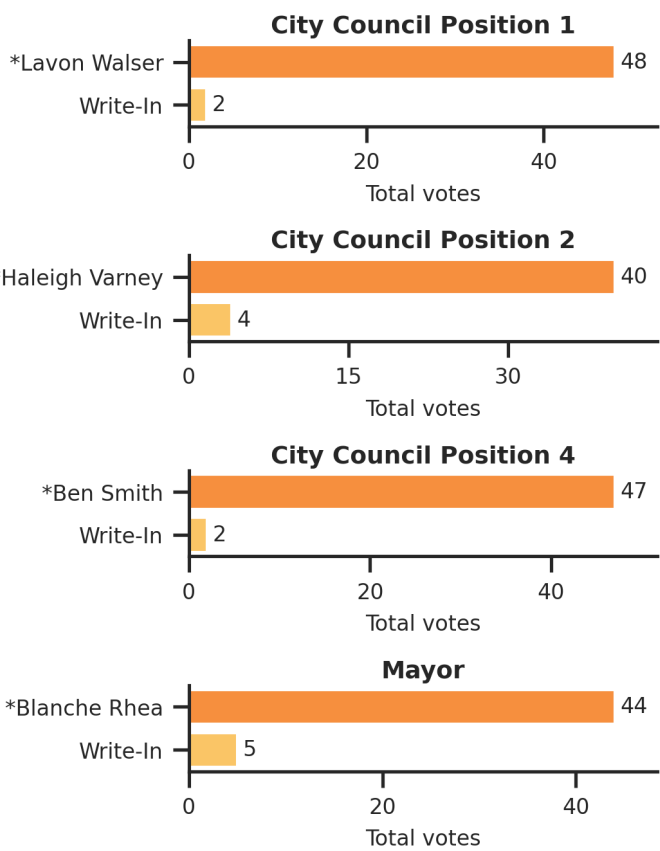


Fig 2 Election results in Farmington for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

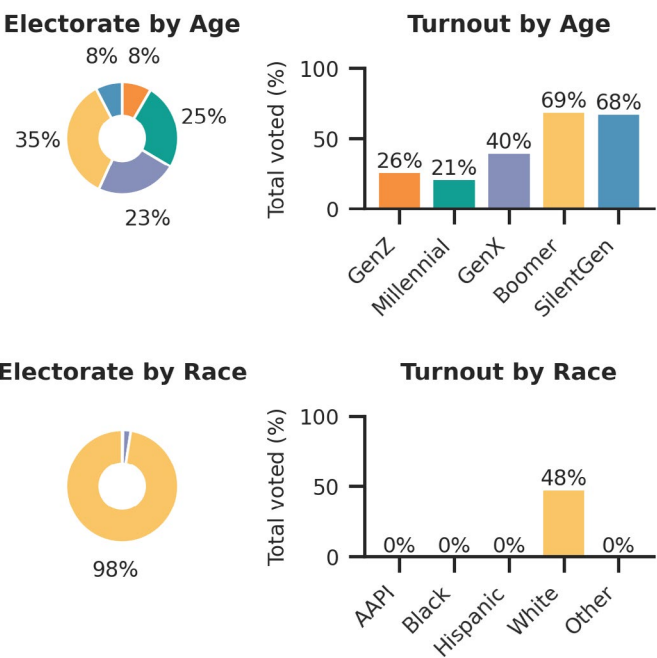


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Garfield for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

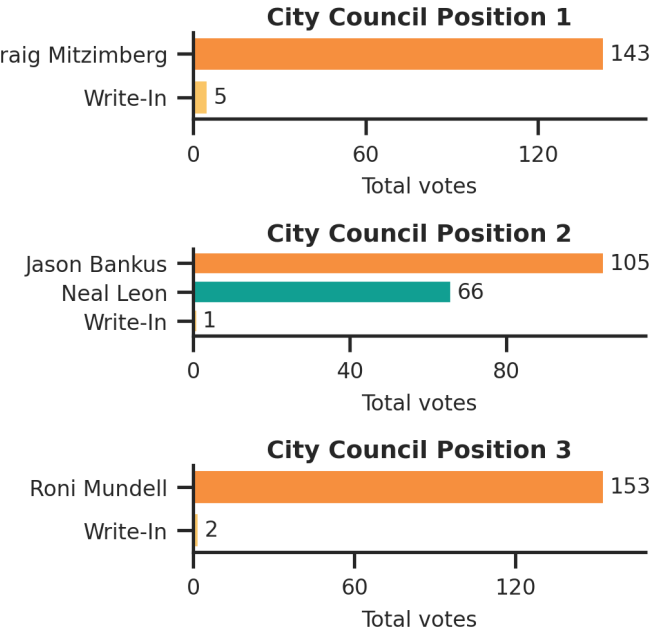


Fig 2 Election results in Garfield for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

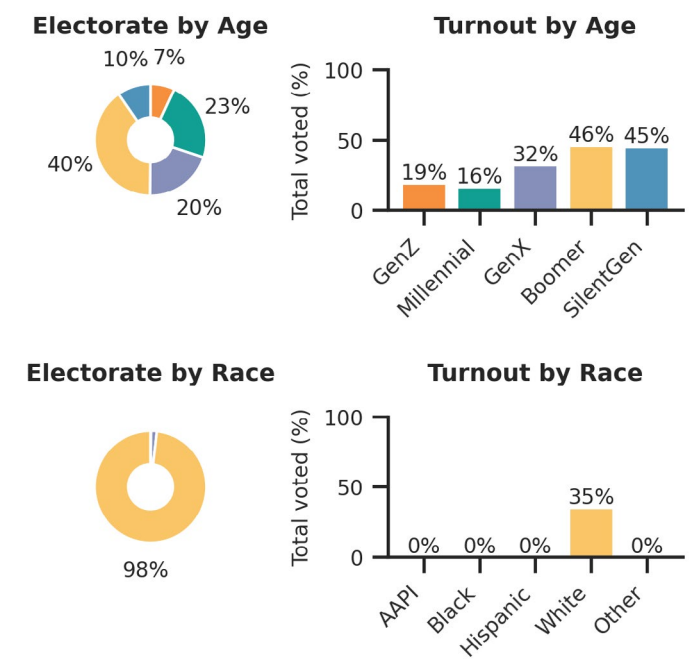


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Garfield School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

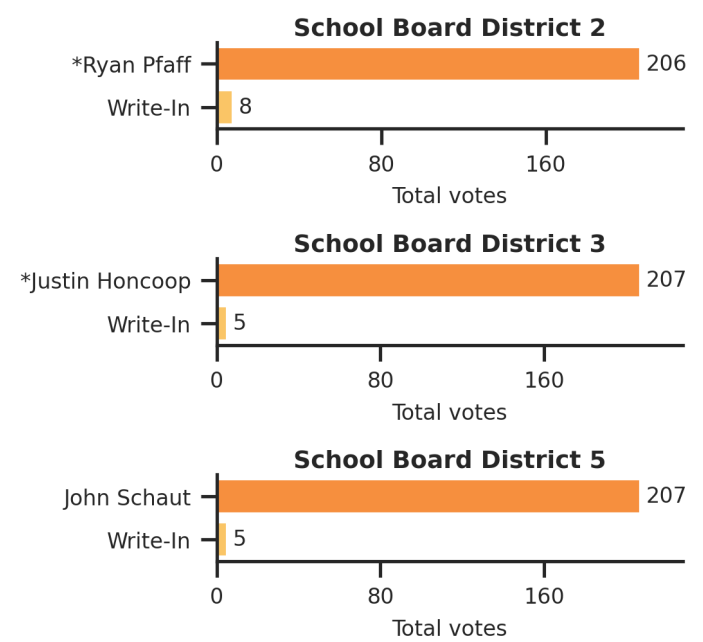


Fig 2 Election results in Garfield School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

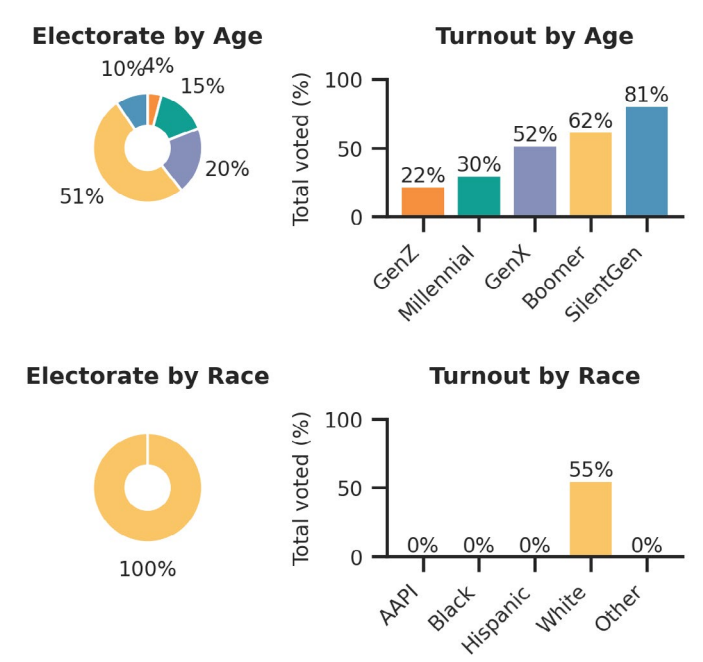


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in LaCrosse for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

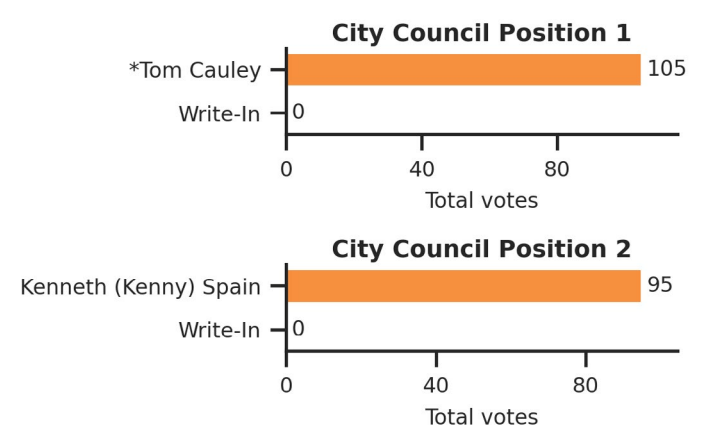


Fig 2 Election results in LaCrosse for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

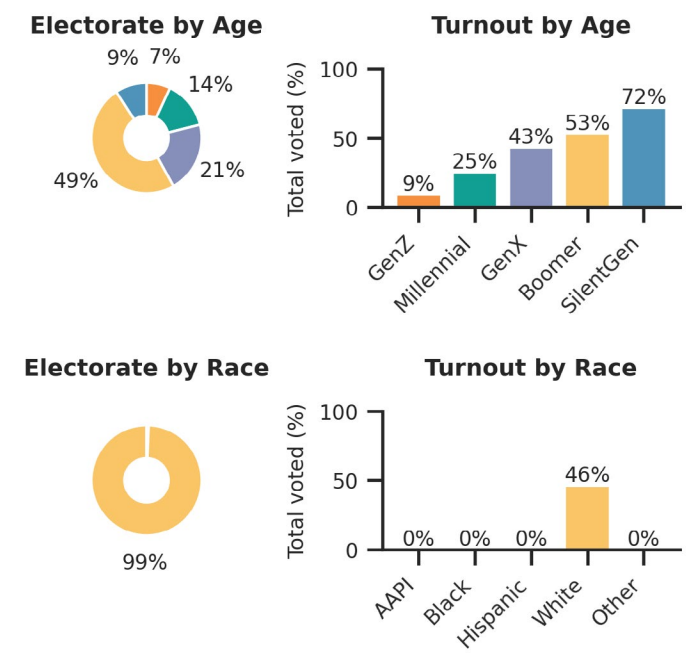


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in LaCrosse School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

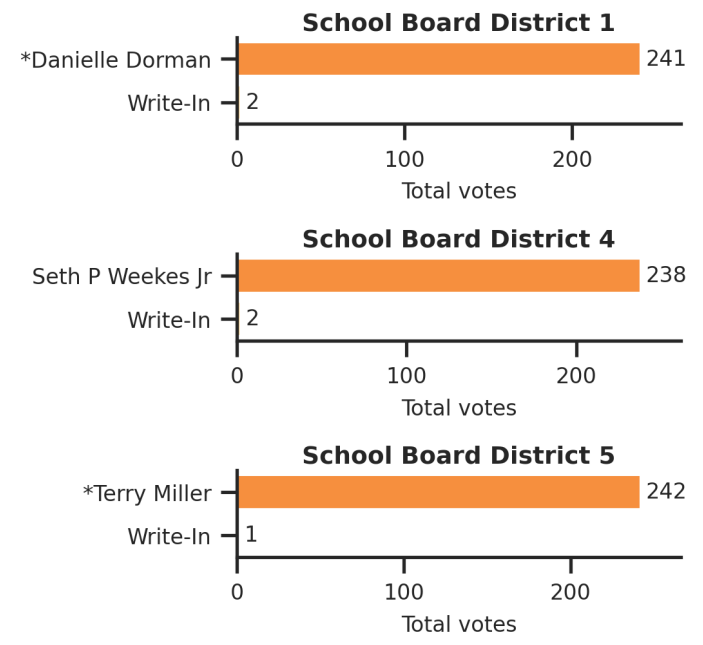


Fig 2 Election results in LaCrosse School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

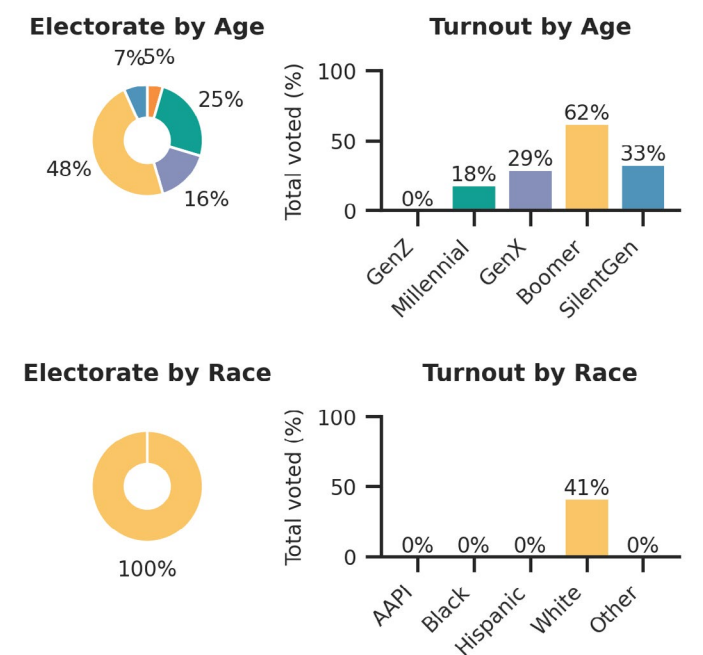


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lamont for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

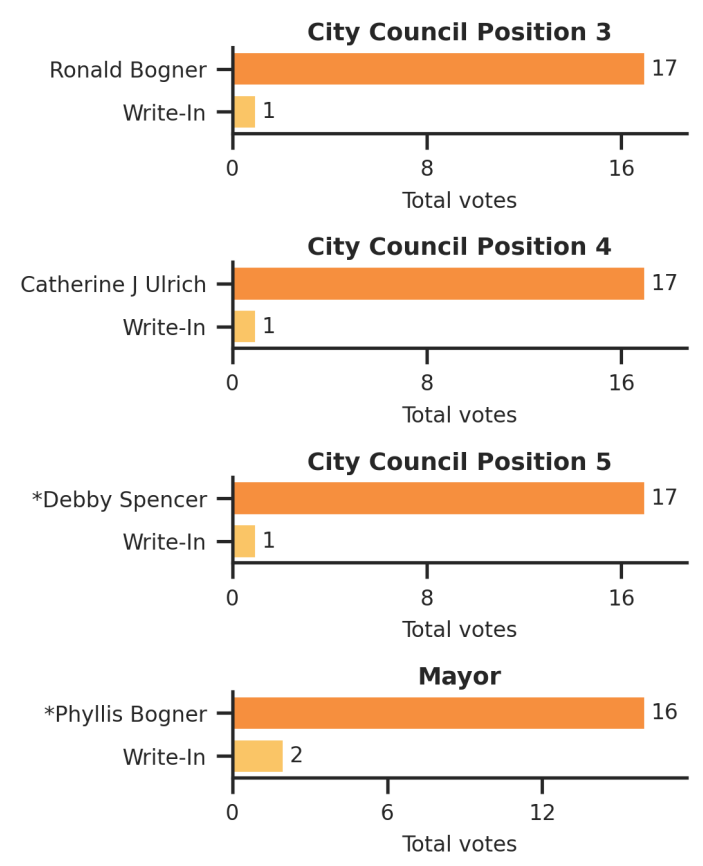
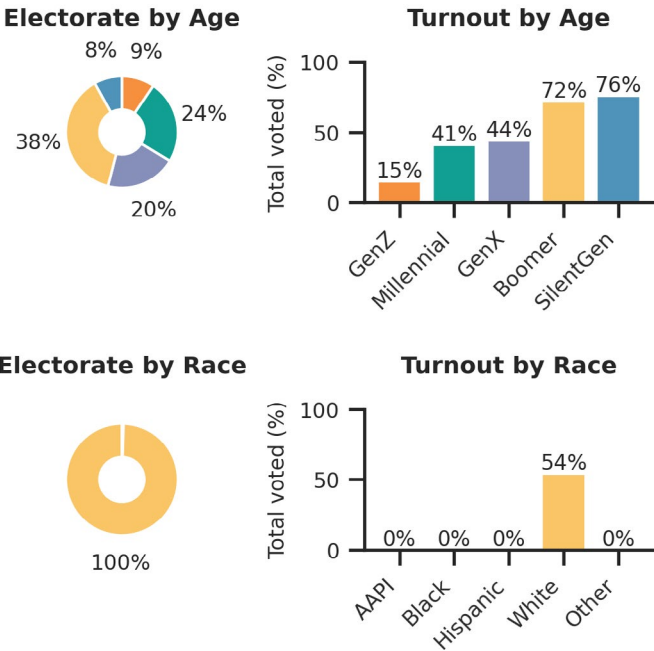


Fig 2 Election results in Lamont for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

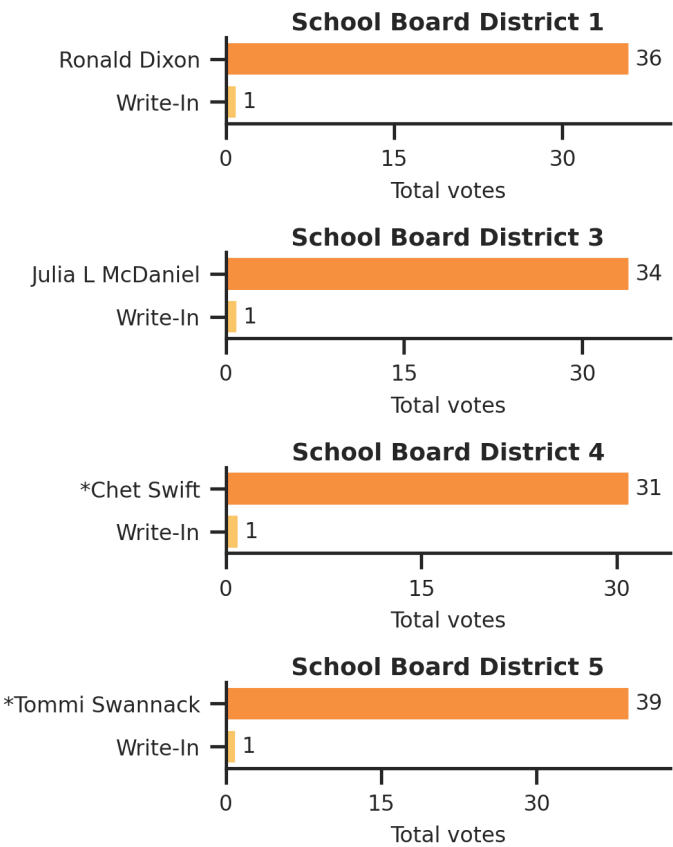

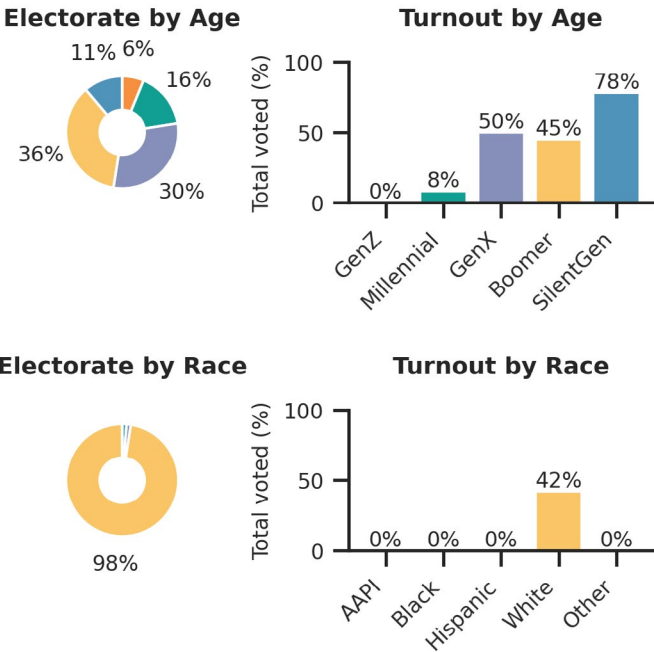

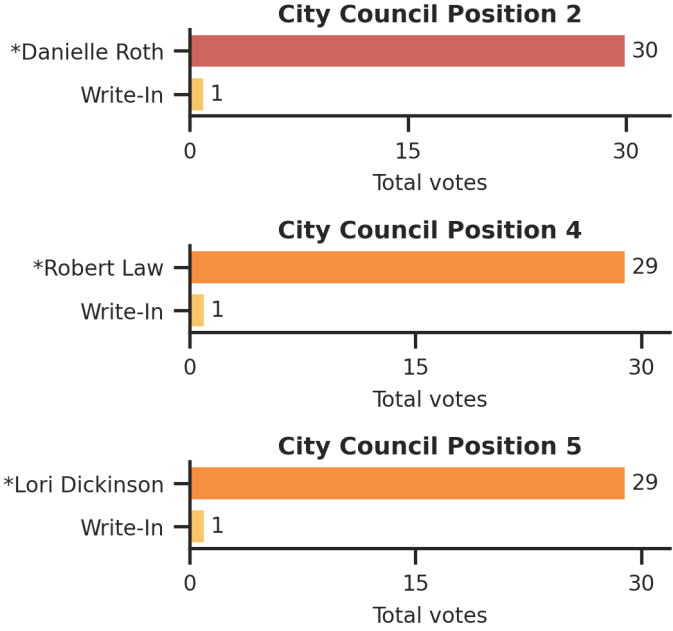

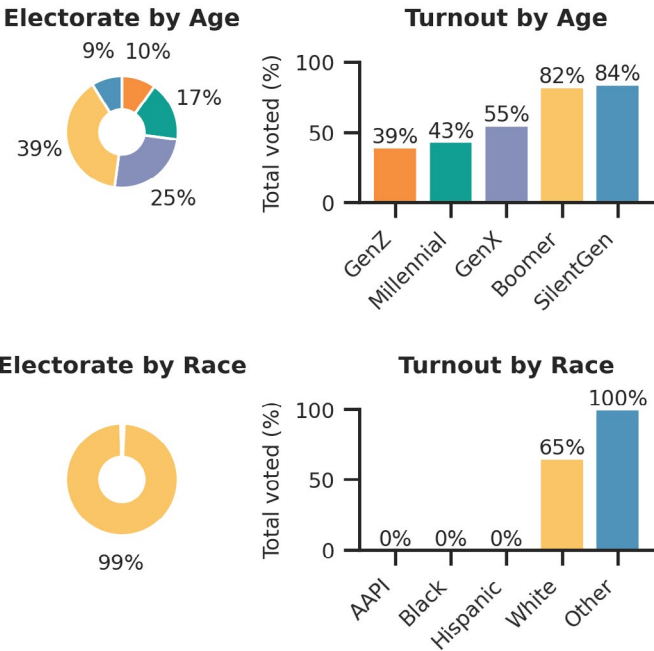


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oakesdale for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

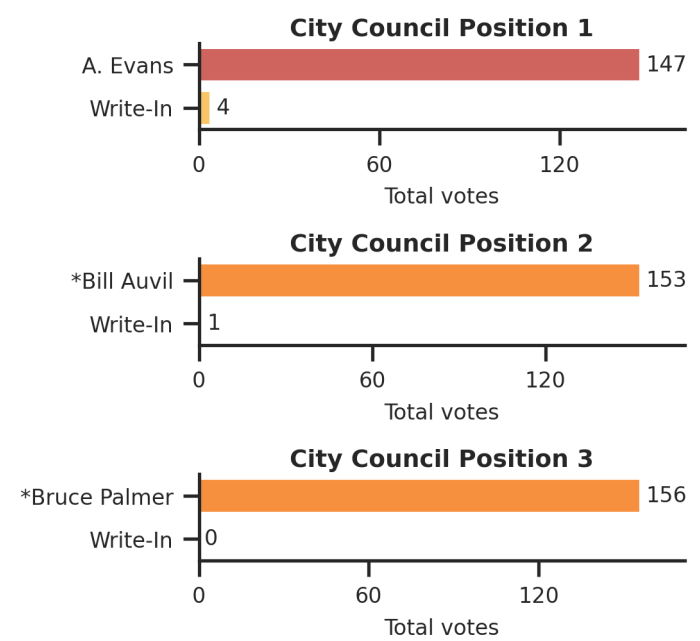


Fig 2 Election results in Oakesdale for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

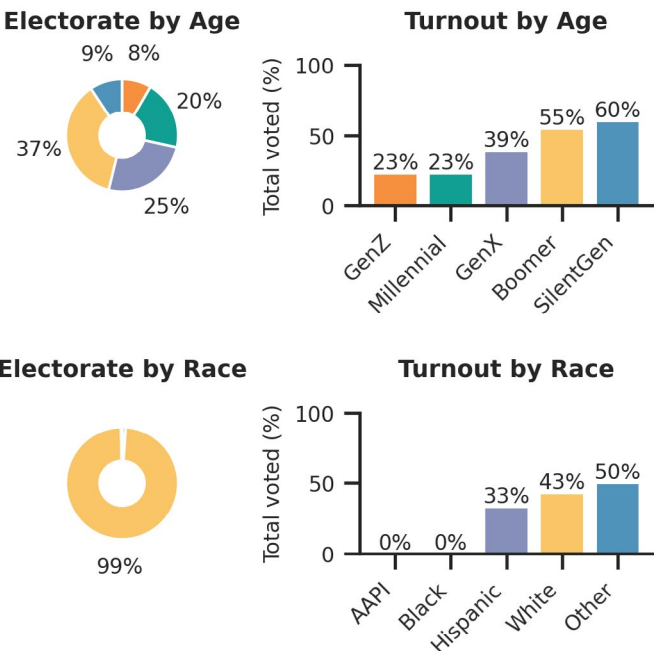


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oakesdale School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

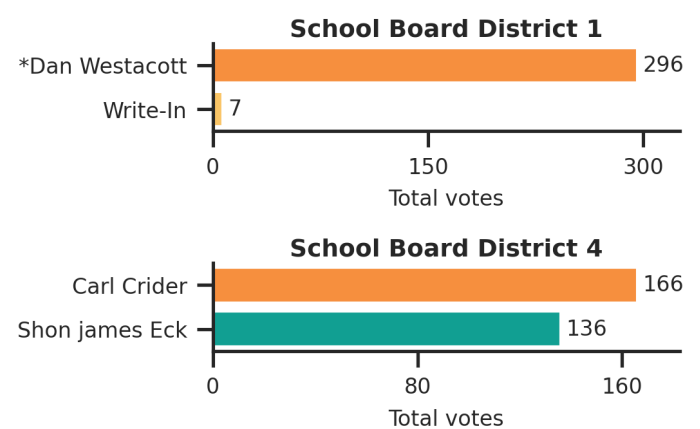


Fig 2 Election results in Oakesdale School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

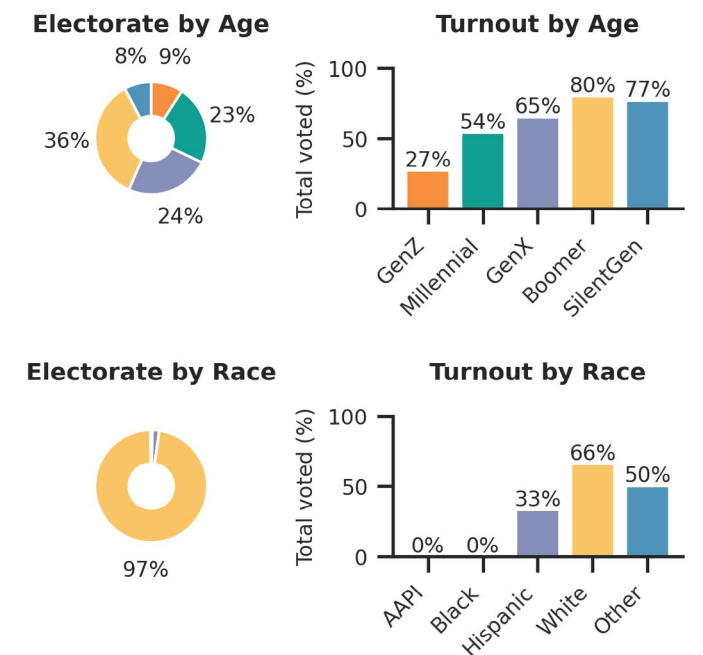


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Palouse for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

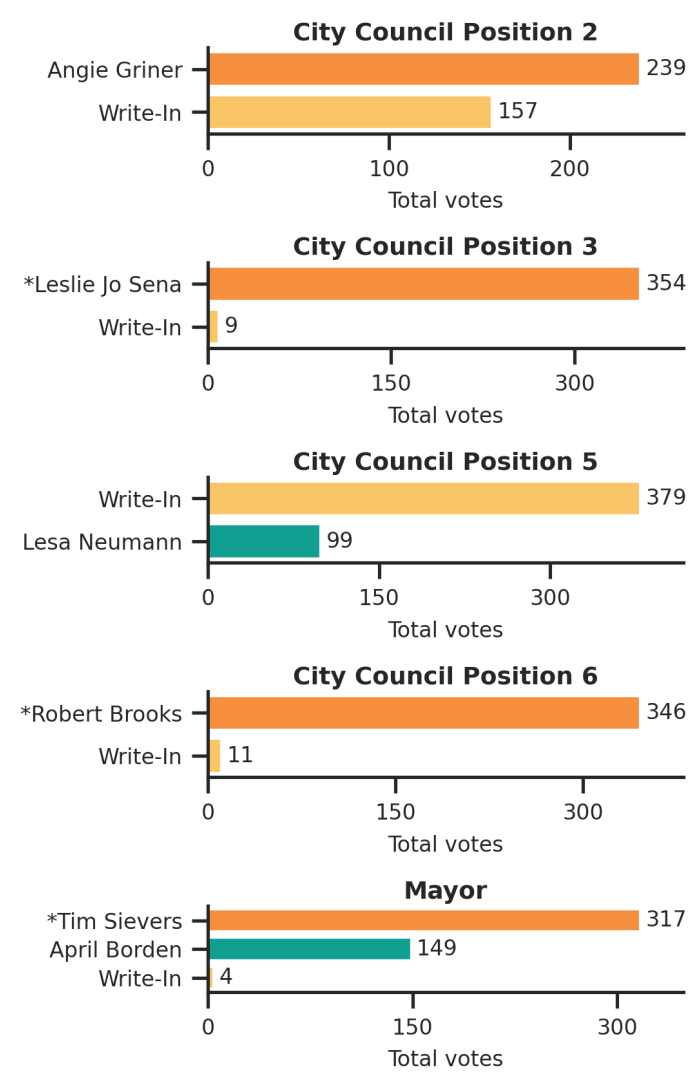


Fig 2 Election results in Palouse for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

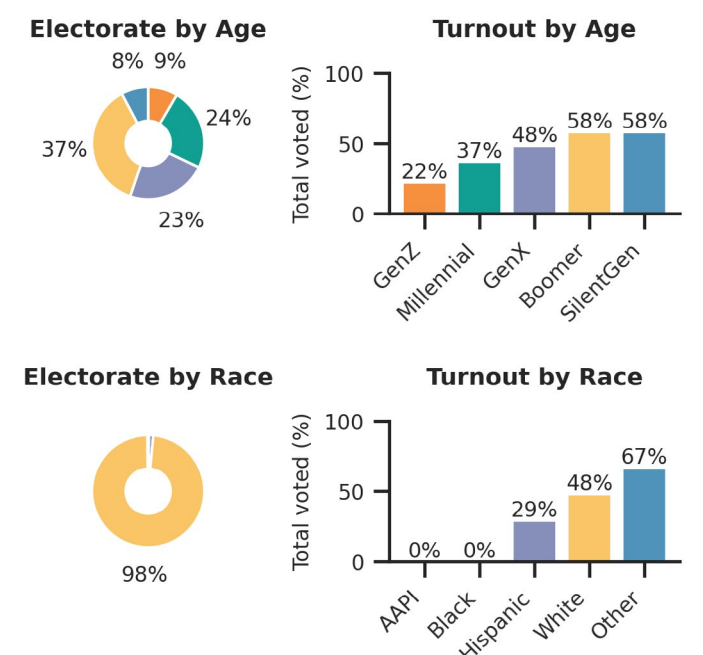


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Palouse School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

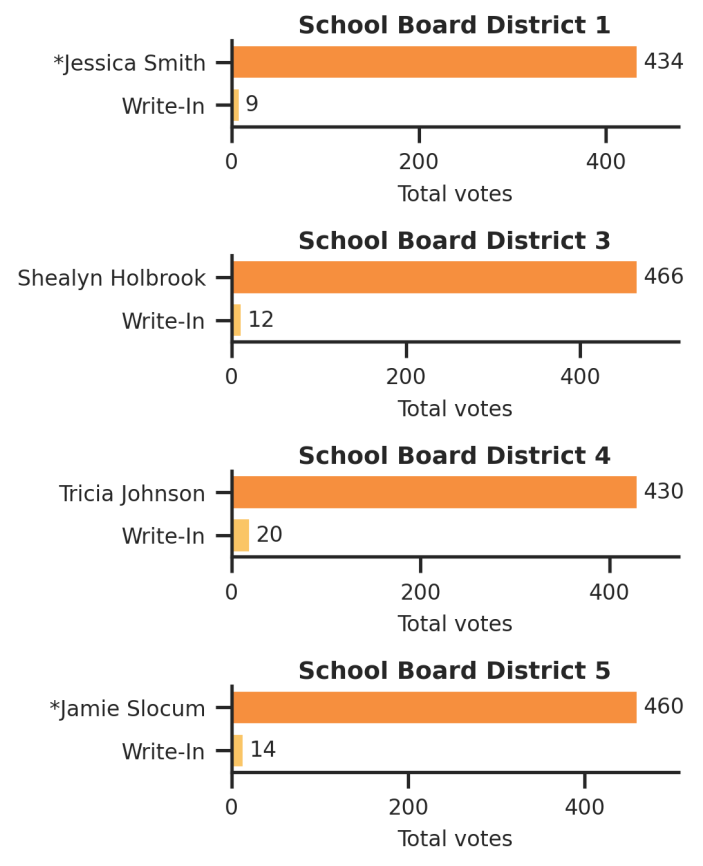


Fig 2 Election results in Palouse School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

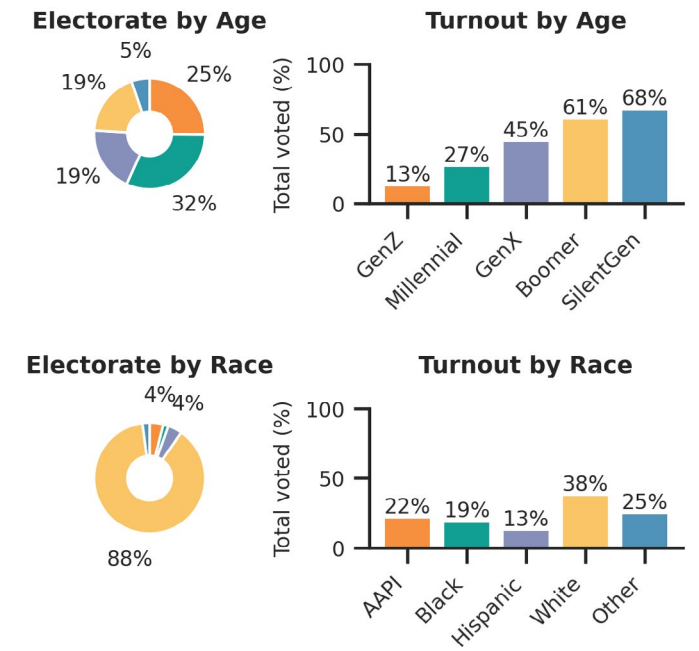


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pullman for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

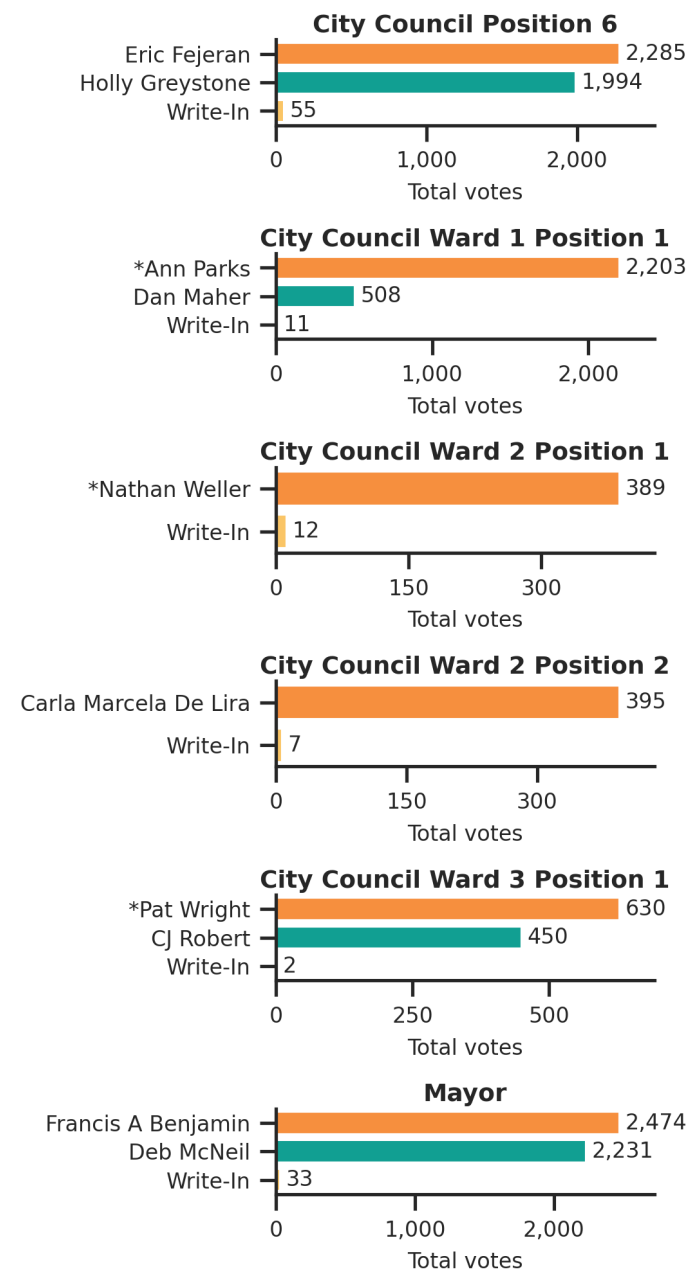


Fig 2 Election results in Pullman for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

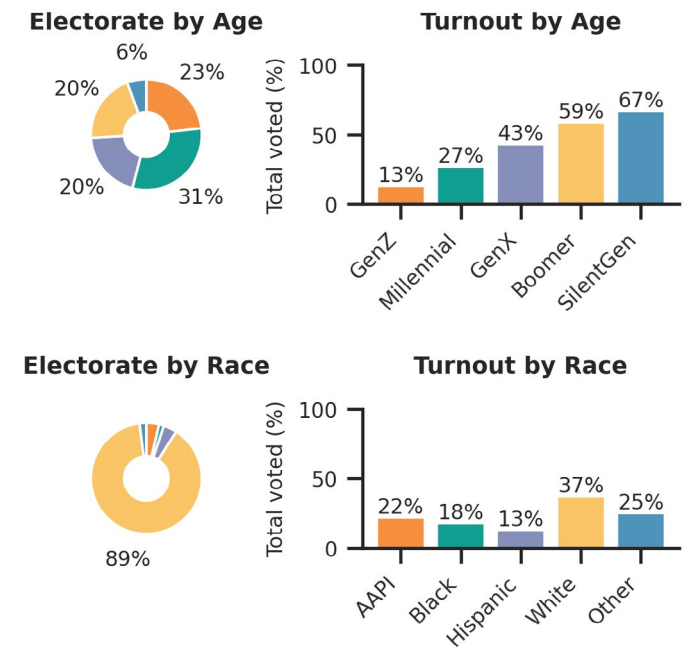


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pullman School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

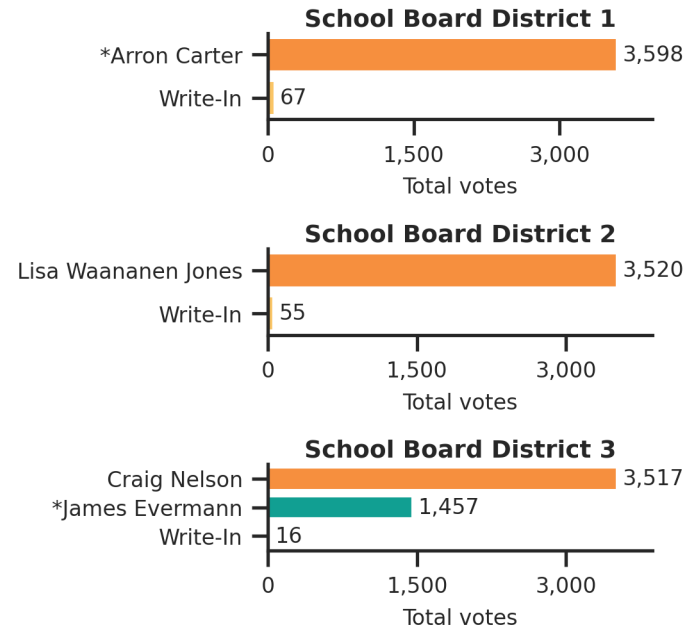


Fig 2 Election results in Pullman School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

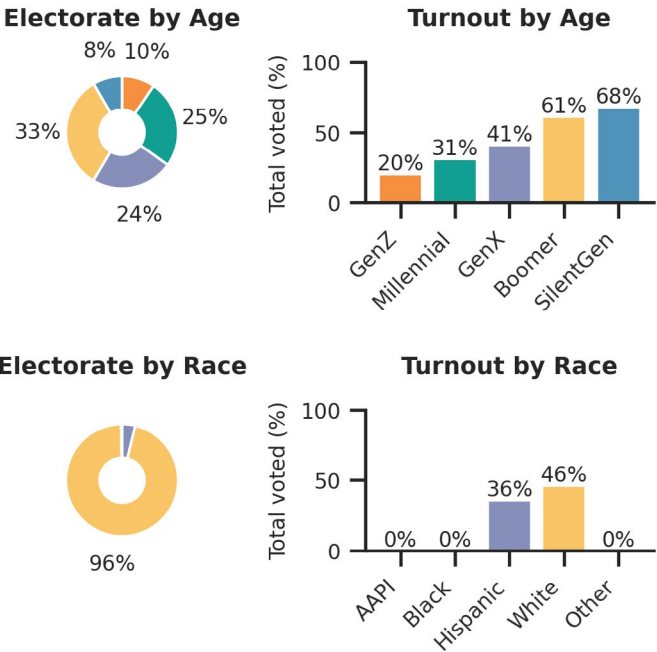


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rosalia for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

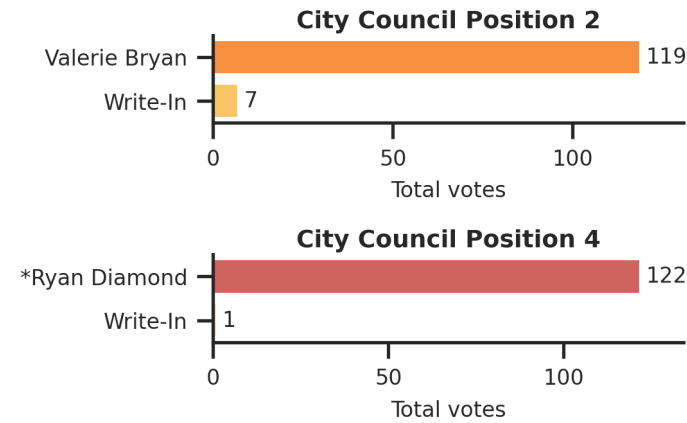


Fig 2 Election results in Rosalia for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

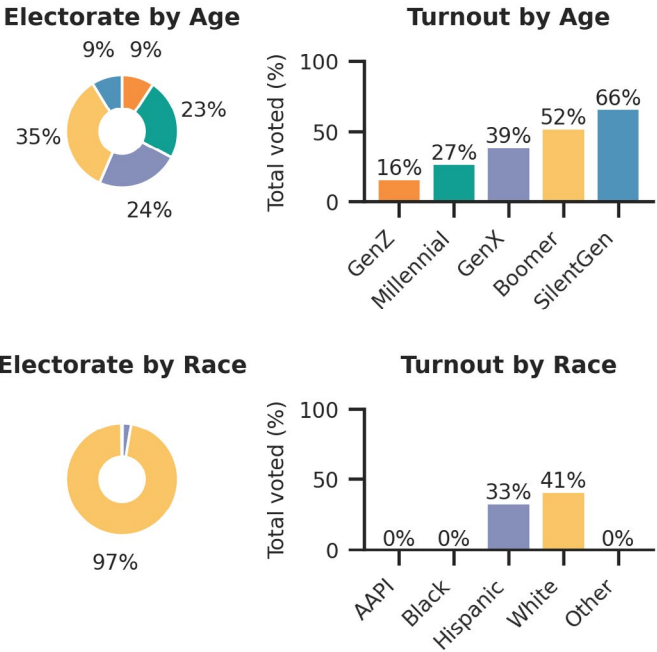


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rosalia School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

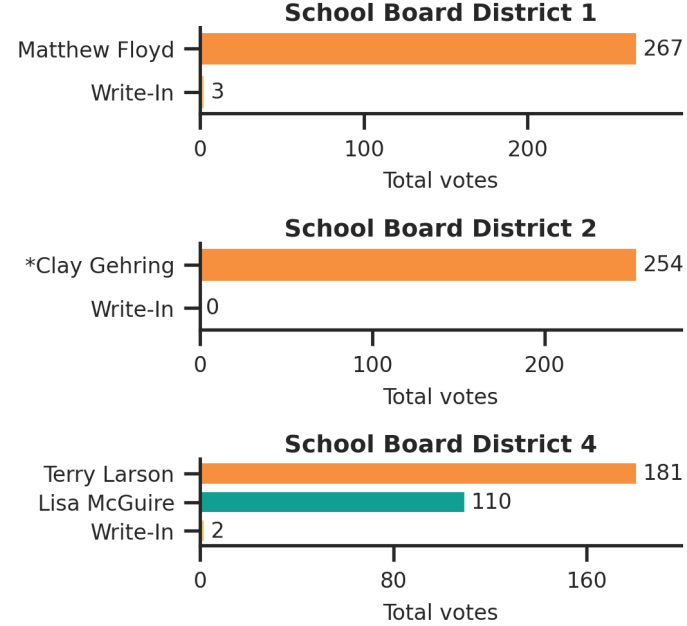


Fig 2 Election results in Rosalia School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

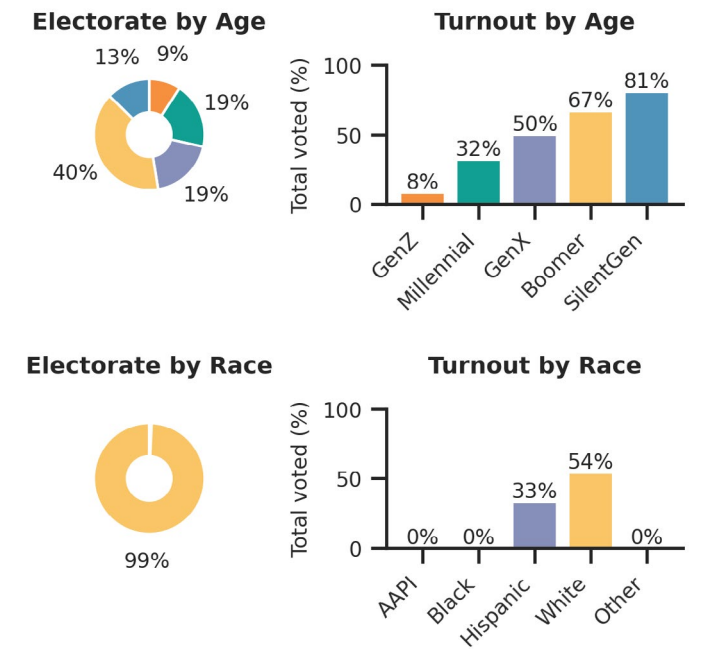


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in St. John for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

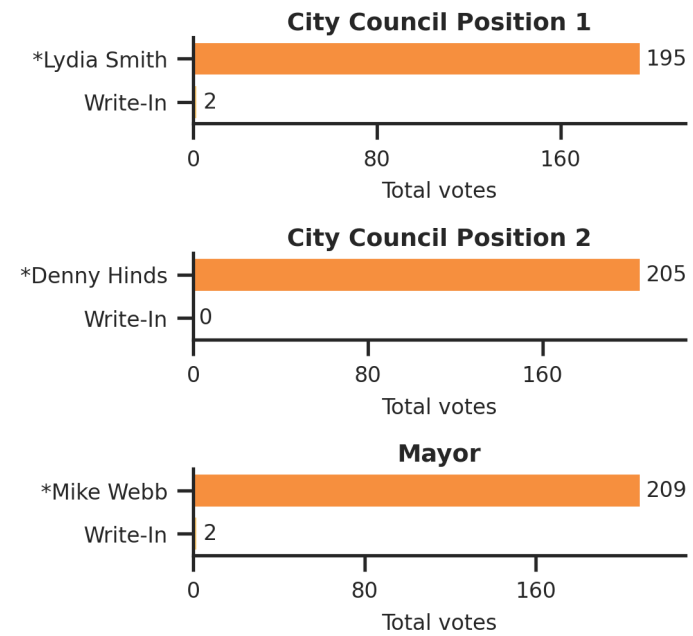


Fig 2 Election results in St. John for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

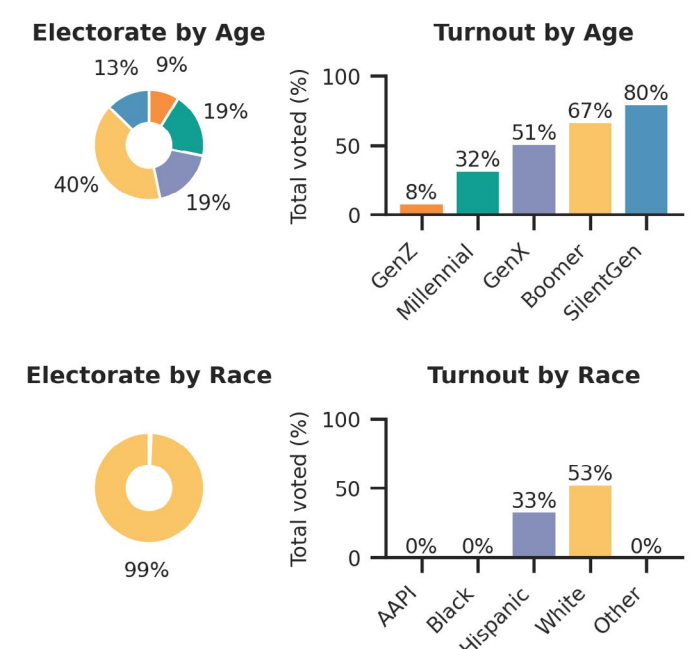


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in St. John School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

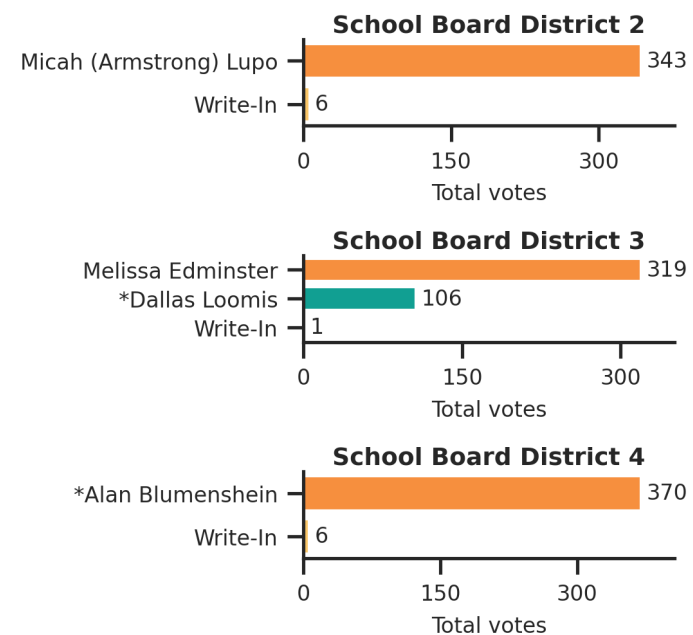


Fig 2 Election results in St. John School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

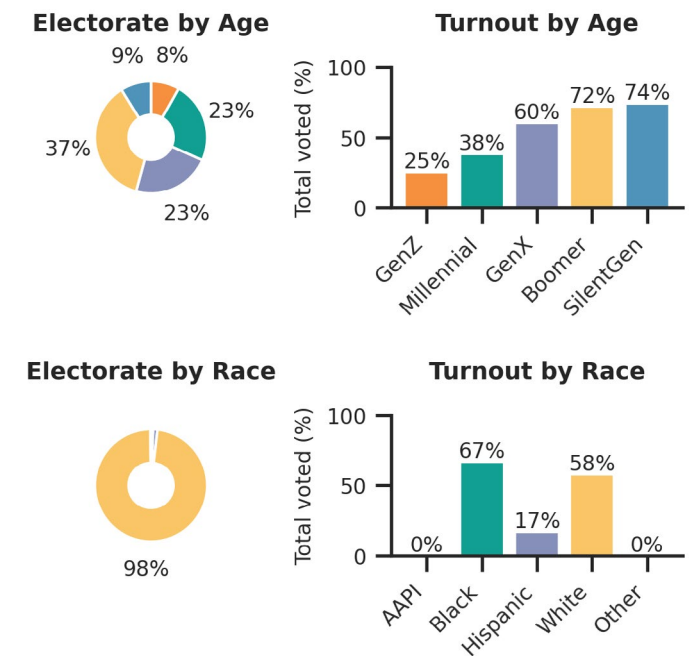


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Tekoa for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

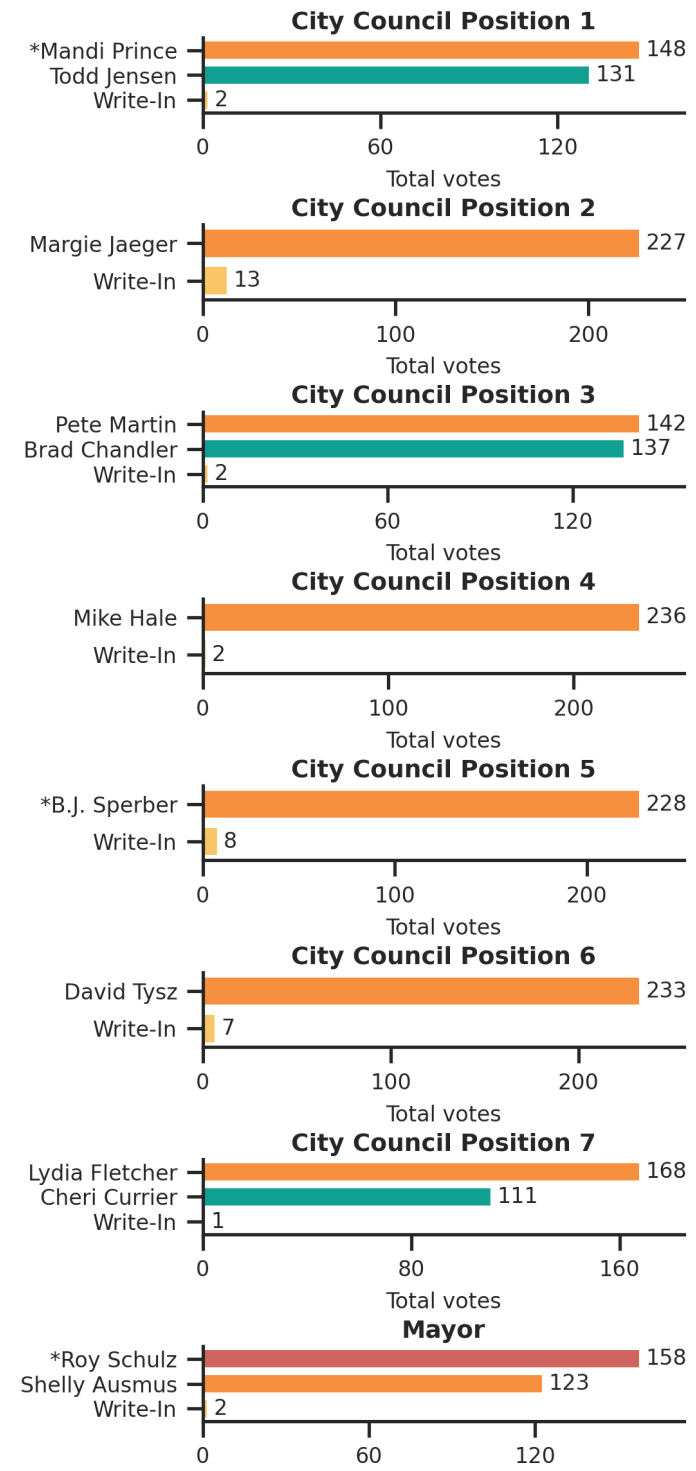


Fig 2 Election results in Tekoa for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

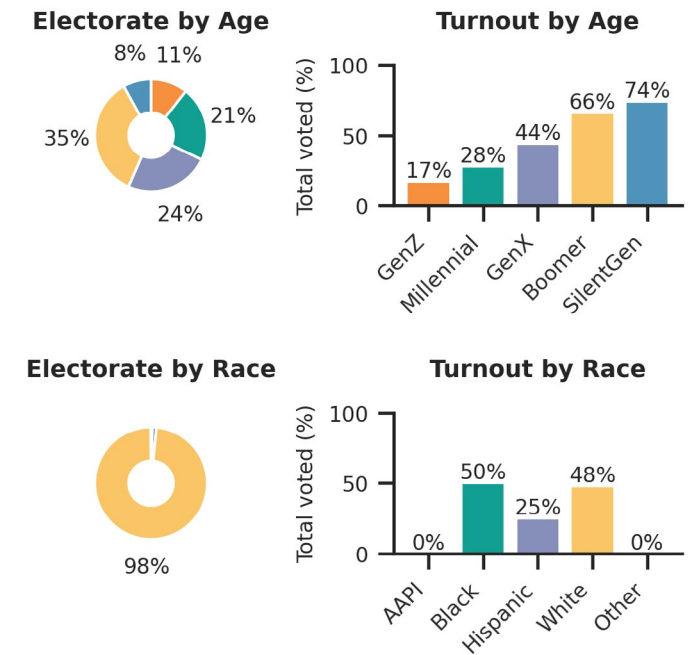


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Tekoa School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

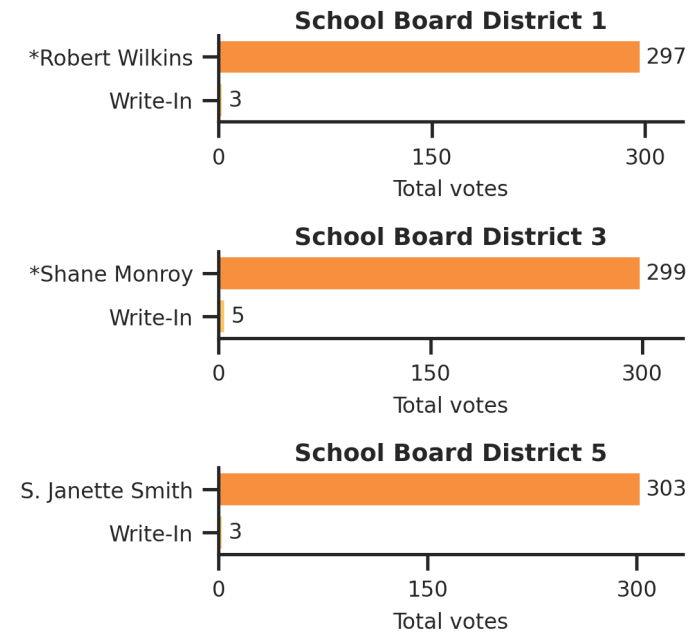


Fig 2 Election results in Tekoa School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

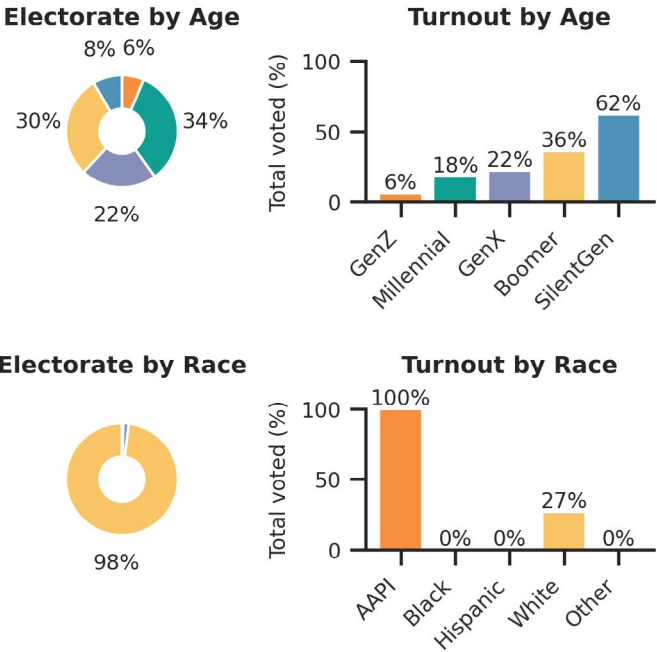


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Uniontown for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

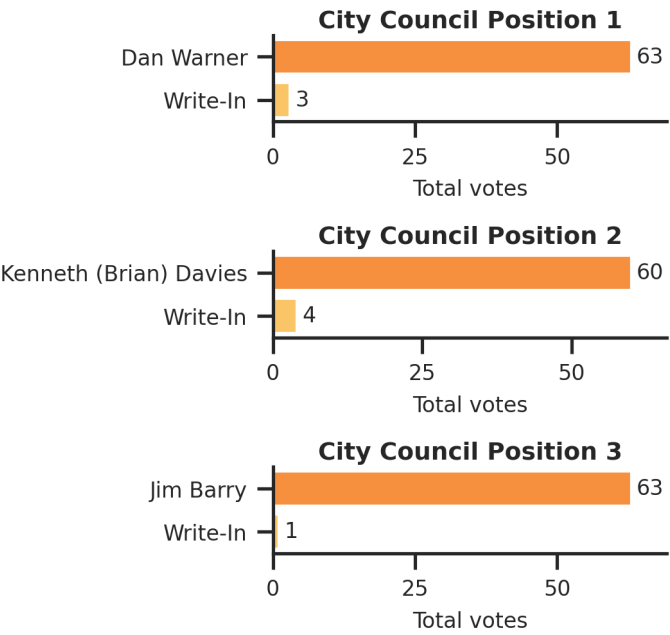
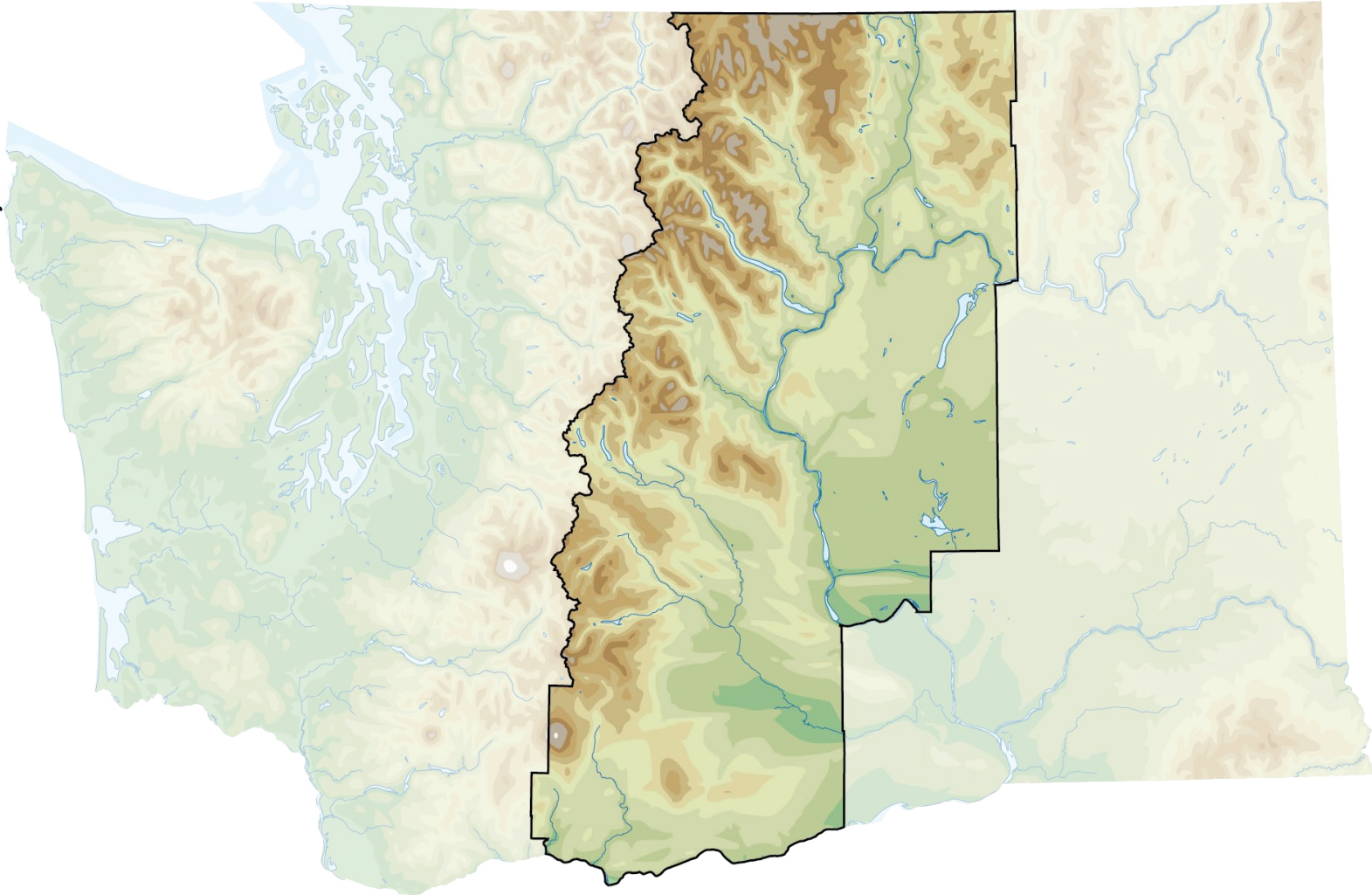


Fig 2 Election results in Uniontown for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

Voter turnout & outreach

There are 319,591 registered voters in Central Washington, including 5,718 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 32.9% – the second lowest in the state. Across Central Washington, voter turnout was highest in Chelan County (43.7%), Okanogan County (42.4%), and Klickitat County (39.8%), and lowest in Yakima County (26.0%) and Grant County (29.5%).

Young voters make up 27.3% of the electorate in Central Washington (87,094 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 27.6% lower than older voters (12.8% vs 40.4%). The electorate in Central Washington is the second most racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for 23.1% of all registered voters, yet turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 26.2% lower than White voters (12.7% vs 38.9%). From mid-August to mid-November, eight WCA Data Hub partners were active in Central Washington making a total of 65,518 contact attempts to 36,803 unique voters (~0.21 attempts per voter). This included 9,448 door knocks, 10,125 phone calls, 13,653 text messages, and 32,292 mailers.

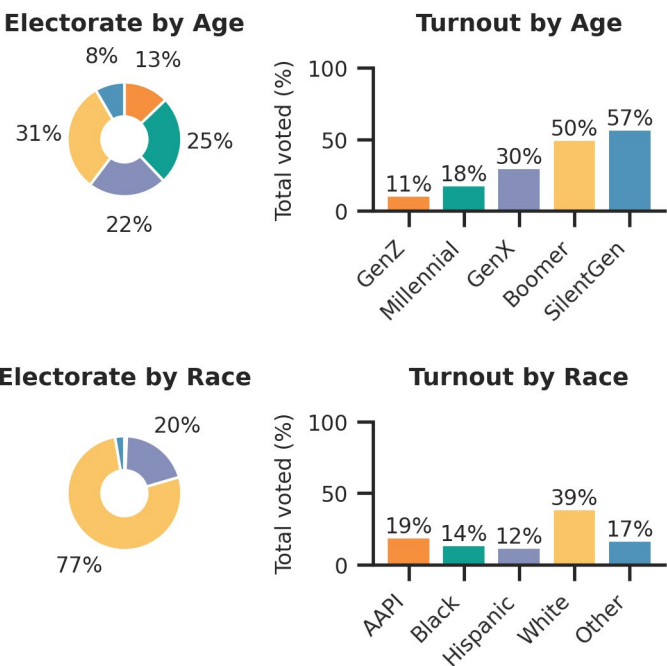


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Central Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

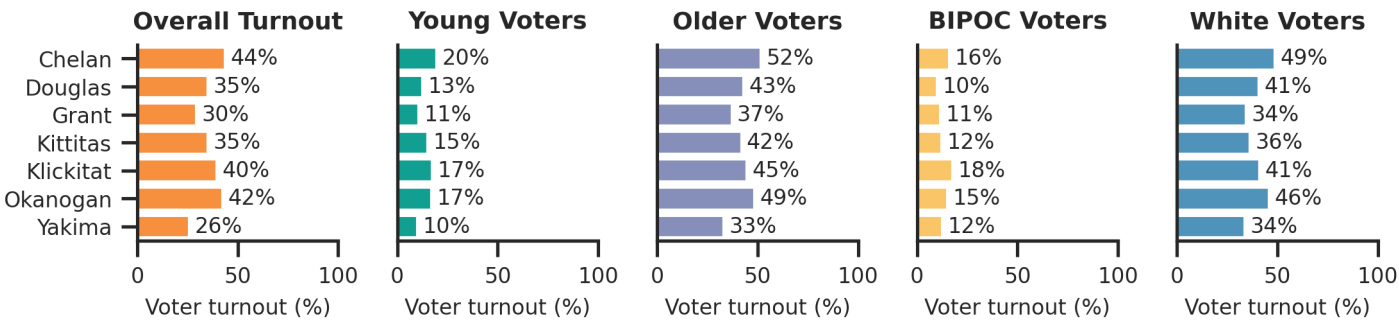


Fig 2 Voter turnout by county in Central Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

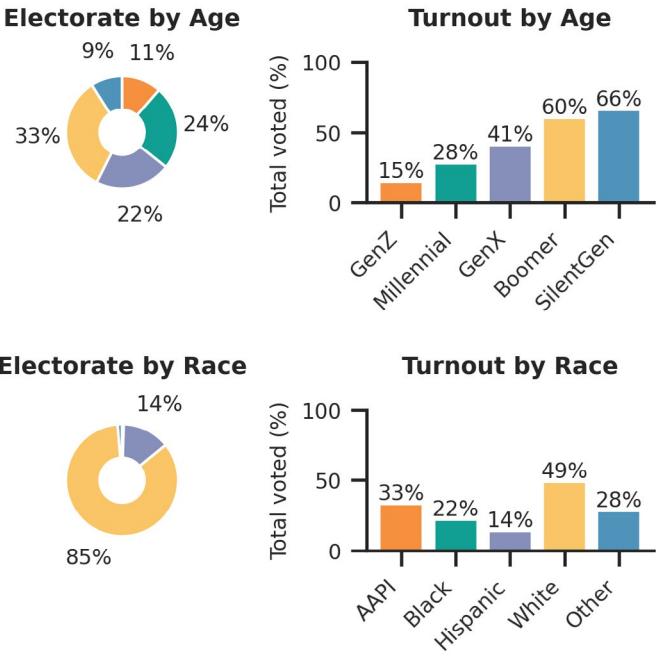


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Chelan County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

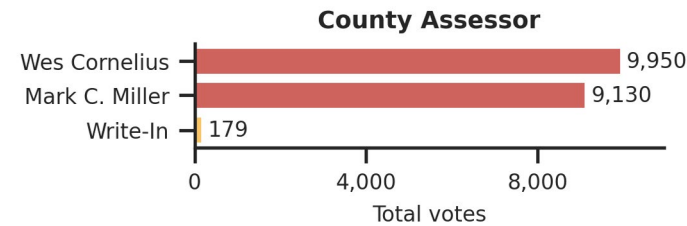


Fig 2 Election results in Chelan County for the 2023 General Election. Asterisks indicate incumbents.

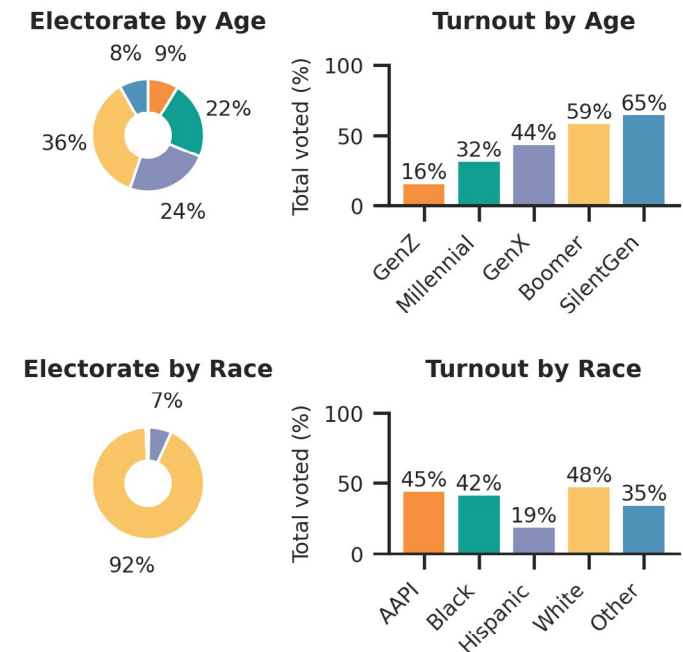


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cascade School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

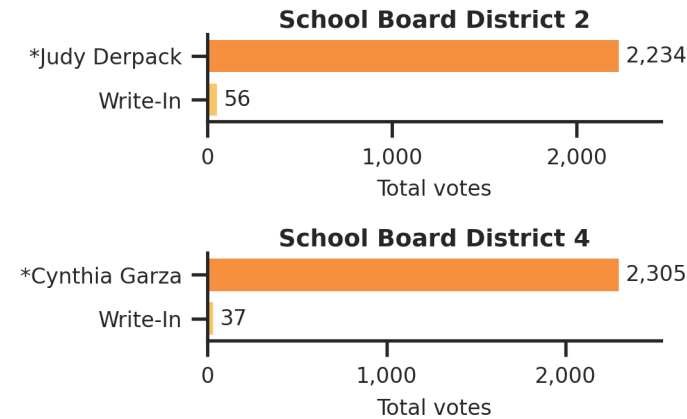


Fig 2 Election results in Cascade School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

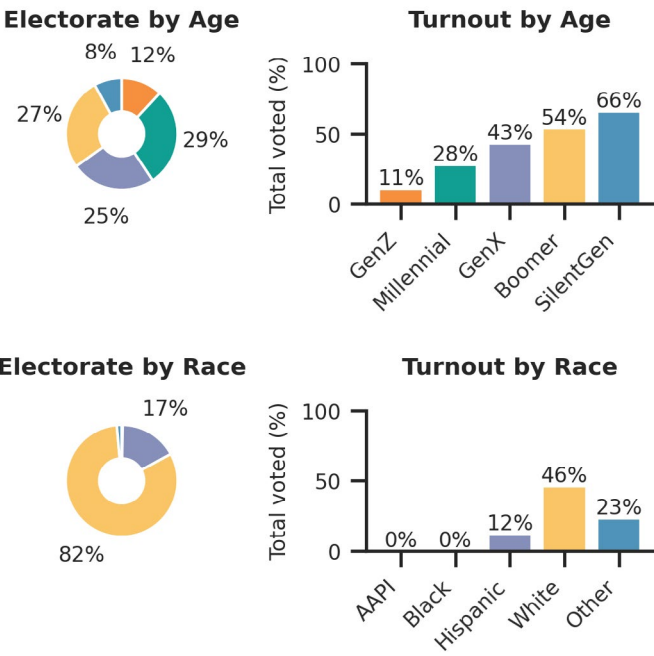


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cashmere for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

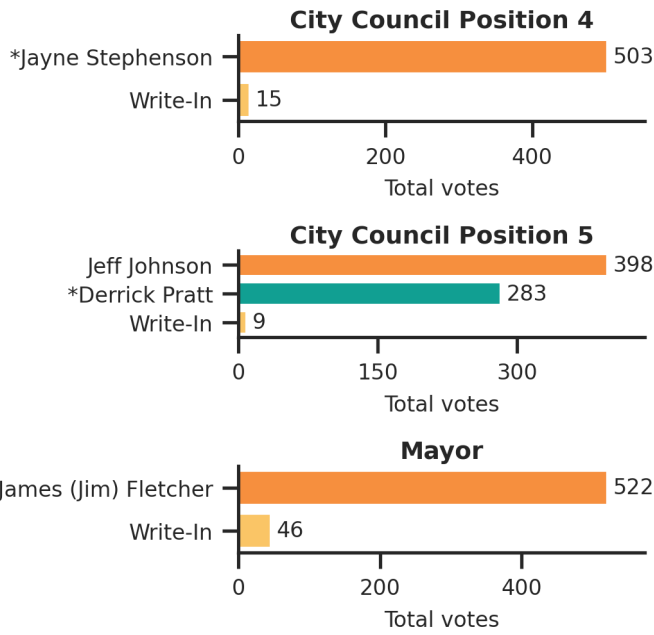


Fig 2 Election results in Cashmere for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

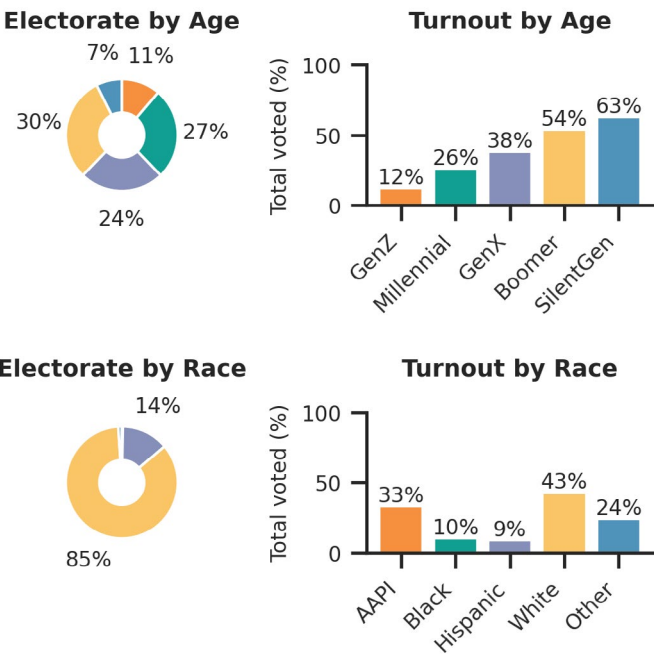


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cashmere School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

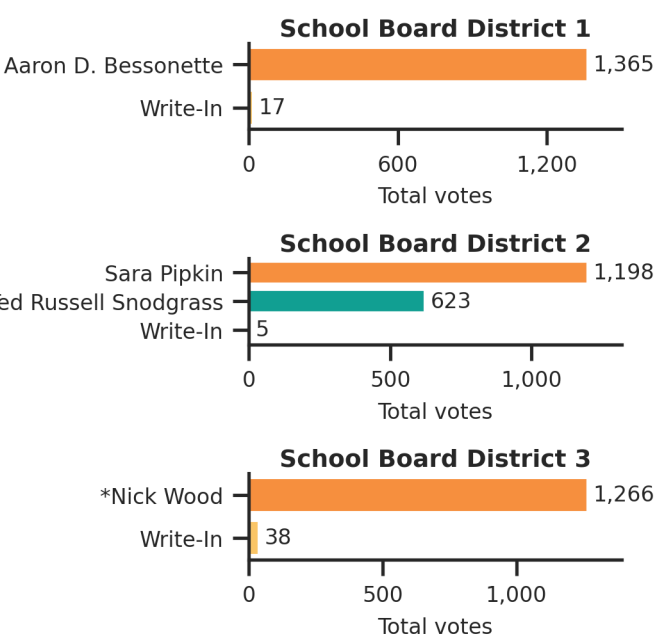


Fig 2 Election results in Cashmere School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

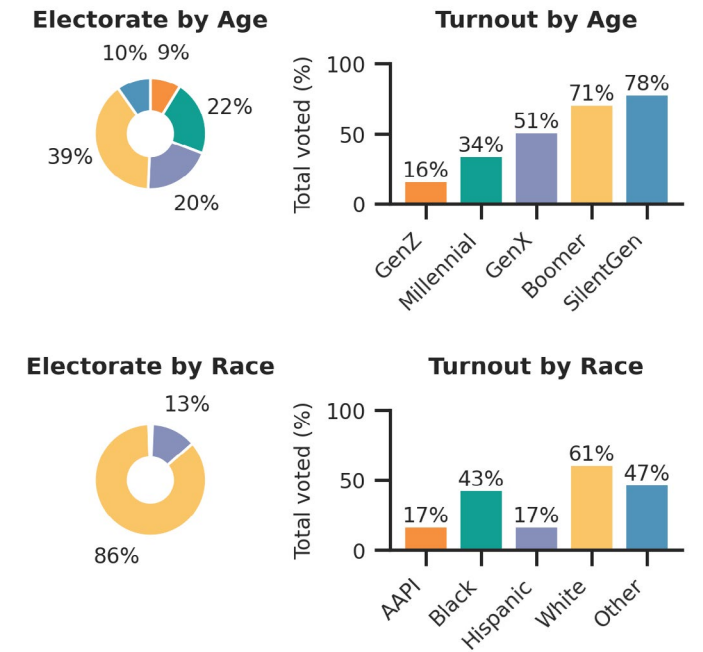


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Chelan for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

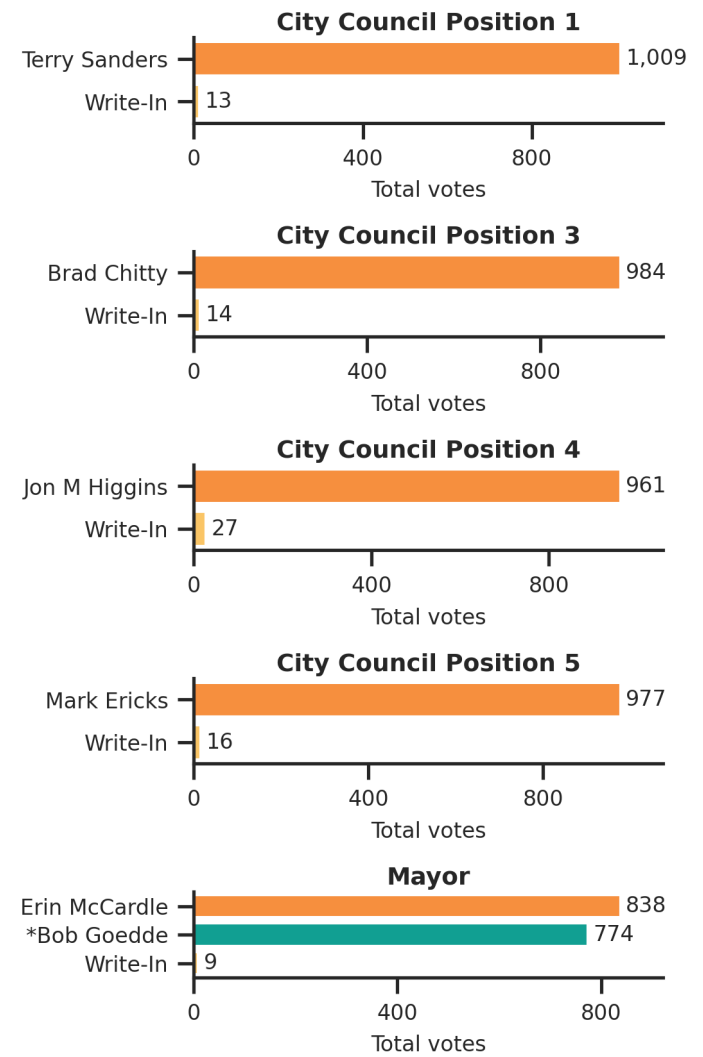


Fig 2 Election results in Chelan for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

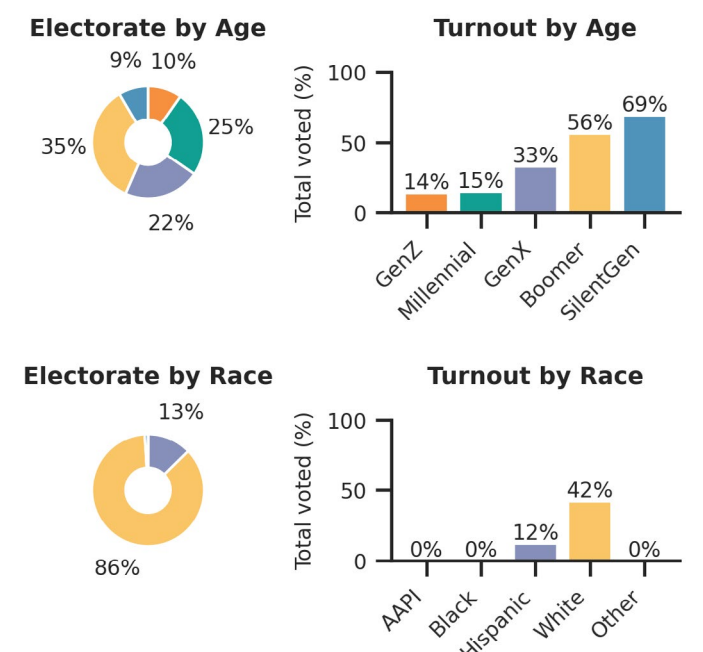


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Entiat for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

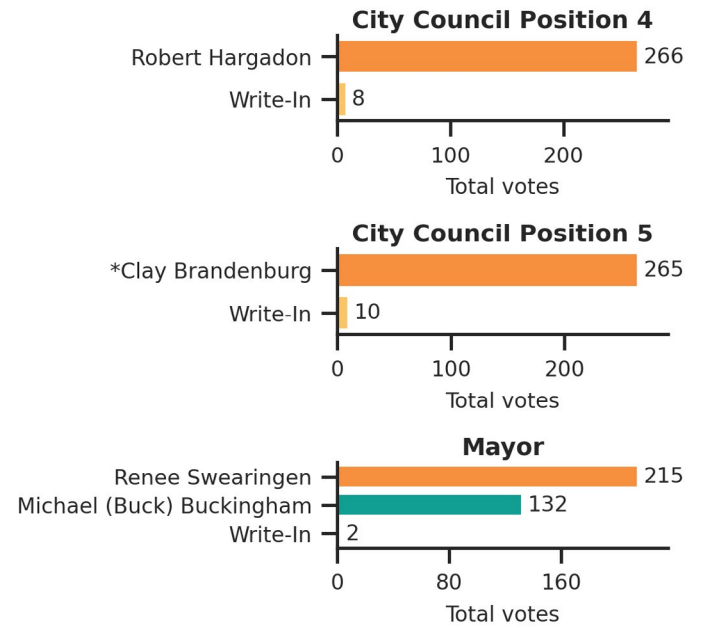
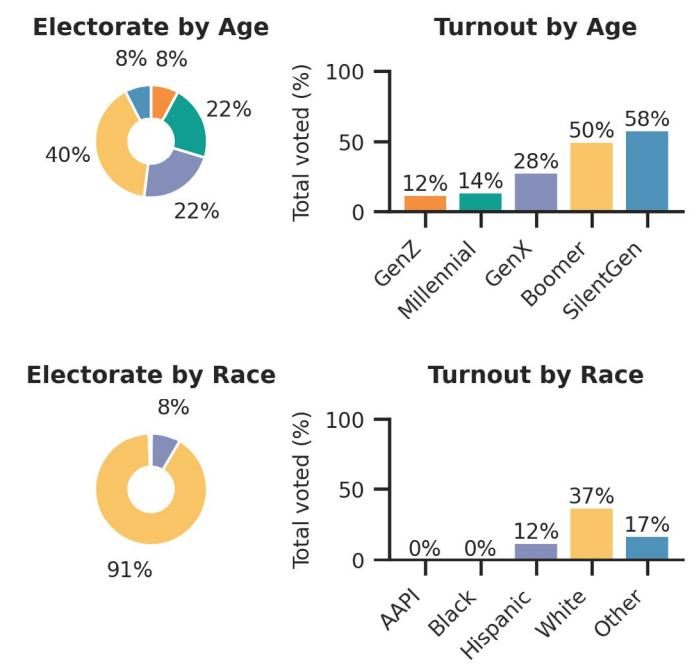


Fig 2 Election results in Entiat for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

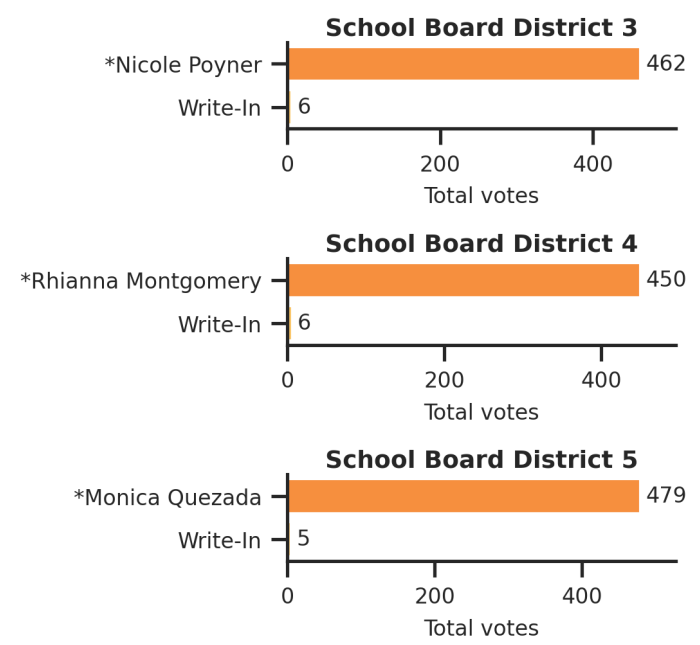

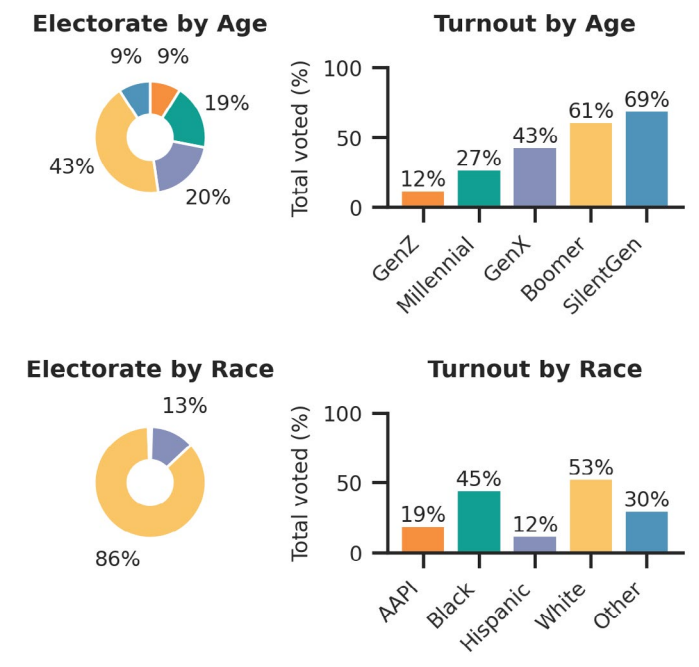


**Fig 2** Election results in Entiat School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

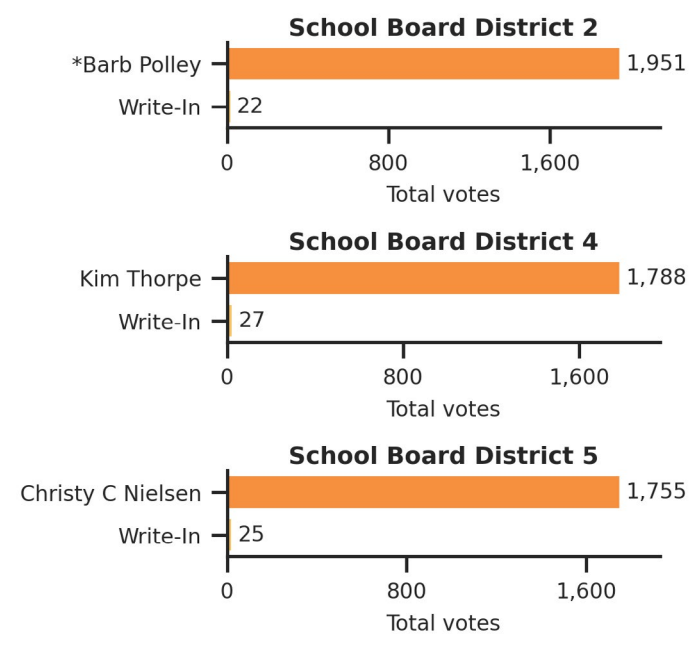

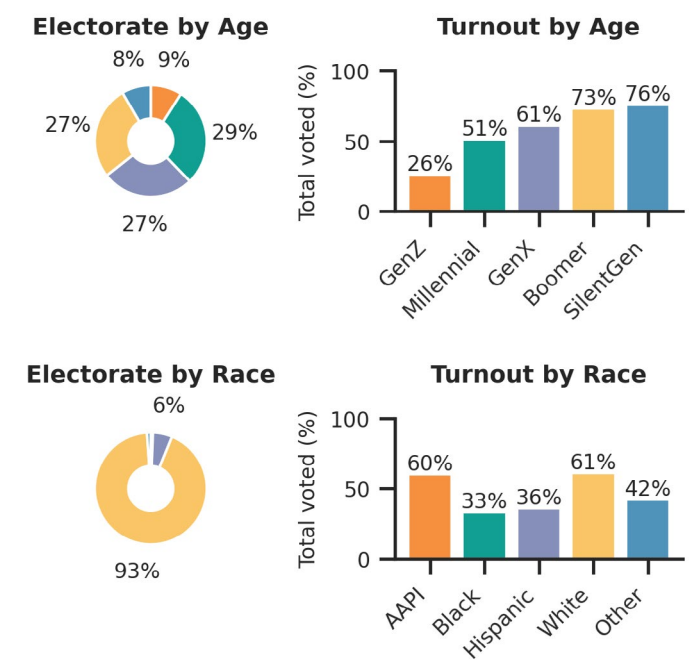
**Fig 2** Election results in Lake Chelan School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

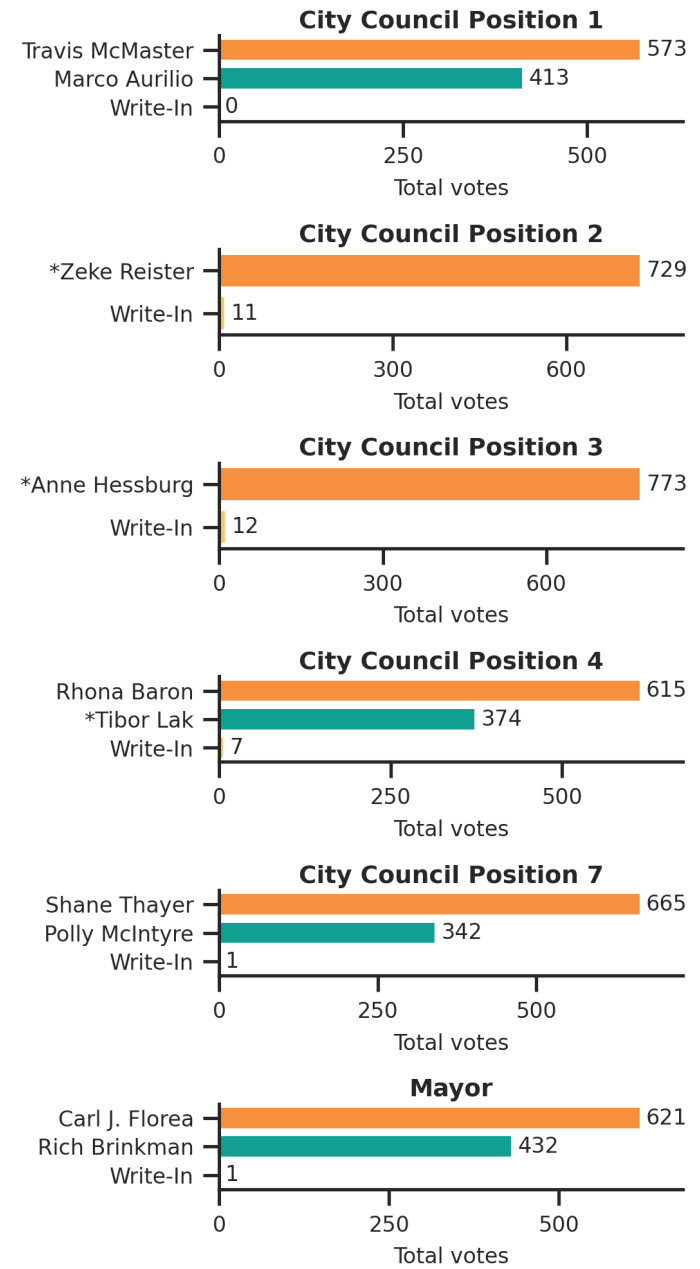


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Leavenworth for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

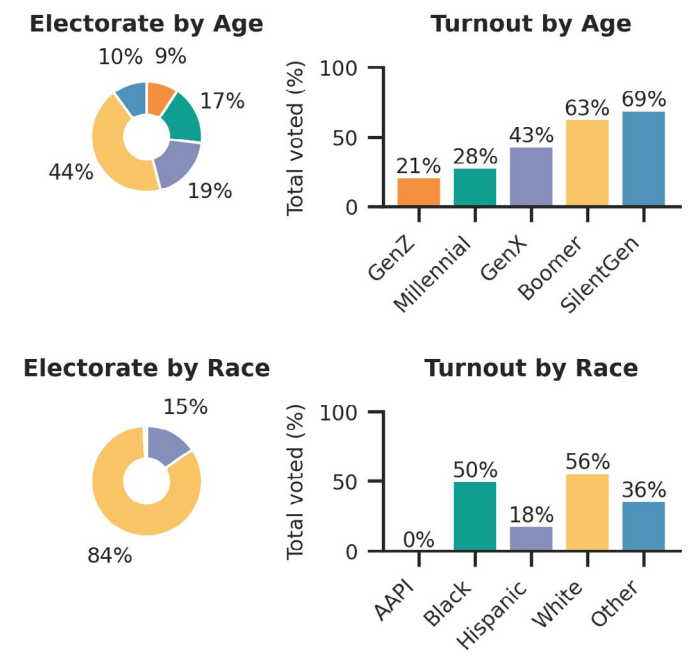


**Fig 2** Election results in Leavenworth for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

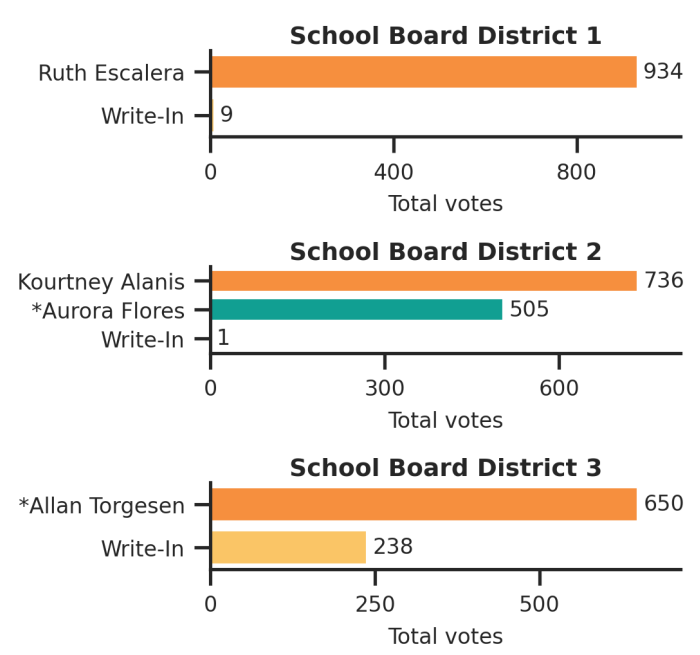

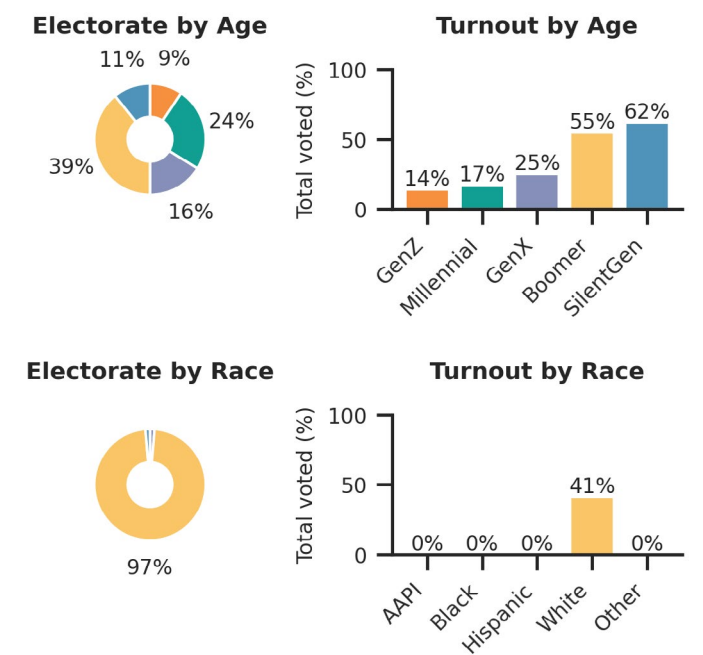

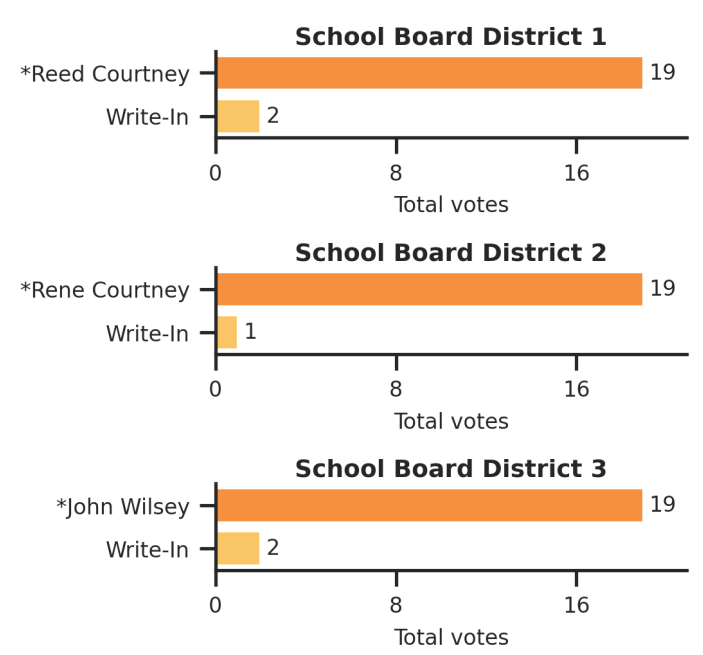

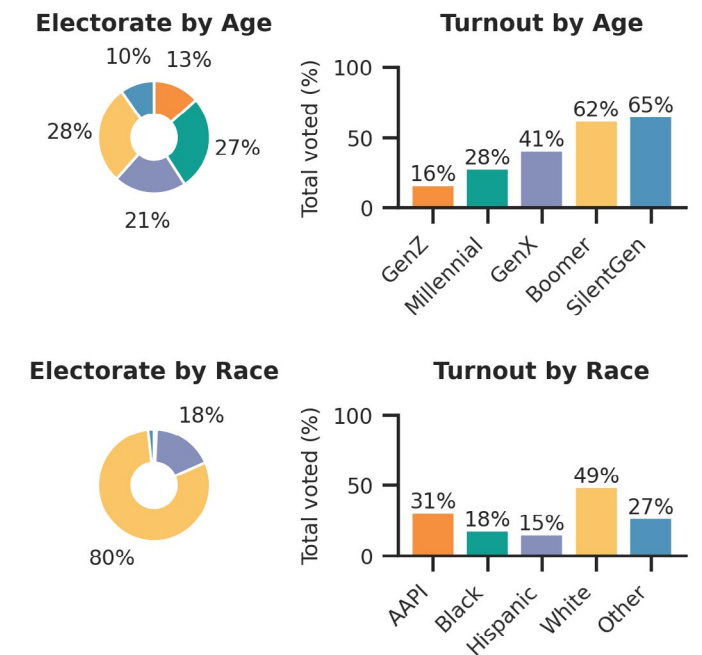

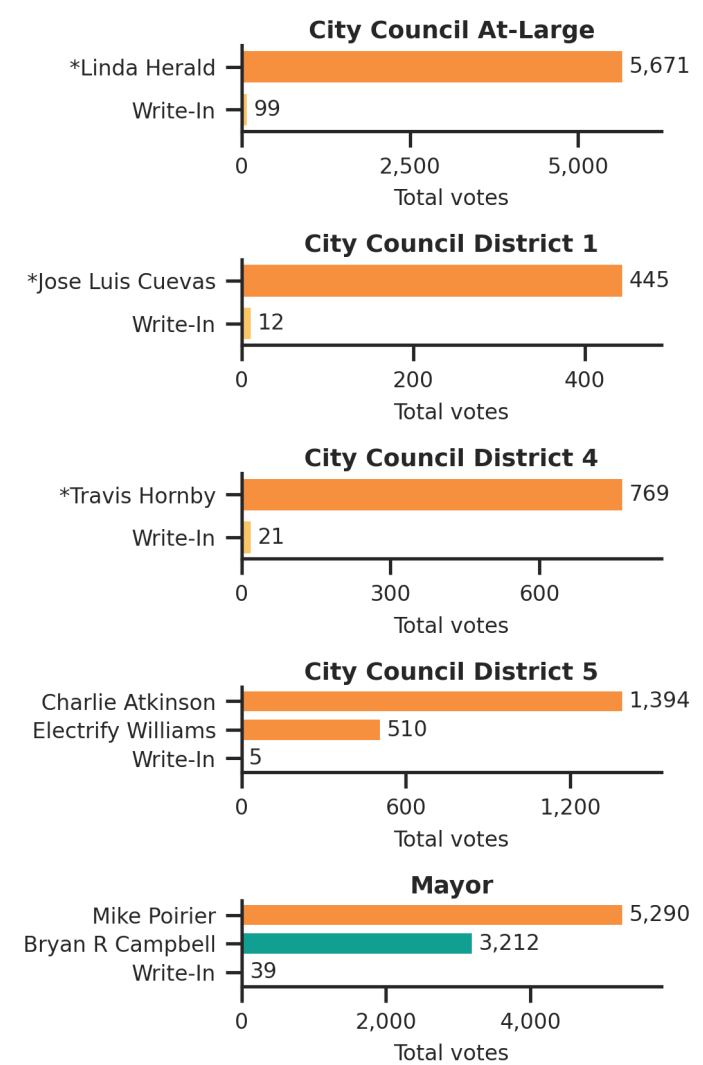


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wenatchee for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

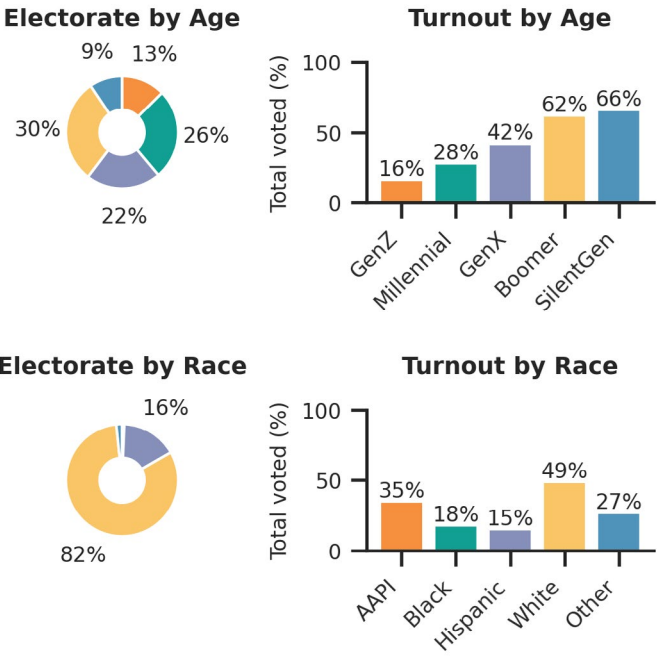
**Fig 2** Election results in Wenatchee for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

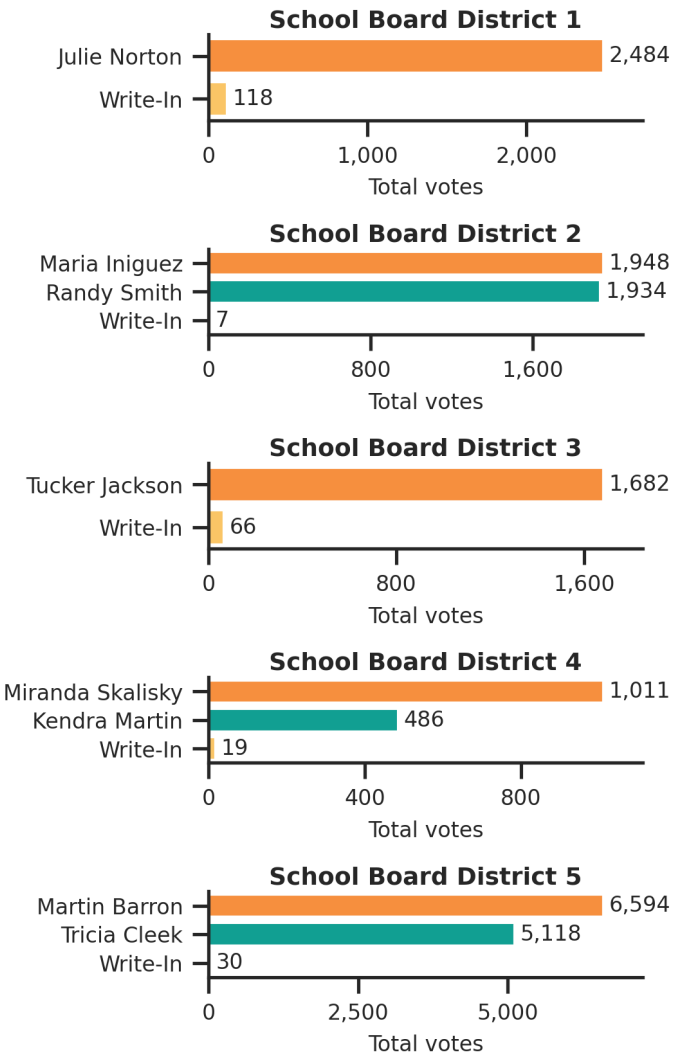


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wenatchee School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

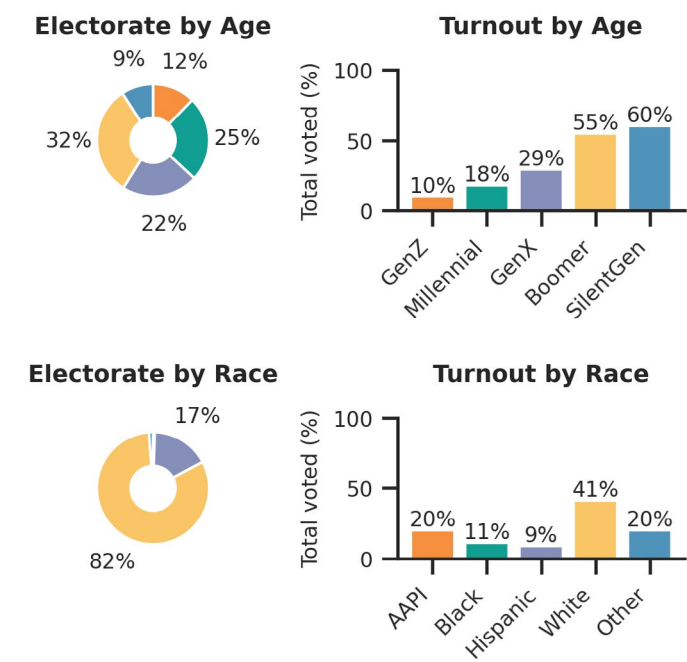


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Douglas County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

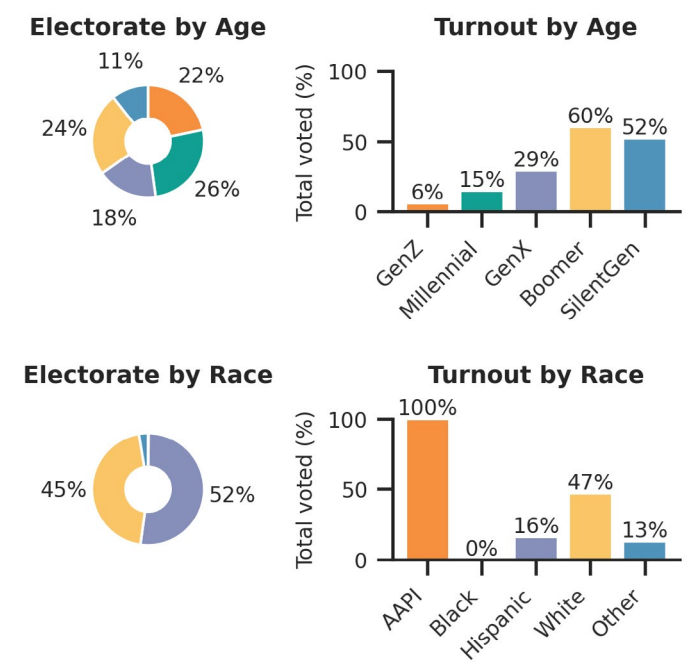


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bridgeport for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

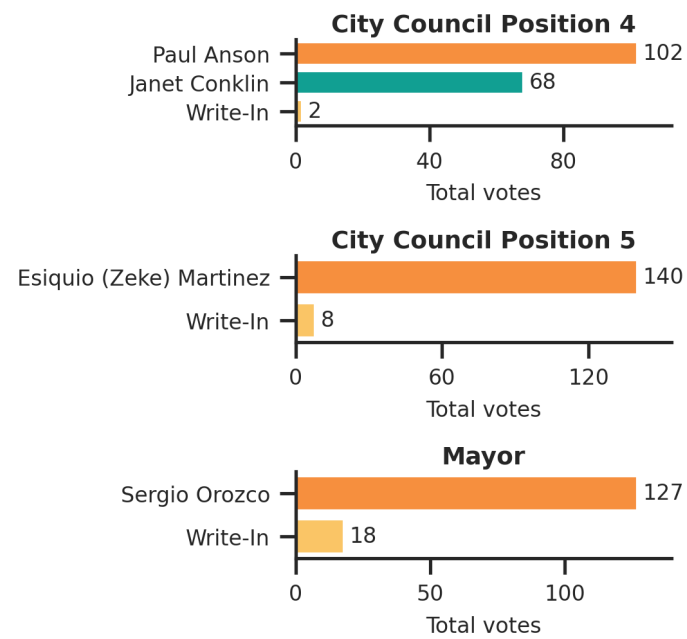
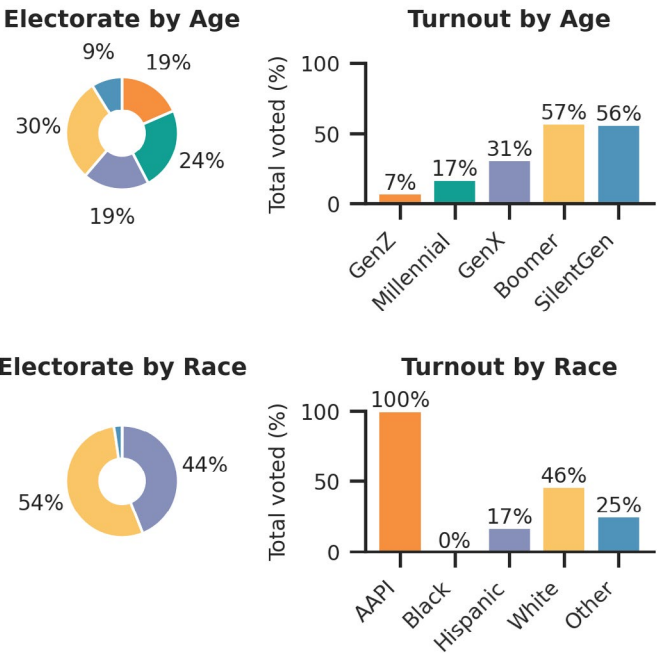


Fig 2 Election results in Bridgeport for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

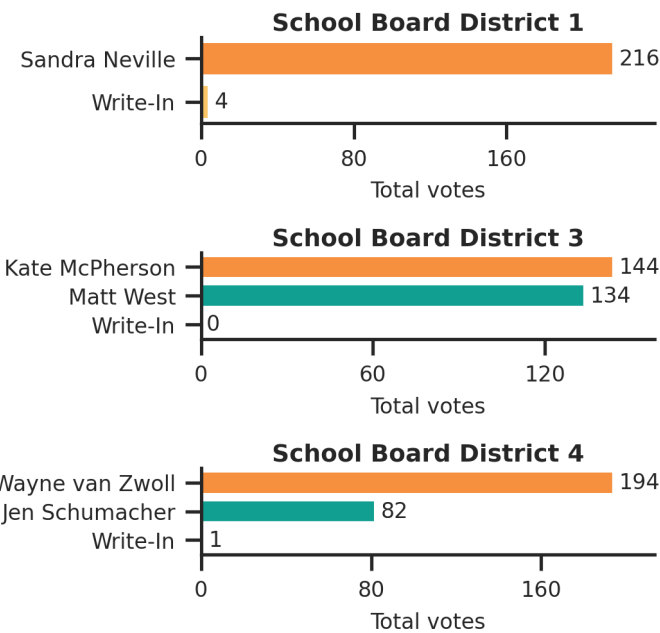

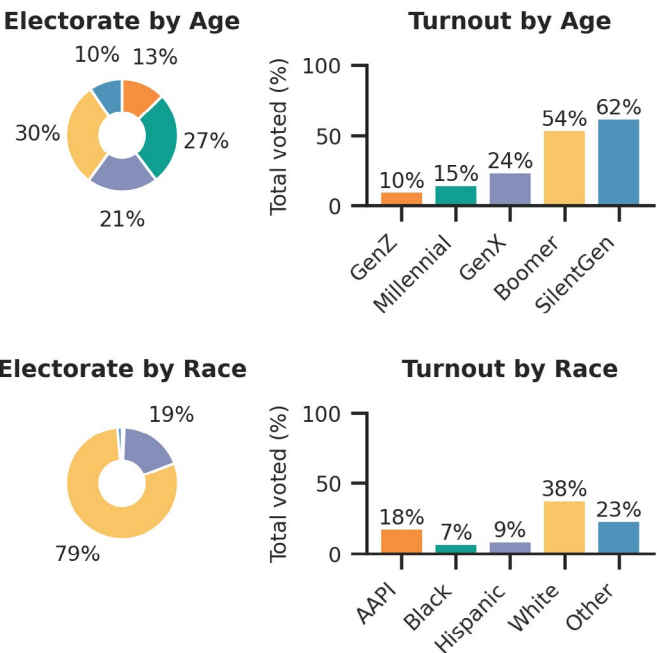

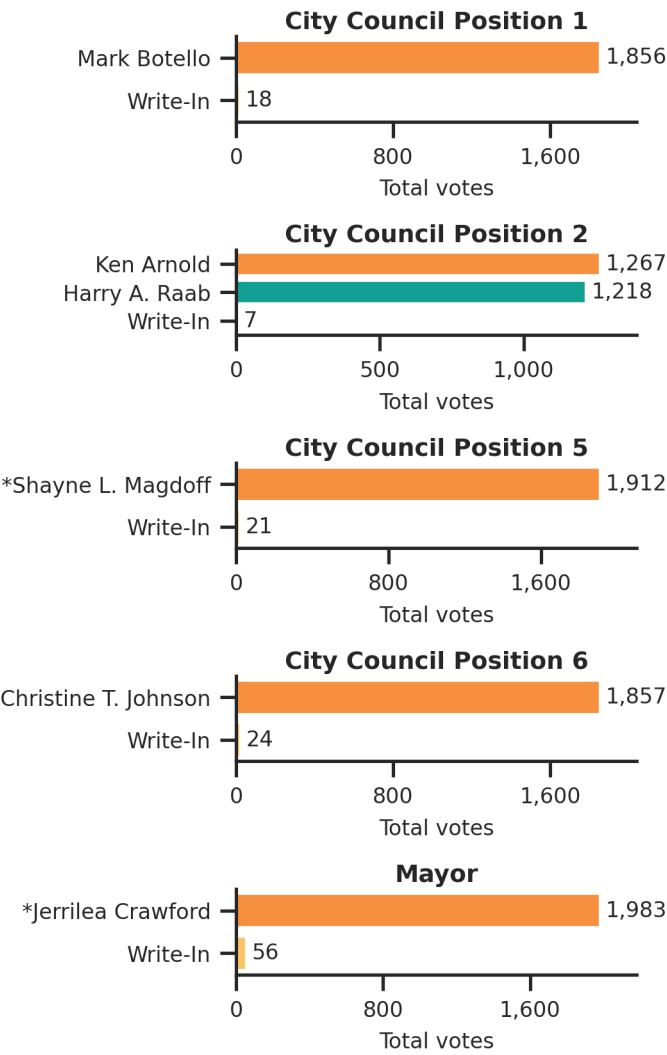


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in East Wenatchee for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

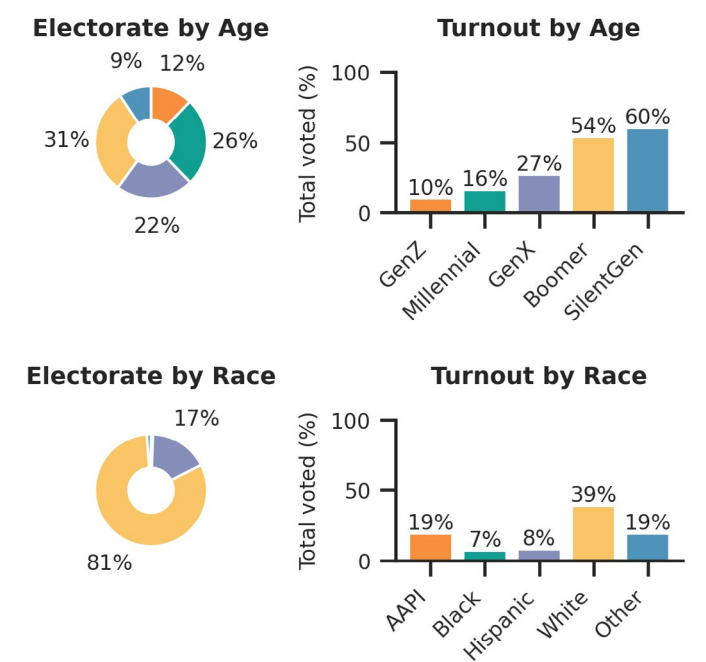

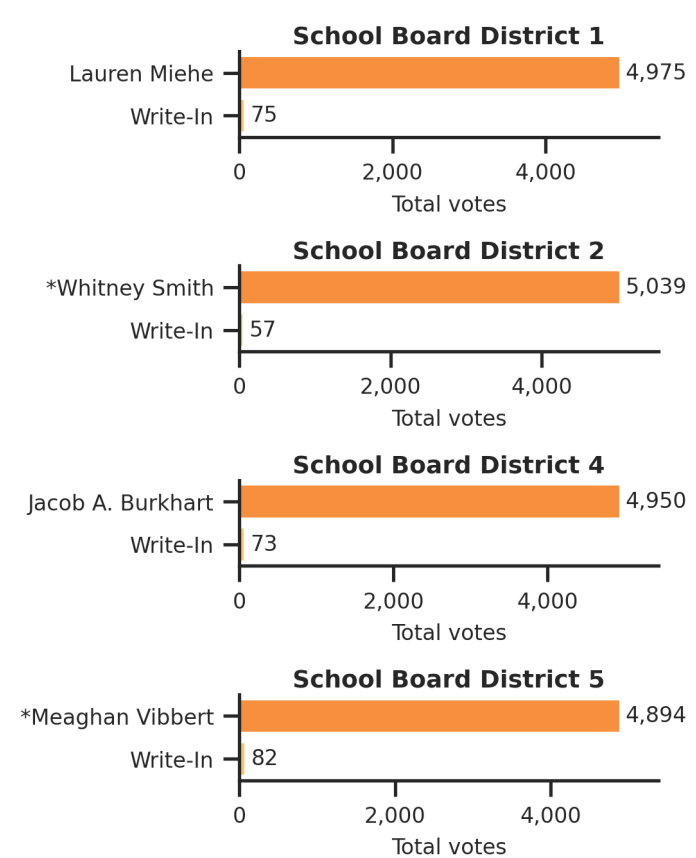

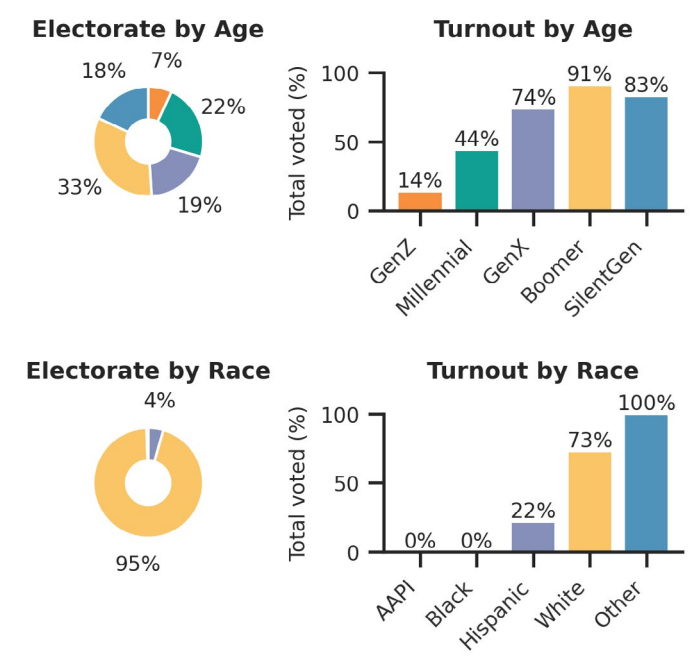

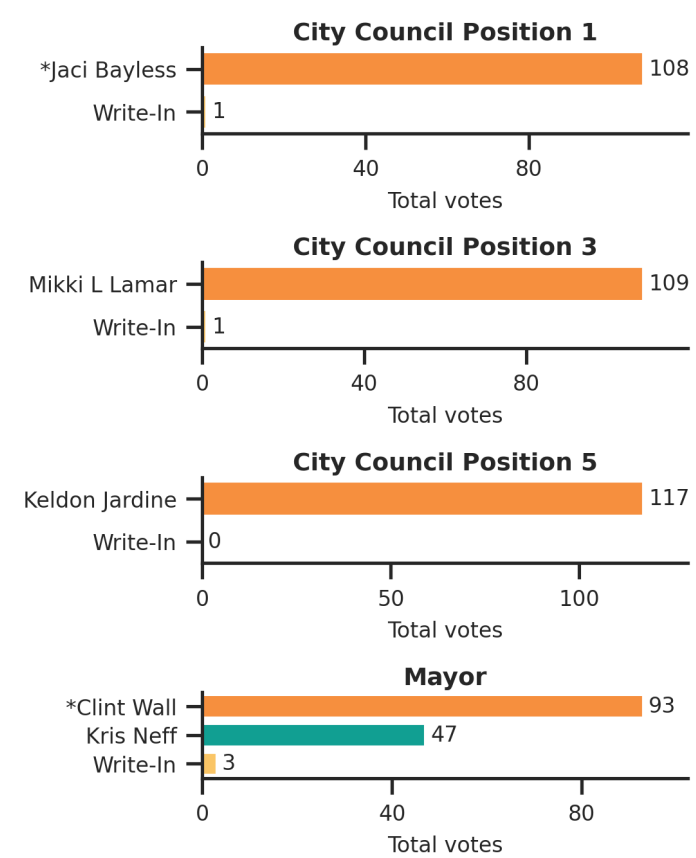

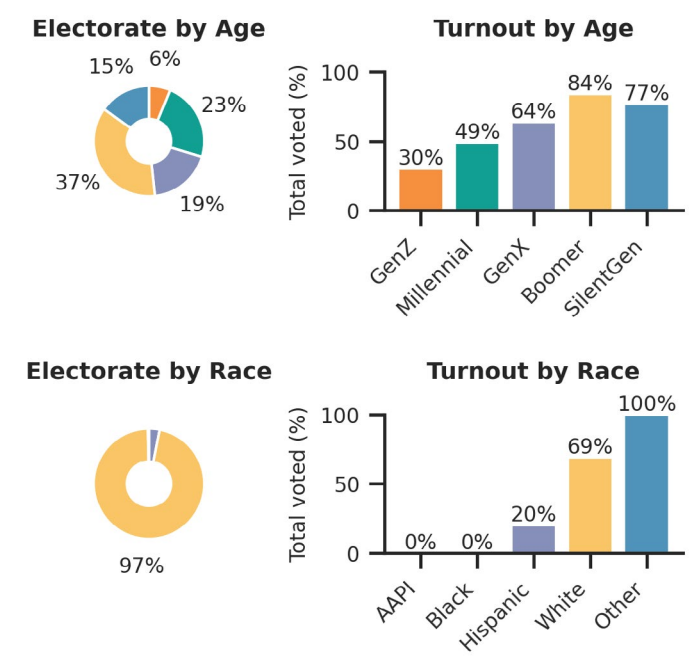
**Fig 2** Election results in Mansfield for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

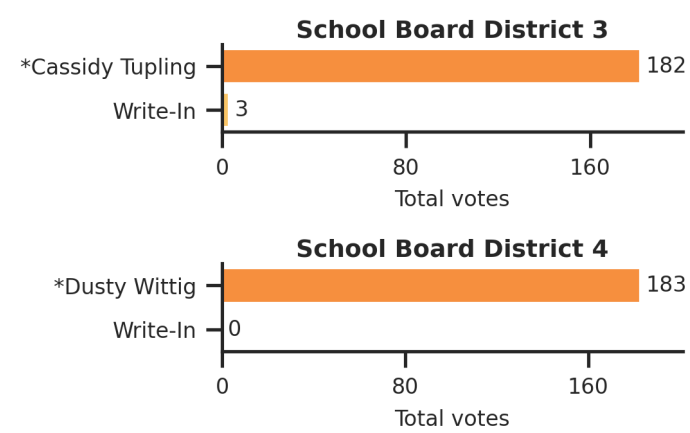

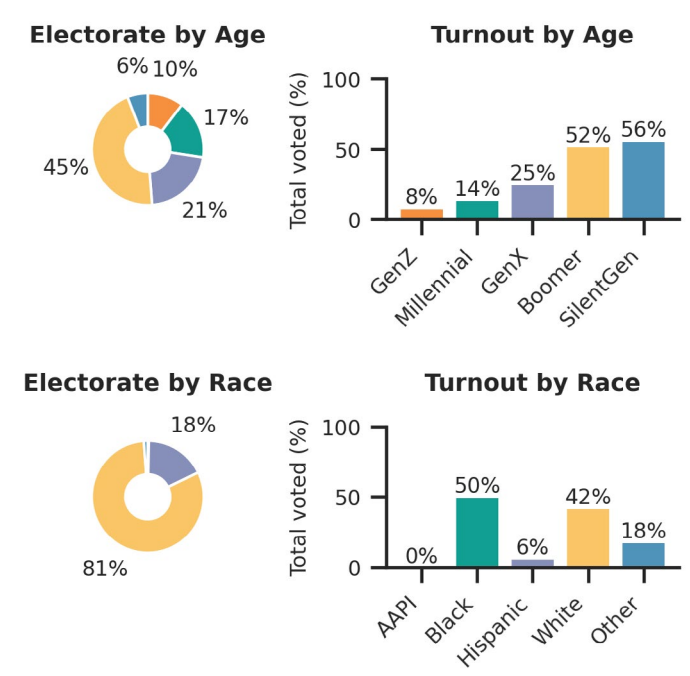


**Fig 2** Election results in Mansfield School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

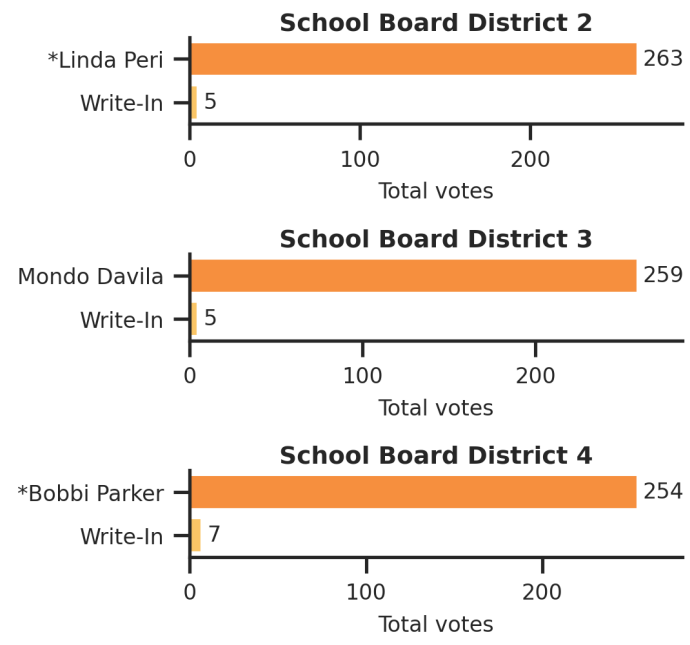

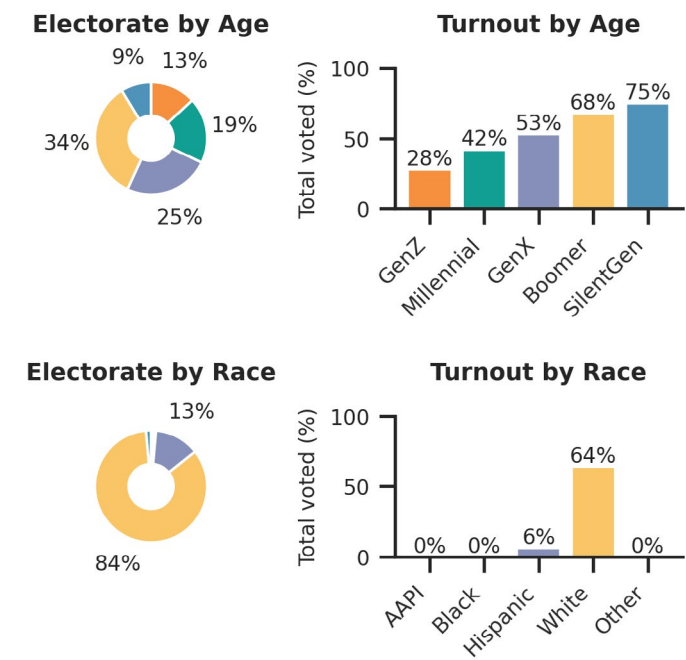


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Palisades School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

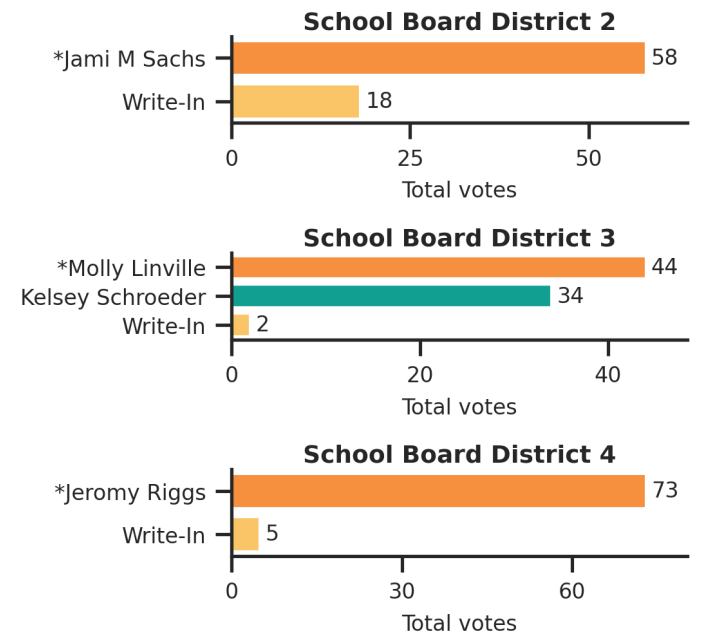


Fig 2 Election results in Palisades School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

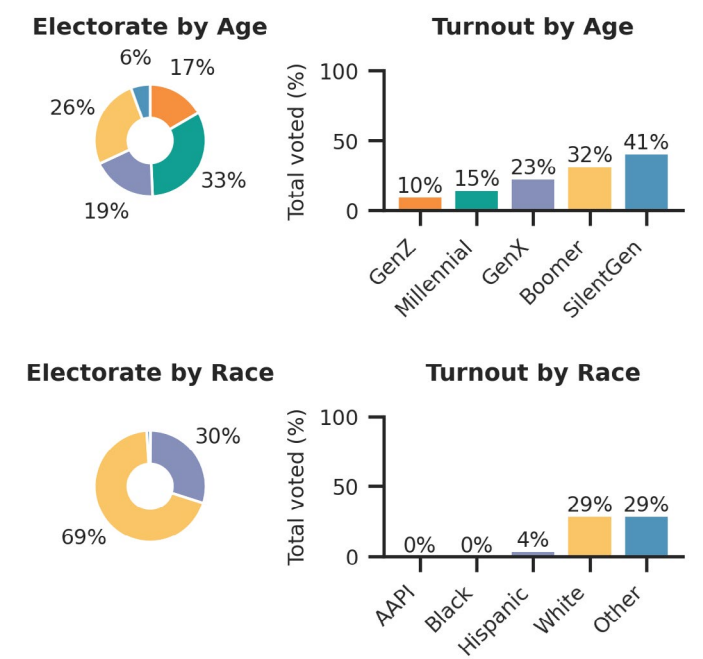


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rock Island for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

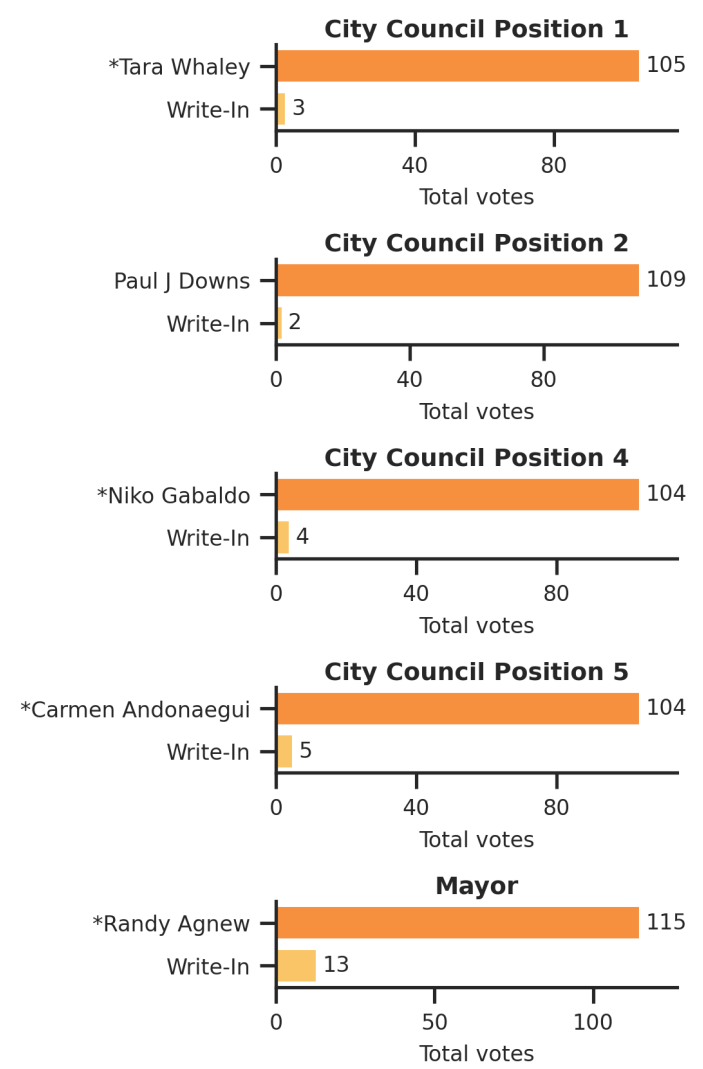
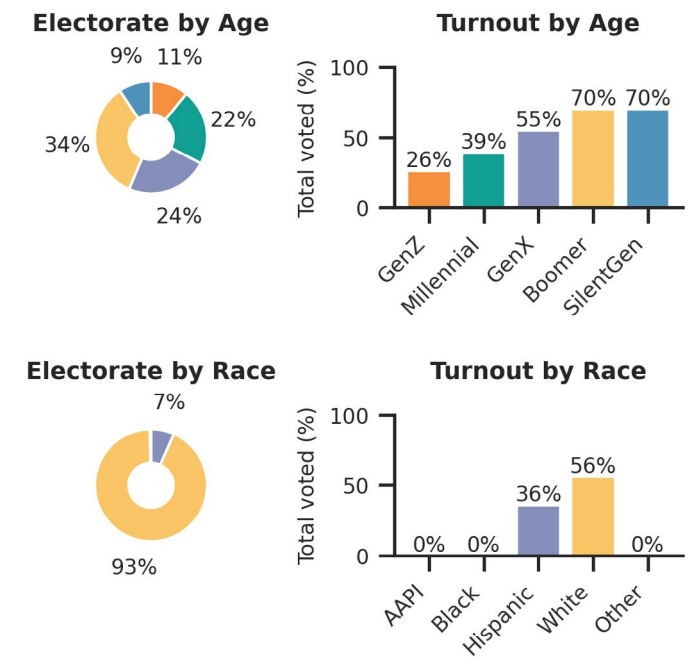


Fig 2 Election results in Rock Island for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

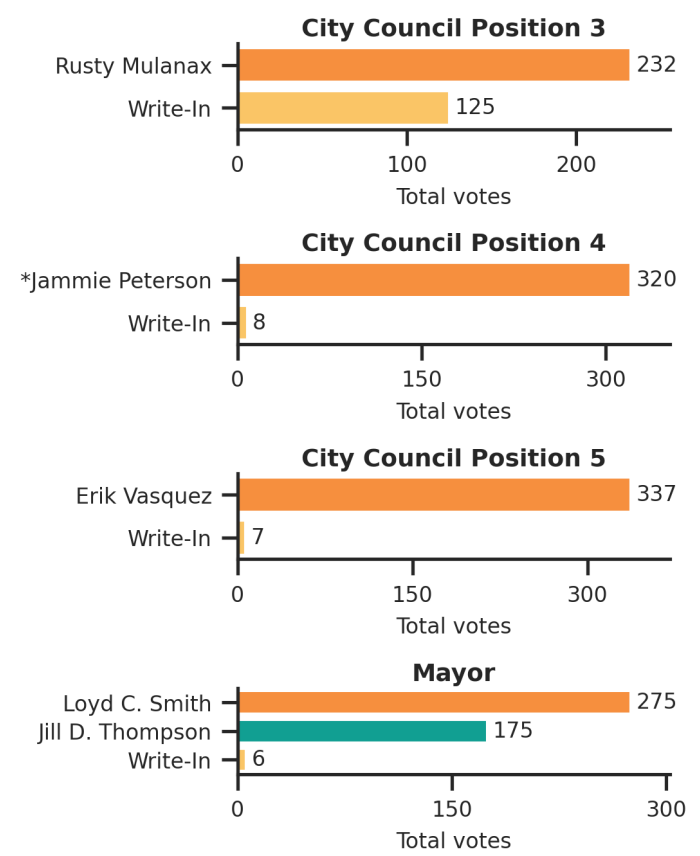

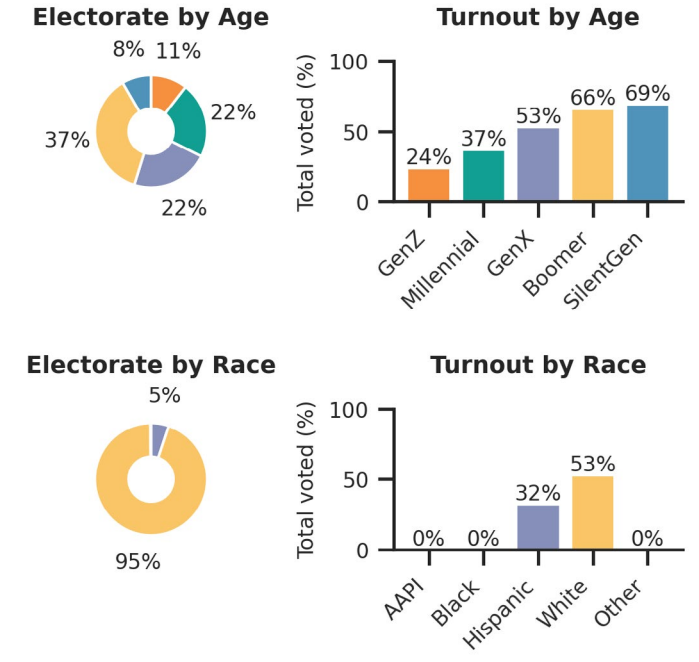

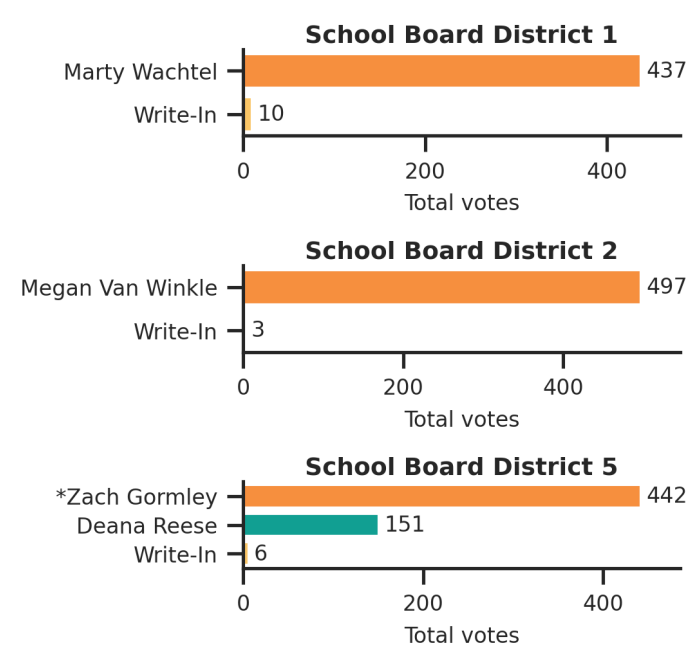

**Fig 2** Election results in Waterville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

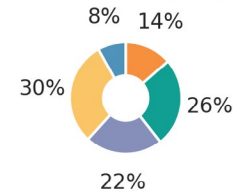

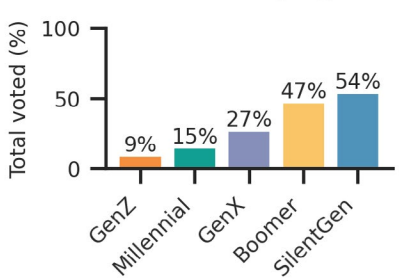

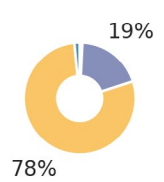

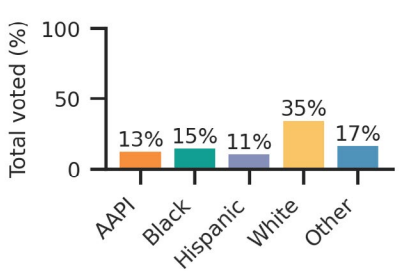

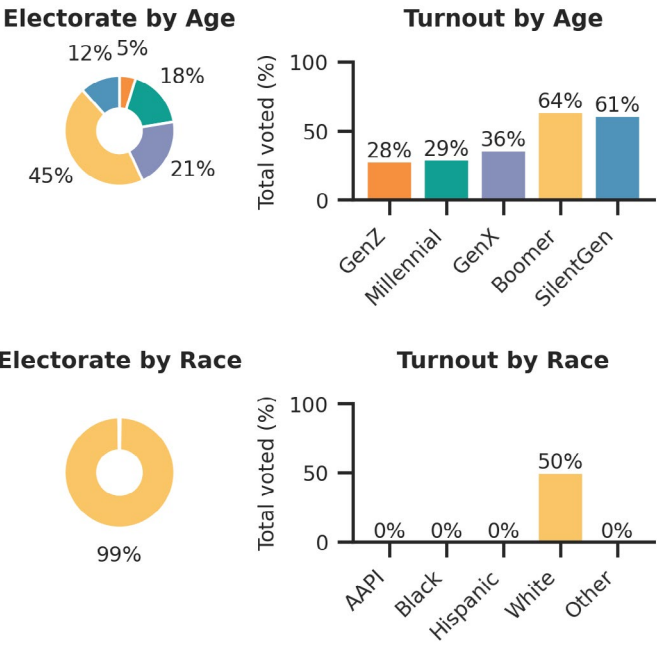


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Coulee City for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

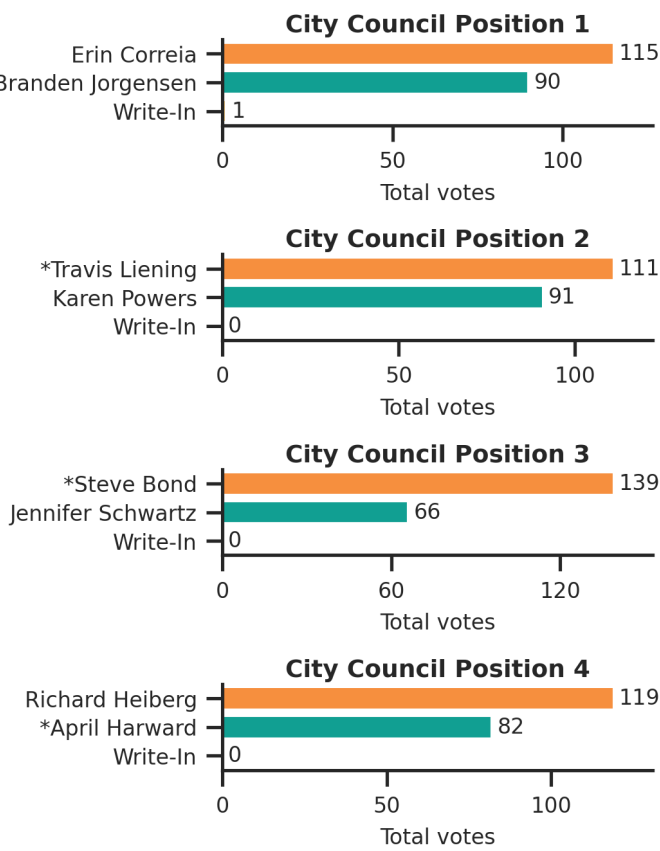


Fig 2 Election results in Coulee City for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

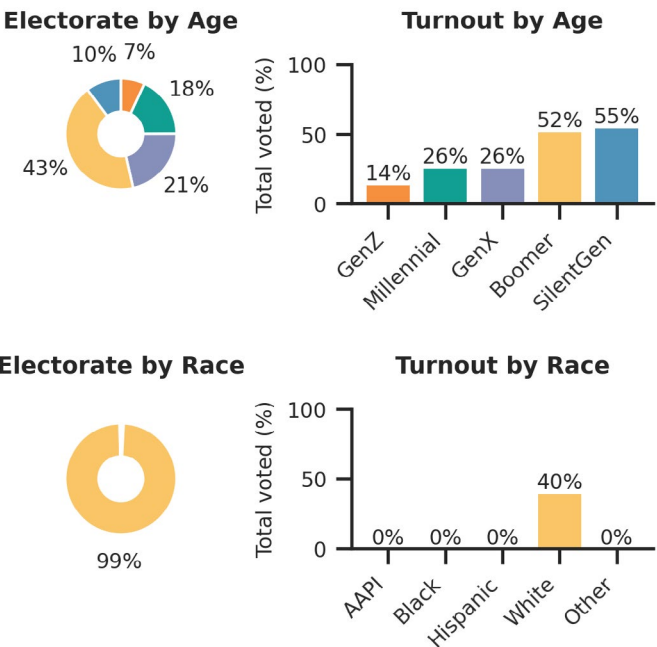


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Coulee-Hartline School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

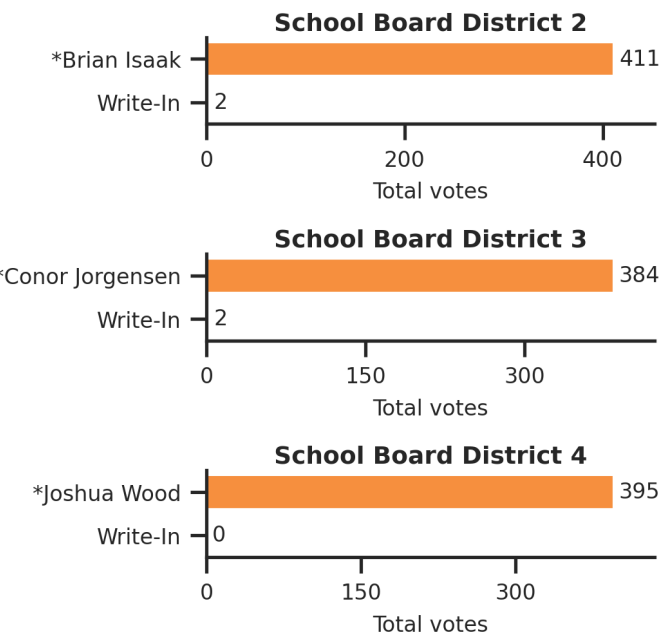
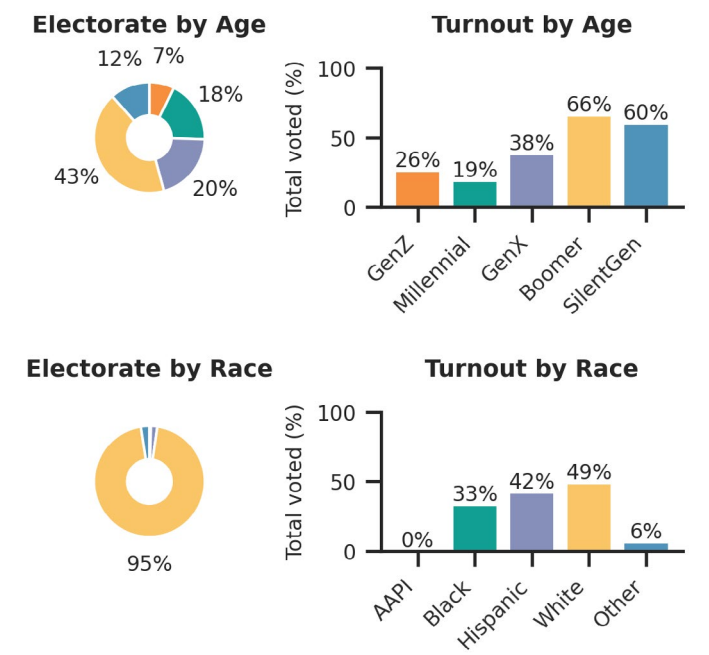


Fig 2 Election results in Coulee-Hartline School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

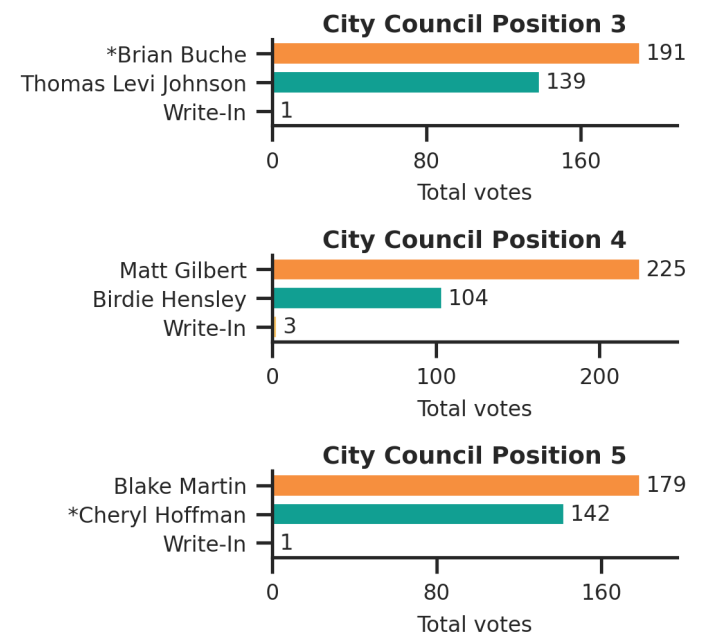

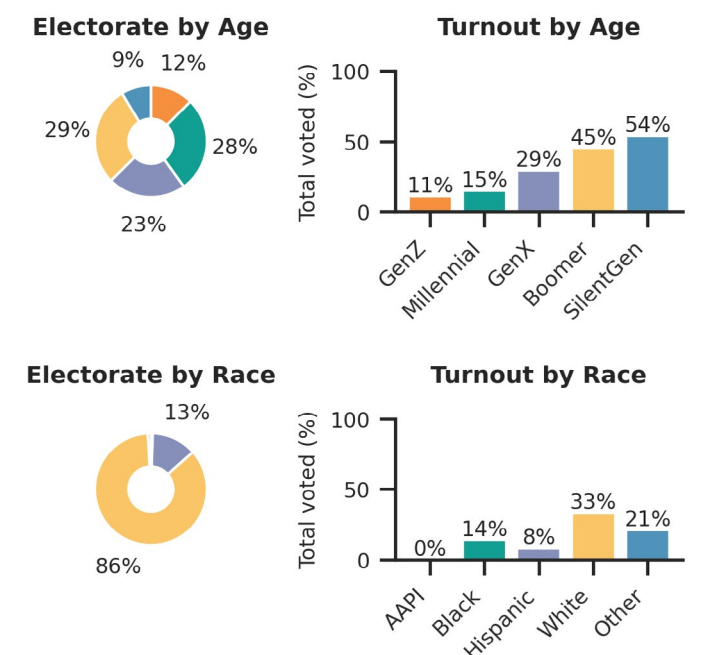


**Fig 2** Election results in Electric City for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

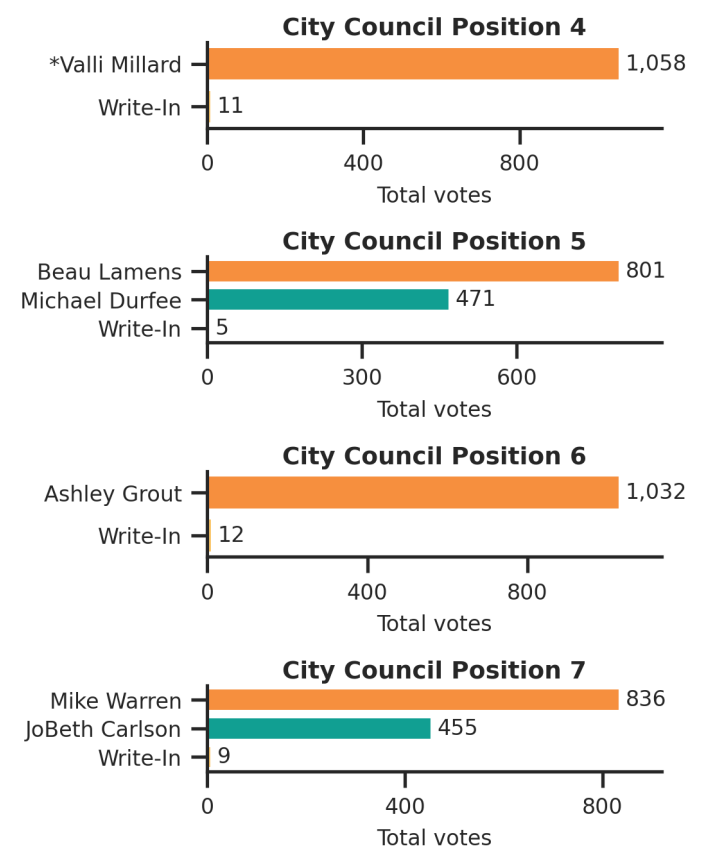

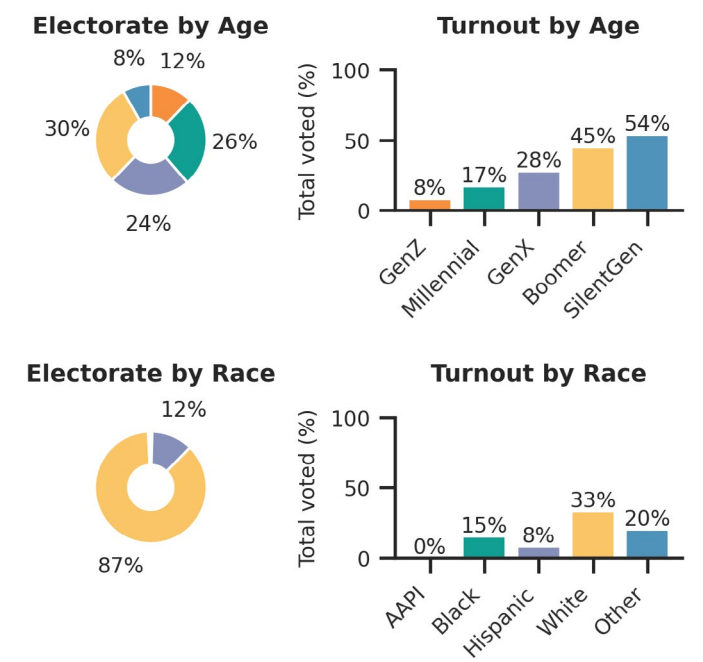


**Fig 2** Election results in Ephrata for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

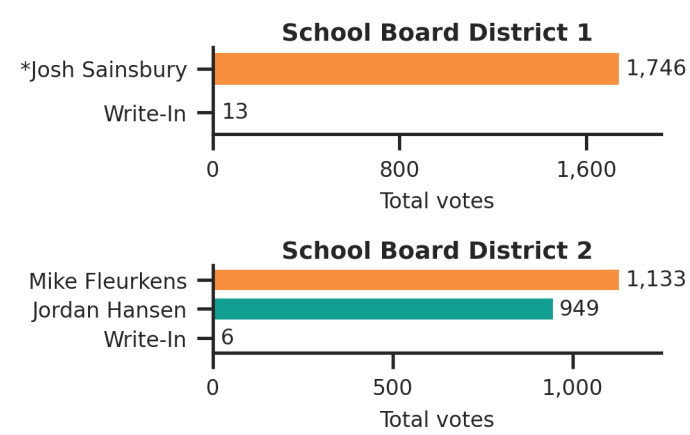

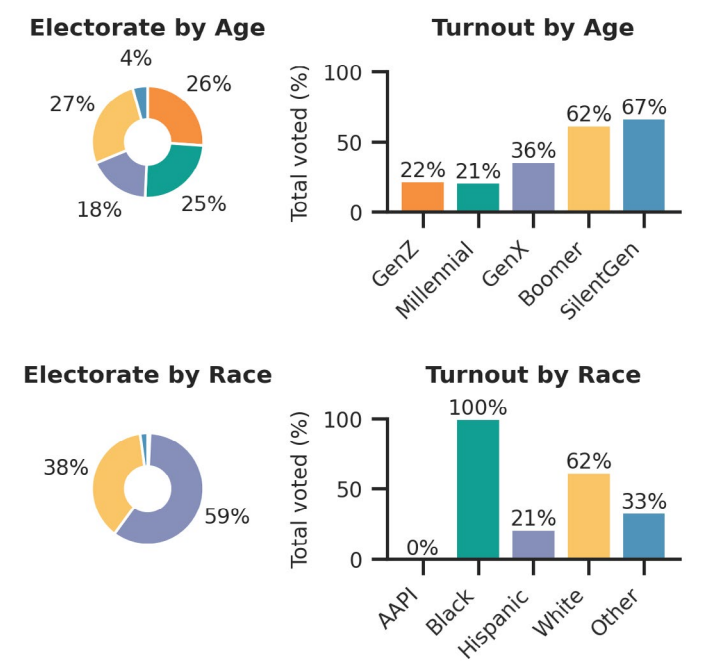

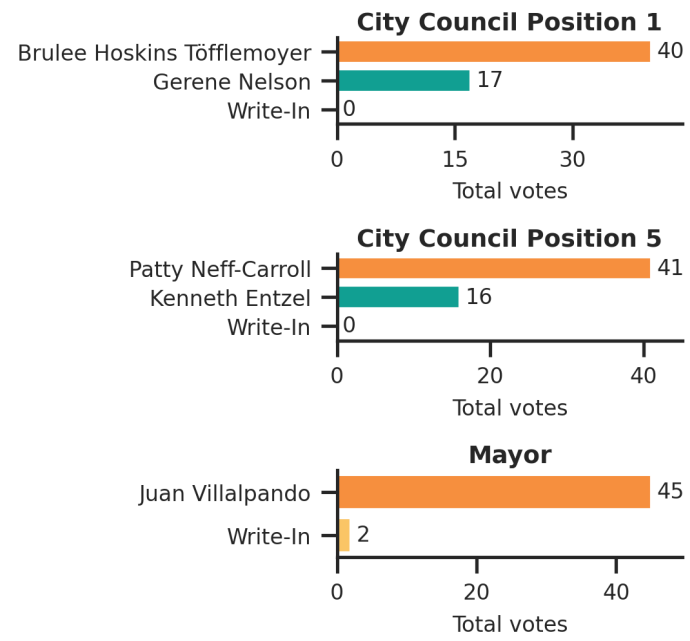

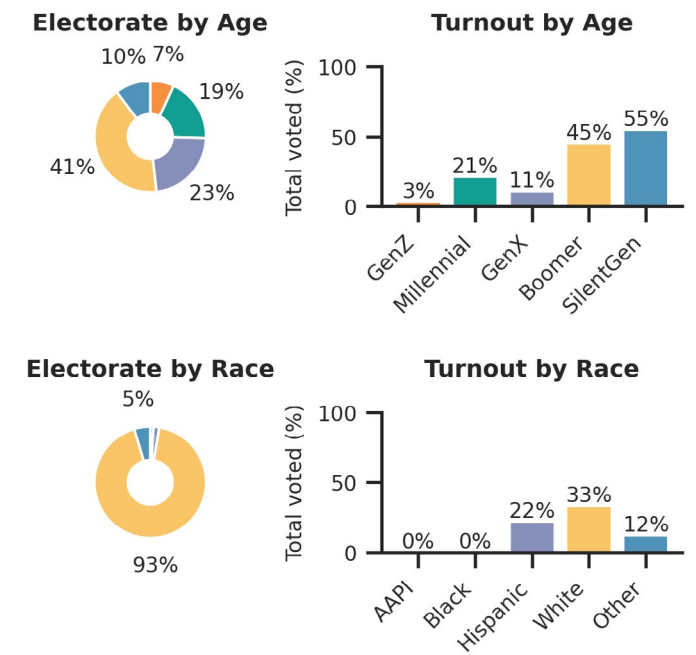


**Fig 2** Election results in George for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

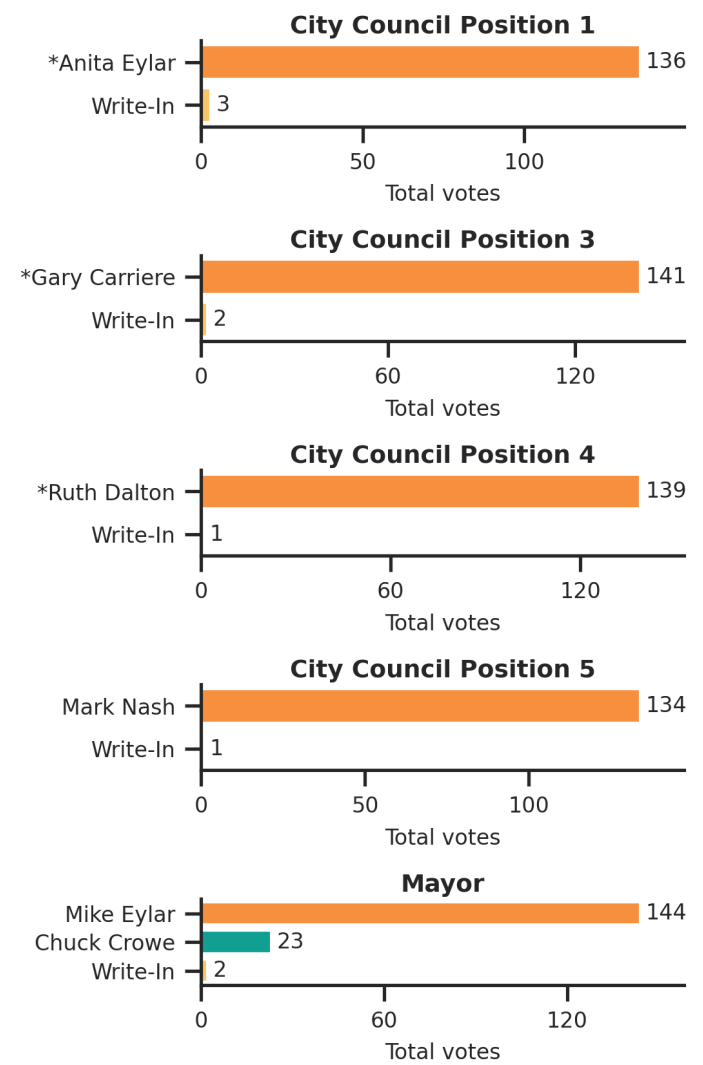


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Grand Coulee for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

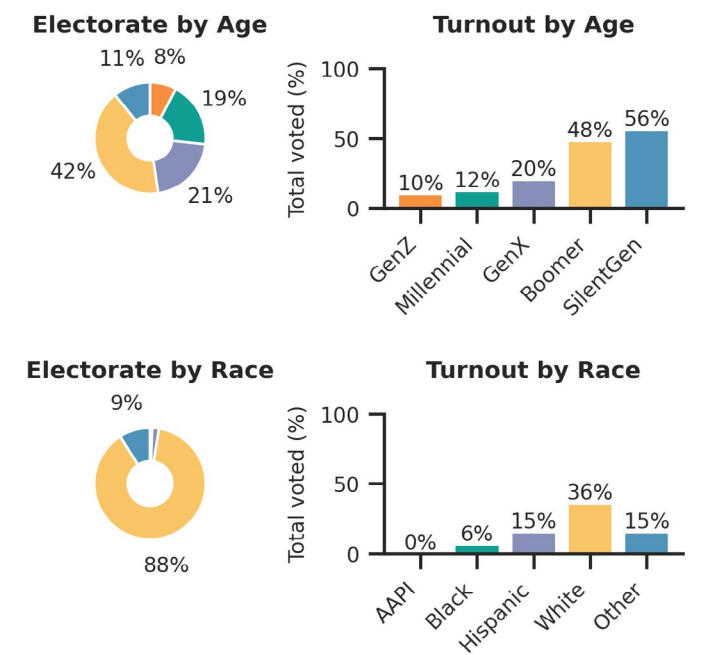


**Fig 2** Election results in Grand Coulee for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

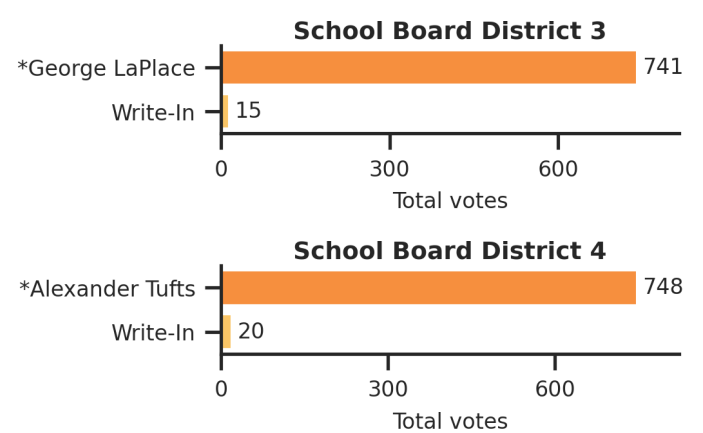

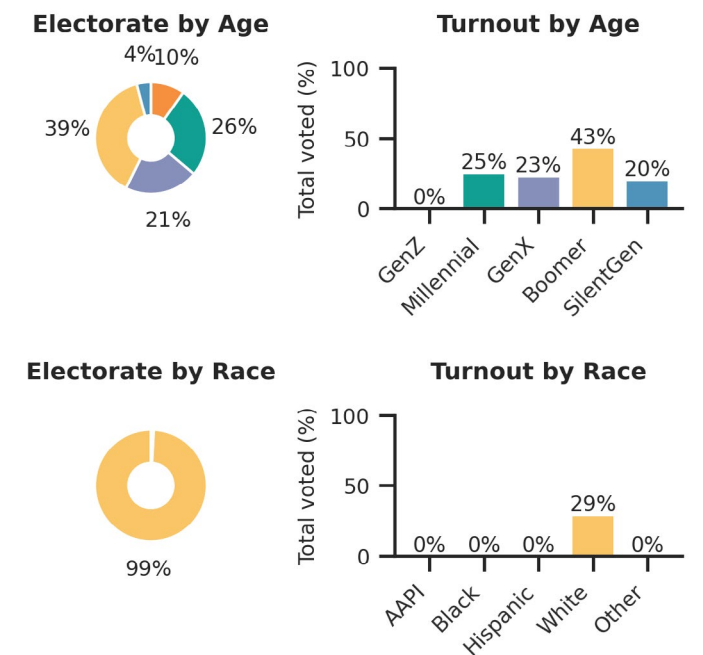


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Hartline for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

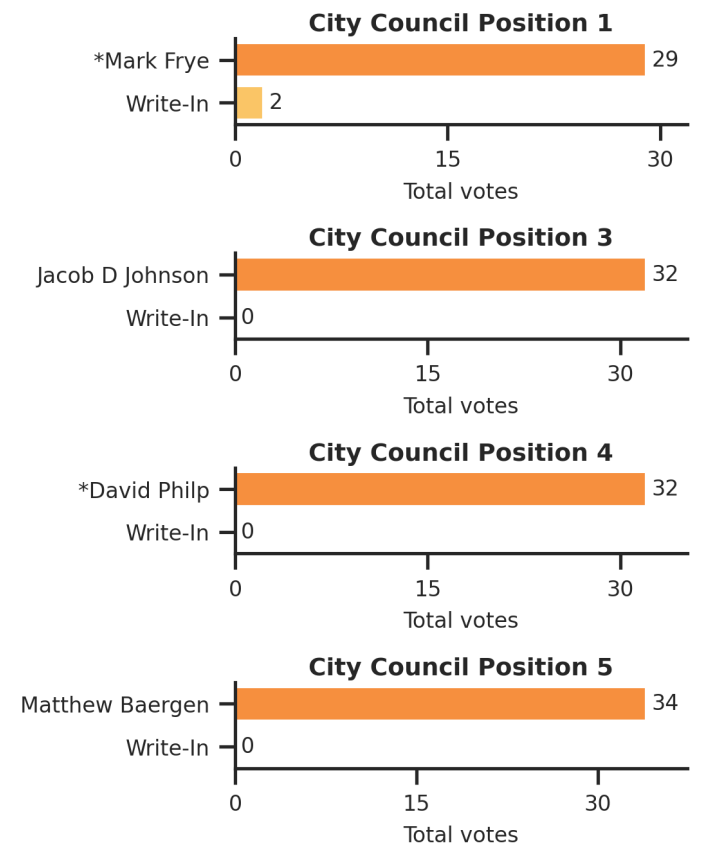


Fig 2 Election results in Hartline for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

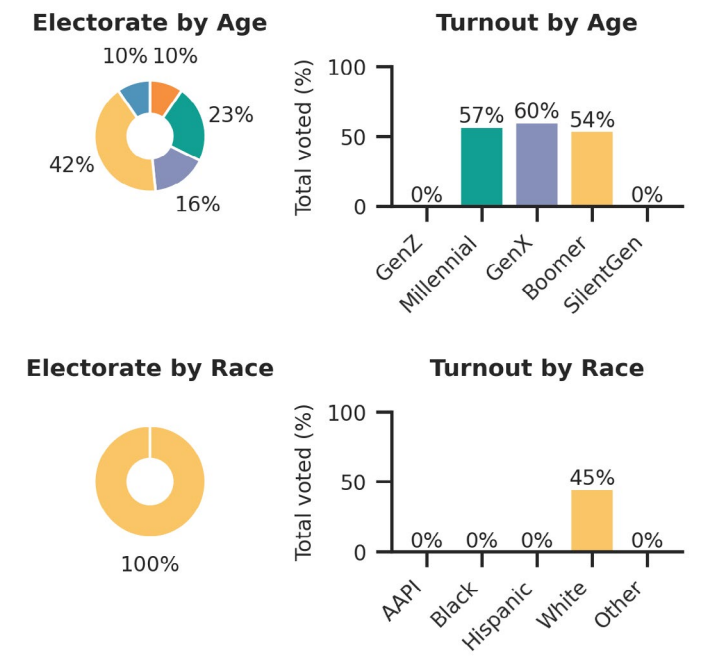


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Krupp for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

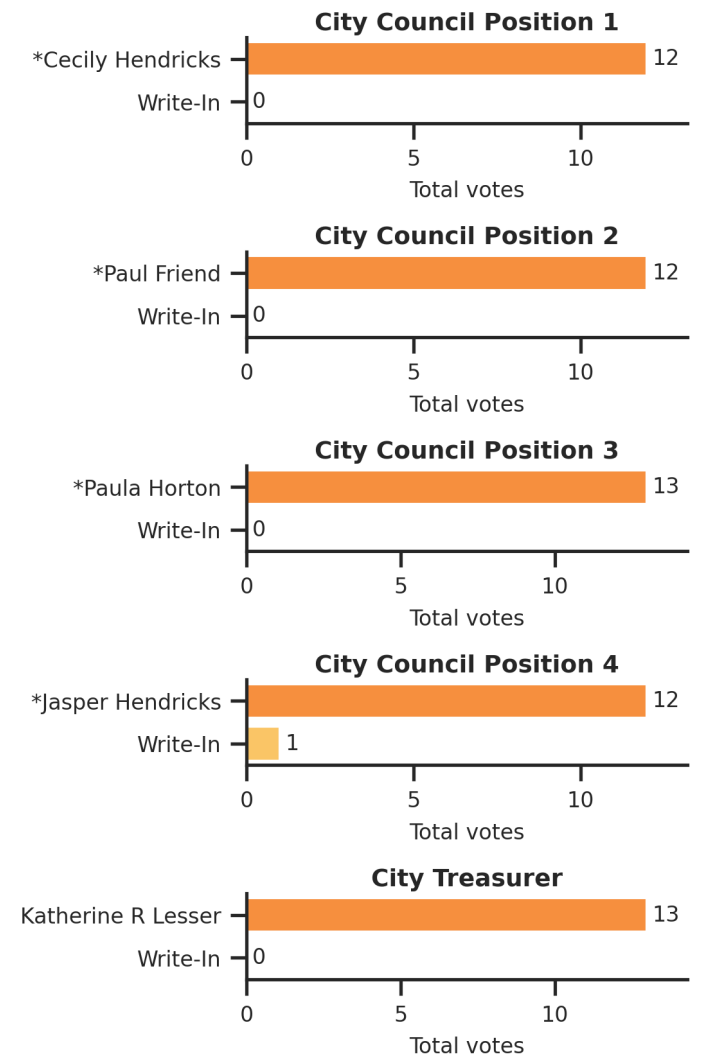


Fig 2 Election results in Krupp for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

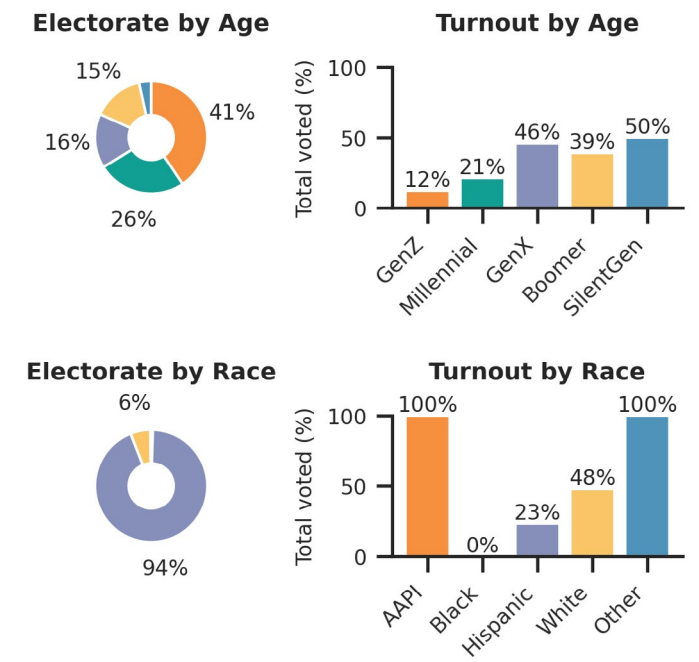


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mattawa for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

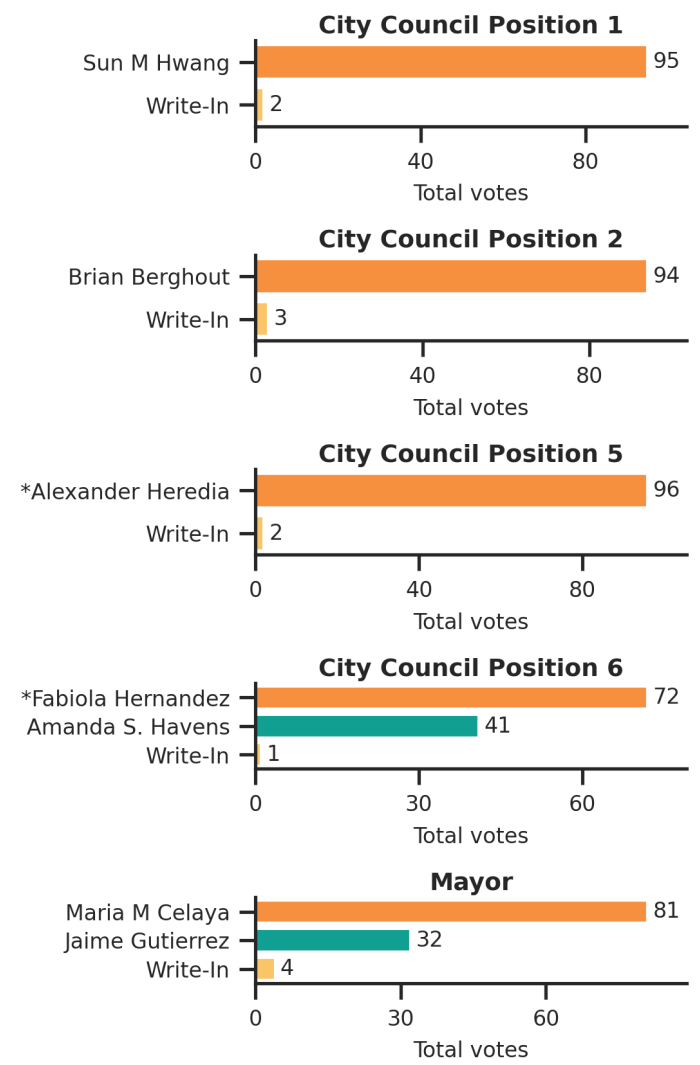


Fig 2 Election results in Mattawa for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

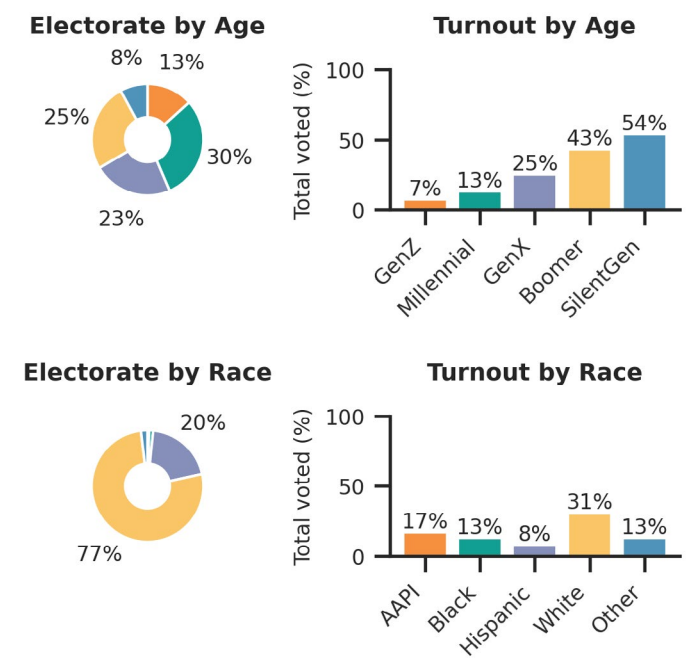


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Moses Lake for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

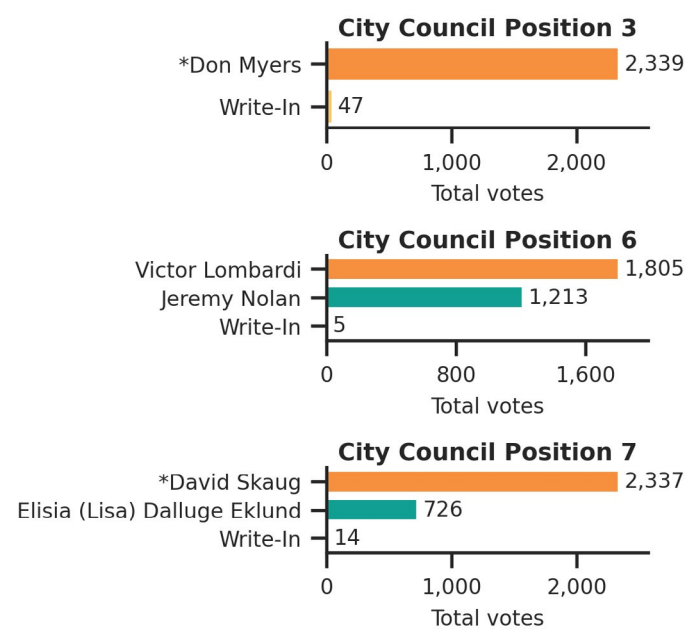
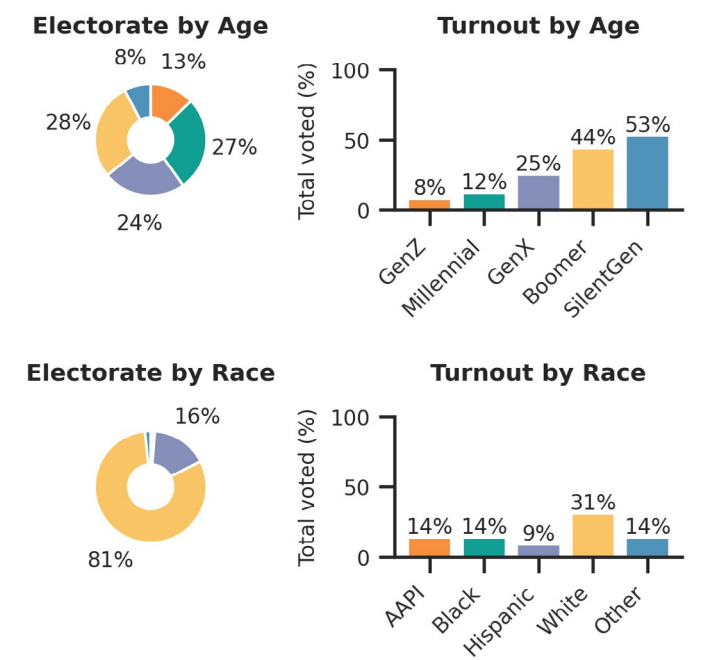


Fig 2 Election results in Moses Lake for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

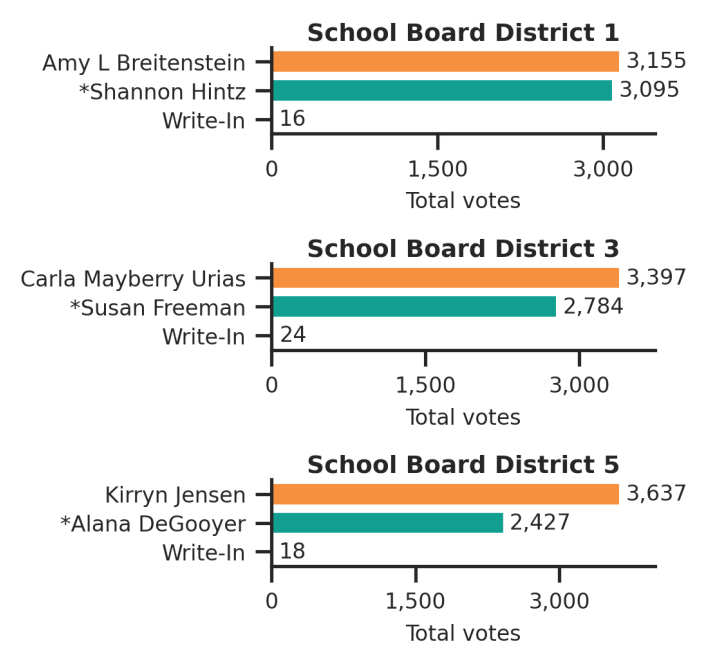

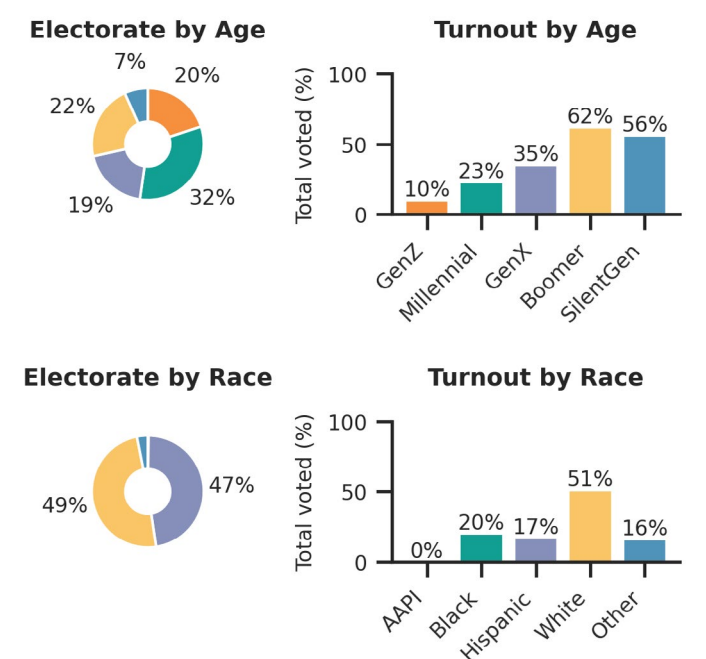

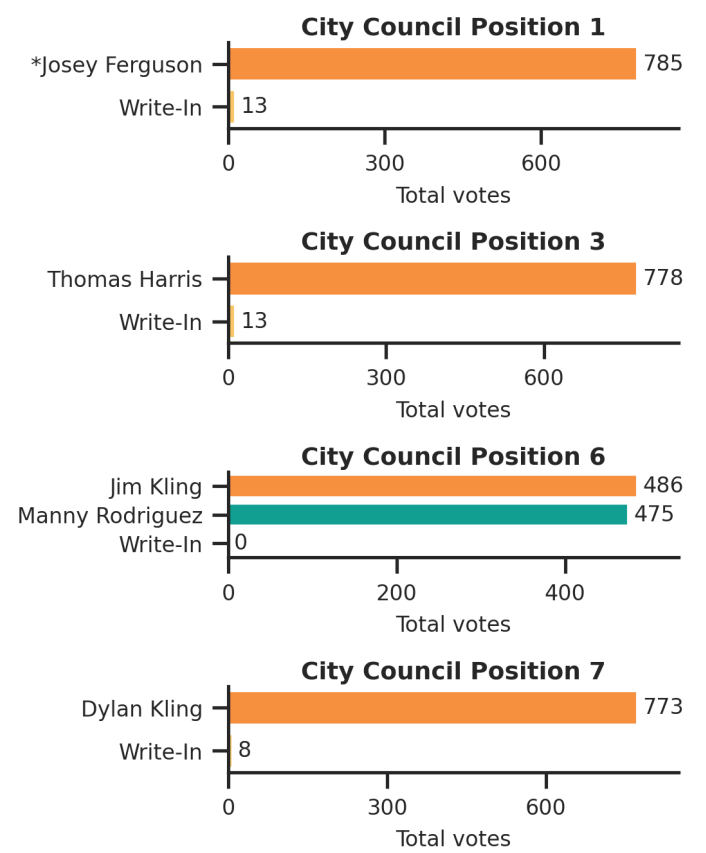

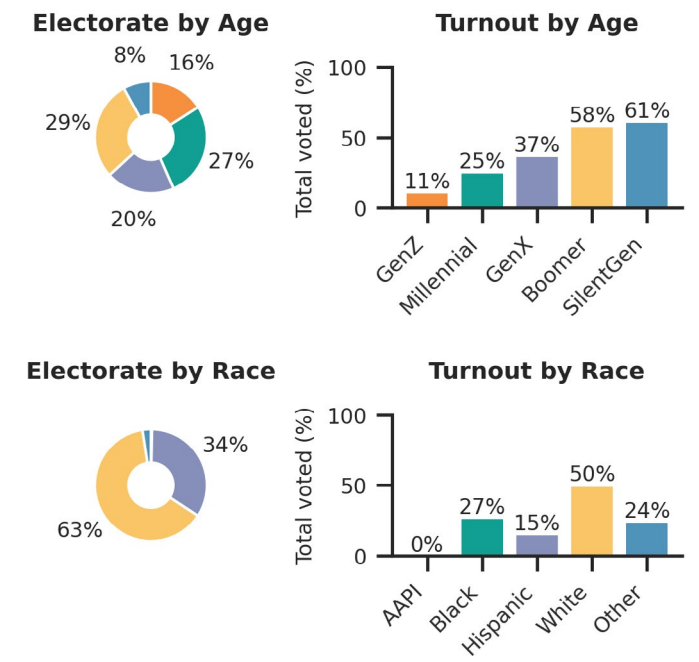

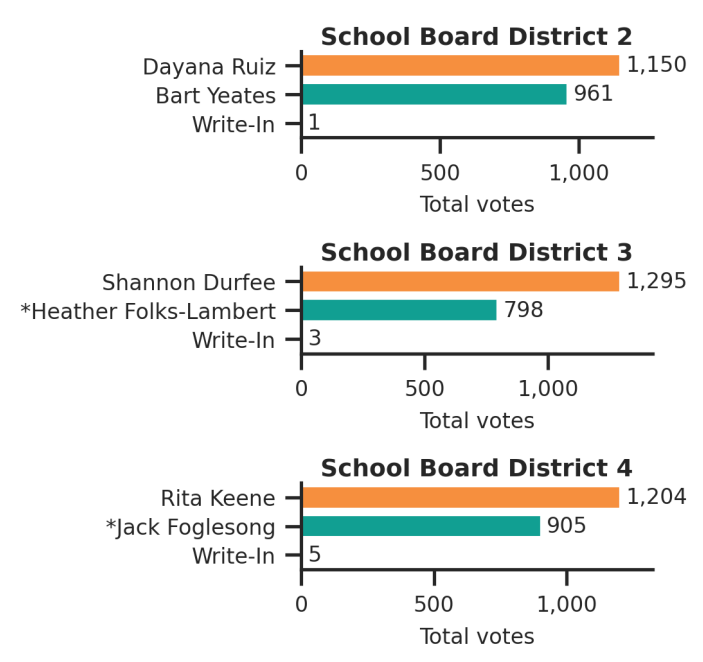

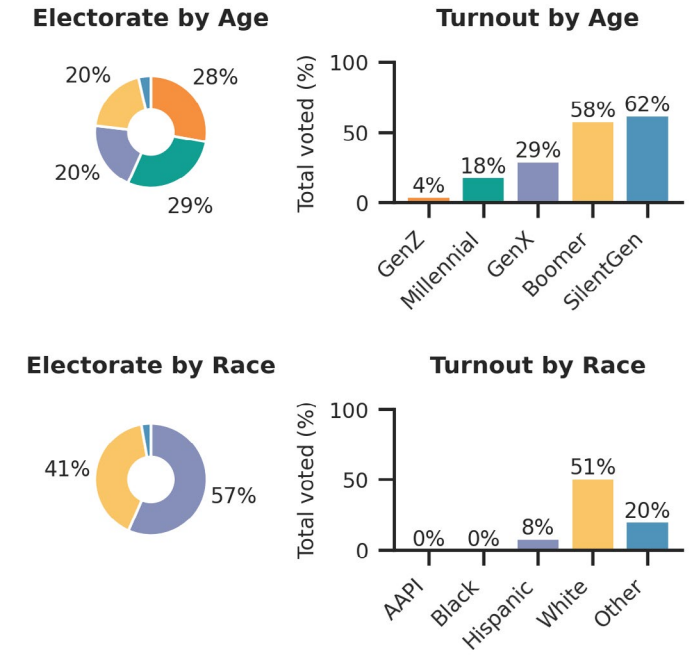

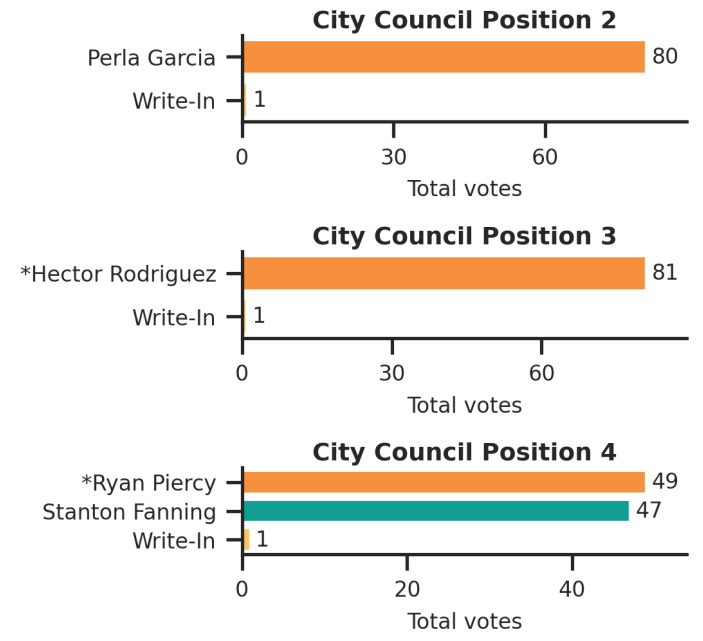

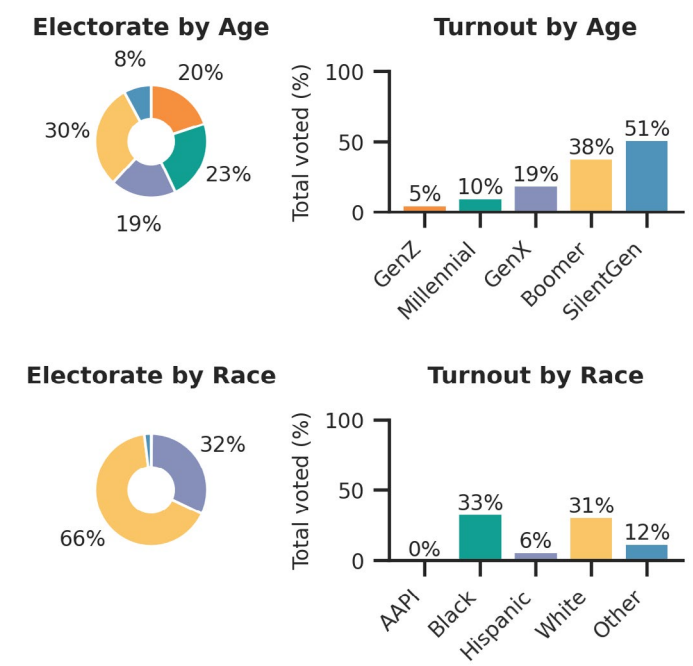
**Fig 2** Election results in Royal City for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

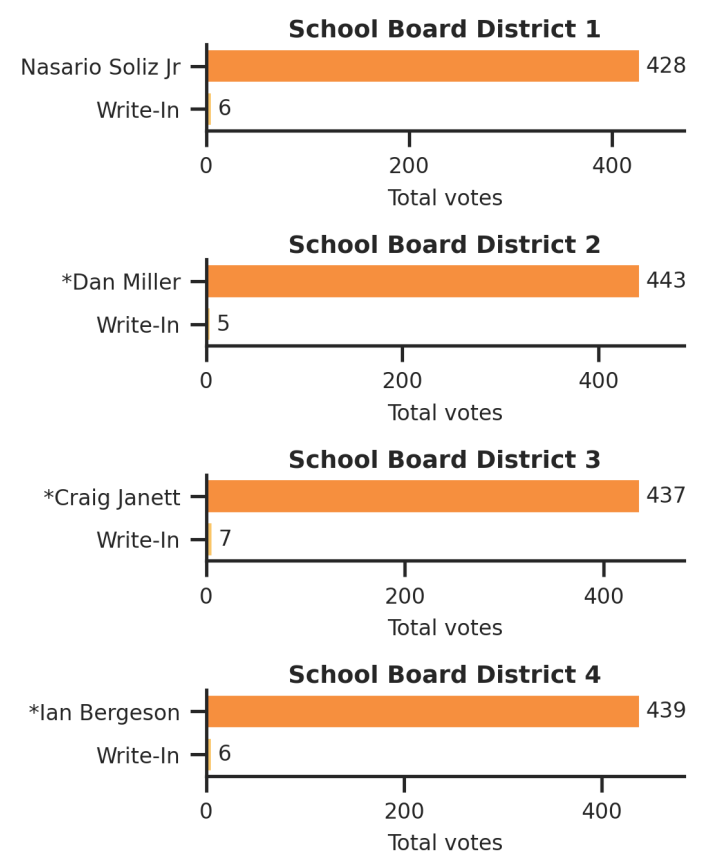

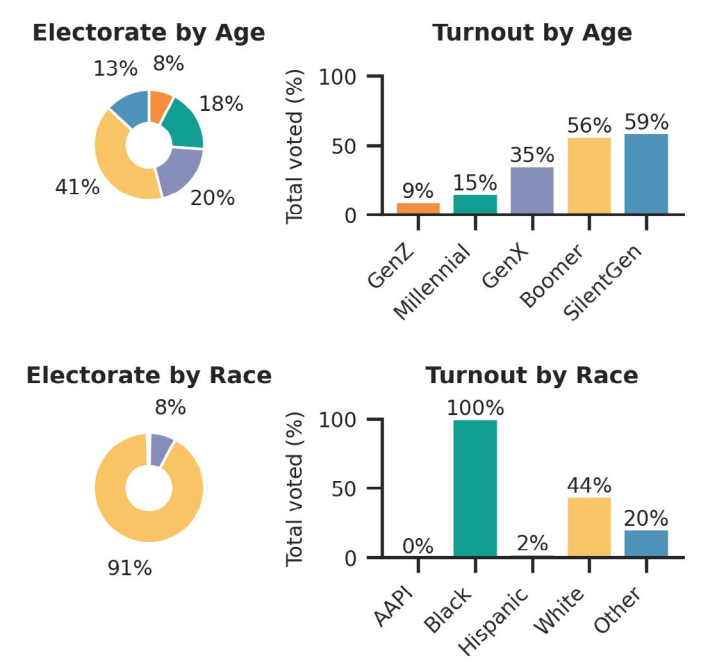


**Fig 2** Election results in Royal School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

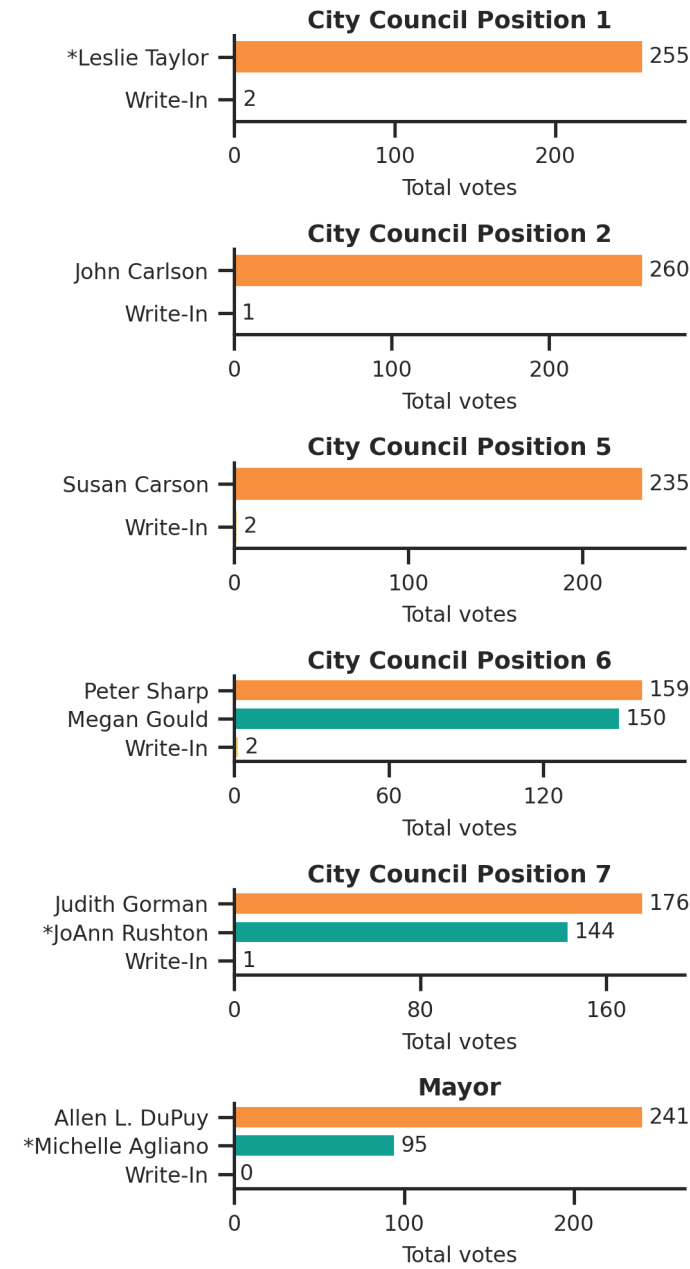


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Soap Lake for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

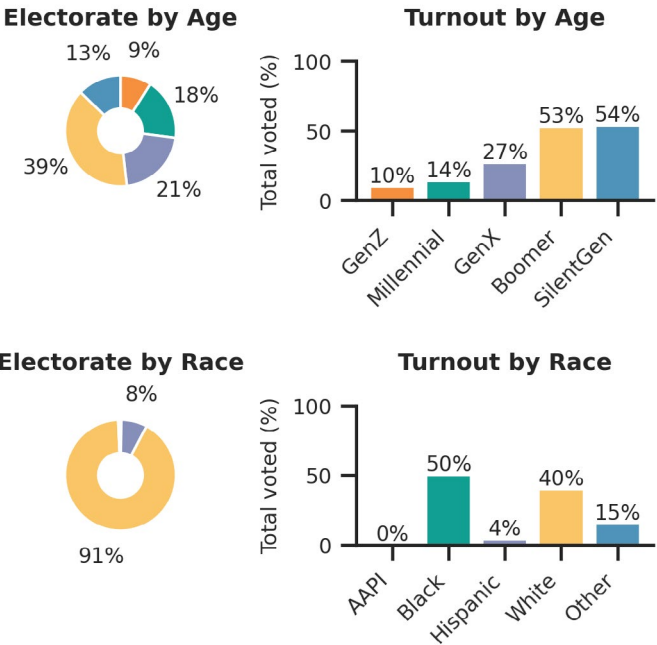


**Fig 2** Election results in Soap Lake for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

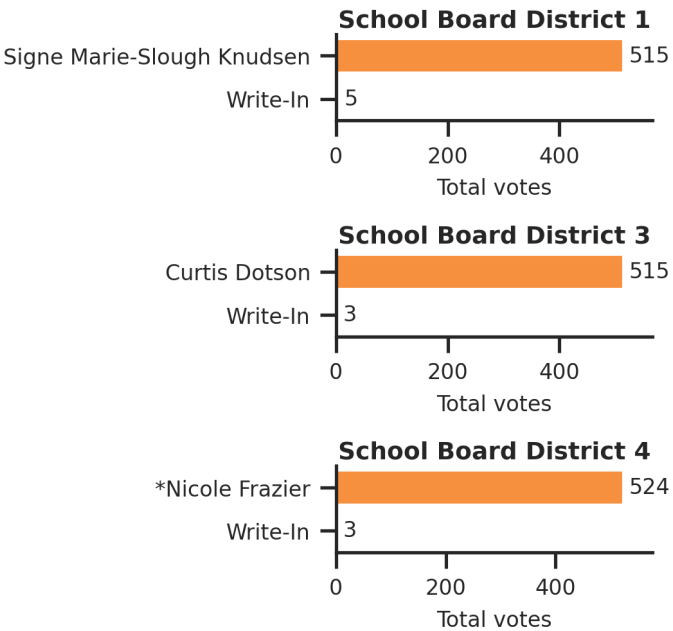

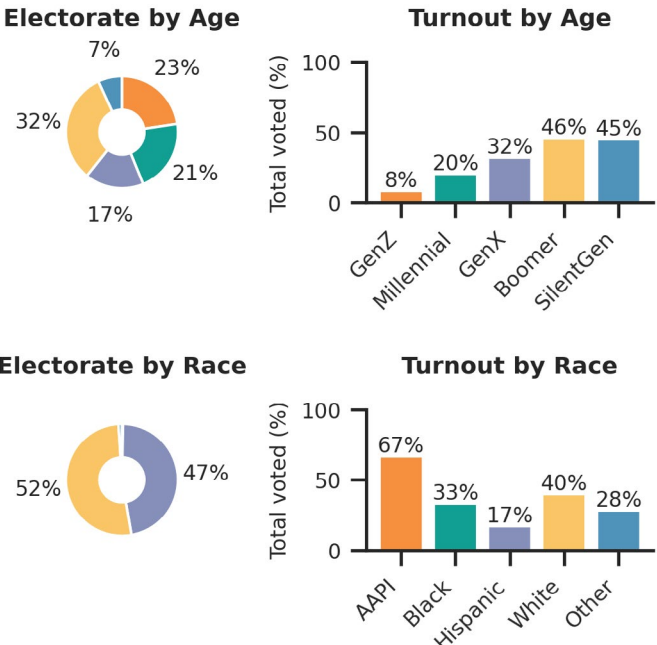


**Fig 2** Election results in Soap Lake School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

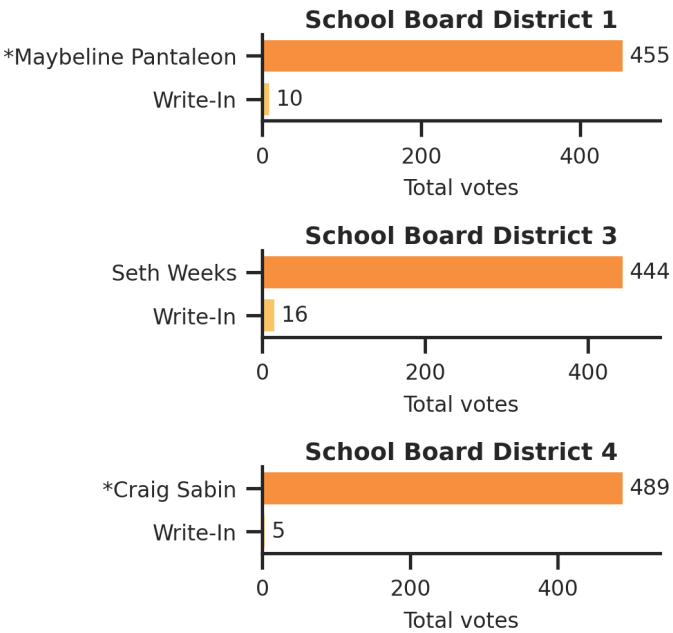

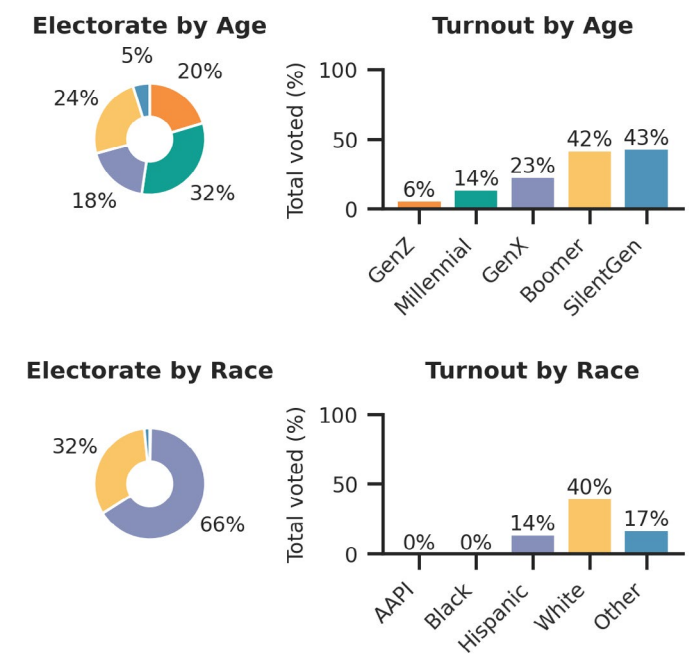


**Fig 2** Election results in Wahluke School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

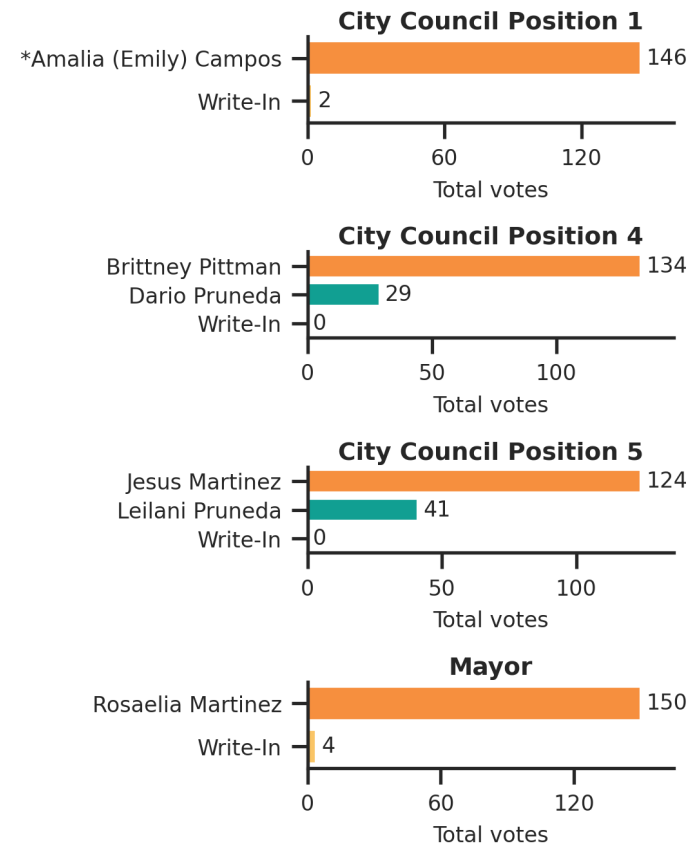

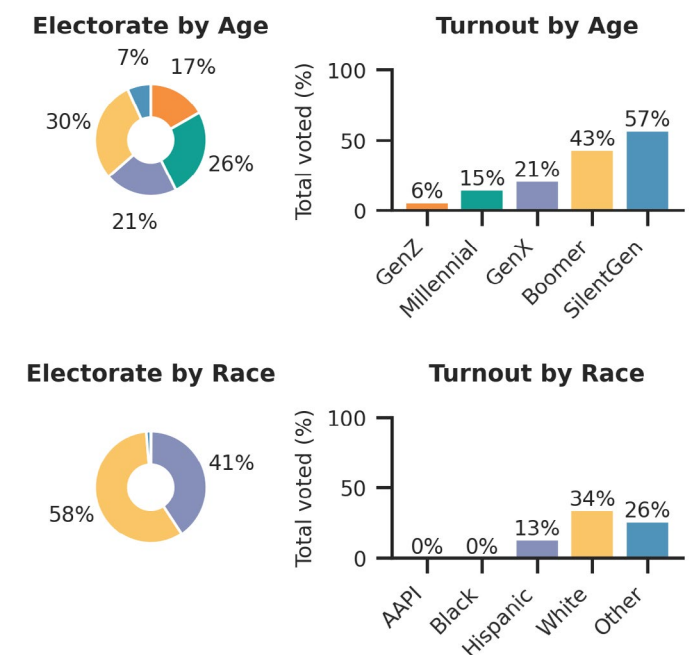

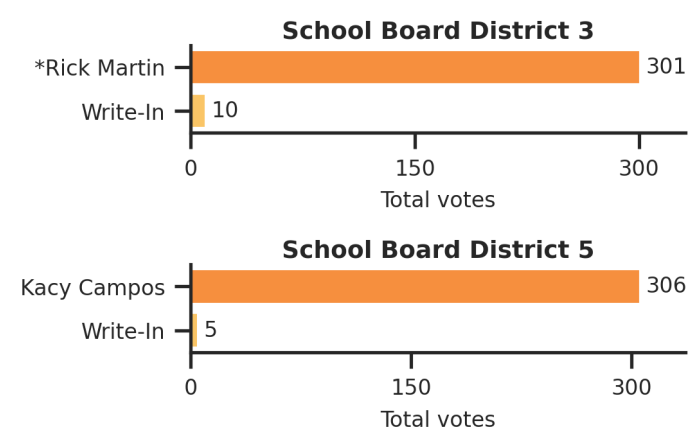

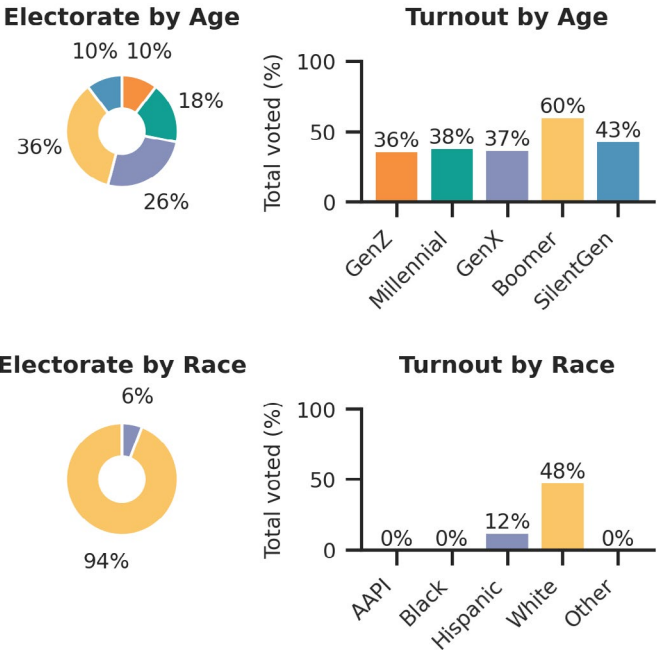


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wilson Creek for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

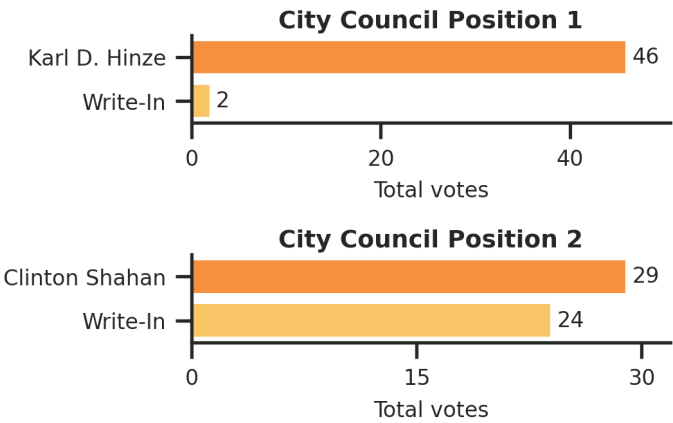


Fig 2 Election results in Wilson Creek for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

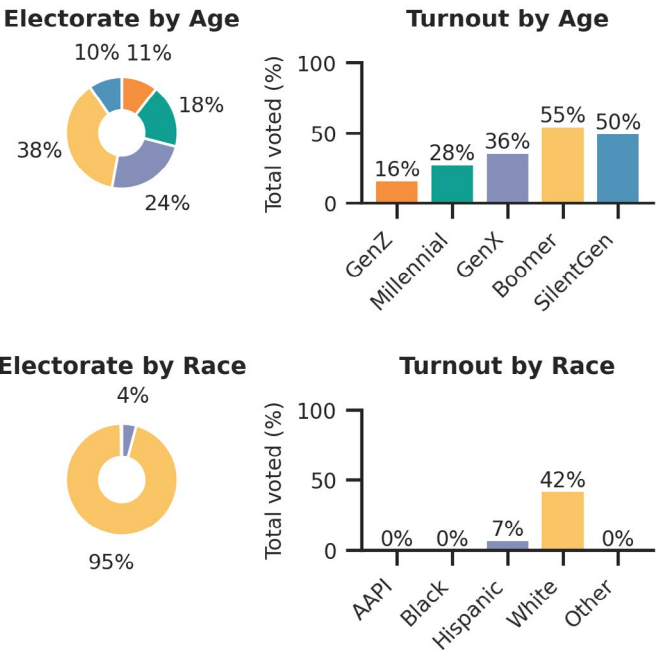


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wilson Creek School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

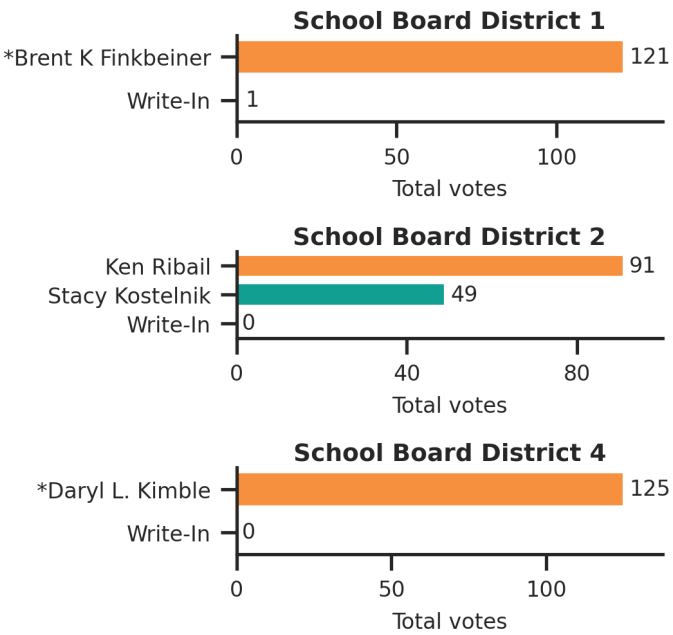


Fig 2 Election results in Wilson Creek School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





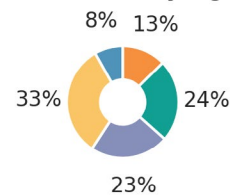

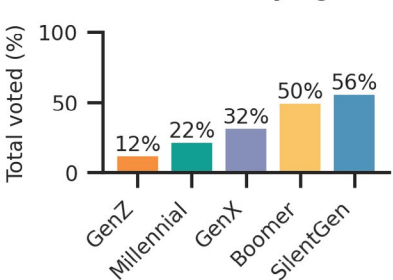

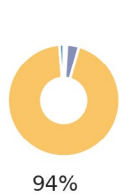
Electorate by Age



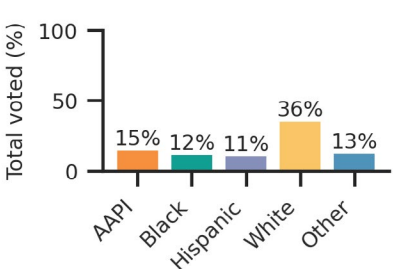

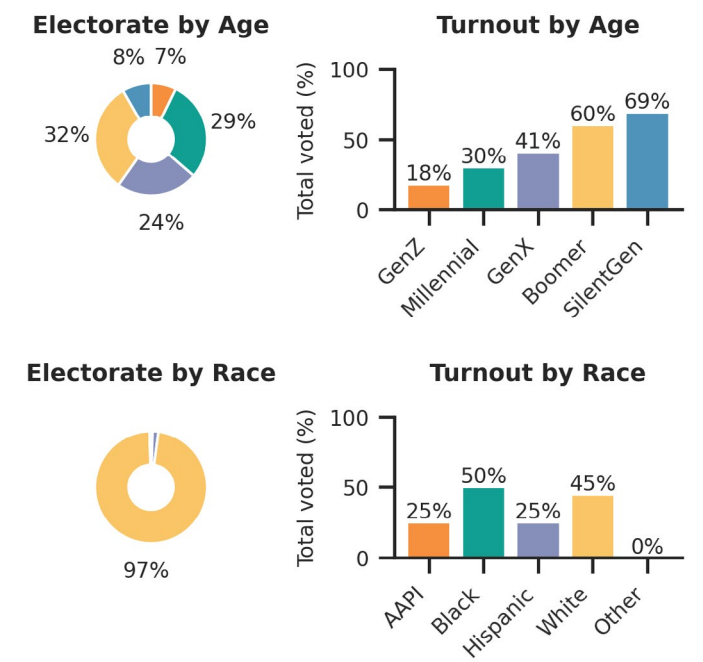


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cle Elum for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

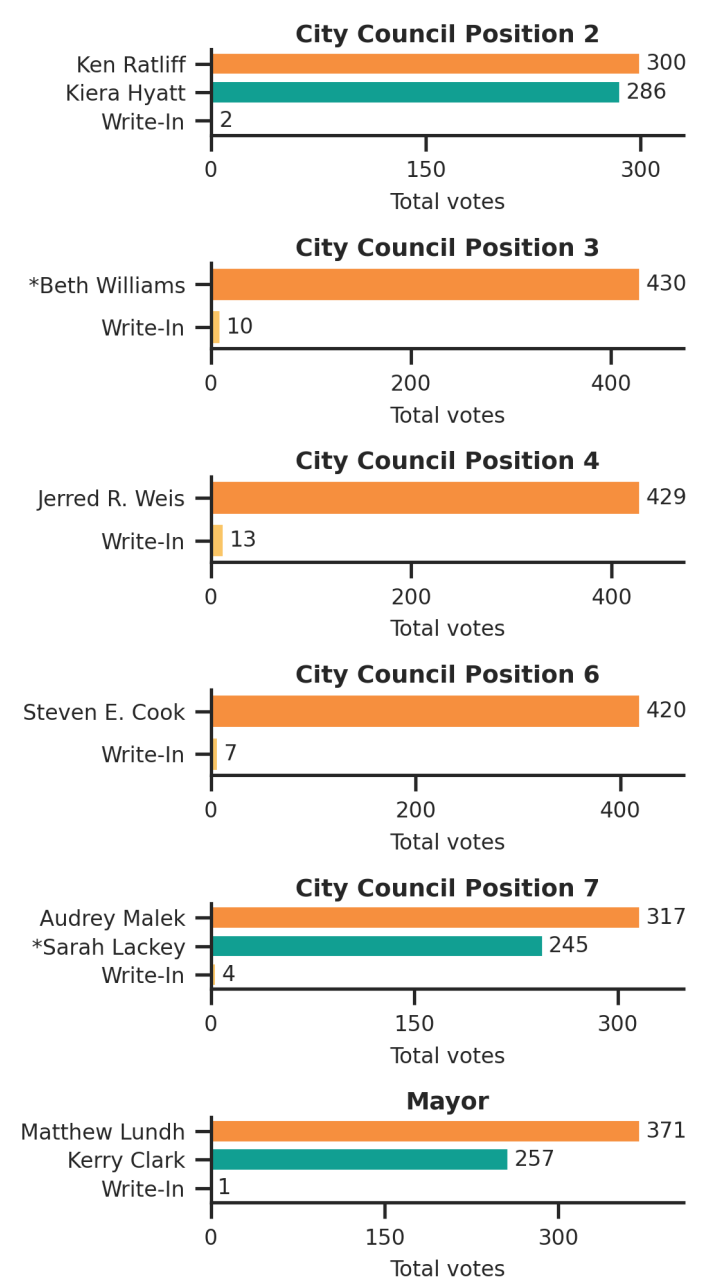


Fig 2 Election results in Cle Elum for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

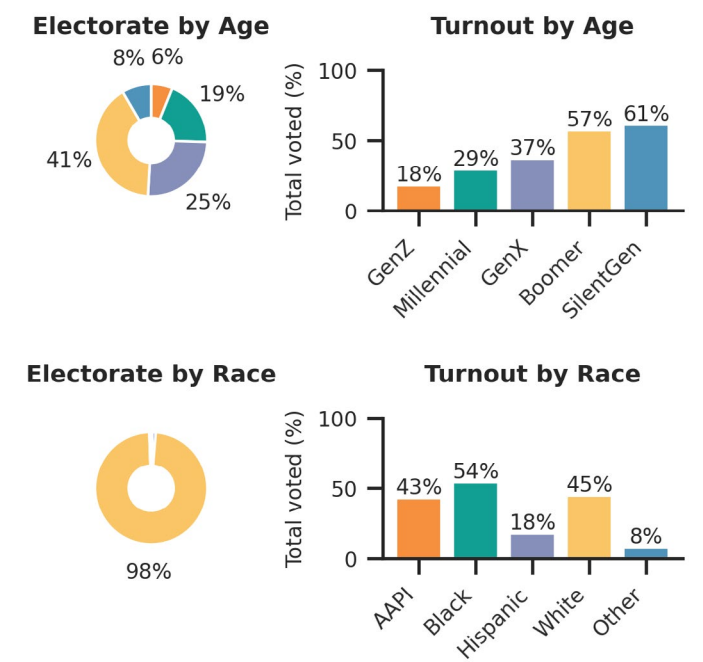


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cle Elum-Roslyn School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

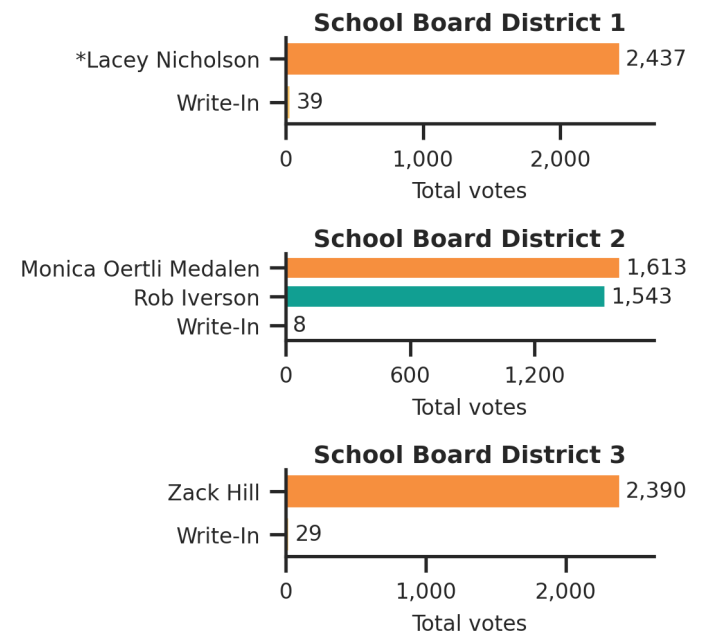


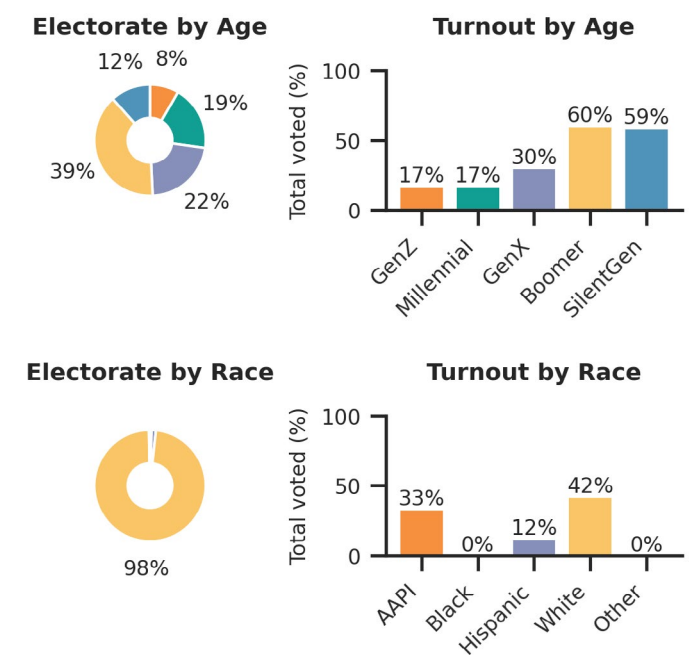
Fig 2 Election results in Cle Elum-Roslyn School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

## Voter turnout

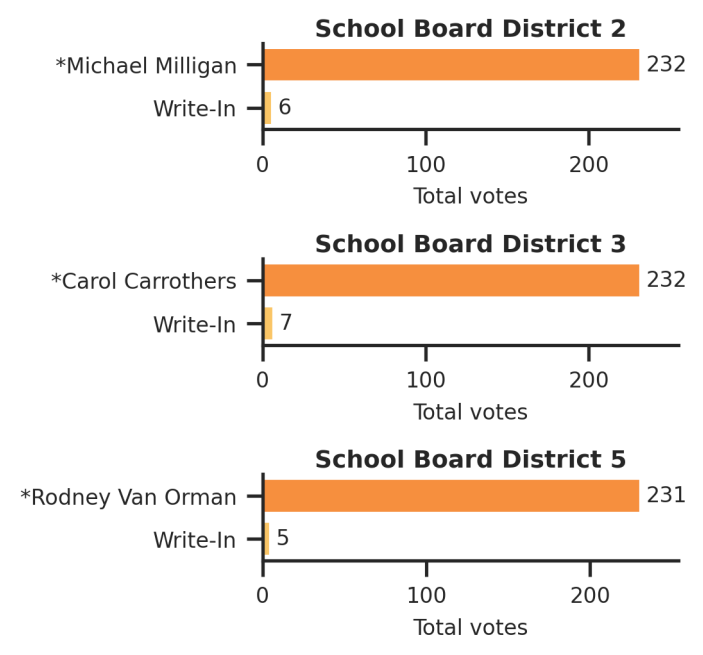

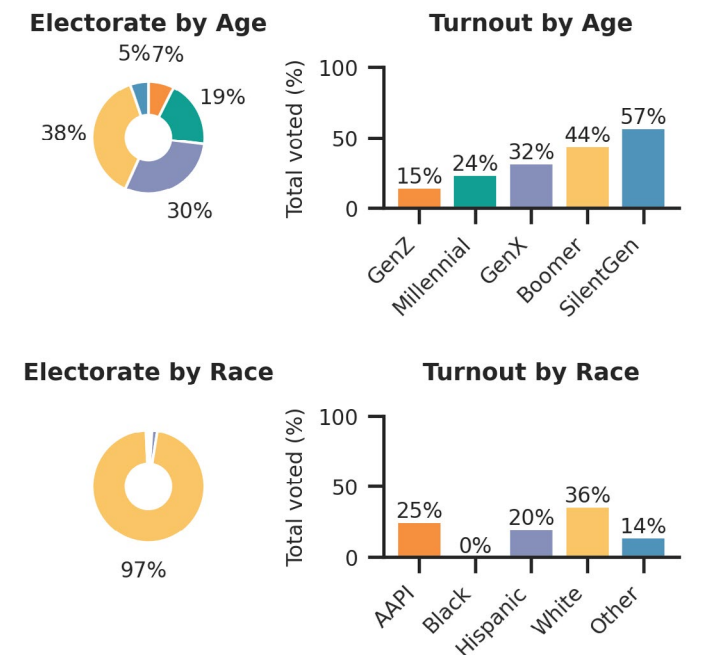


**Fig 2** Election results in Damman School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

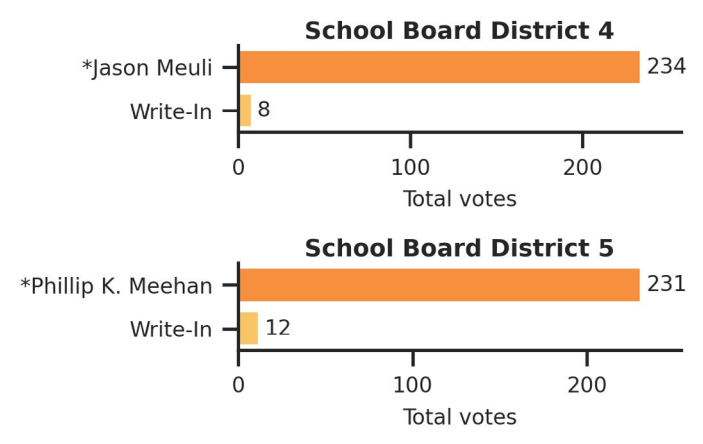

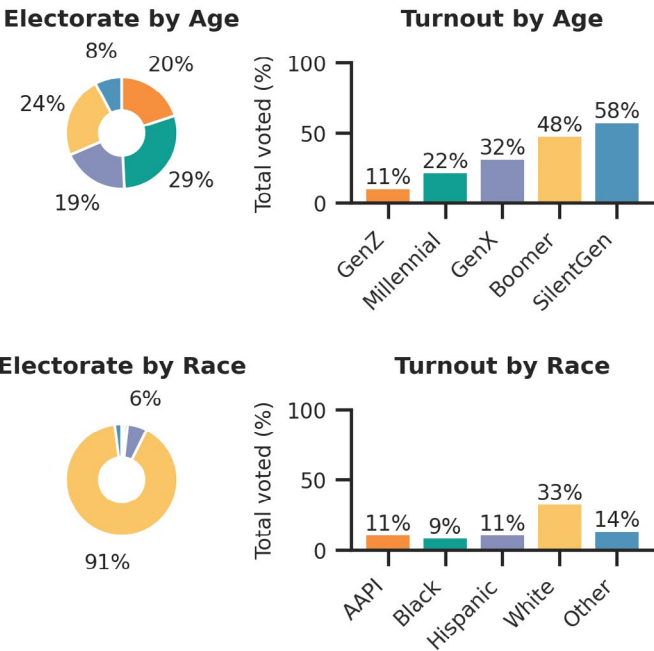


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ellensburg for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

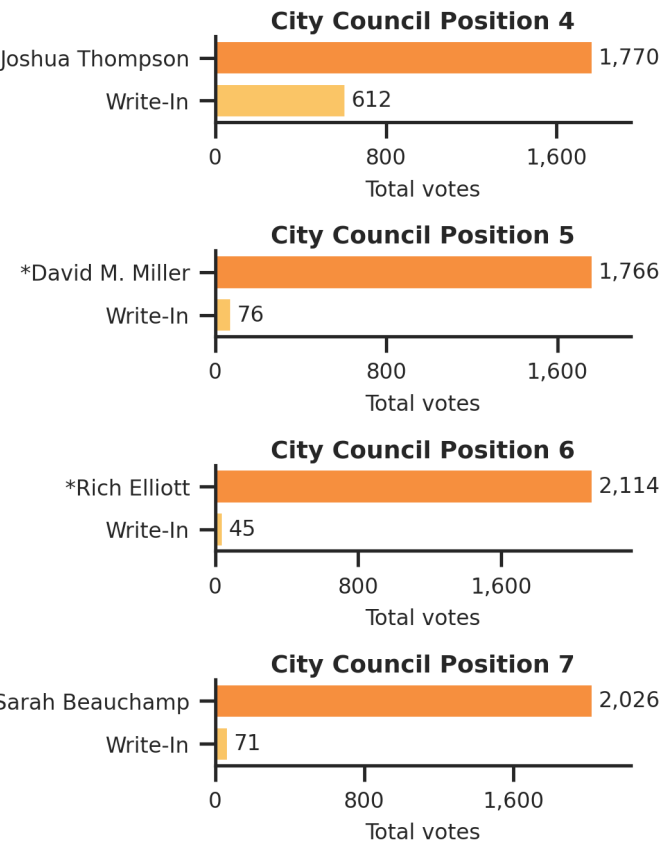


Fig 2 Election results in Ellensburg for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

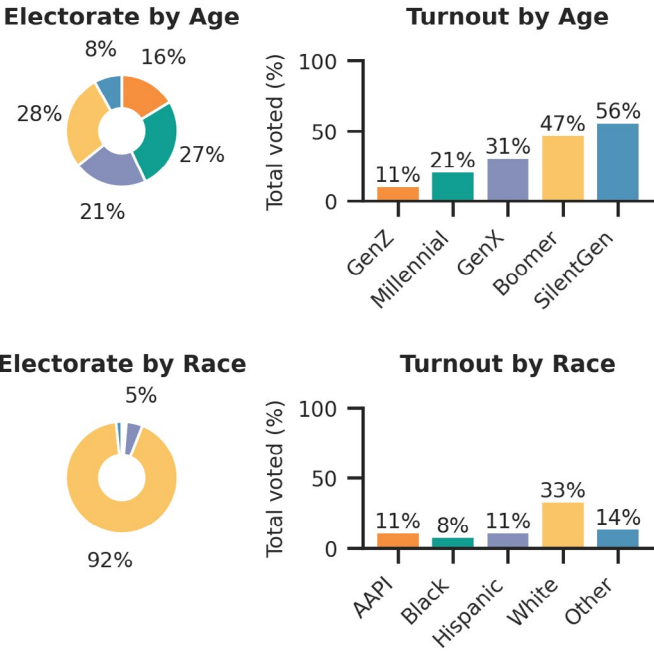


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ellensburg School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

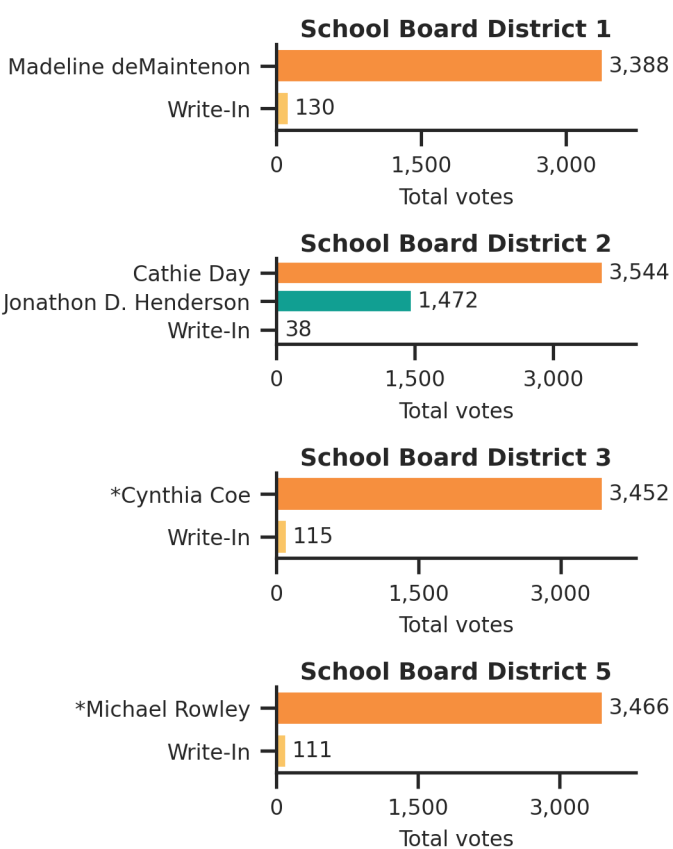


Fig 2 Election results in Ellensburg School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

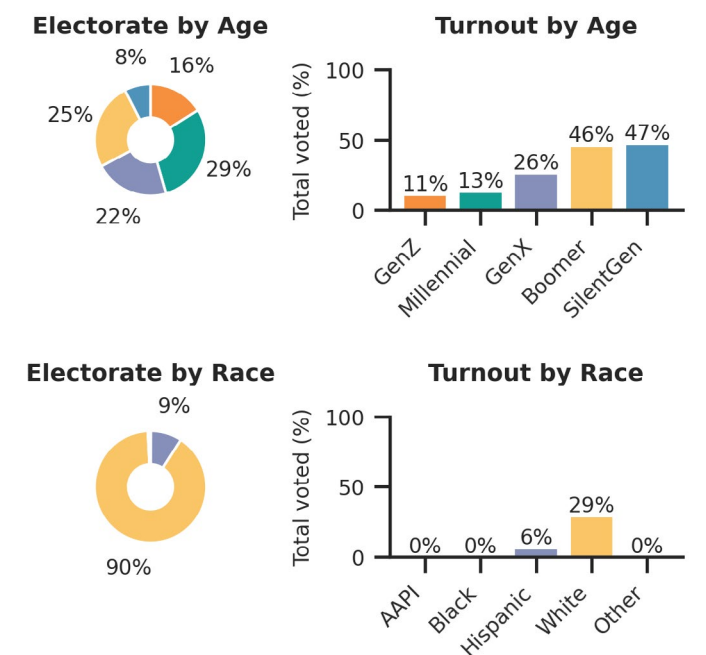


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kittitas for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

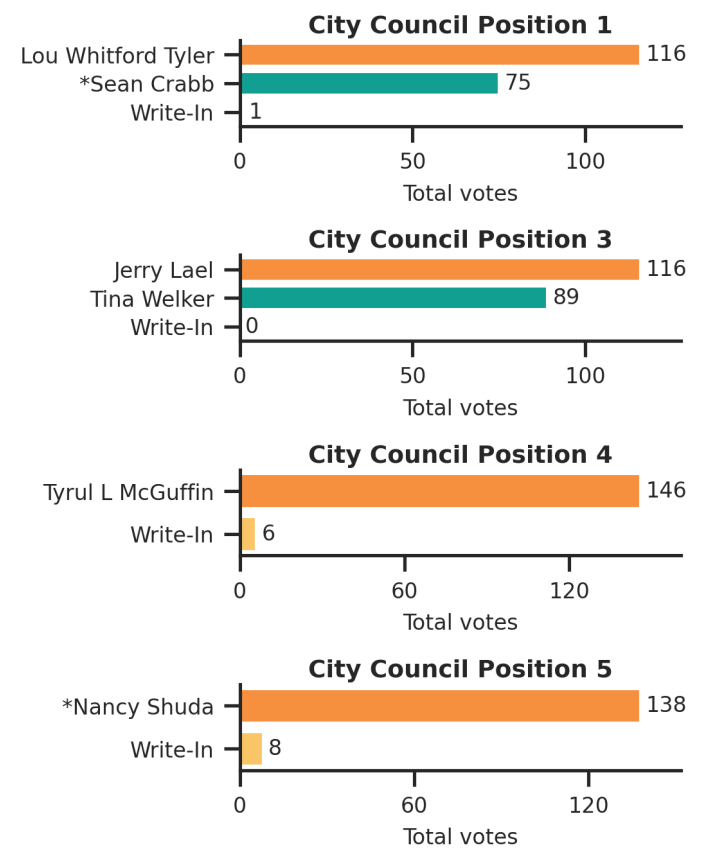


Fig 2 Election results in Kittitas for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

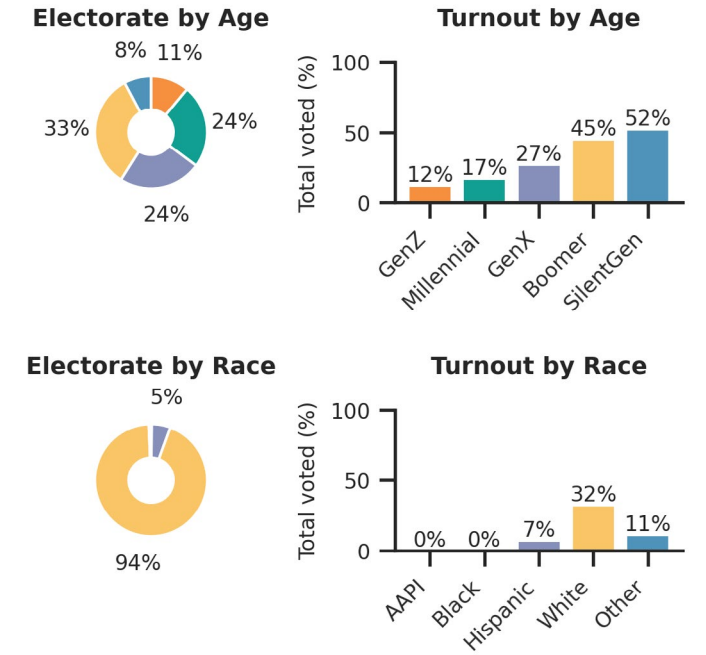


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kittitas School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

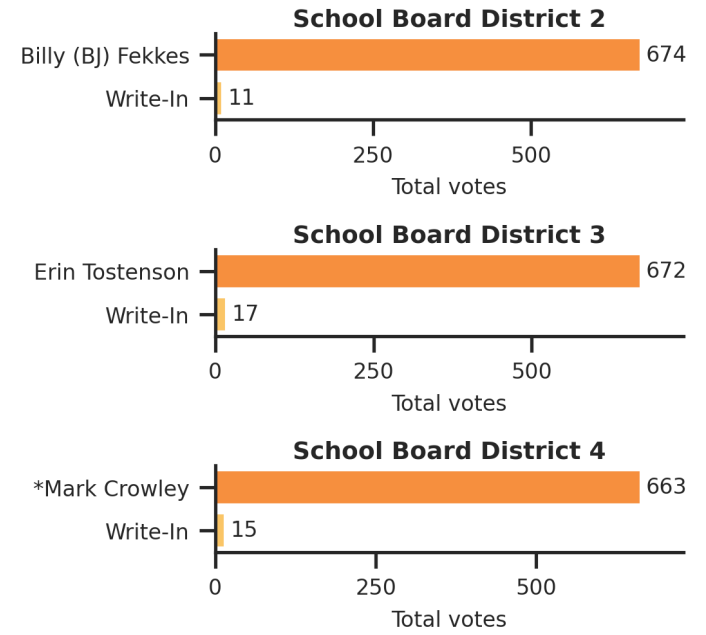


Fig 2 Election results in Kittitas School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

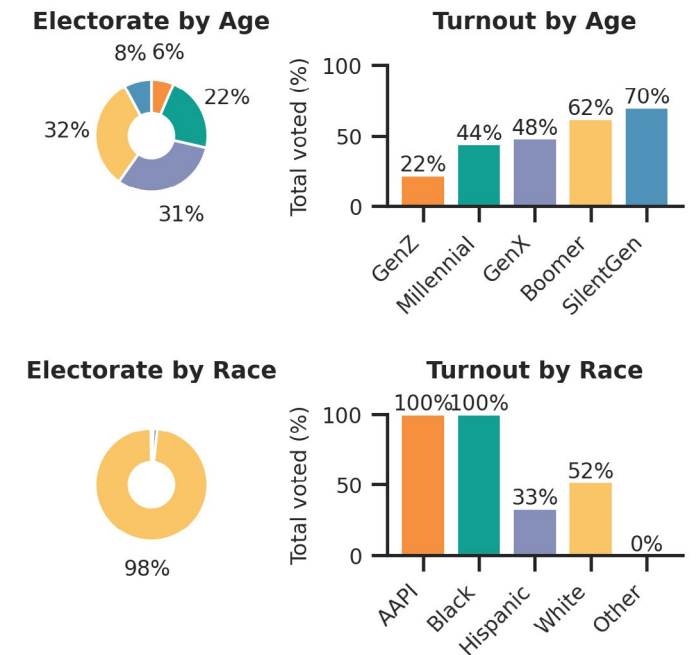


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Roslyn for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

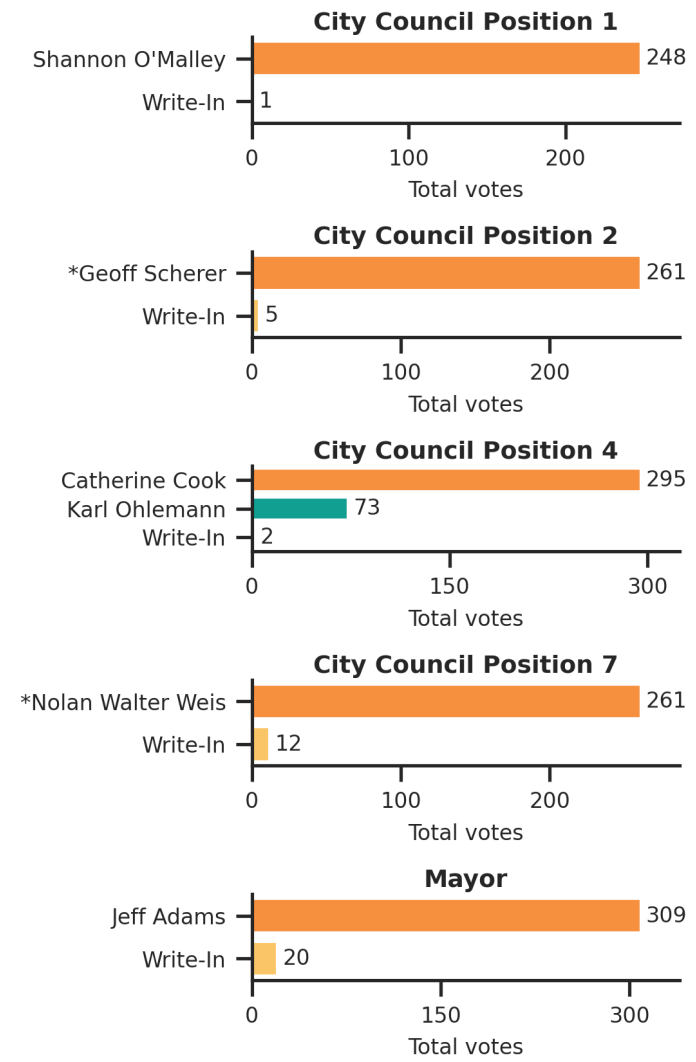


Fig 2 Election results in Roslyn for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

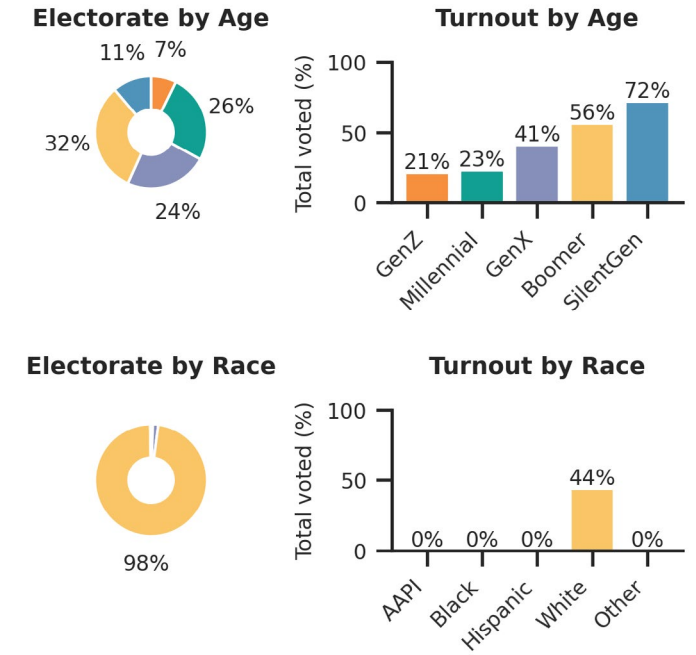


Fig 1 Voter turnout in South Cle Elum for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by (i) age group and (ii) race.

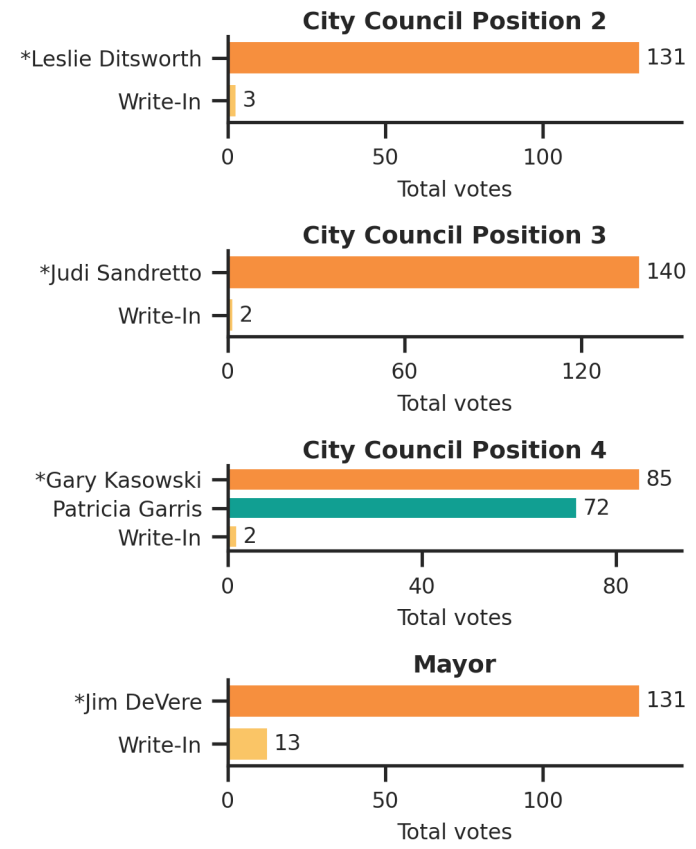


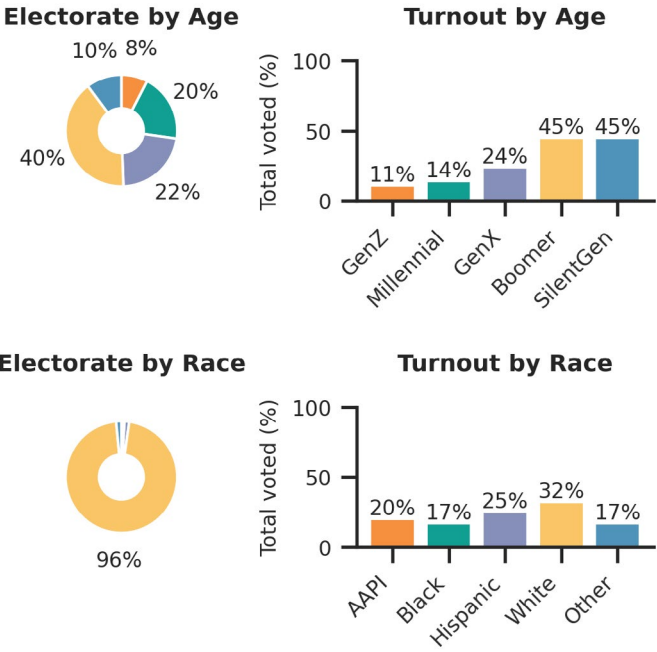
Fig 2 Election results in South Cle Elum for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

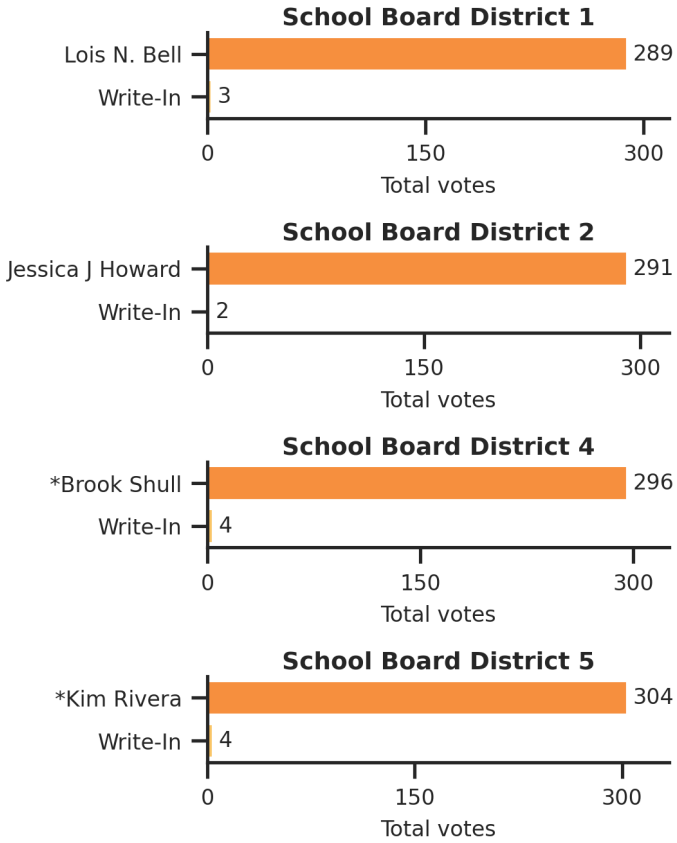

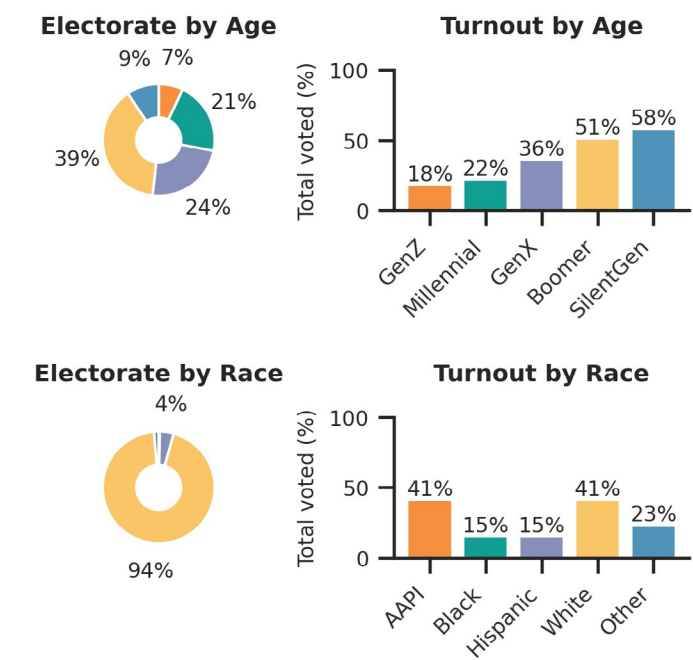


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Klickitat County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

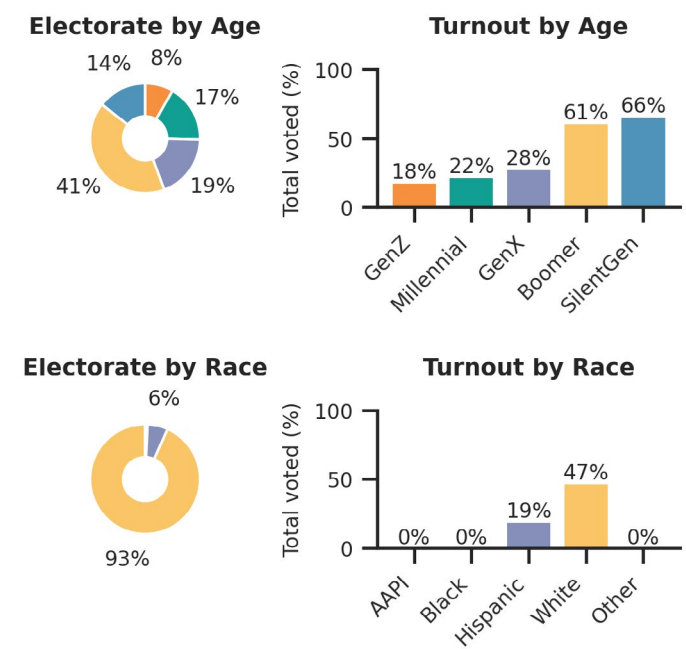


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bickleton School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

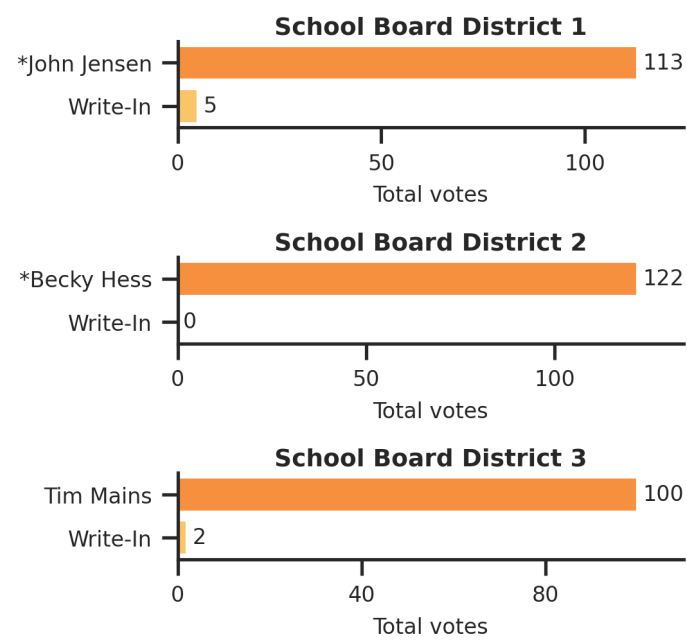


Fig 2 Election results in Bickleton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

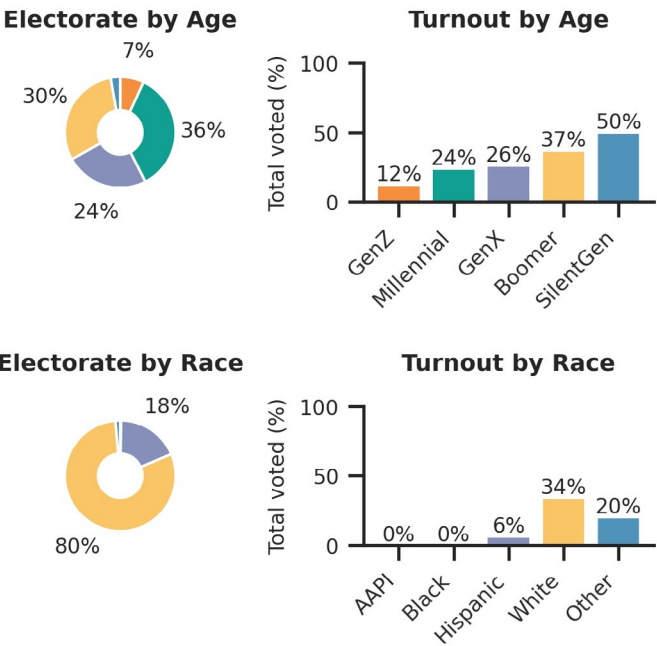


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bingen for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

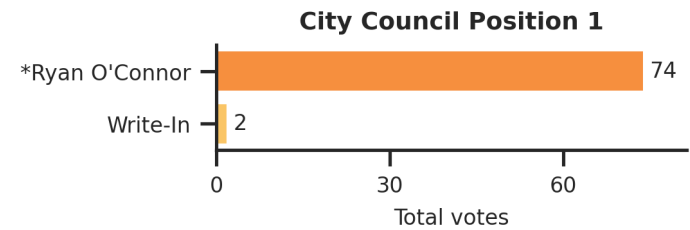


Fig 2 Election results in Bingen for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

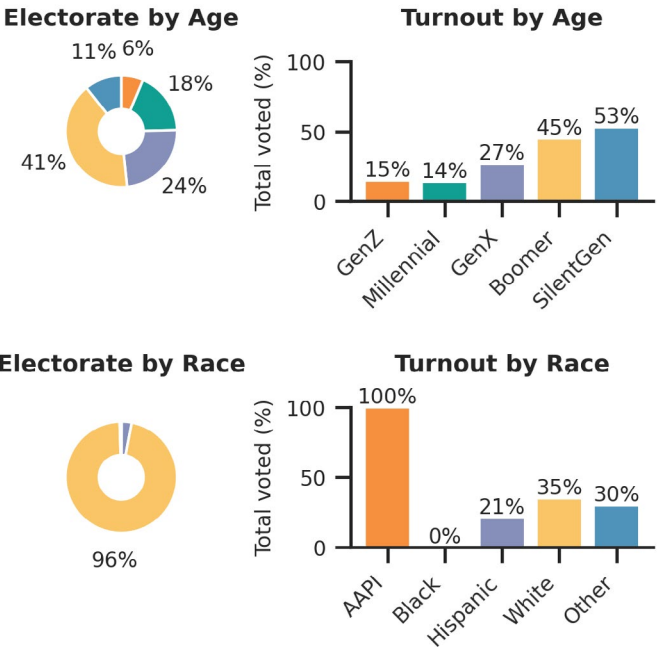


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Centerville School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

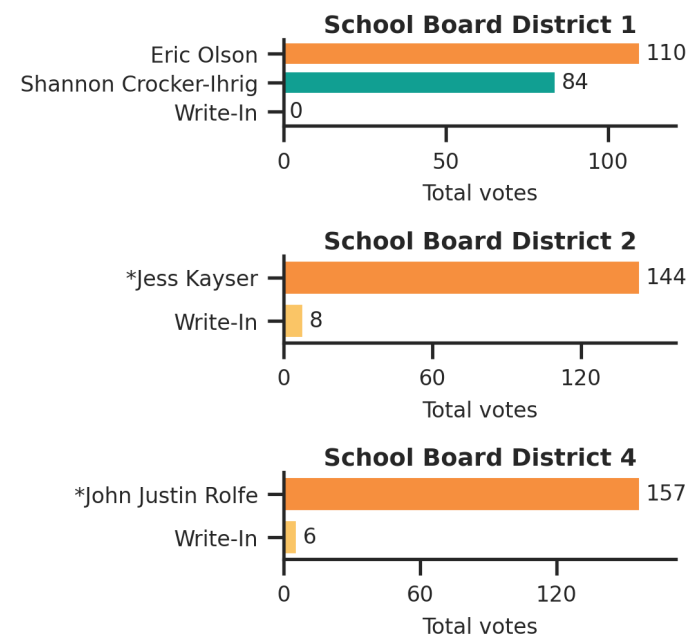


Fig 2 Election results in Centerville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

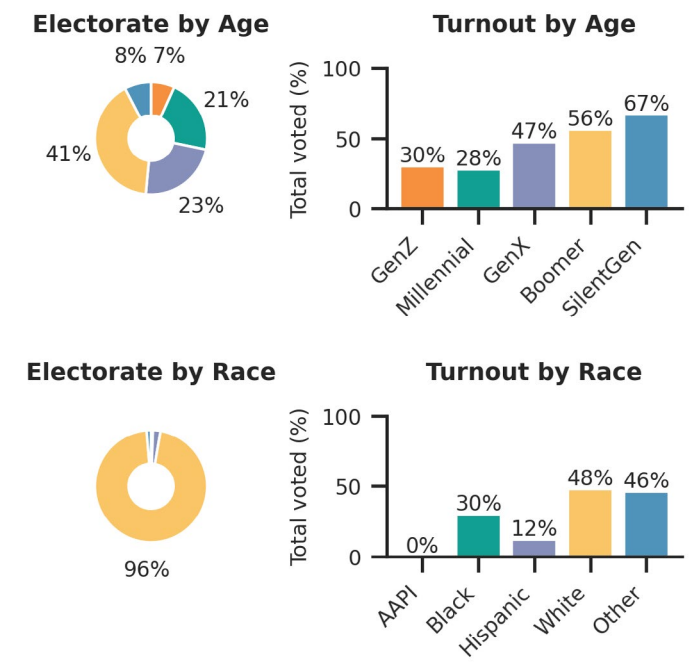


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Glenwood School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

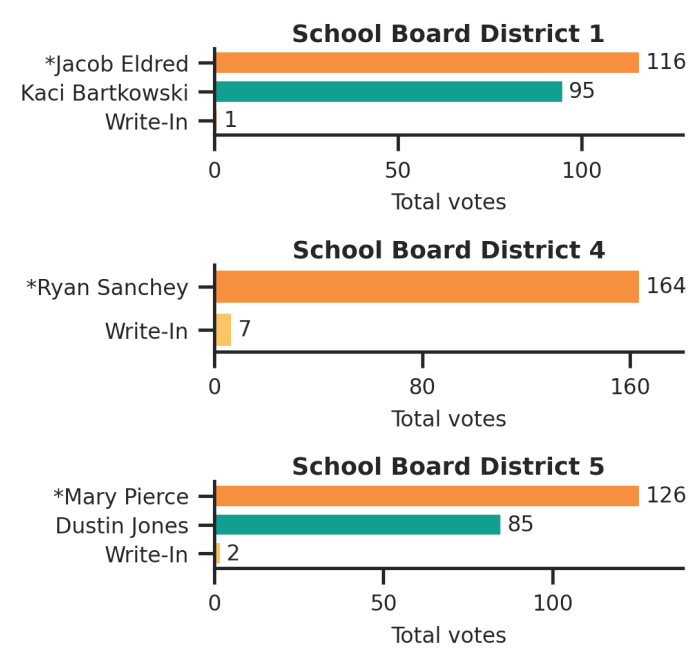


Fig 2 Election results in Glenwood School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

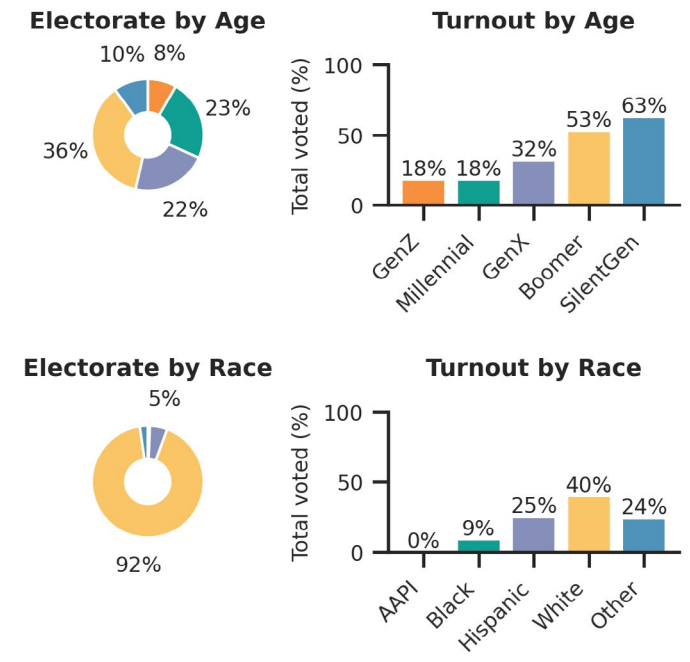


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Goldendale for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

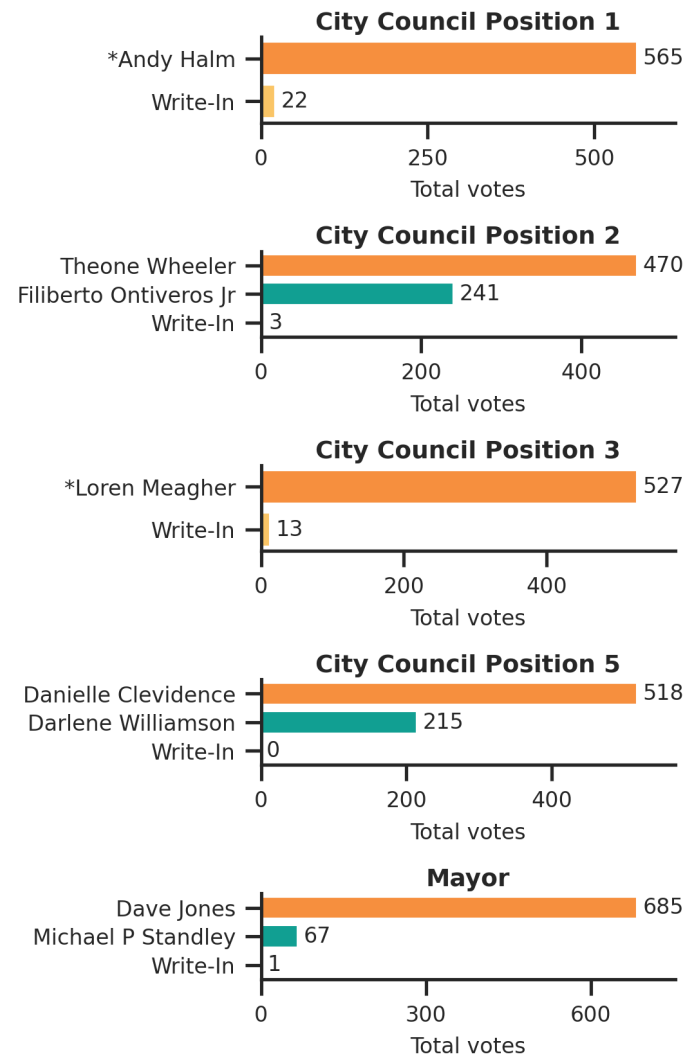


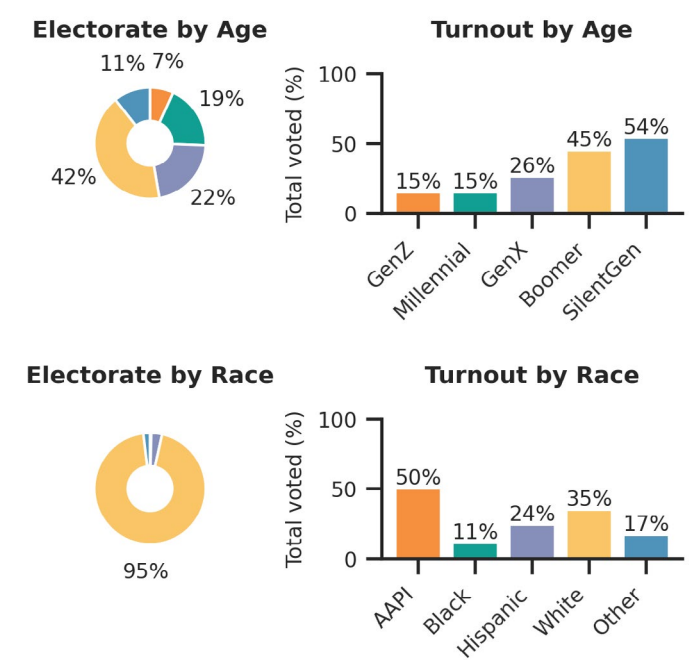
Fig 2 Election results in Goldendale for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

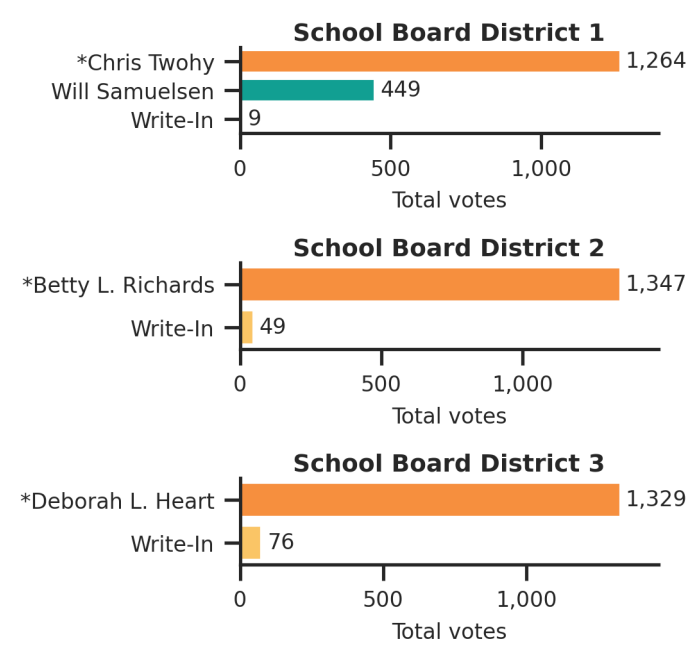

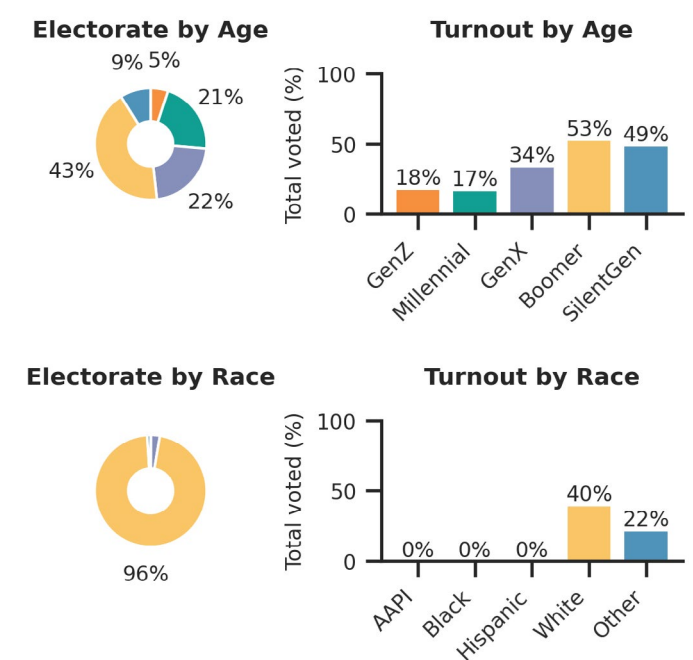


**Fig 2** Election results in Goldendale School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

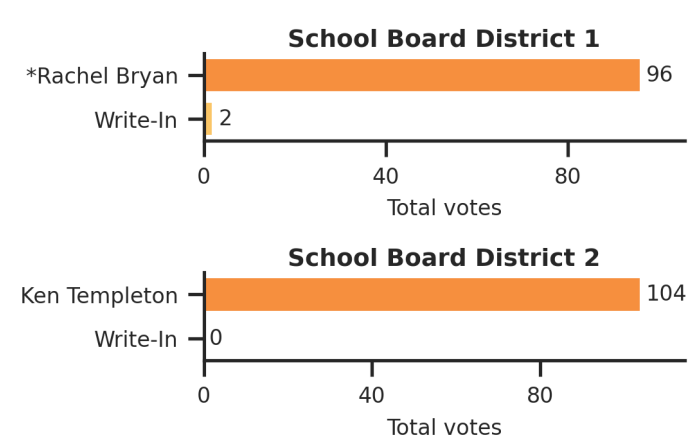

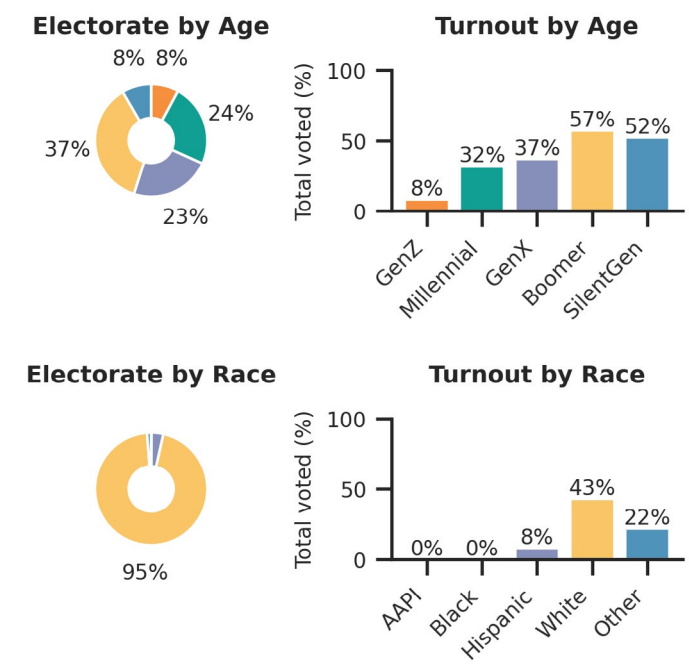


**Fig 2** Election results in Klickitat School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

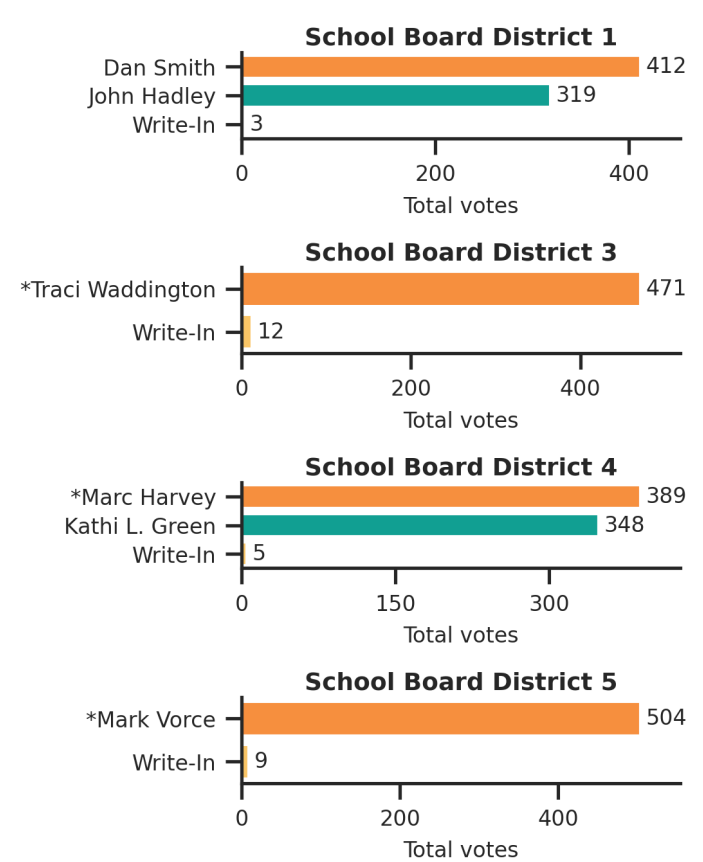

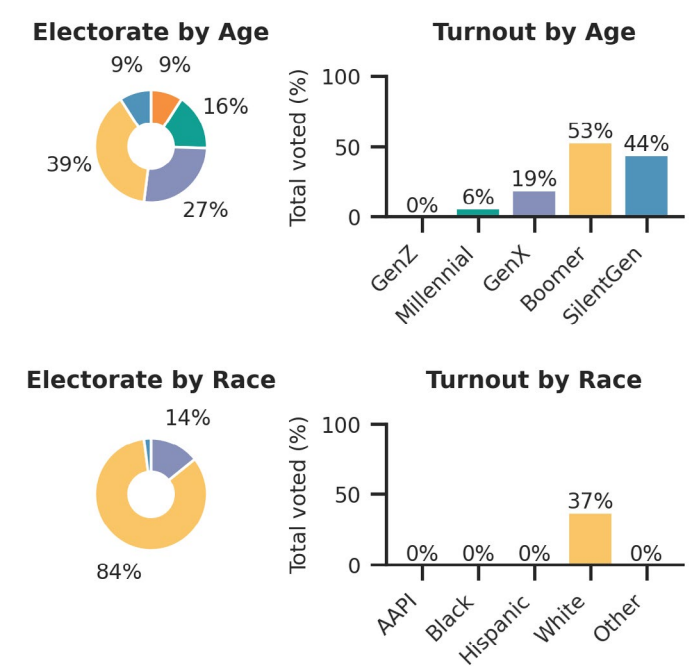


**Fig 2** Election results in Lyle School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

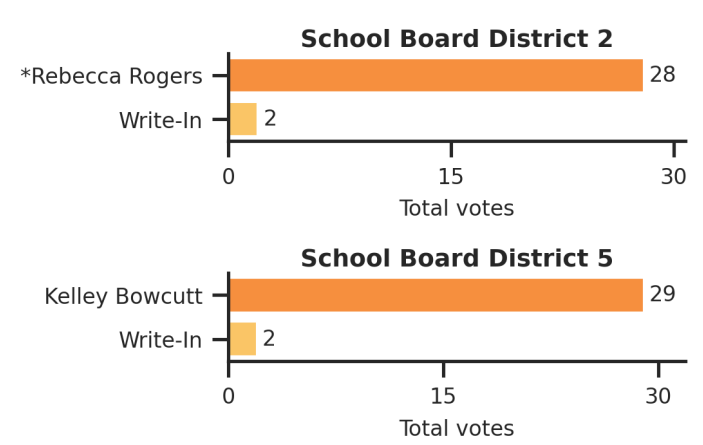

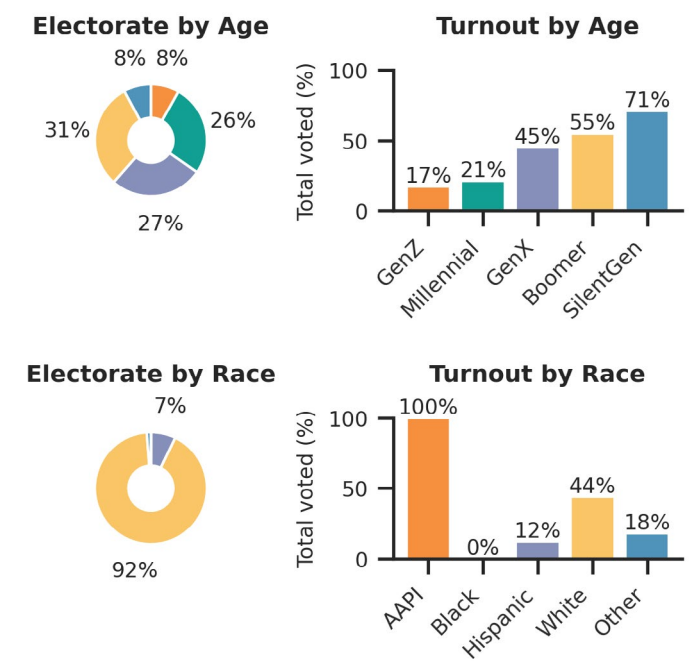


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Trout Lake School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

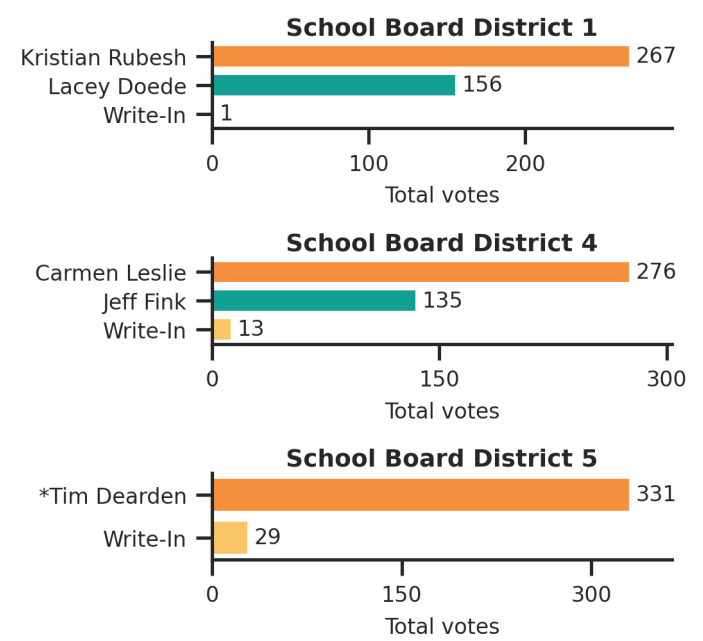


Fig 2 Election results in Trout Lake School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

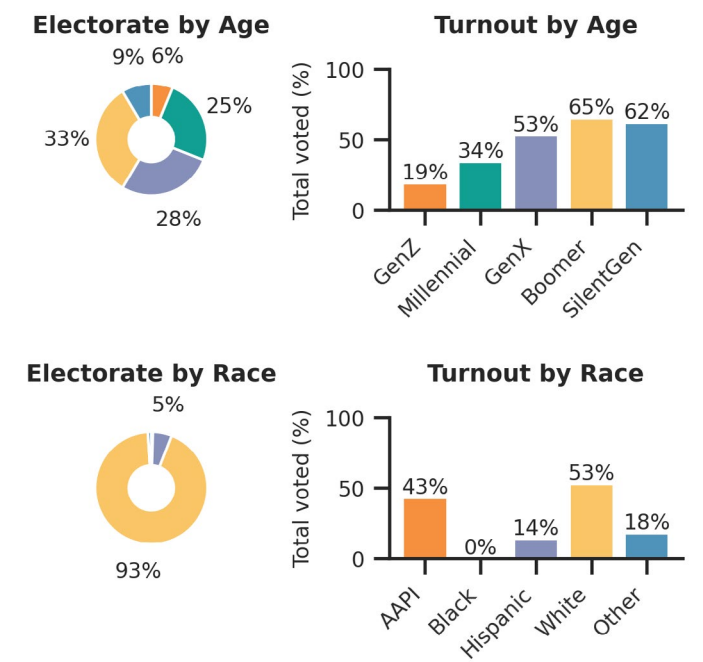


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in White Salmon for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

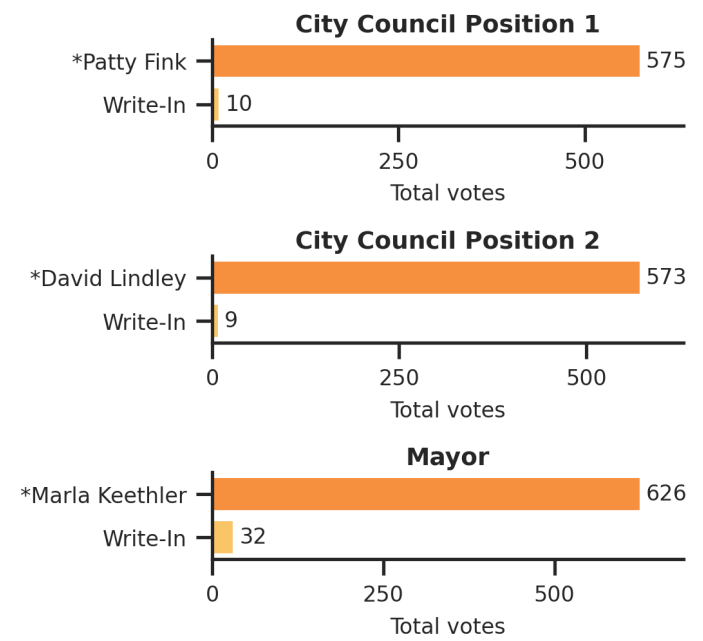


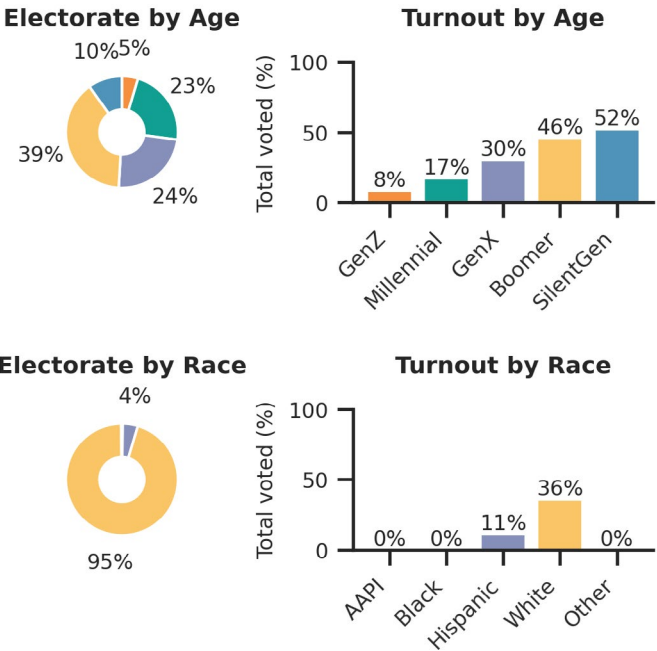
Fig 2 Election results in White Salmon for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

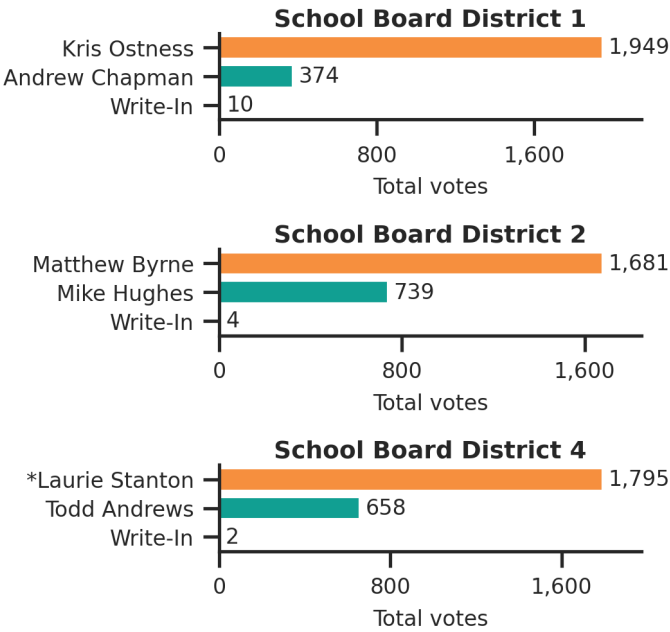

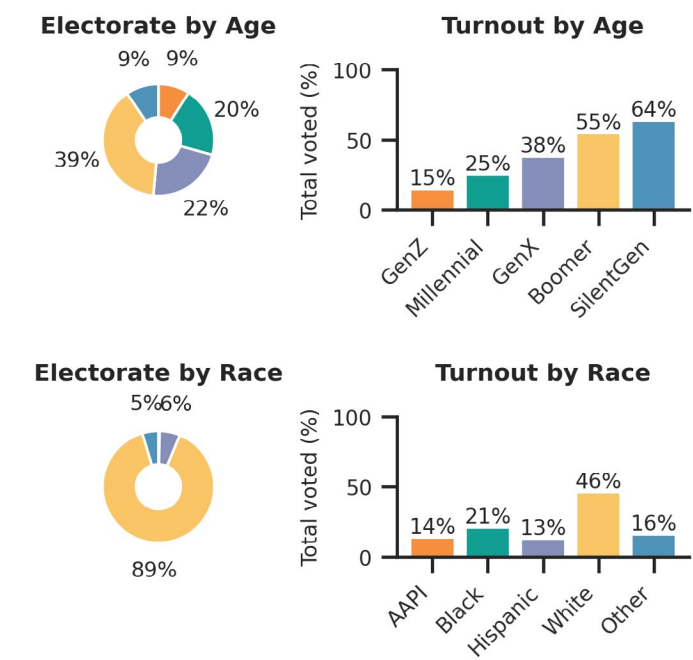


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Okanogan County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

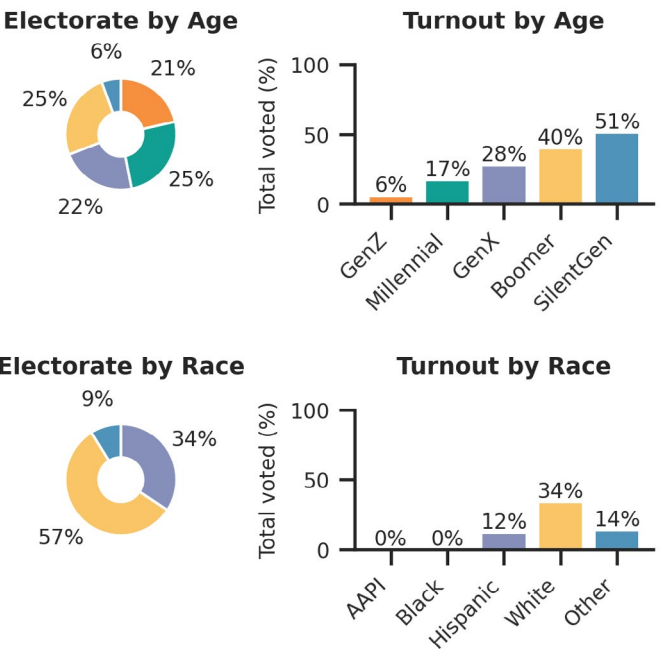


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Brewster for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

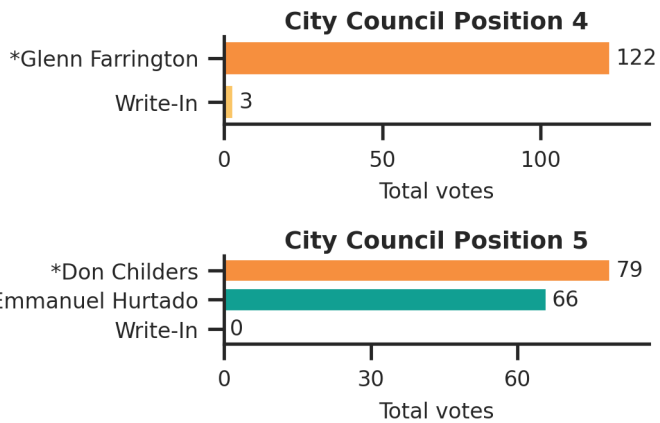
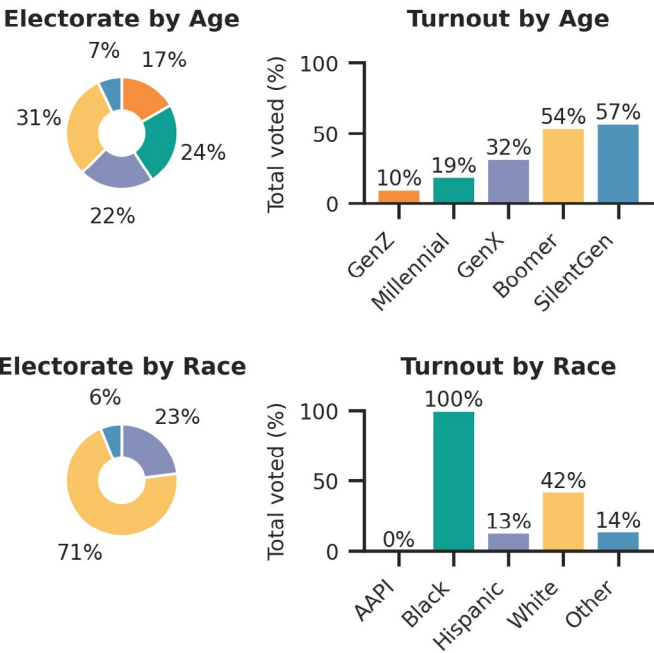


Fig 2 Election results in Brewster for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

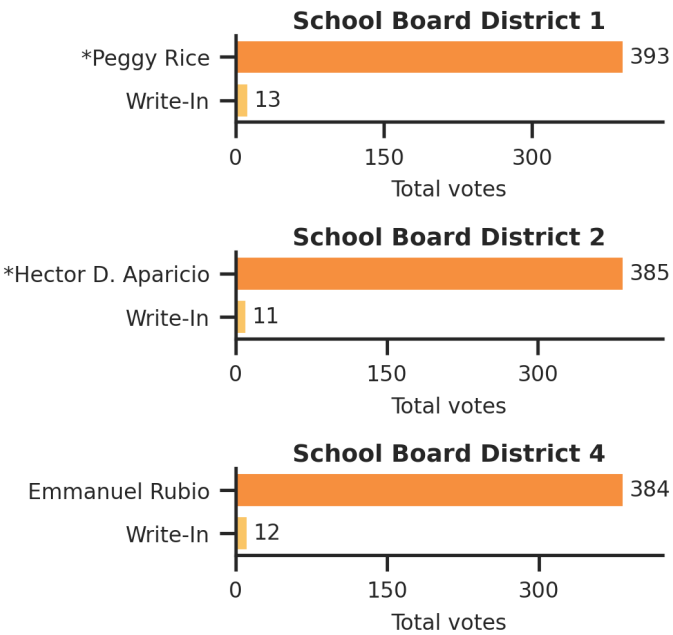

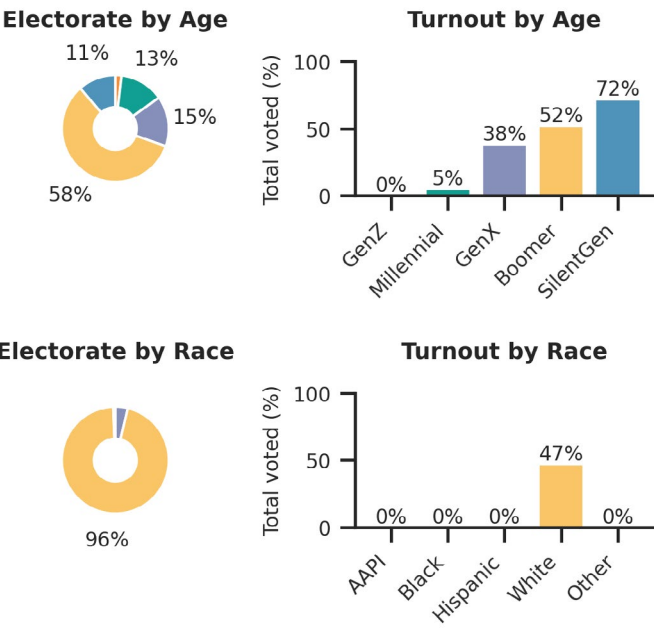

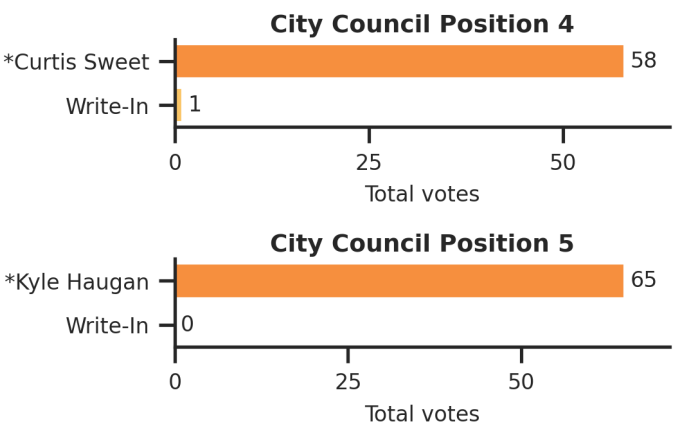

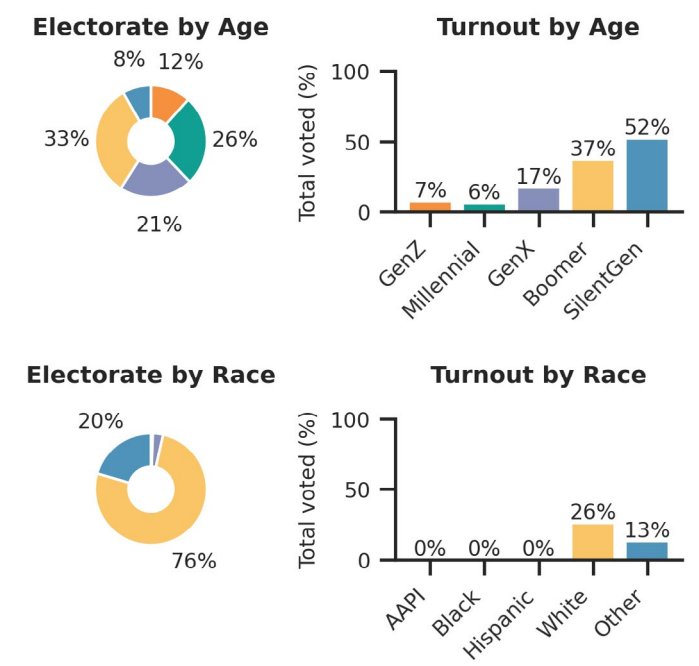
**Fig 2** Election results in Conconully for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

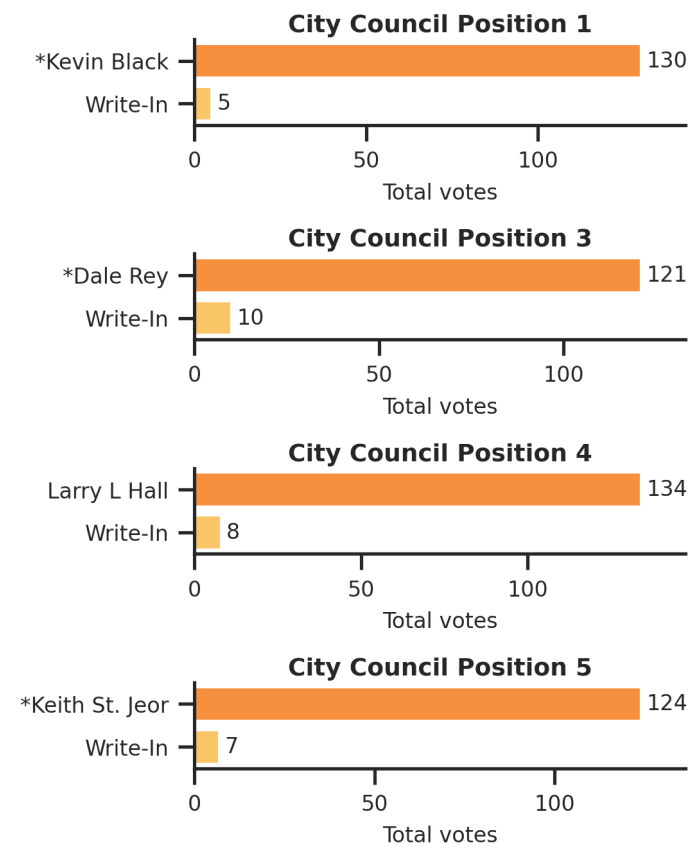

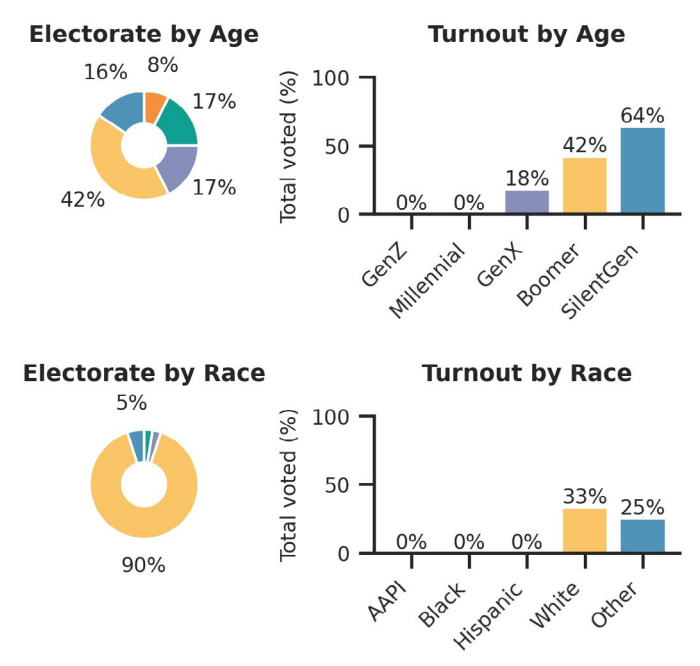


**Fig 2** Election results in Coulee Dam for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

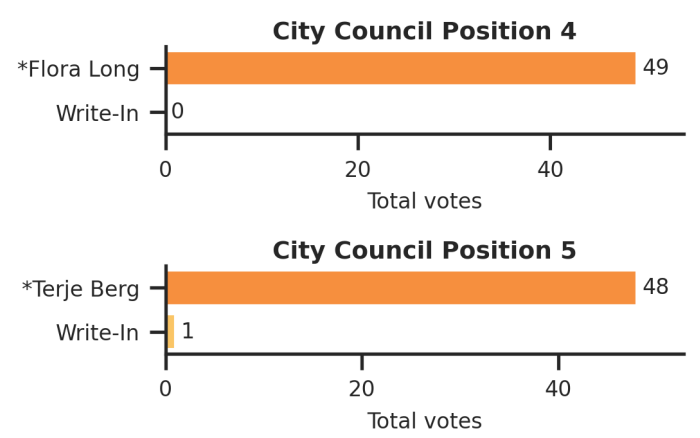

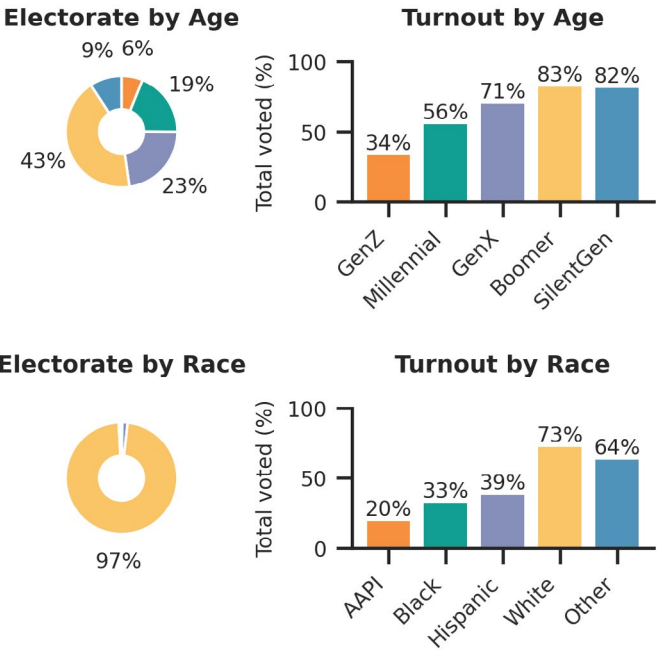

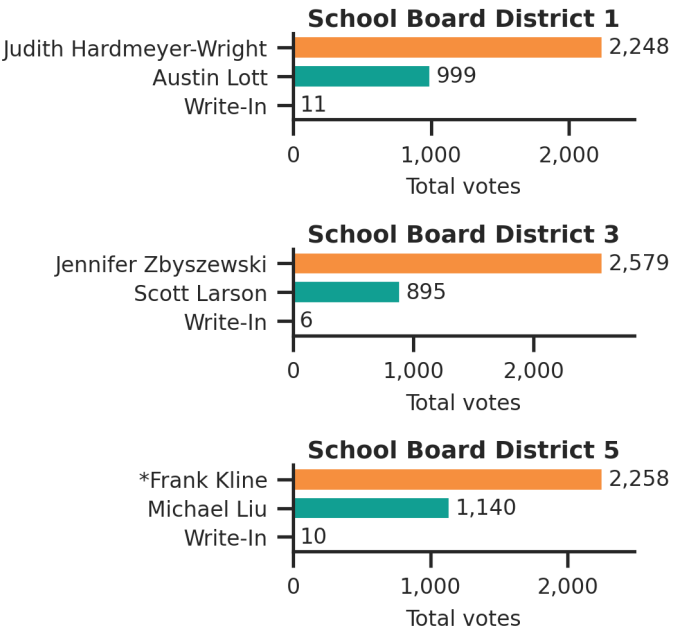

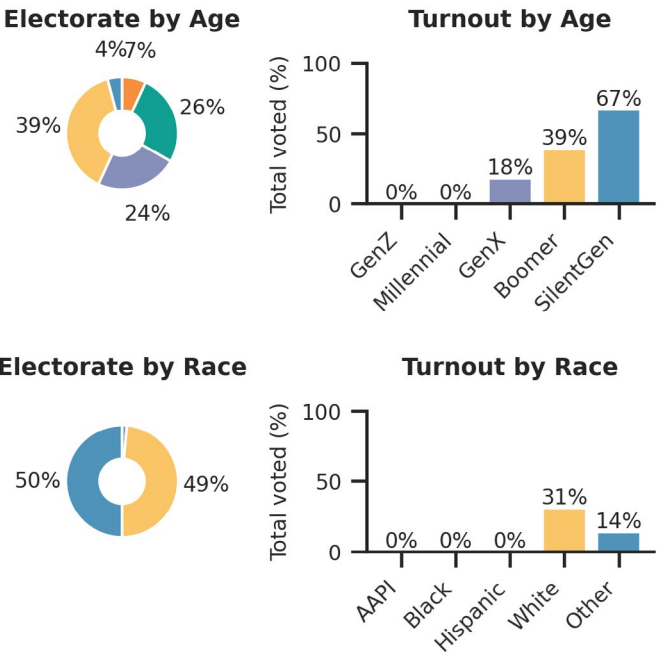

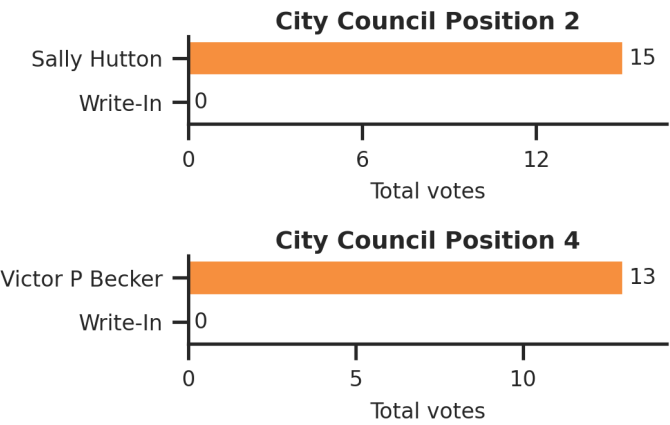

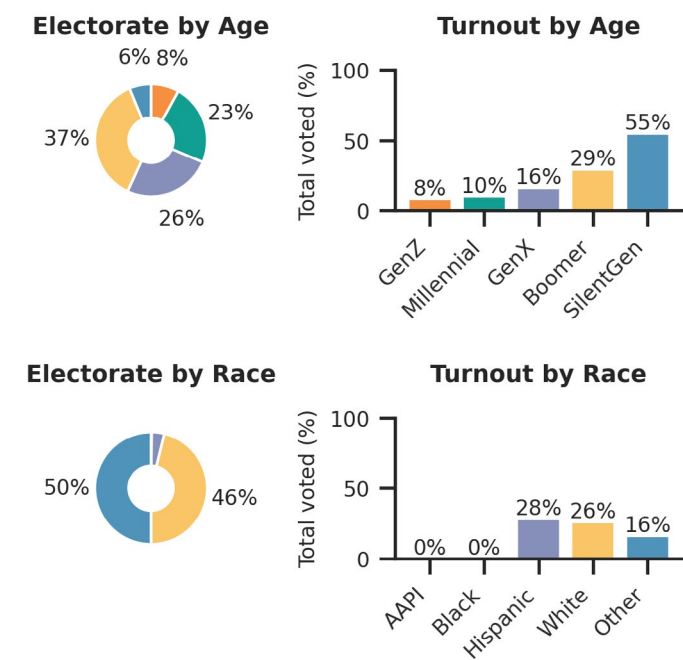


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Nespelem School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

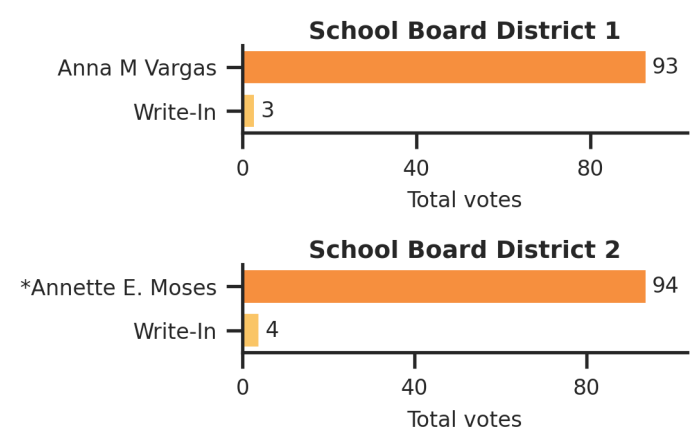


Fig 2 Election results in Nespelem School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

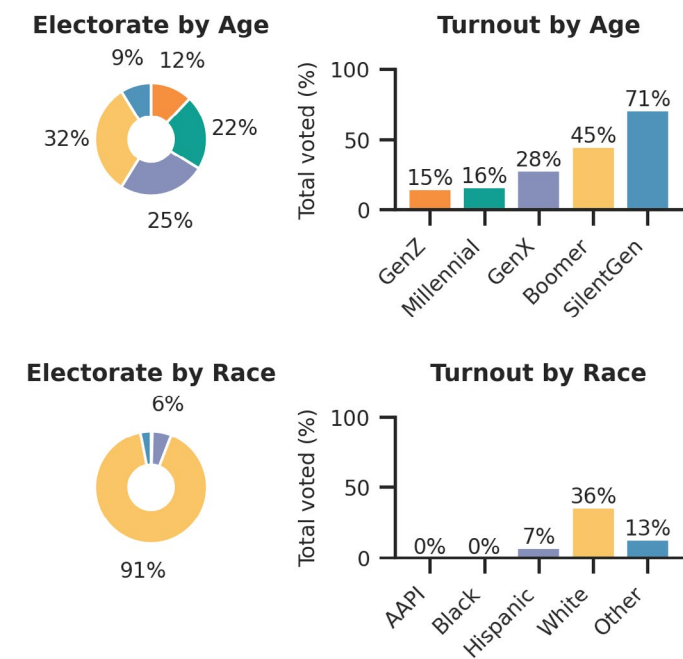


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Okanogan for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

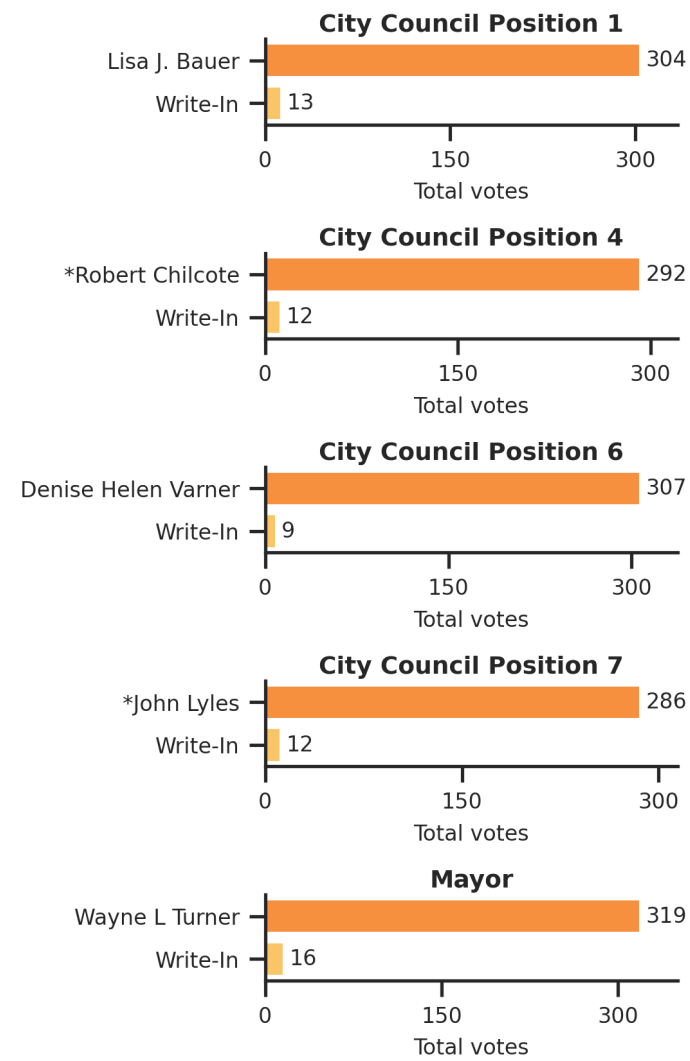
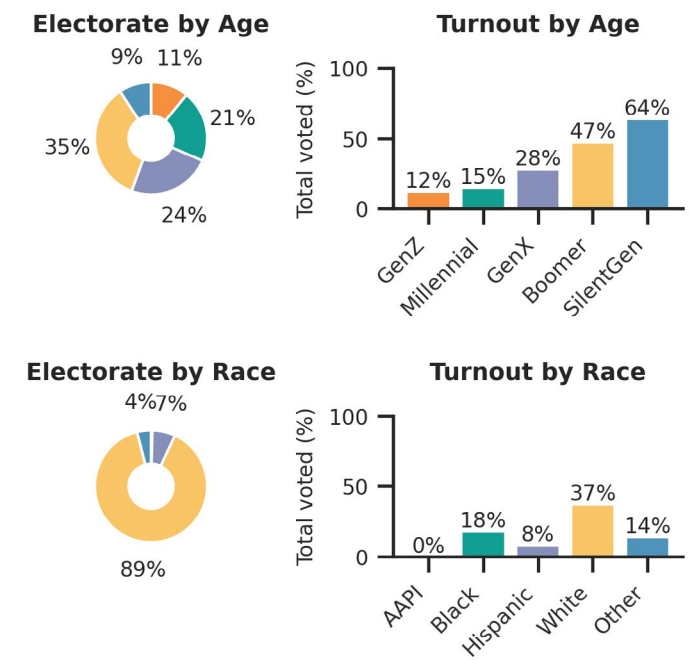


Fig 2 Election results in Okanogan for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

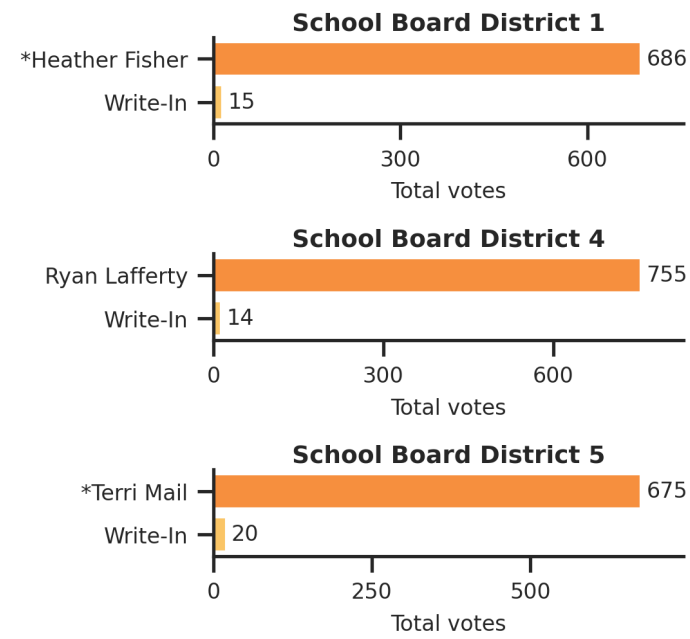

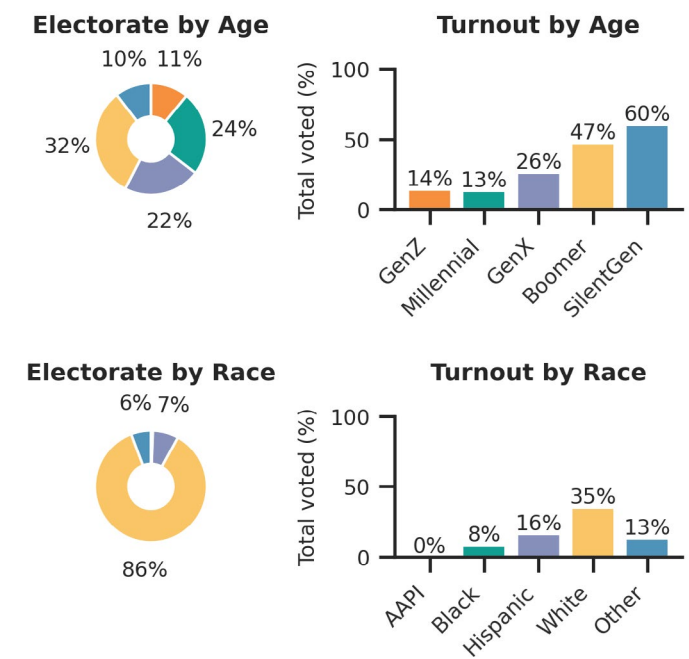

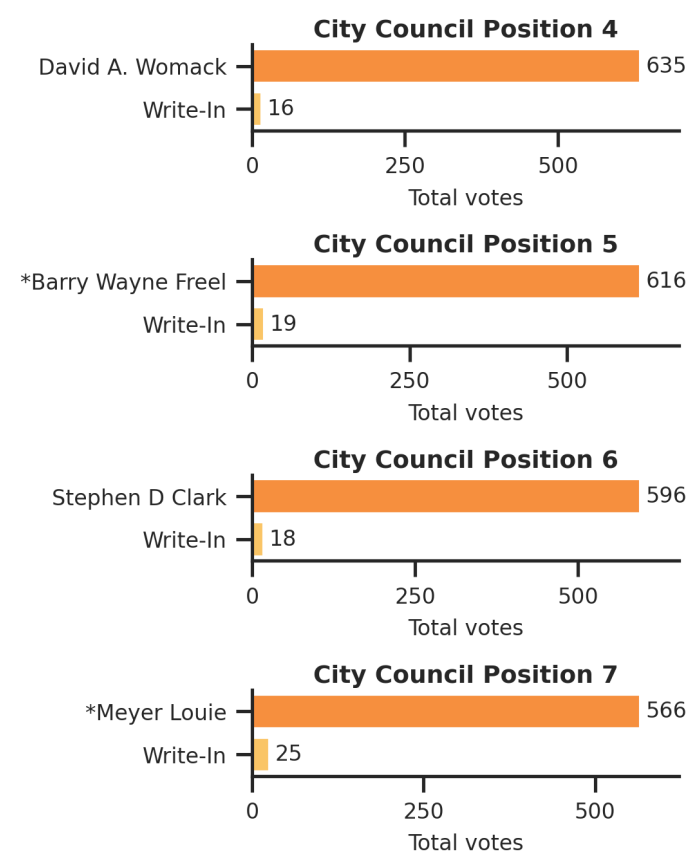

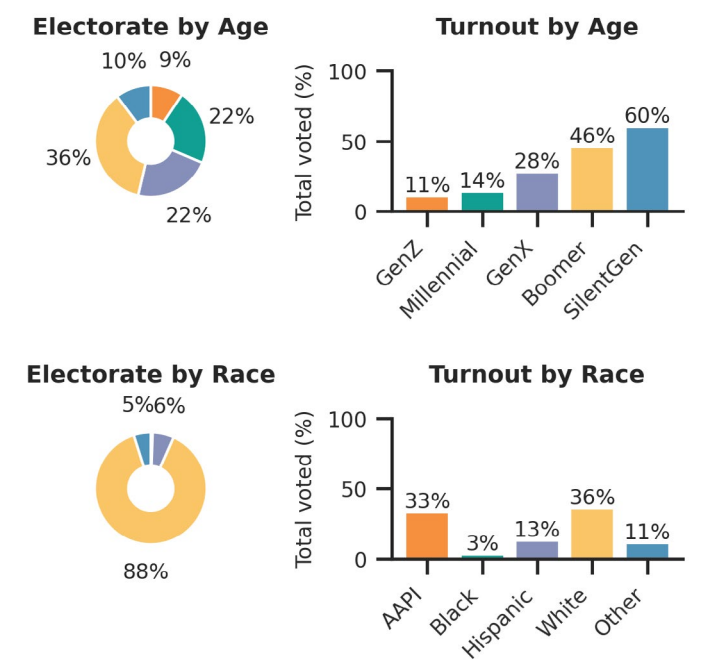


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Omak School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

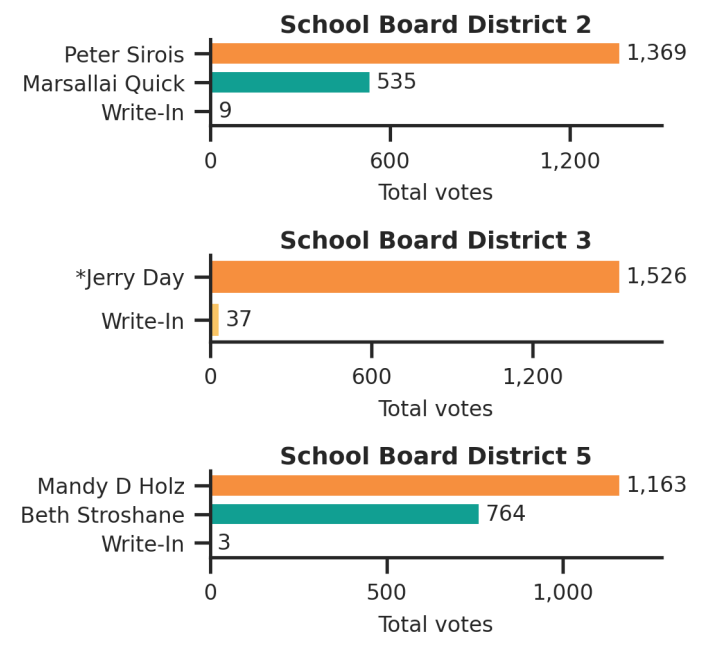


Fig 2 Election results in Omak School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

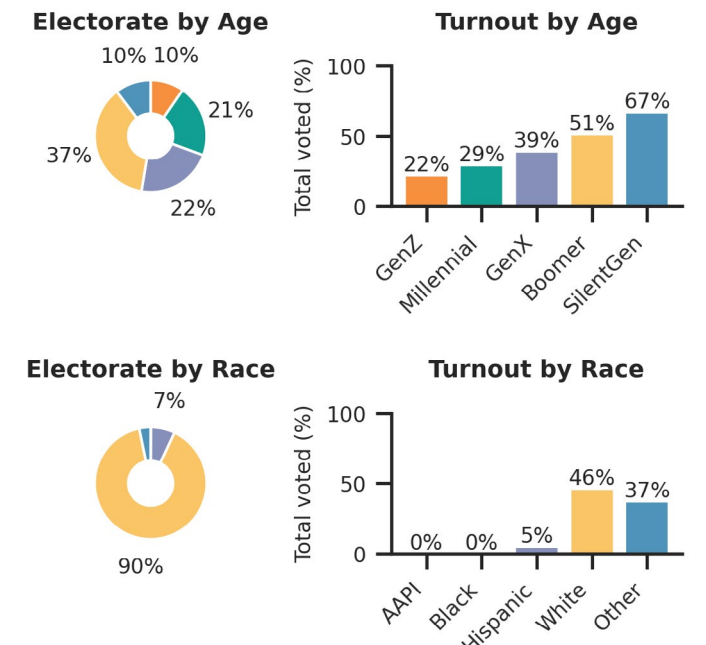


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oroville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

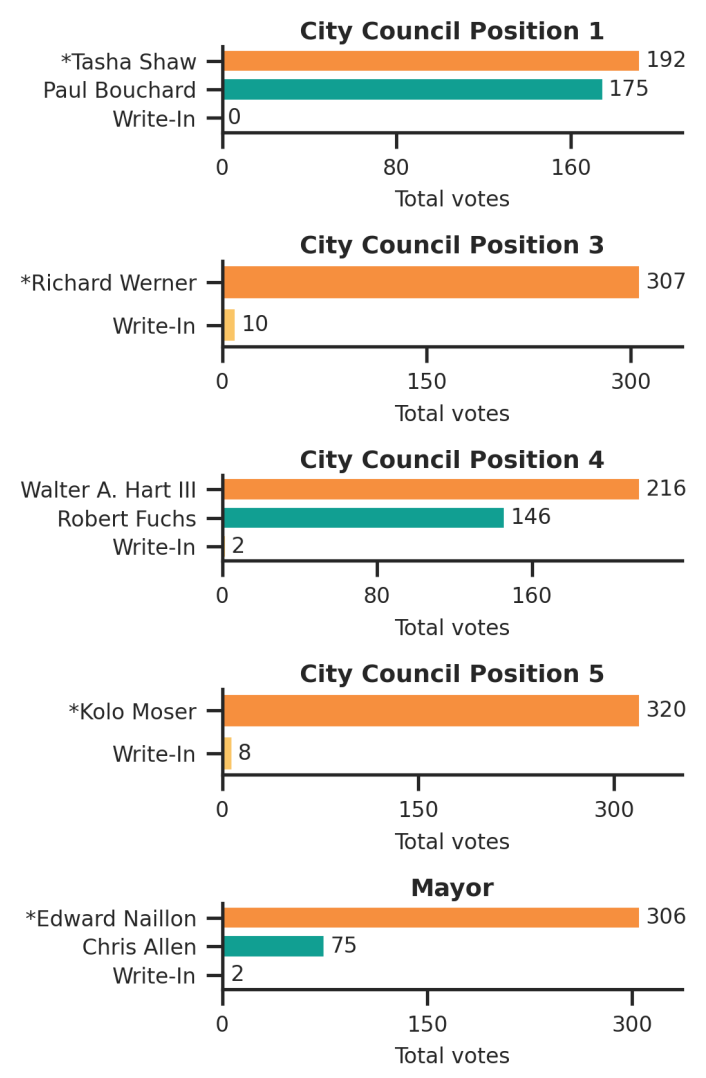
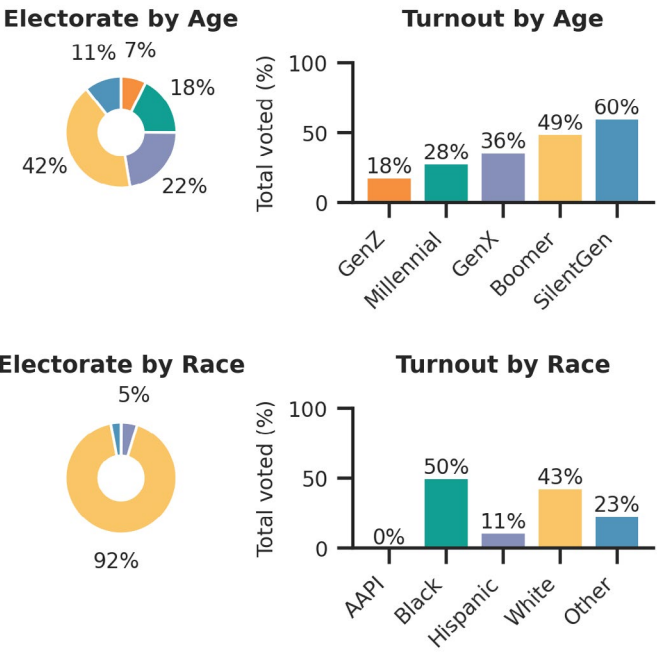


Fig 2 Election results in Oroville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

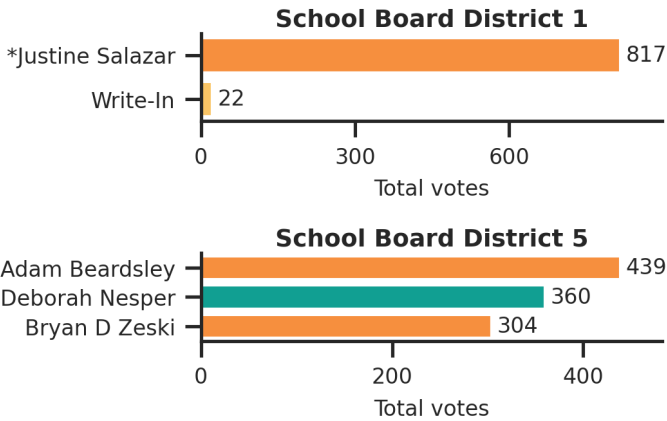

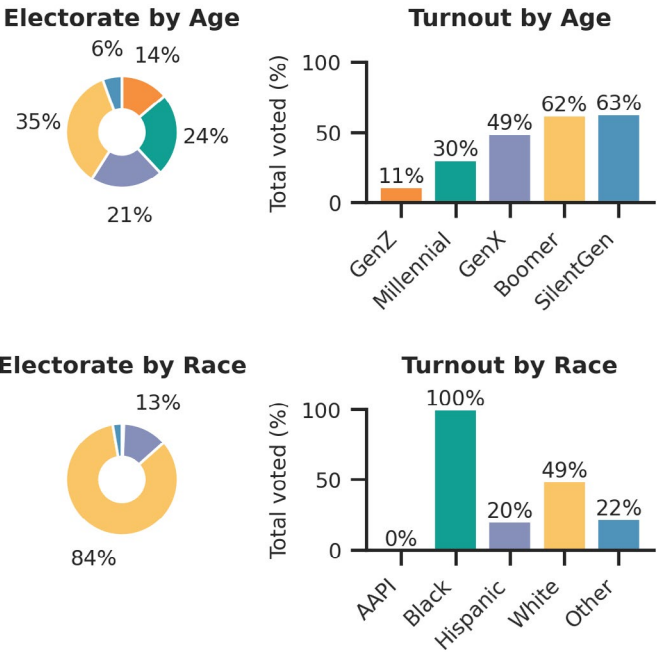

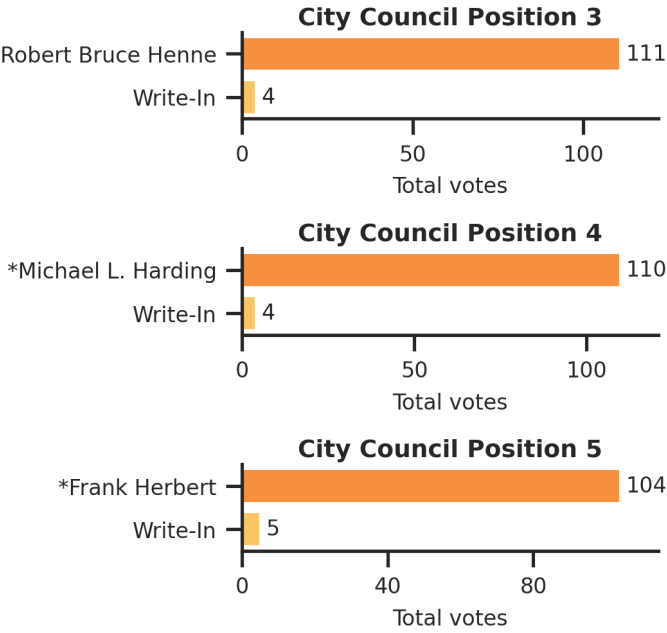

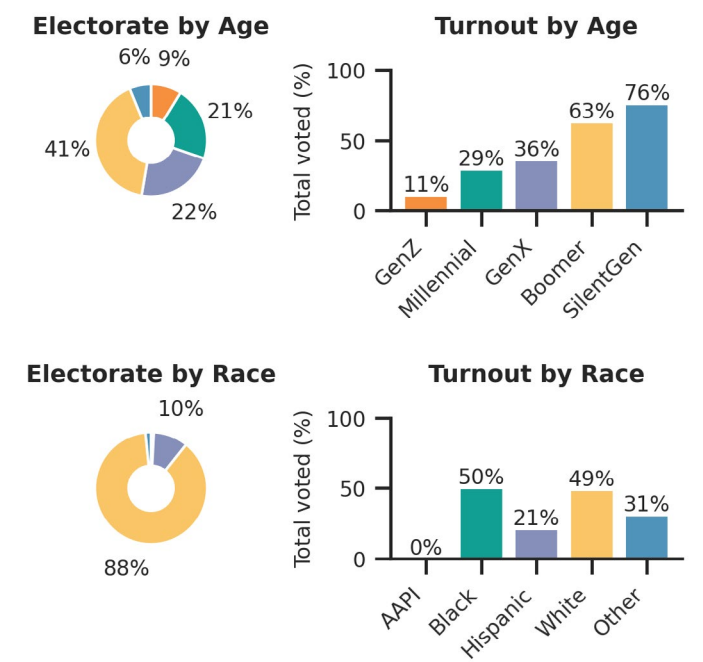


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pateros School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

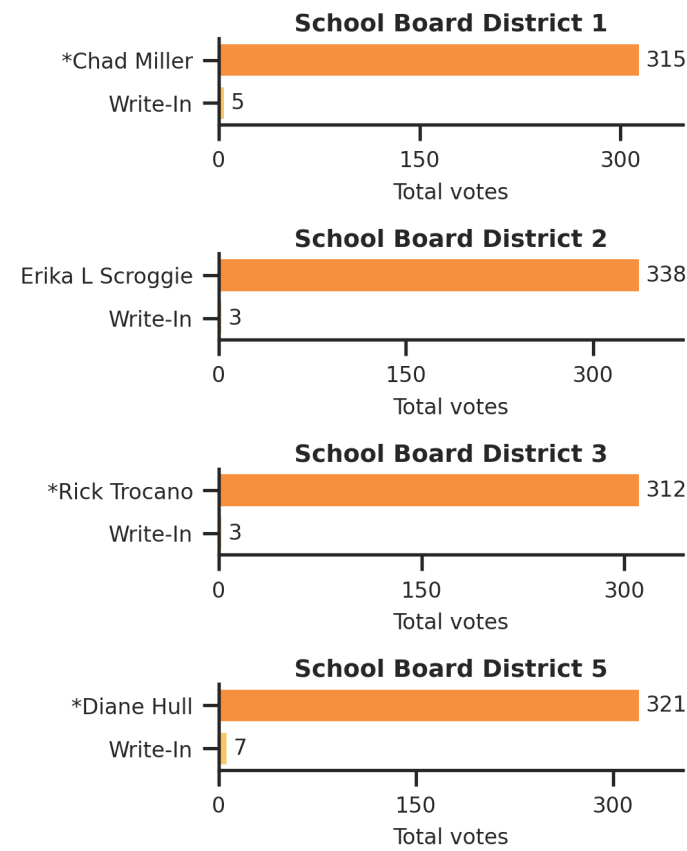


Fig 2 Election results in Pateros School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

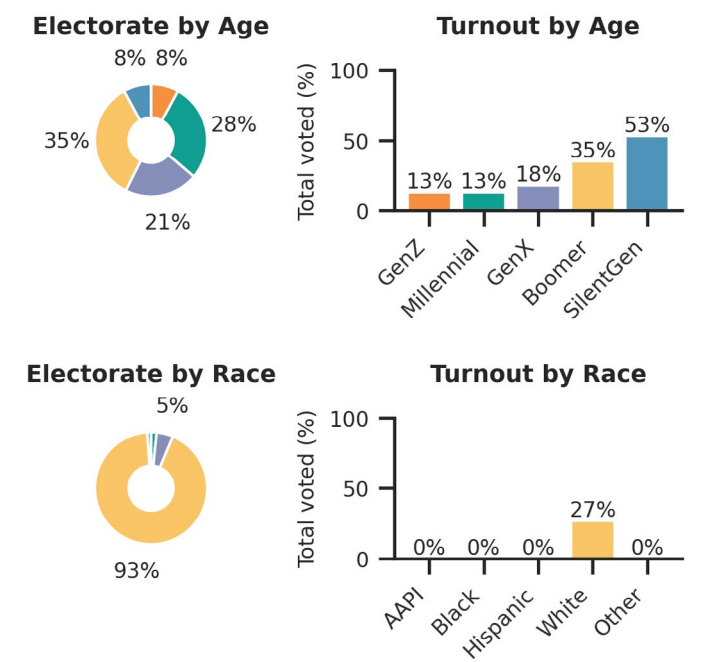


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Riverside for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

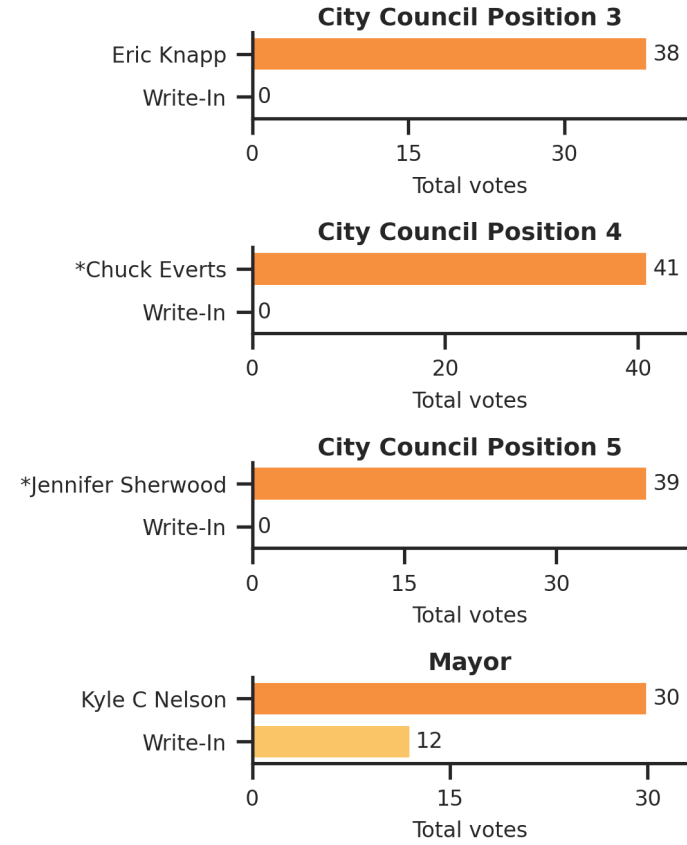
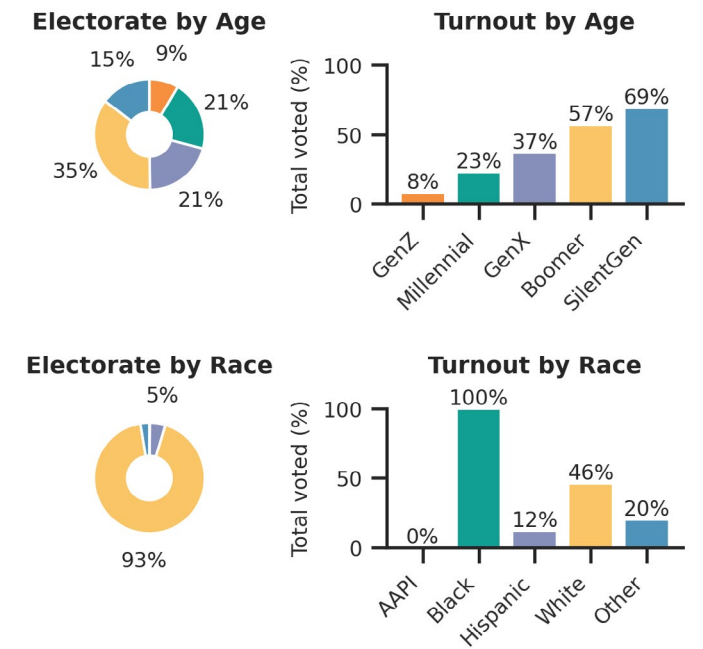


Fig 2 Election results in Riverside for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

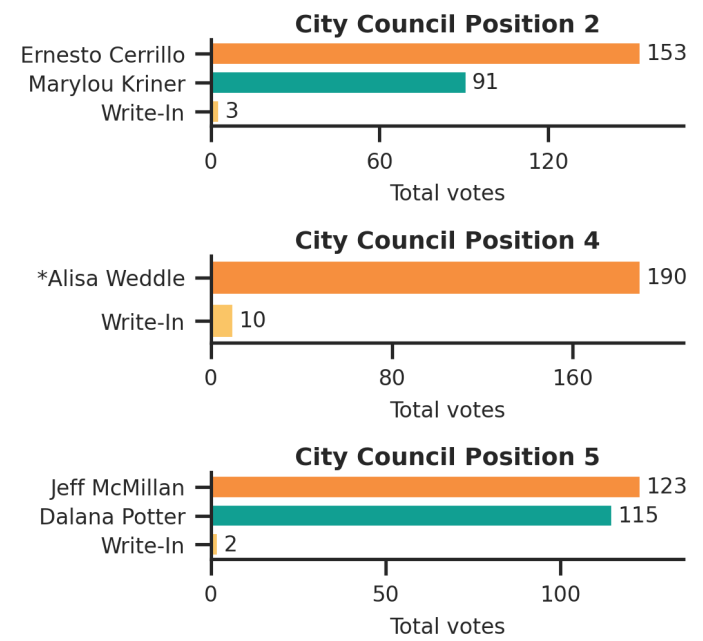

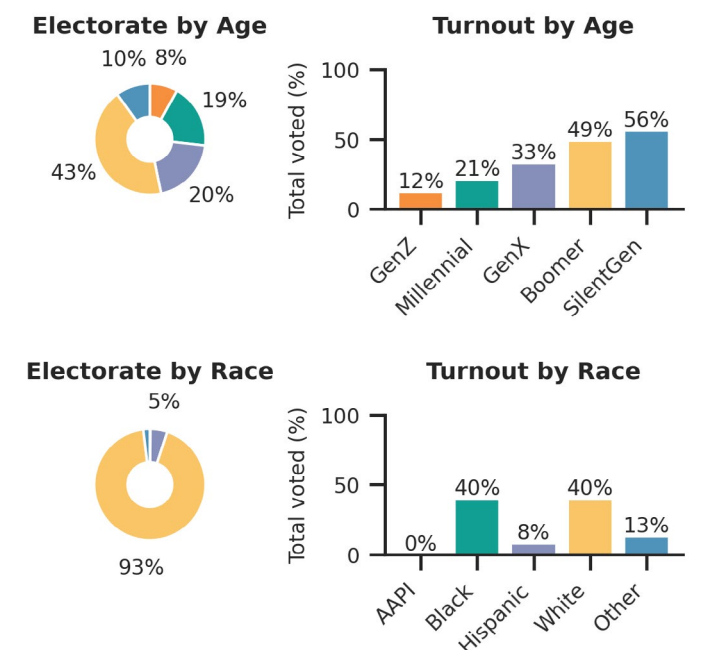

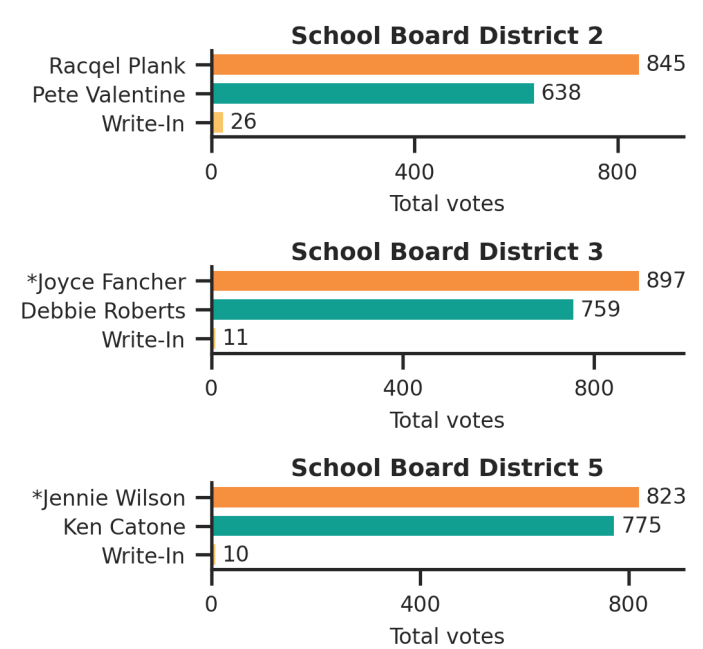

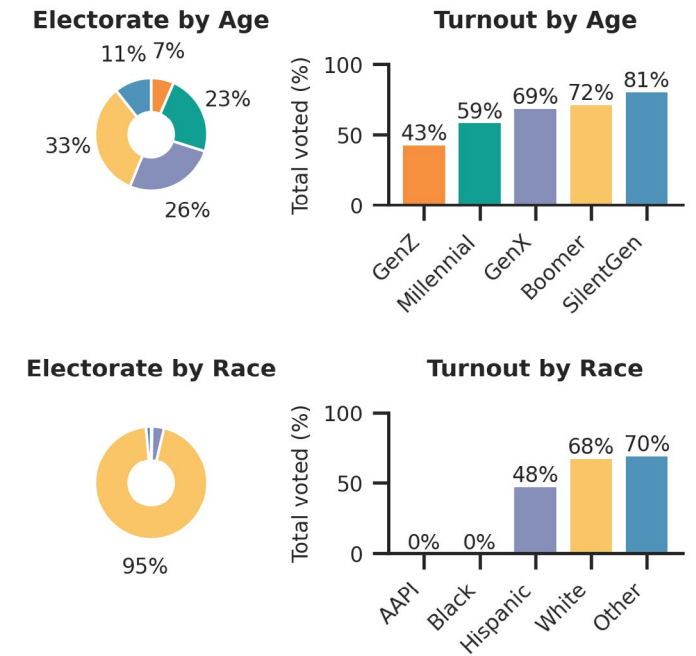


**Fig 2** Election results in Tonasket School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

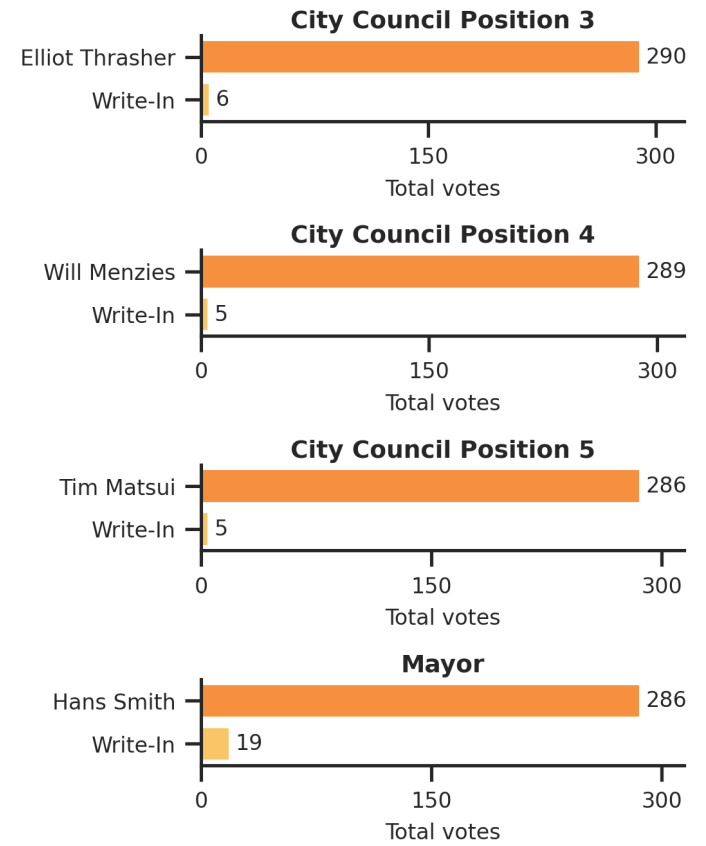

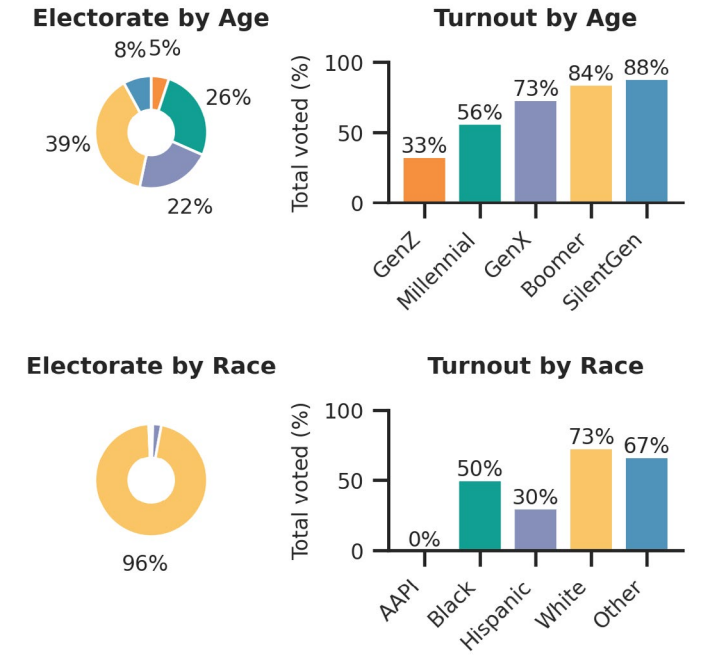

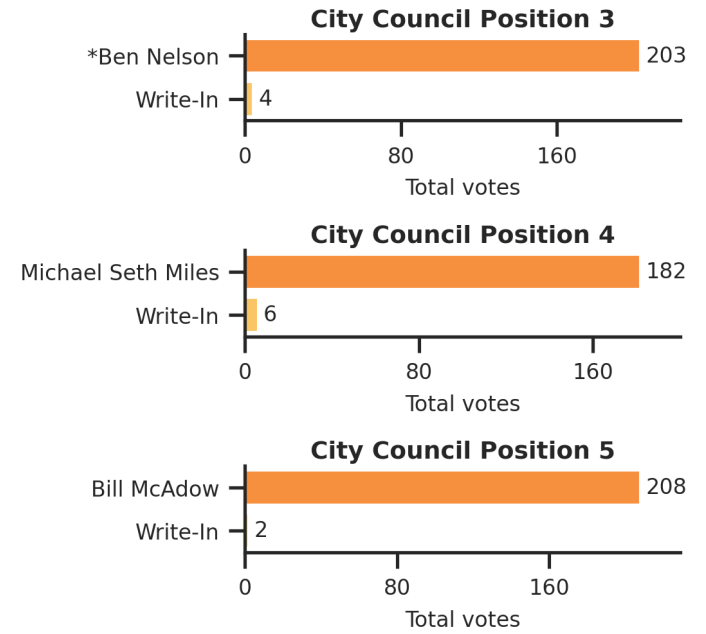

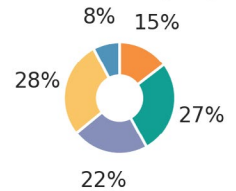
**Fig 2** Election results in Winthrop for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



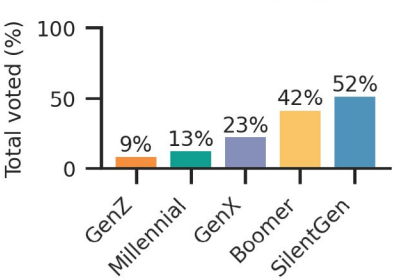

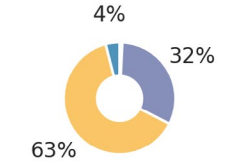
Electorate by Age

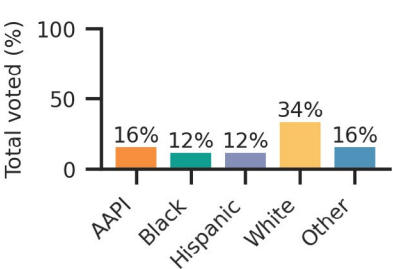
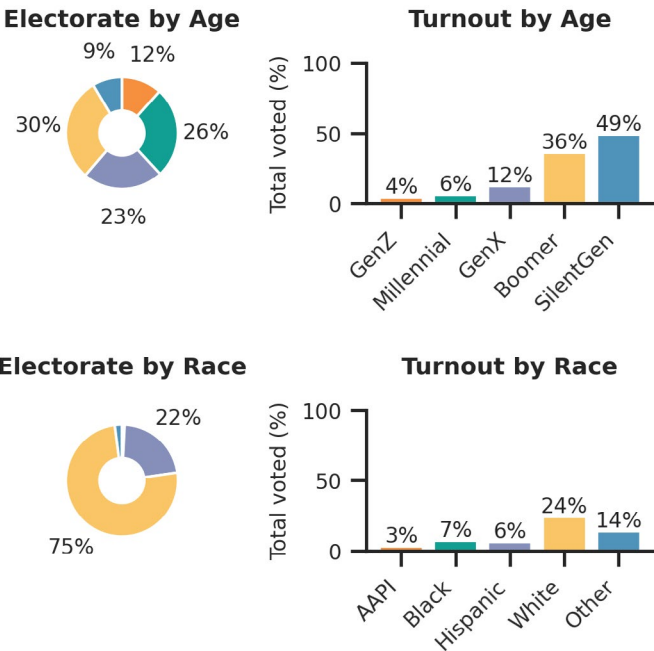


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Yakima County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

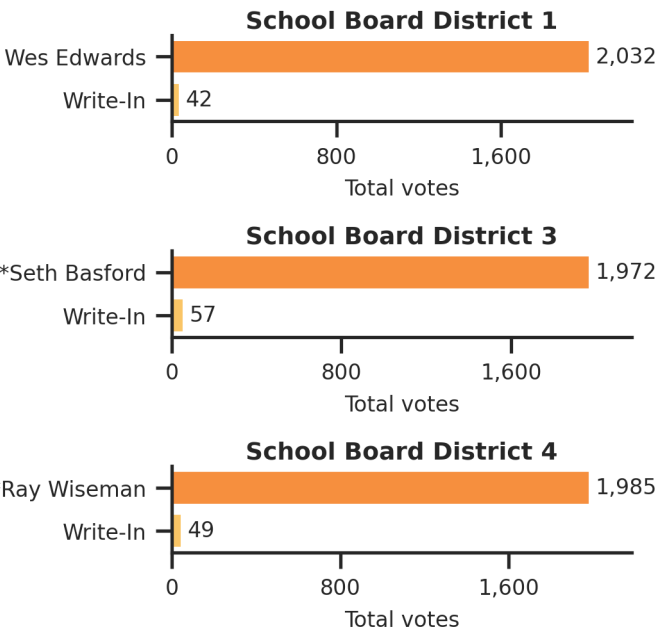

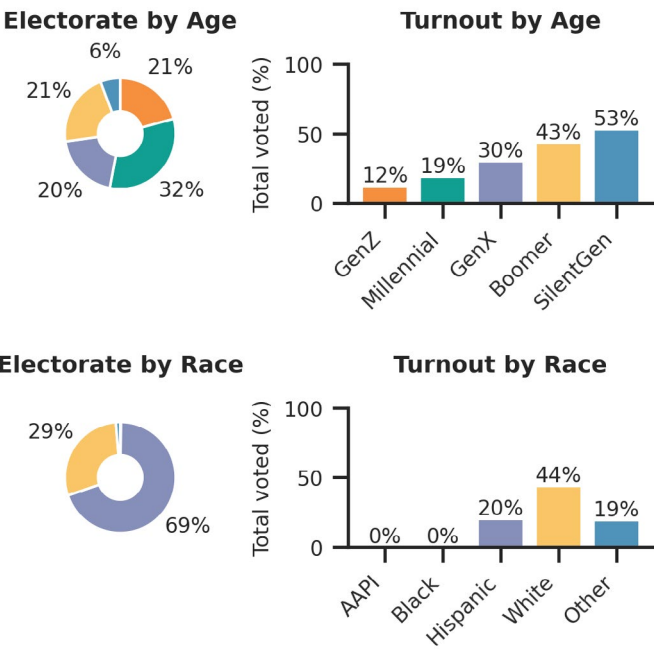

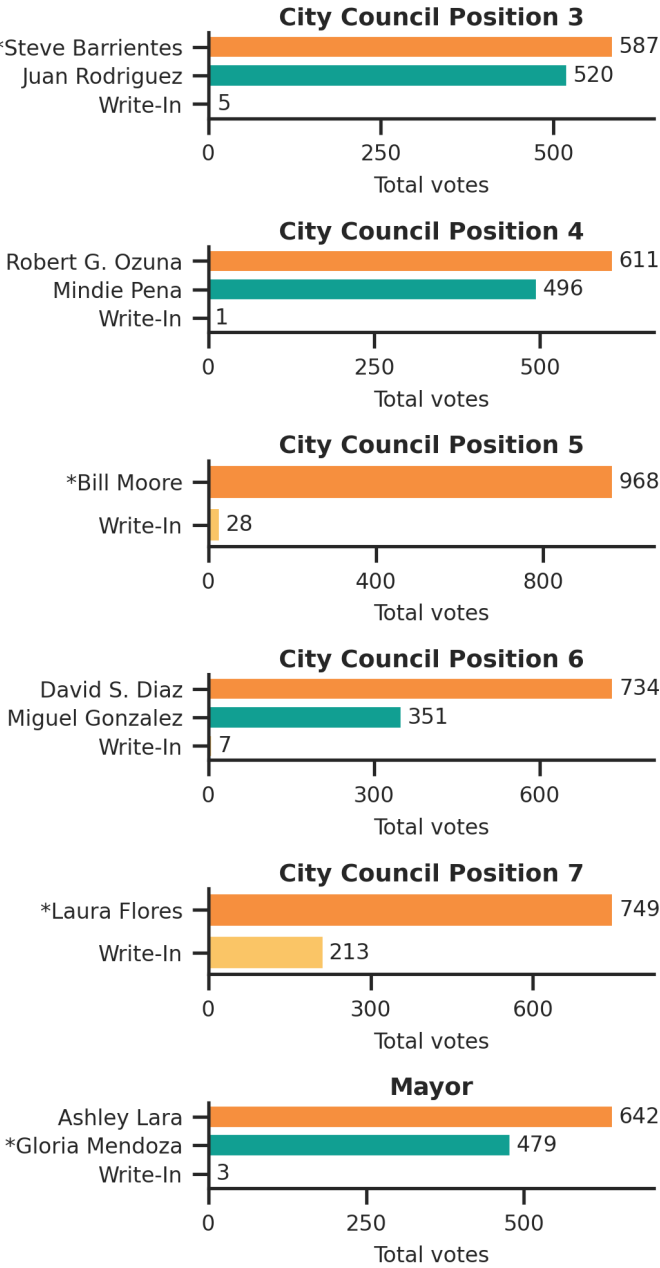

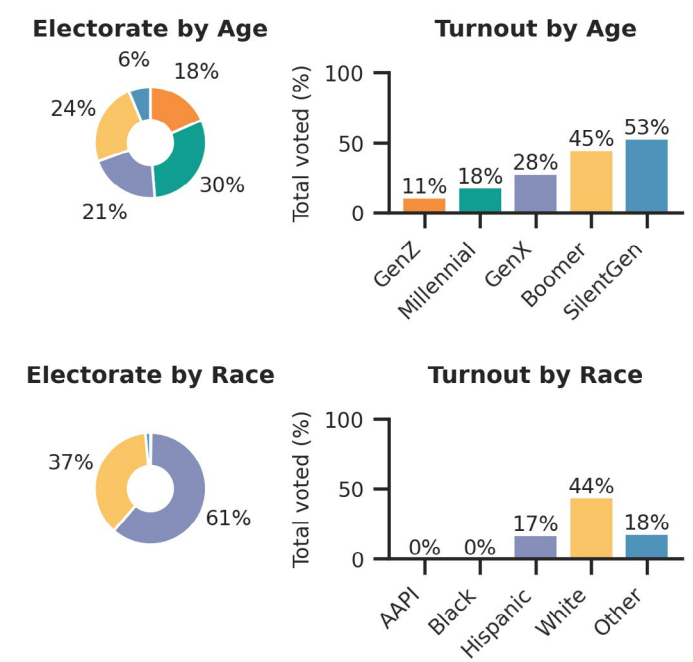

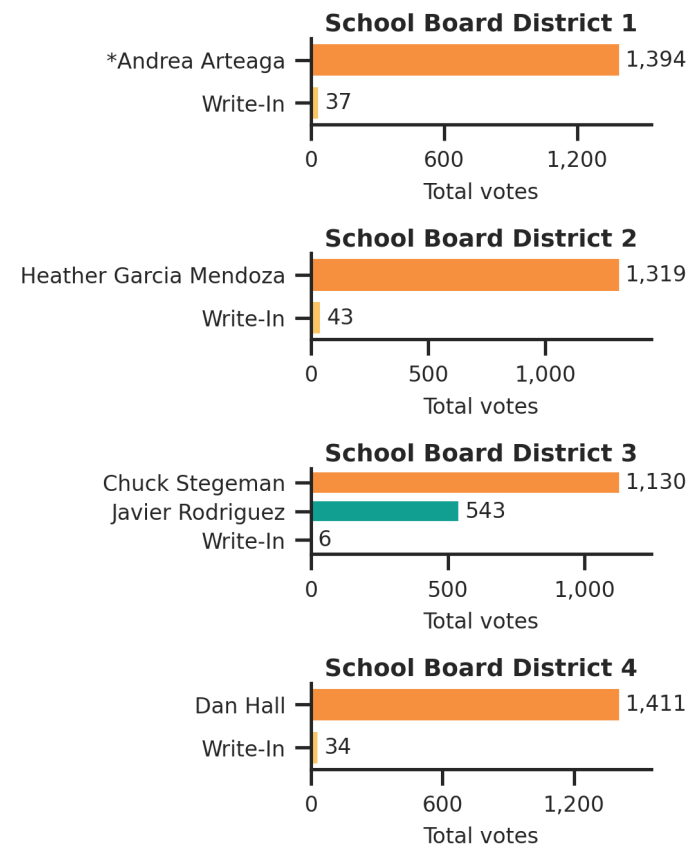

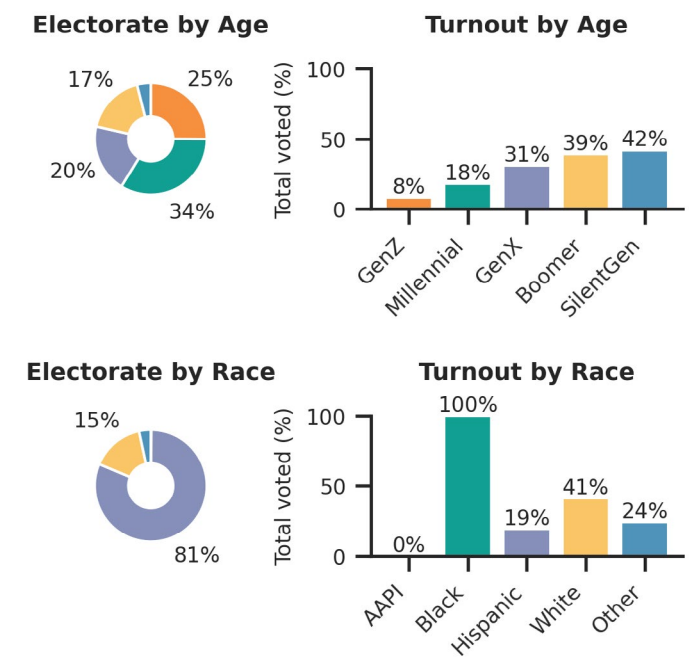

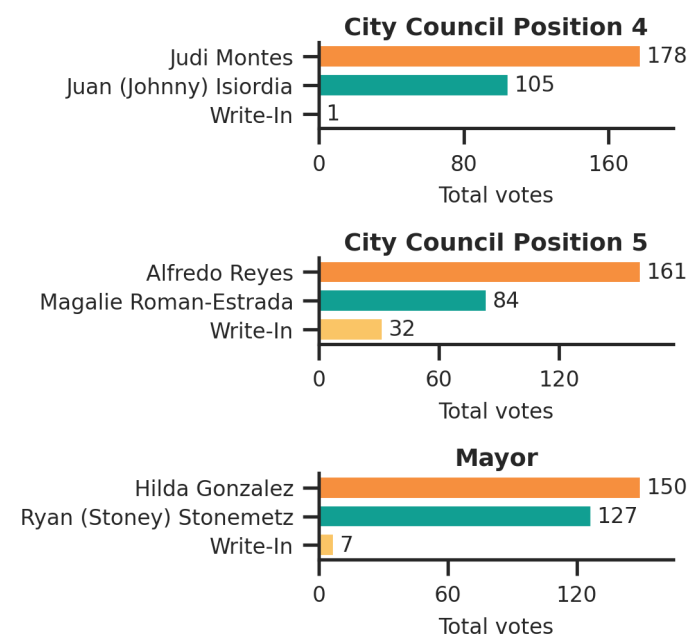

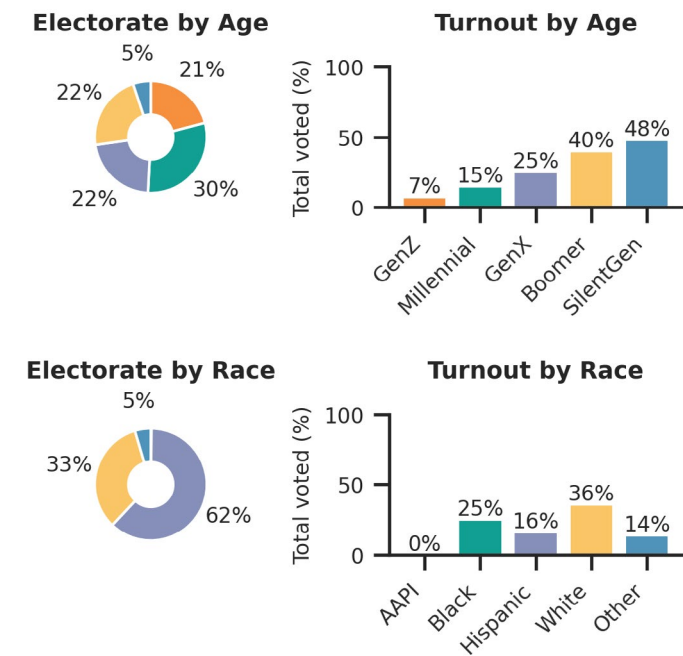


**Fig 2** Election results in Granger for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

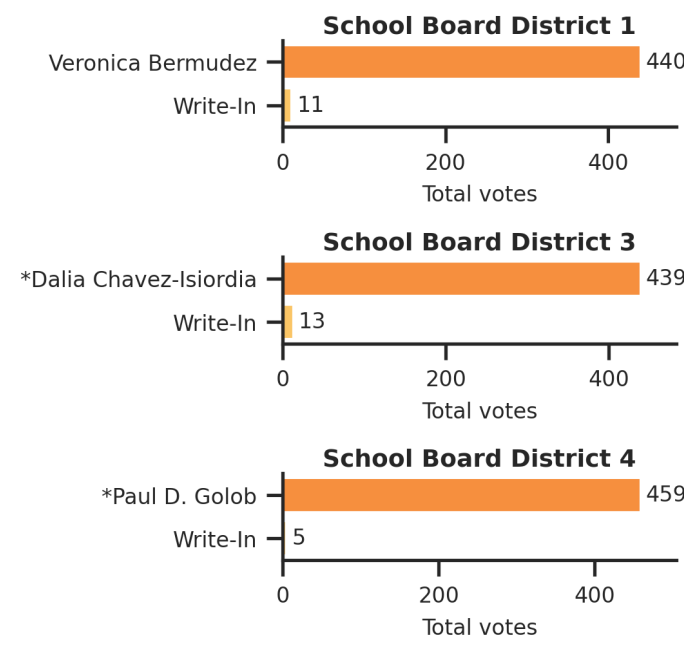

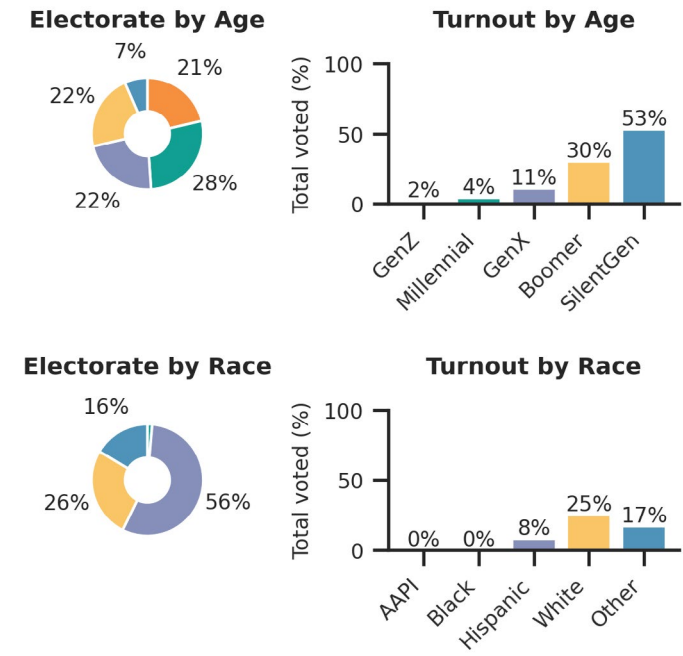

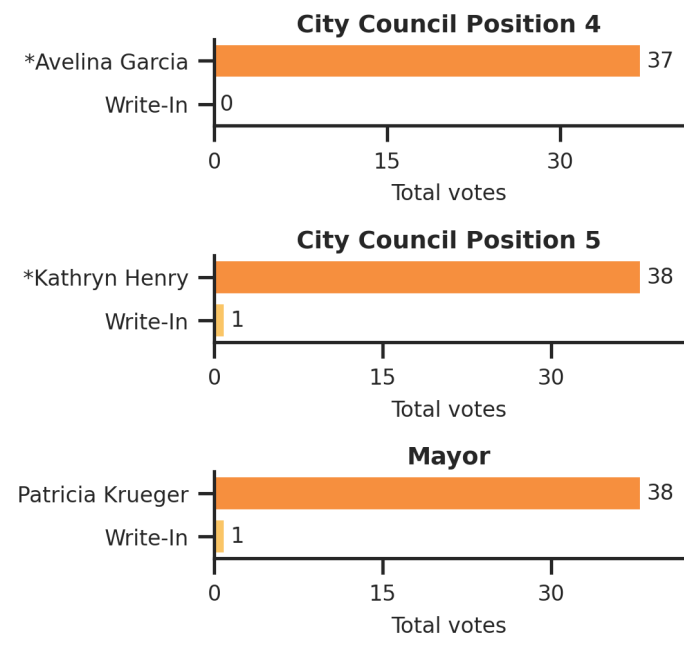

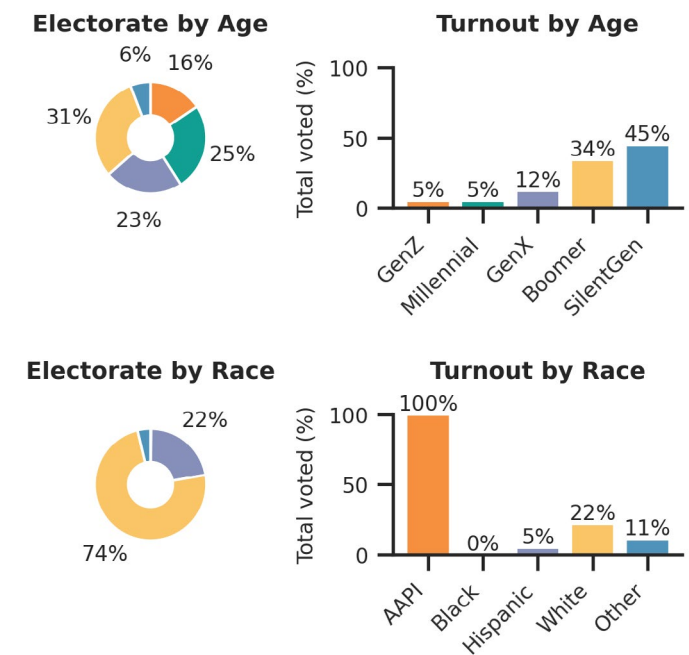


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Highland School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

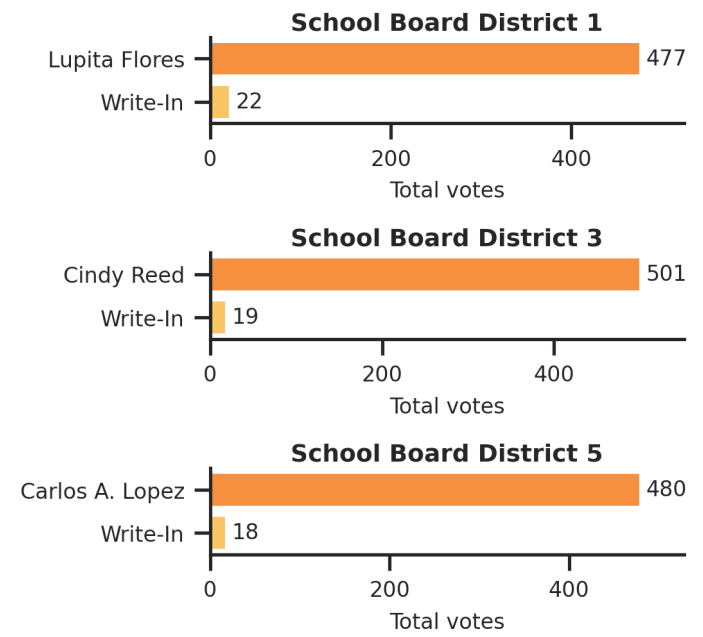


Fig 2 Election results in Highland School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

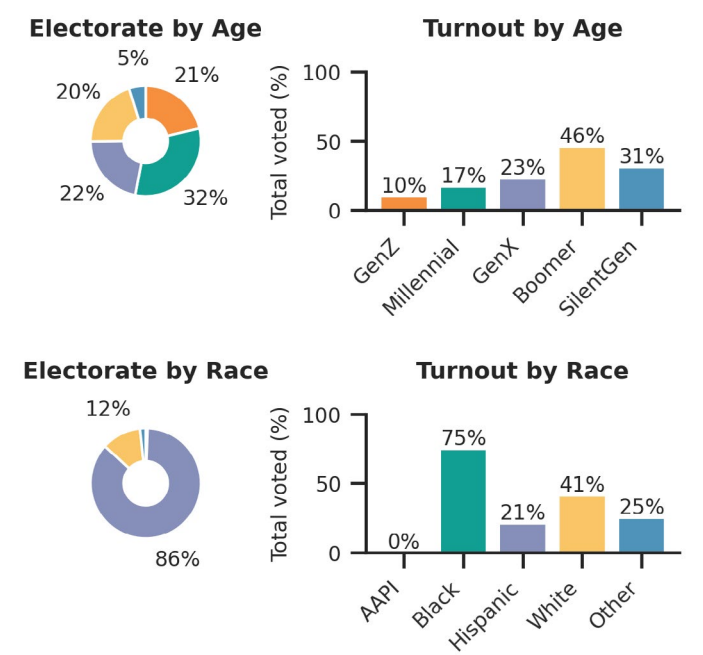


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mabton for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

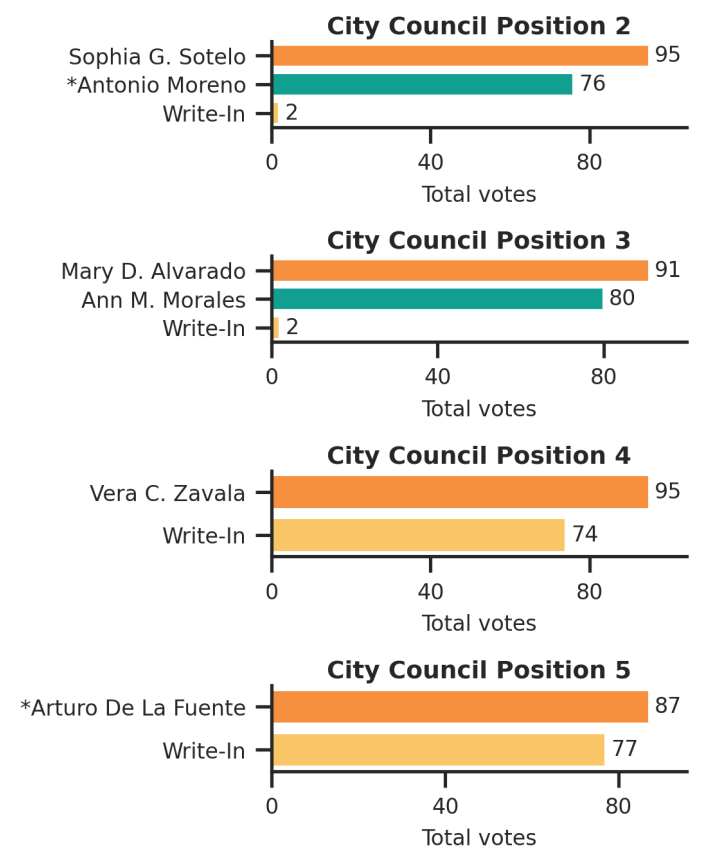
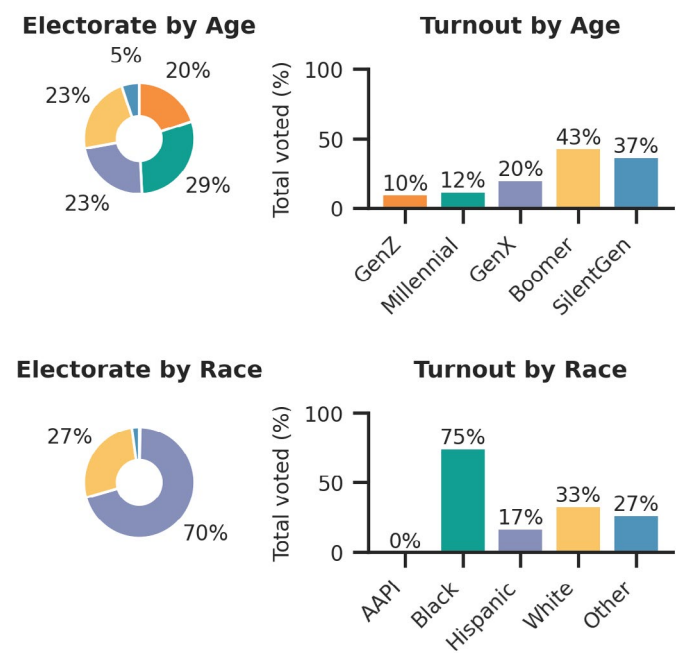


Fig 2 Election results in Mabton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

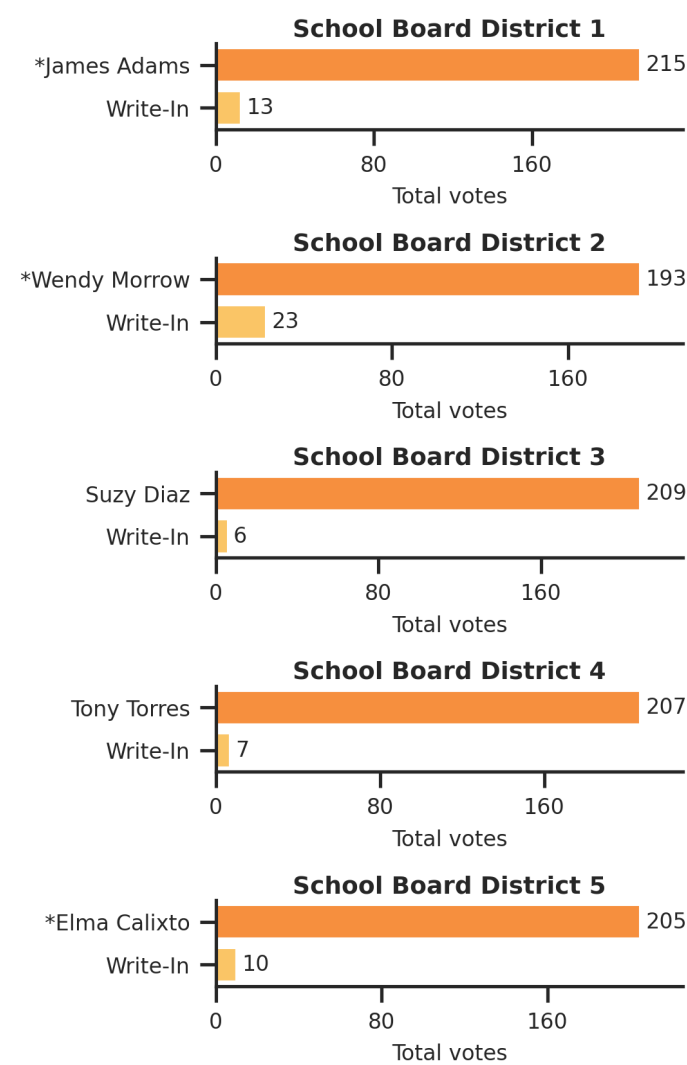


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mabton School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

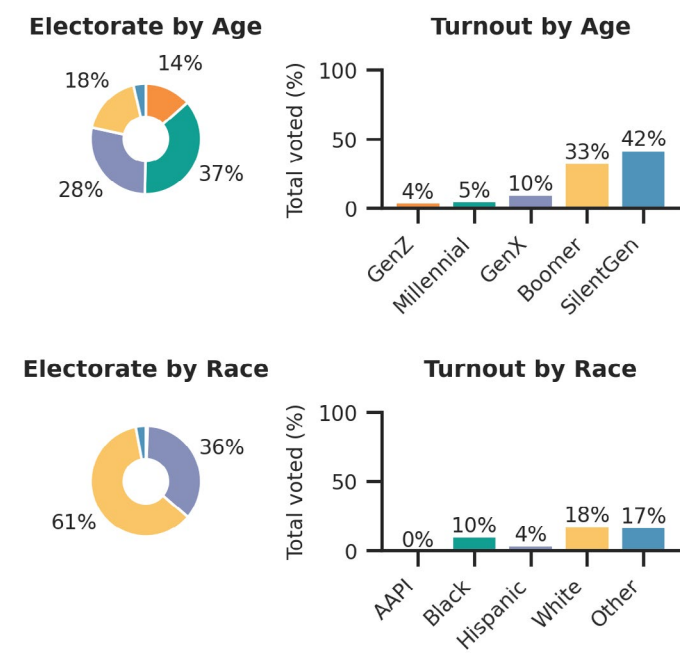

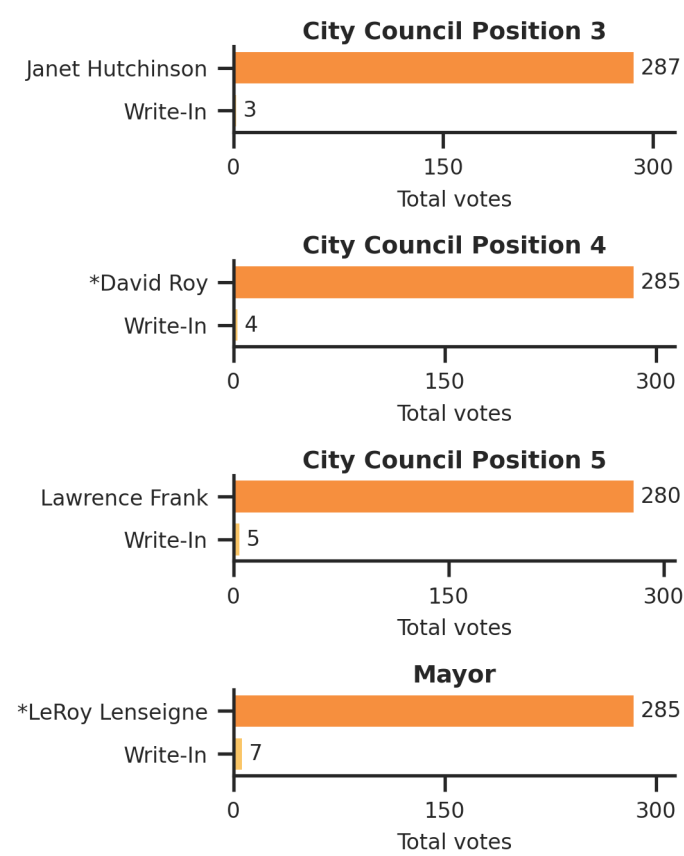

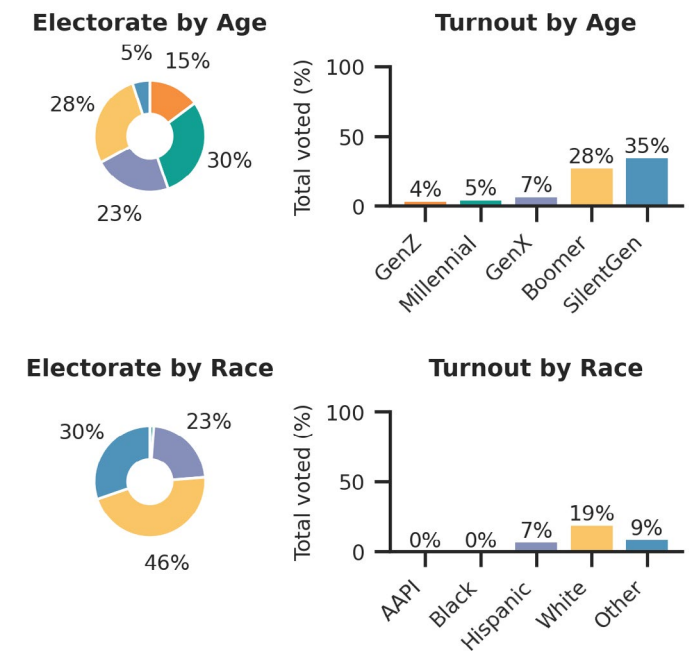


**Fig 2** Election results in Moxee for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

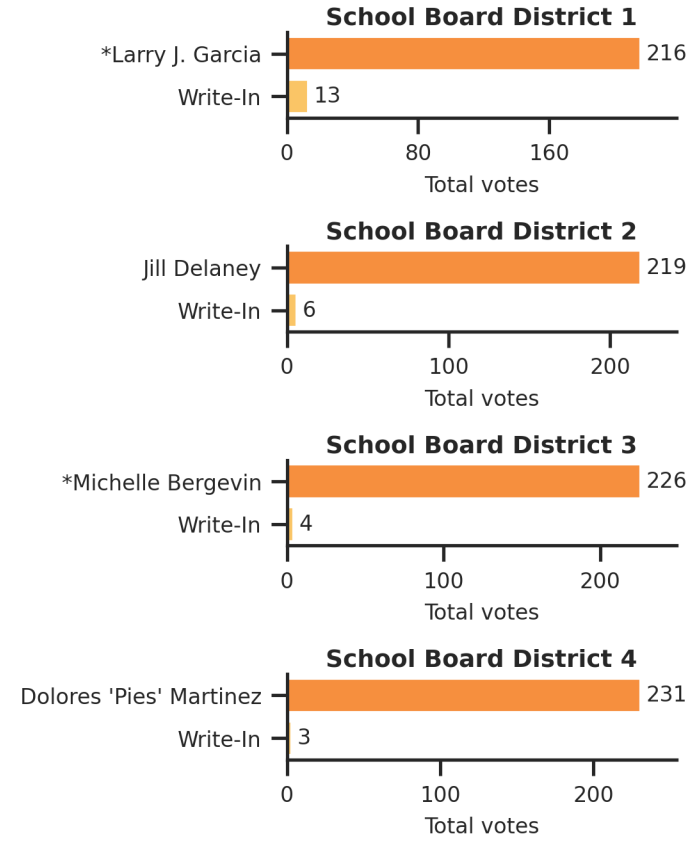

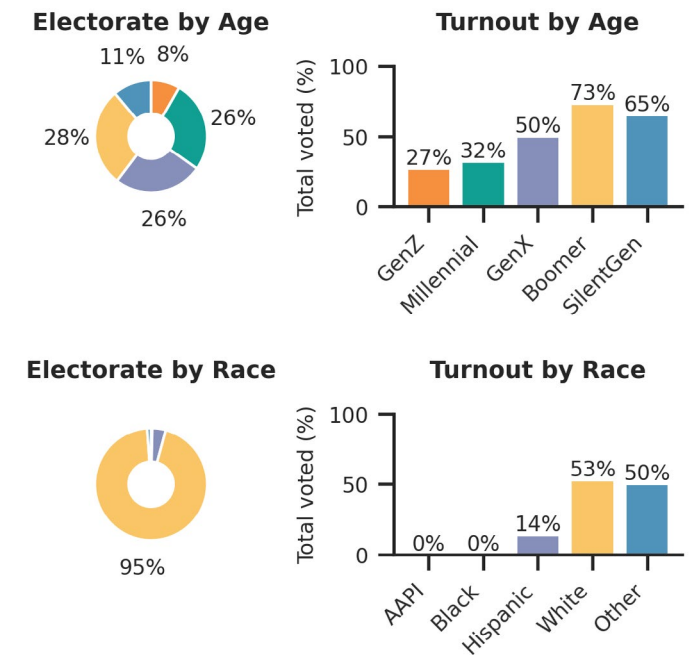


**Fig 2** Election results in Mt. Adams School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

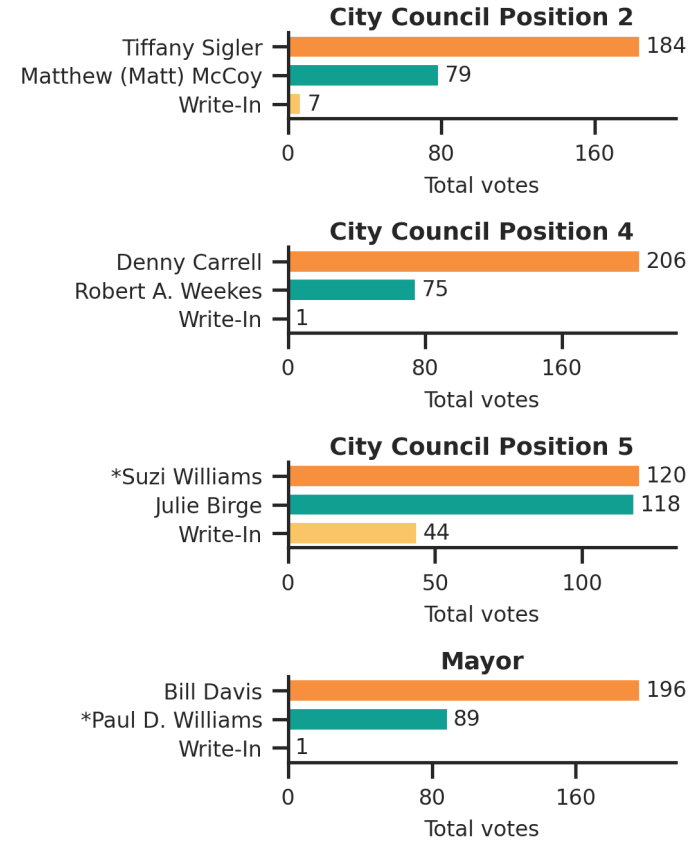

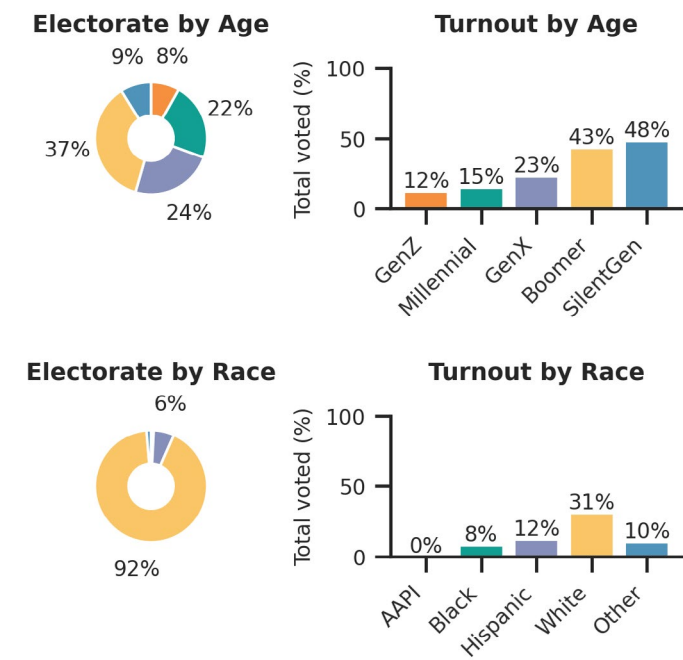


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Naches Valley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

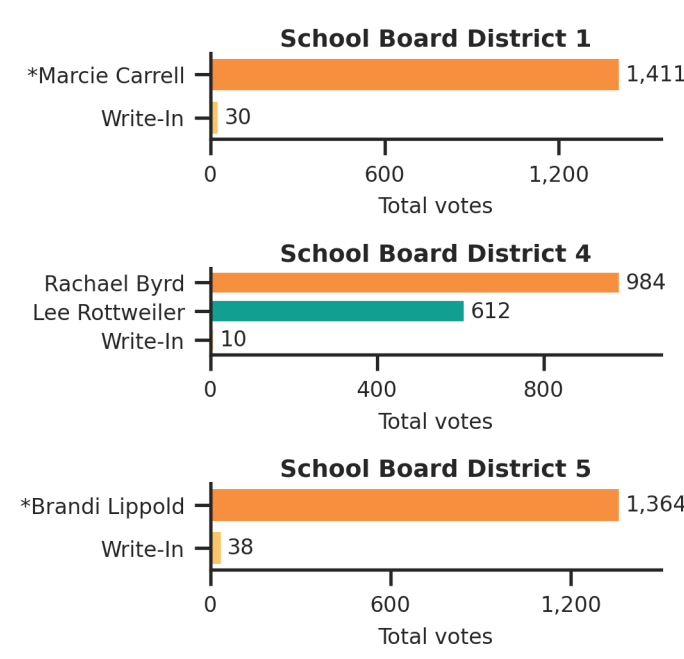


Fig 2 Election results in Naches Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

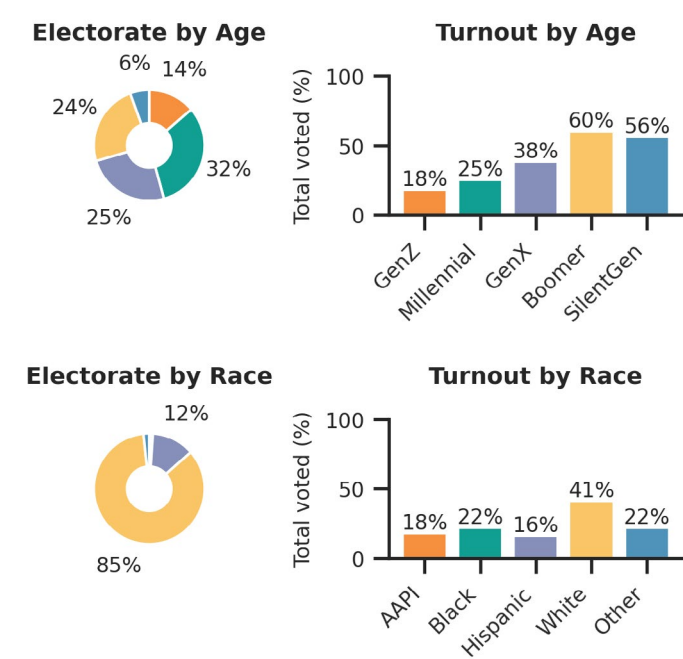


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Selah for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

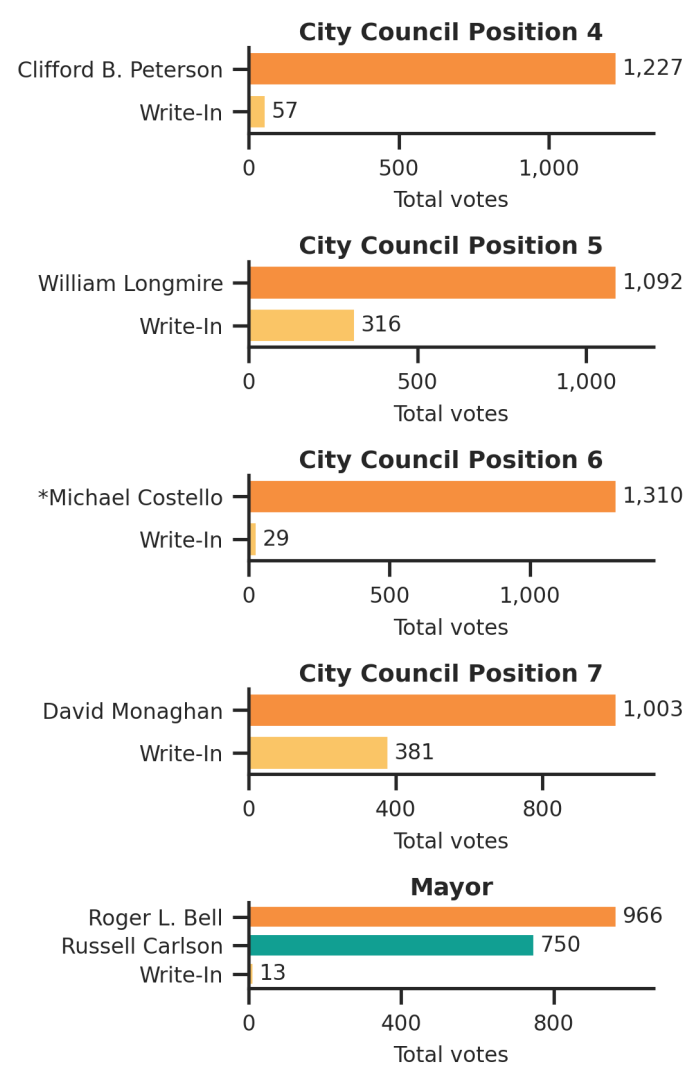
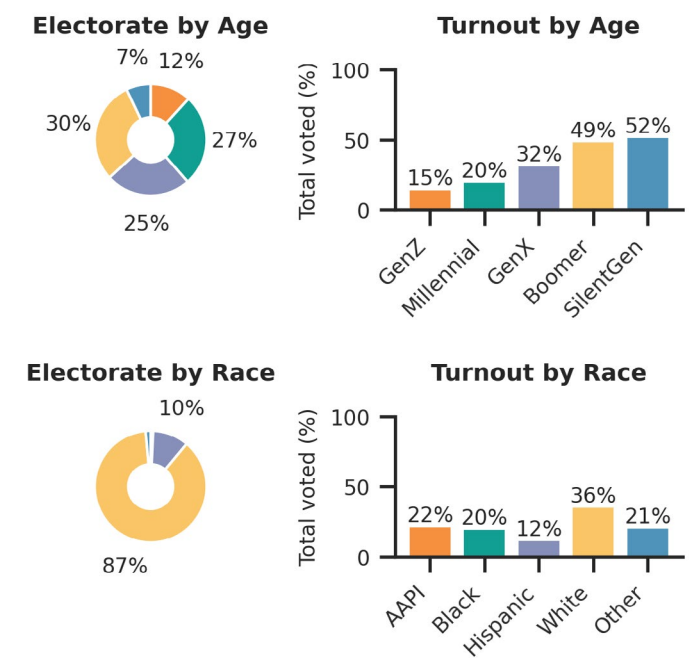


Fig 2 Election results in Selah for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

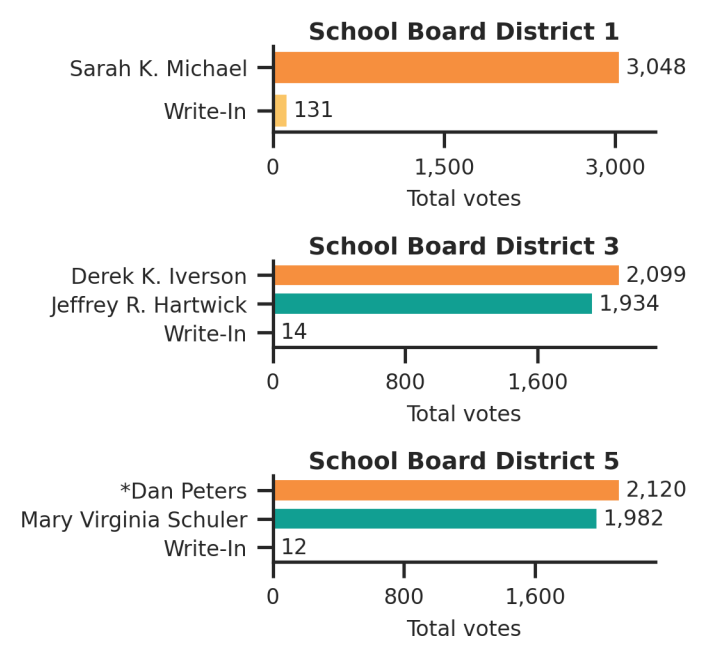

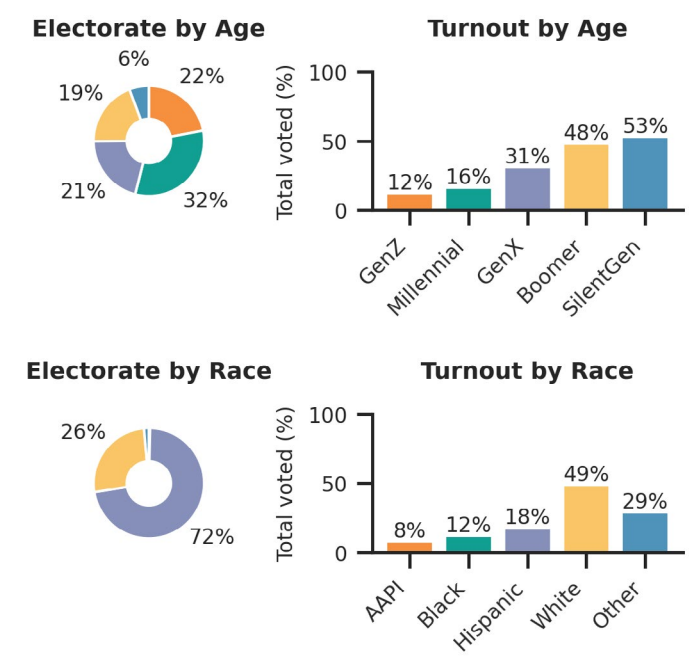


**Fig 2** Election results in Selah School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

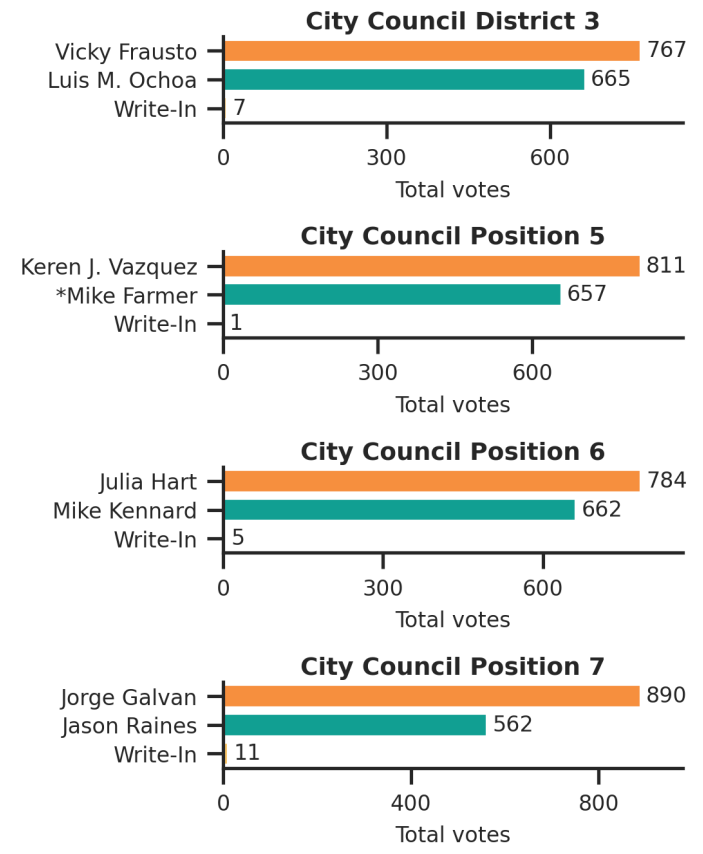

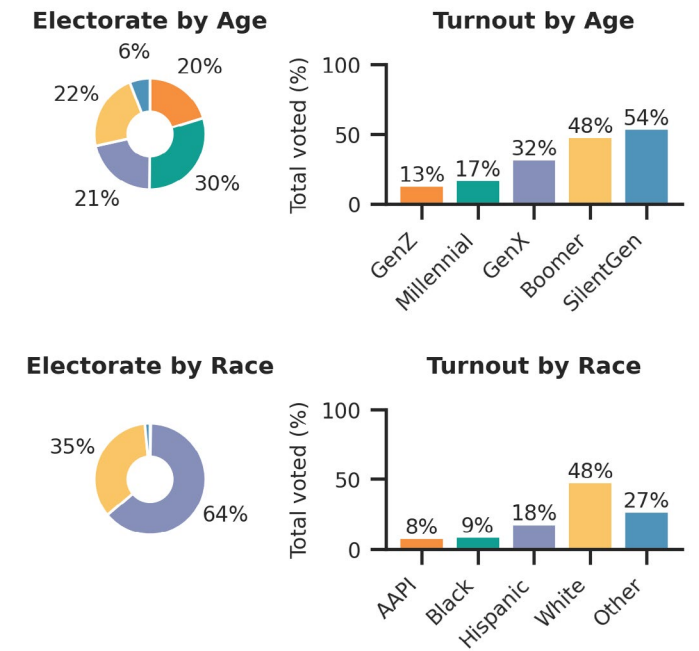


**Fig 2** Election results in Sunnyside for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

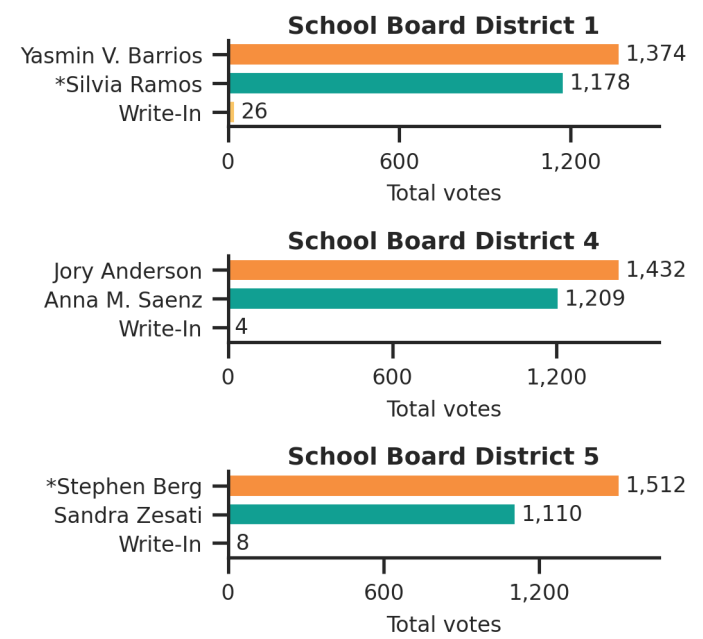

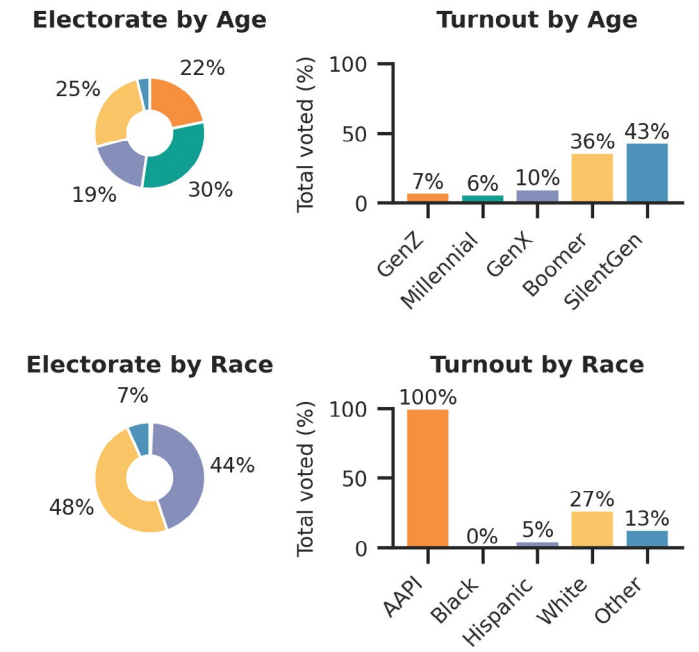

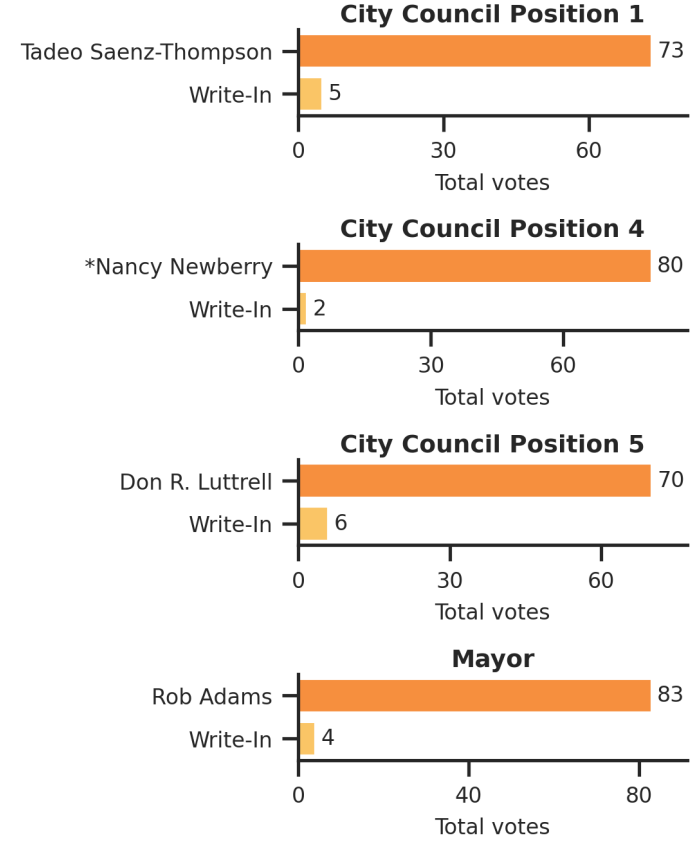

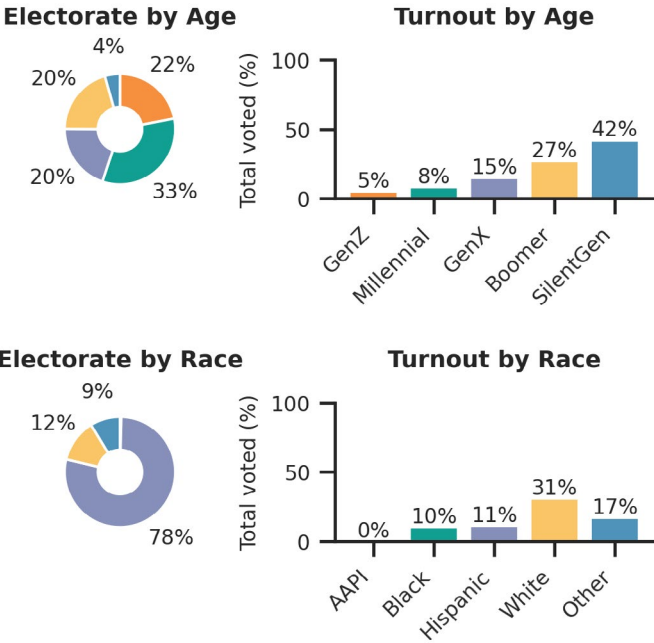


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Toppenish for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

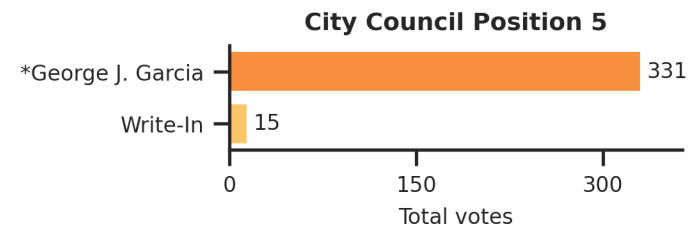


Fig 2 Election results in Toppenish for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

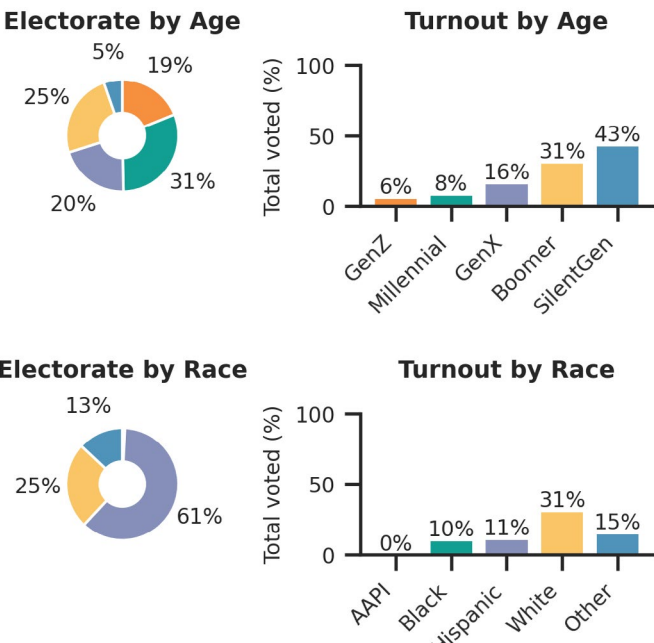


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Toppenish School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

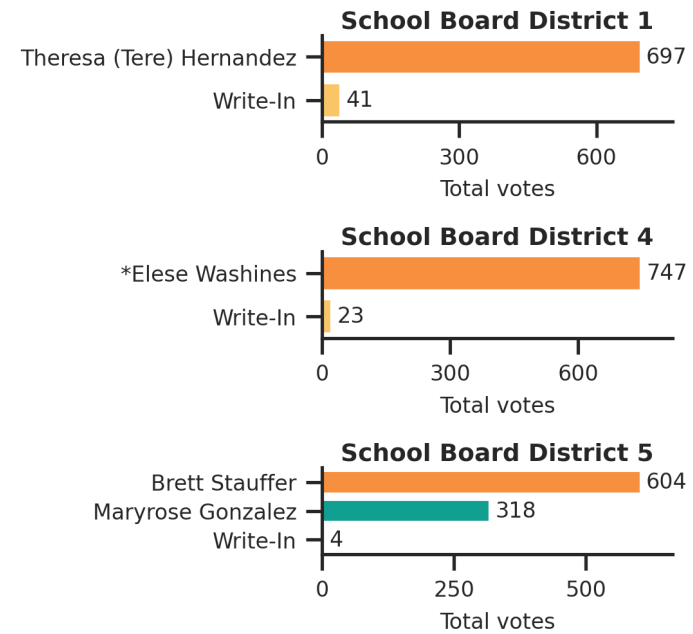


Fig 2 Election results in Toppenish School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

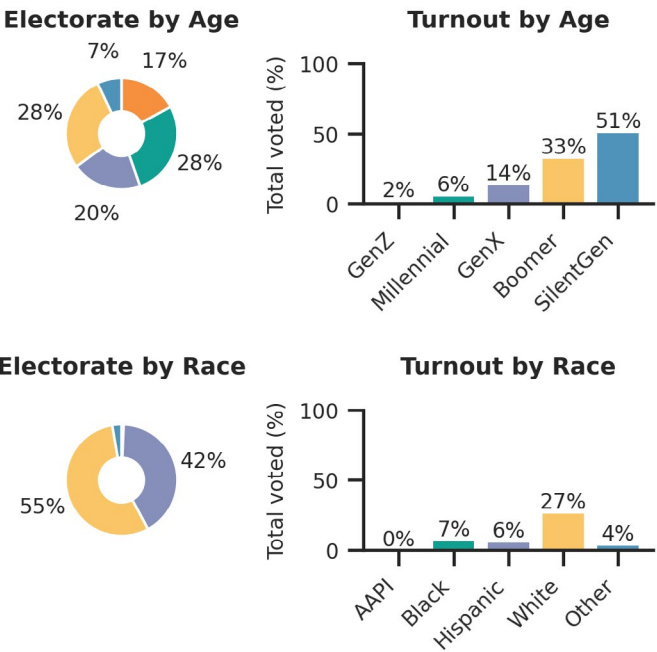


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Union Gap for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

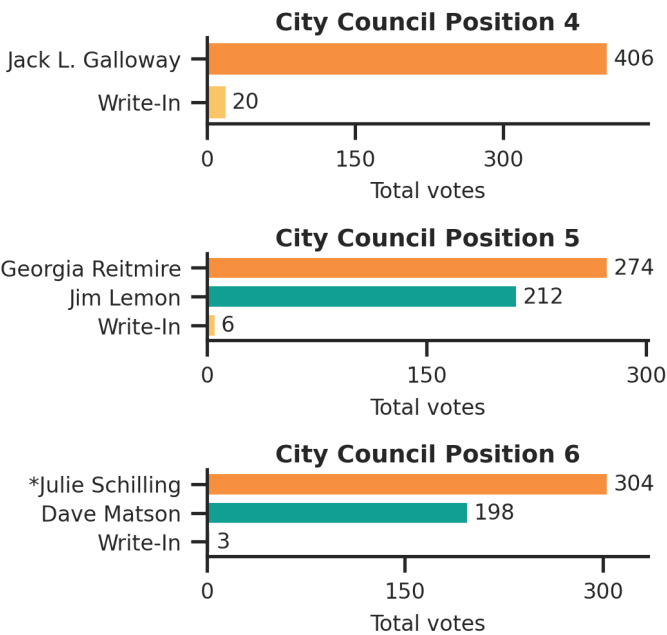


Fig 2 Election results in Union Gap for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

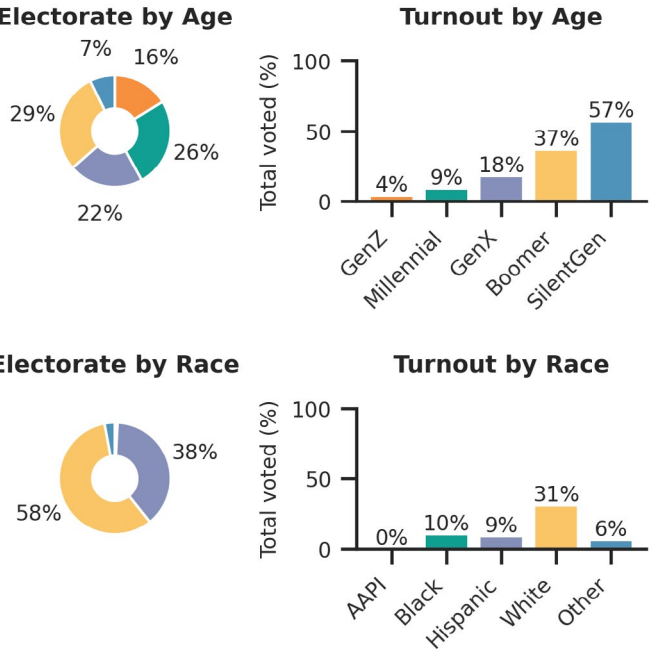


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Union Gap School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

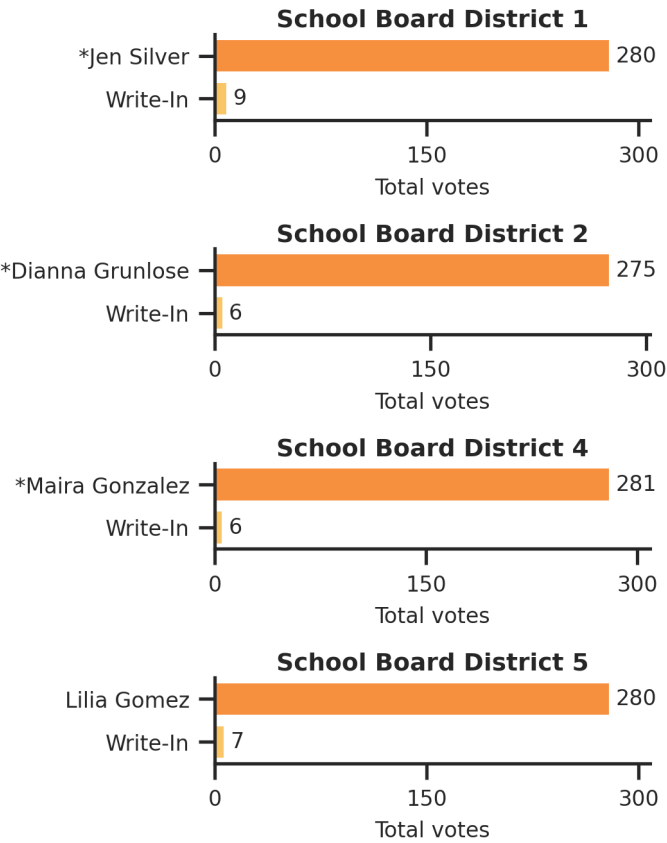


Fig 2 Election results in Union Gap School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

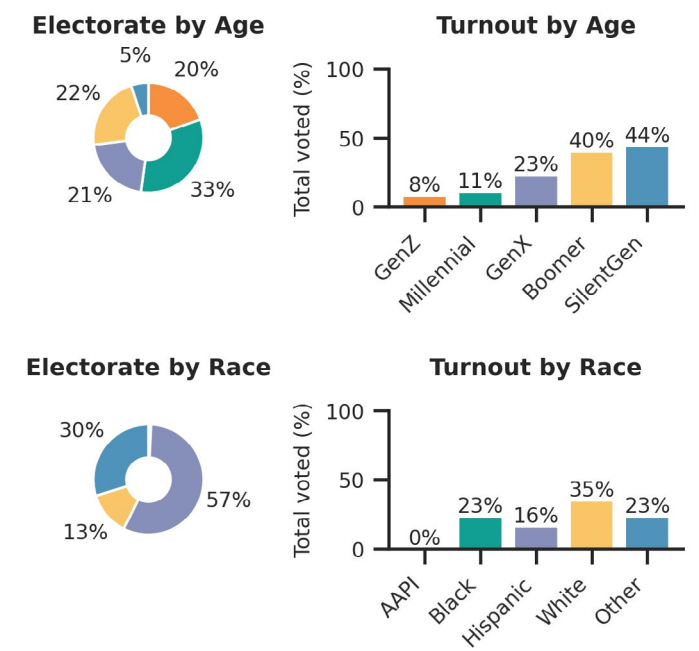


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wapato for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

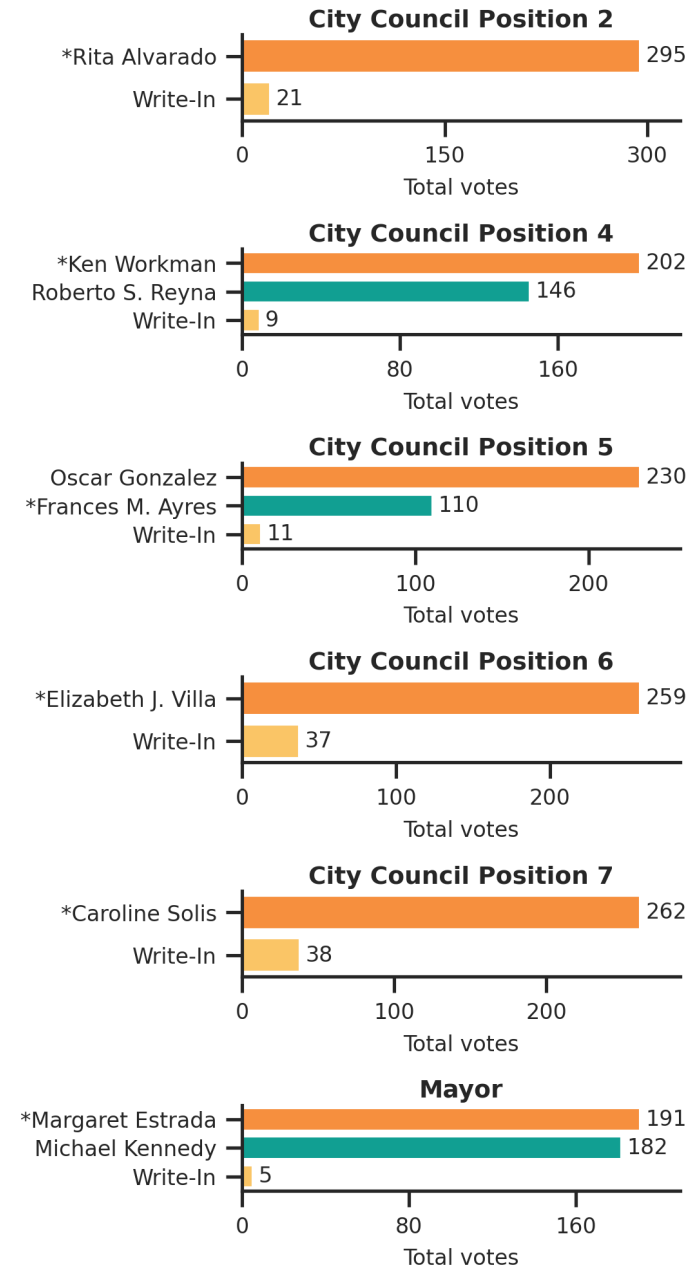


Fig 2 Election results in Wapato for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

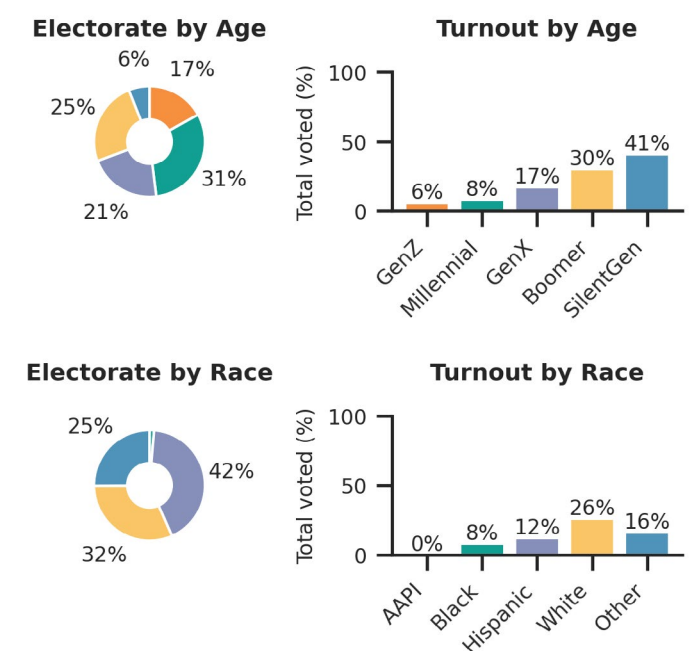


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wapato School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

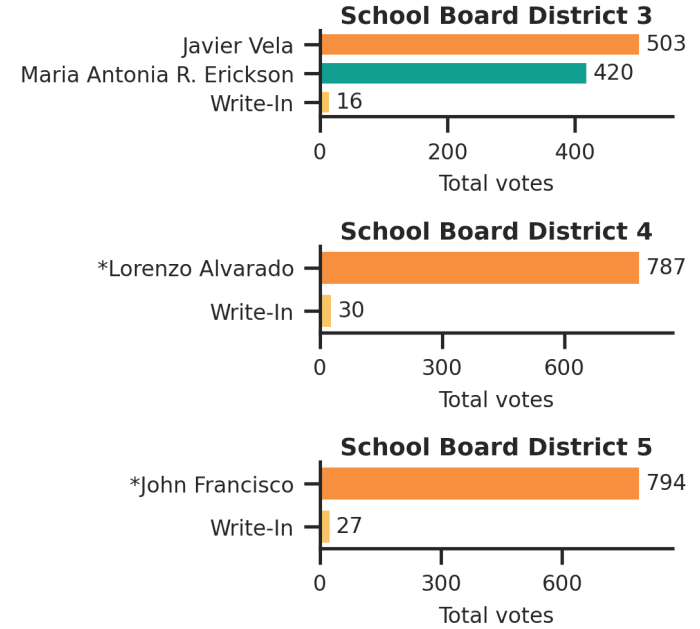
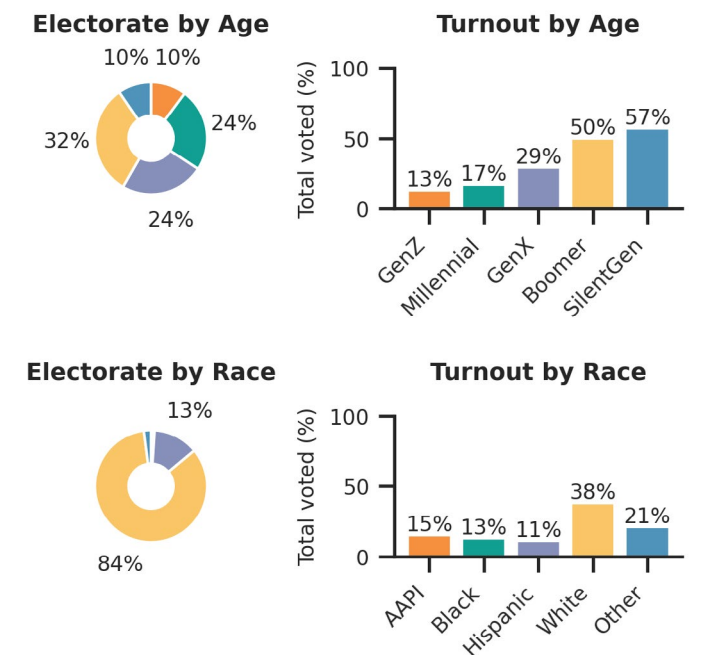


Fig 2 Election results in Wapato School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

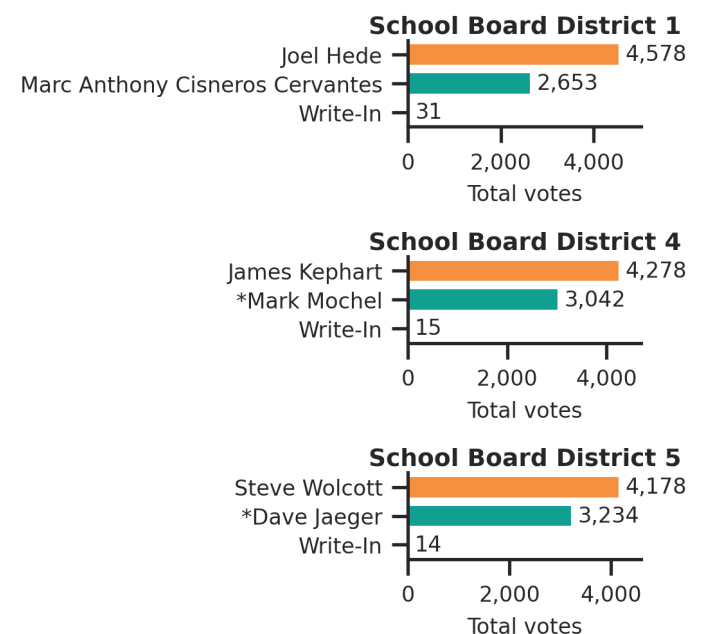

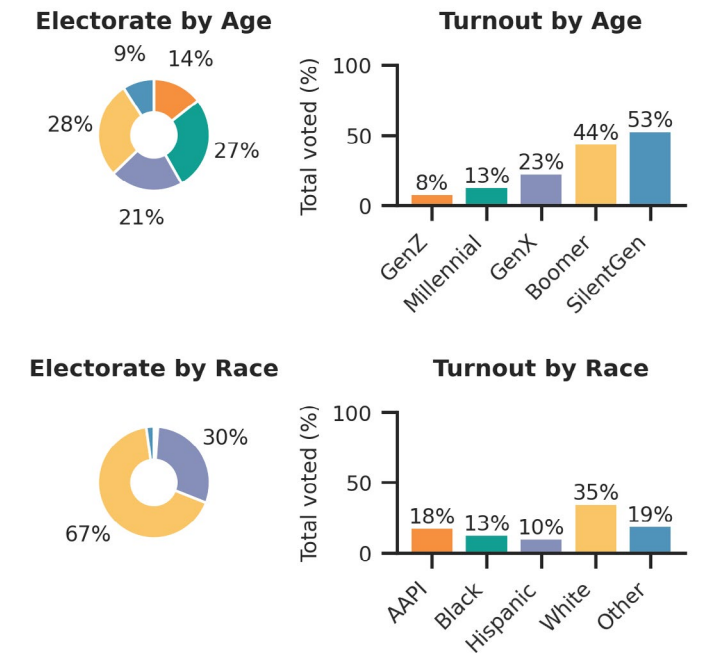

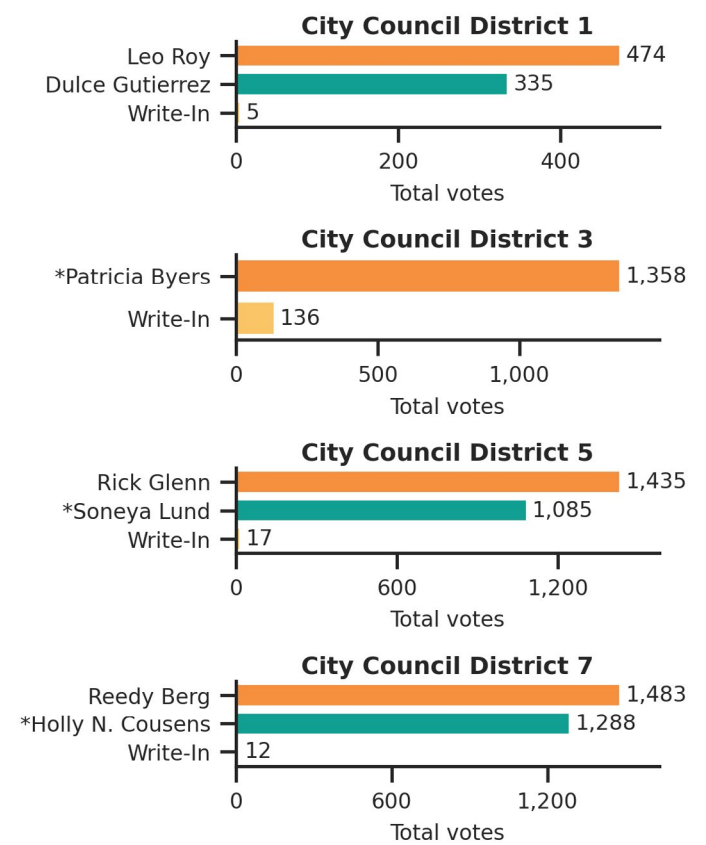

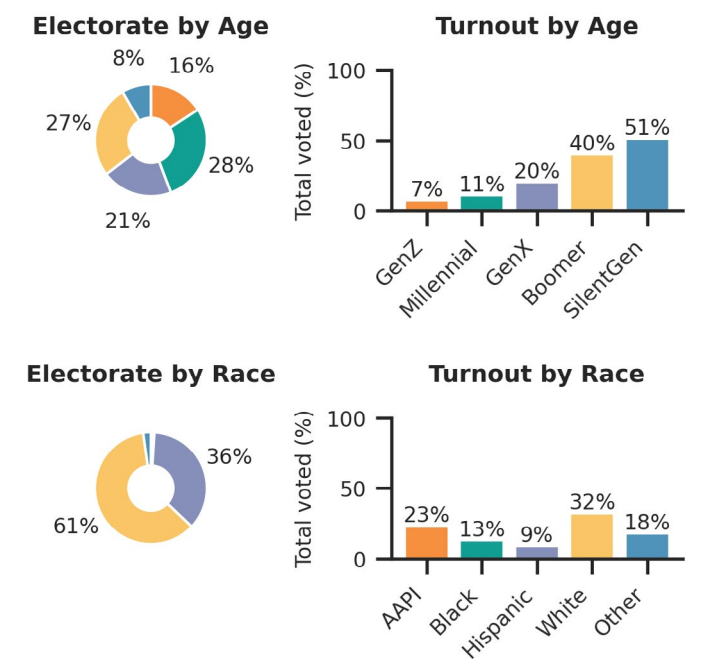

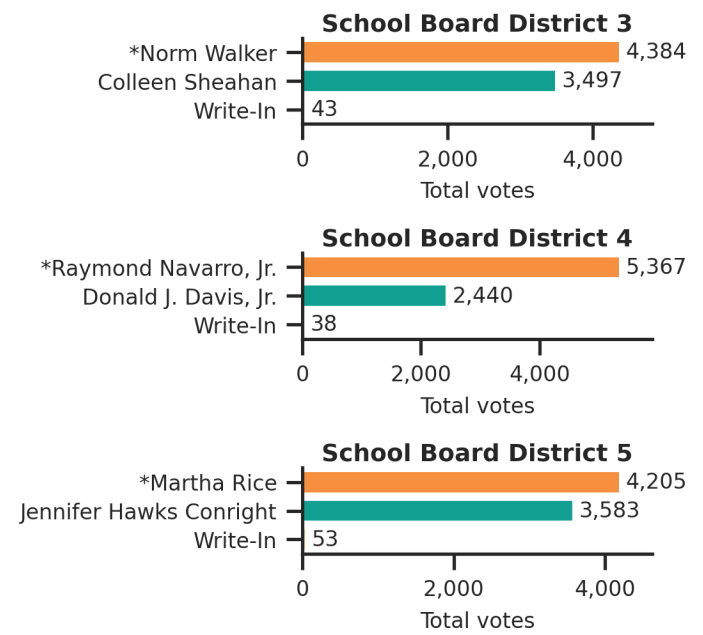

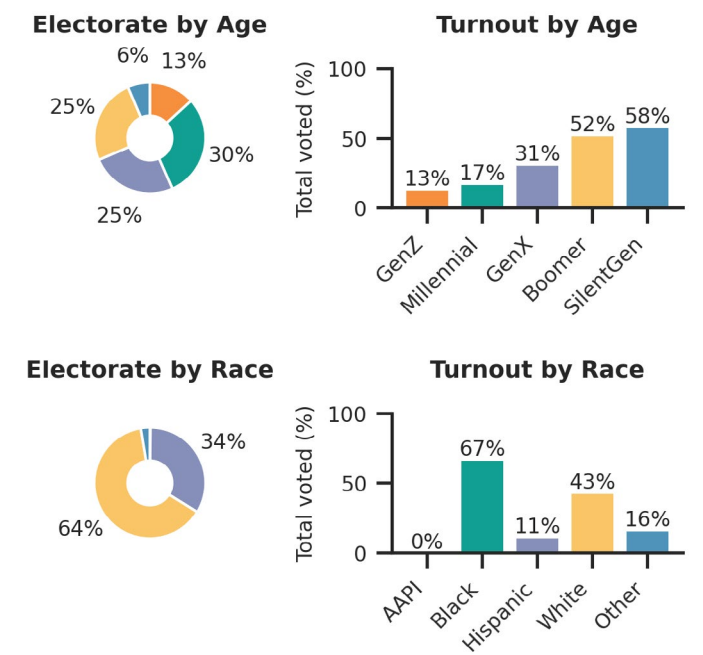

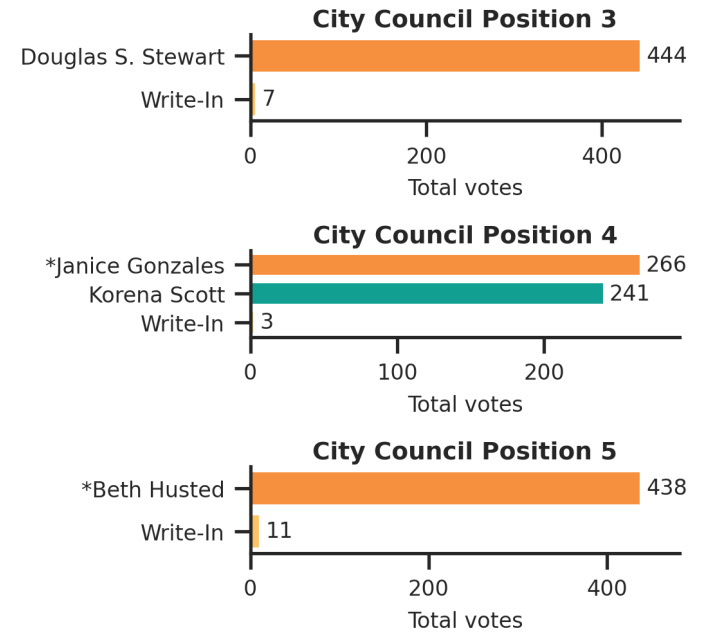

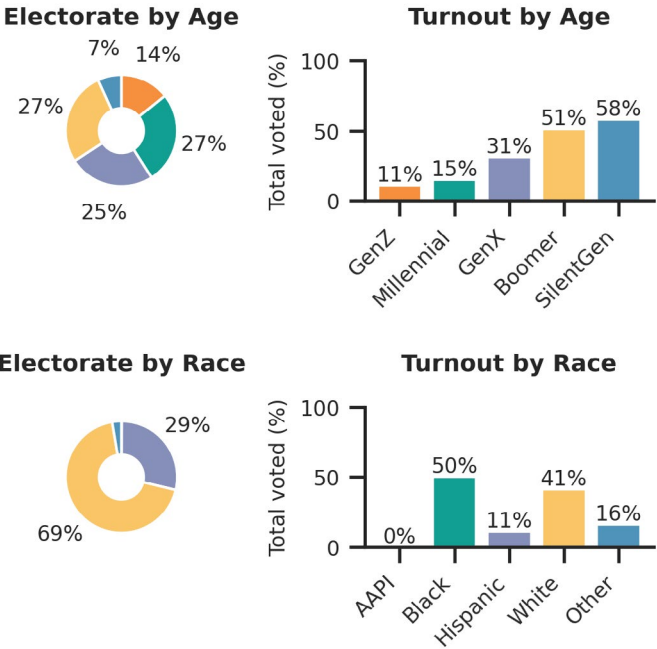


**Fig 2** Election results in Zillah for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

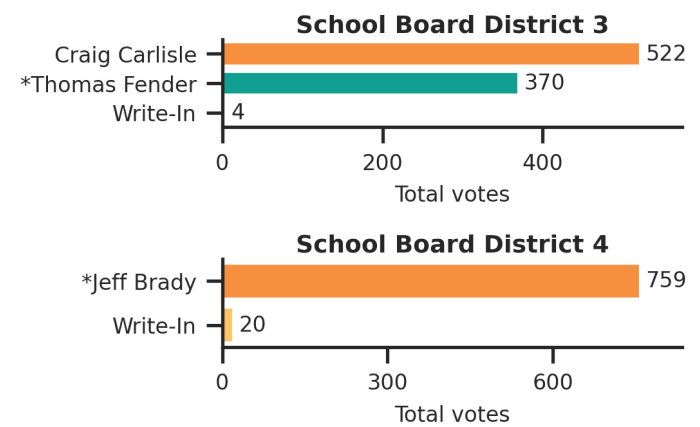

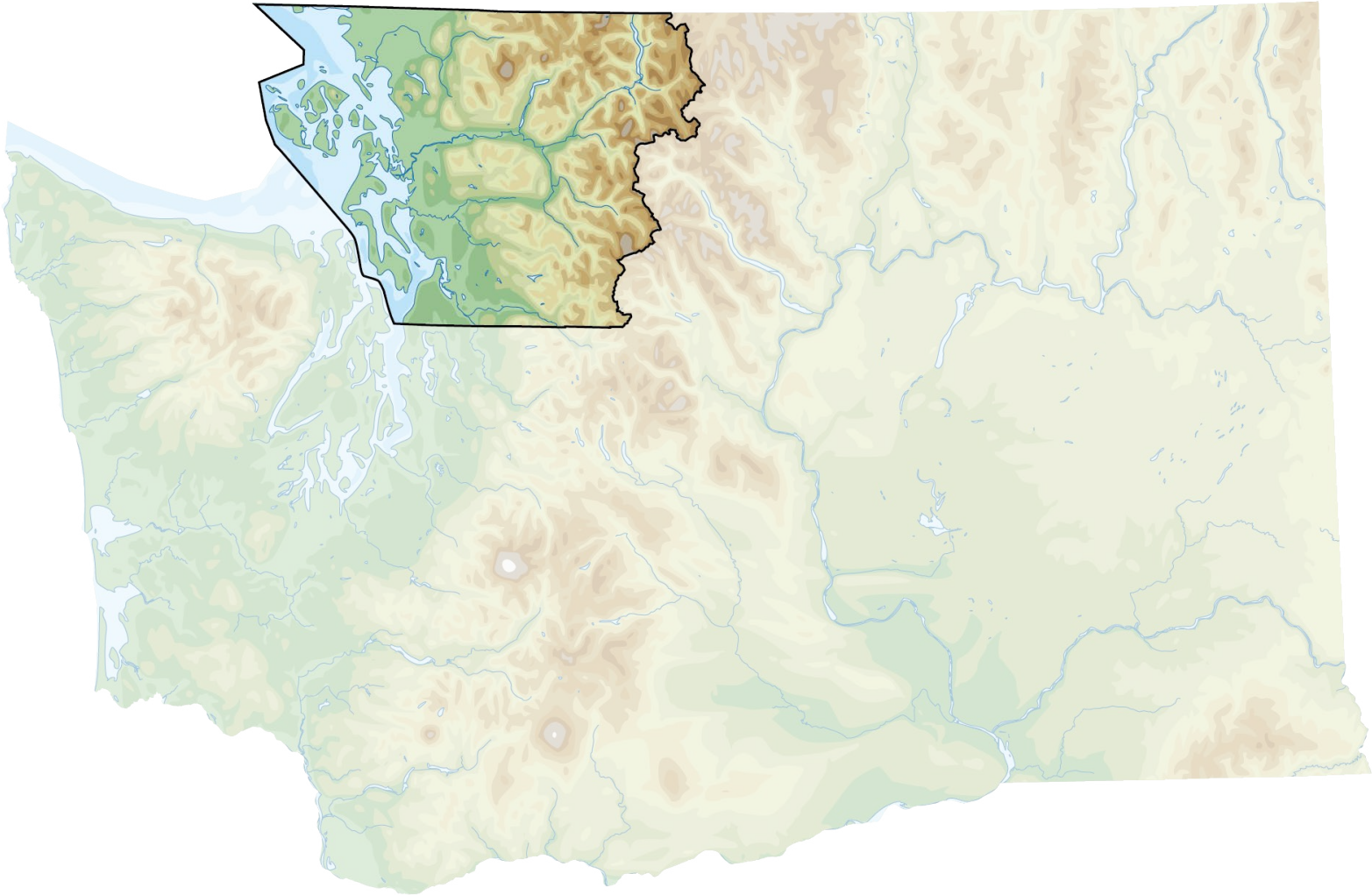

There are 815,137 registered voters in Northwestern Washington, including 17,999 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 40.5% – the highest in the state. Across Northwestern Washington, voter turnout was highest in Whatcom County (51.5%), San Juan County (49.5%), and Island County (47.0%), and lowest in Snohomish County (36.6%) and Skagit County (37.1%).

Young voters make up 26.1% of the electorate in Northwestern Washington (212,997 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 26.3% lower than older voters (21.1% vs 47.4%). People of color comprise 15.0% of the electorate in Northwestern Washington, and turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 24.6% lower than White voters (19.6% vs 44.2%). From mid-August to mid-November, six WCA Data Hub partners were active in Northwestern Washington, making a total of 165,416 contact attempts to 90,037 unique voters (~0.20 attempts per voter). This included 21,091 door knocks, 210 phone calls, 54,275 text messages, and 73,556 mailers.

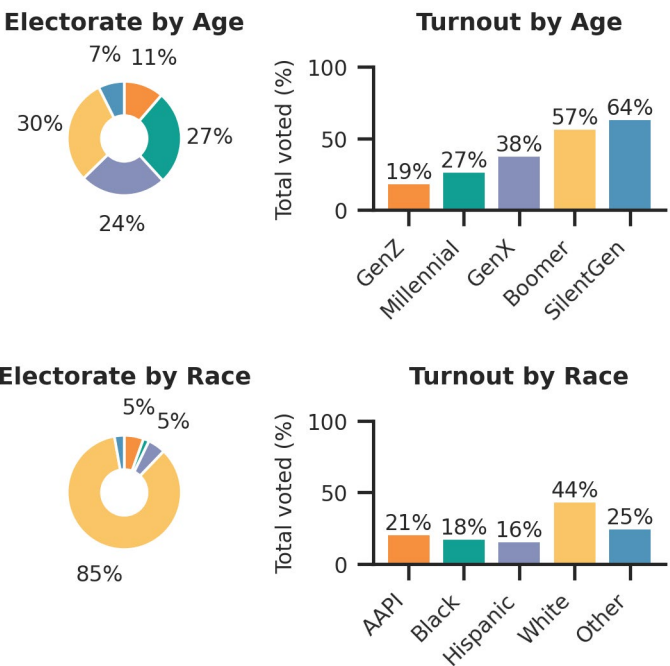


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Northwestern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

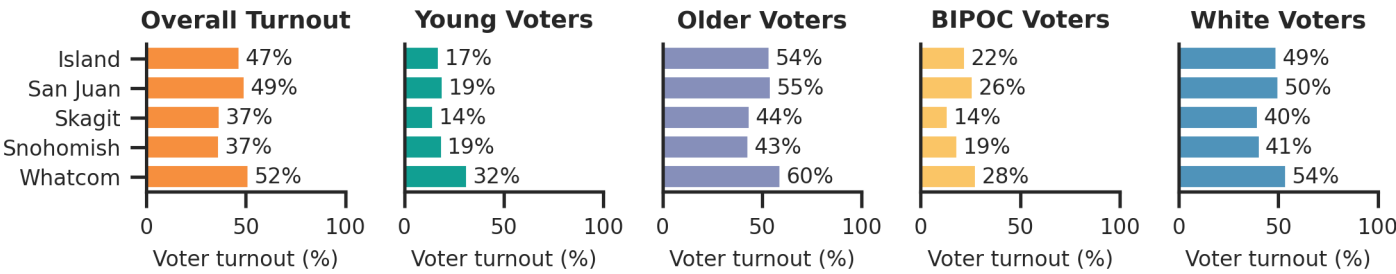


Fig 2 Voter turnout by county in Northwestern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

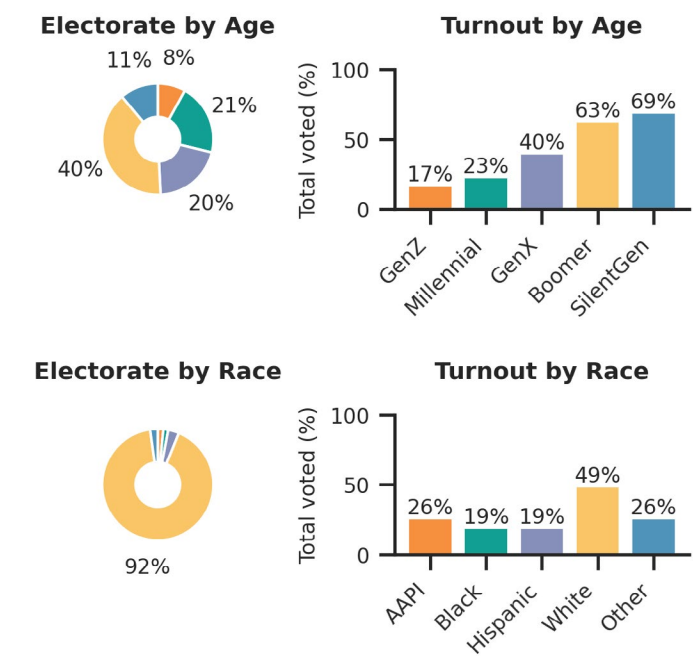


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Island County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

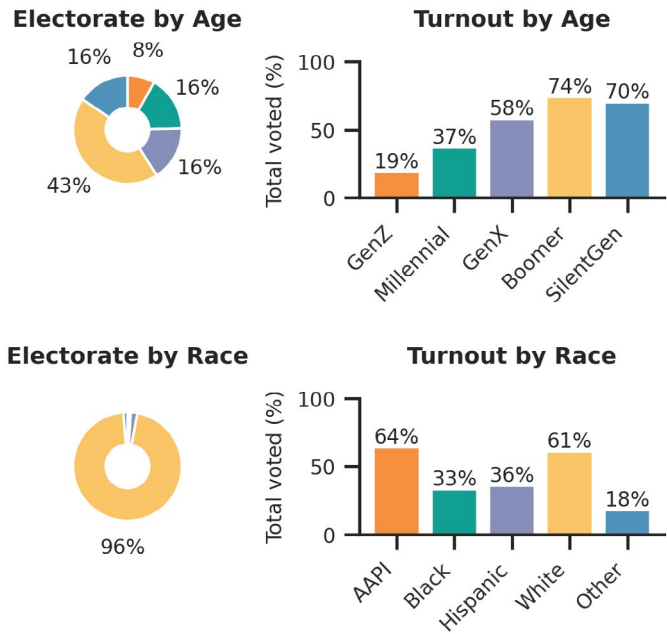


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Coupeville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

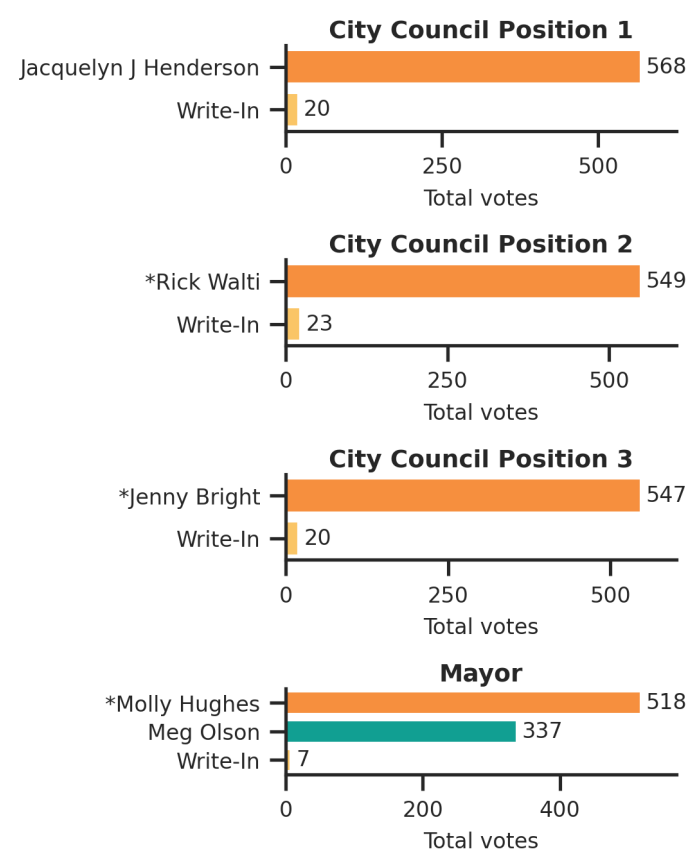


Fig 2 Election results in Coupeville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

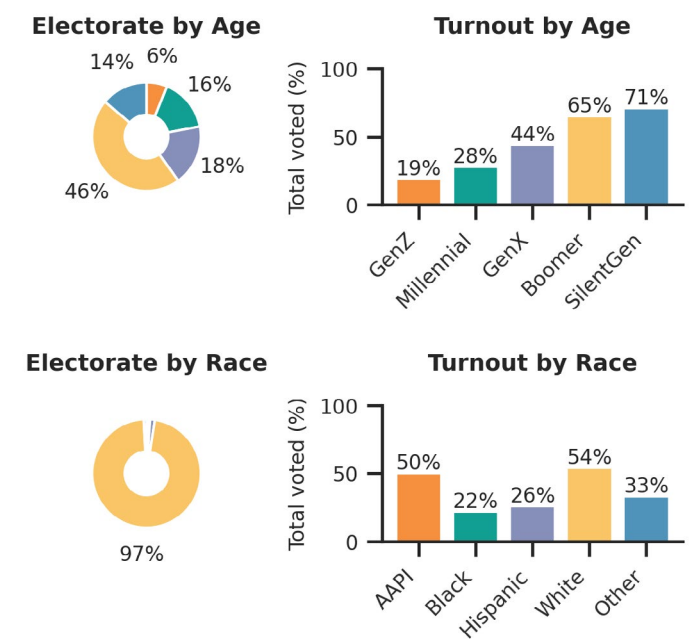


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Coupeville School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

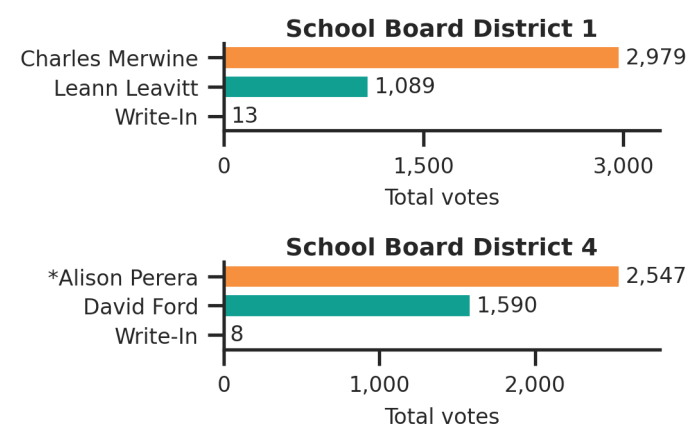


Fig 2 Election results in Coupeville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

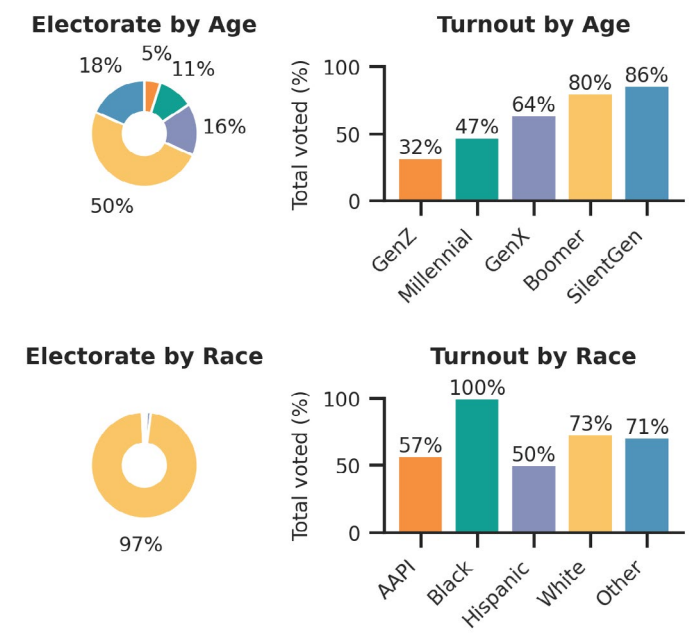


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Langley for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

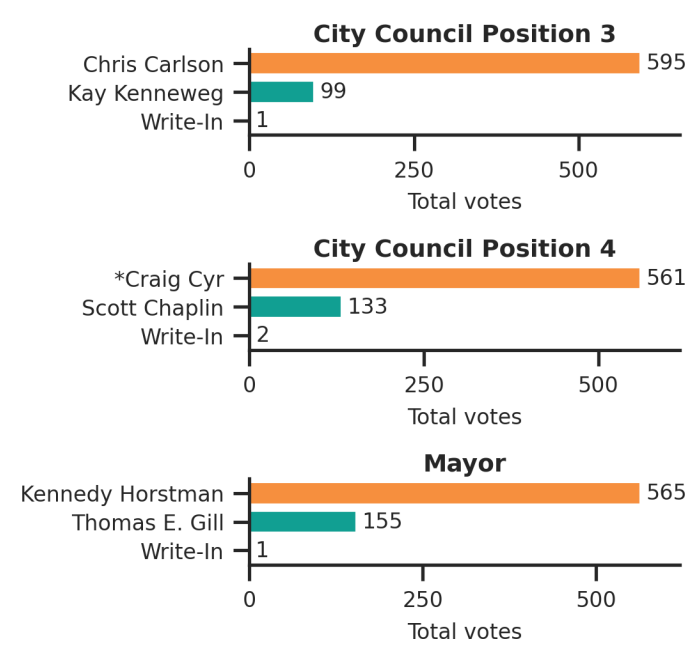


Fig 2 Election results in Langley for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

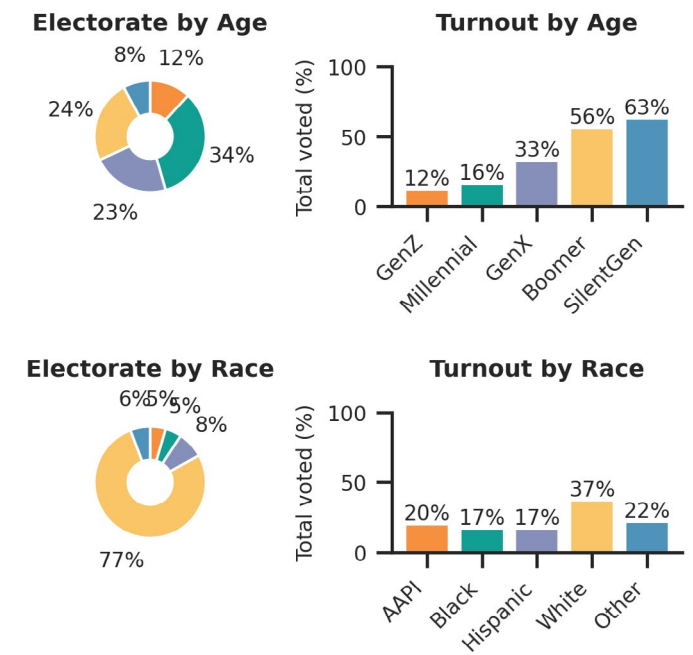


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oak Harbor for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

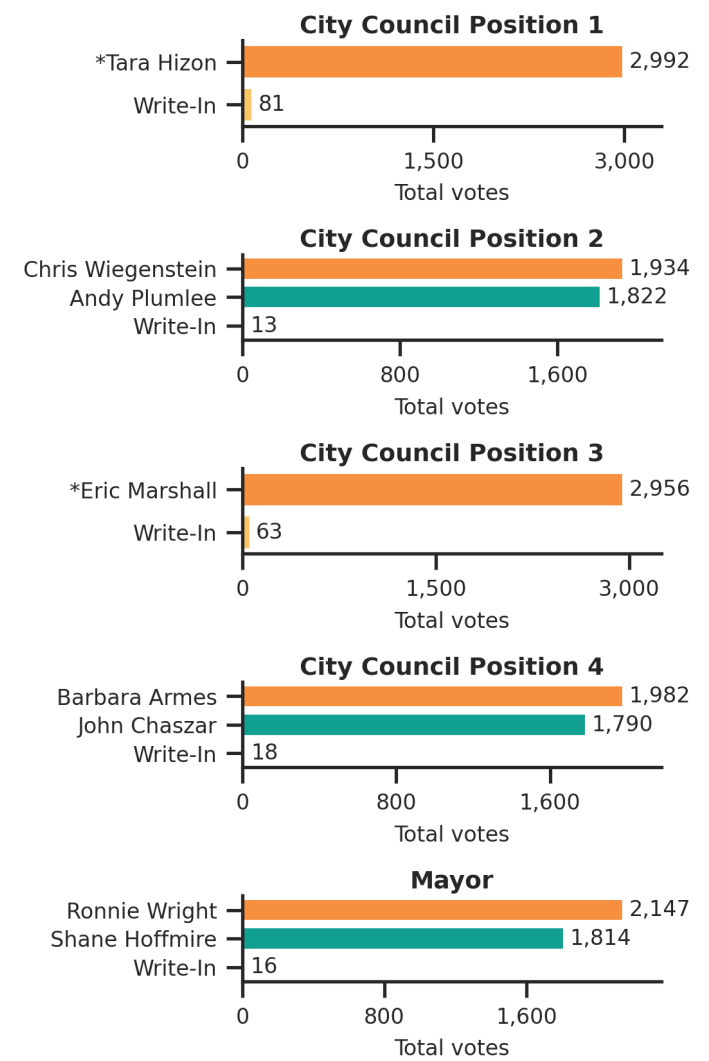


Fig 2 Election results in Oak Harbor for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

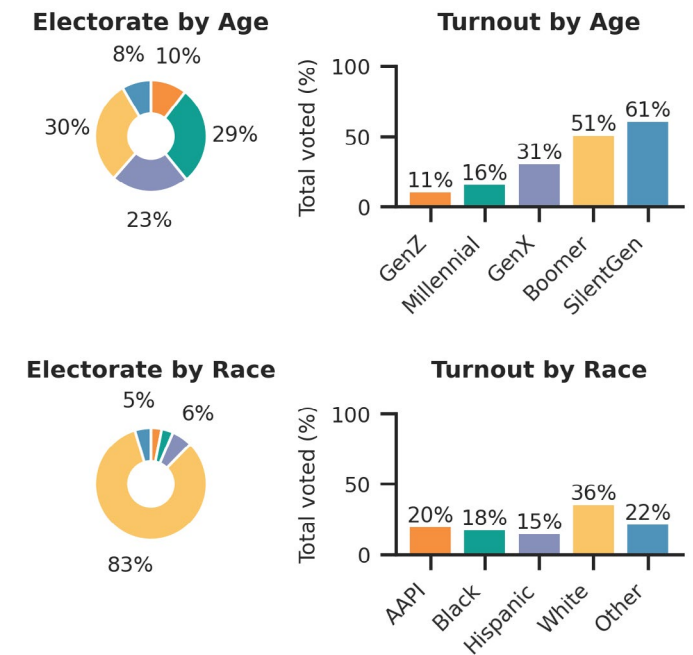


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oak Harbor School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

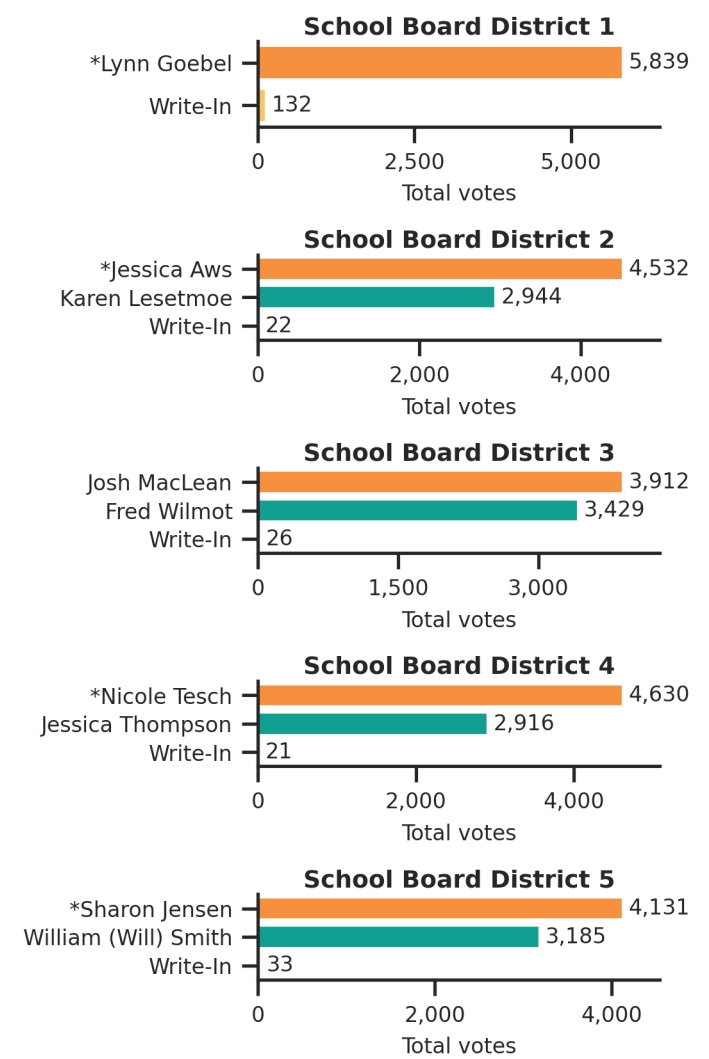


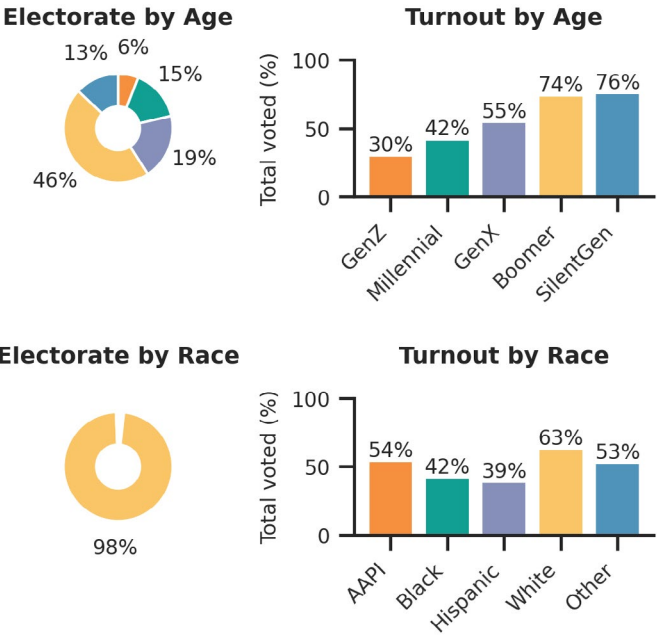
Fig 2 Election results in Oak Harbor School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

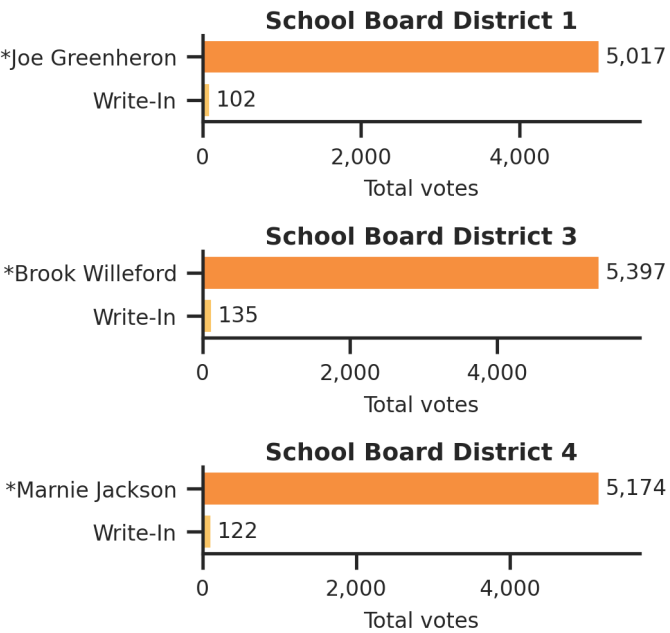

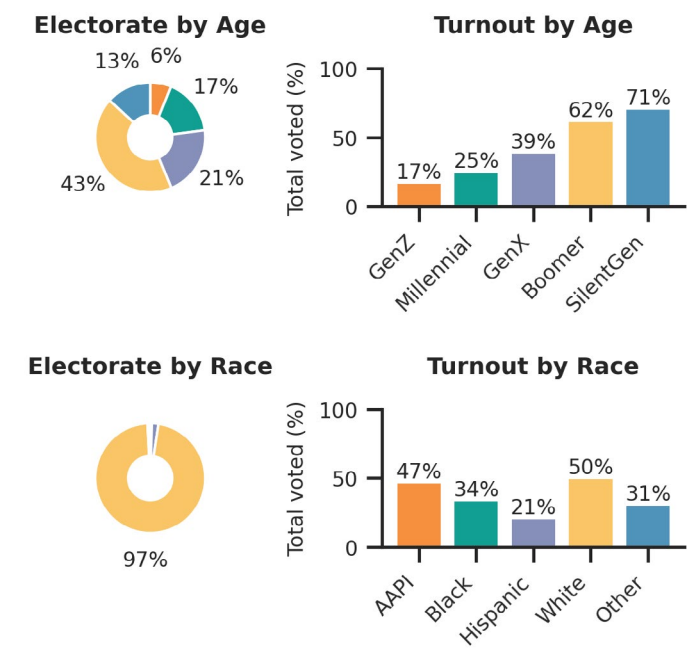


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in San Juan County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

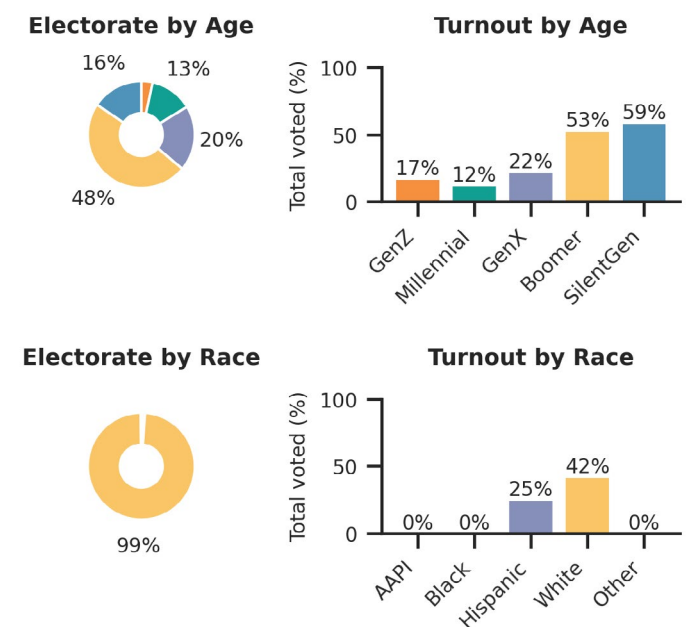


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Friday Harbor for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

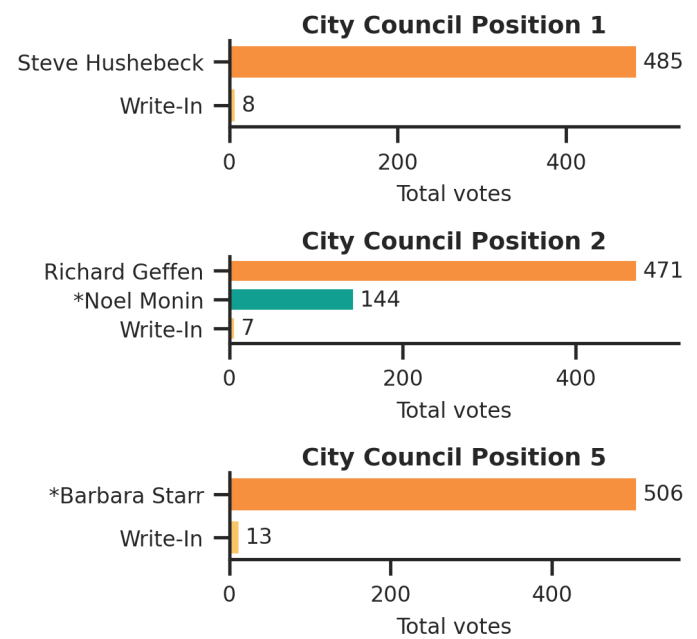


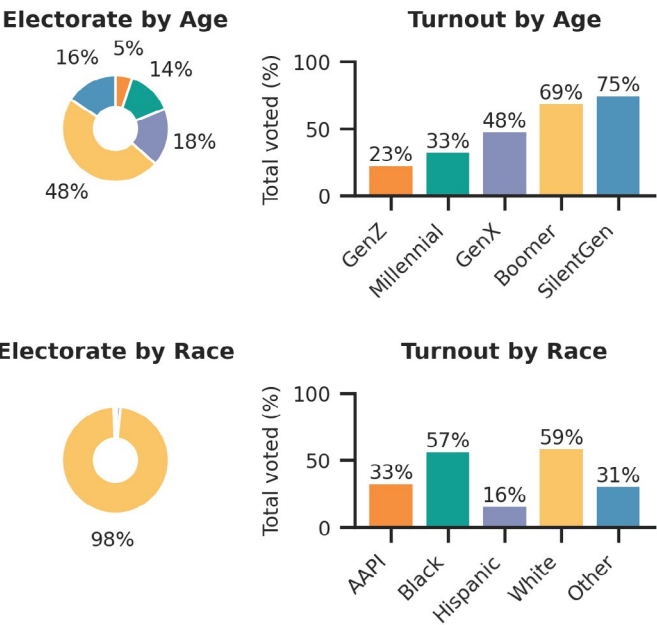
Fig 2 Election results in Friday Harbor for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

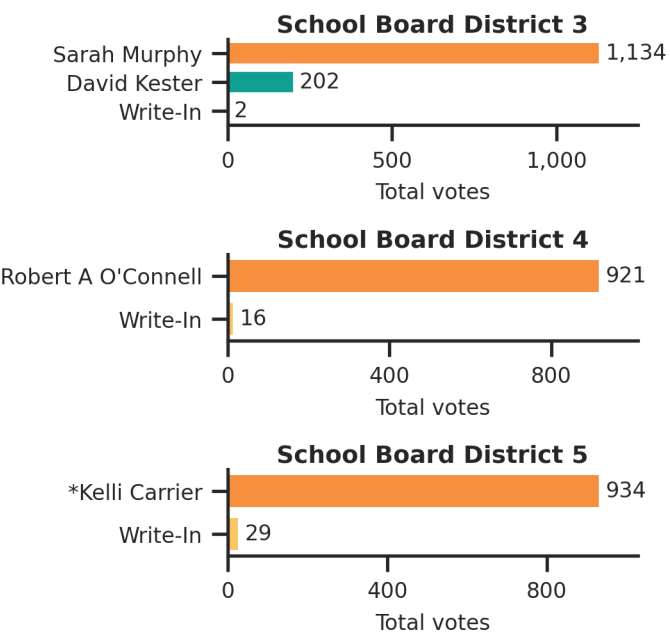

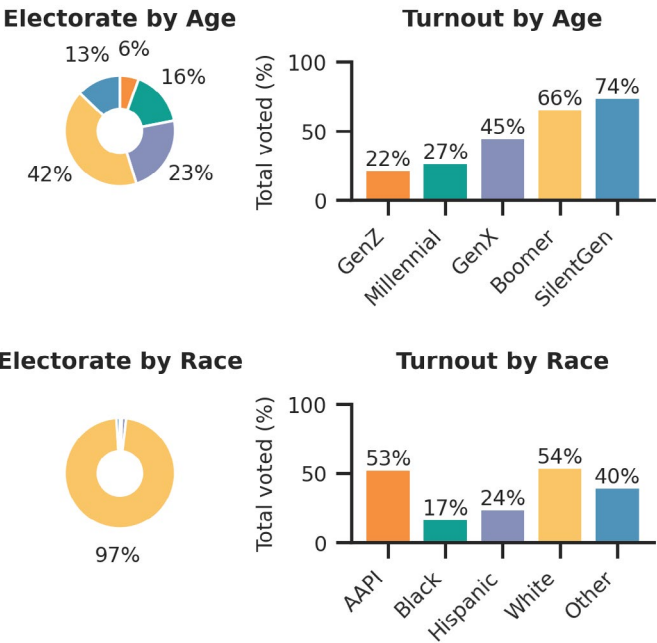


**Fig 2** Election results in Lopez Island School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

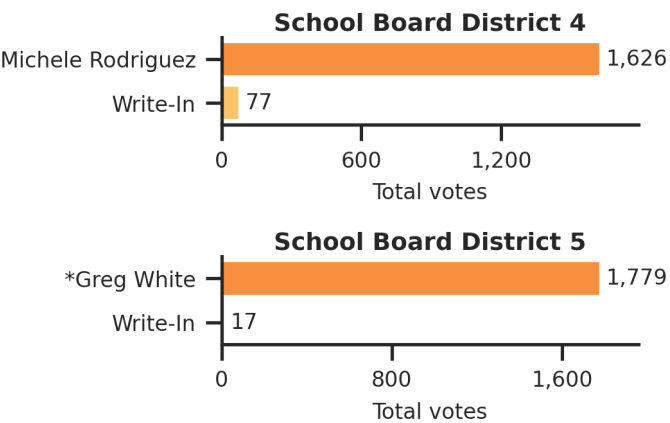

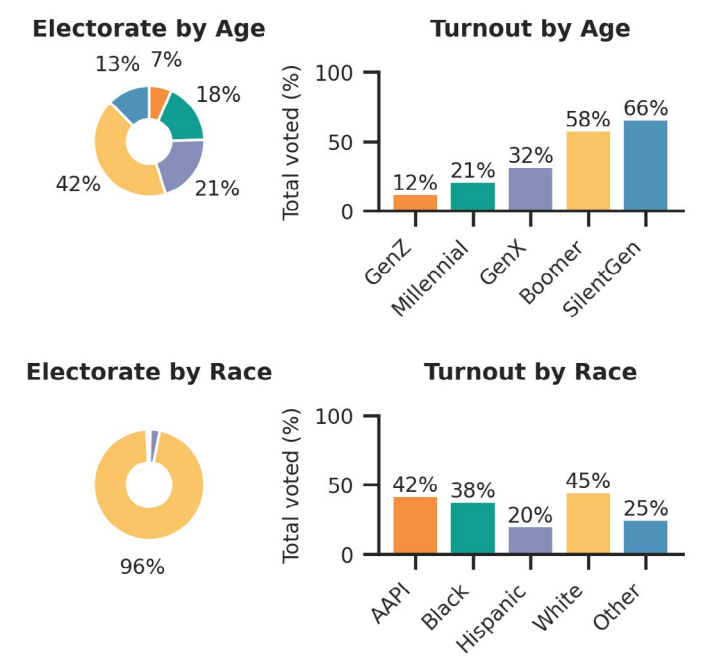


**Fig 2** Election results in Orcas Island School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

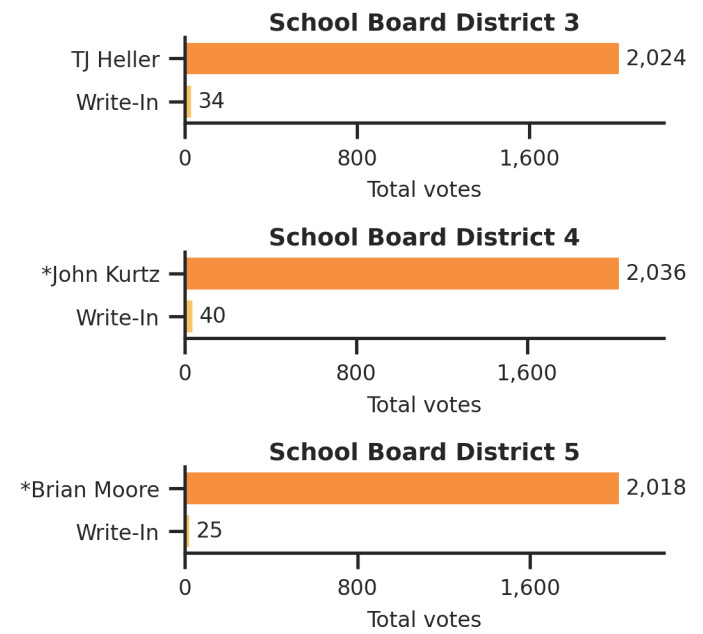

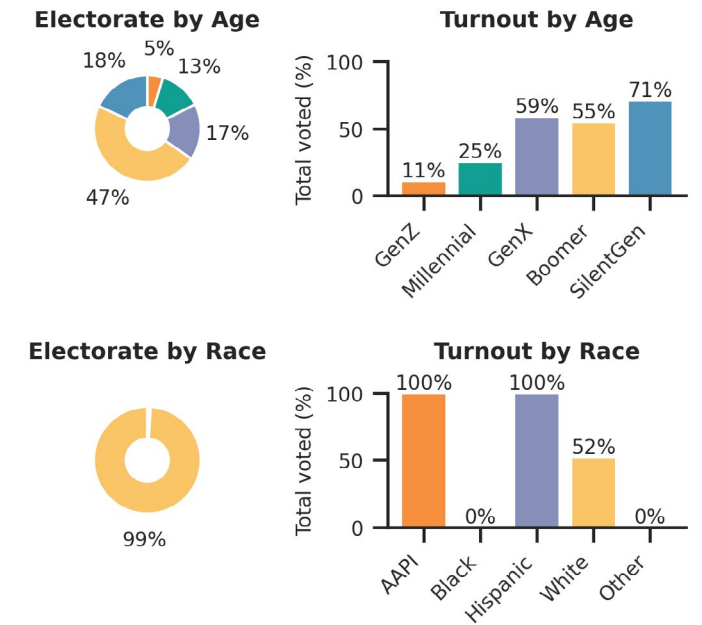


**Fig 2** Election results in San Juan Island School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

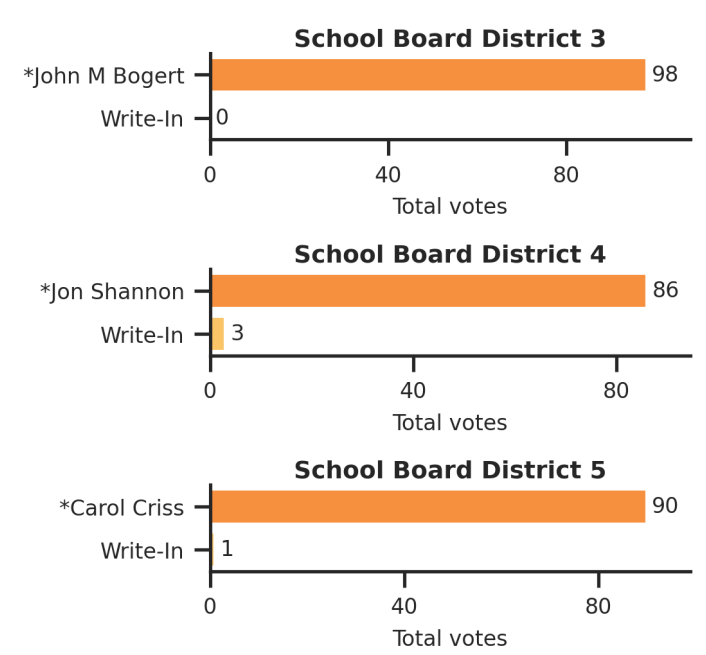

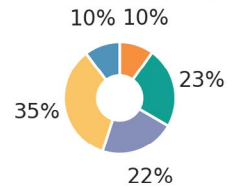
**Fig 2** Election results in Shaw Island School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



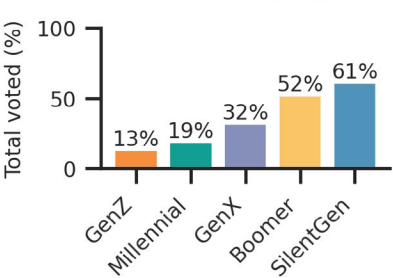

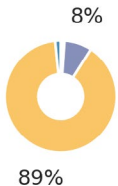
Electorate by Age



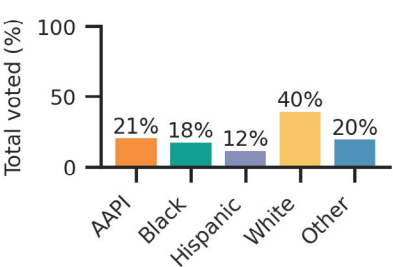

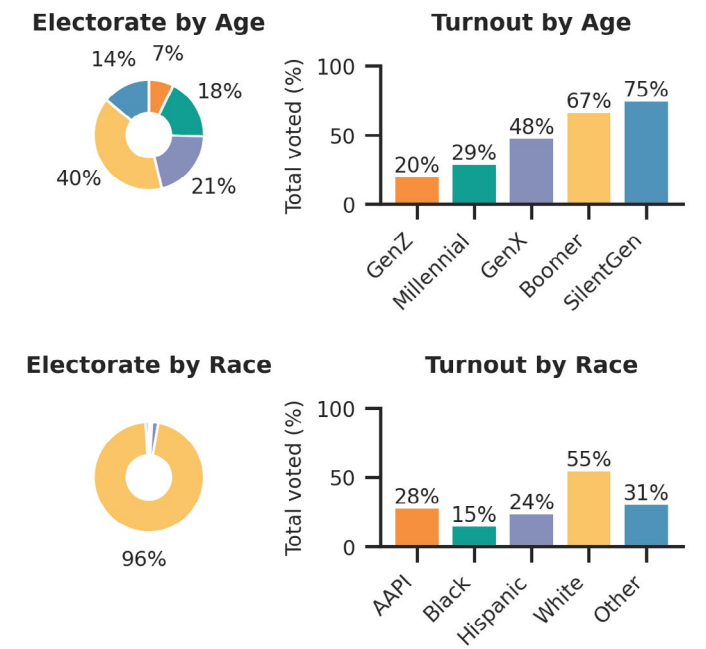


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Anacortes for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

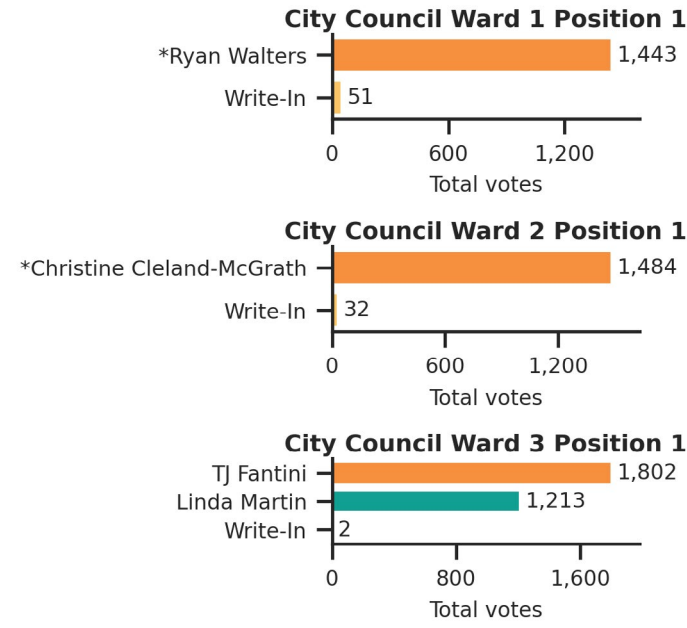


Fig 2 Election results in Anacortes for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

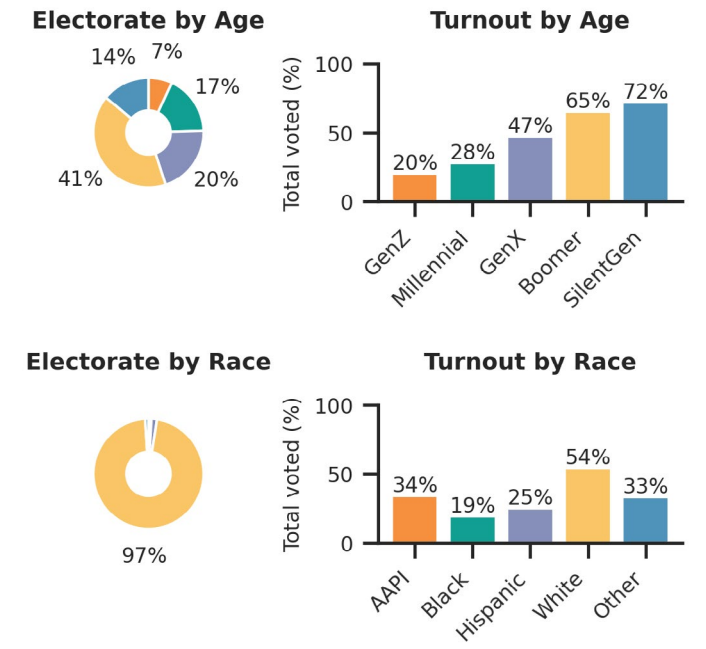


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Anacortes School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

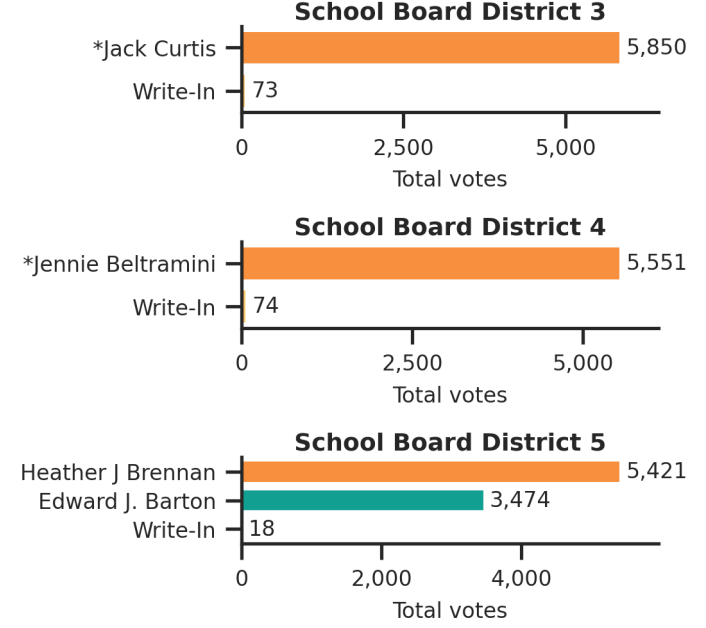


Fig 2 Election results in Anacortes School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

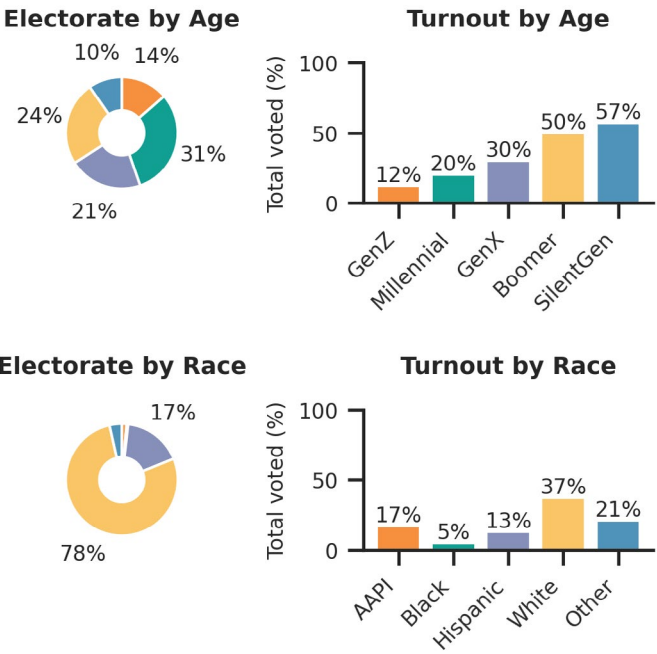


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Burlington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

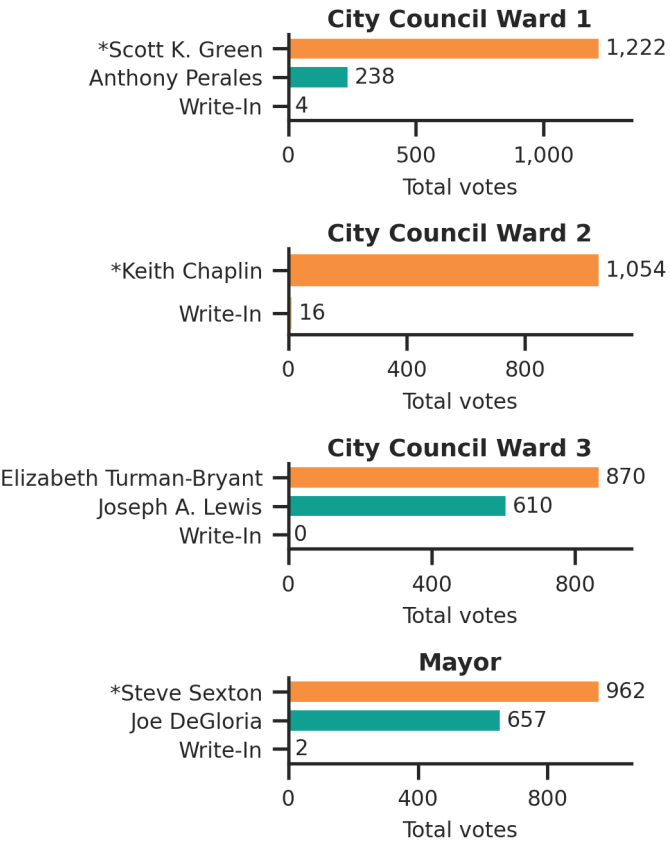


Fig 2 Election results in Burlington for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

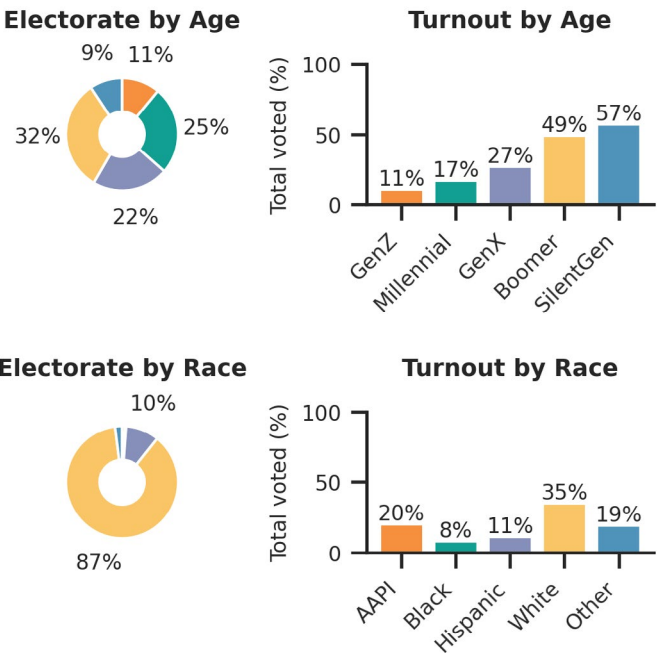


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Burlington-Edison School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

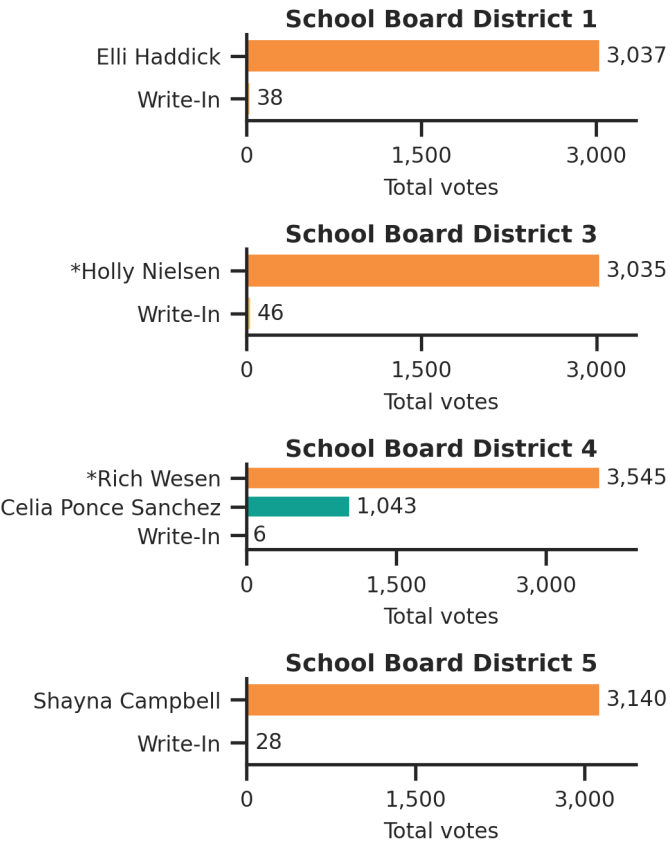
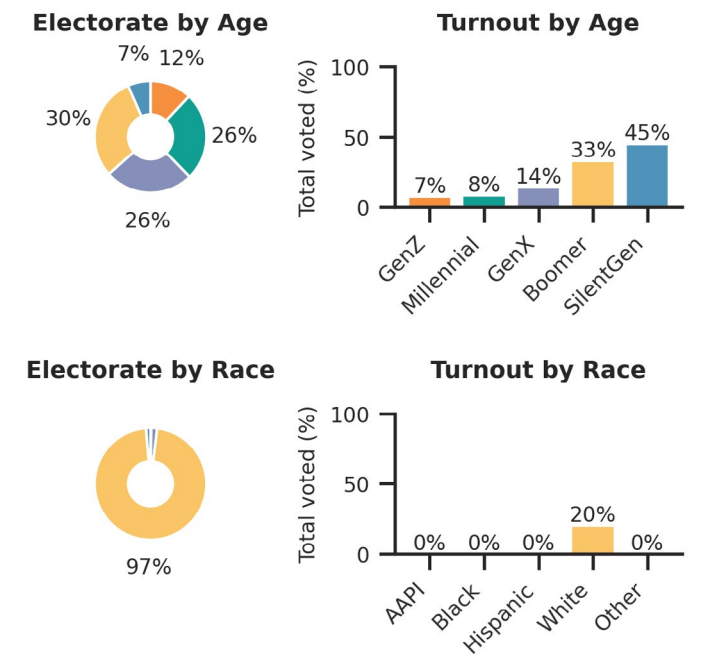


Fig 2 Election results in Burlington-Edison School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

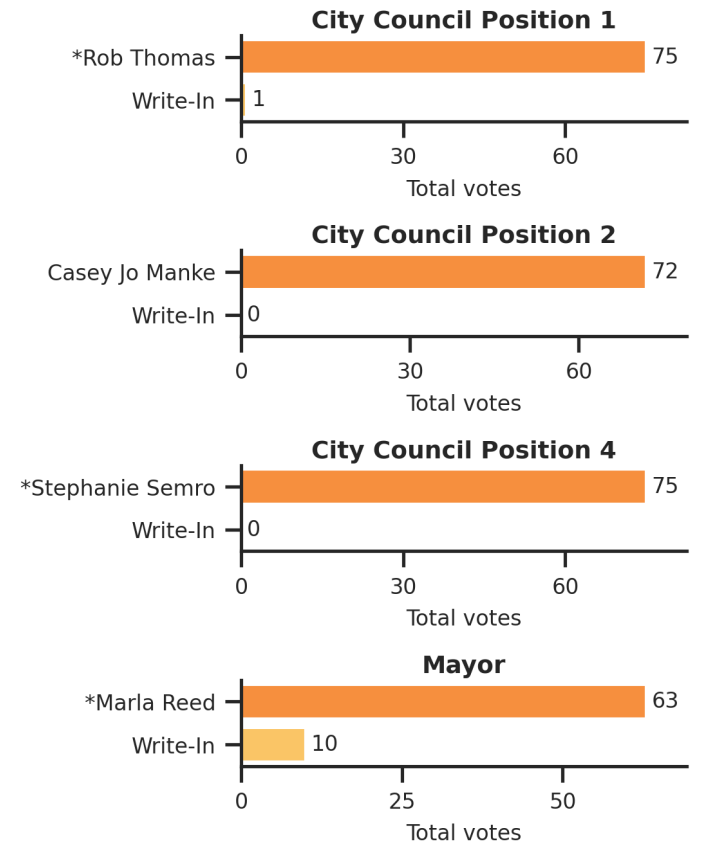

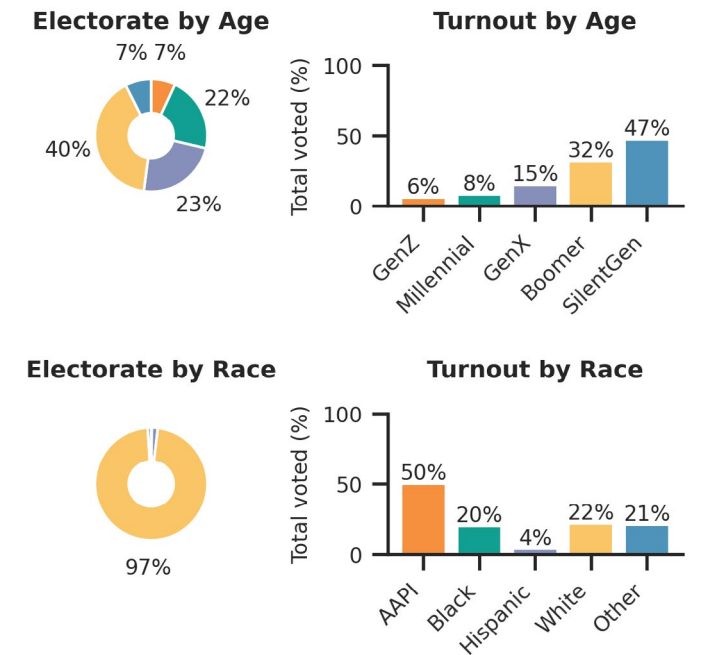

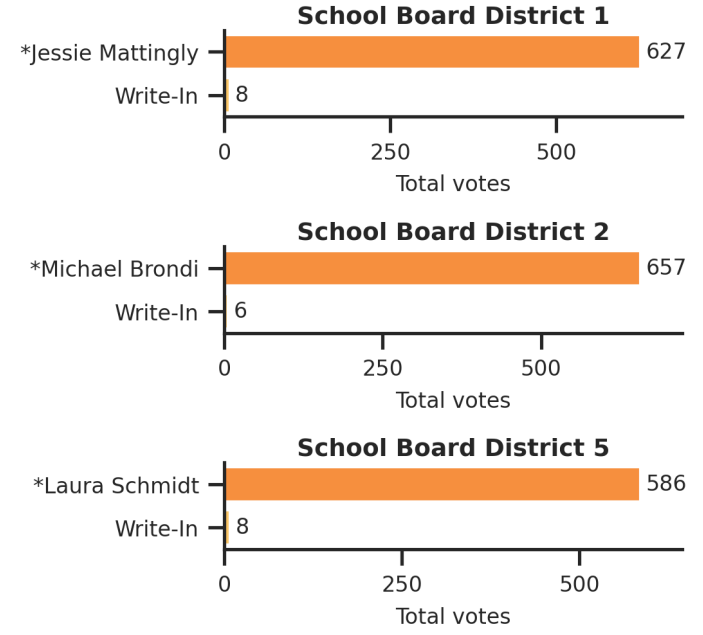

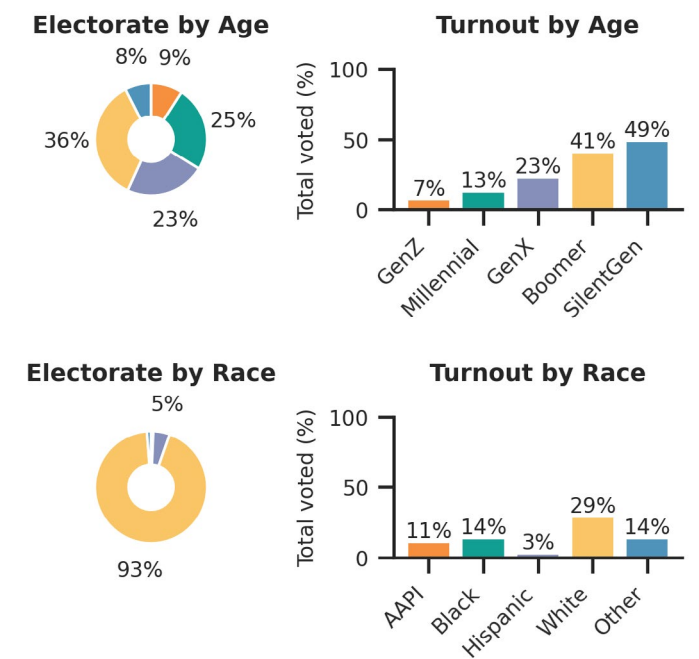


**Fig 2** Election results in Concrete School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

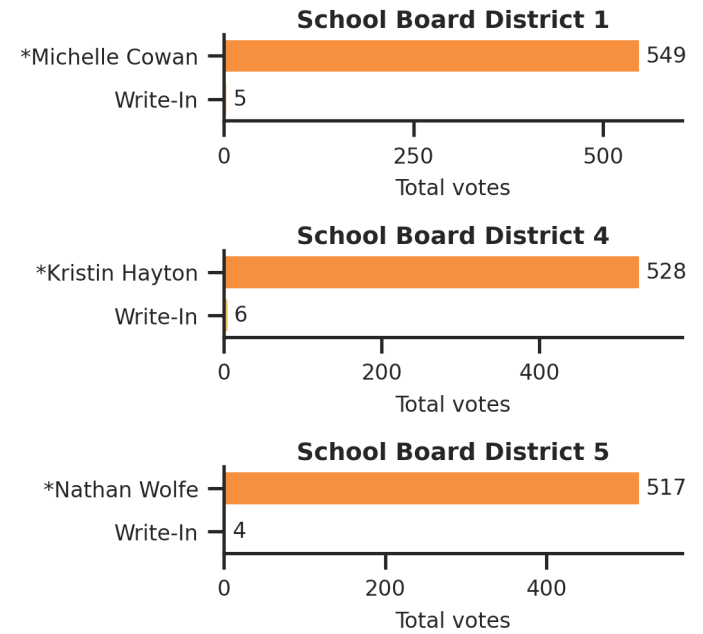

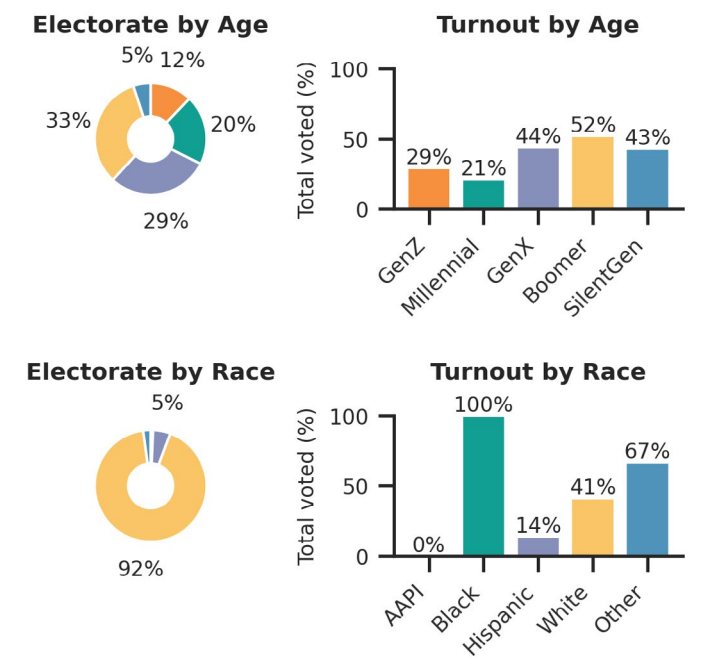

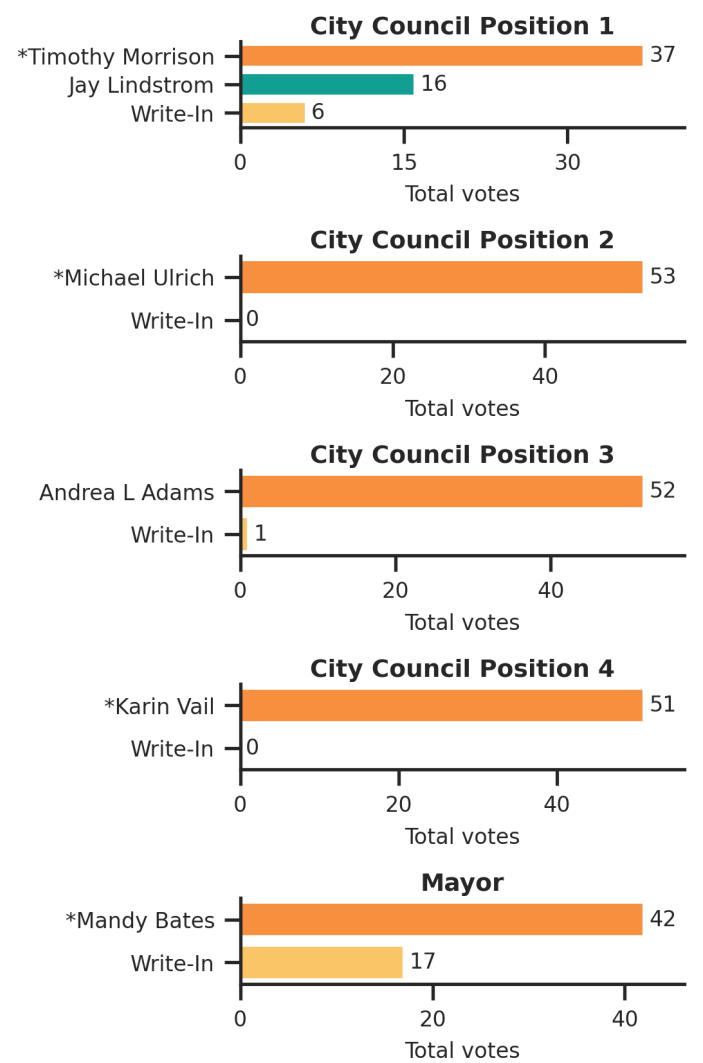


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Hamilton for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

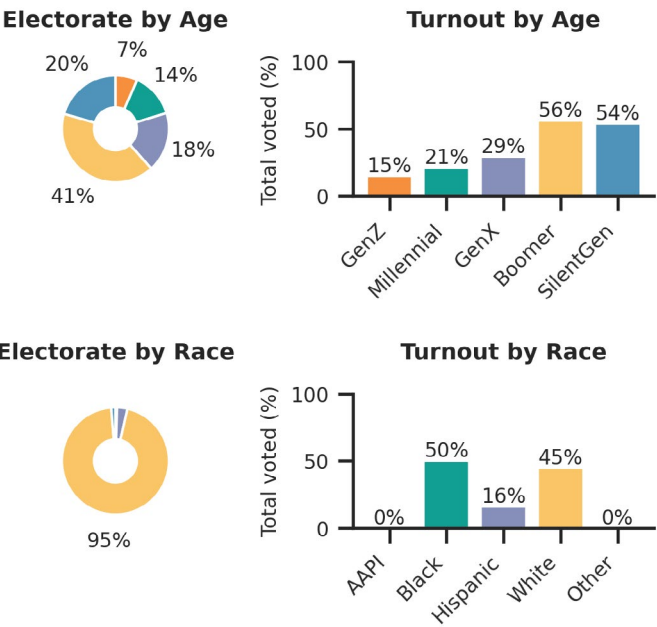


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in La Conner for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

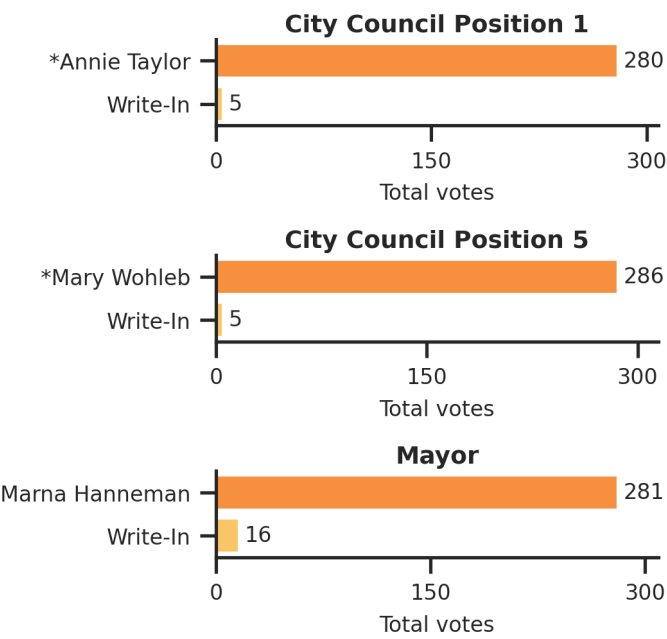


Fig 2 Election results in La Conner for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

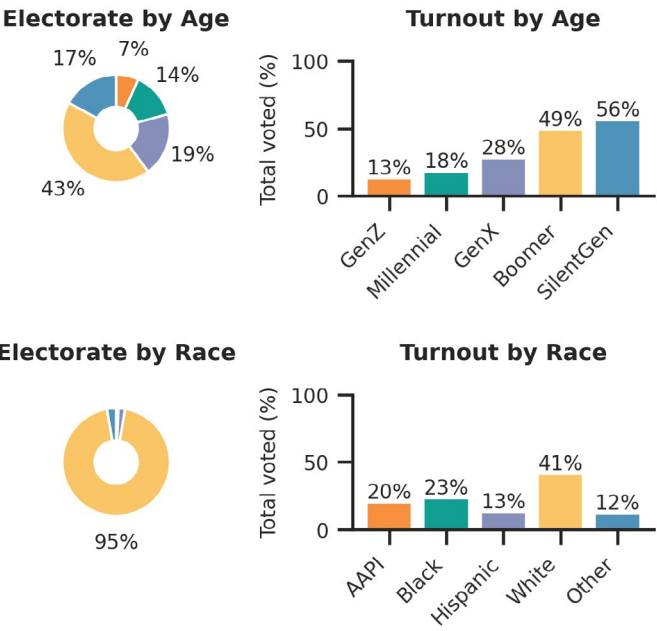


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in La Conner School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

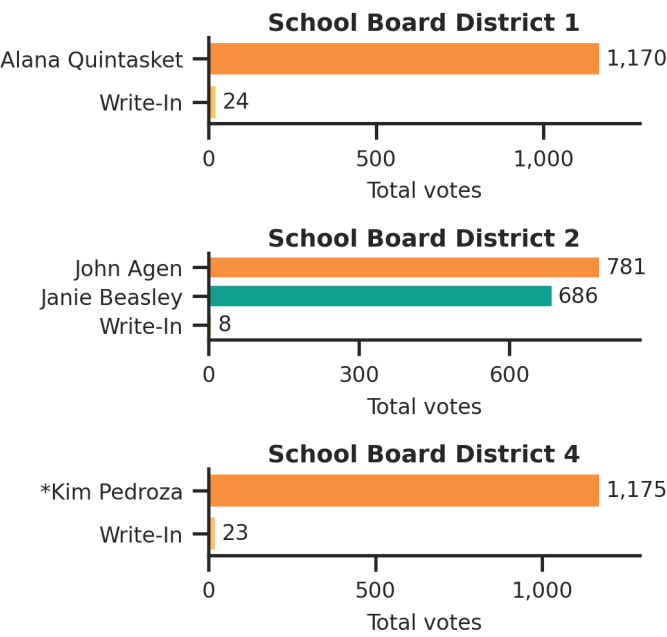


Fig 2 Election results in La Conner School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

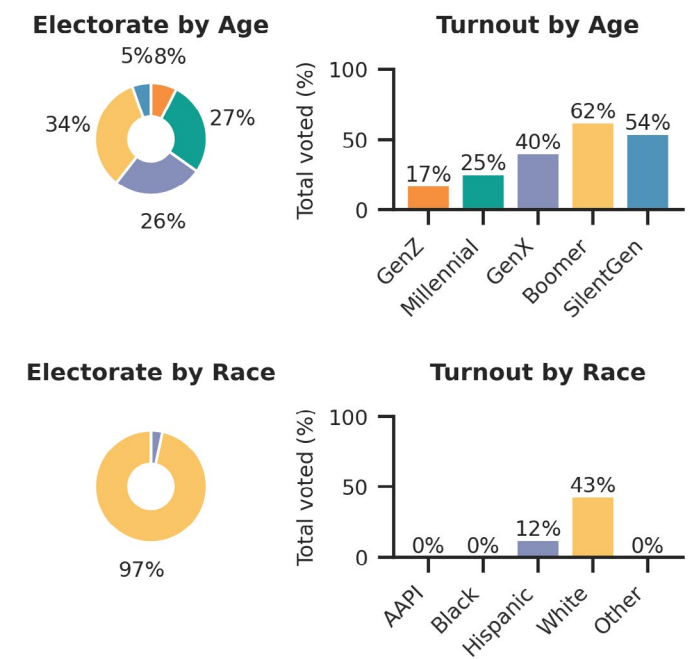


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lyman for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

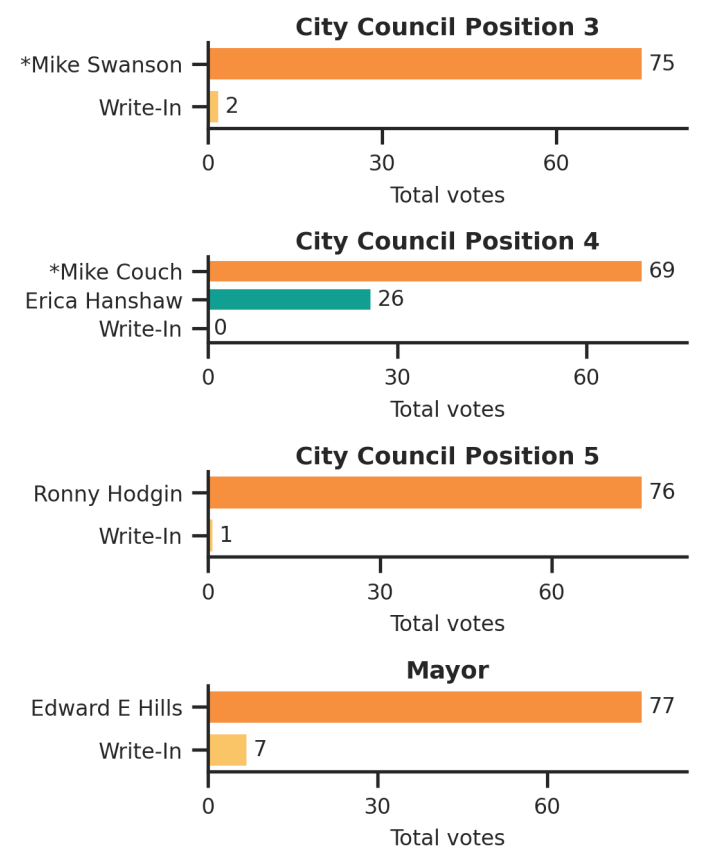


Fig 2 Election results in Lyman for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

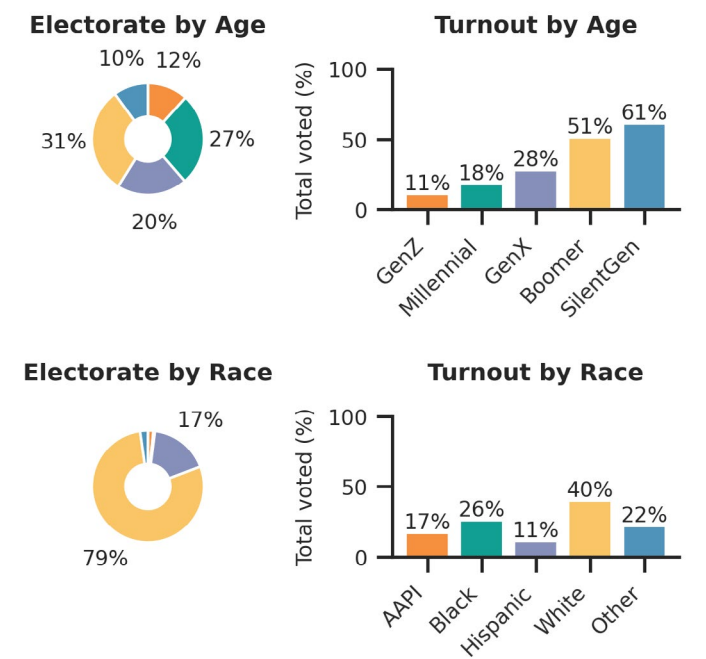


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mt. Vernon for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

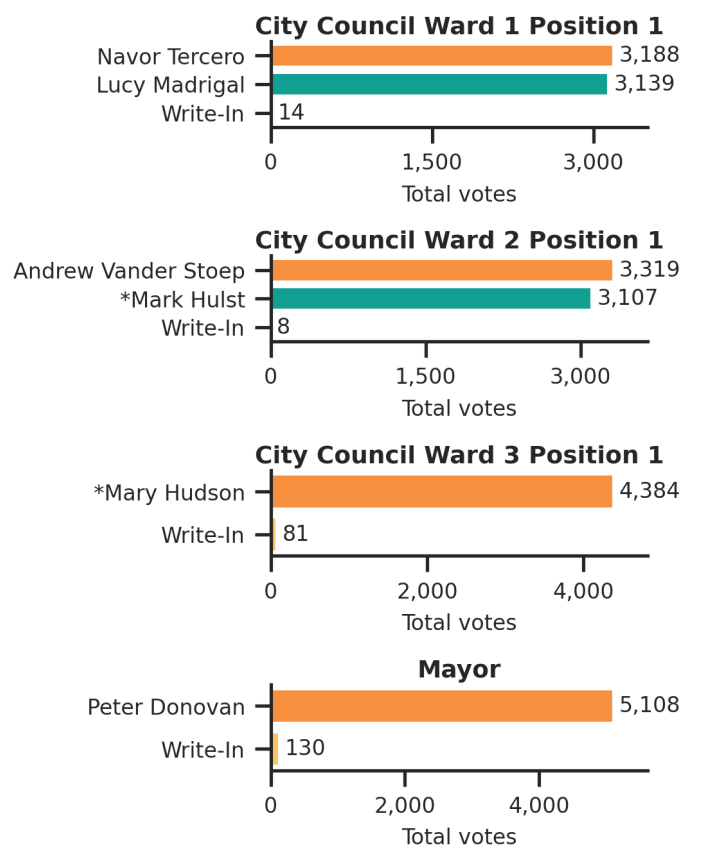


Fig 2 Election results in Mt. Vernon for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

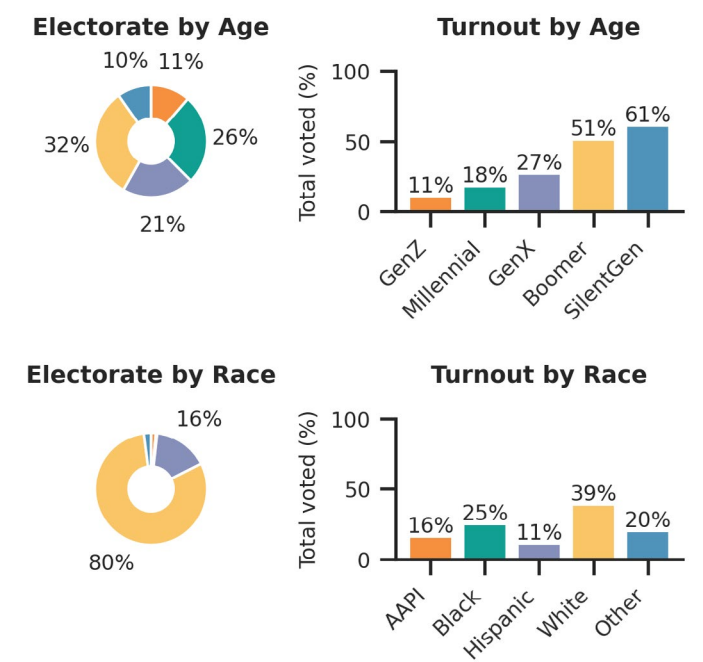


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mt. Vernon School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

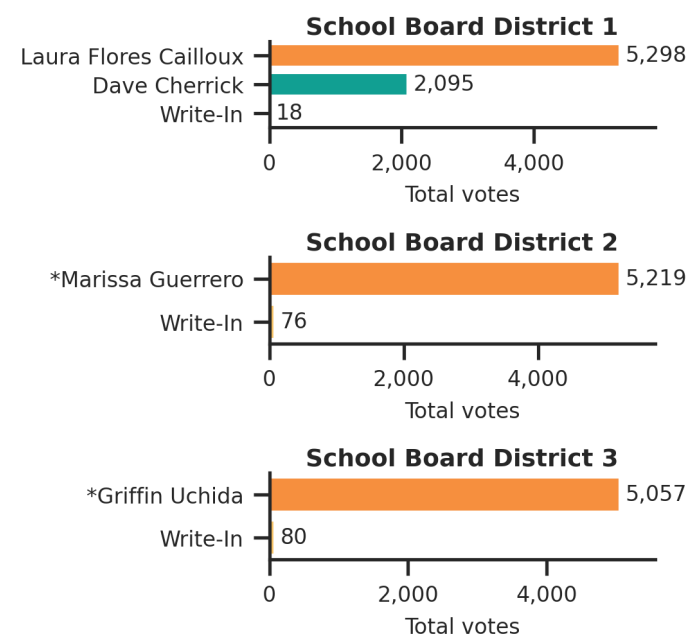


Fig 2 Election results in Mt. Vernon School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

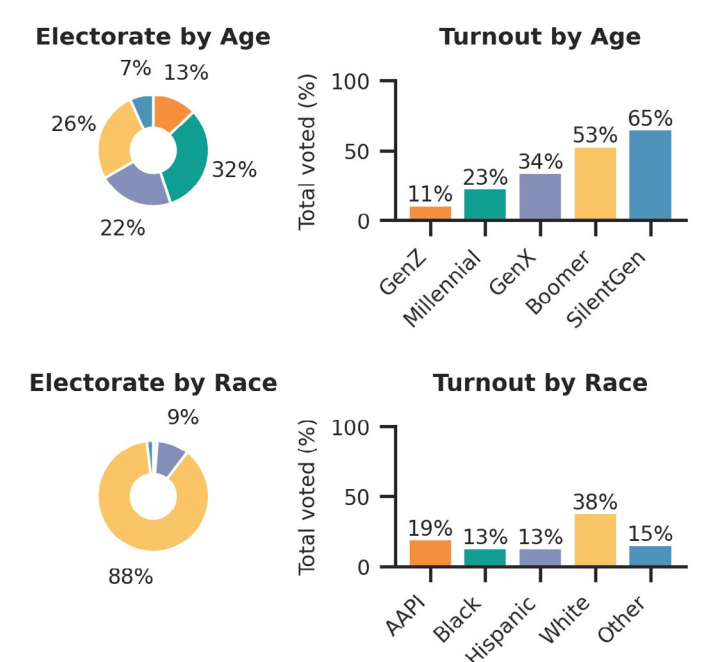


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sedro-Woolley for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

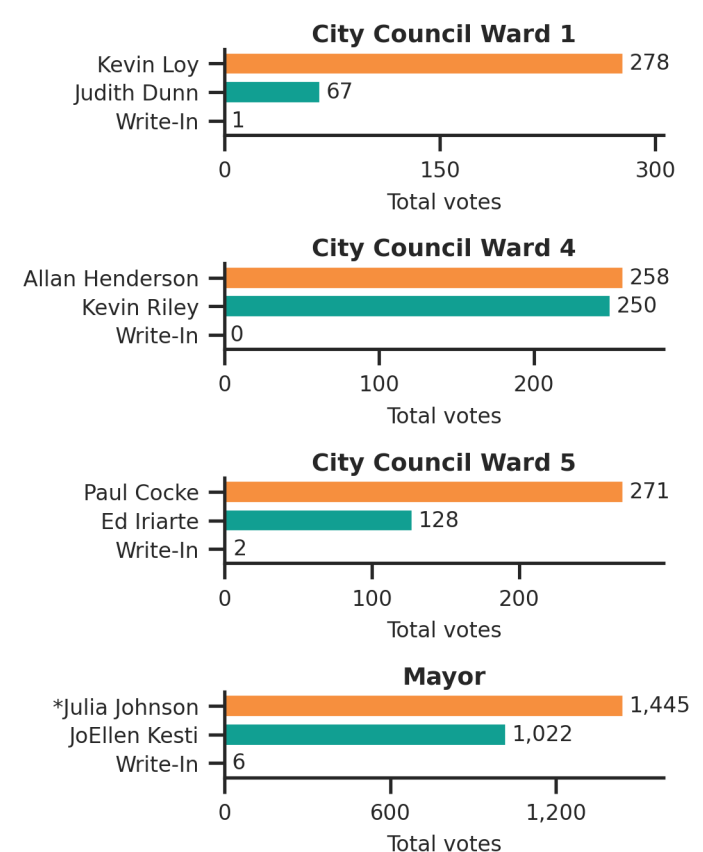


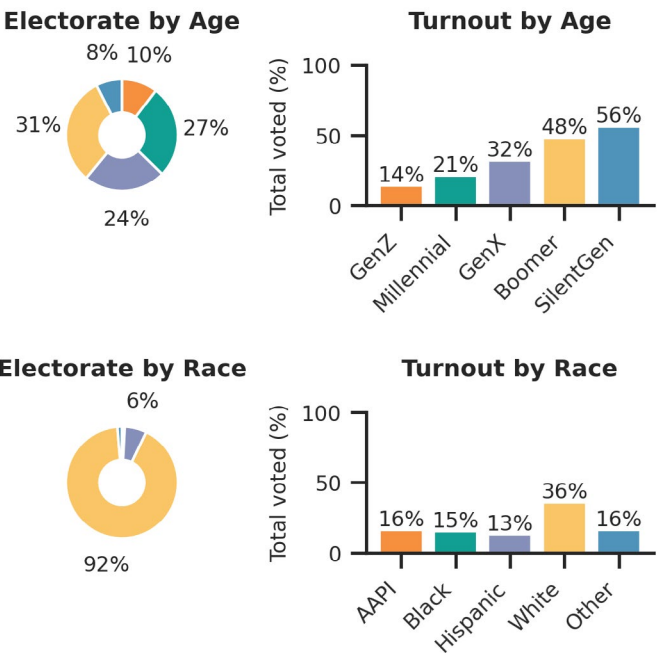
Fig 2 Election results in Sedro-Woolley for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

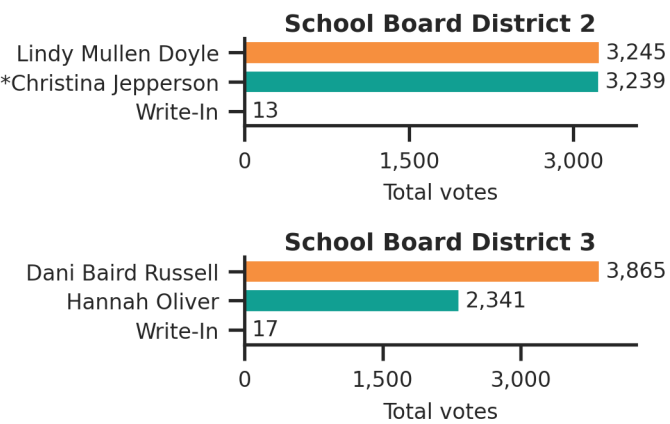

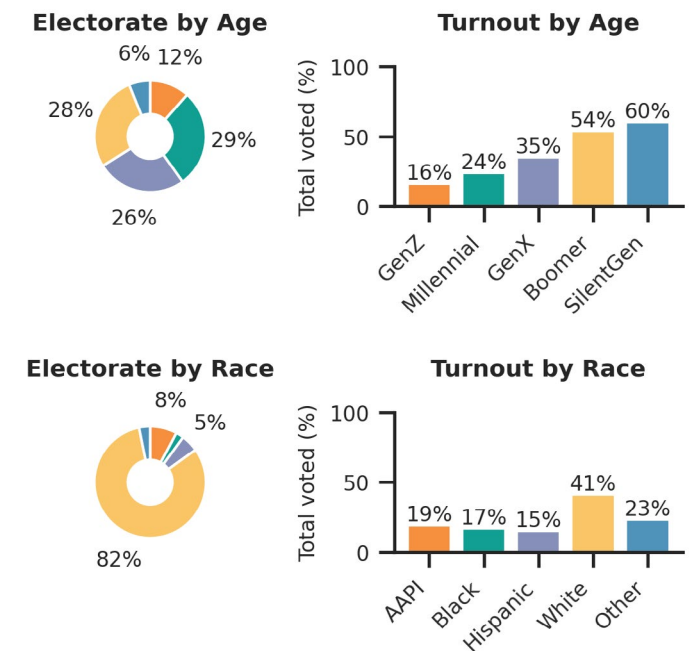


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Snohomish County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

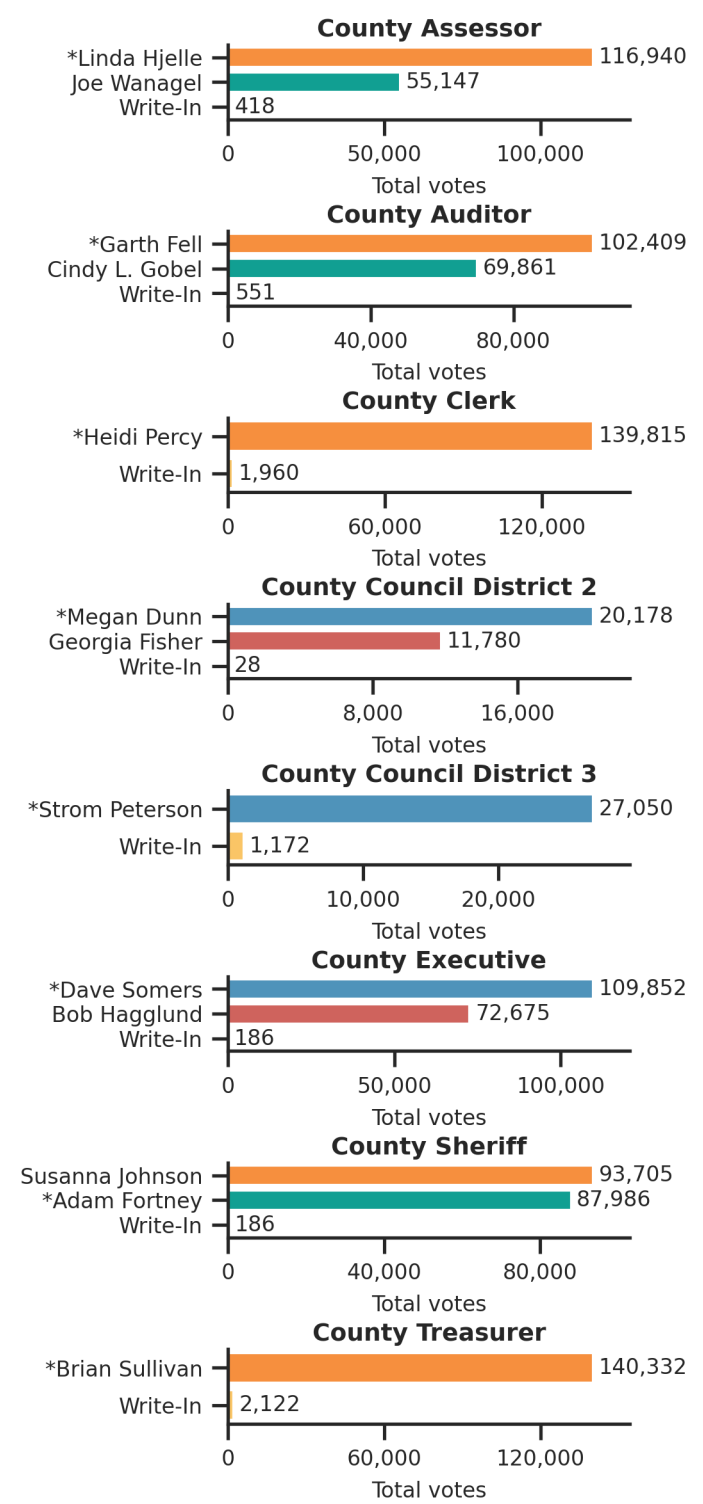


Fig 2 Election results in Snohomish County for the 2023 General Election. Asterisks indicate incumbents.

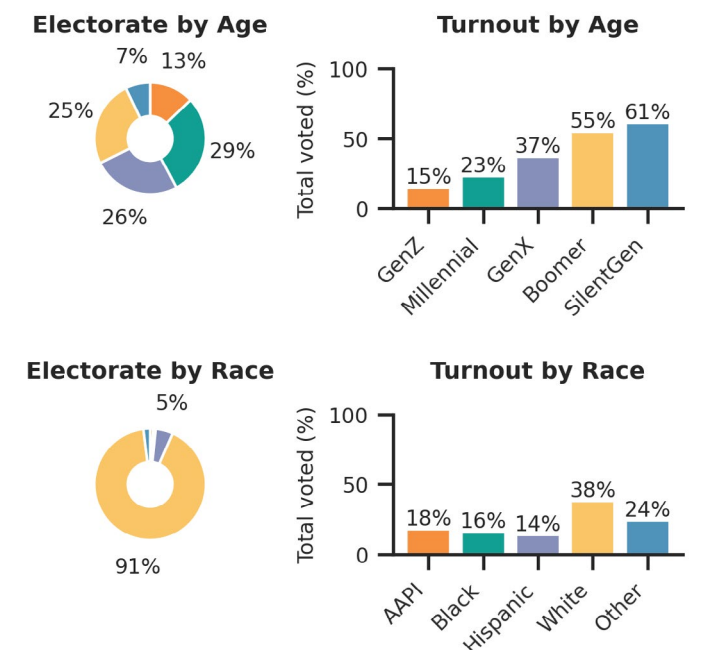


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Arlington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

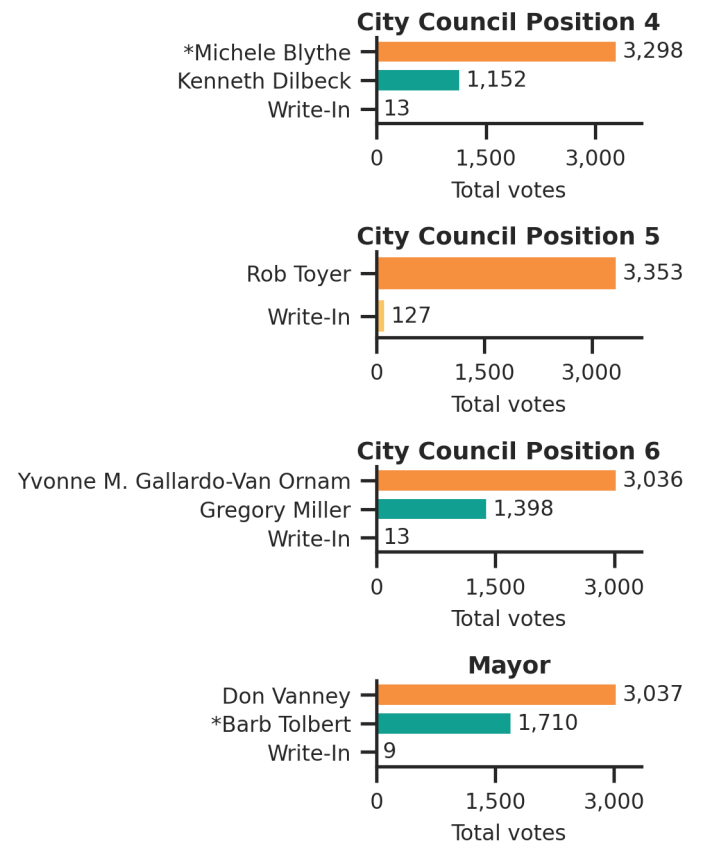


Fig 2 Election results in Arlington for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

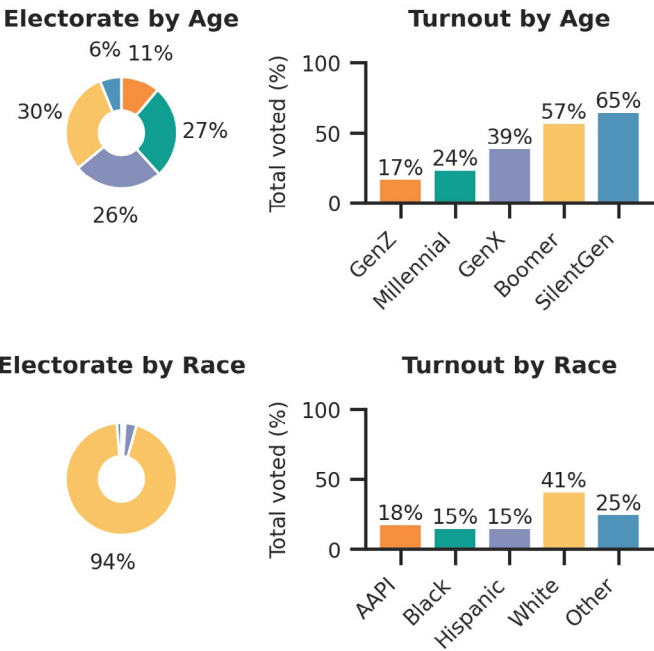


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Arlington School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

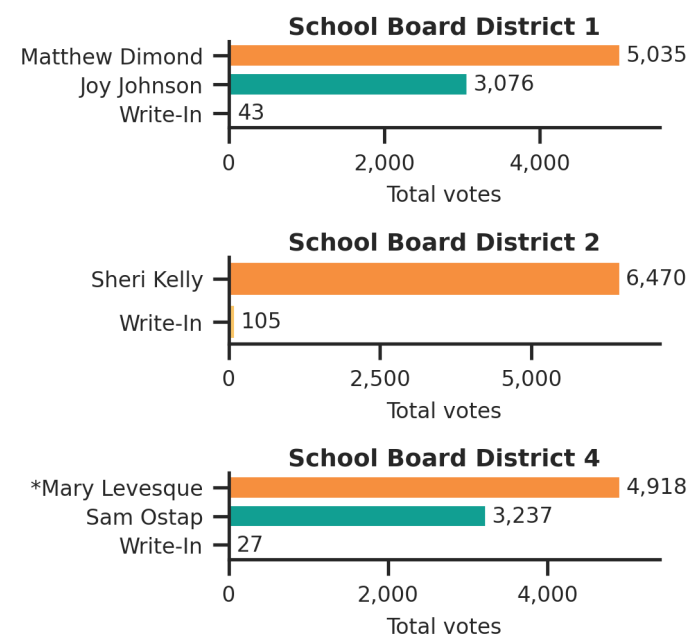


Fig 2 Election results in Arlington School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

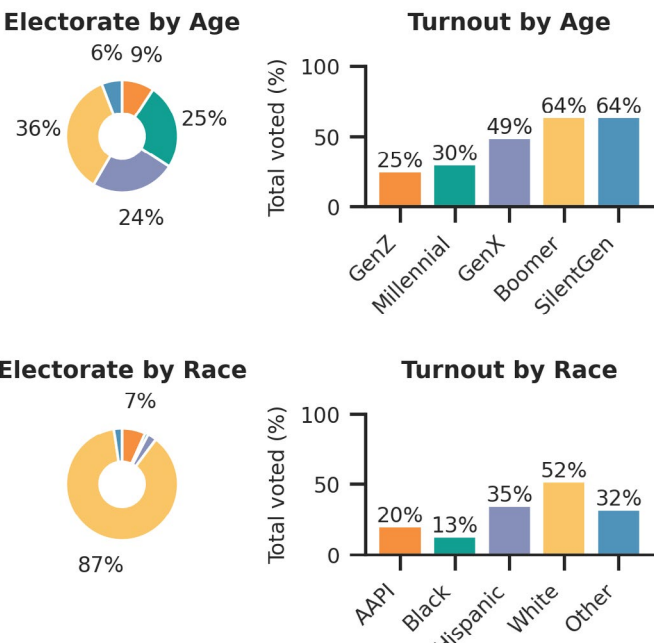


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Brier for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

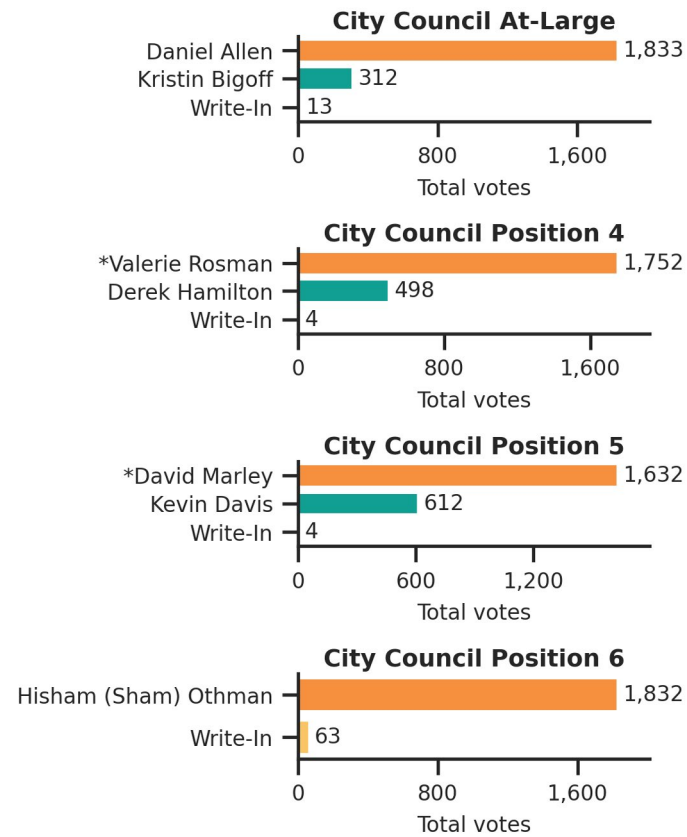
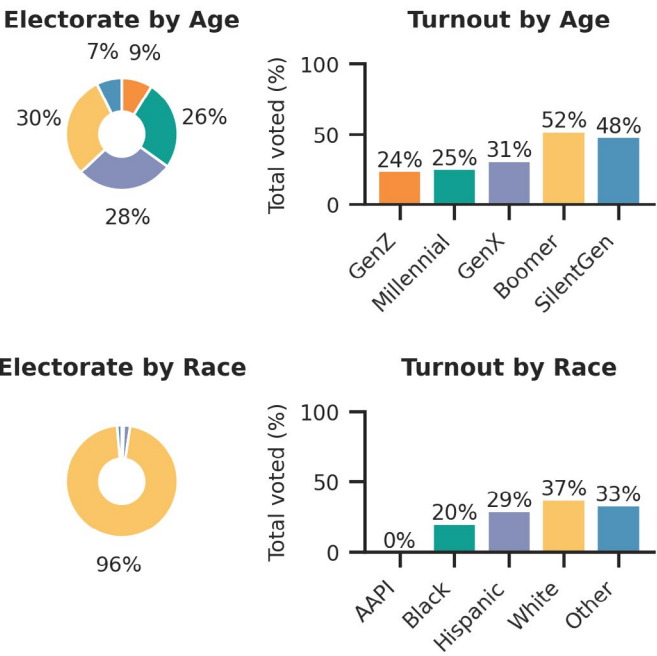


Fig 2 Election results in Brier for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

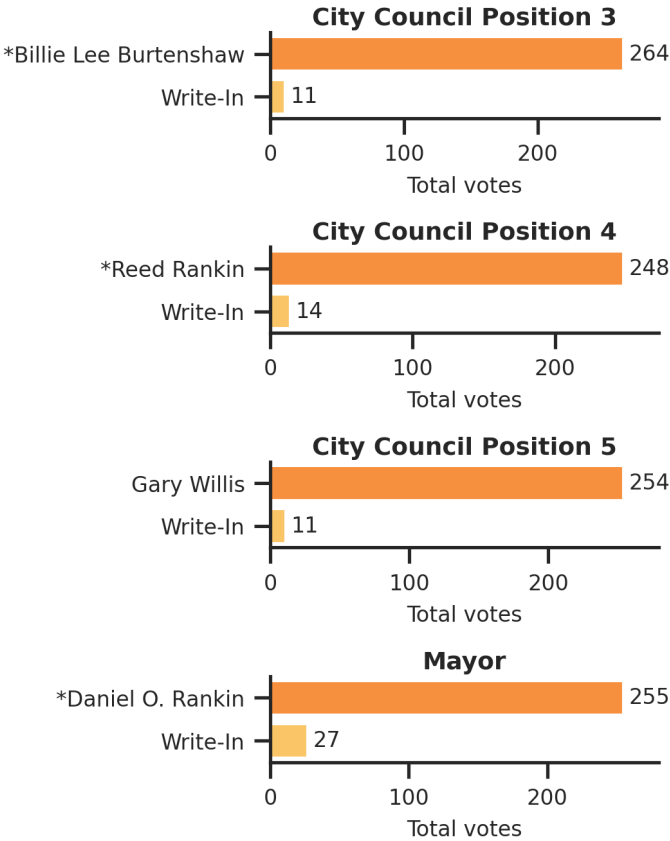

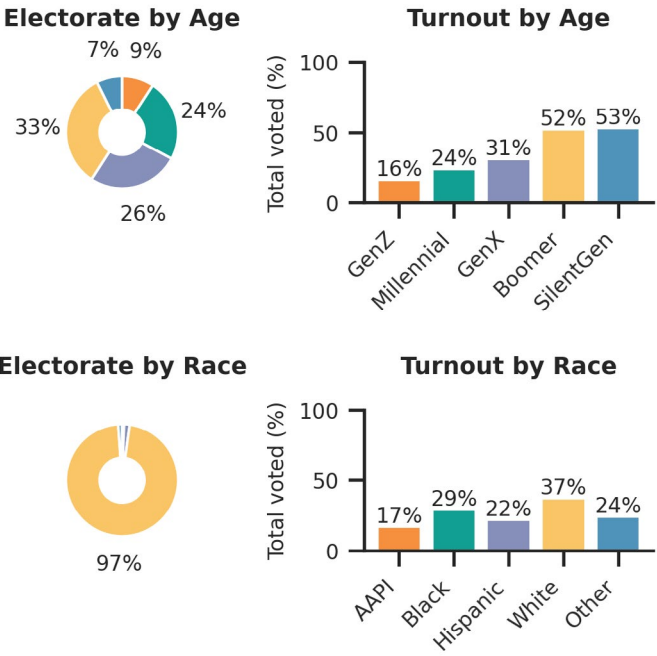

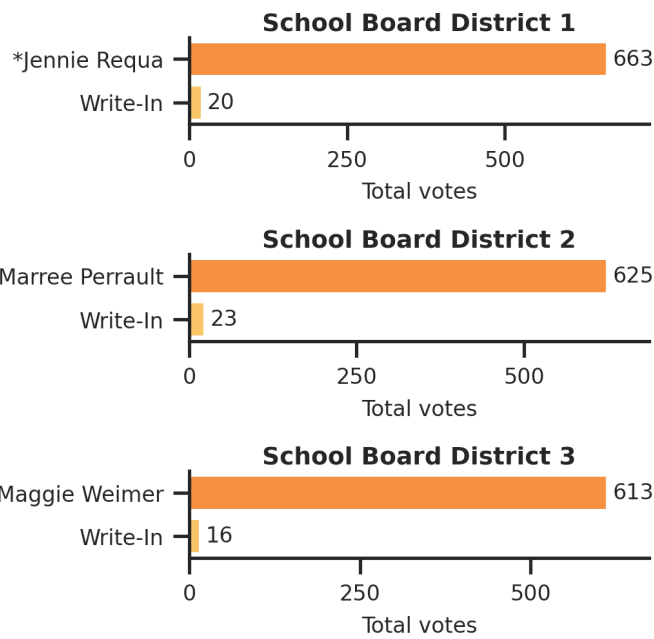

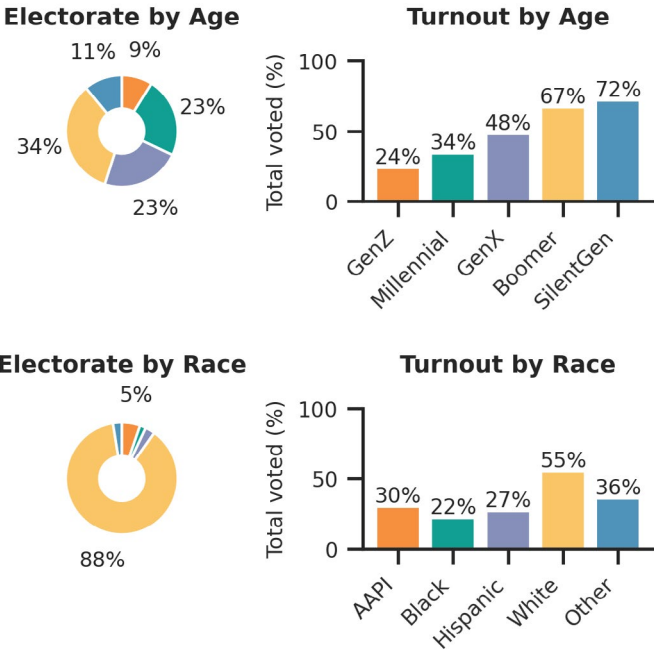


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Edmonds for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

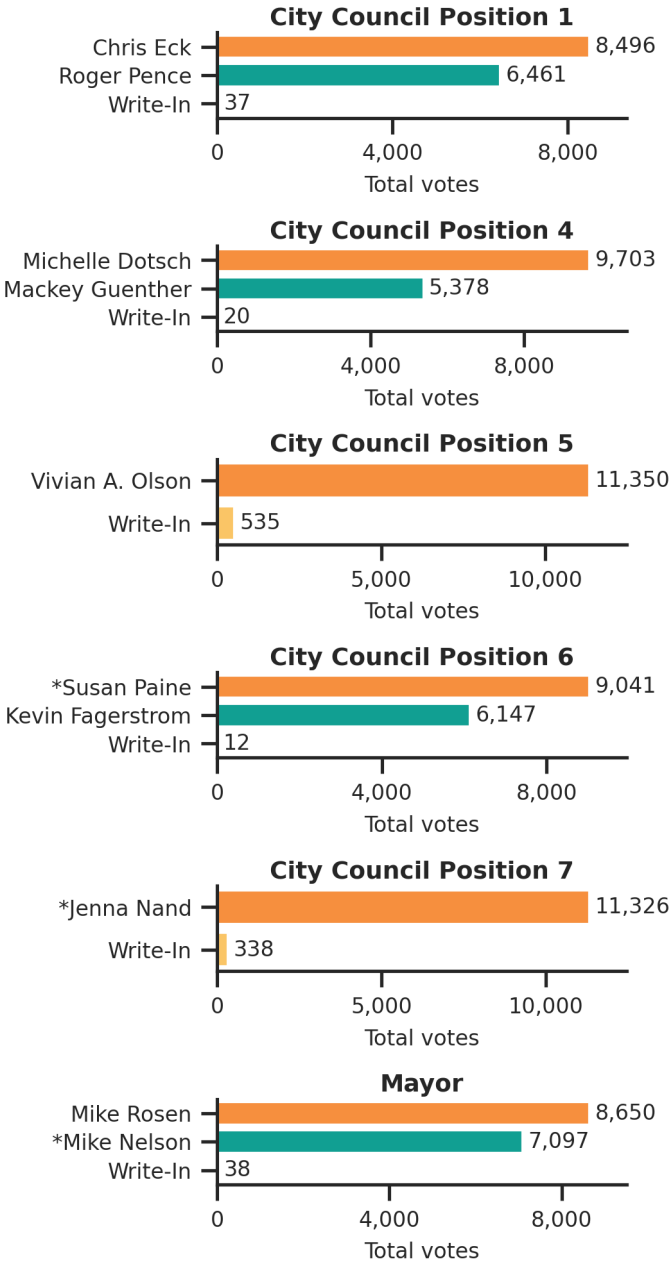


Fig 2 Election results in Edmonds for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

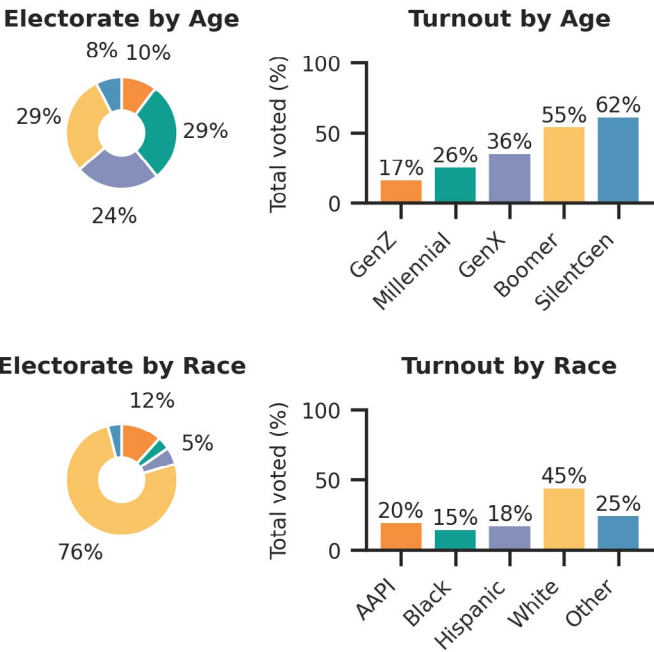


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Edmonds School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

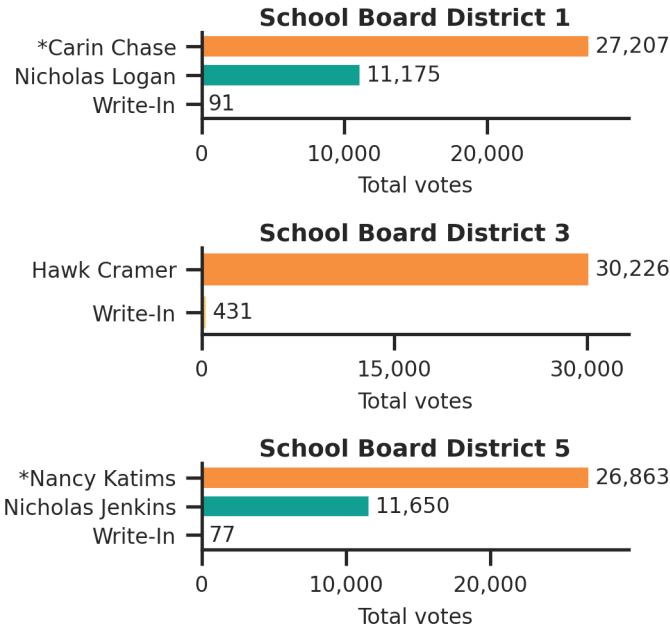


Fig 2 Election results in Edmonds School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

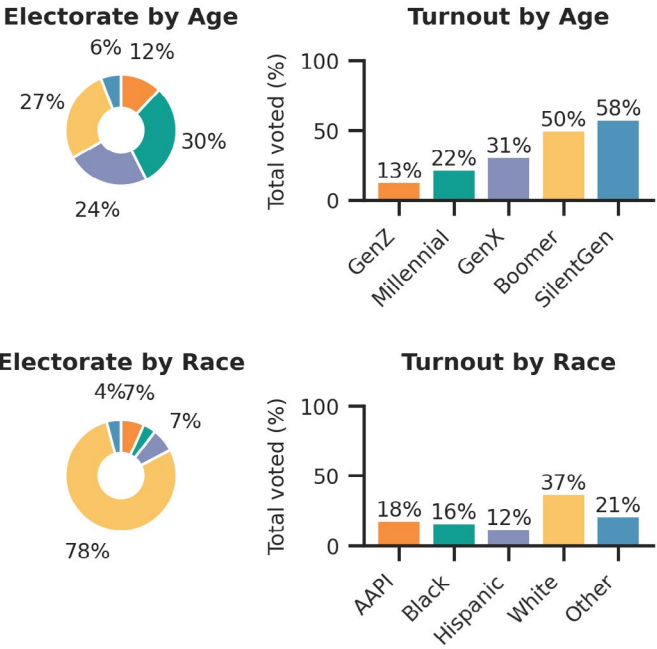


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Everett for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

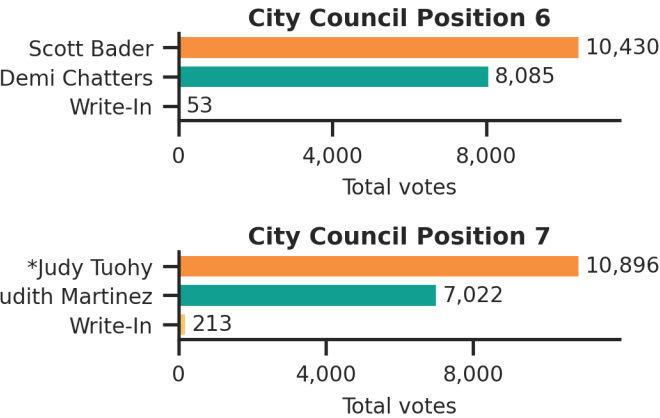


Fig 2 Election results in Everett for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

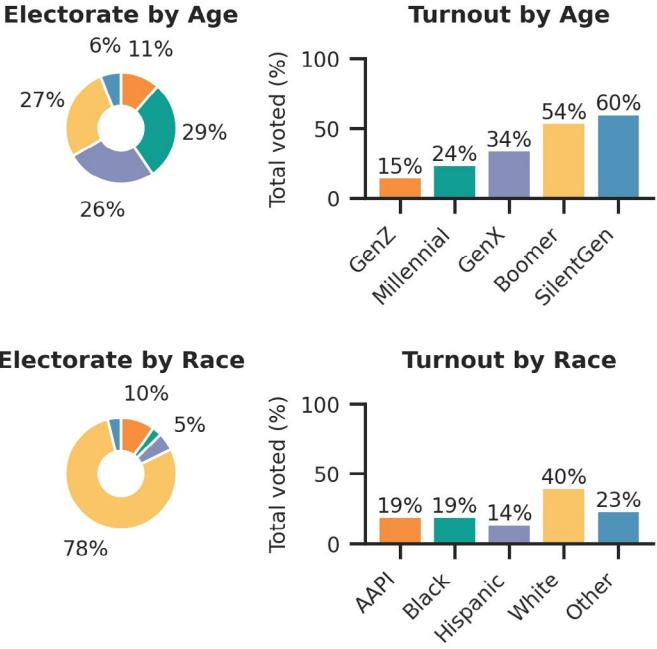


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Everett School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

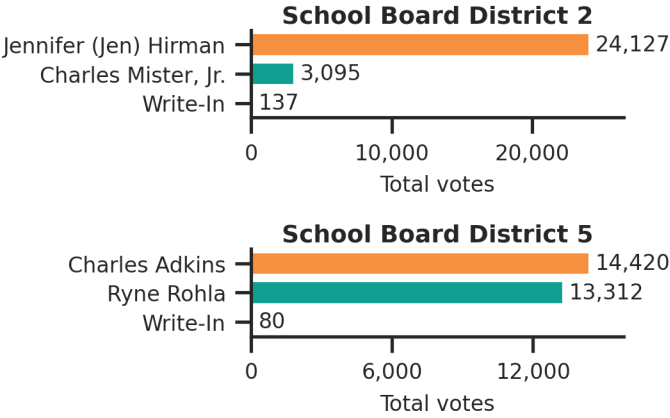


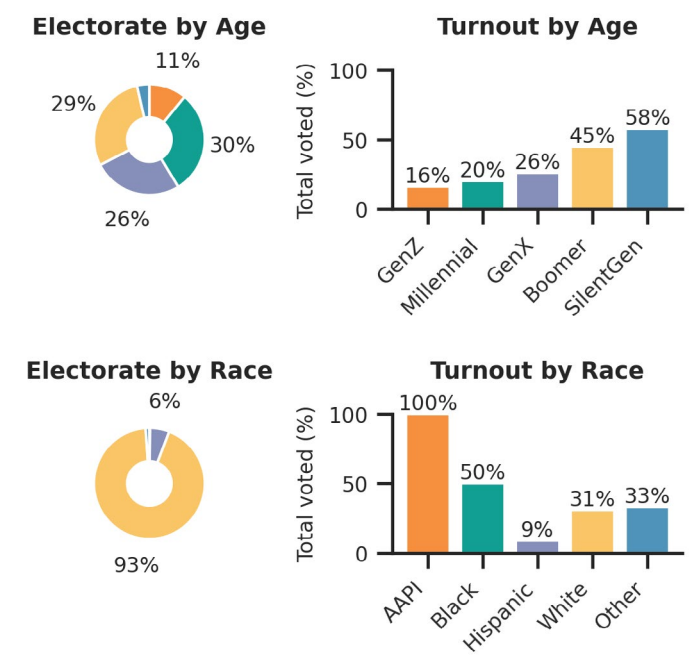
Fig 2 Election results in Everett School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

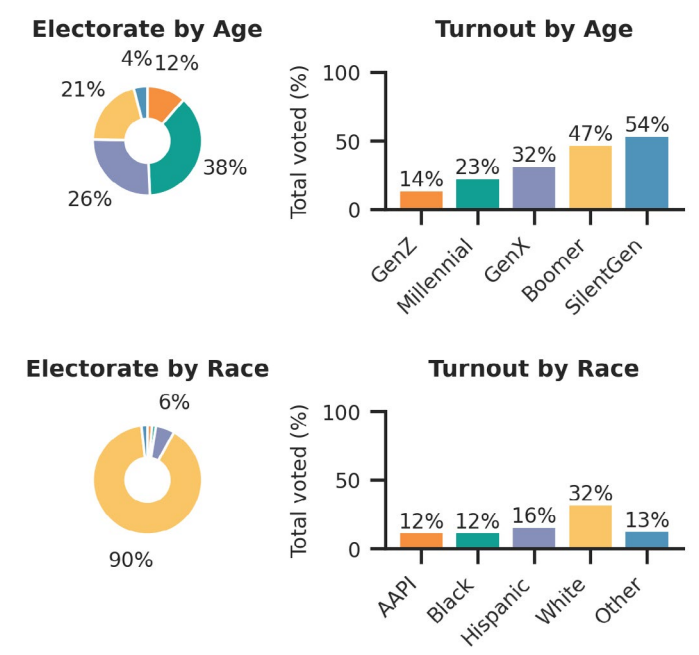


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Gold Bar for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

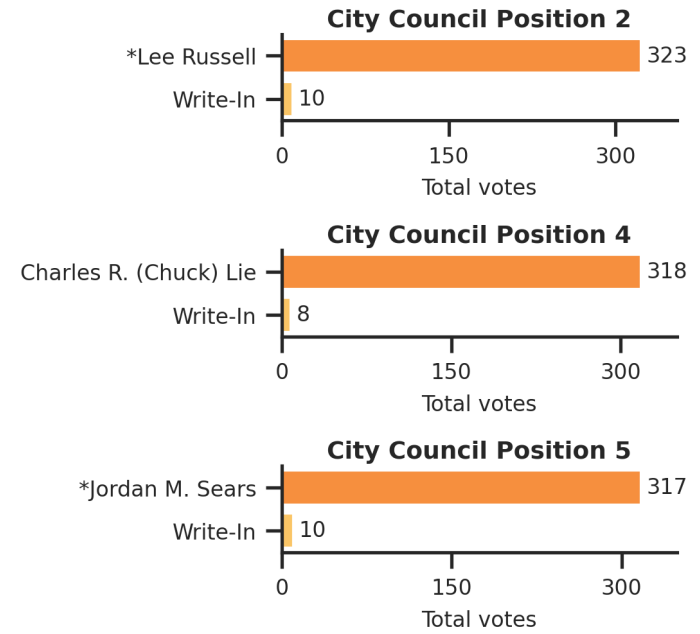

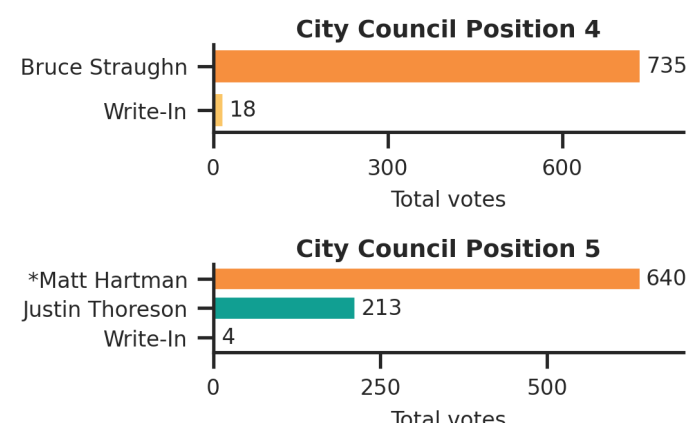

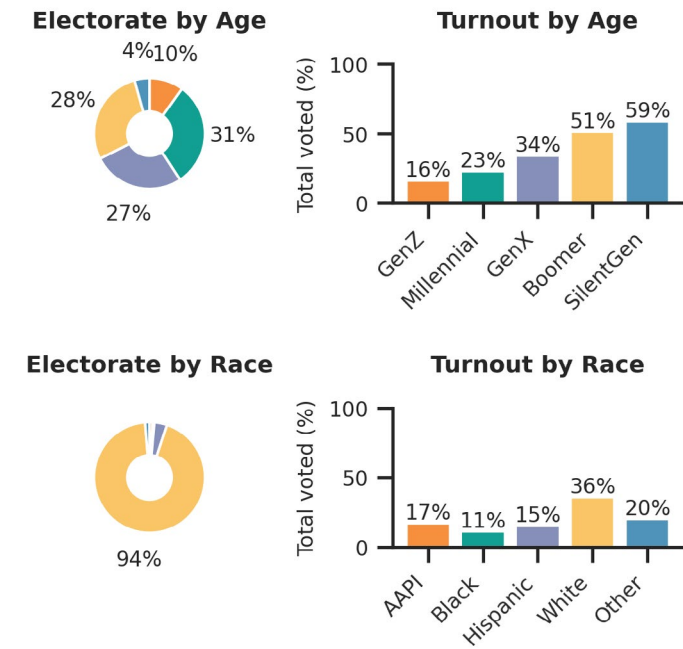


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Granite Falls School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

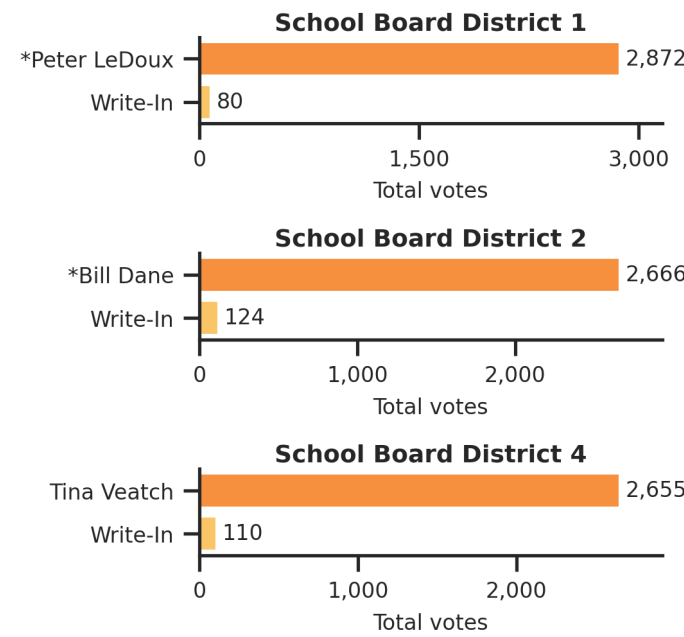


Fig 2 Election results in Granite Falls School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

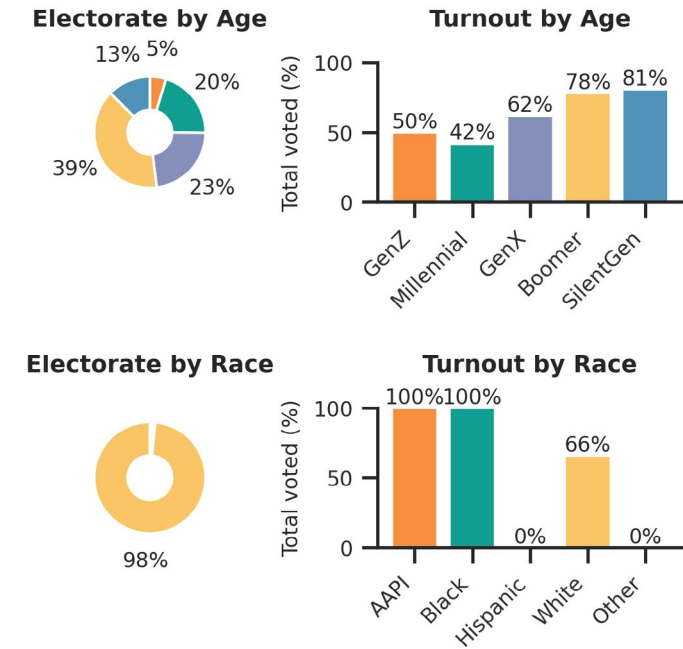


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Index for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

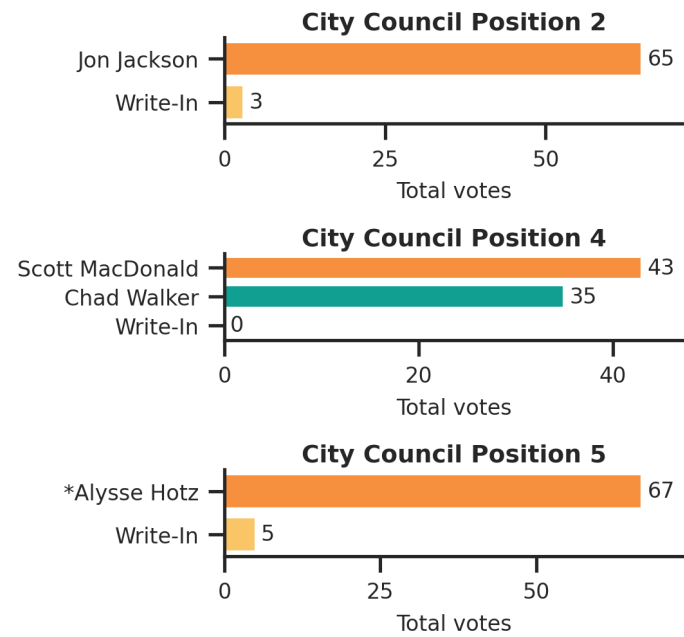
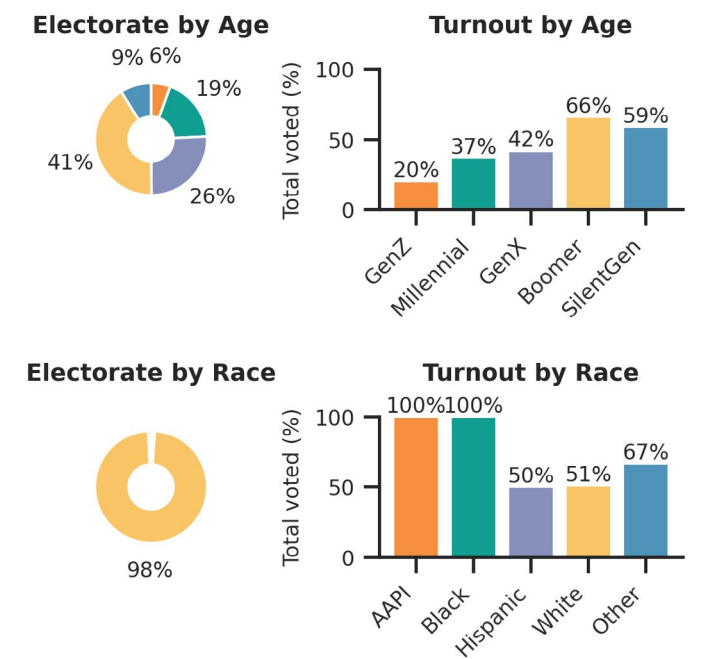


Fig 2 Election results in Index for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

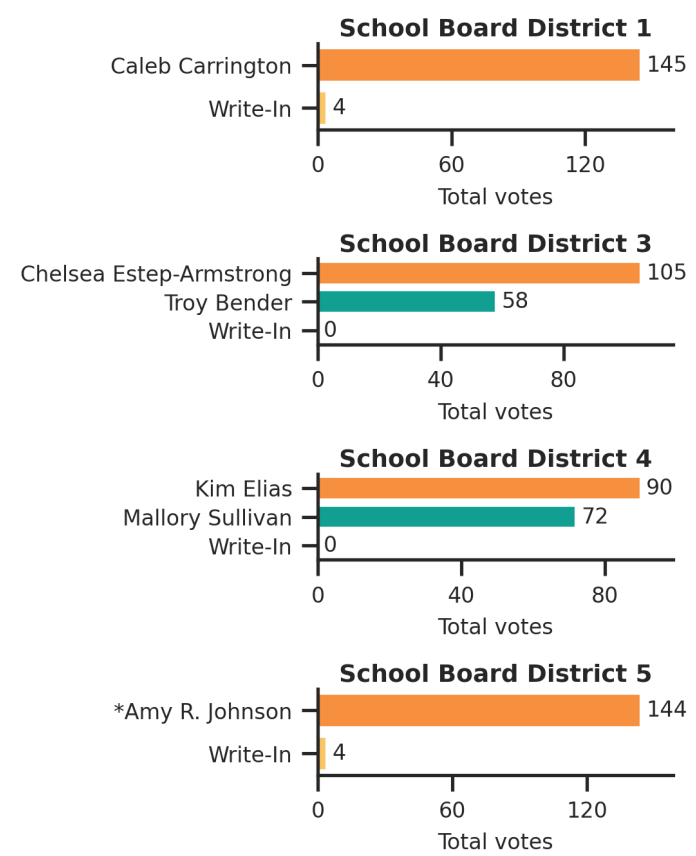

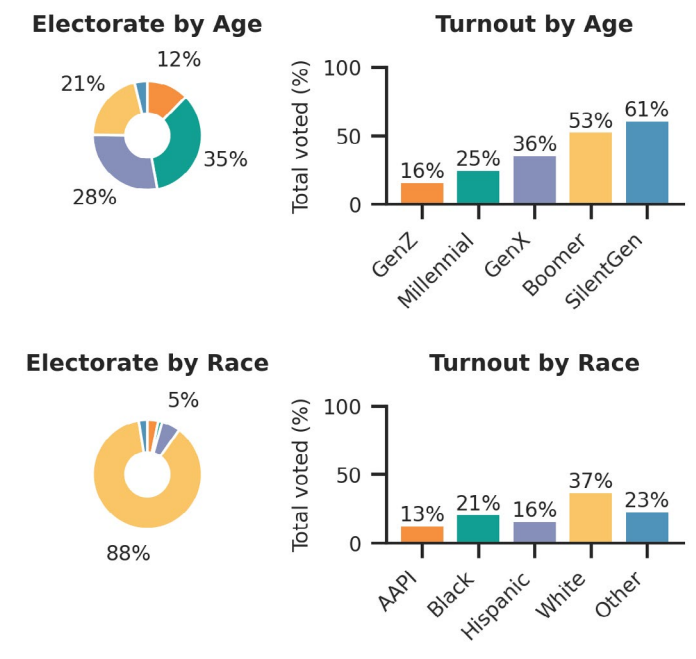

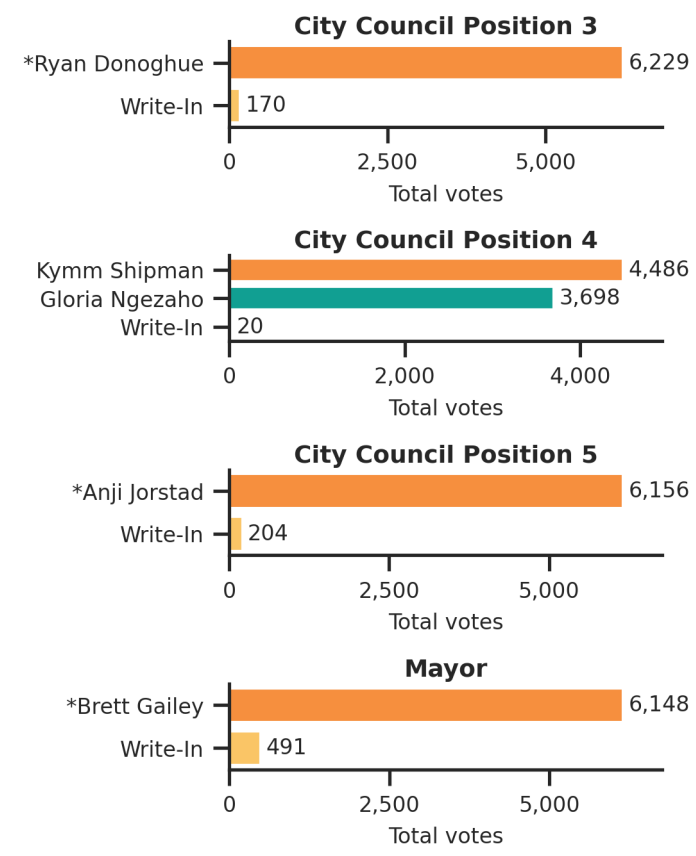

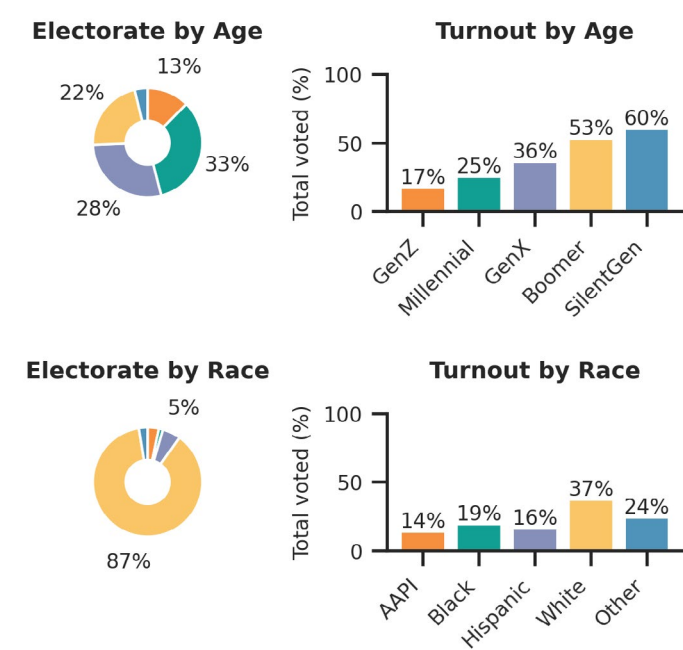


**Fig 2** Election results in Lake Stevens for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

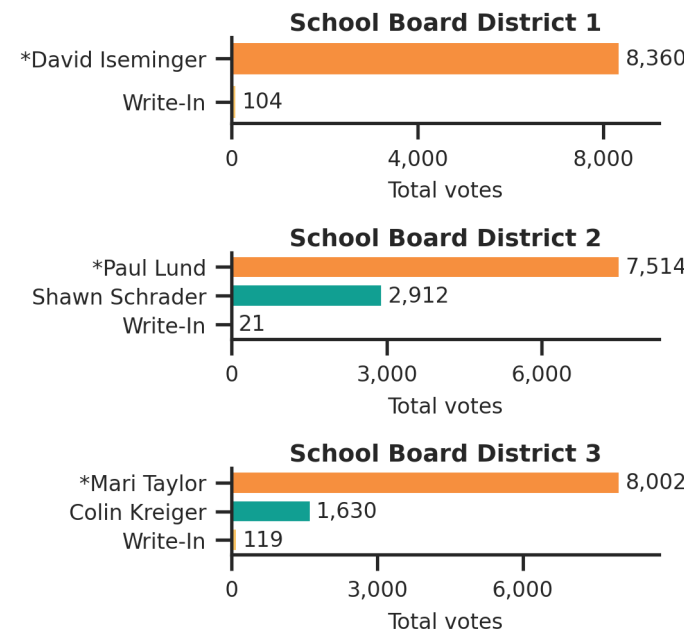

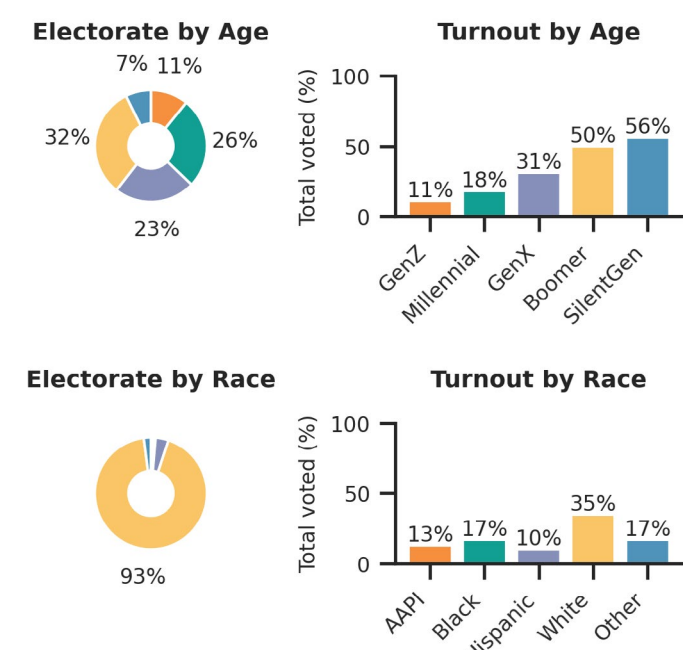


**Fig 2** Election results in Lake Stevens School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

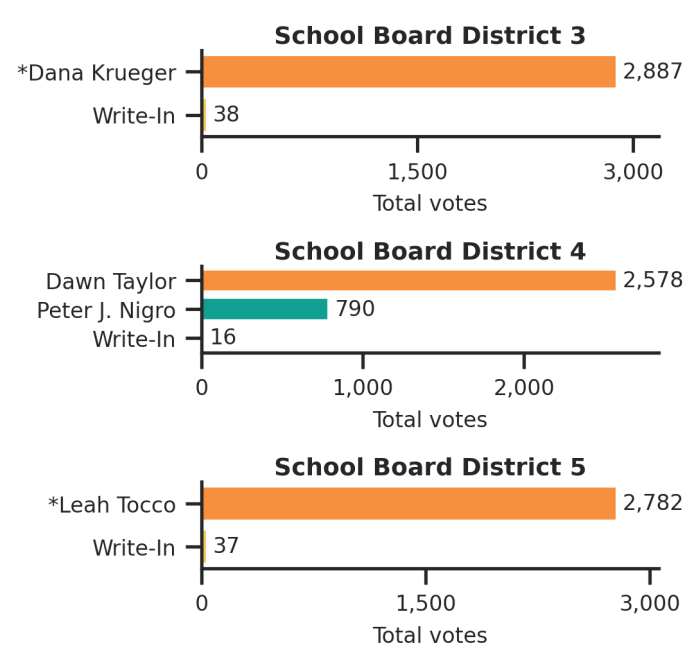

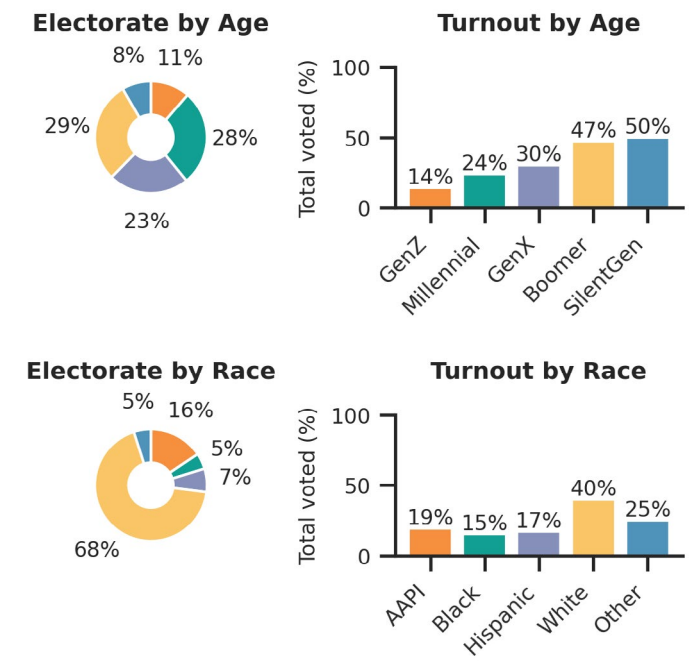


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lynnwood for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

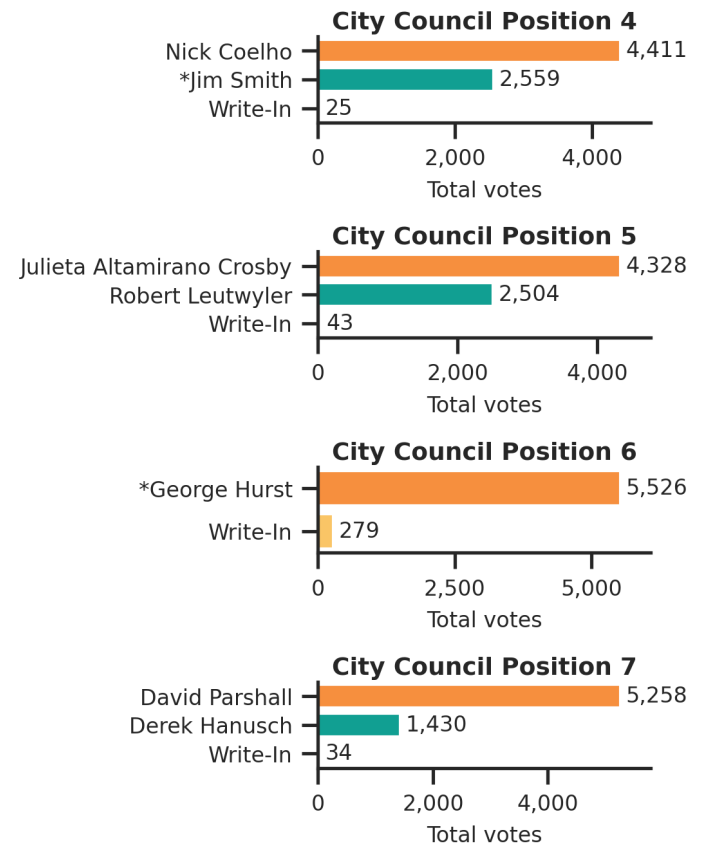


Fig 2 Election results in Lynnwood for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

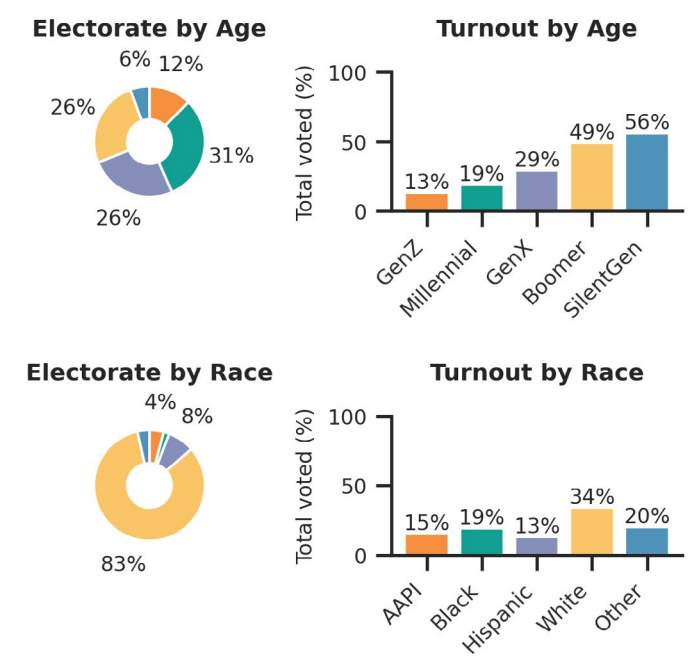


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Marysville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

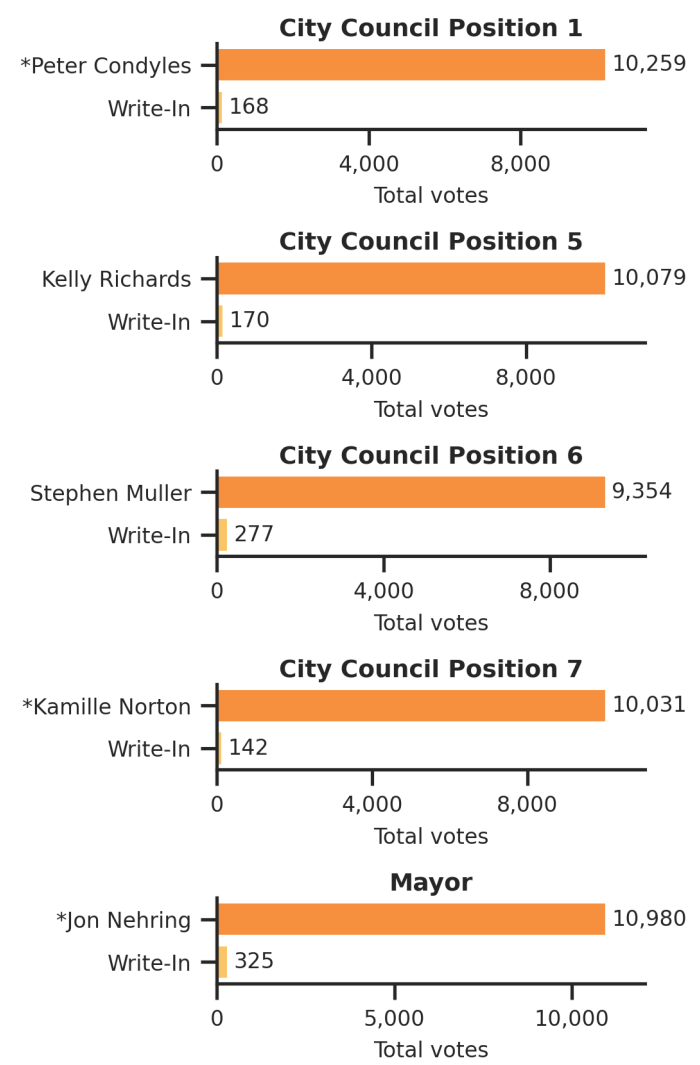
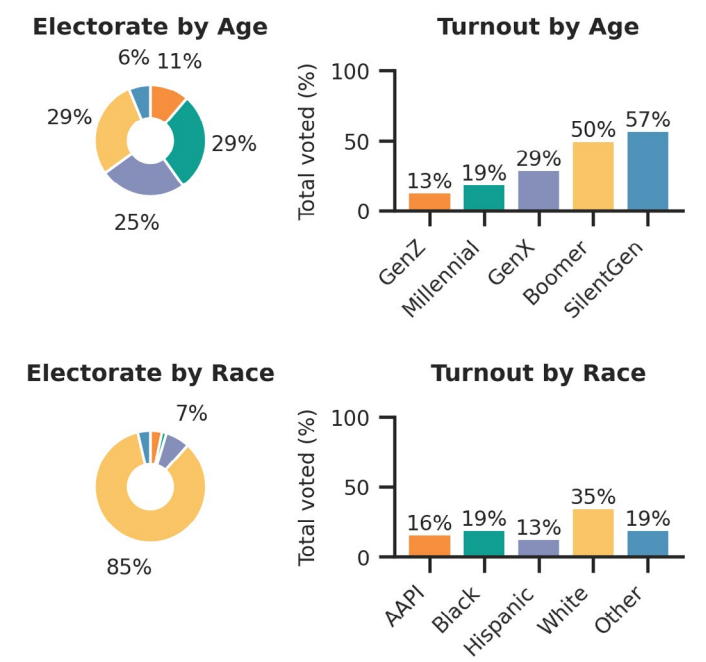


Fig 2 Election results in Marysville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

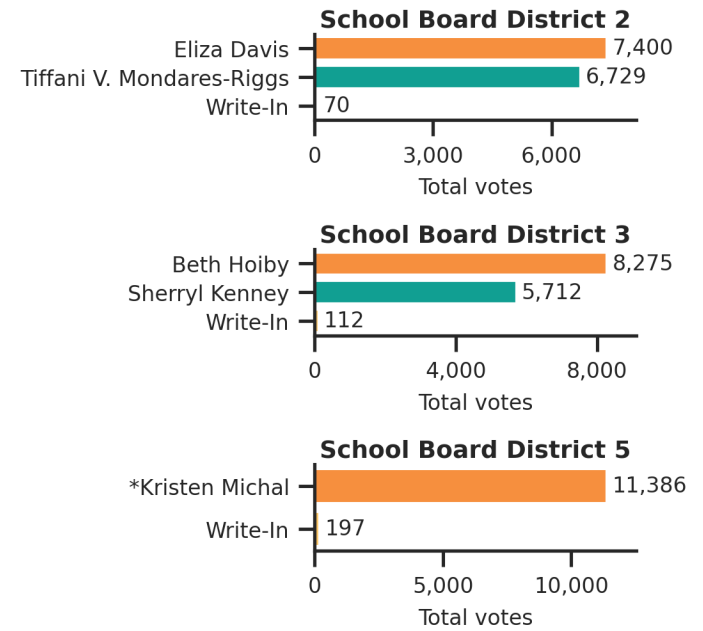

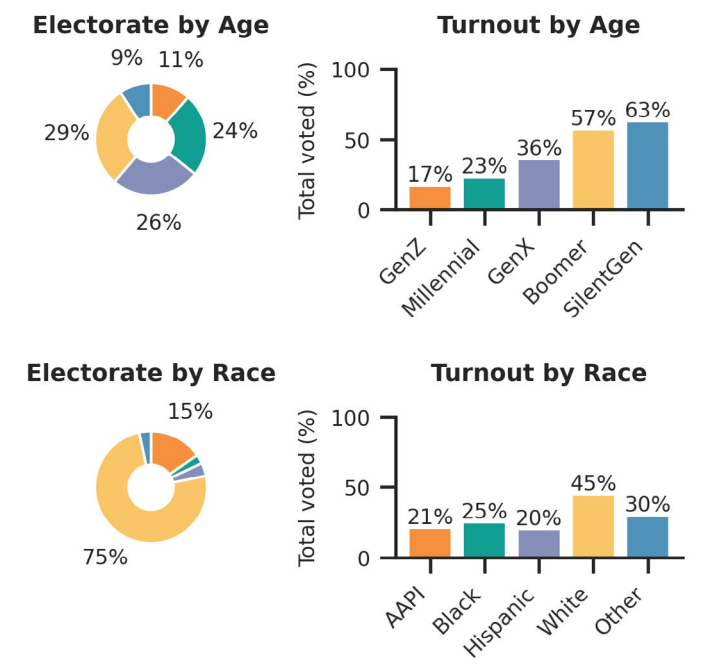

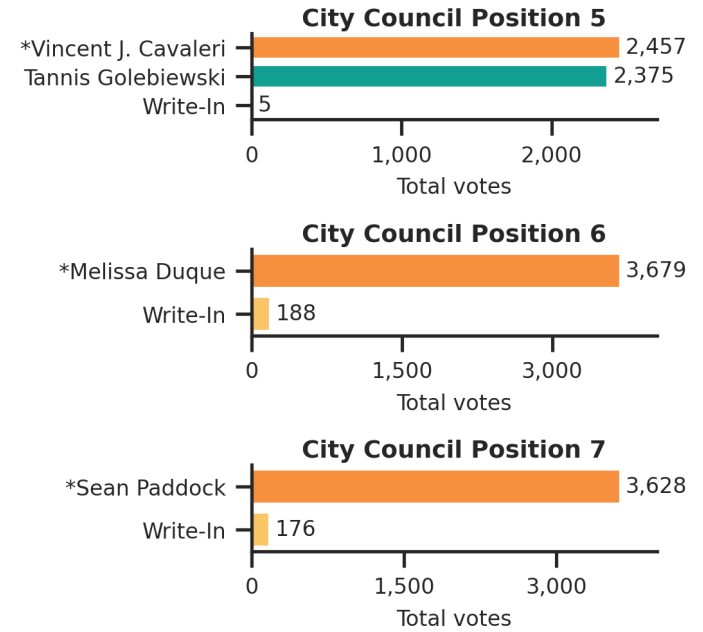

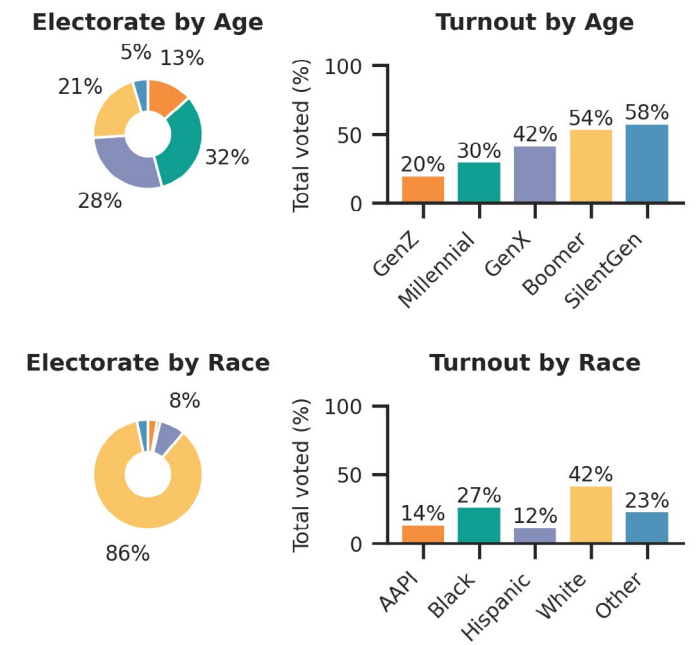


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Monroe for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

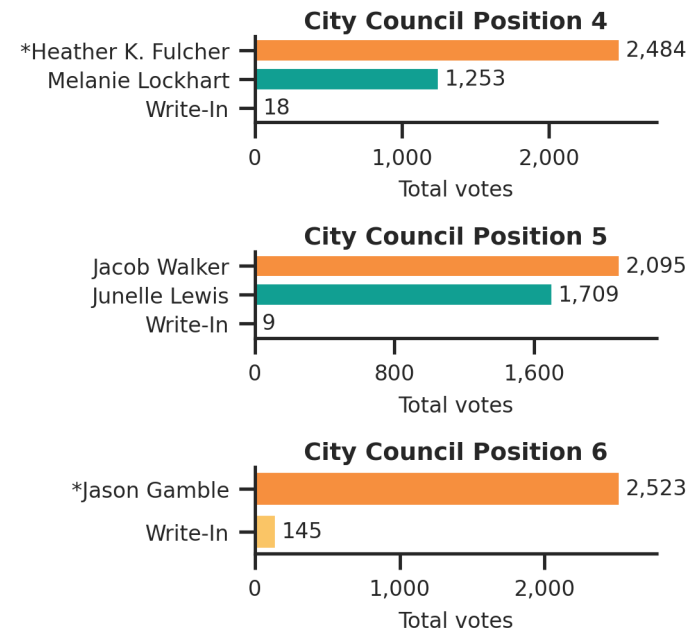


Fig 2 Election results in Monroe for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

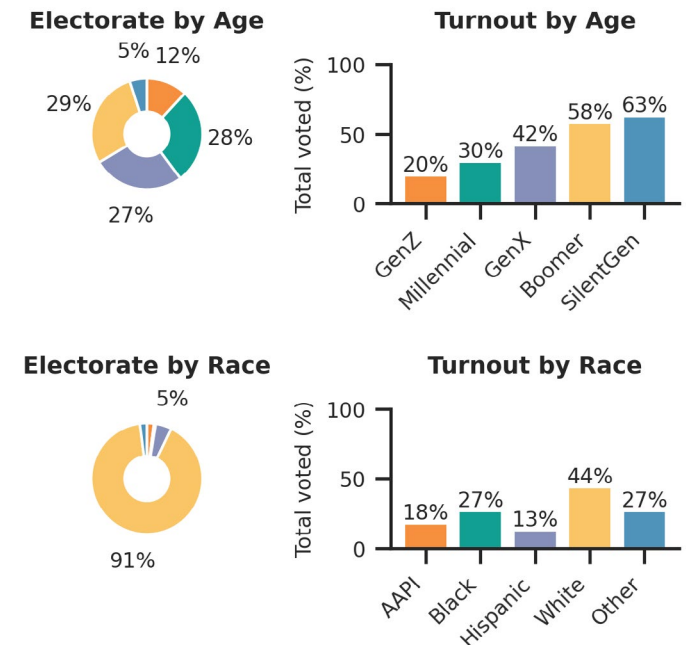


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Monroe School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

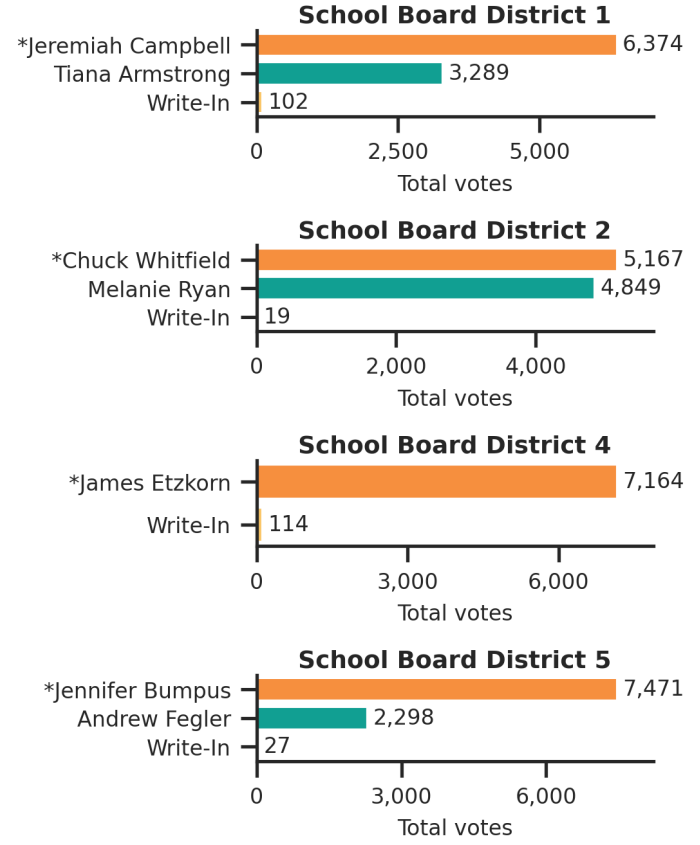
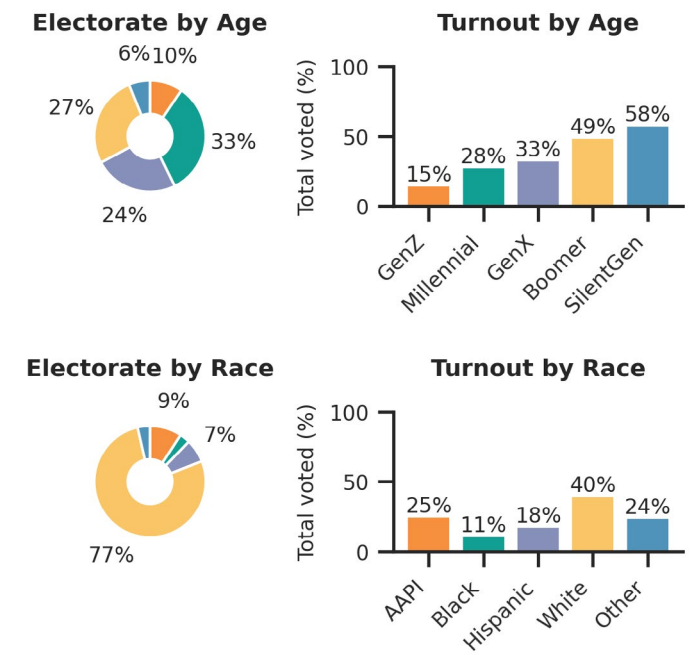


Fig 2 Election results in Monroe School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

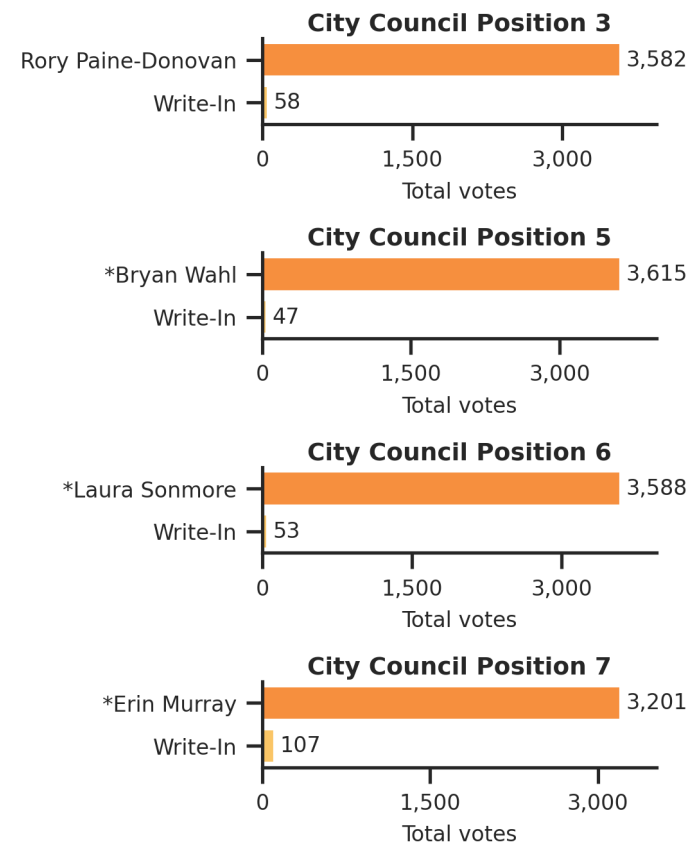

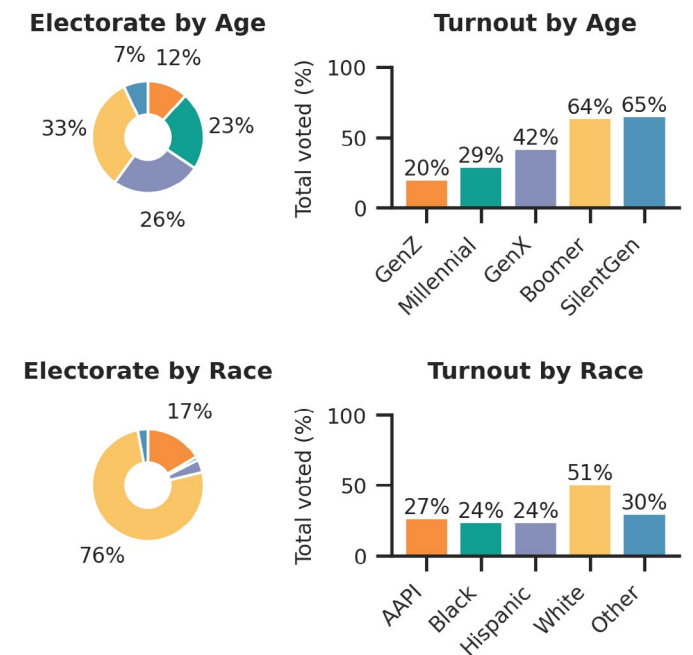


**Fig 2** Election results in Montlake Terrace for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

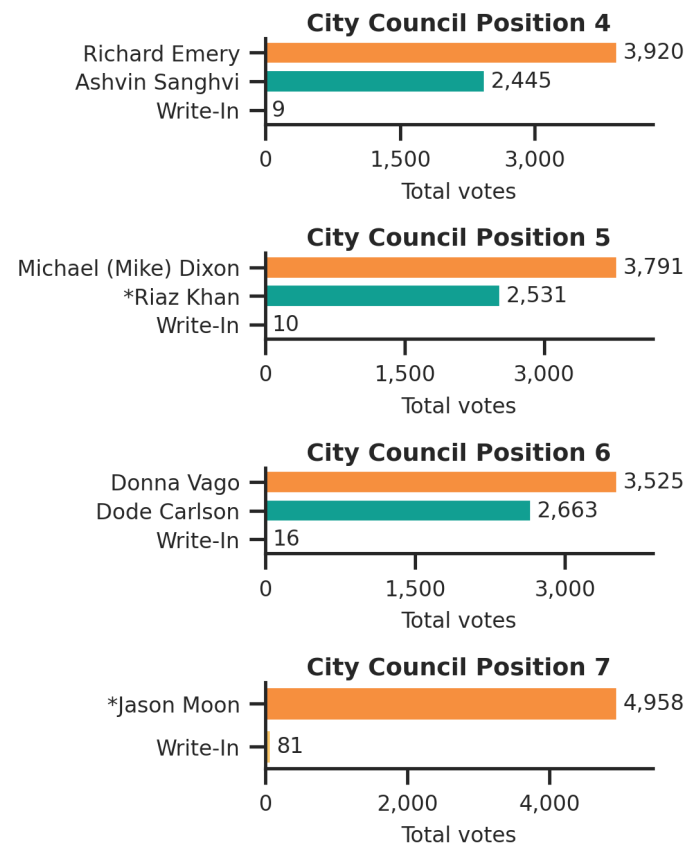

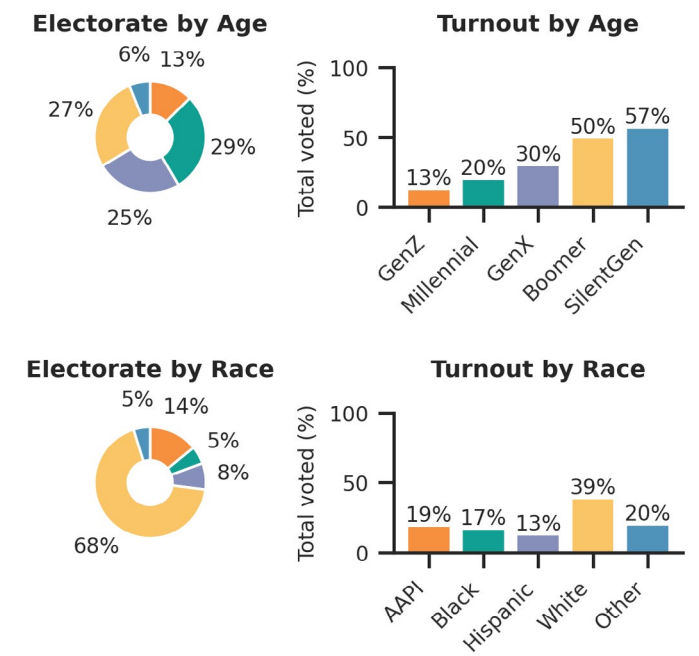


**Fig 2** Election results in Mukilteo for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

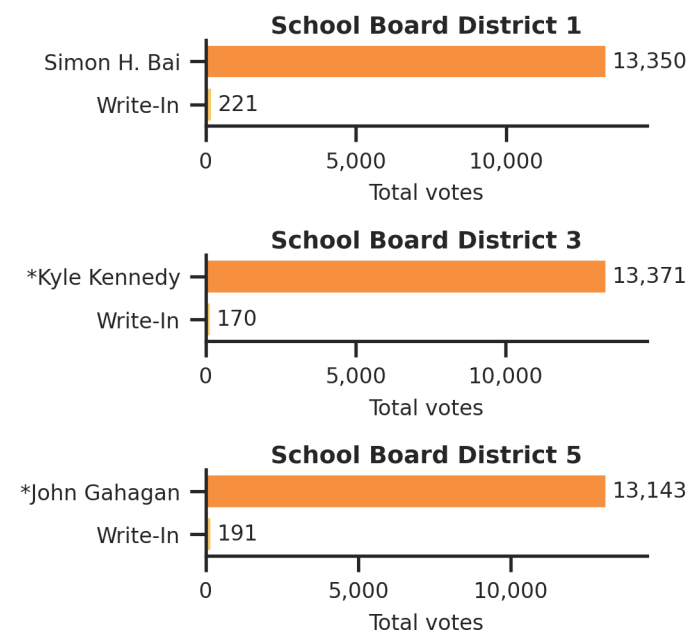

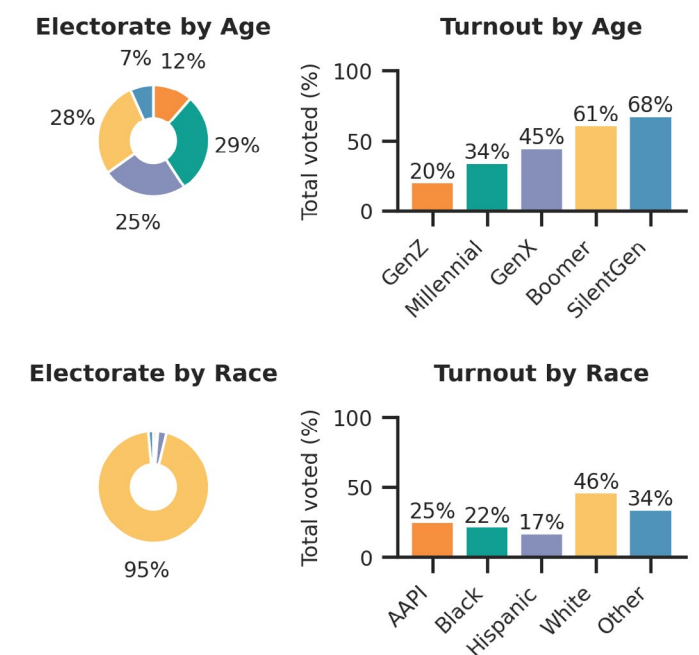

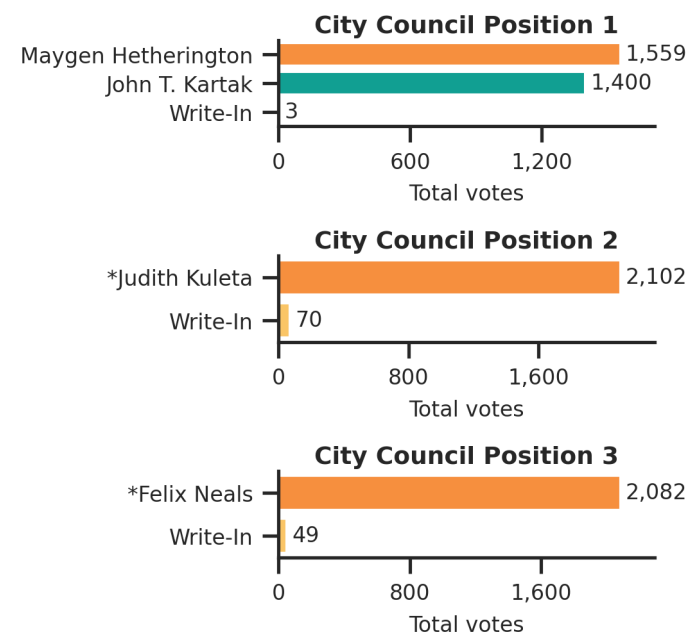

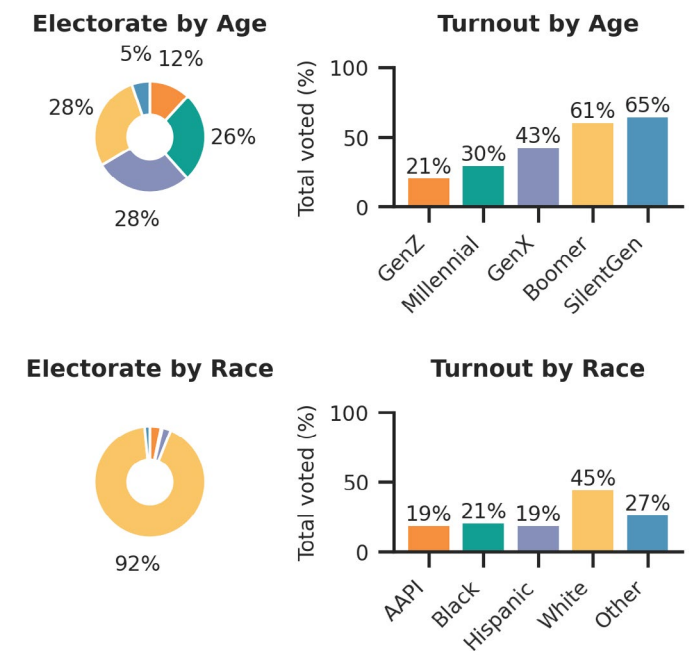


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Snohomish School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

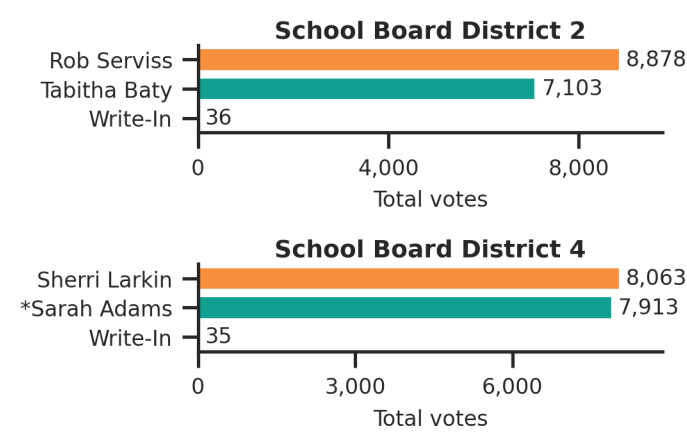


Fig 2 Election results in Snohomish School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

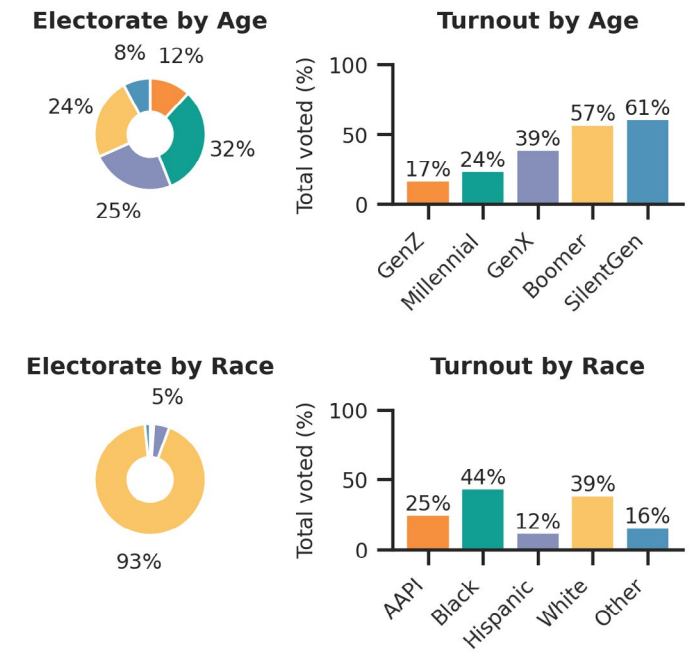


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Stanwood for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

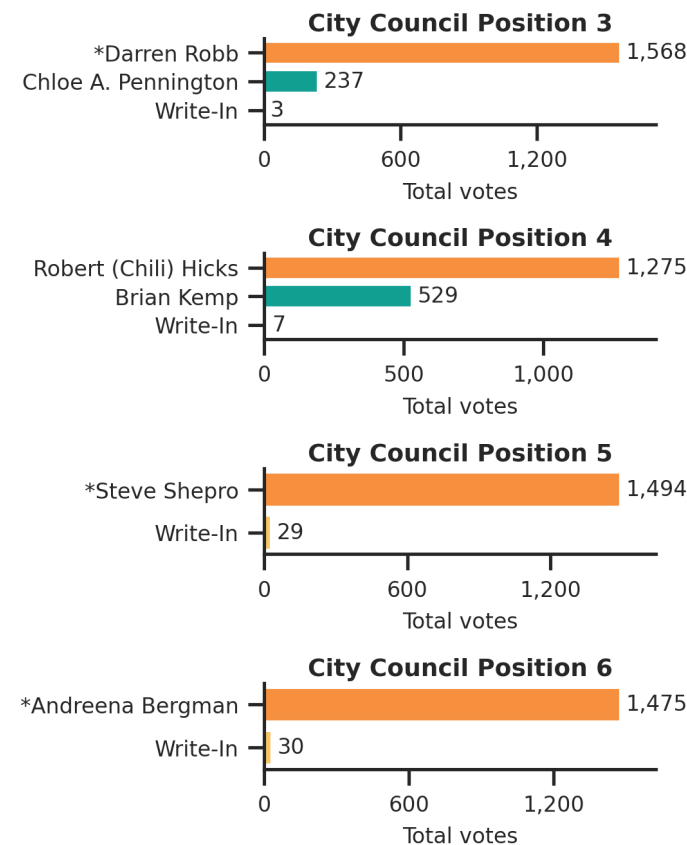


Fig 2 Election results in Stanwood for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

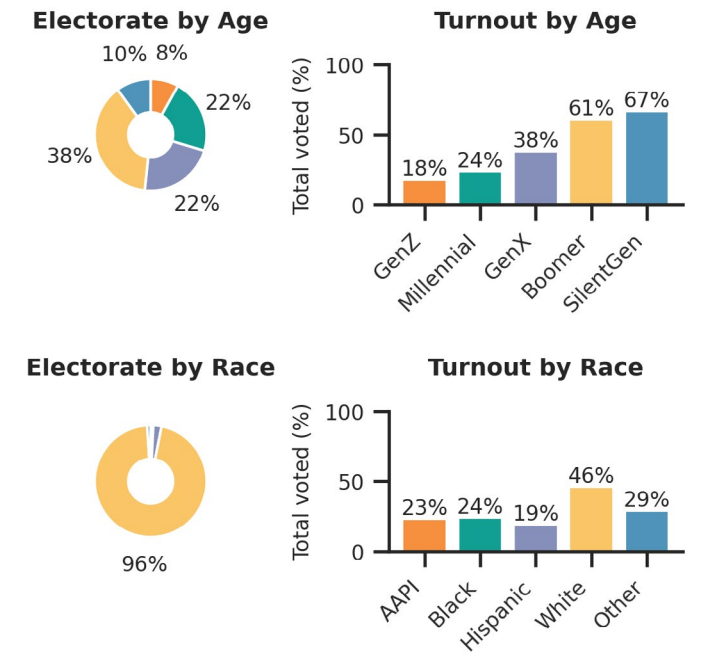


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Stanwood-Camano School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

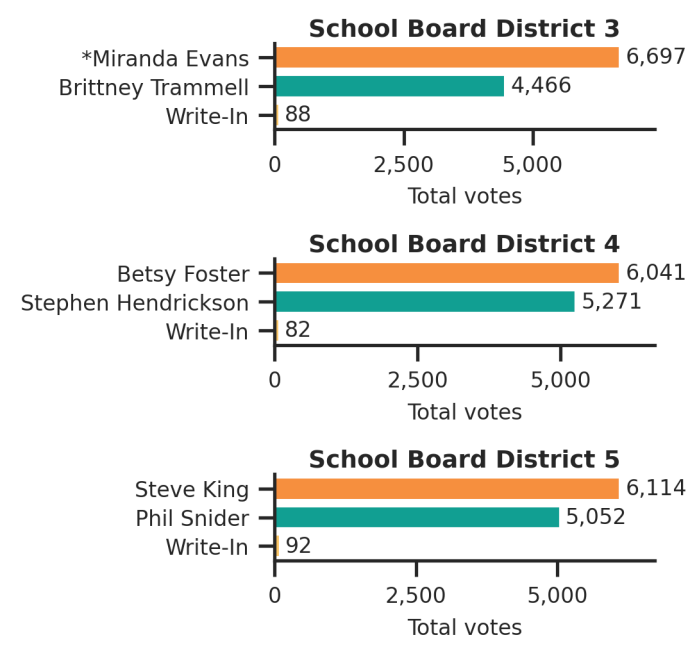


Fig 2 Election results in Stanwood-Camano School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

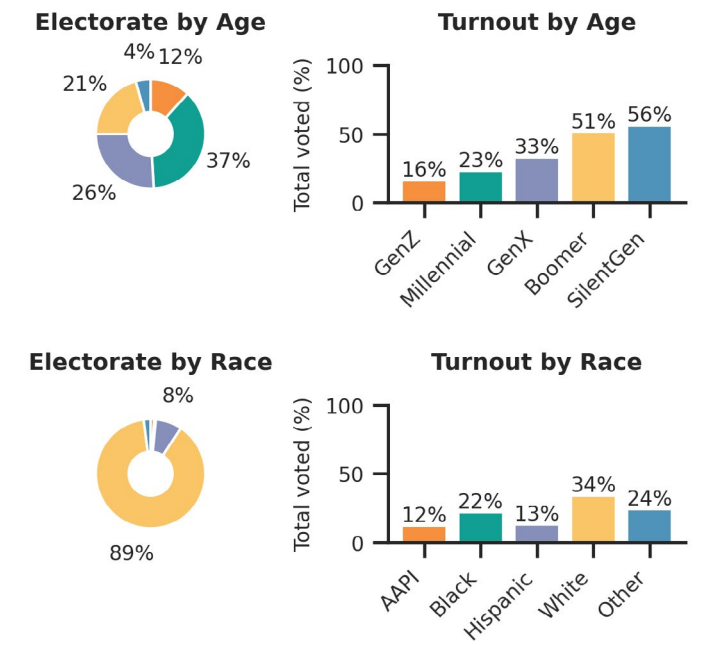


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sultan for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

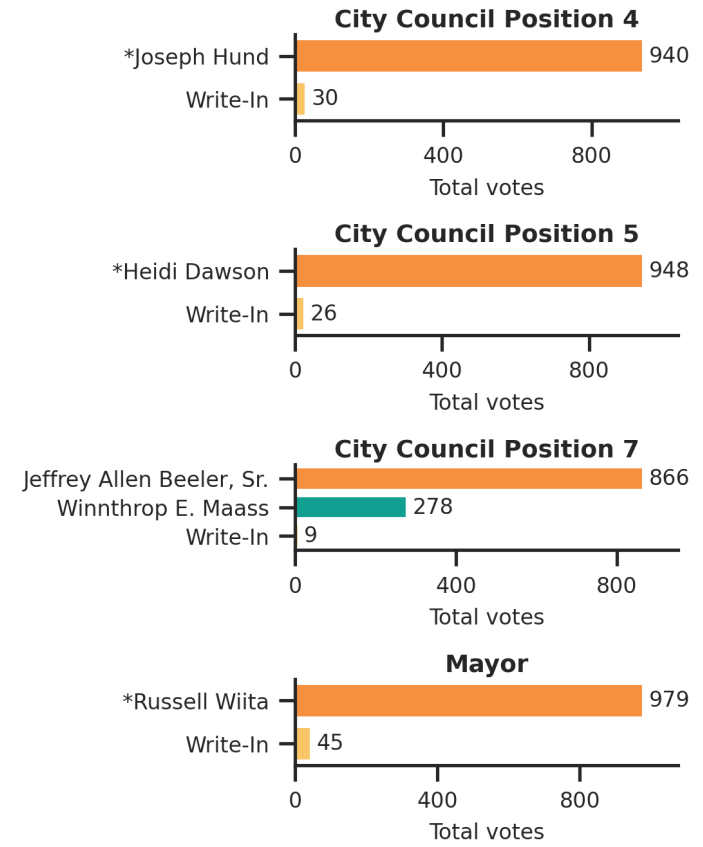
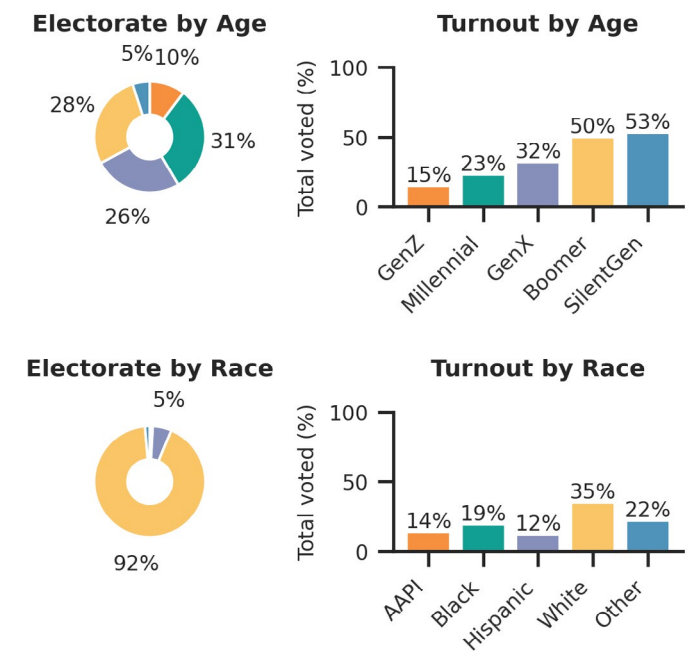


Fig 2 Election results in Sultan for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

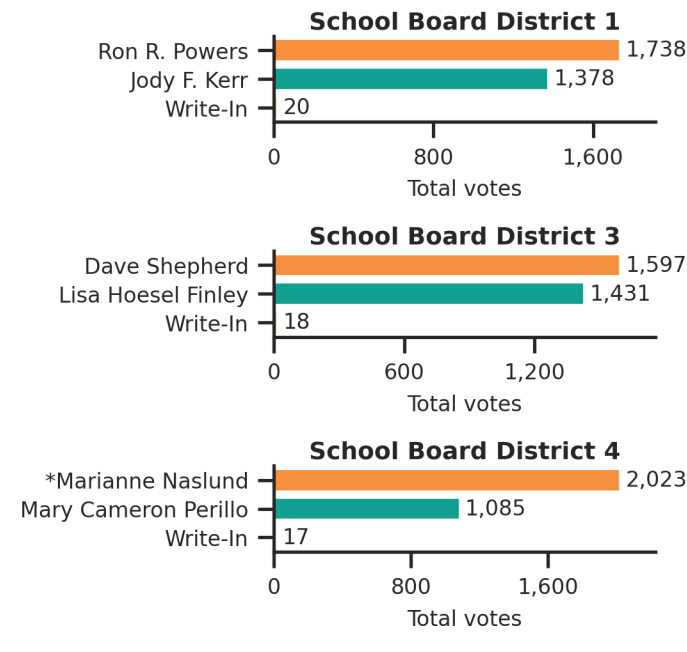

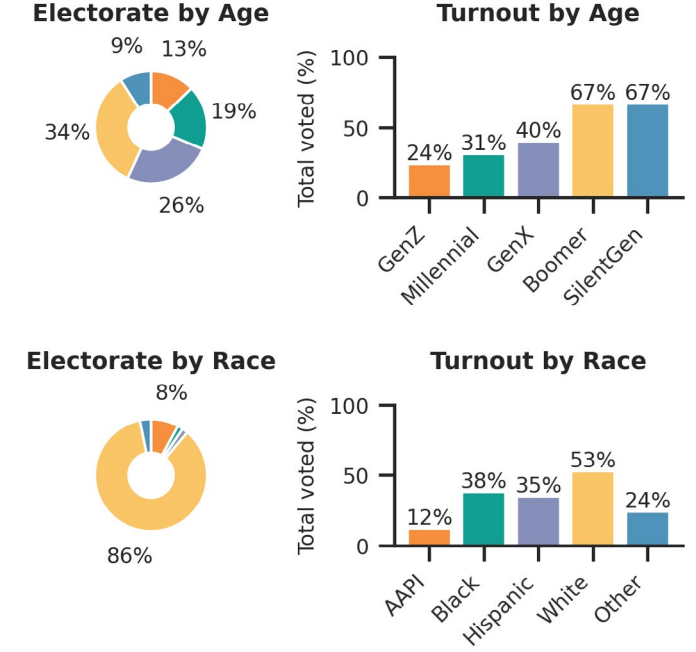

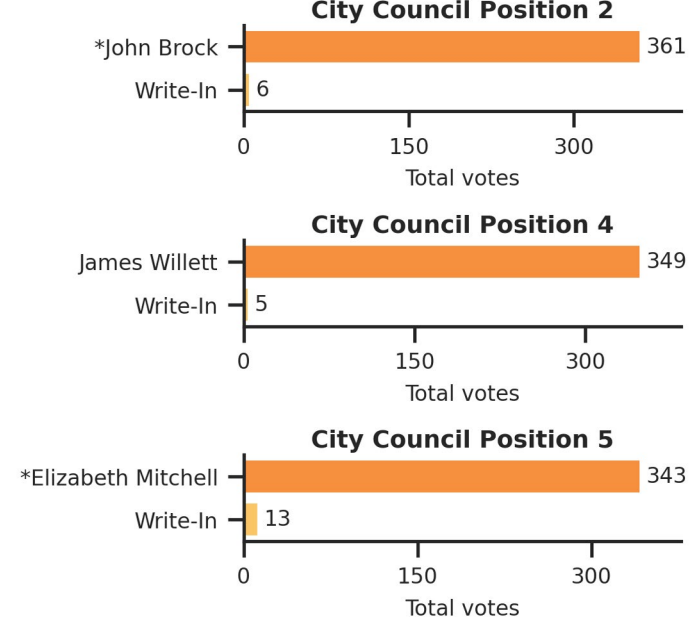

**Fig 2** Election results in Woodway for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



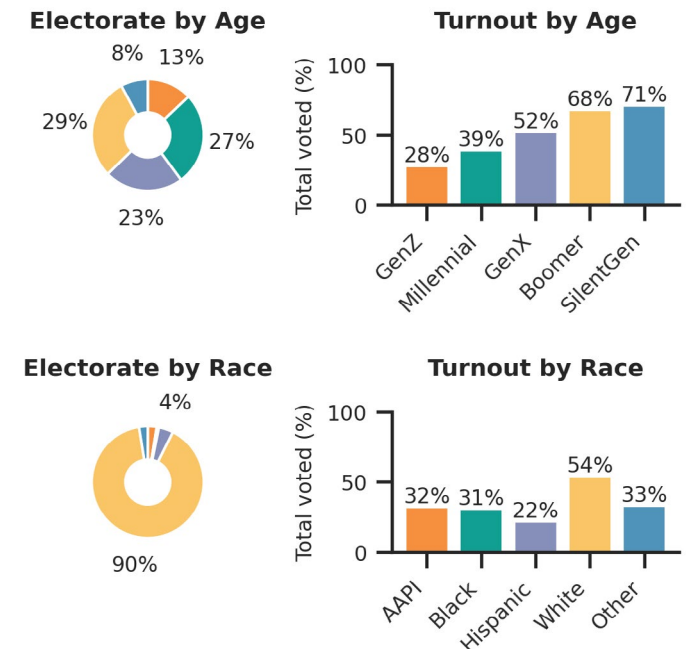

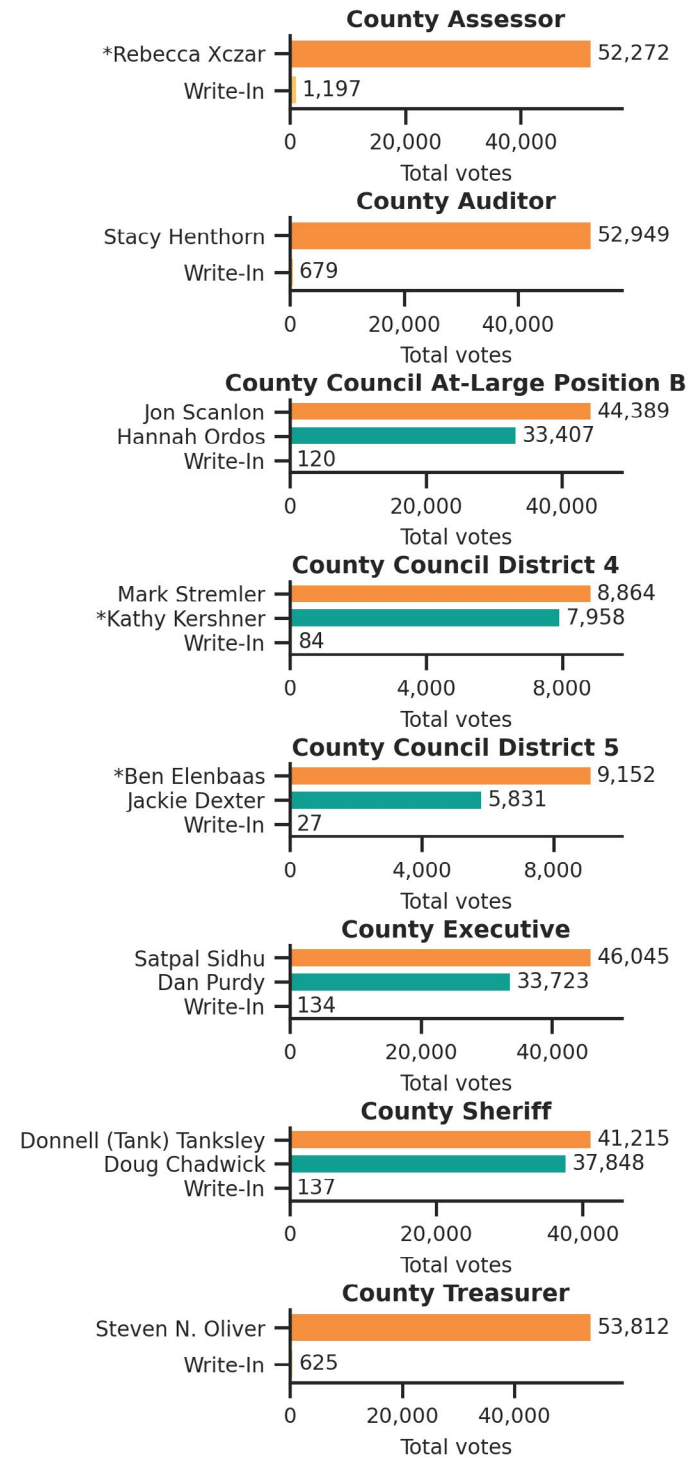


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Whatcom County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

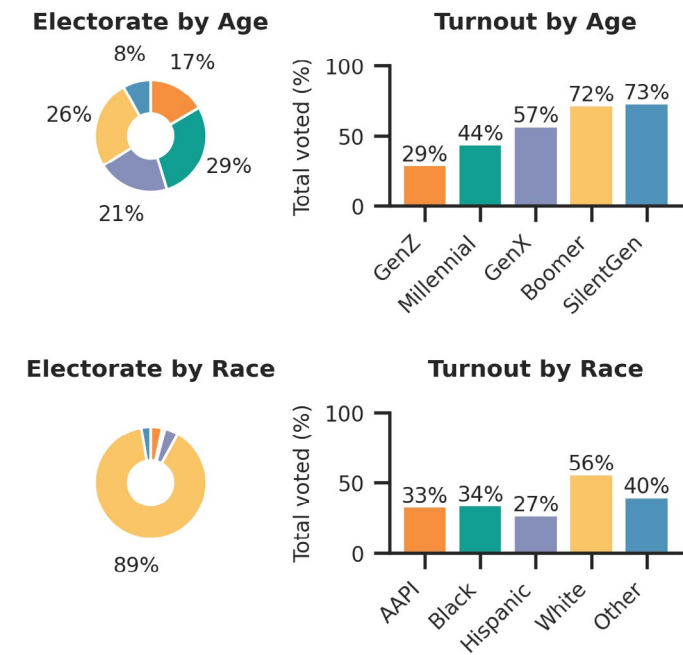


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bellingham for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

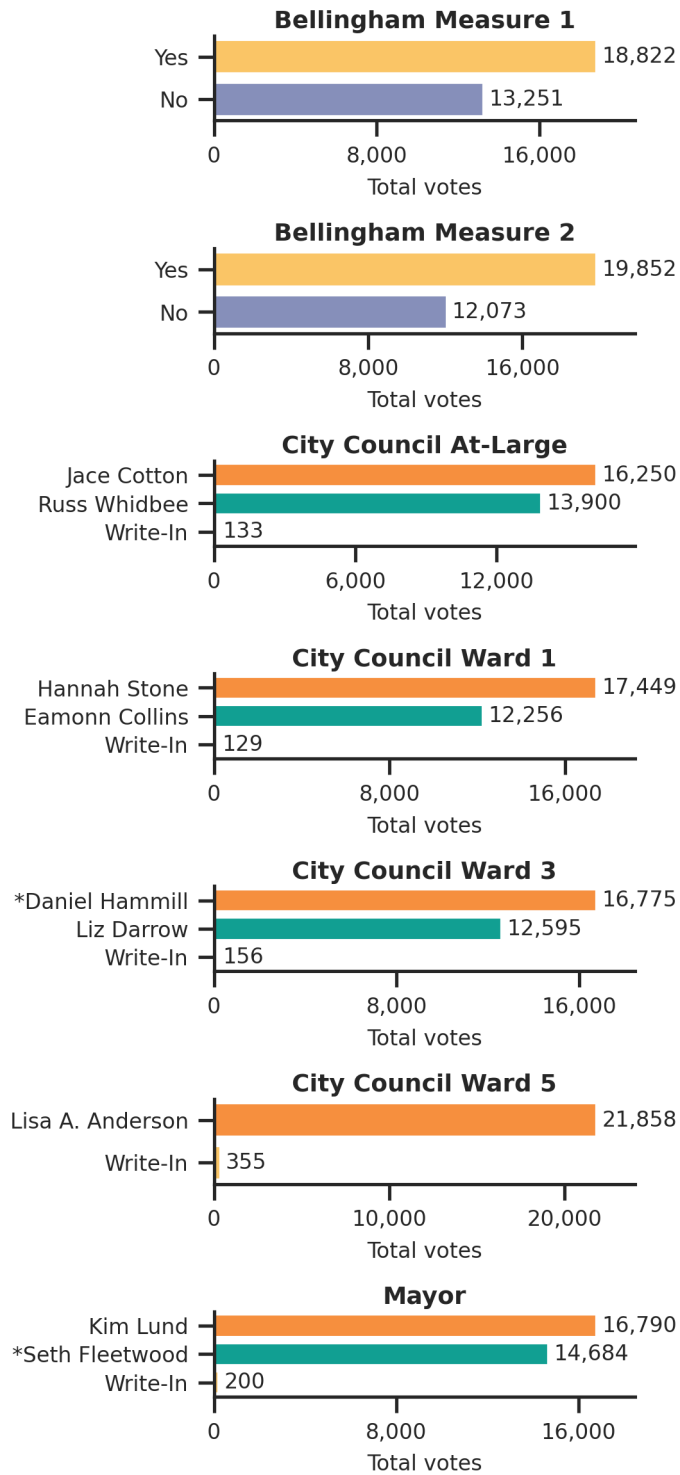


Fig 2 Election results in Bellingham for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

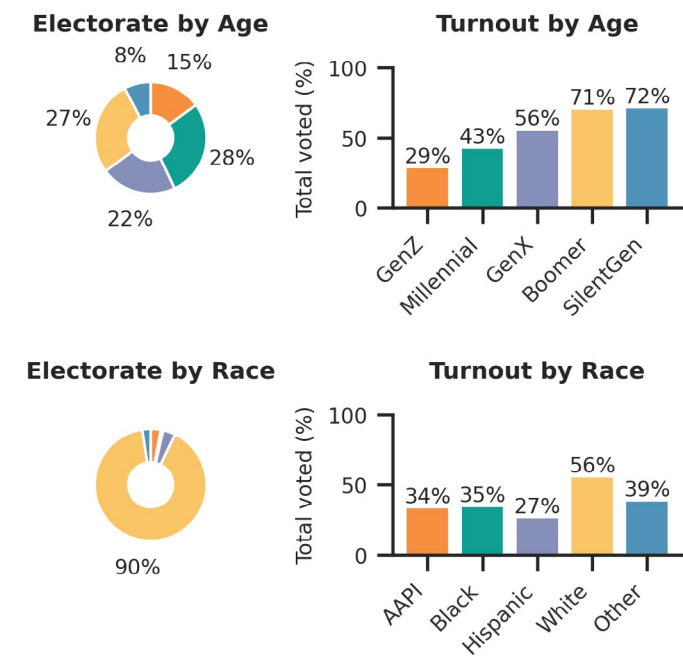


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bellingham School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

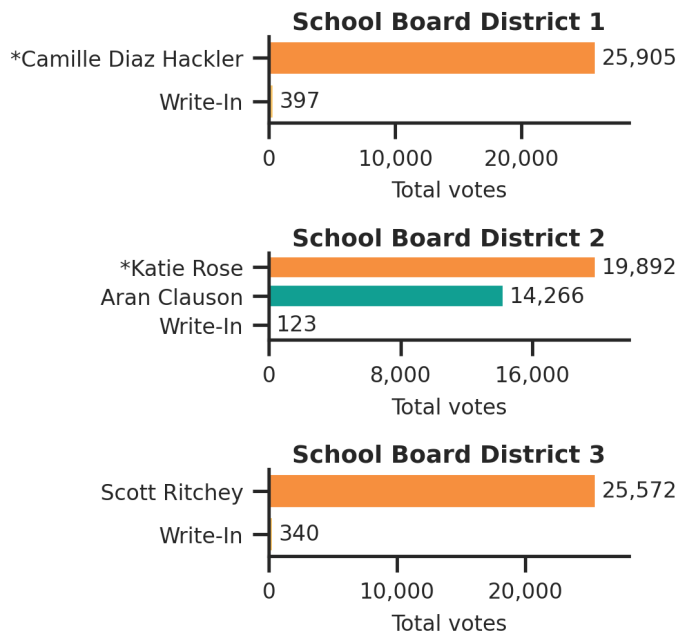


Fig 2 Election results in Bellingham School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

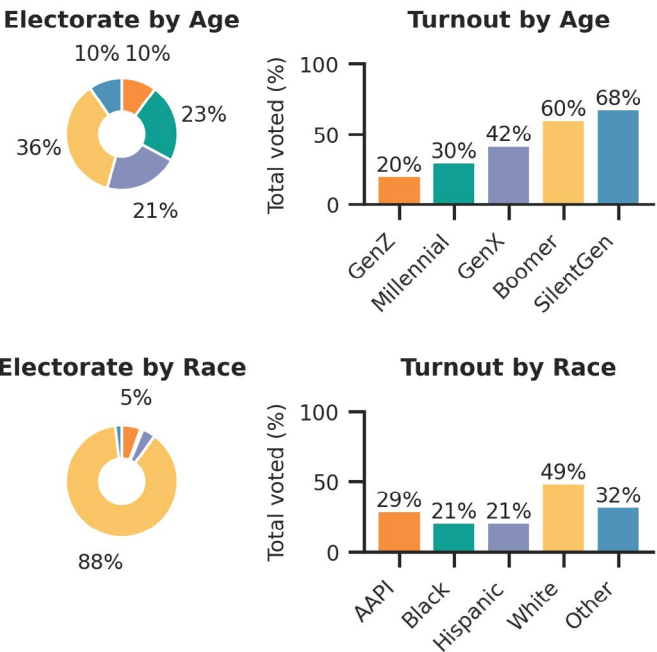


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Blaine for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

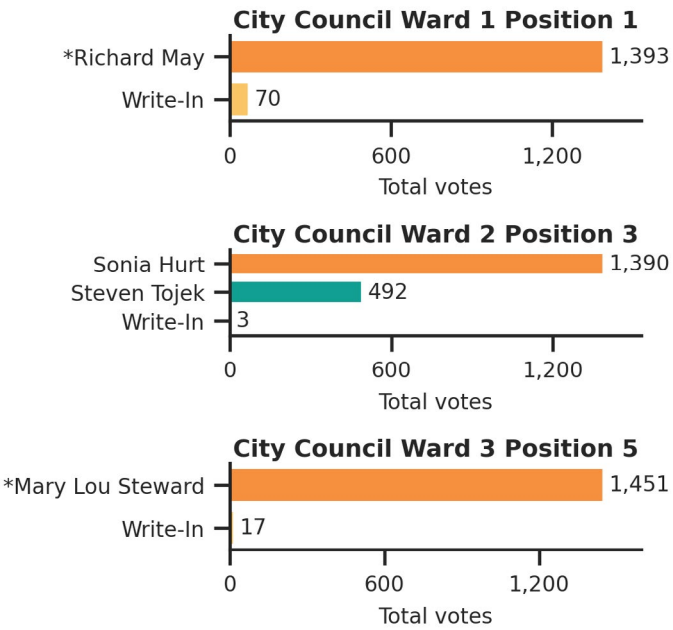


Fig 2 Election results in Blaine for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

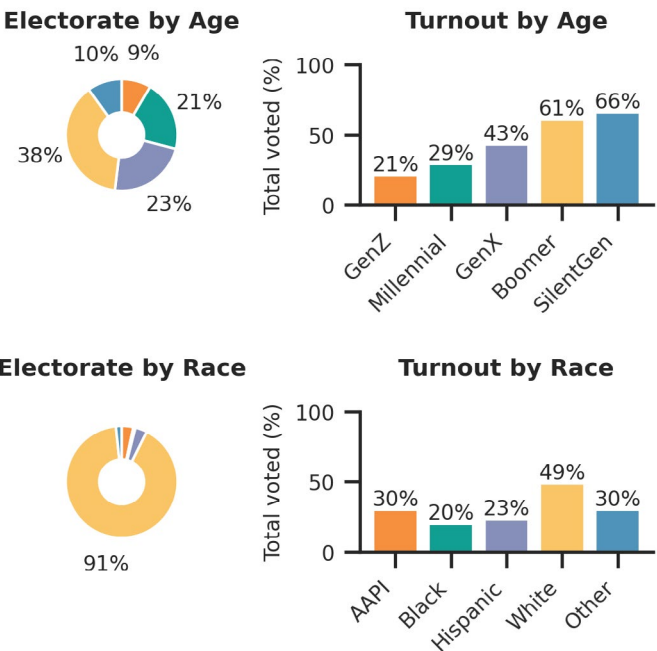


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Blaine School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

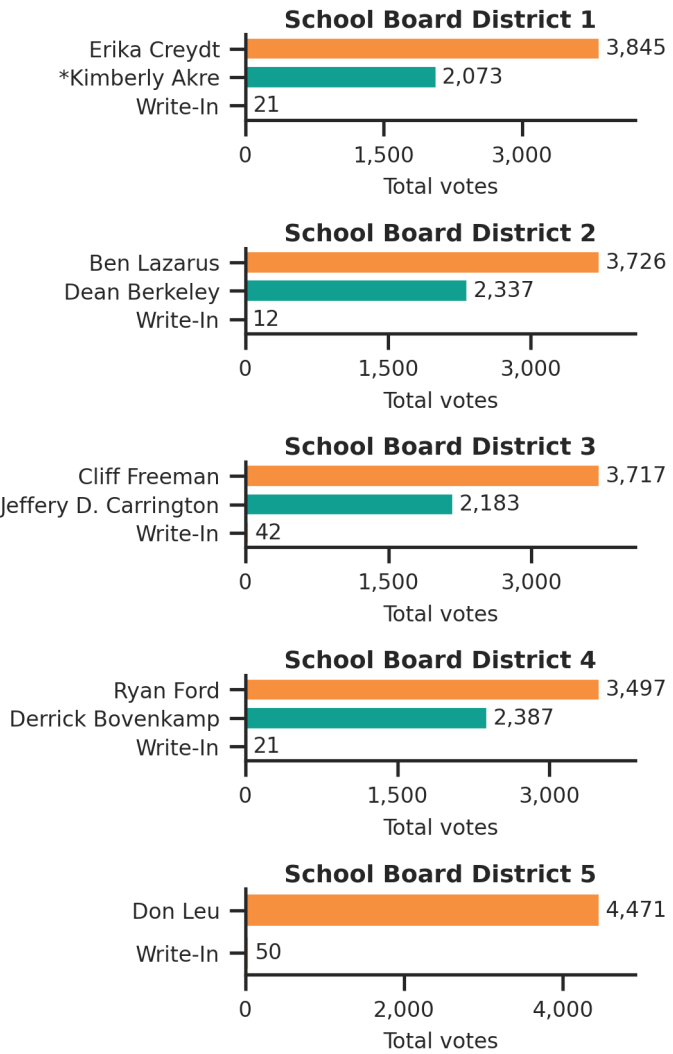


Fig 2 Election results in Blaine School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

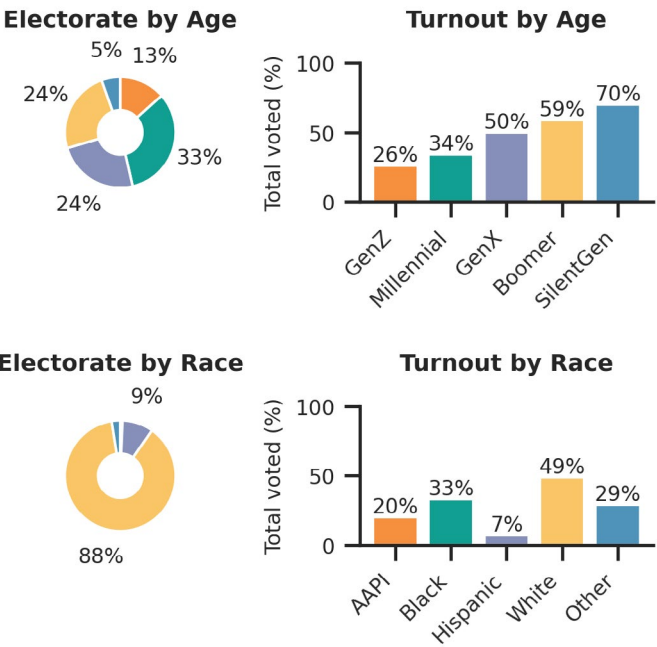


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Everson for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

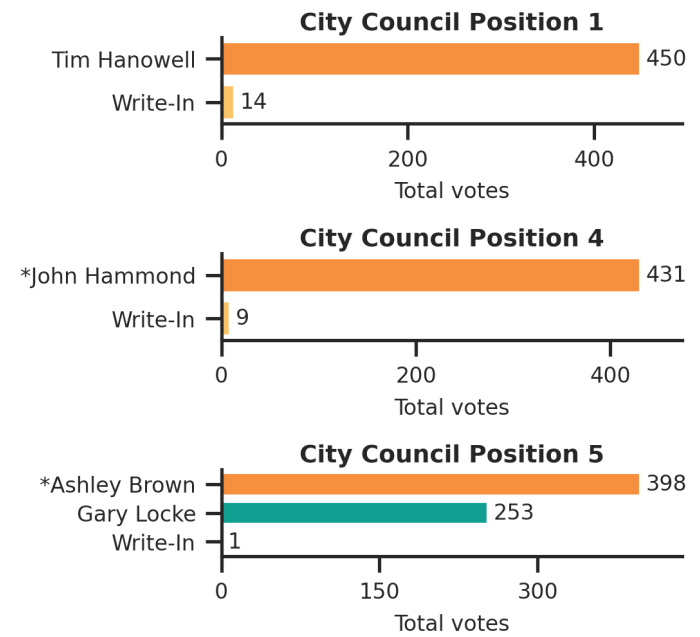


Fig 2 Election results in Everson for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

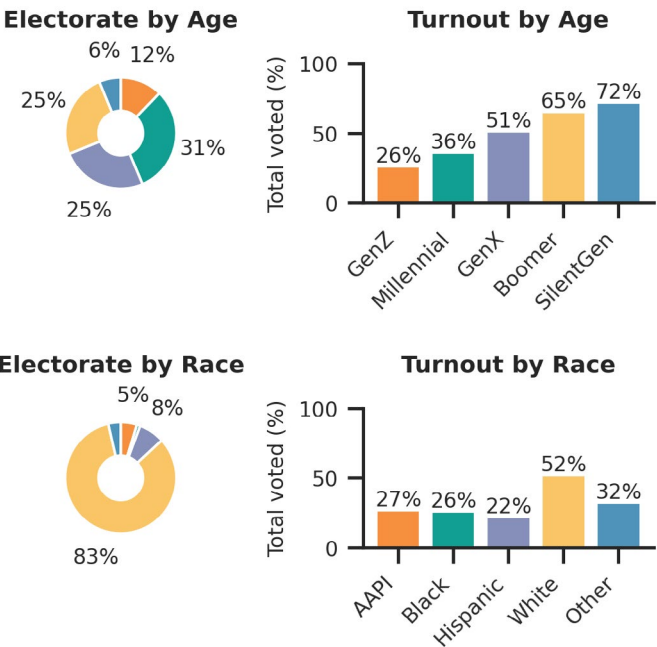


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ferndale for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

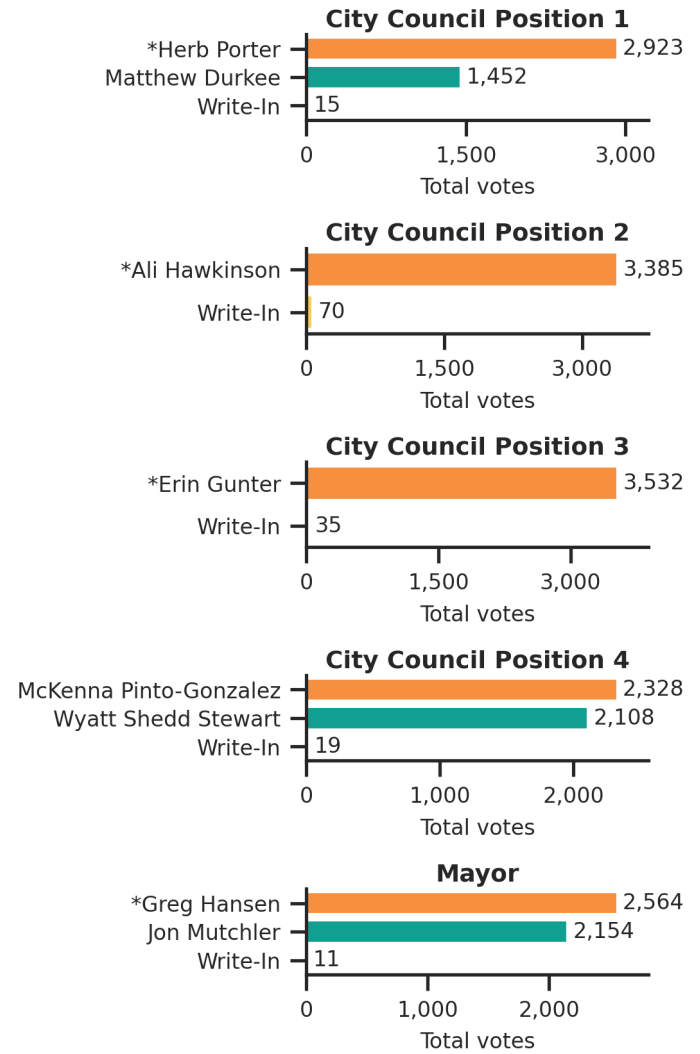
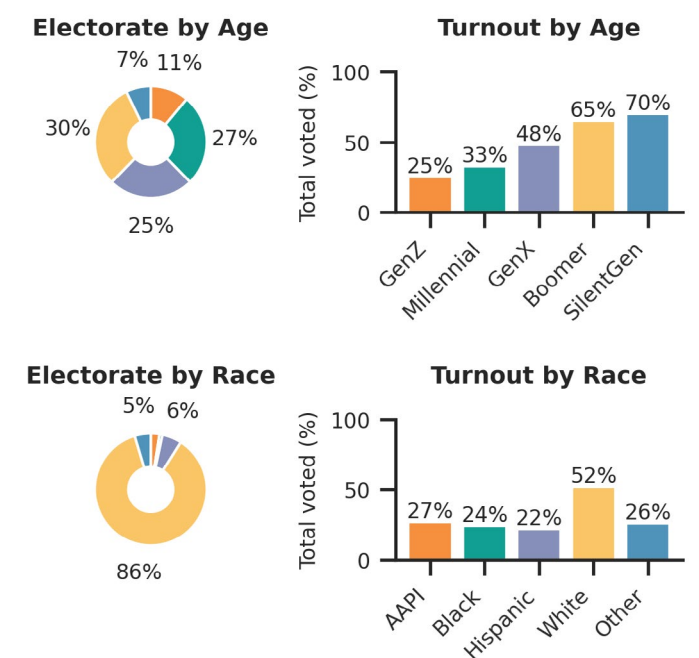


Fig 2 Election results in Ferndale for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

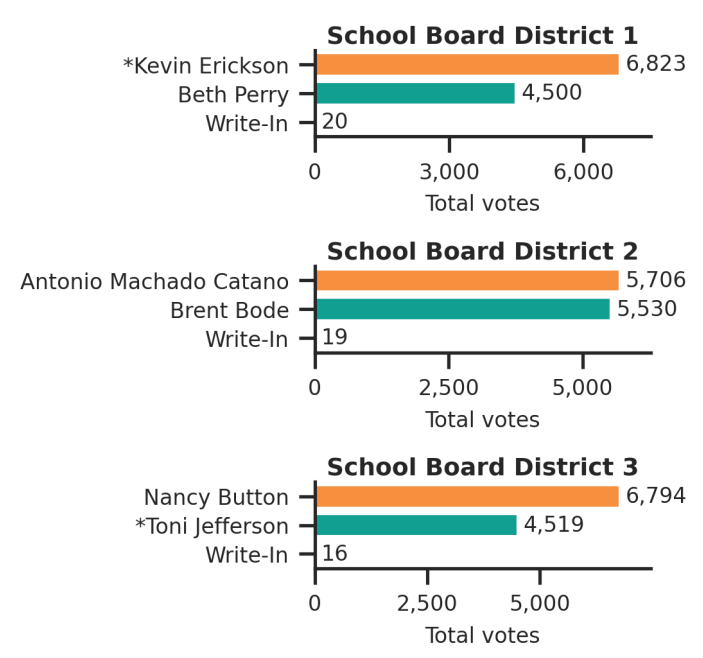

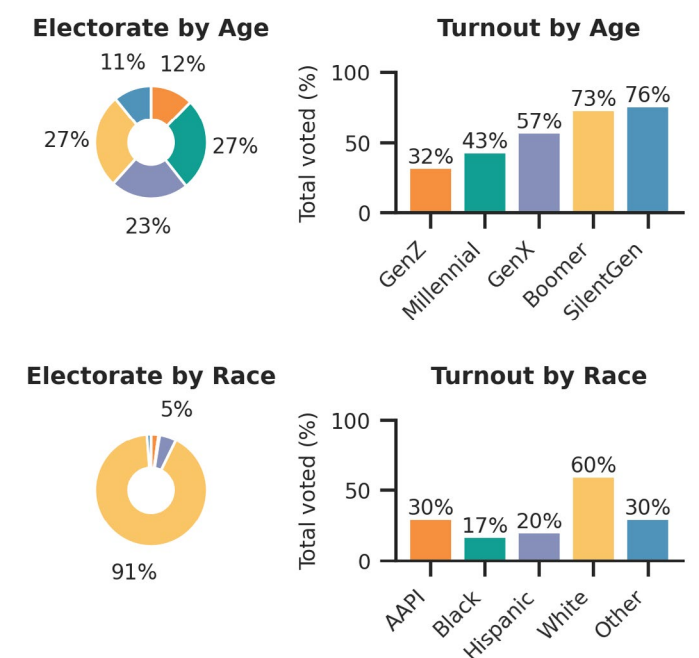

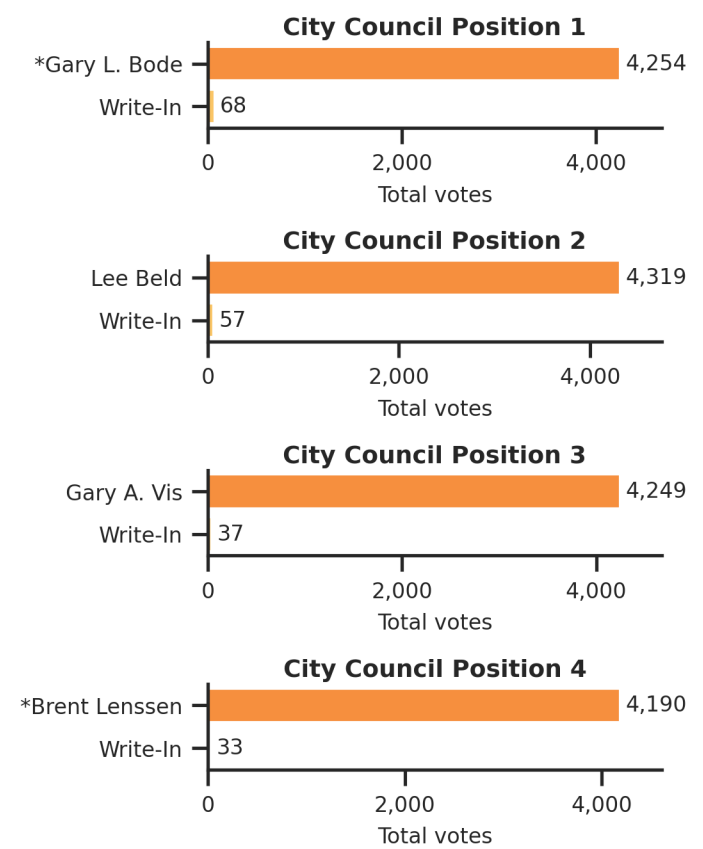

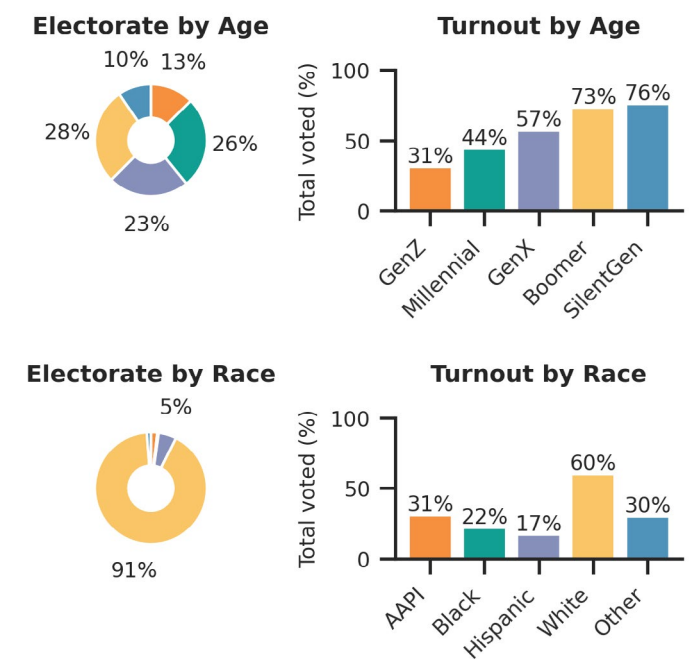
**Fig 2** Election results in Lynden for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

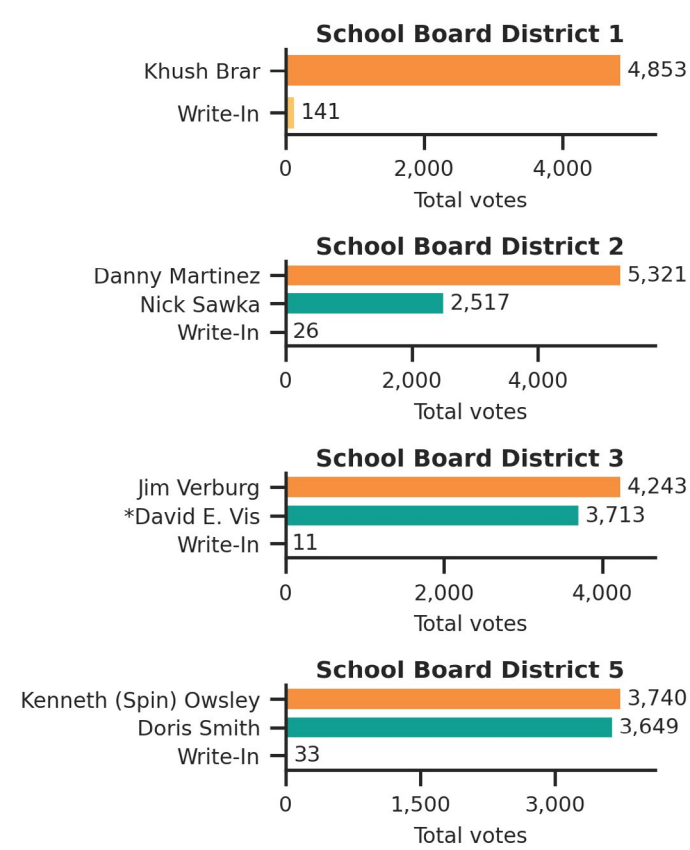

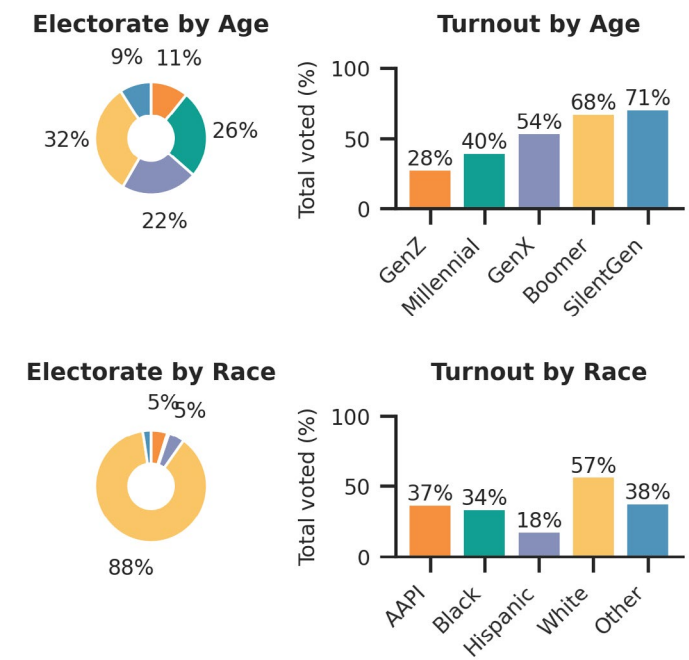


**Fig 2** Election results in Lynden School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

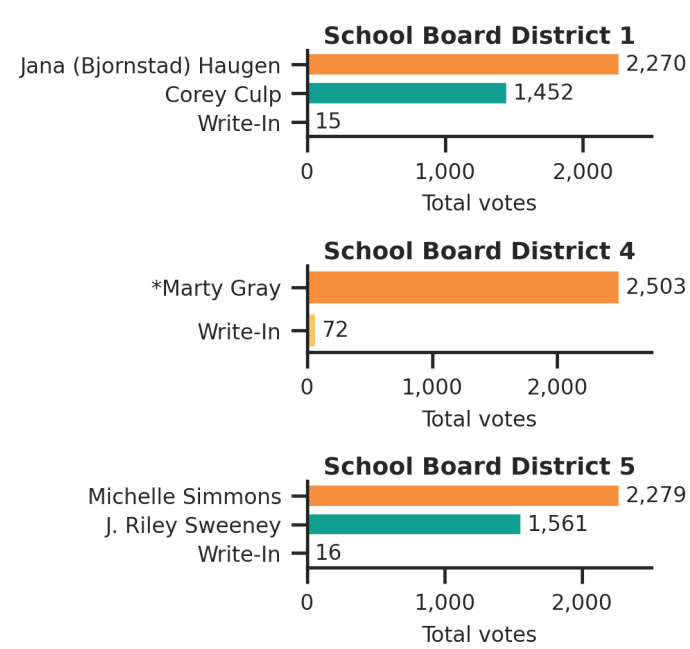

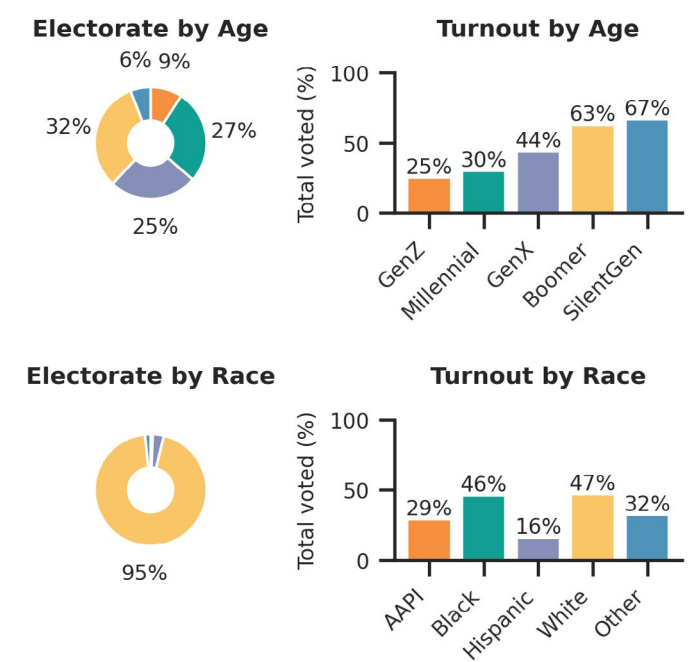

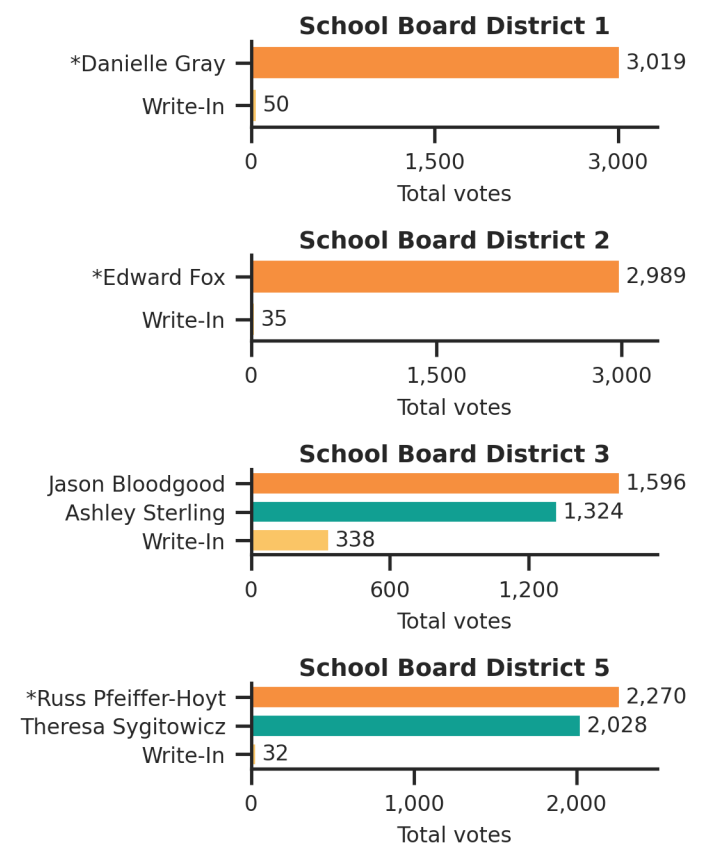

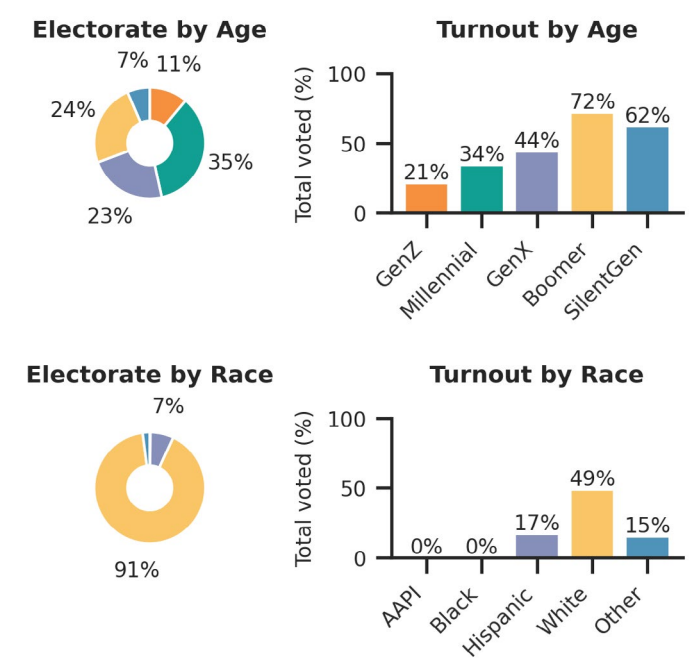

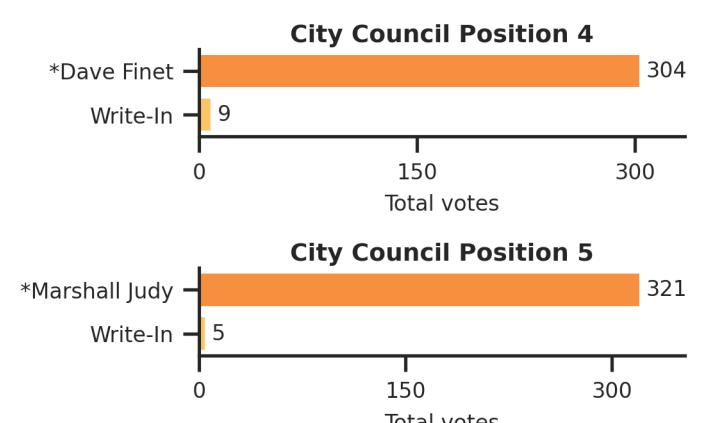

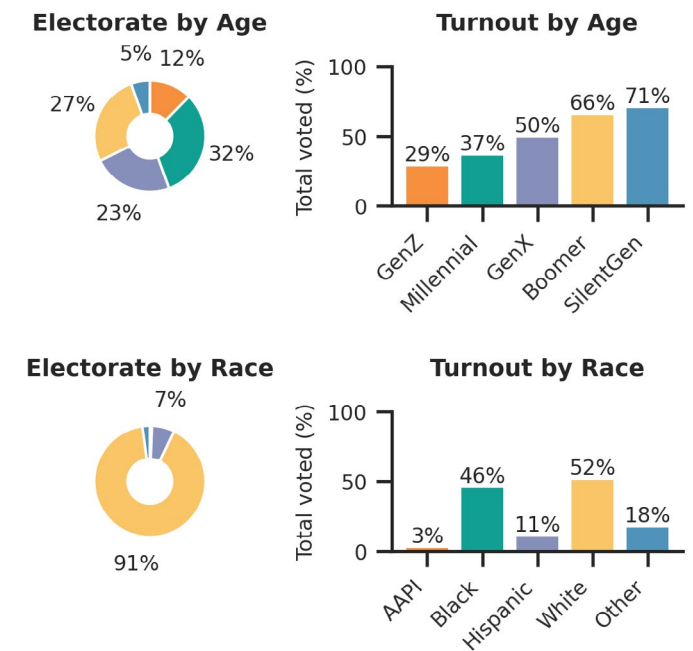


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Nooksack Valley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

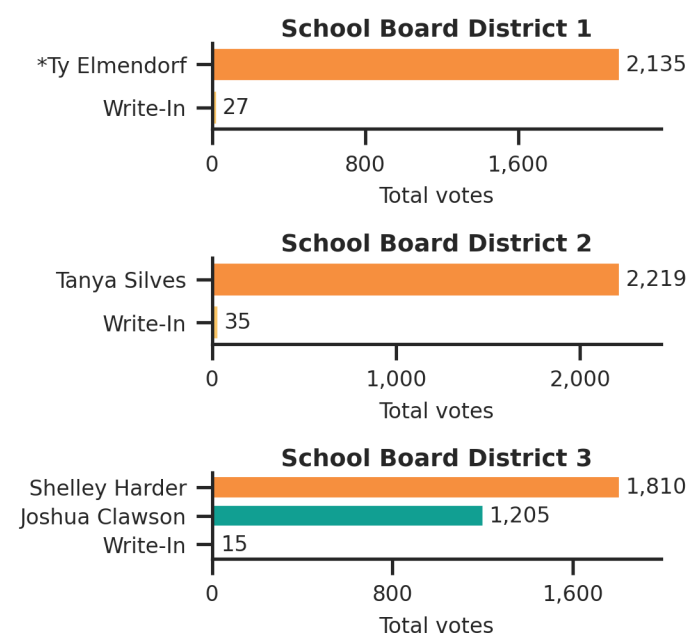


Fig 2 Election results in Nooksack Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

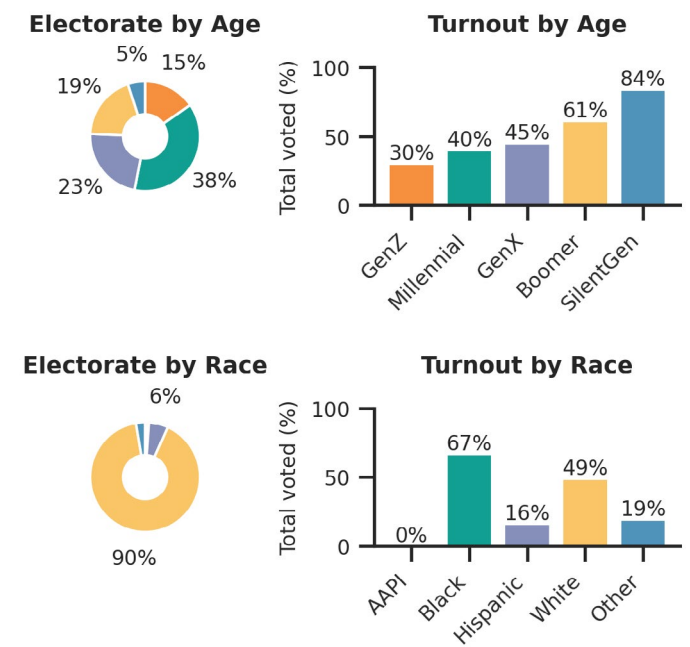


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sumas for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

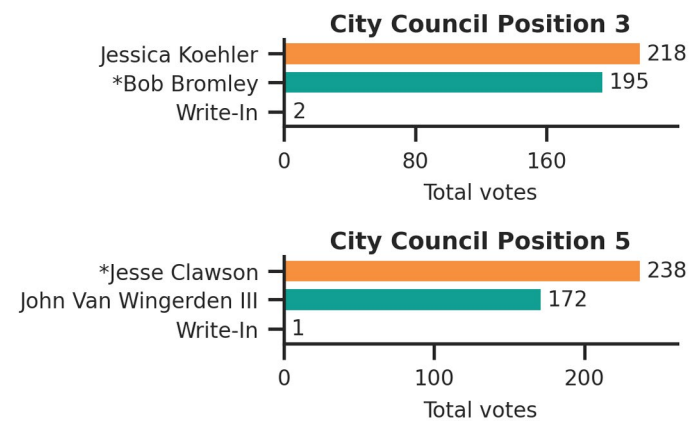
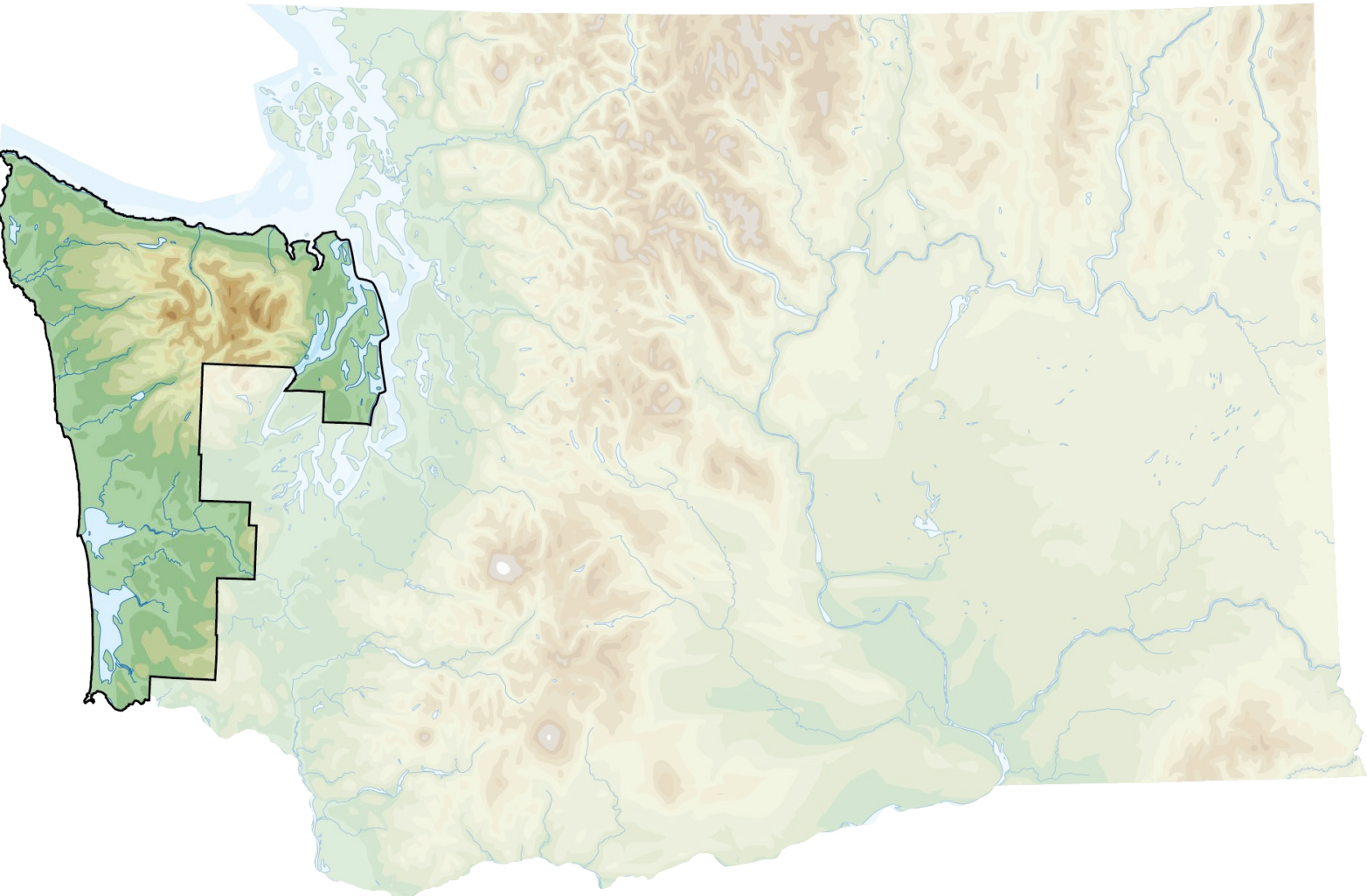


Fig 2 Election results in Sumas for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

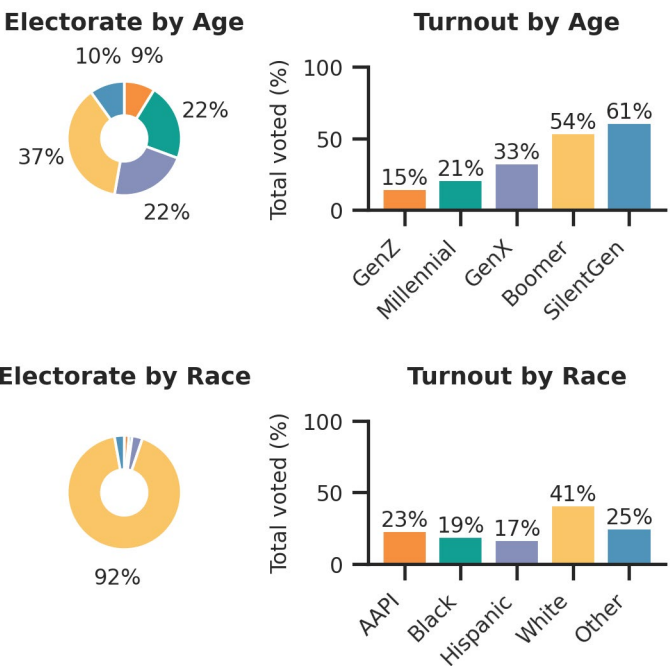

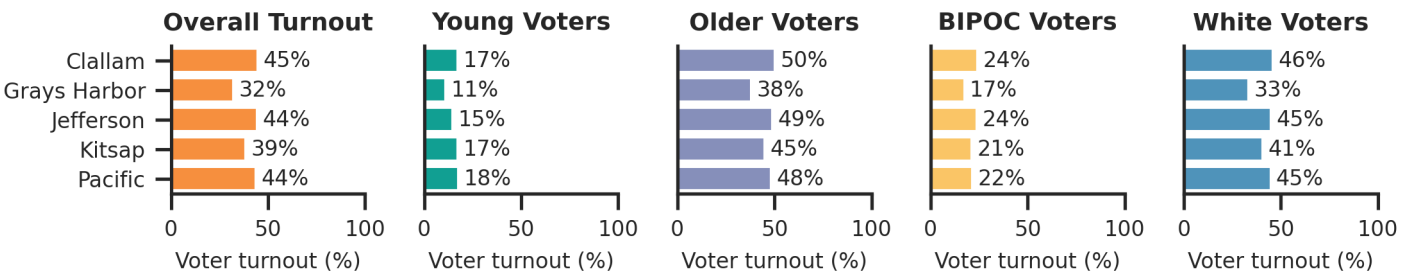
## Voter turnout & outreach

There are 304,604 registered voters in Coastal Washington, including 7,249 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 39.5% – the third highest in the state. Across Coastal Washington, voter turnout was highest in Clallam County (44.8%), Jefferson County (44.3%), and Pacific County (43.6%), and lowest in Grays Harbor County (32.3%) and Kitsap County (38.6%).

Young voters make up 20.5% of the electorate in Coastal Washington (62,406 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.4% lower than older voters (16.2% vs 45.6%). The electorate in Coastal Washington is the least racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for just 8.0% of all registered voters, and turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 19.9% lower than White voters (21.2% vs 41.1%). From mid-August to mid-November, four WCA Data Hub partners were active in Coastal Washington, making a total of 9,813 contact attempts to 7,853 unique voters (~0.03 attempts per voter). This included 1,558 door knocks, 710 phone calls, 4,221 text messages, and 3,324 mailers.

**Fig 2** Voter turnout by county in Coastal Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

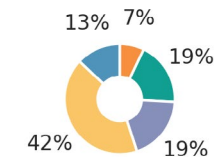

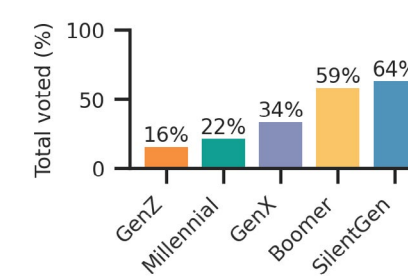

Electorate by Age



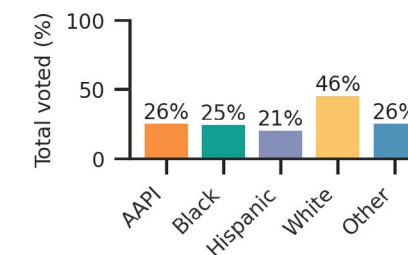
Turnout by Age

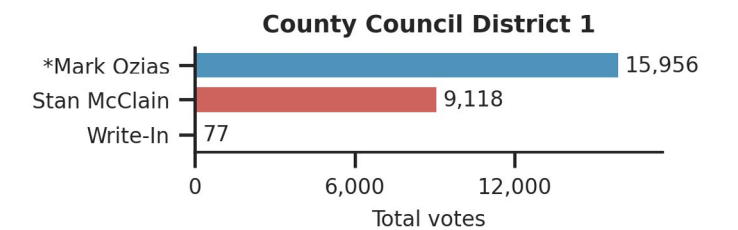

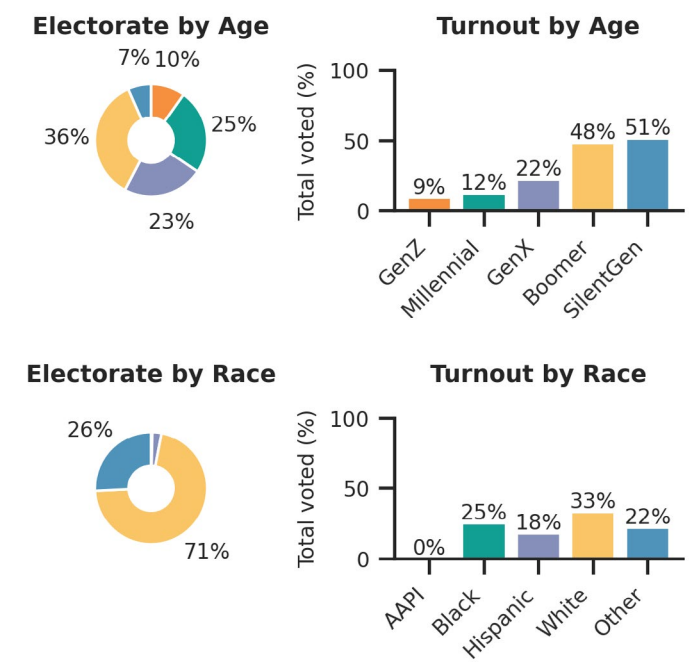


**Fig 2** Election results in Clallam County for the 2023 General Election. Asterisks indicate incumbents.

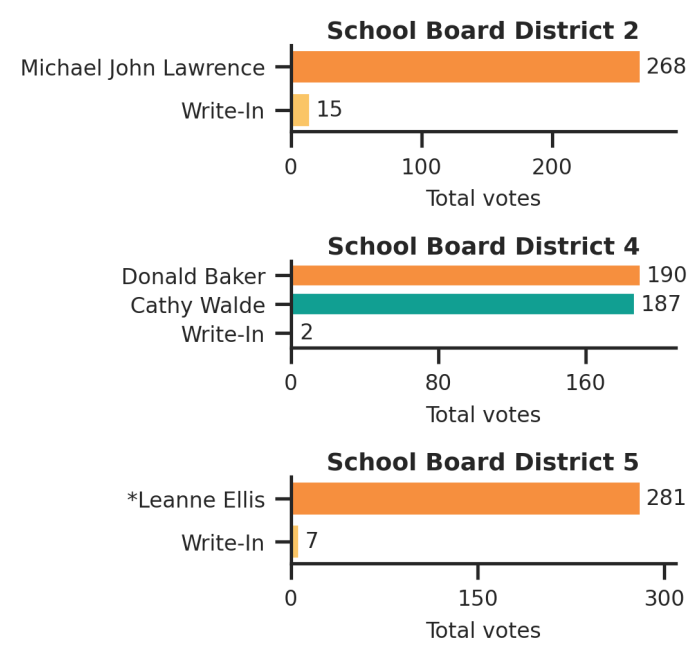

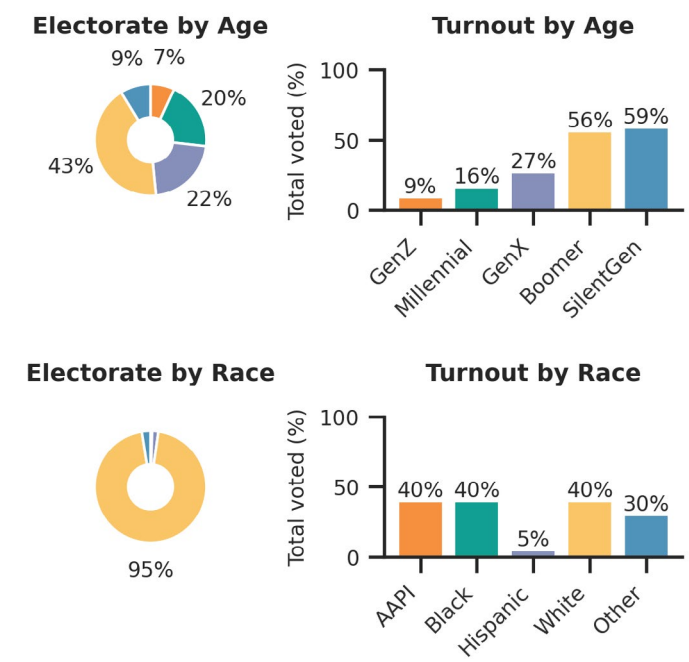


**Fig 2** Election results in Cape Flattery School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

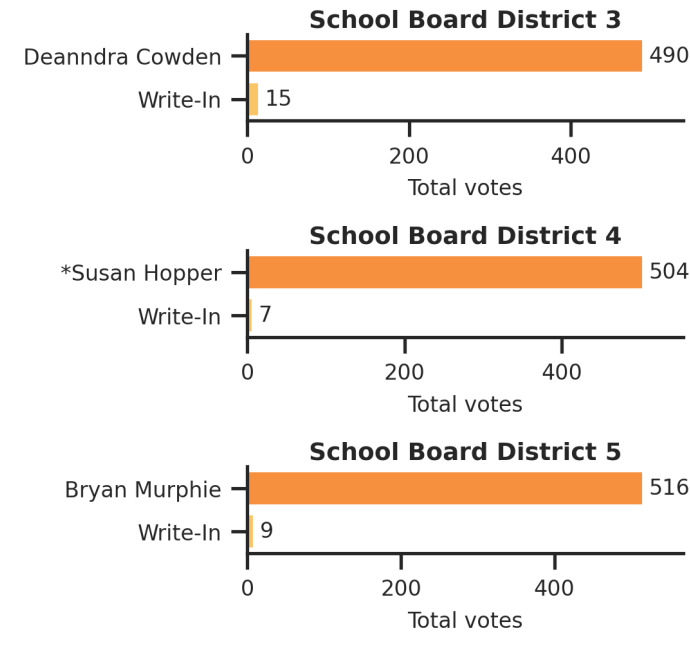

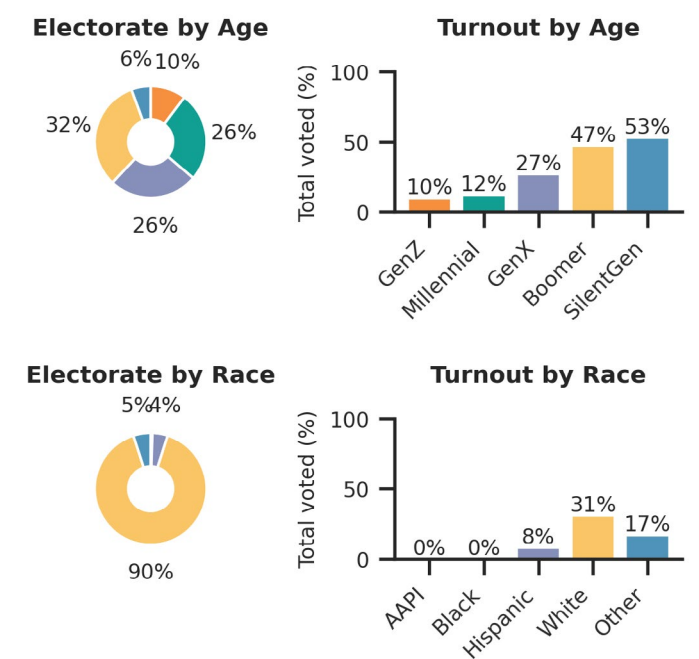


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Forks for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

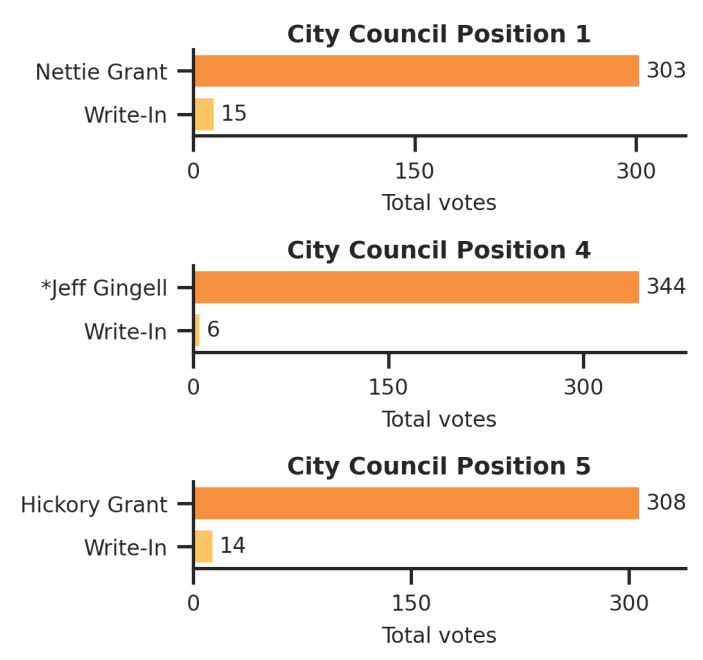


Fig 2 Election results in Forks for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

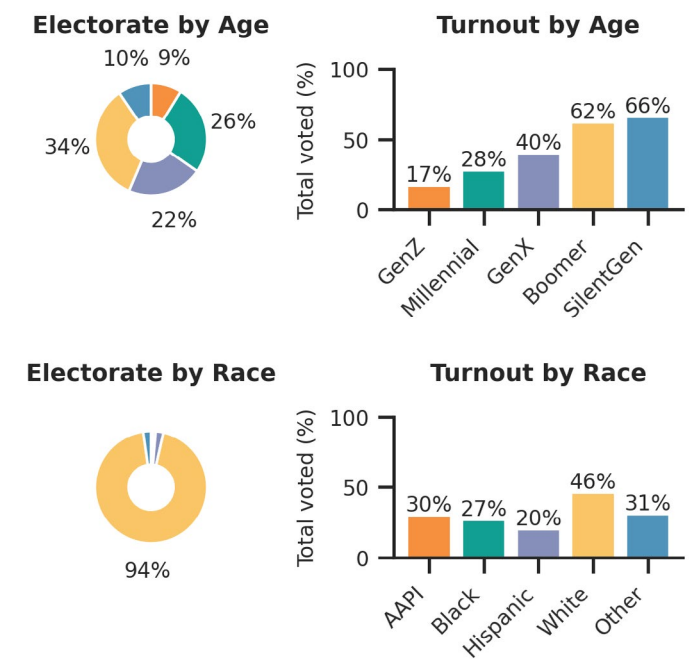


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Port Angeles for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

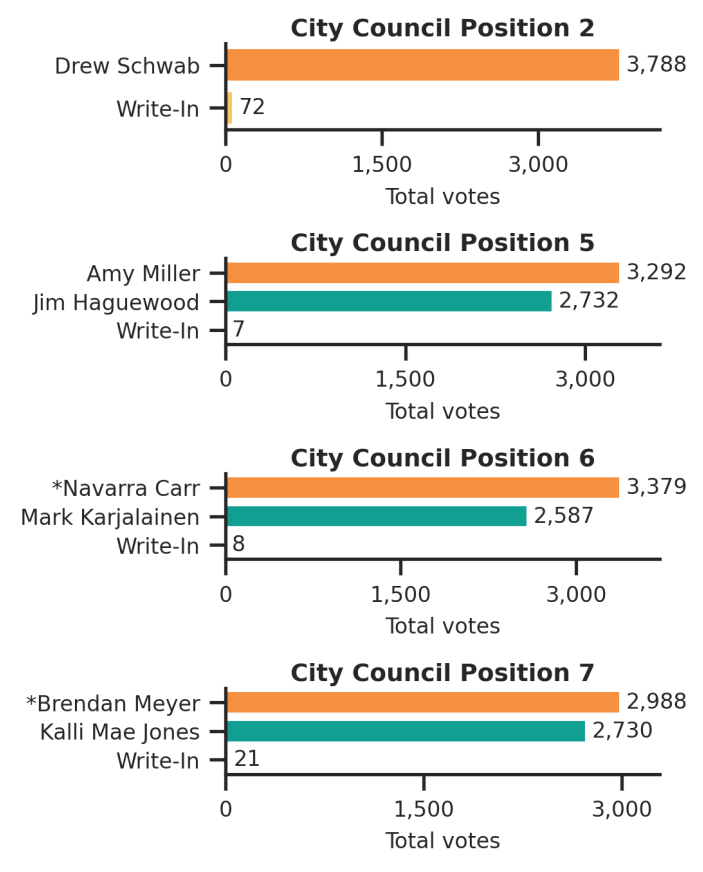


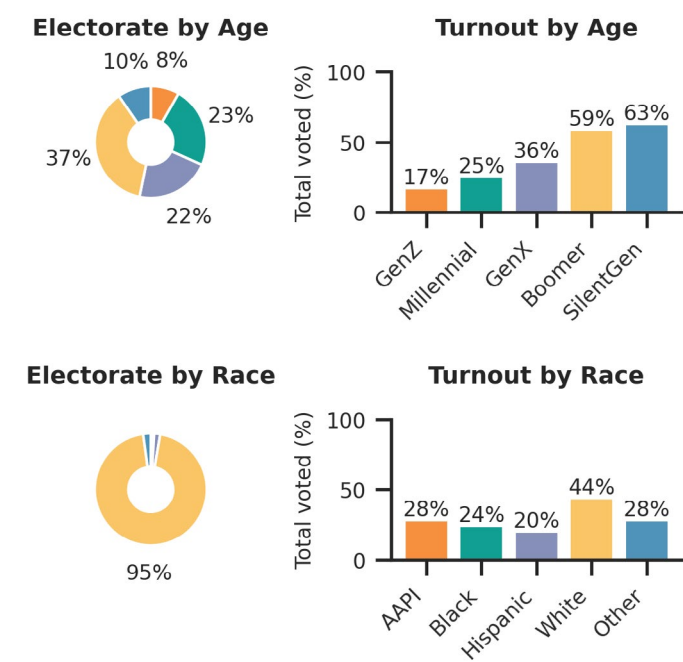
Fig 2 Election results in Port Angeles for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

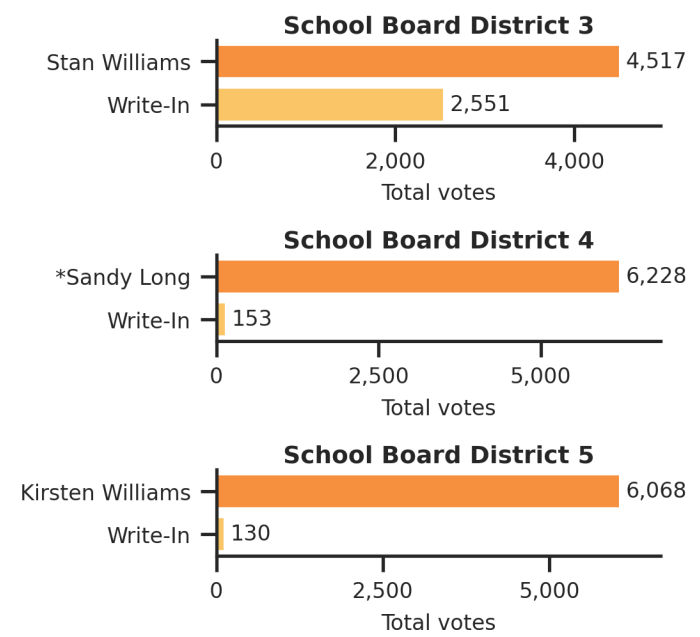

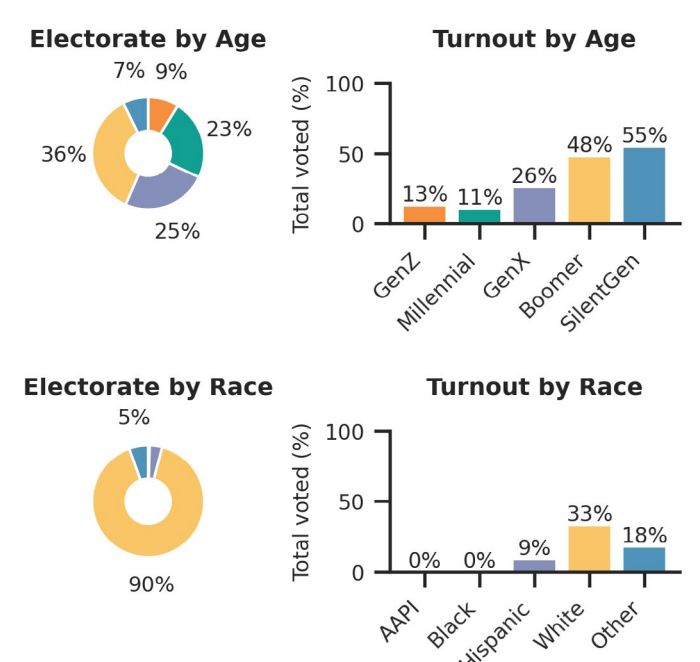


**Fig 2** Election results in Port Angeles School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

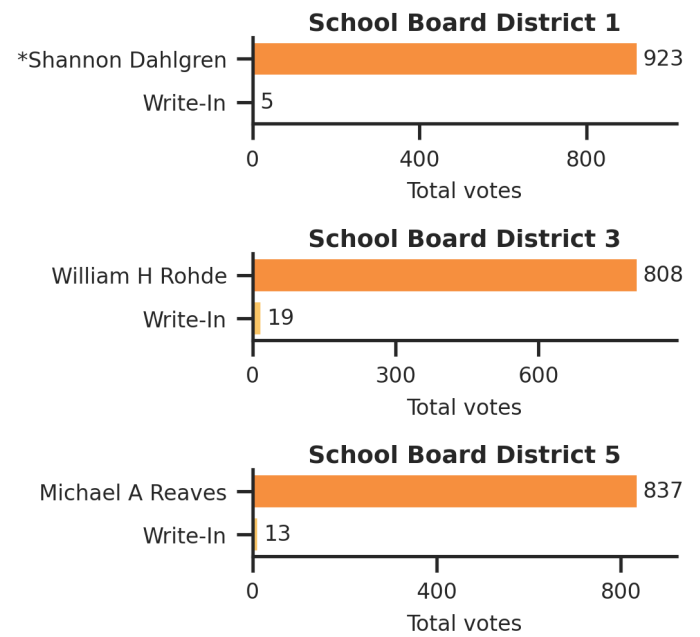

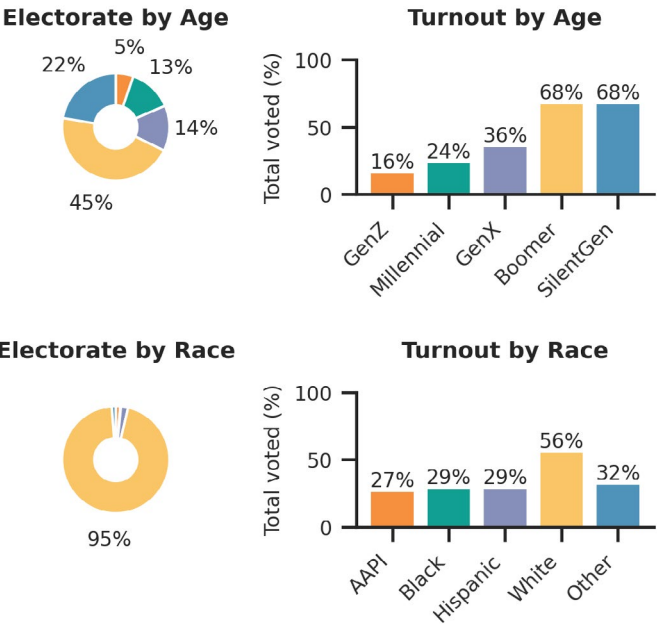


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sequim for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

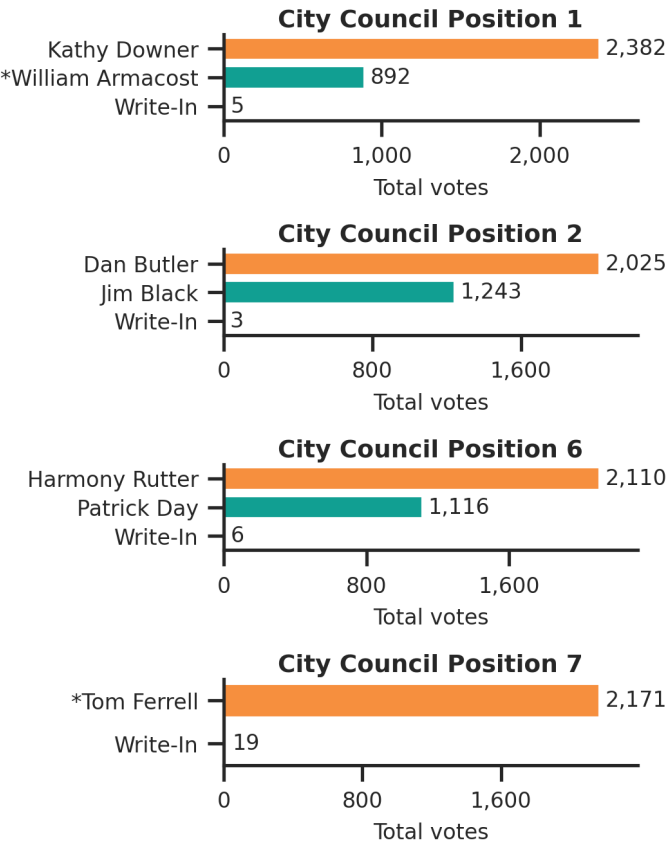


Fig 2 Election results in Sequim for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

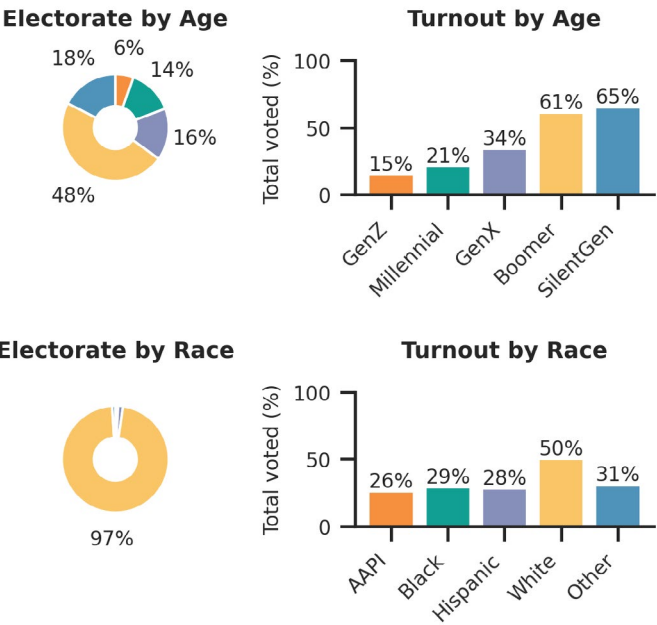


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sequim School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

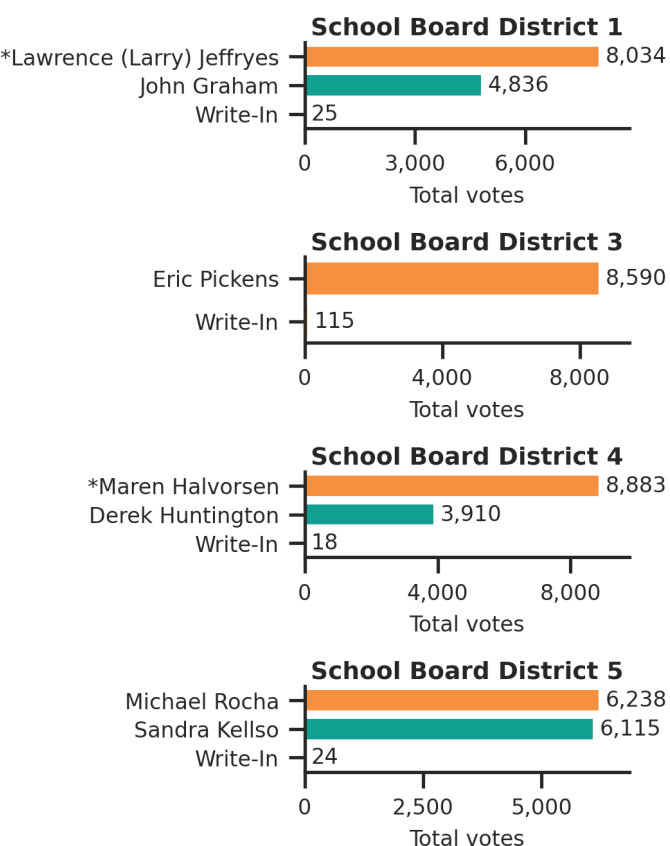
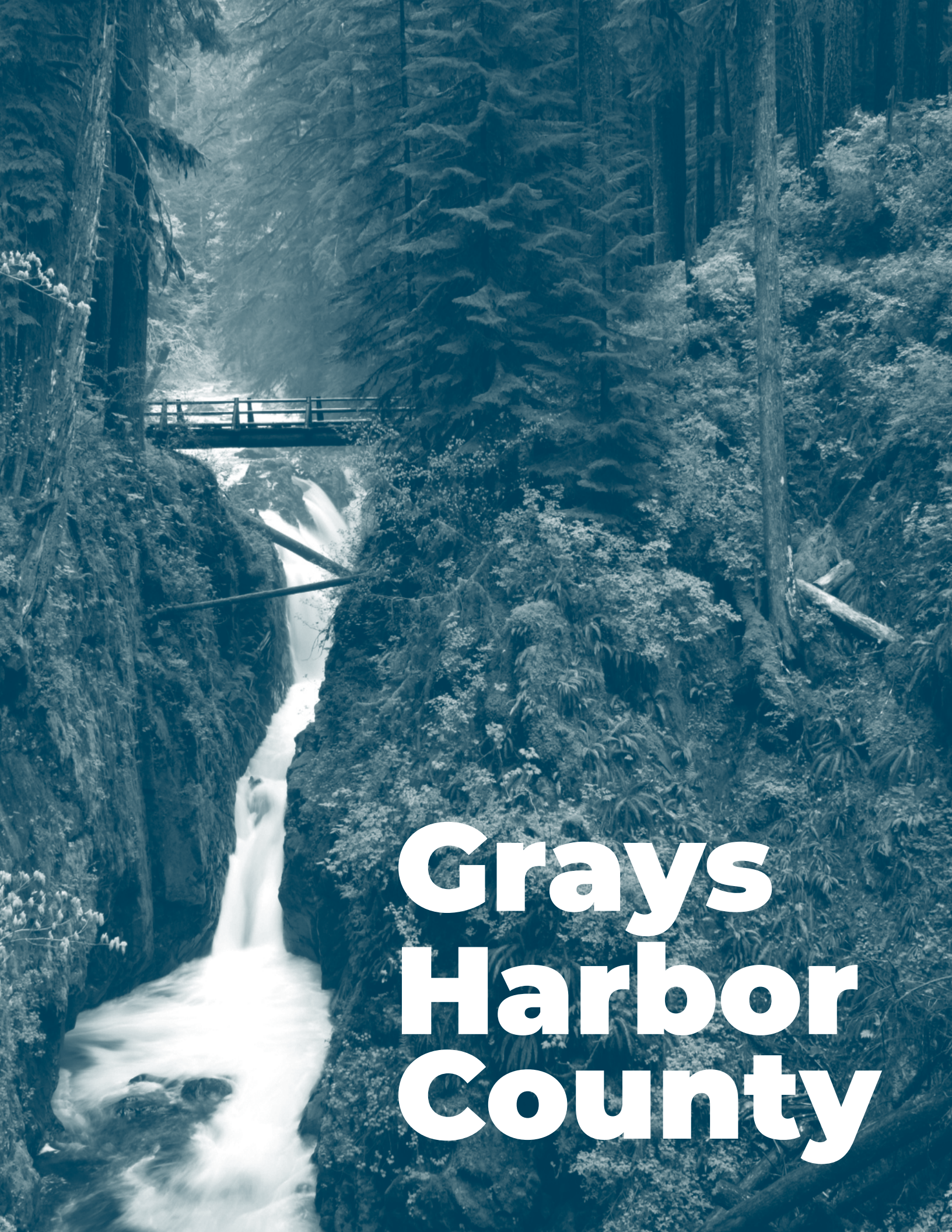


Fig 2 Election results in Sequim School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





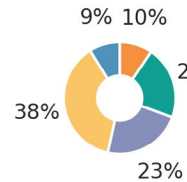

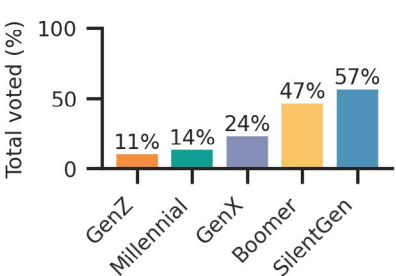

Electorate by Age



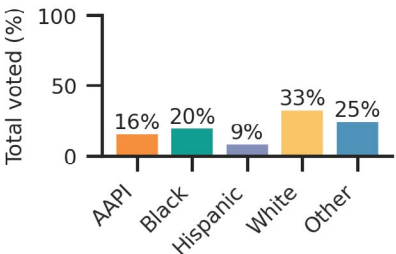

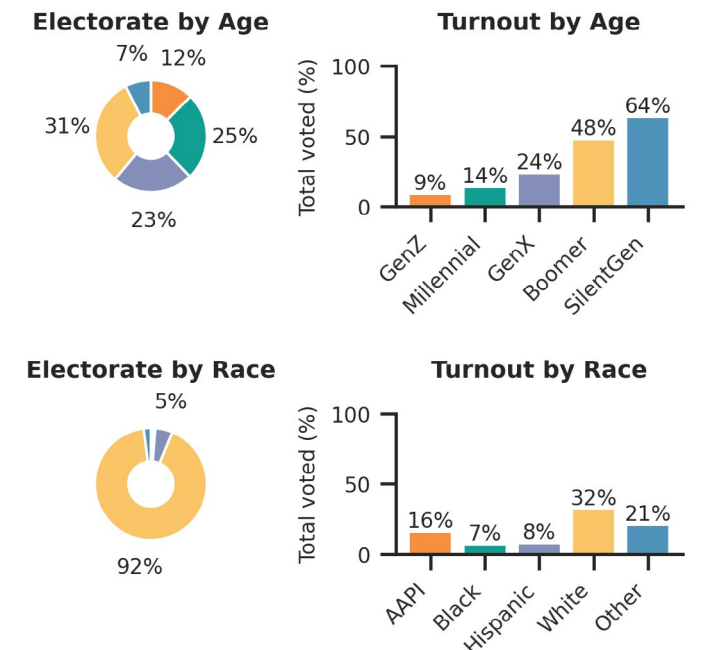


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Aberdeen for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

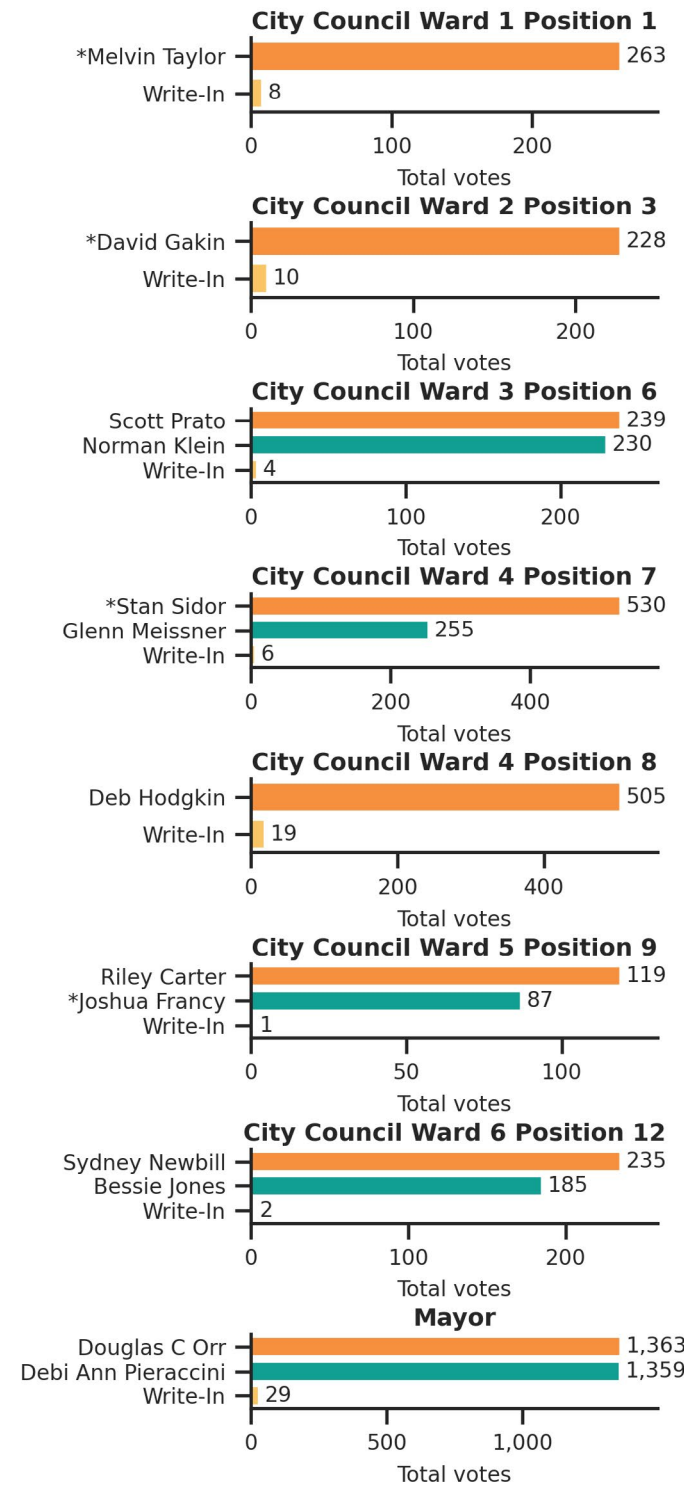


Fig 2 Election results in Aberdeen for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

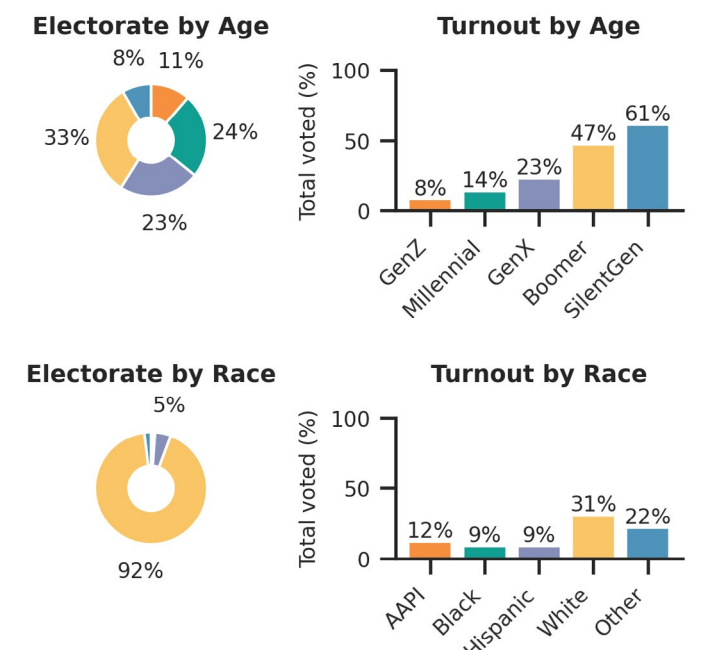


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Aberdeen School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

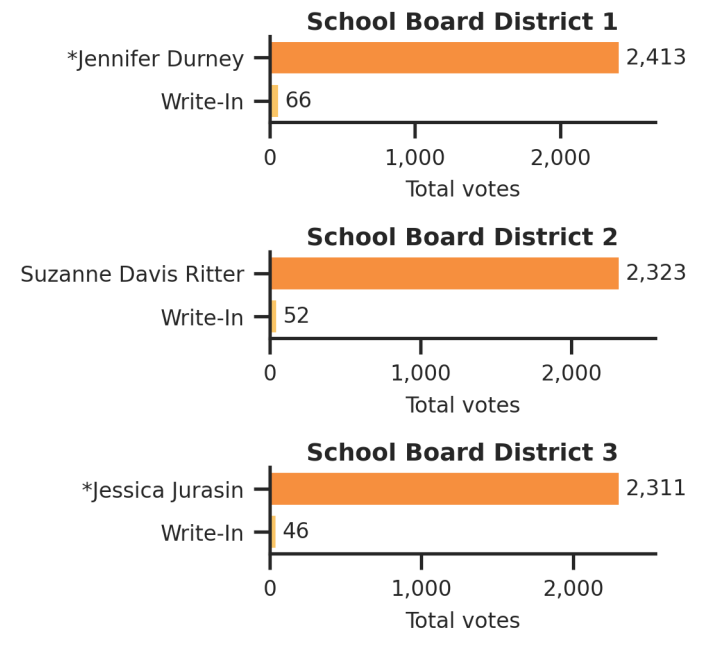


Fig 2 Election results in Aberdeen School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

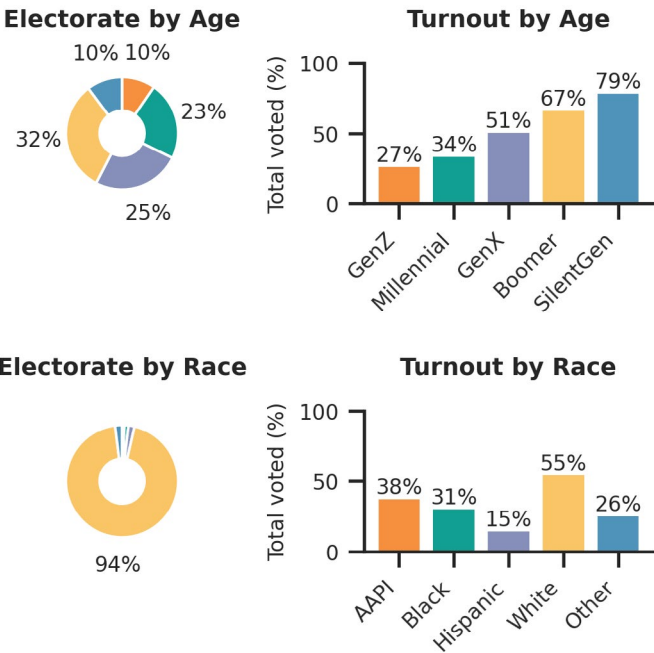


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cosmopolis for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

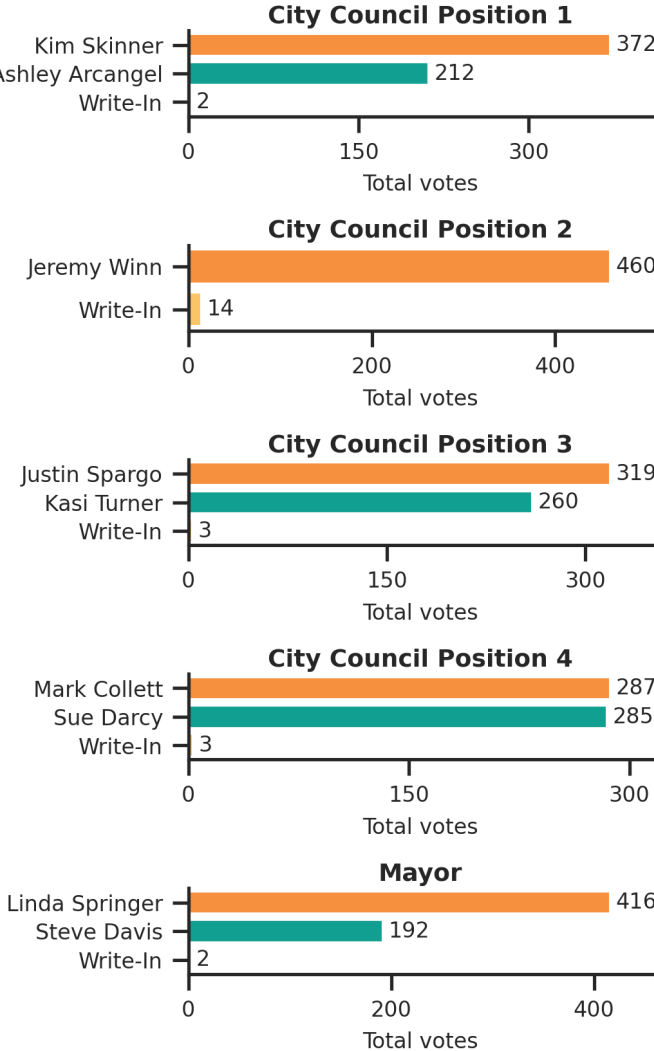


Fig 2 Election results in Comopolis for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

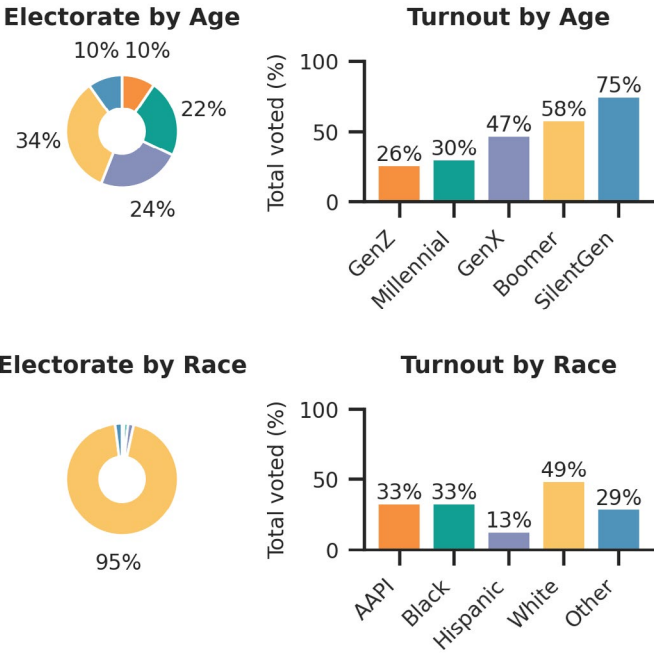


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cosmopolis School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

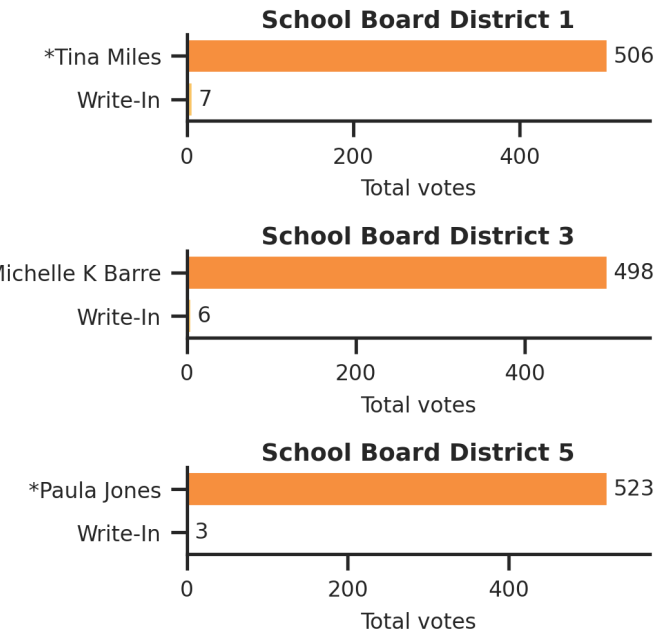


Fig 2 Election results in Cosmopolis School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

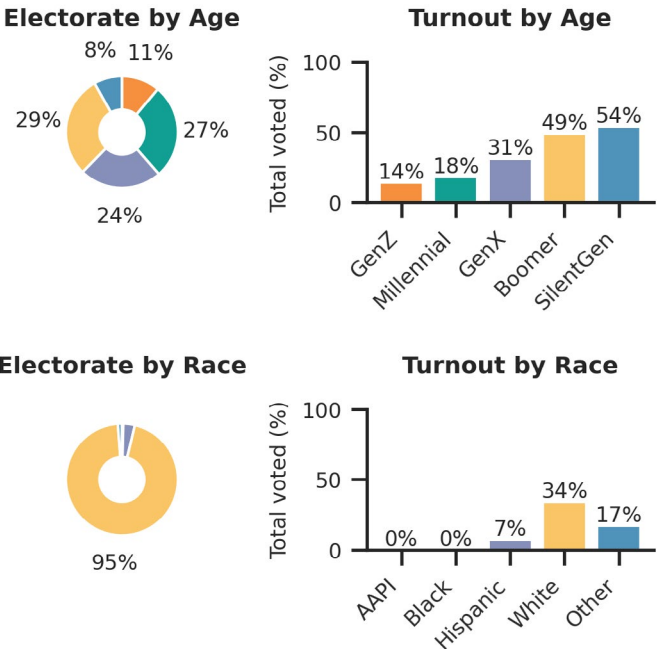


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Elma for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

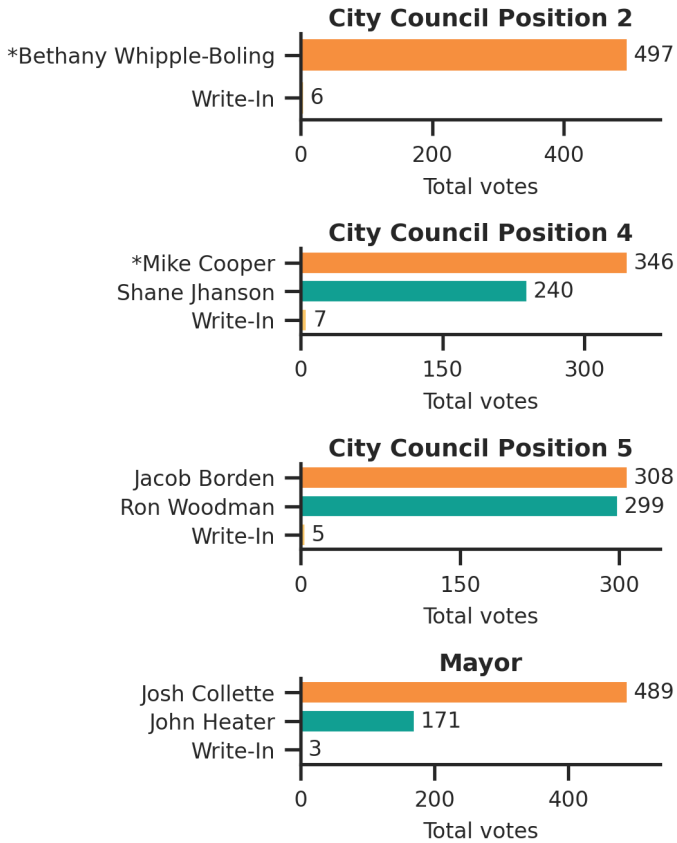


Fig 2 Election results in Elma for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

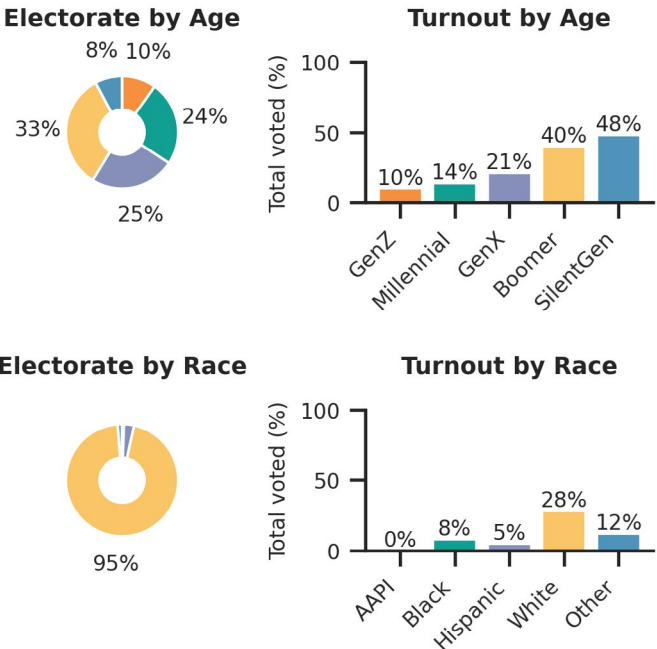


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Elma School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

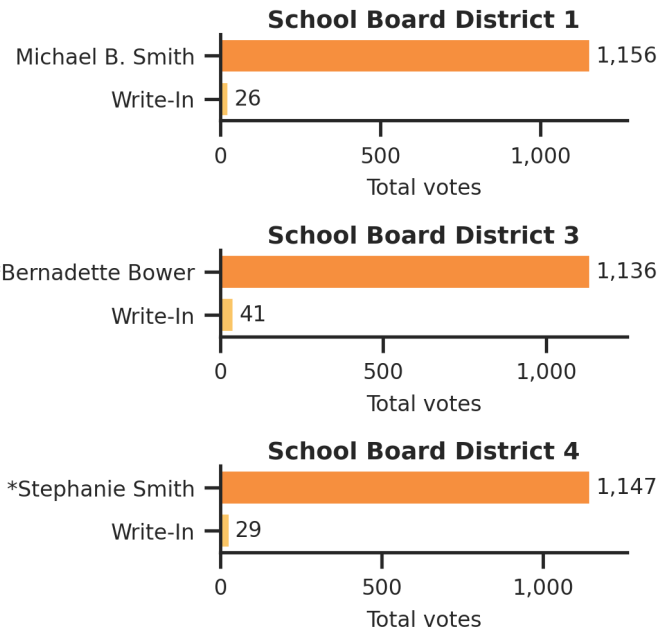


Fig 2 Election results in Elma School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

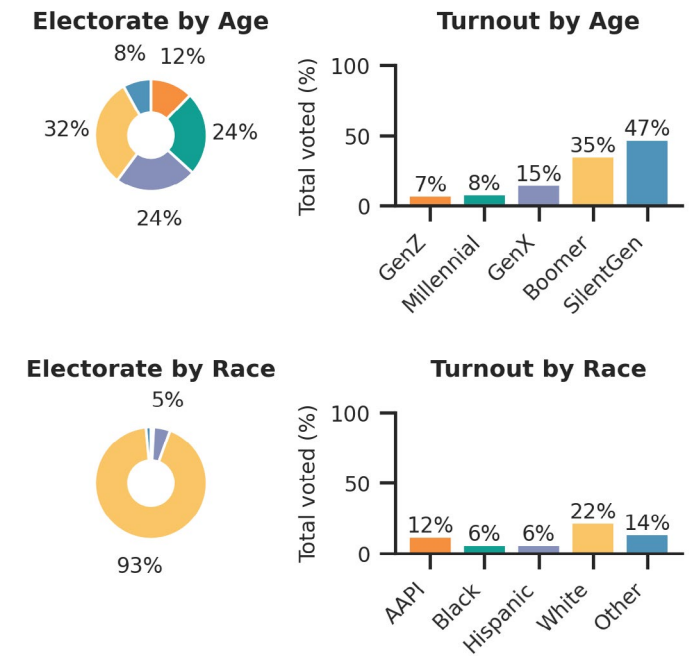


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Hoquiam for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

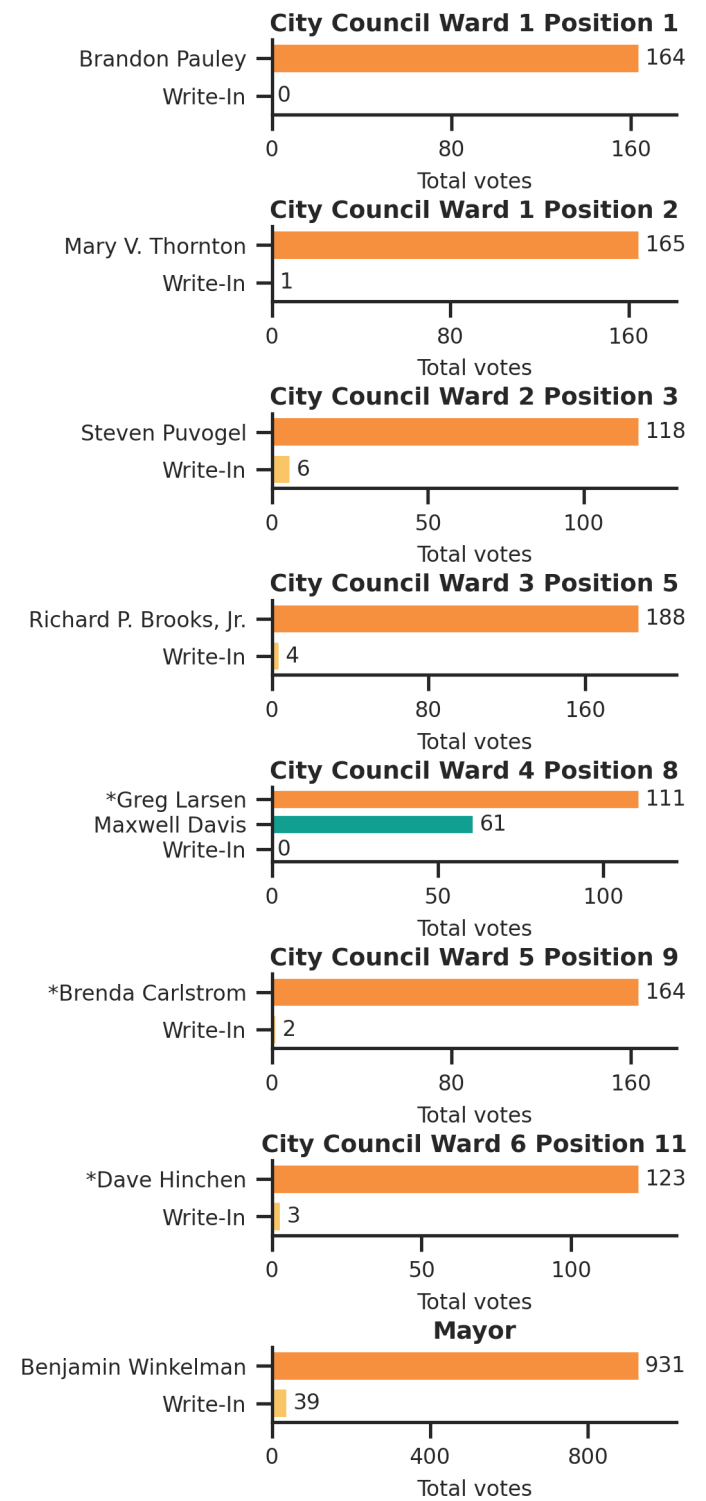


Fig 2 Election results in Hoquiam for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

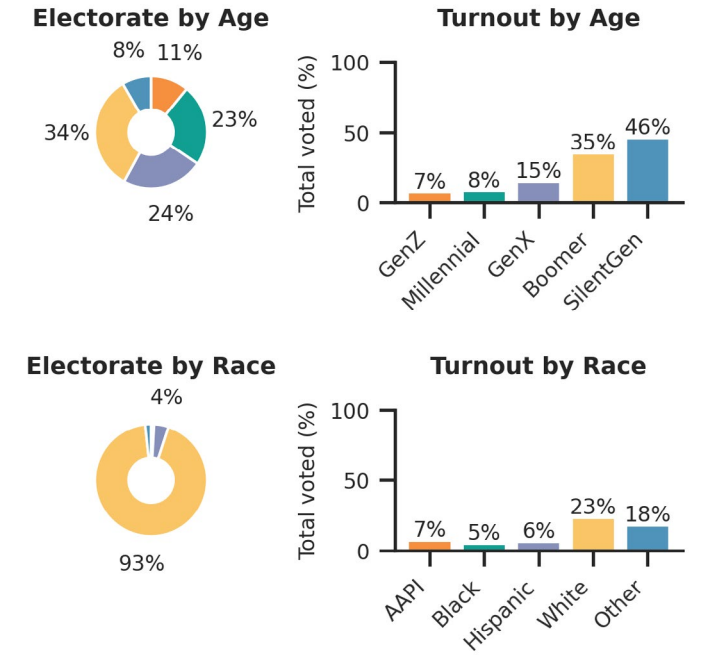


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Hoquiam School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

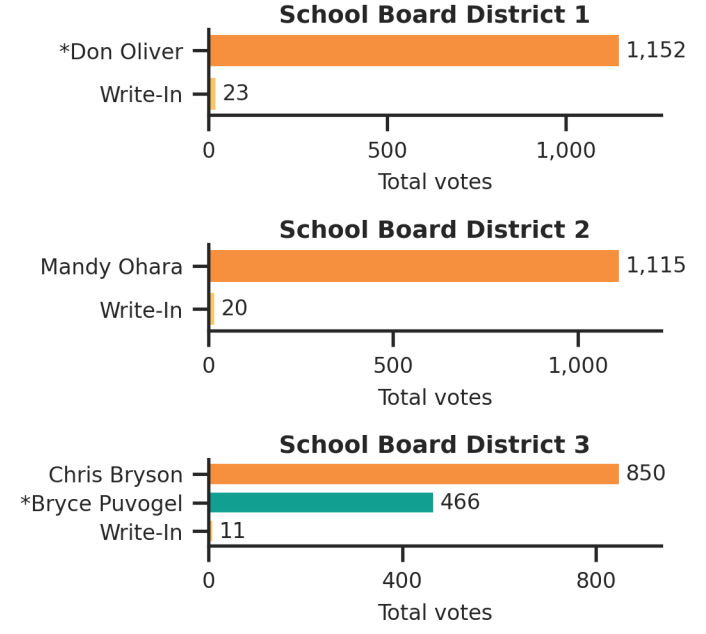


Fig 2 Election results in Hoquiam School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

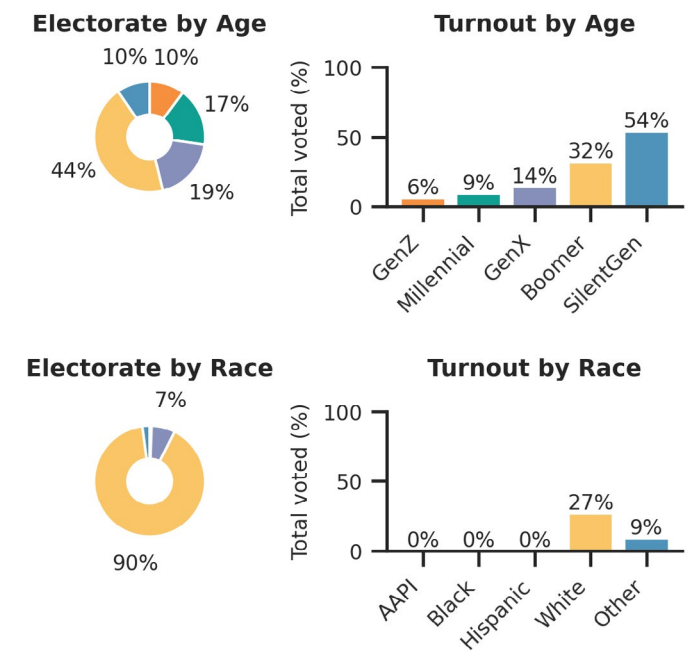


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lake Quinault School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

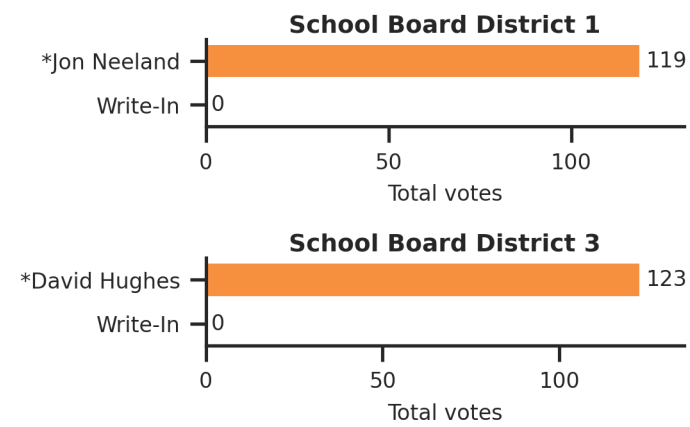


Fig 2 Election results in Lake Quinault School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

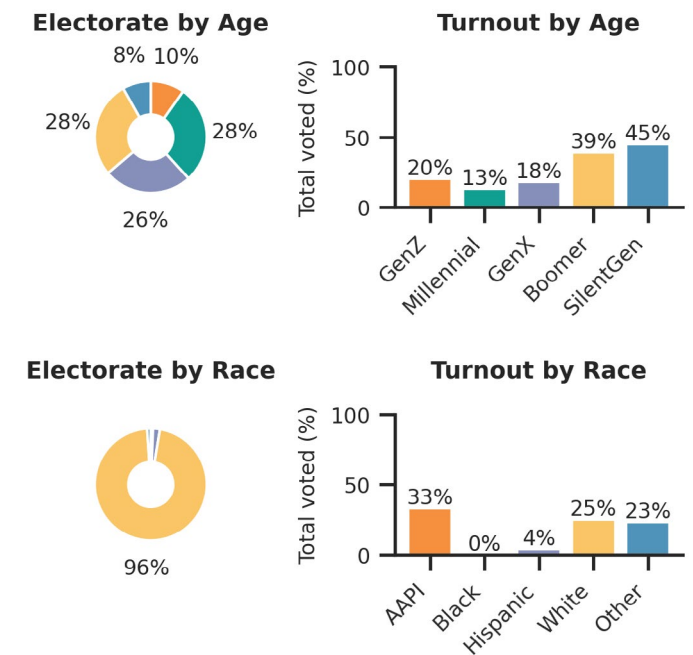


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in McCleary for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

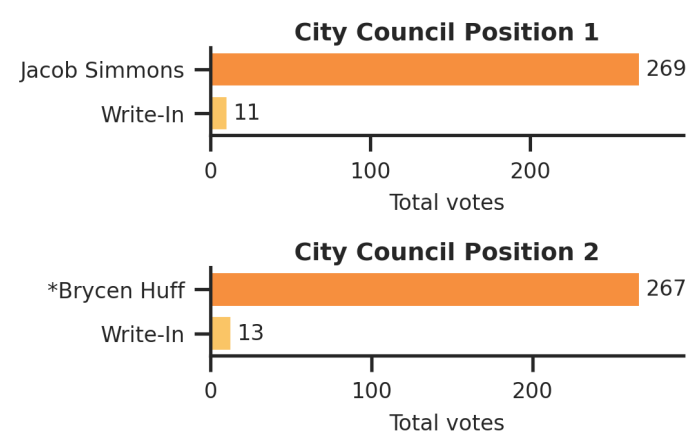


Fig 2 Election results in McCleary for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

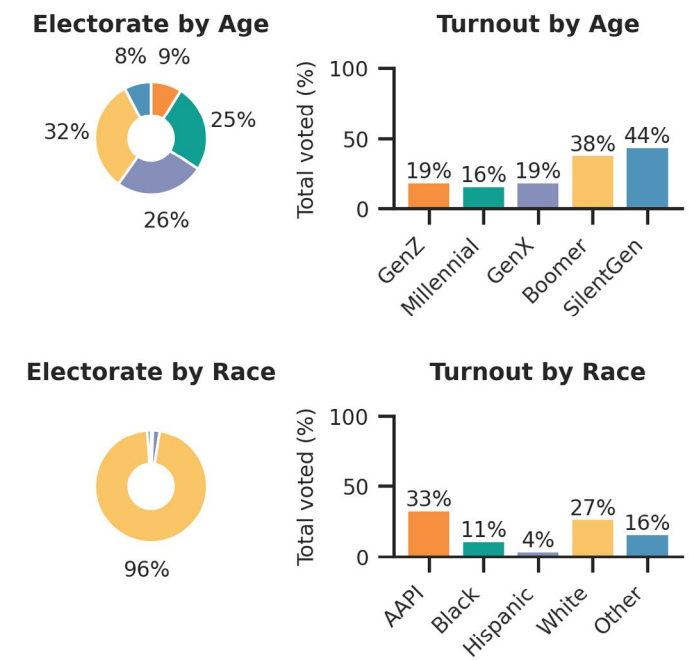


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in McCleary School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

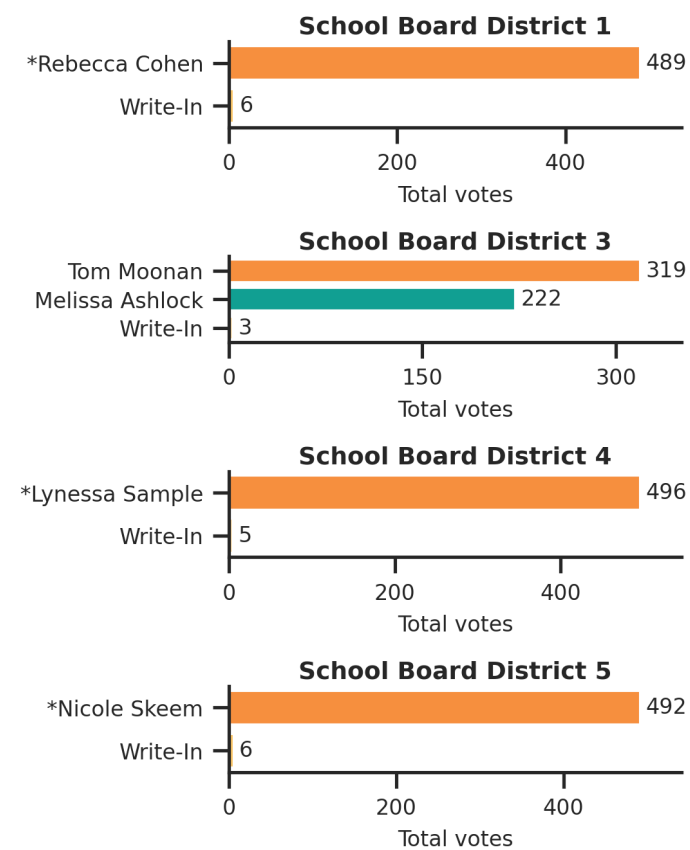


Fig 2 Election results in McCleary School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

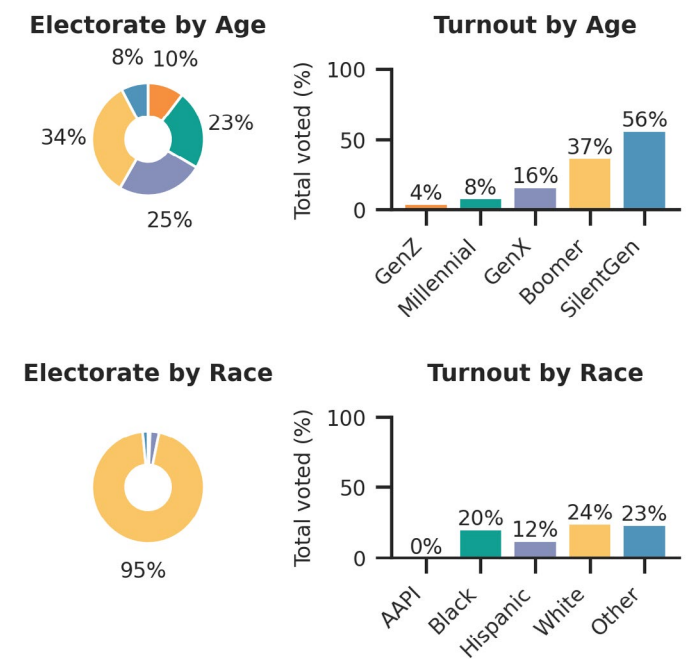


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Montesano for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

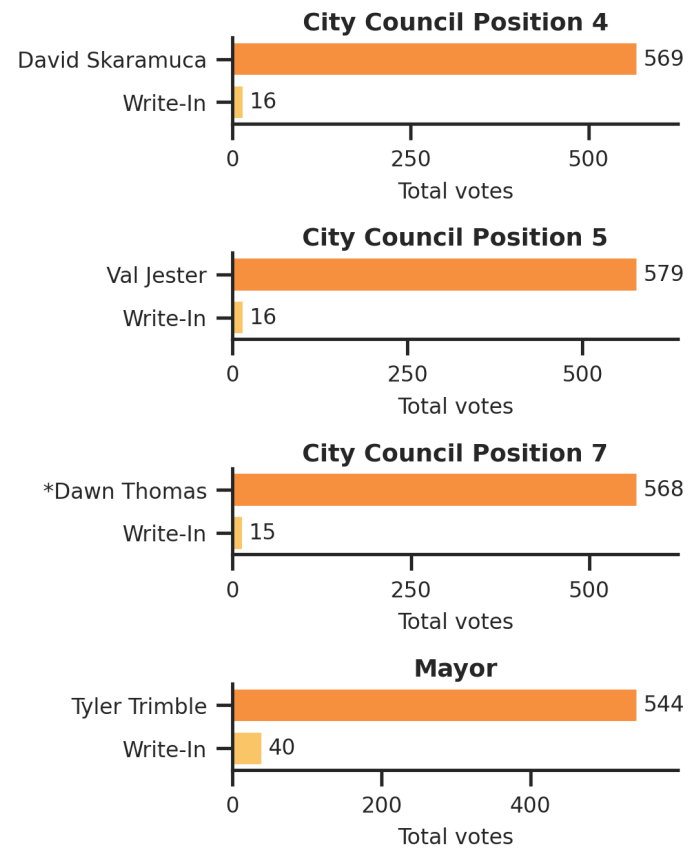


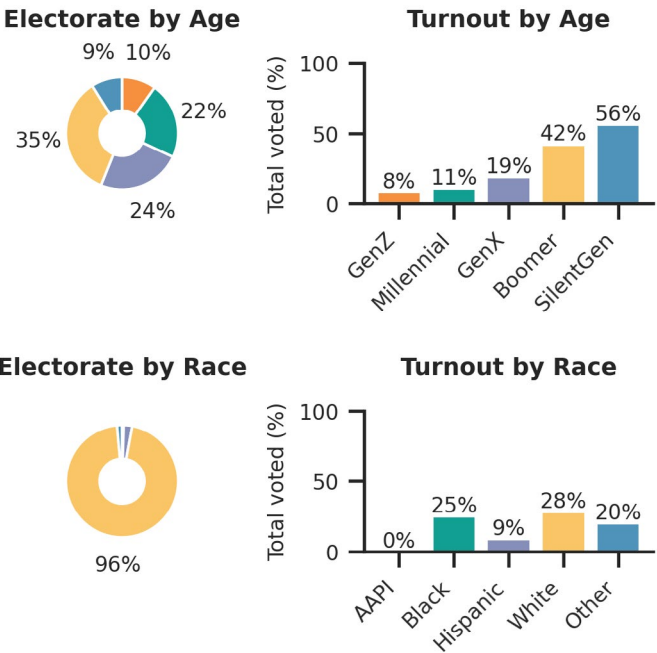
Fig 2 Election results in Montesano for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

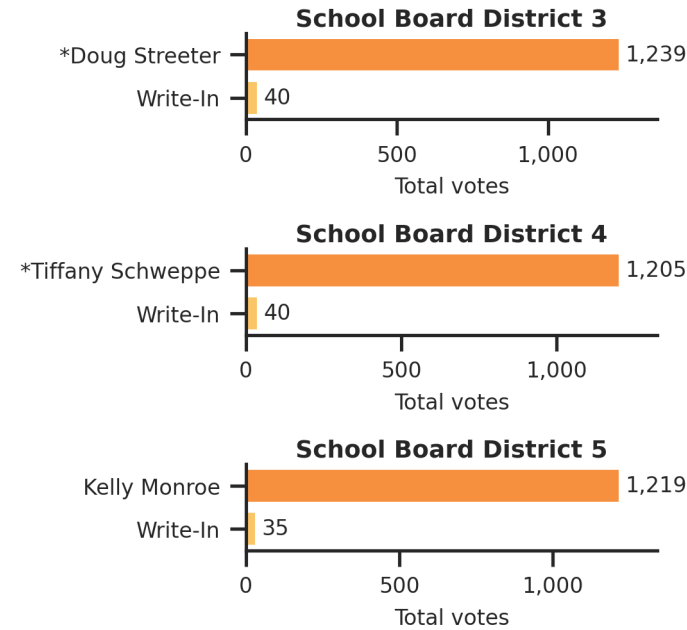

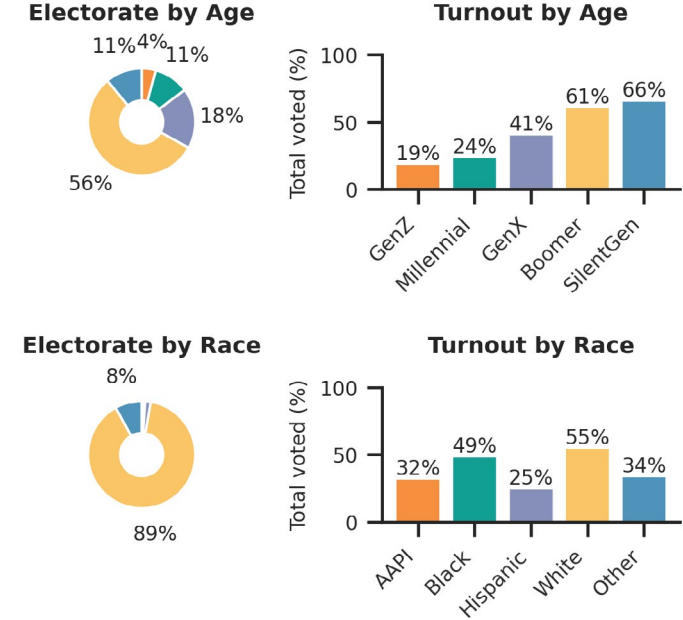


**Fig 2** Election results in Montesano School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

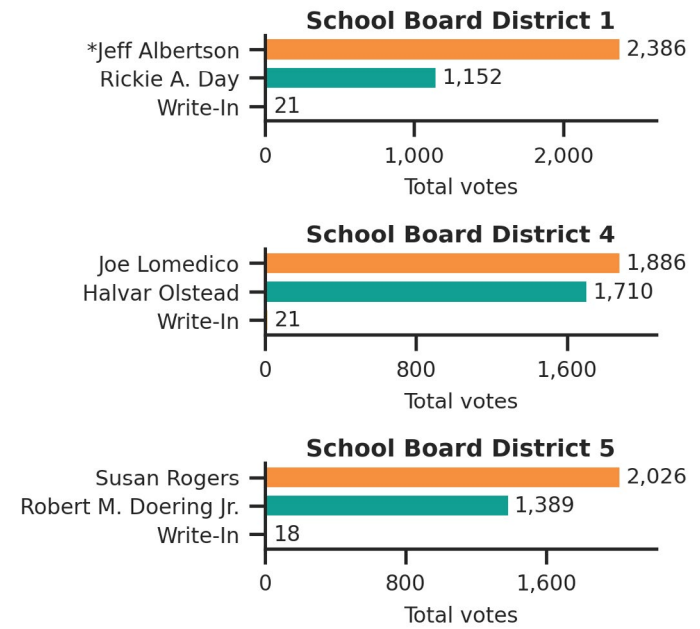

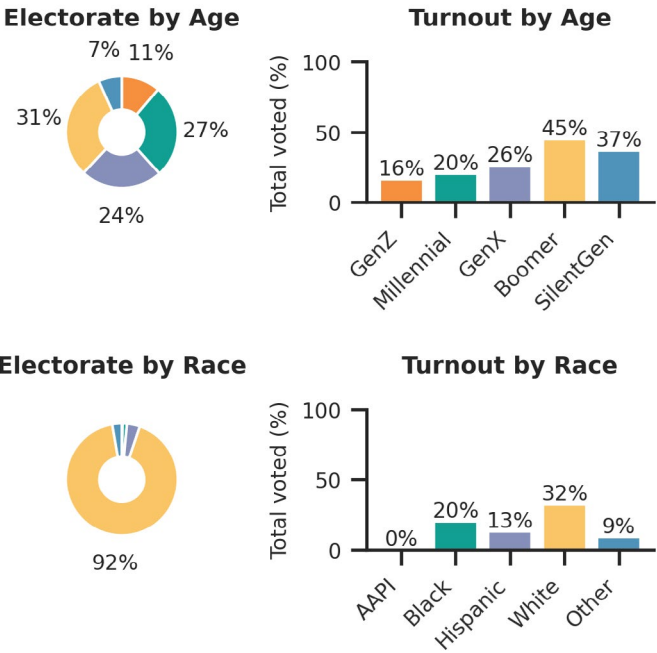


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oakville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

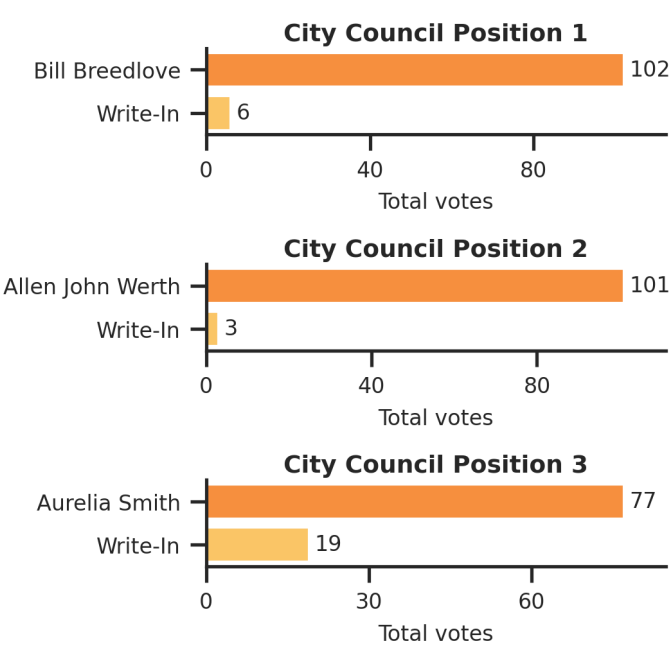


Fig 2 Election results in Oakville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

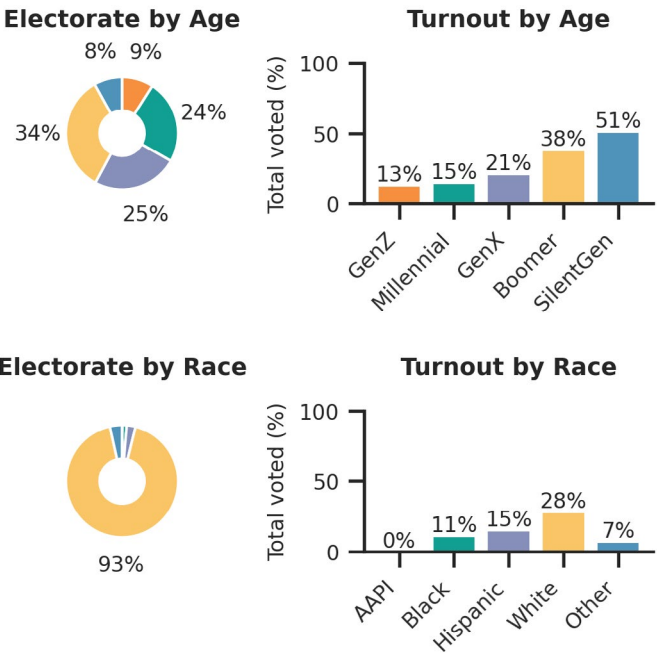


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Oakville School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

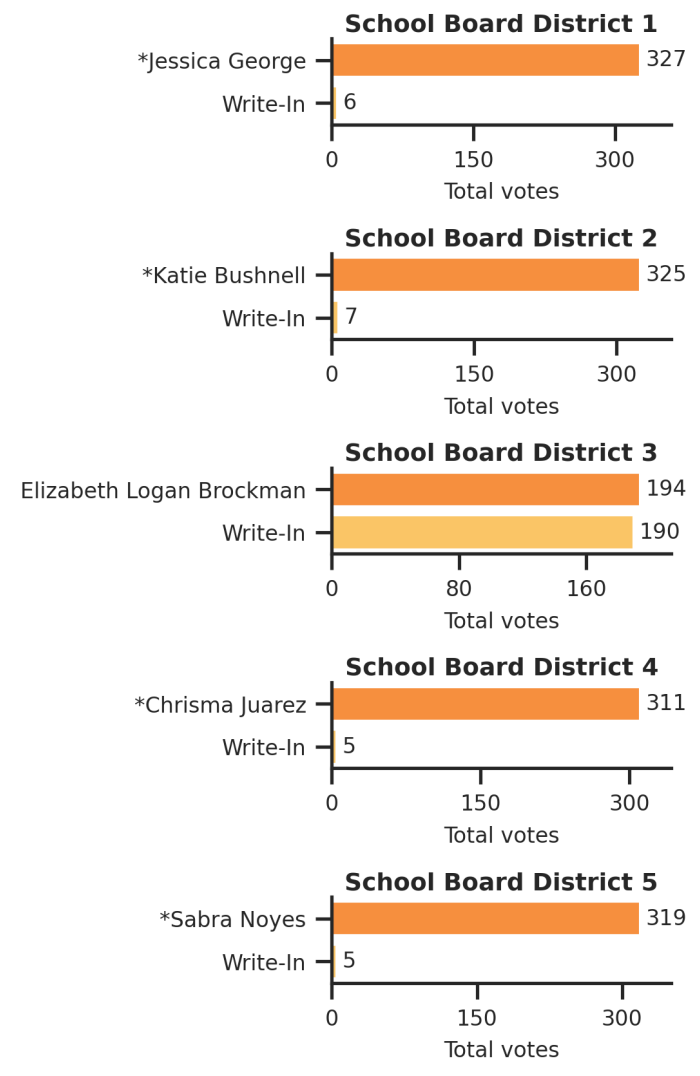
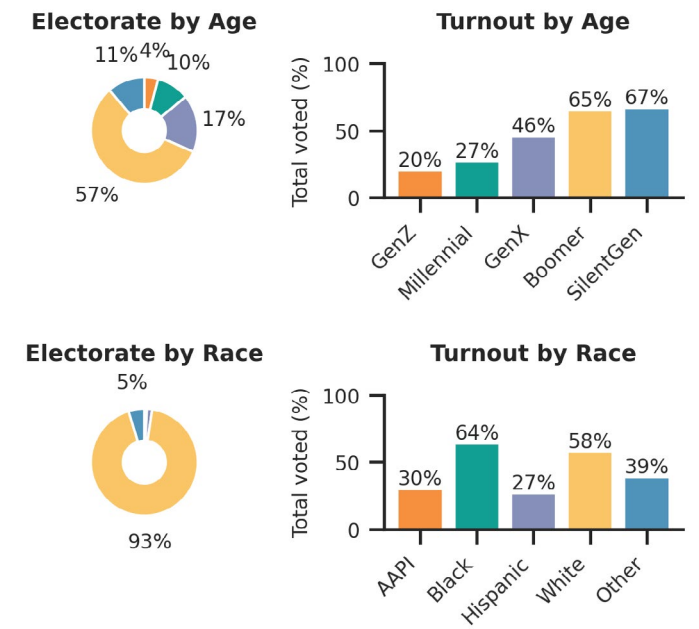


Fig 2 Election results in Oakville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

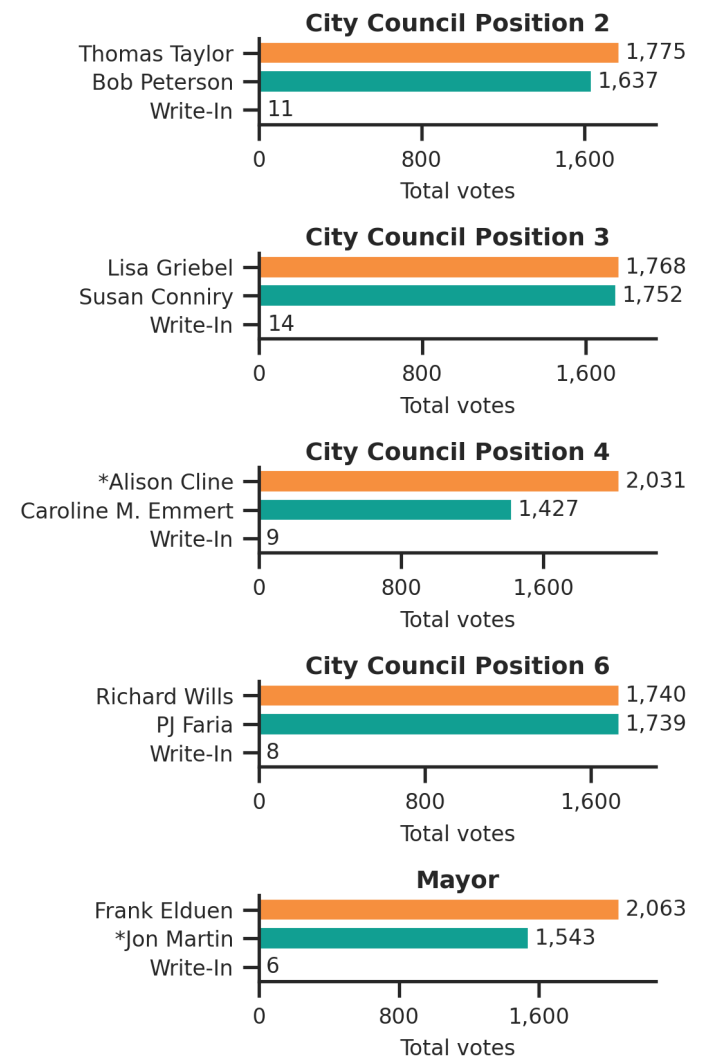


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ocean Shores for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

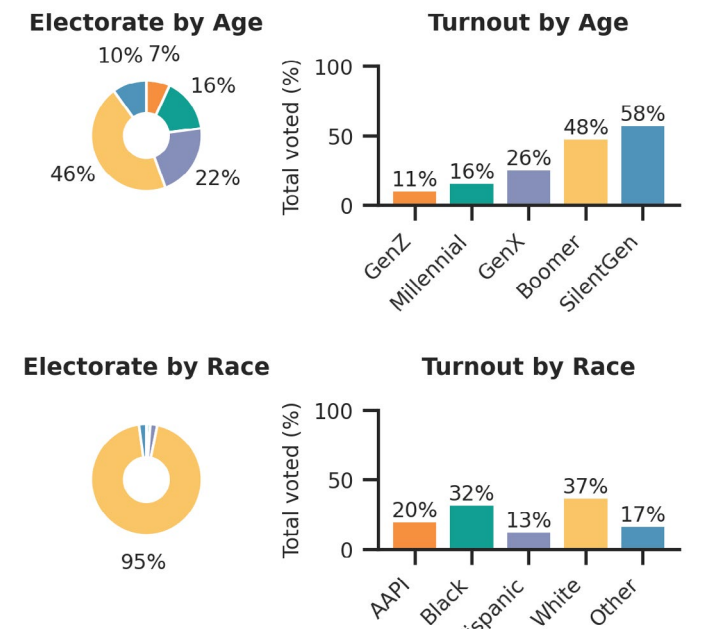


**Fig 2** Election results in Ocean Shores for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

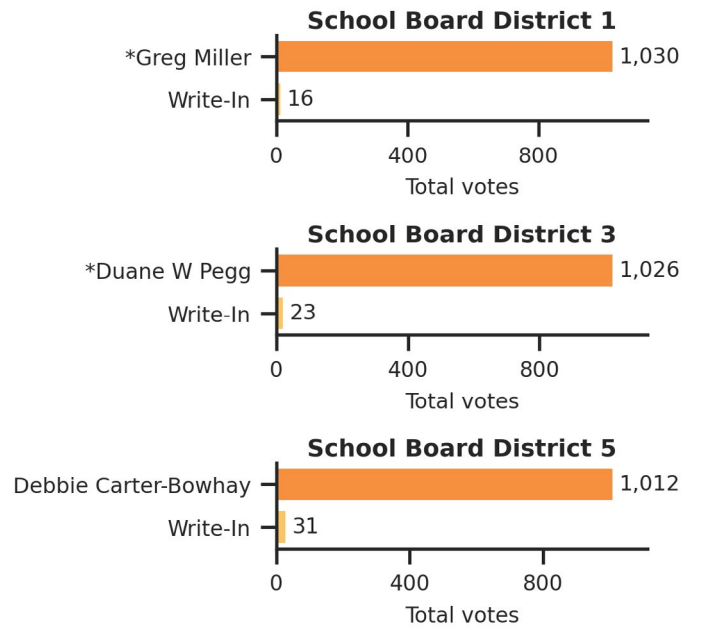

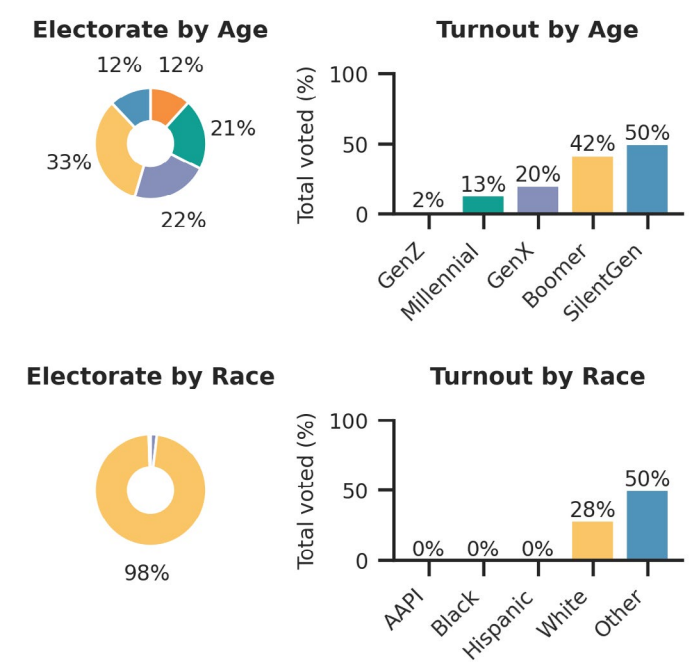
**Fig 2** Election results in Ocosta School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

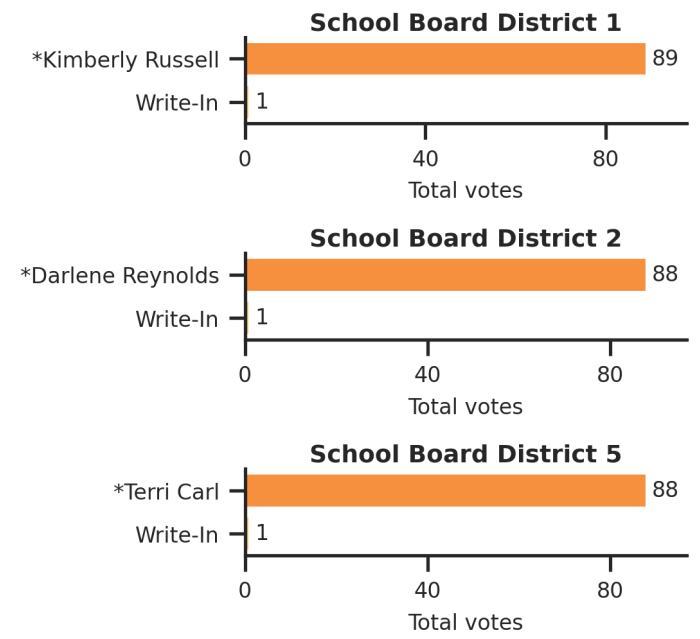

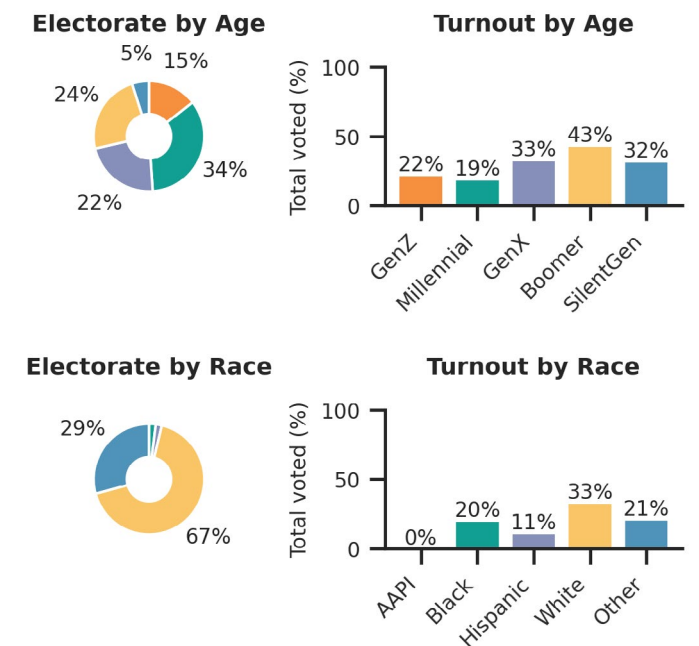


**Fig 2** Election results in Satsop School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

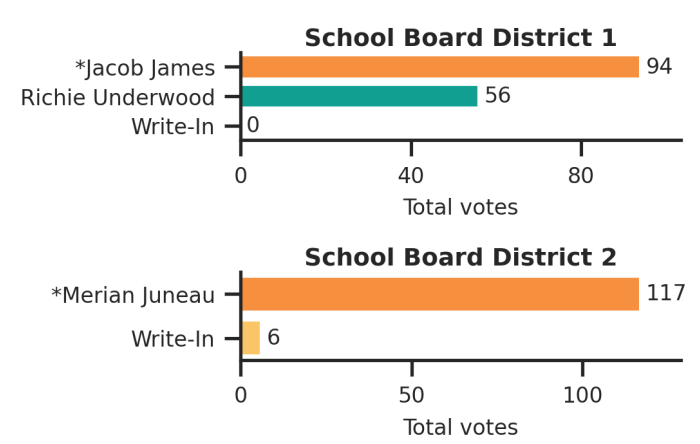

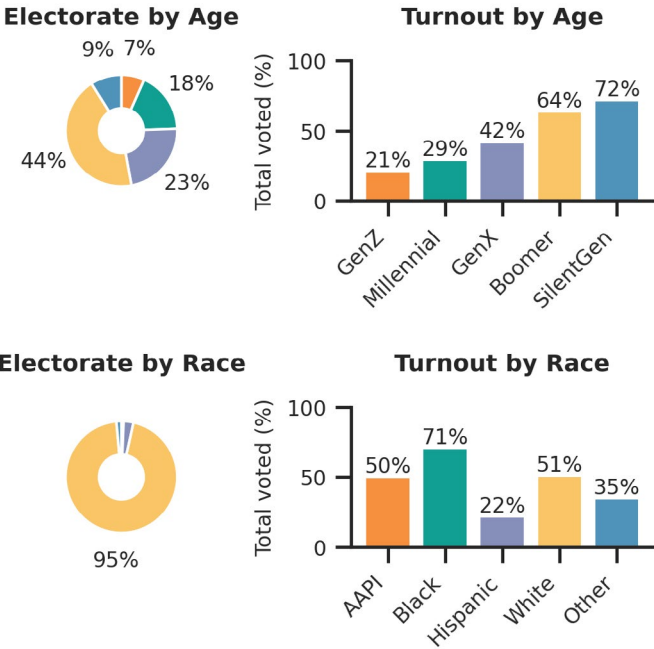


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Westport for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

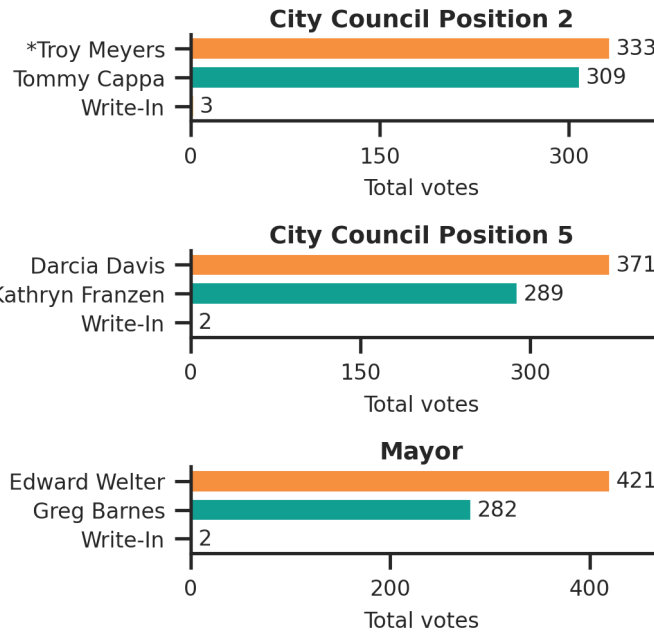


Fig 2 Election results in Westport for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

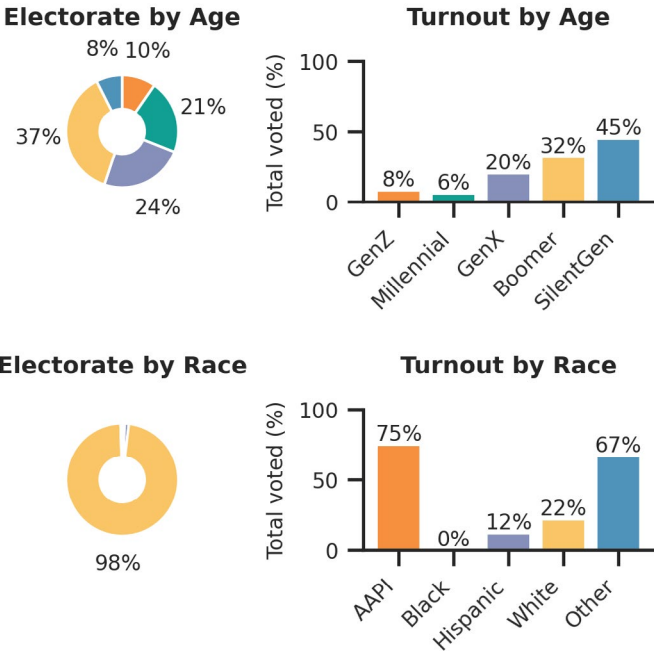


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wishkah Valley School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

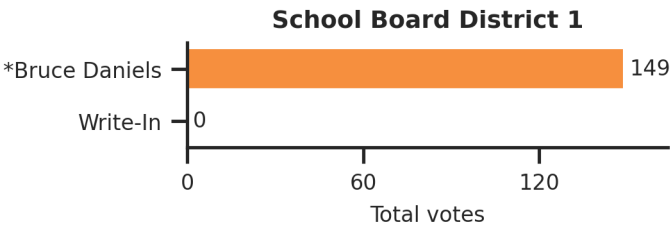


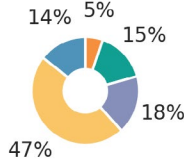
Fig 2 Election results in Wishkah Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



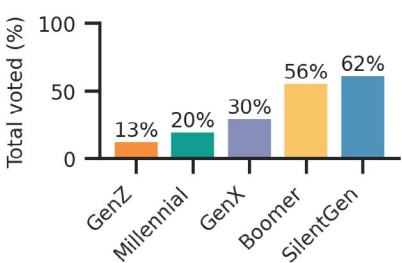

Electorate by Age



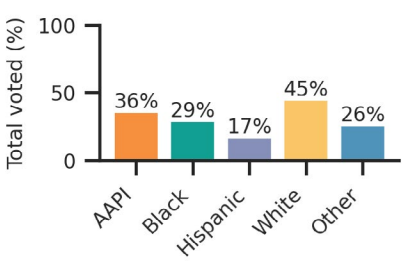

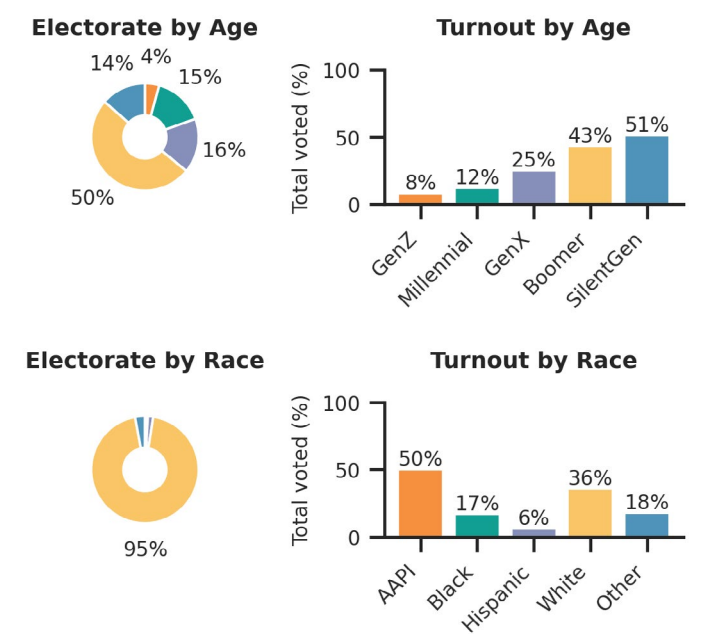
**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Jefferson County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

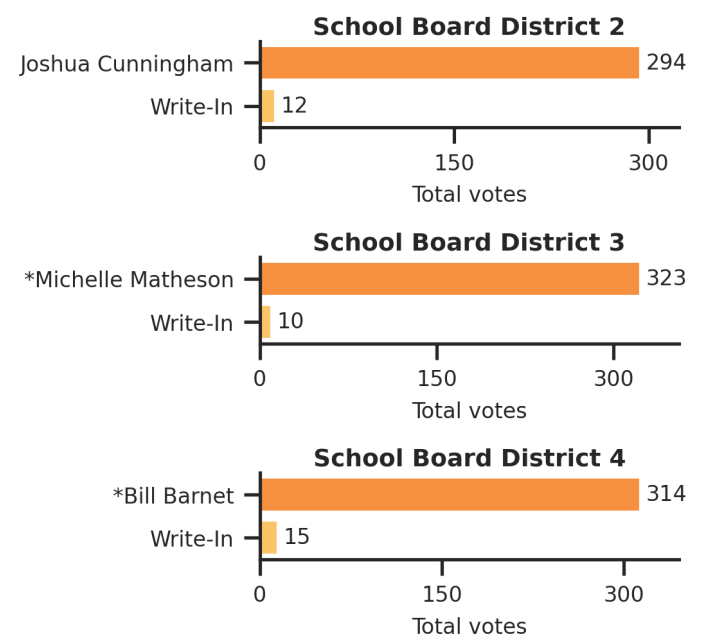

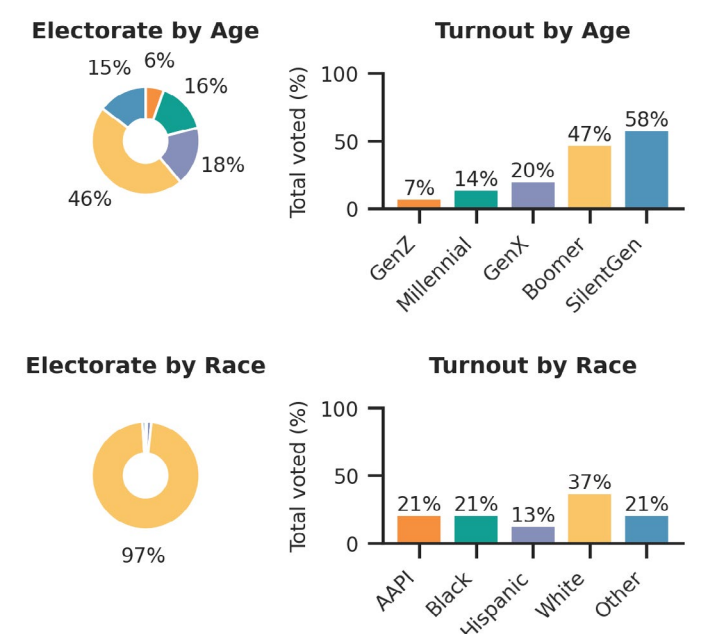


**Fig 2** Election results in Brinnon School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

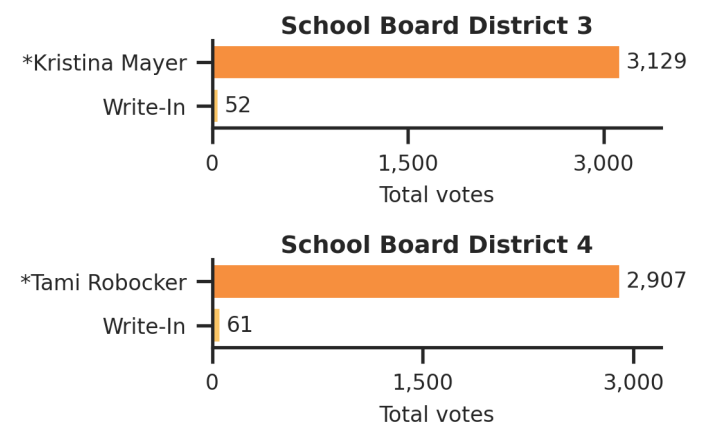

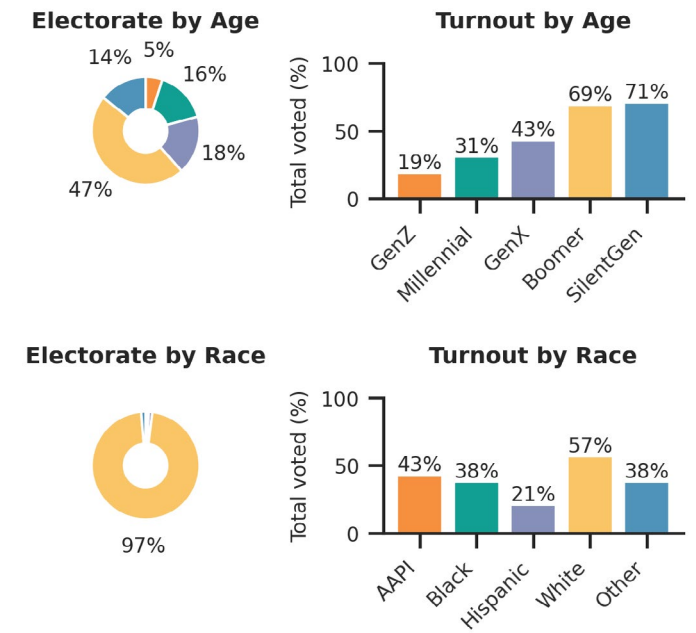

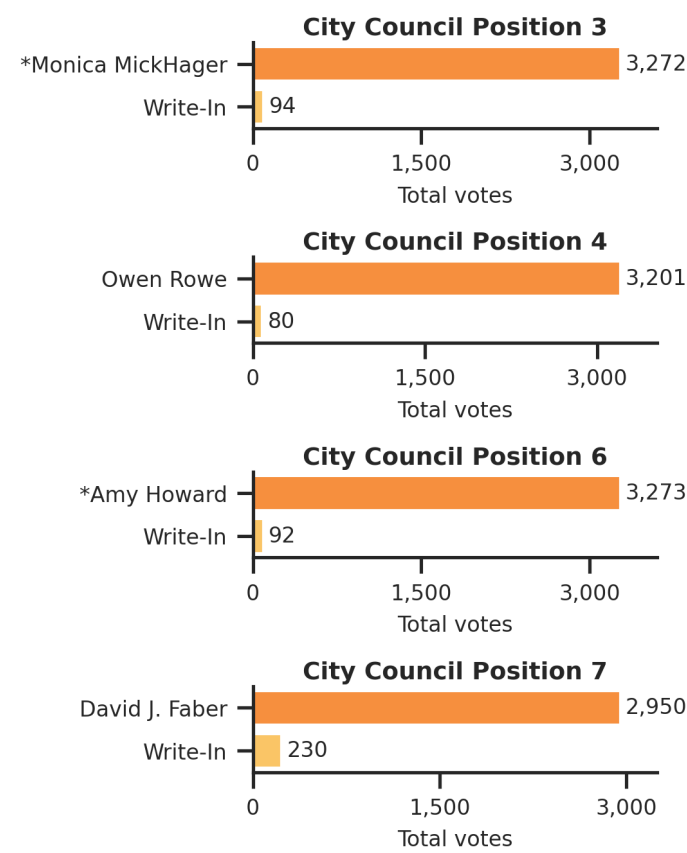

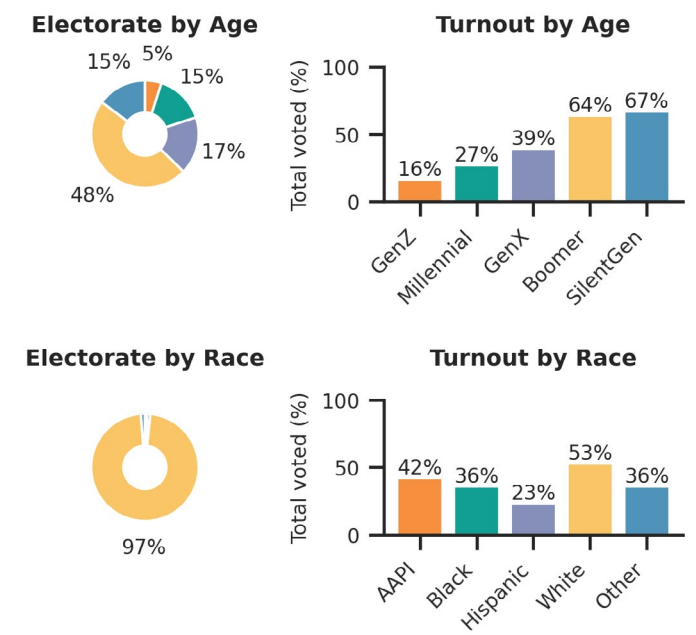

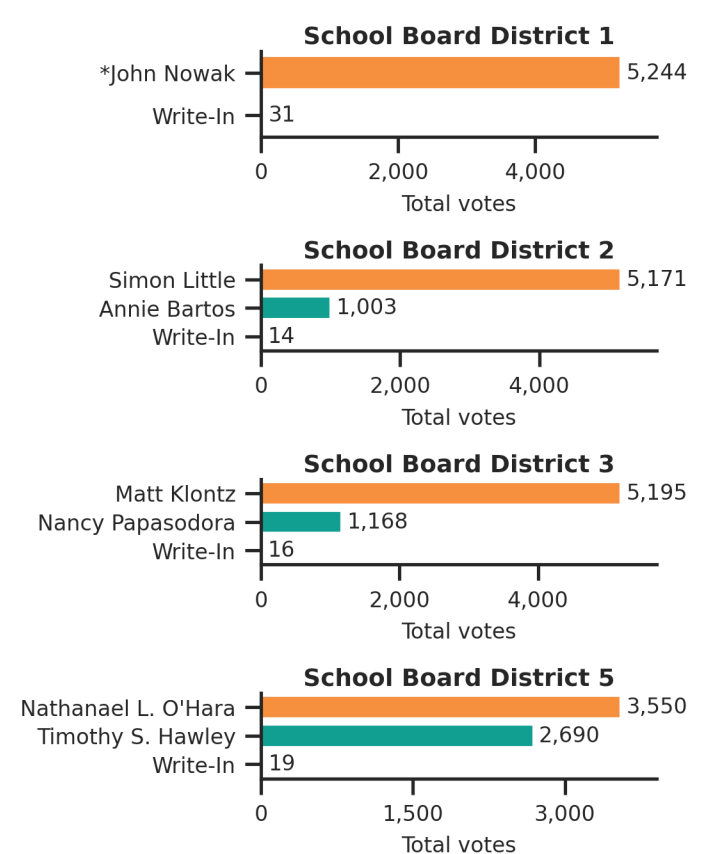

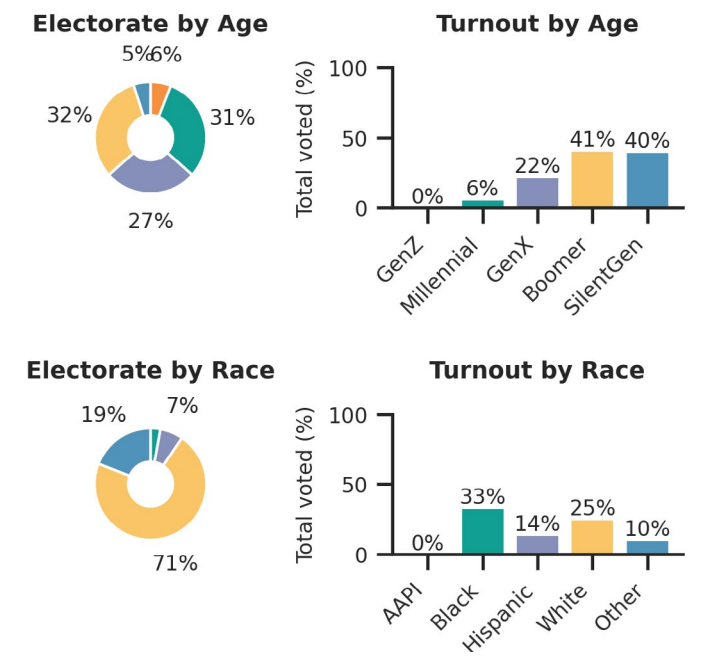


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Queets-Clearwater School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

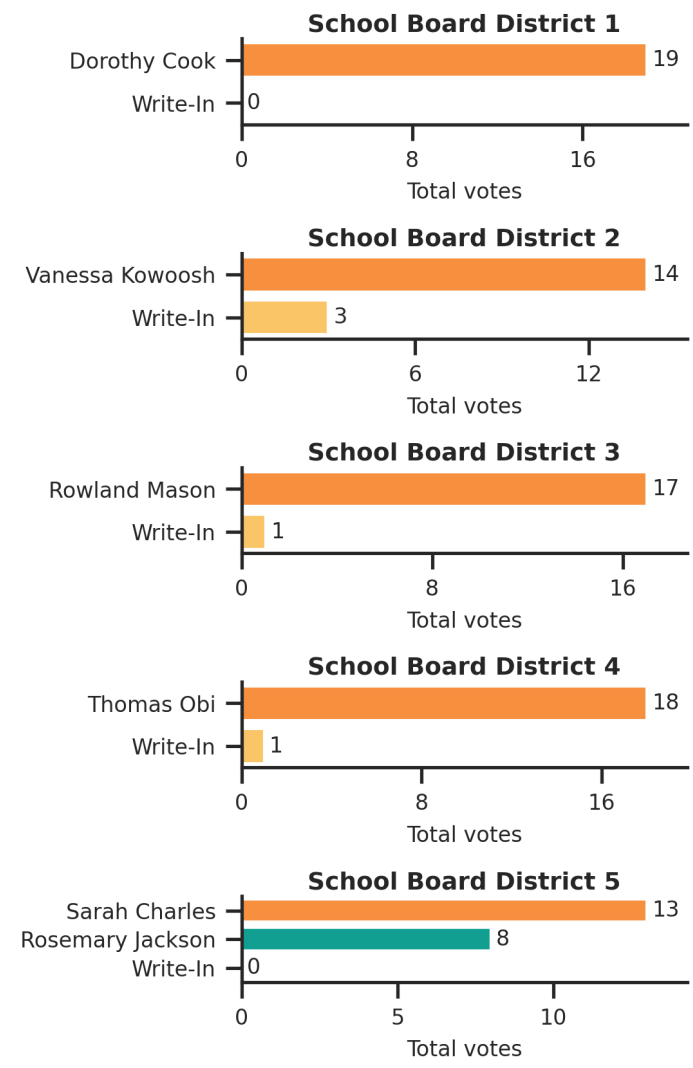


Fig 2 Election results in Queets-Clearwater School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

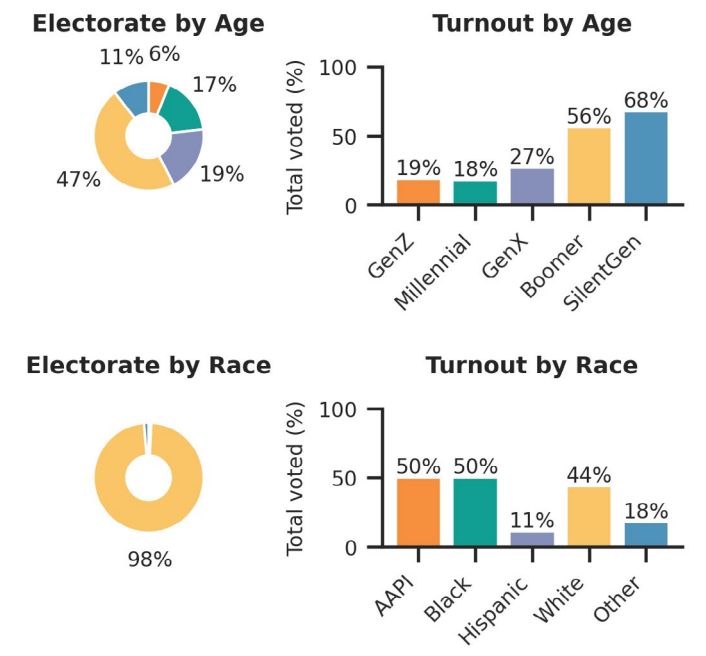


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Quilcene School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

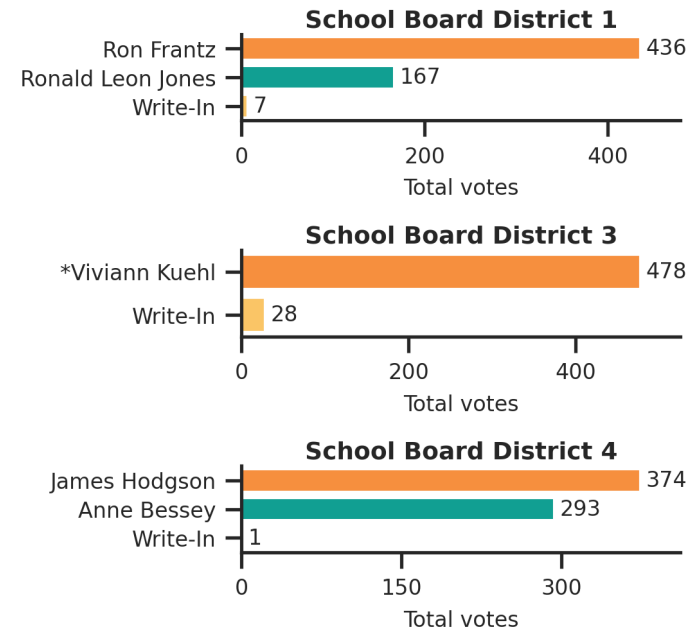


Fig 2 Election results in Quilcene School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



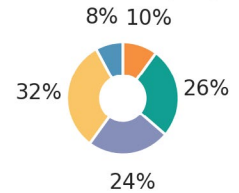

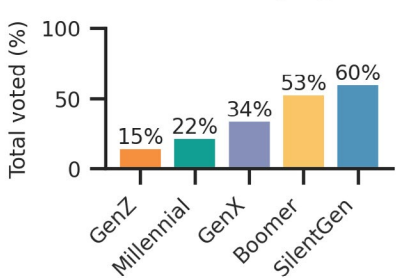

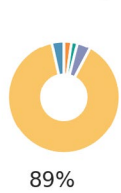

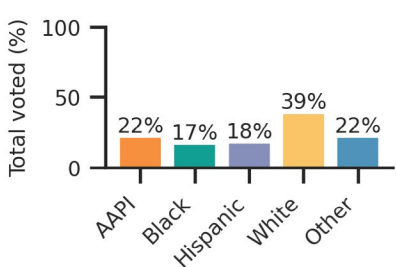

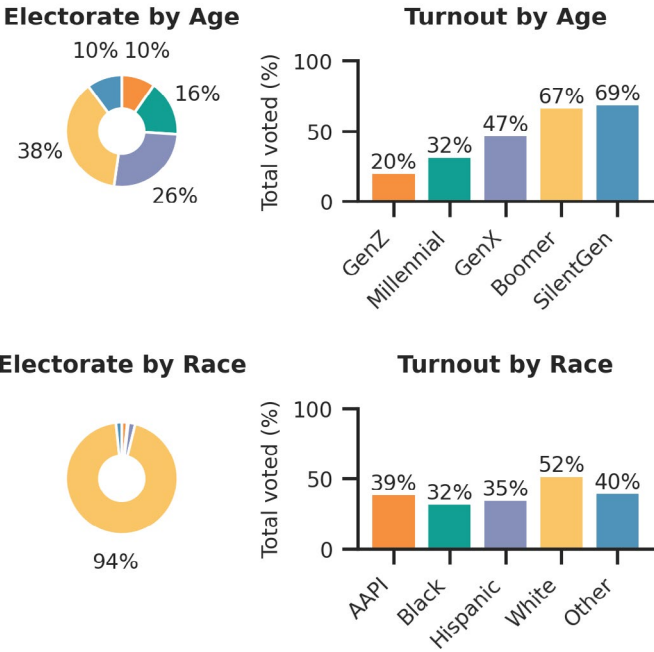


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kitsap County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

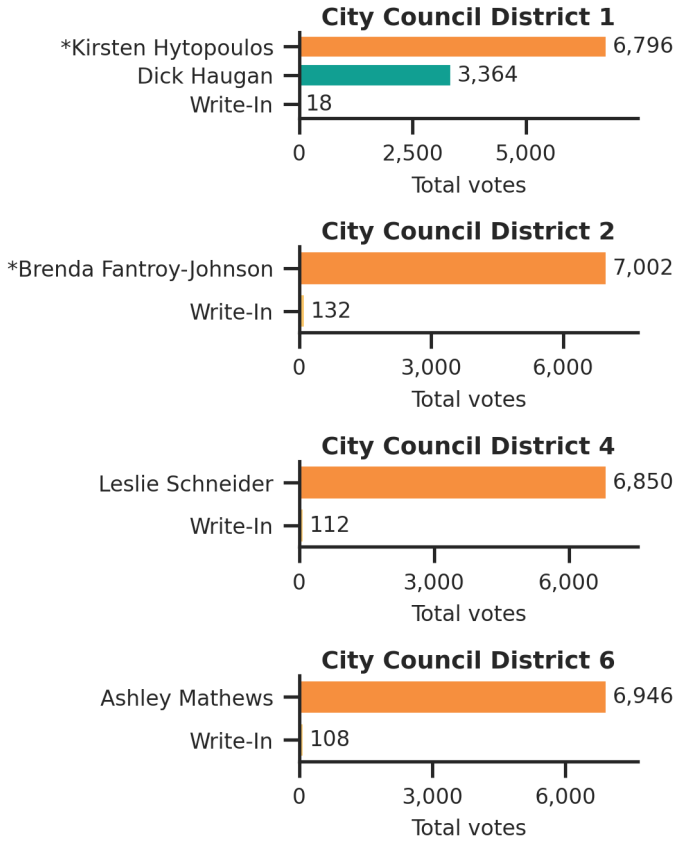

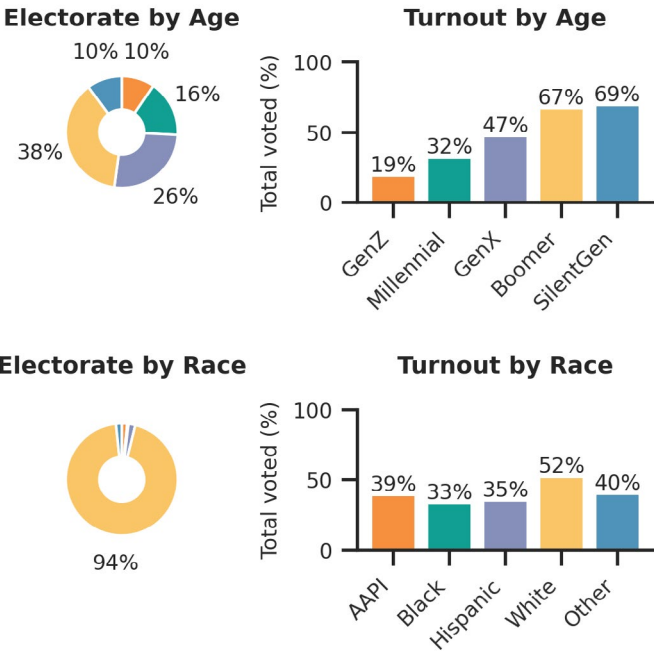

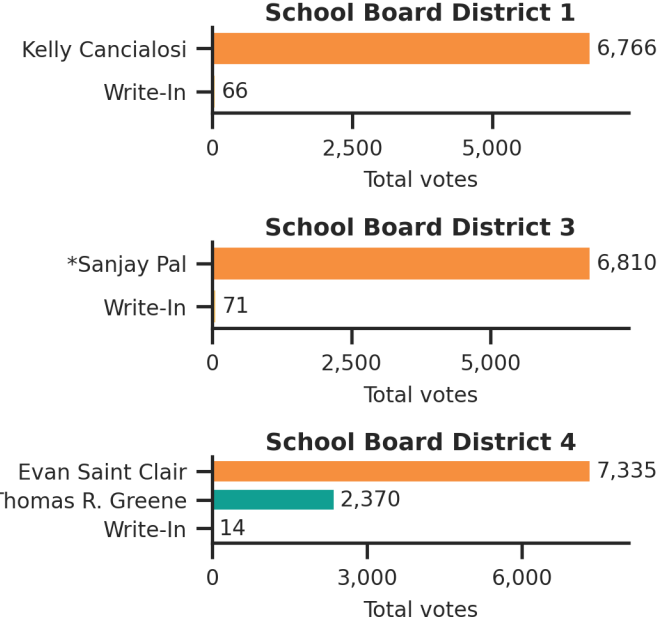

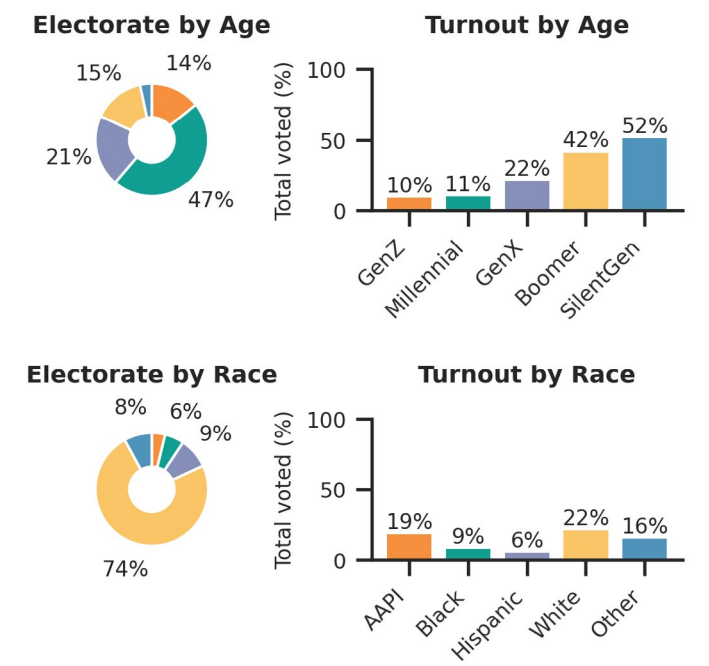

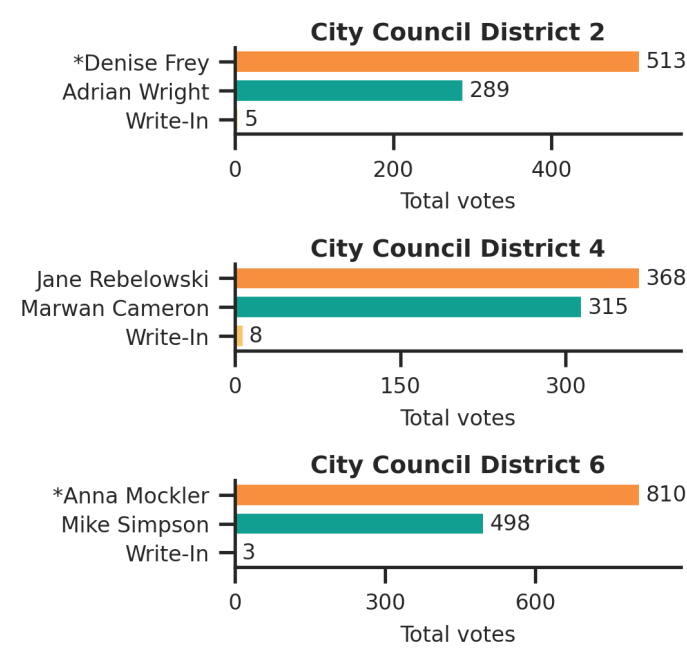

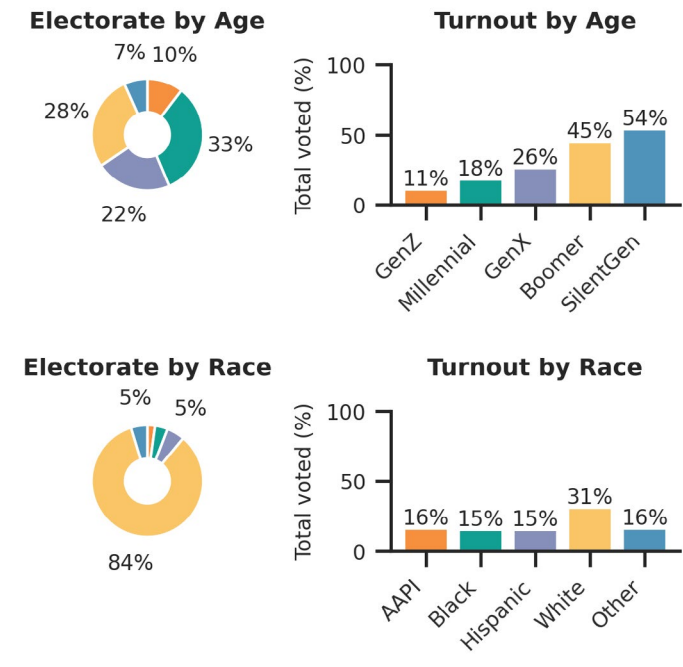

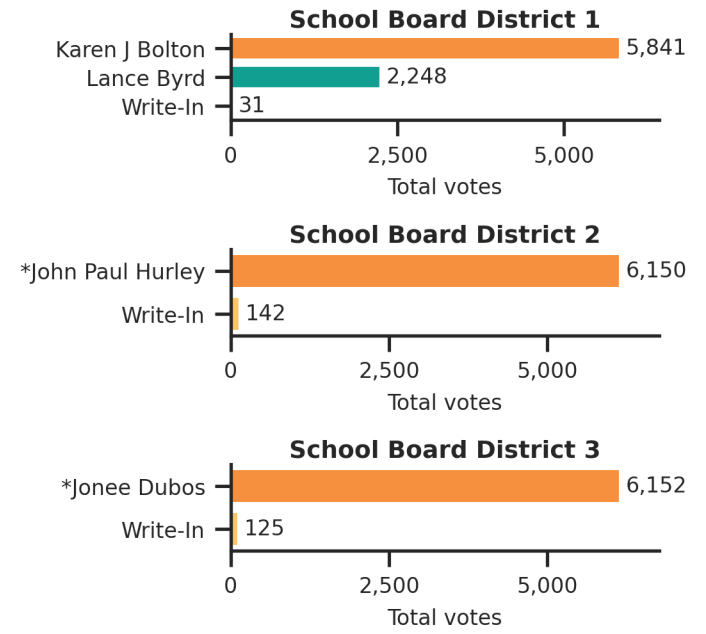

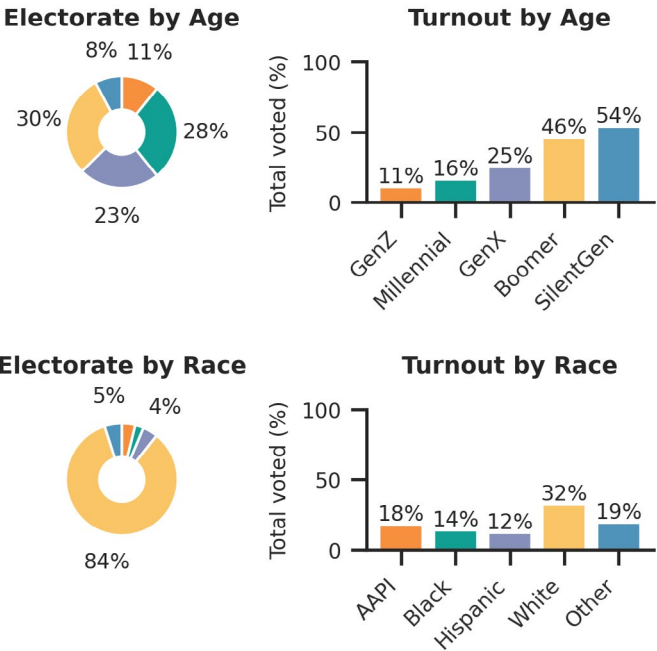
**Fig 2** Election results in Bremerton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

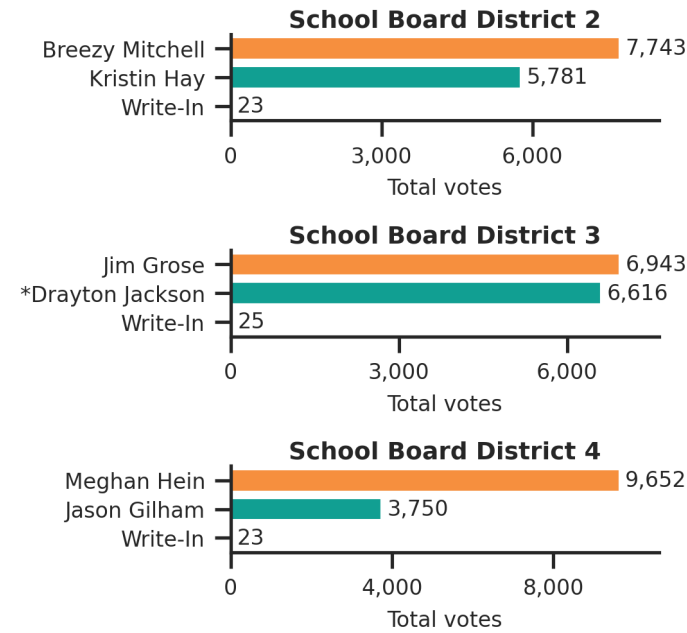

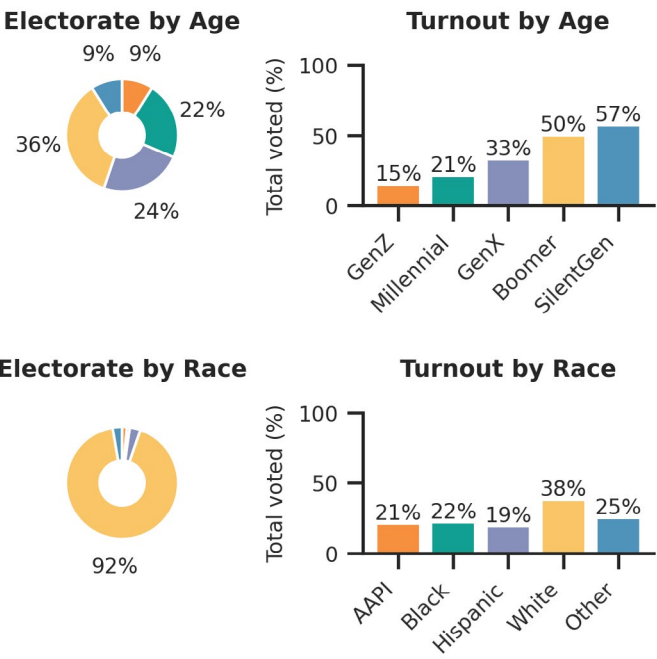


**Fig 2** Election results in Central Kitsap School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

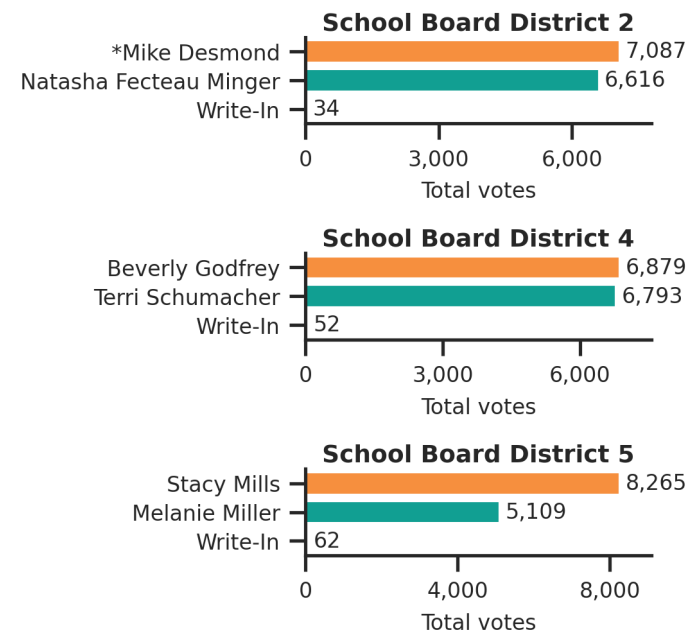

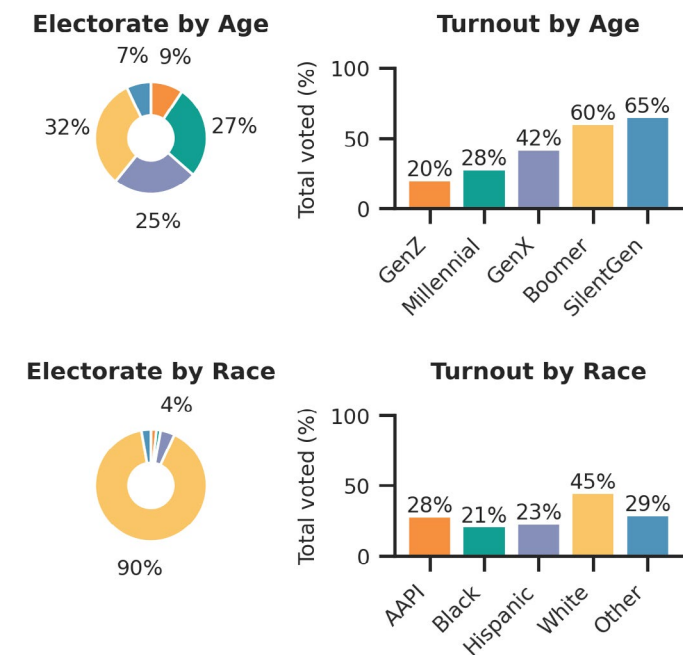


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in South Kitsap School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

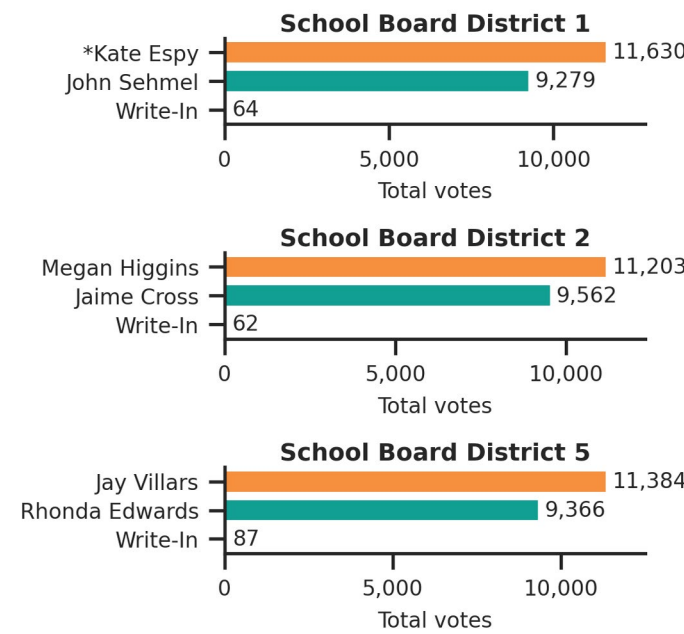


Fig 2 Election results in South Kitsap School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

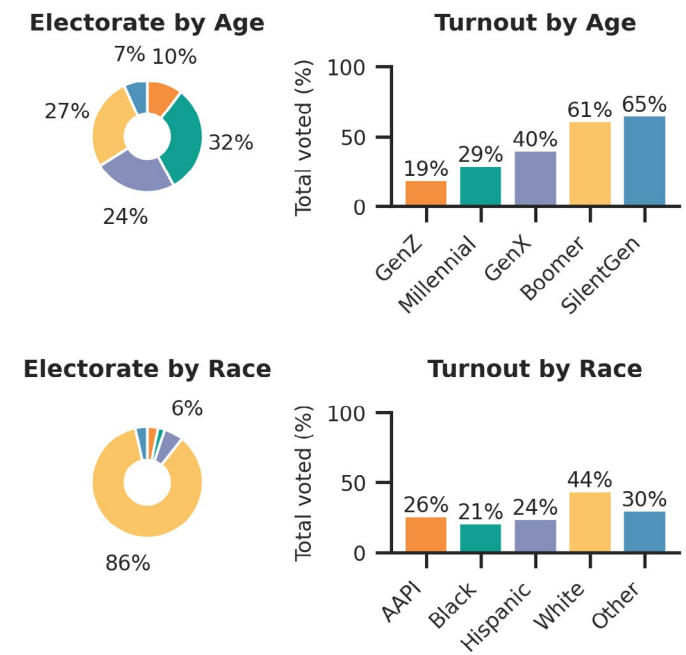


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Port Orchard for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

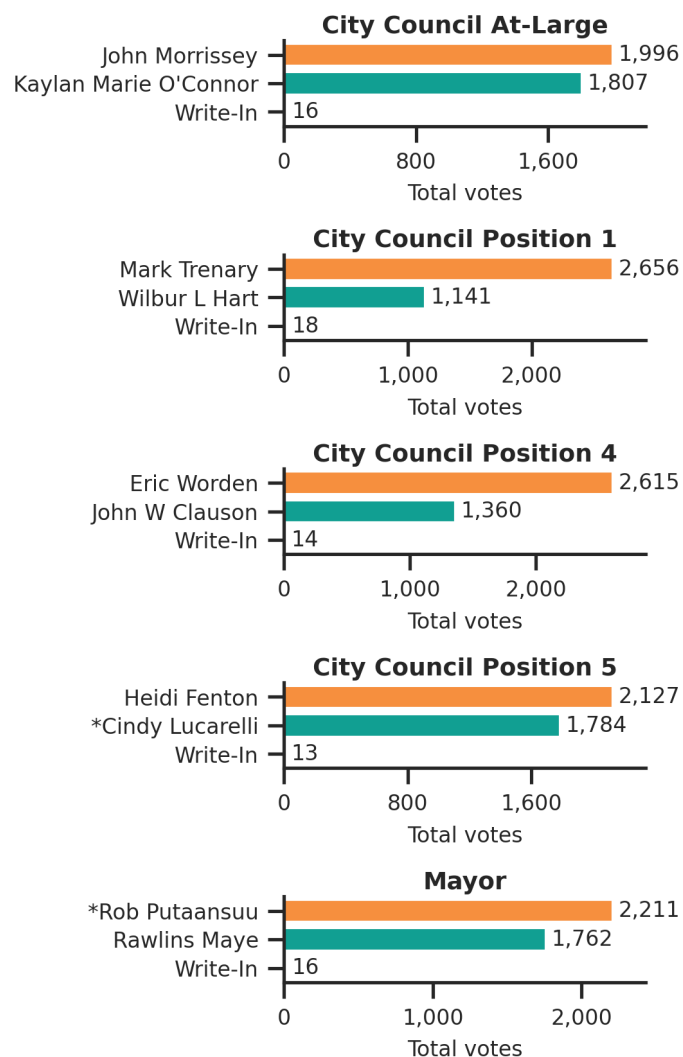
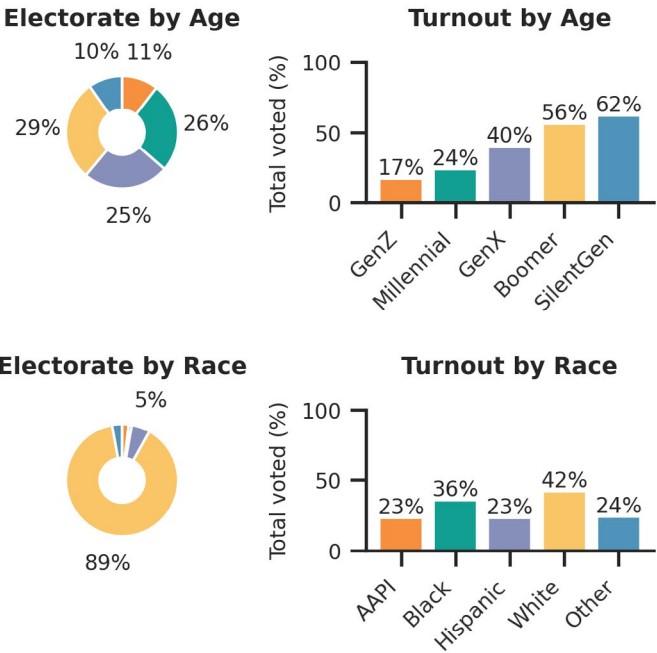


Fig 2 Election results in Port Orchard for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

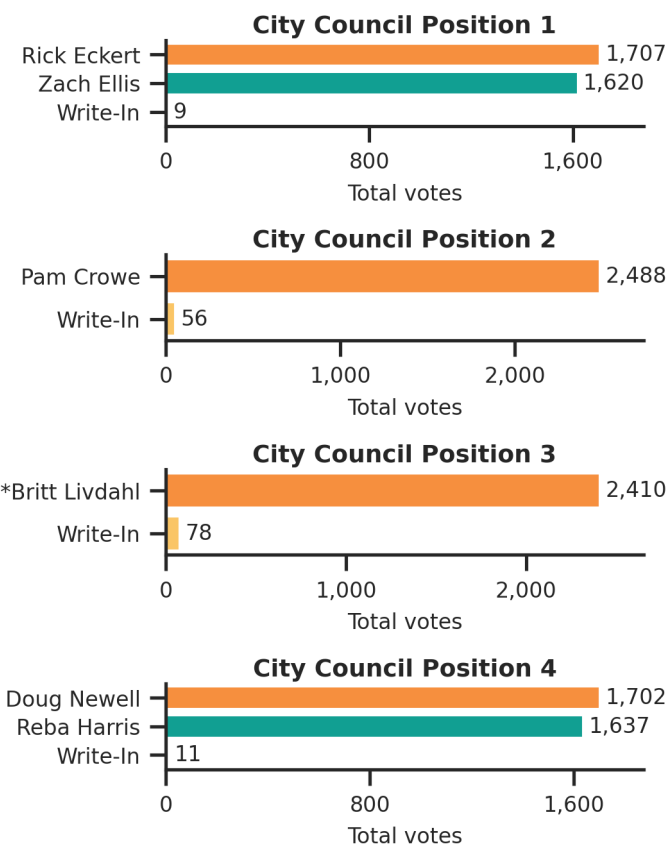

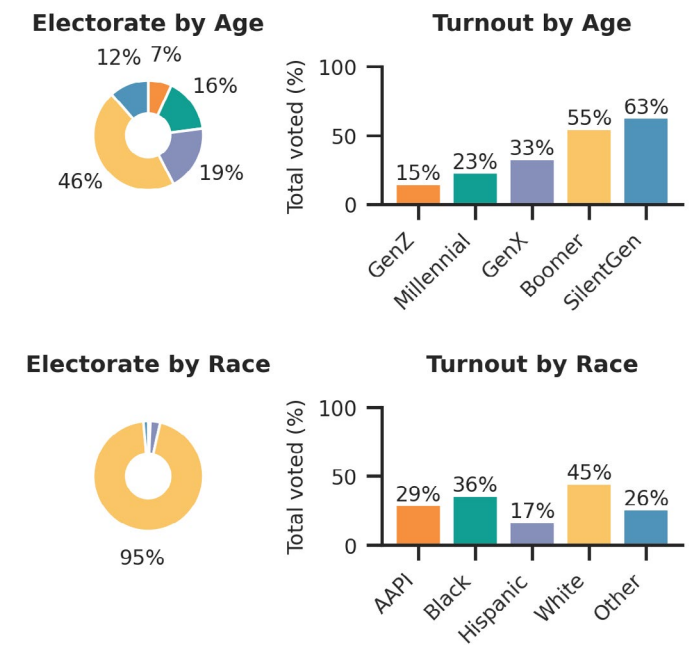


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pacific County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

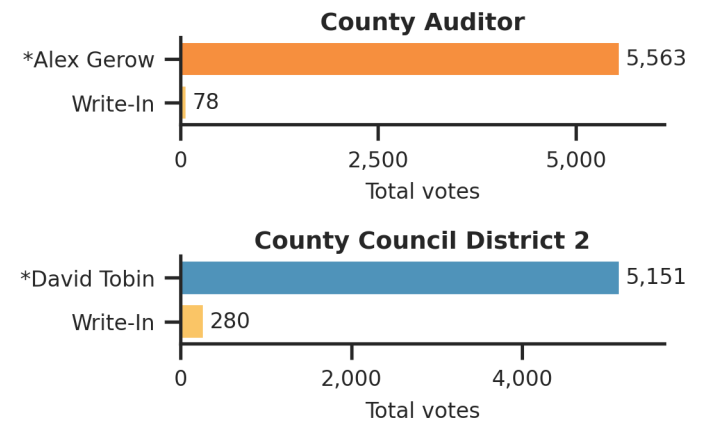


Fig 2 Election results in Pacific County for the 2023 General Election. Asterisks indicate incumbents.

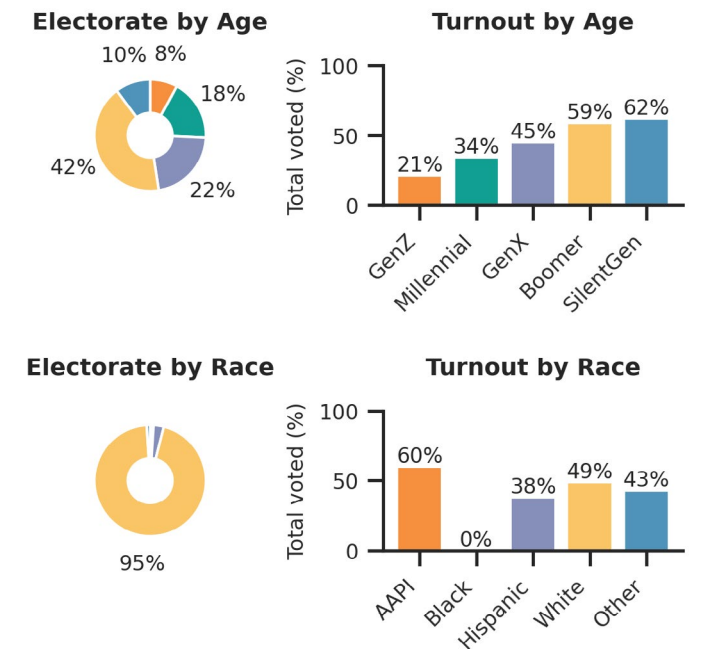


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ilwaco for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

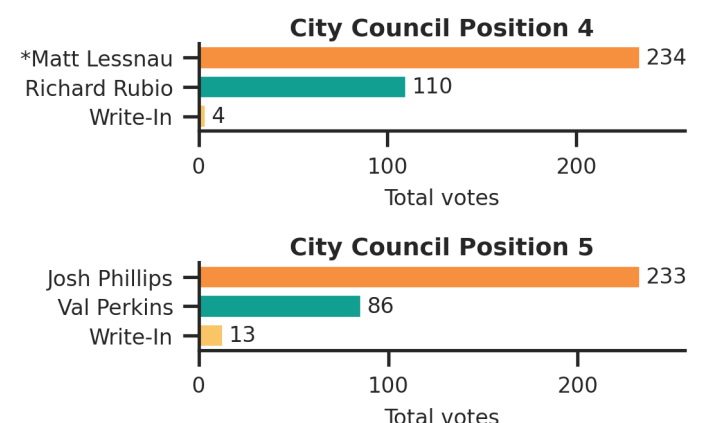


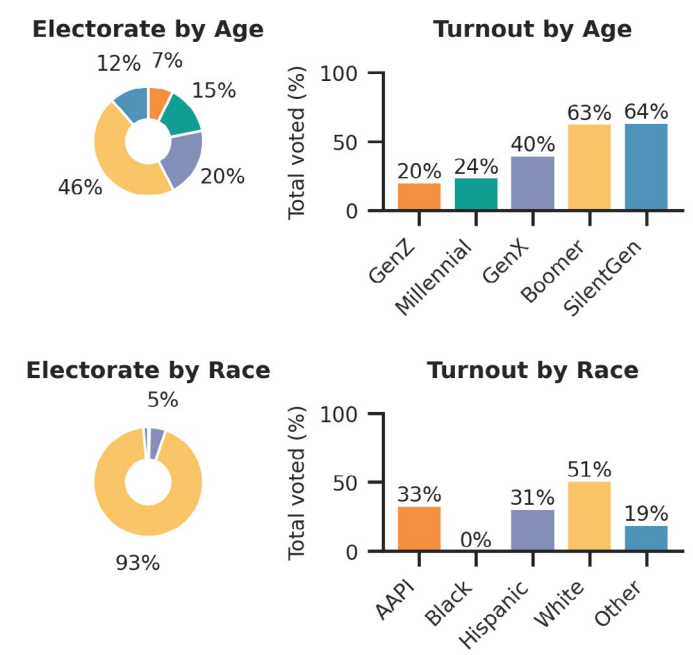
Fig 2 Election results in Ilwaco for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

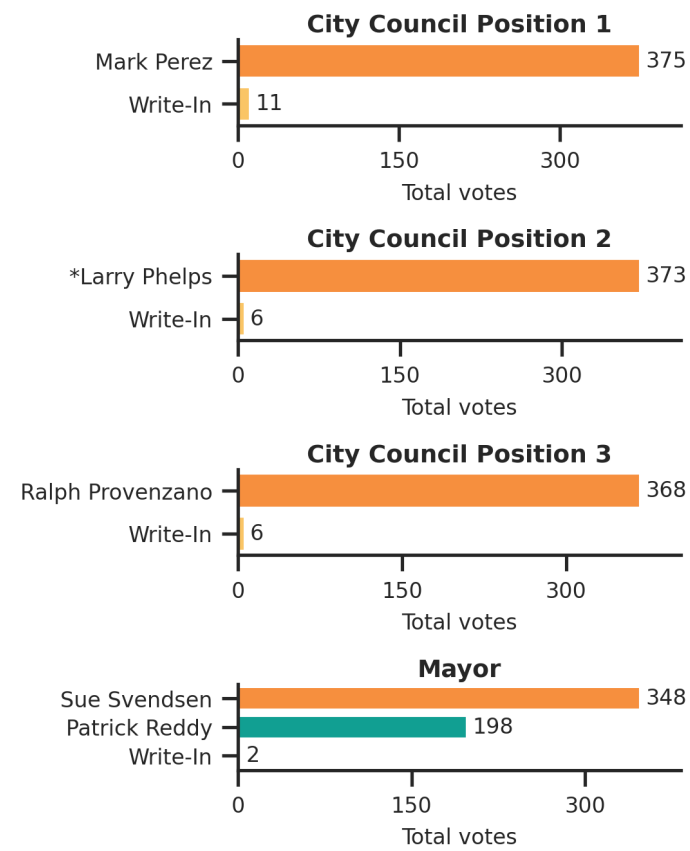

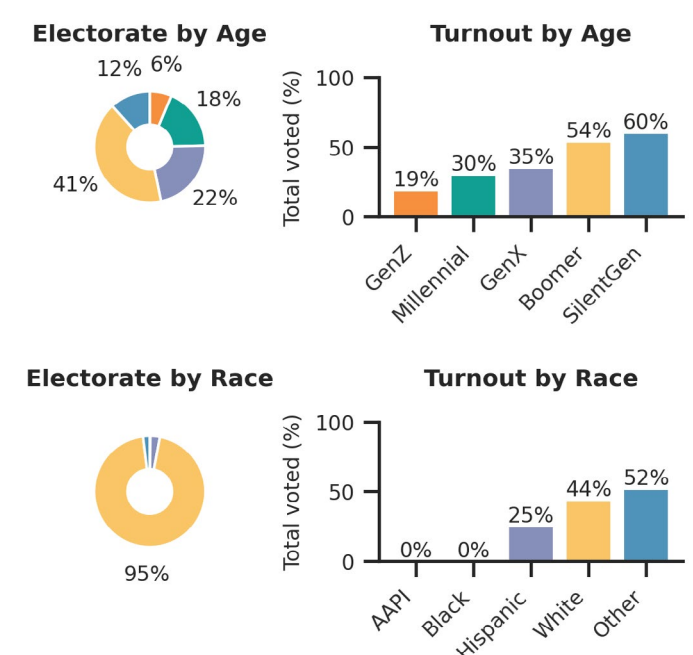


**Fig 2** Election results in Long Beach for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

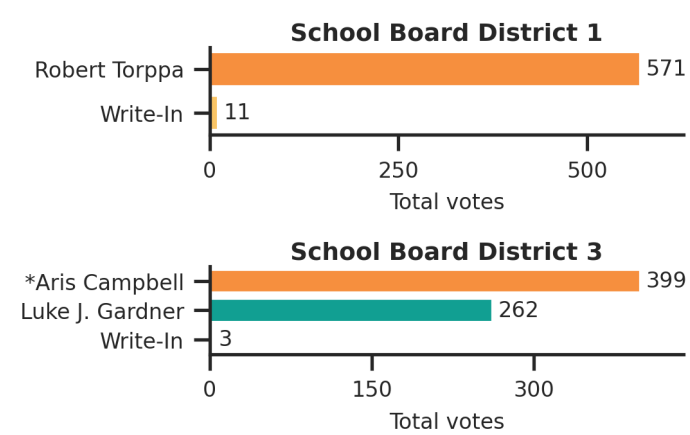

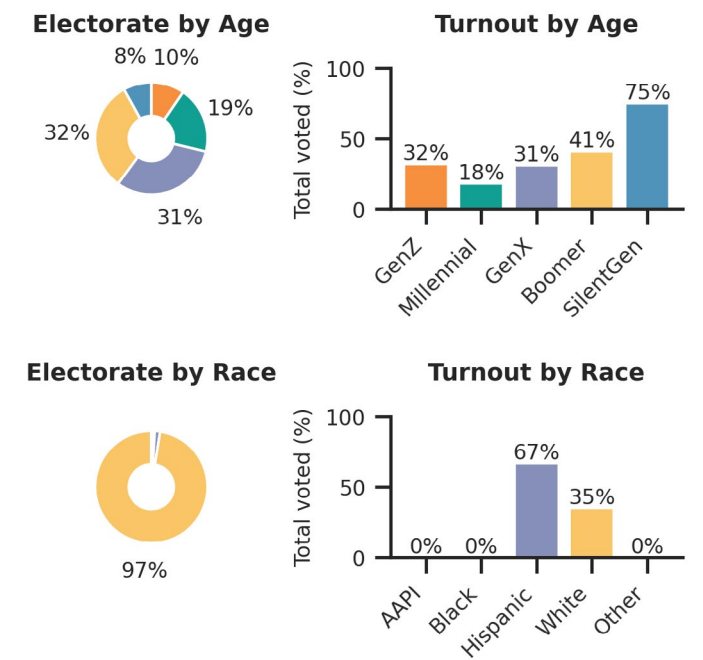


**Fig 2** Election results in Naselle-Grays River Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

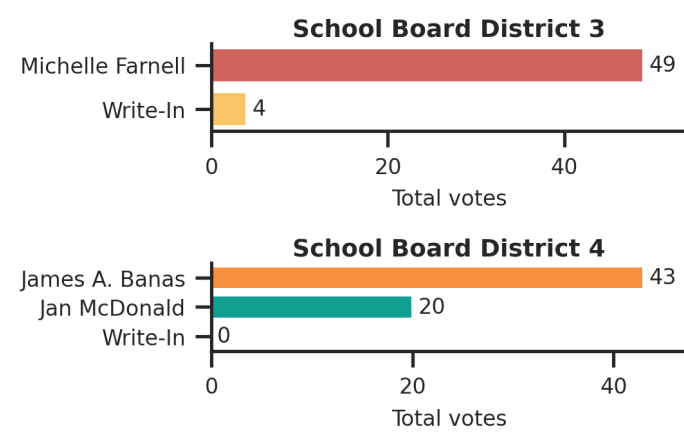

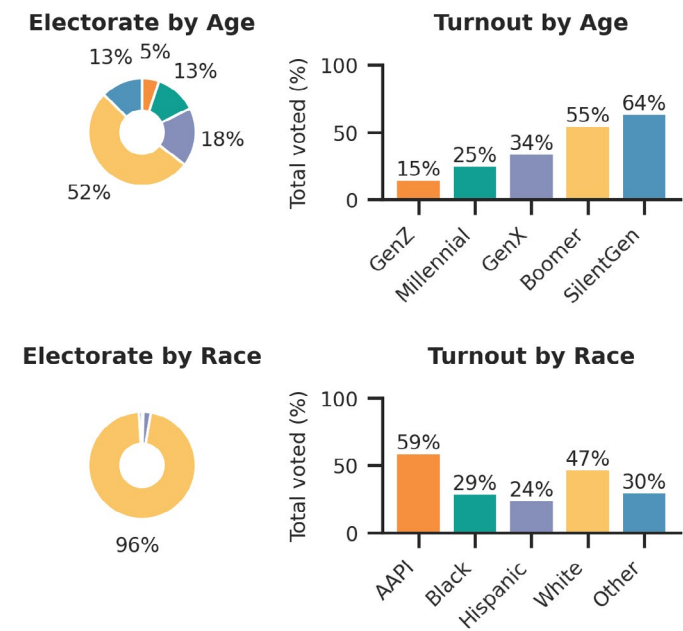


**Fig 2** Election results in North River School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

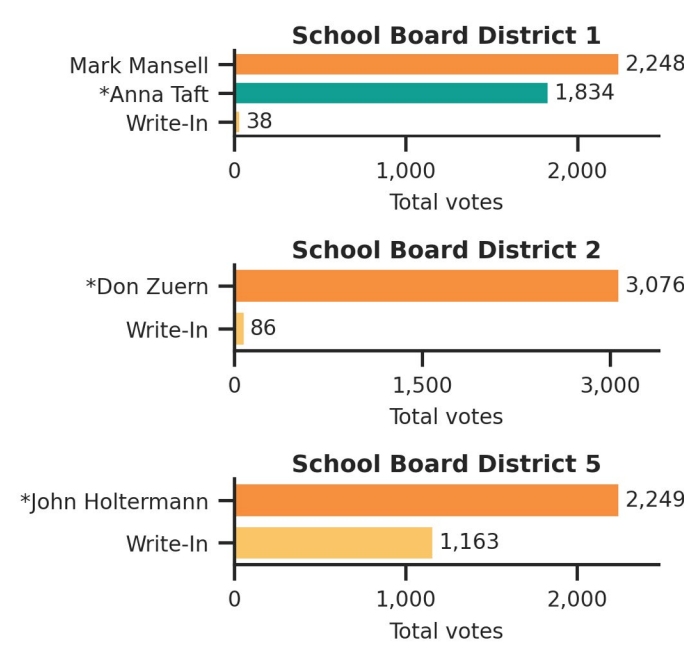

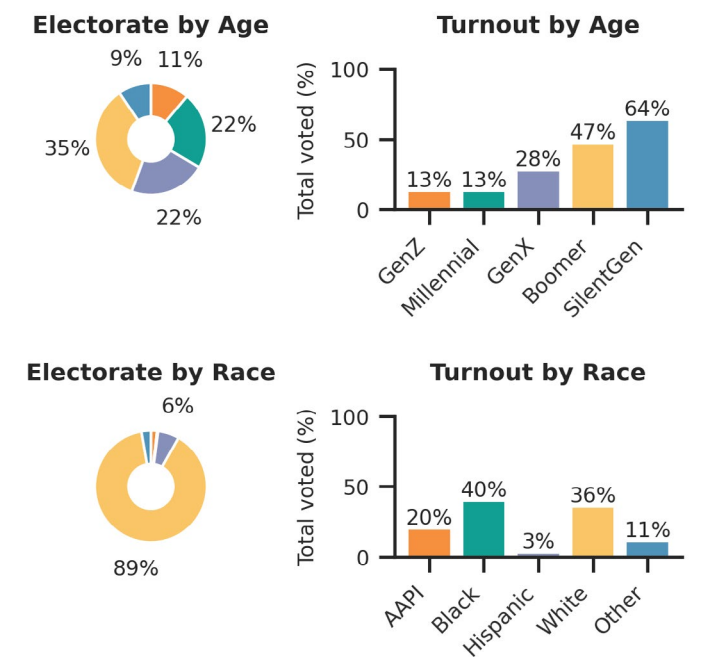


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Raymond for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

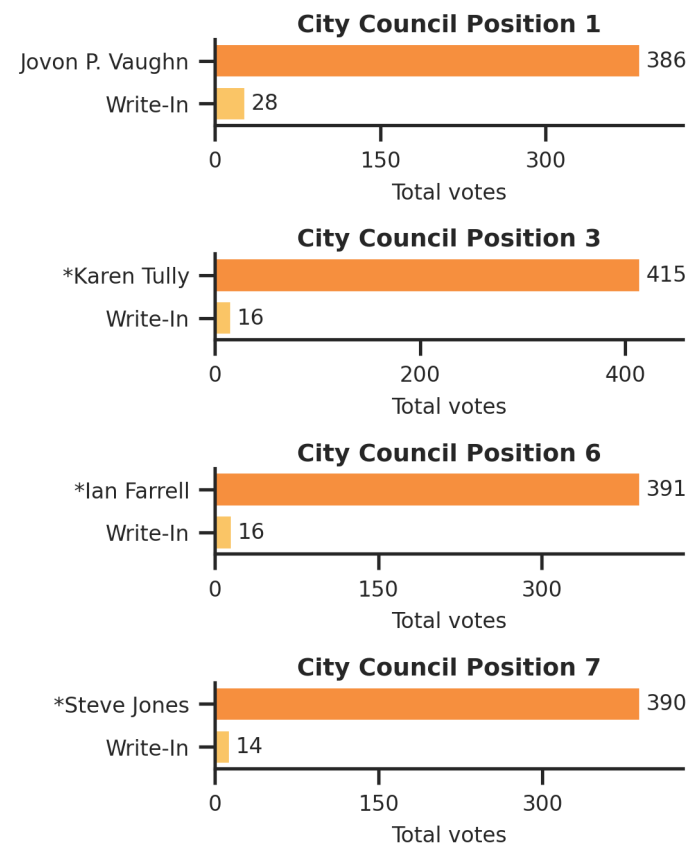


Fig 2 Election results in Raymond for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

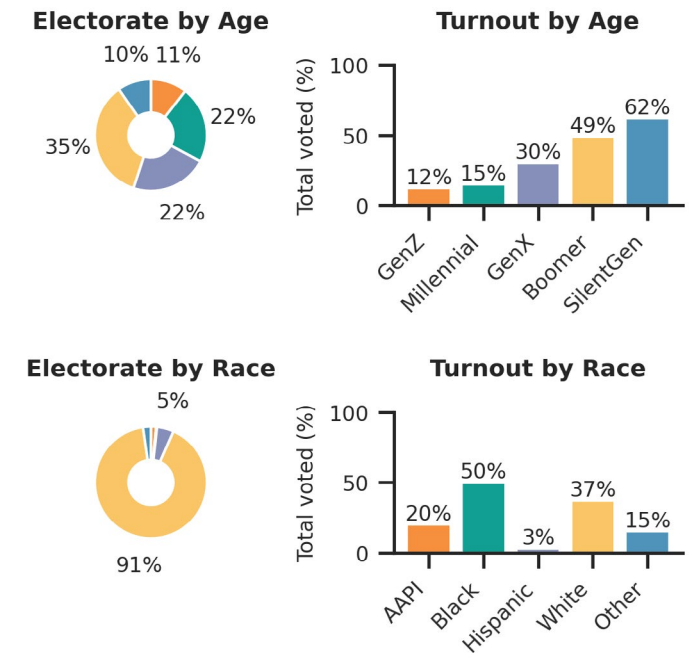


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Raymond School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

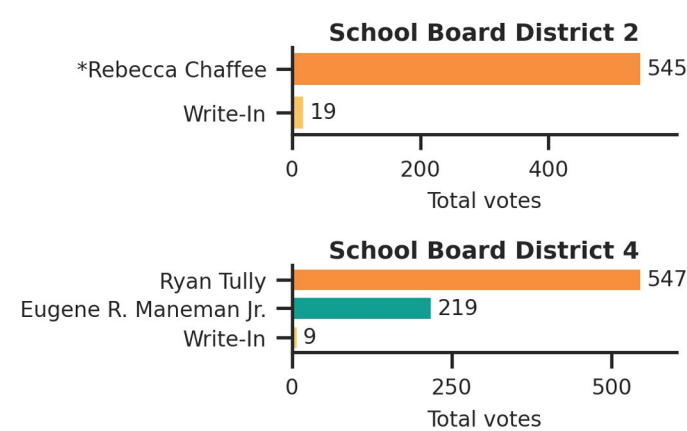


Fig 2 Election results in Raymond School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

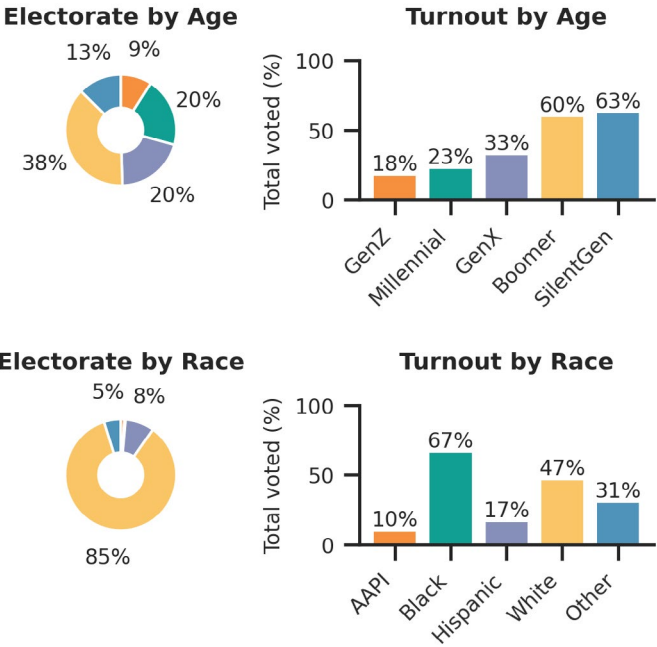


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in South Bend for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

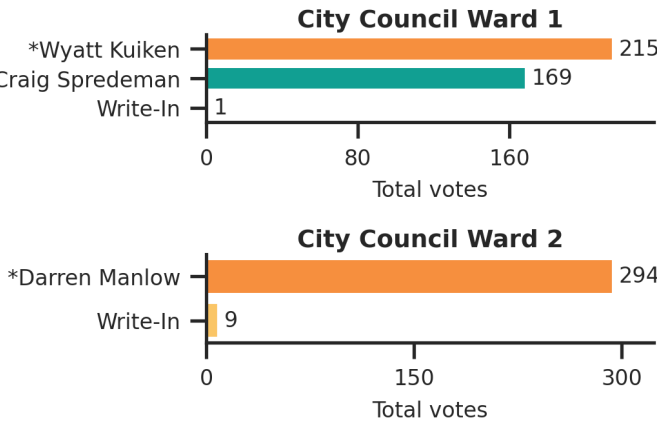


Fig 2 Election results in South Bend for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

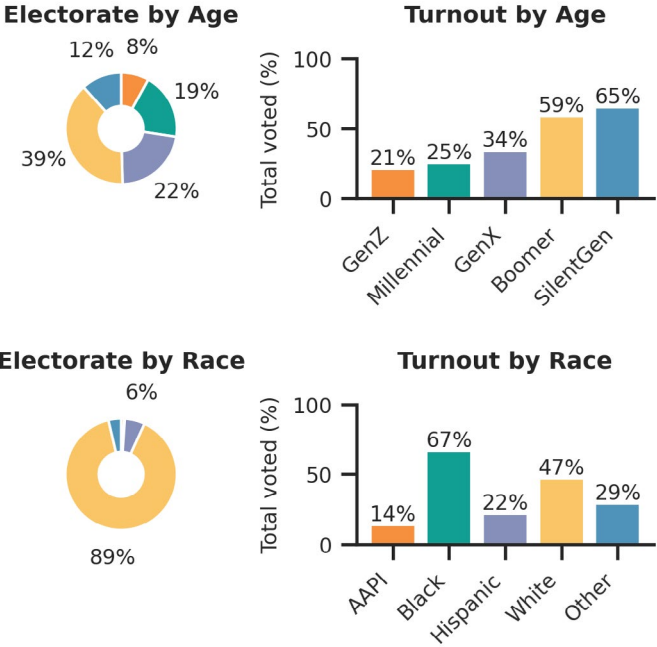


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in South Bend School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

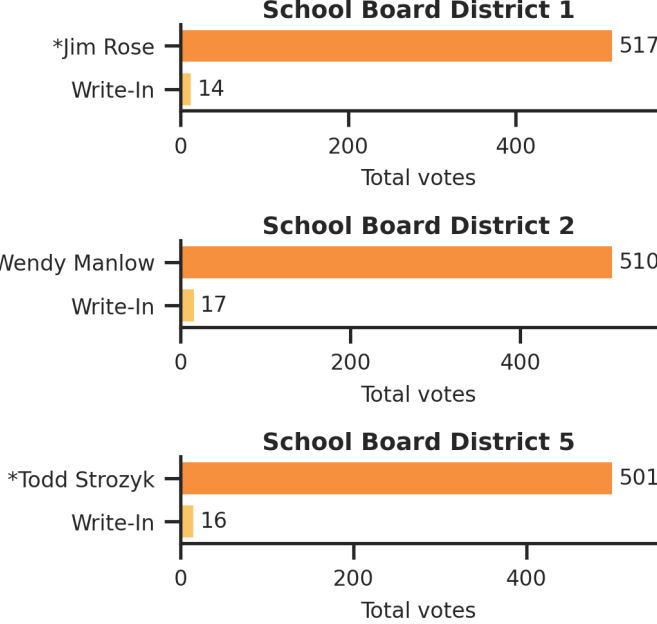
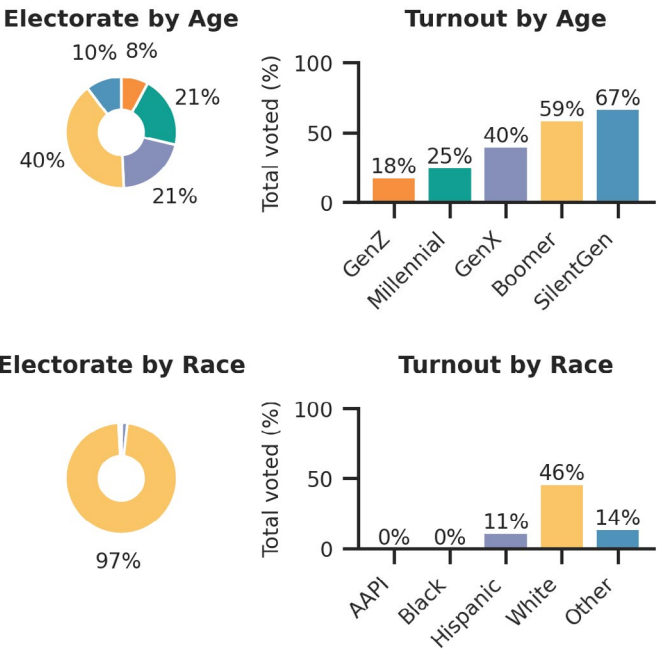


Fig 2 Election results in South Bend School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

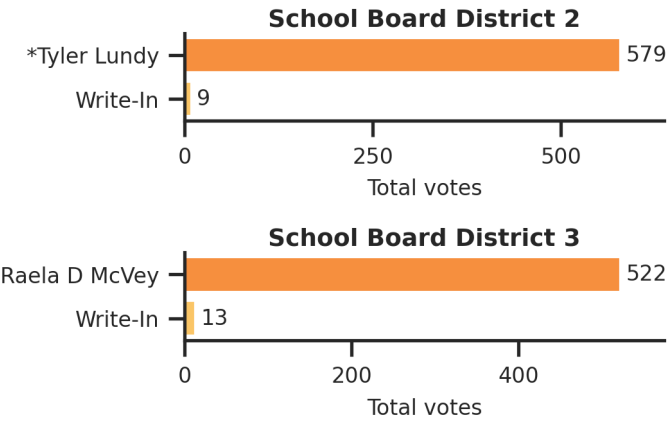

There are 461,836 registered voters in Southwestern Washington, including 14,288 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 29.2% – the lowest in the state. Across Southwestern Washington, voter turnout was highest in Wahkiakum County (47.7%), and lowest in Clark County (27.0%), Skamania County (30.4%), Cowlitz County (33.9%), and Lewis County (34.8%).

Young voters make up 26.0% of the electorate in Southwestern Washington (120,113 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 22.3% lower than older voters (12.7% vs 35.0%). The electorate in Southwestern Washington is the second least racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for just 9.4% of the electorate, and turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 17.1% lower than White voters (13.7% vs 30.8%). From mid-August to mid-November, four WCA Data Hub partners were active in Southwestern Washington, making a total of 119,812 contact attempts to 59,244 unique voters (~0.26 attempts per voter). This included 137 door knocks, 31,443 phone calls, 26,038 text messages, and 62,194 mailers.

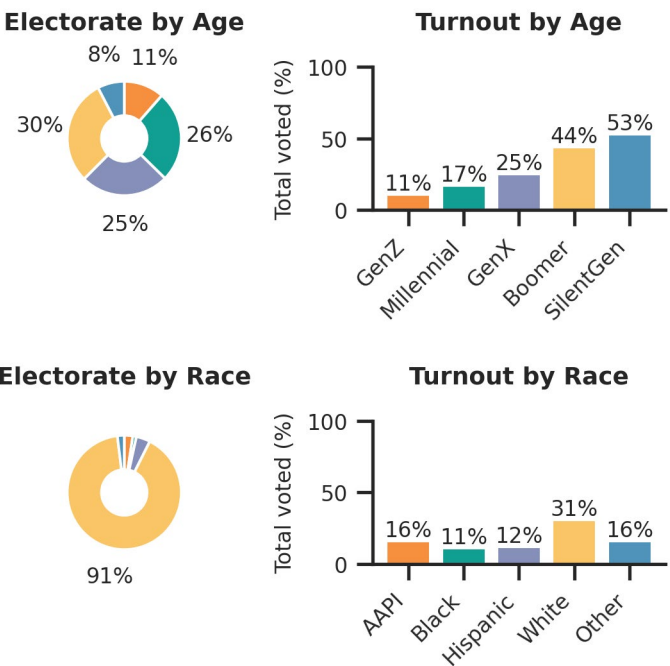


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Southwestern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

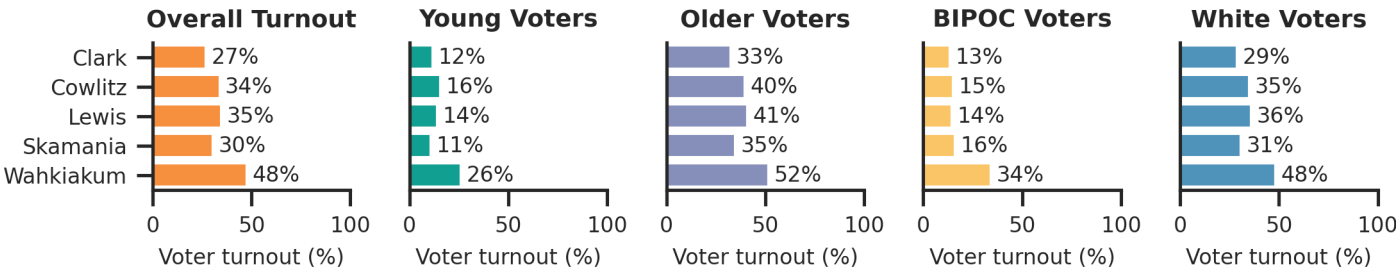


Fig 2 Voter turnout by county in Southwestern Washington for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

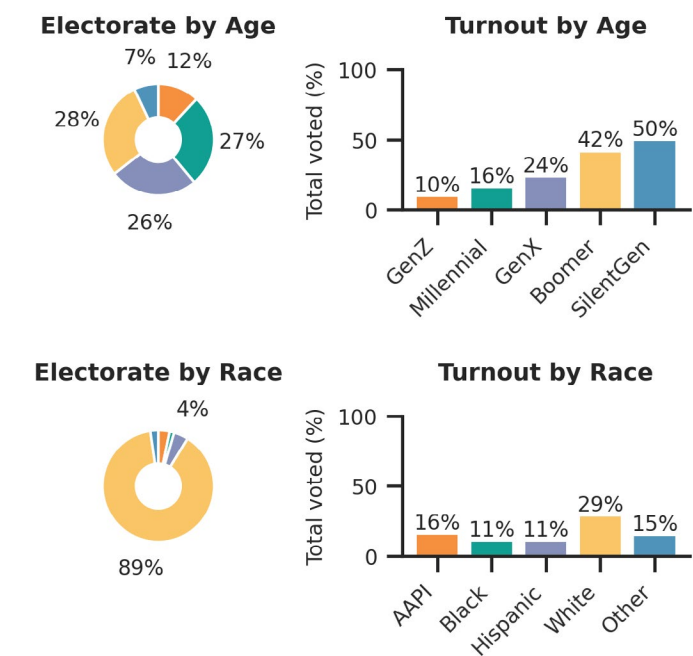


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Clark County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

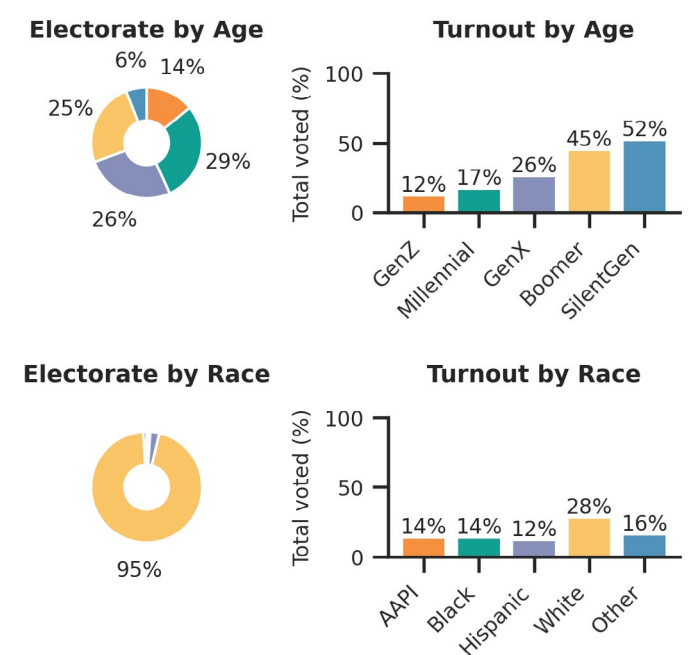


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Battle Ground for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

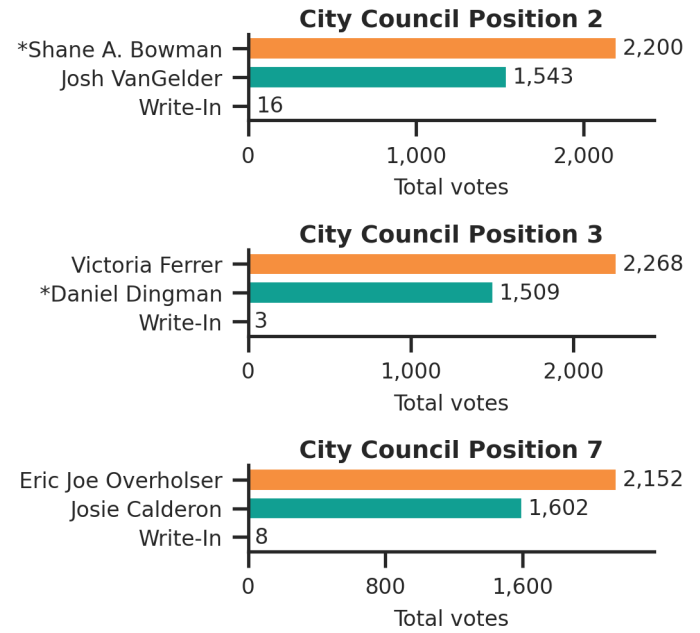


Fig 2 Election results in Battle Ground for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

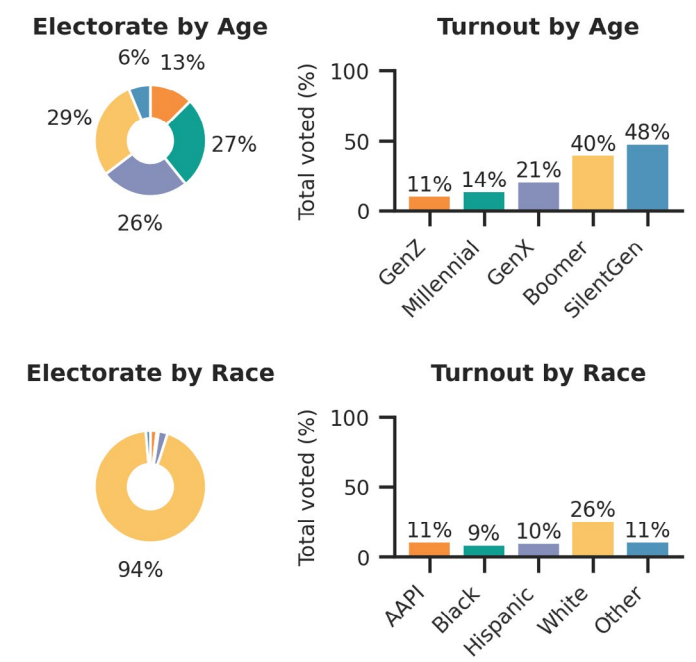


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Battle Ground School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

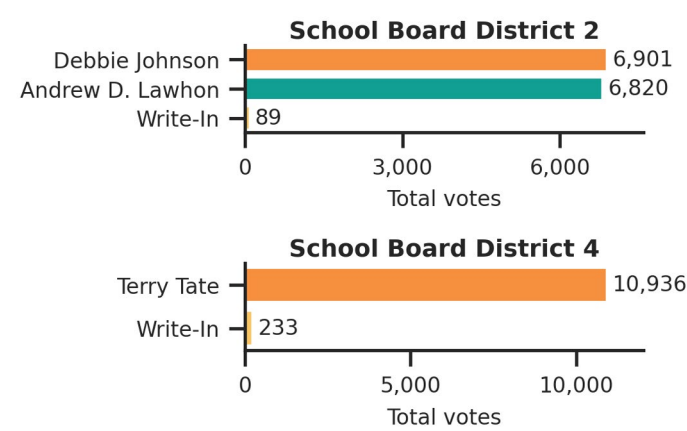


Fig 2 Election results in Battle Ground School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

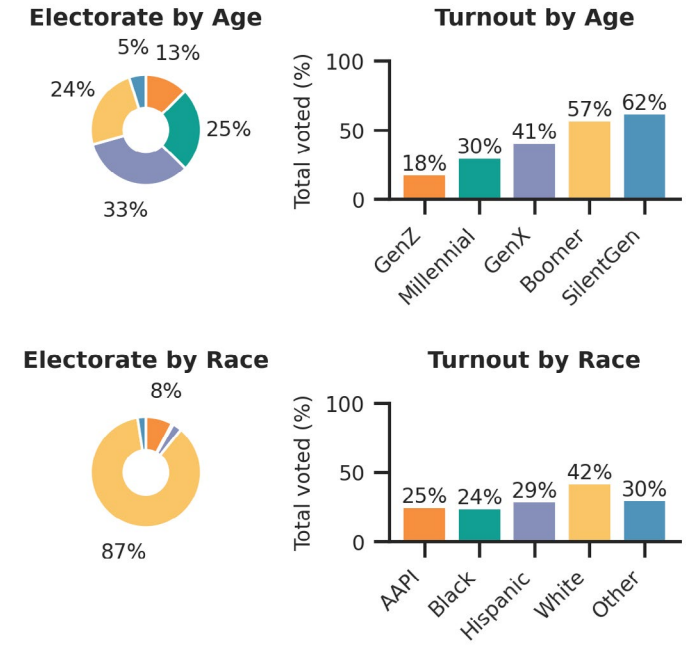


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Camas for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

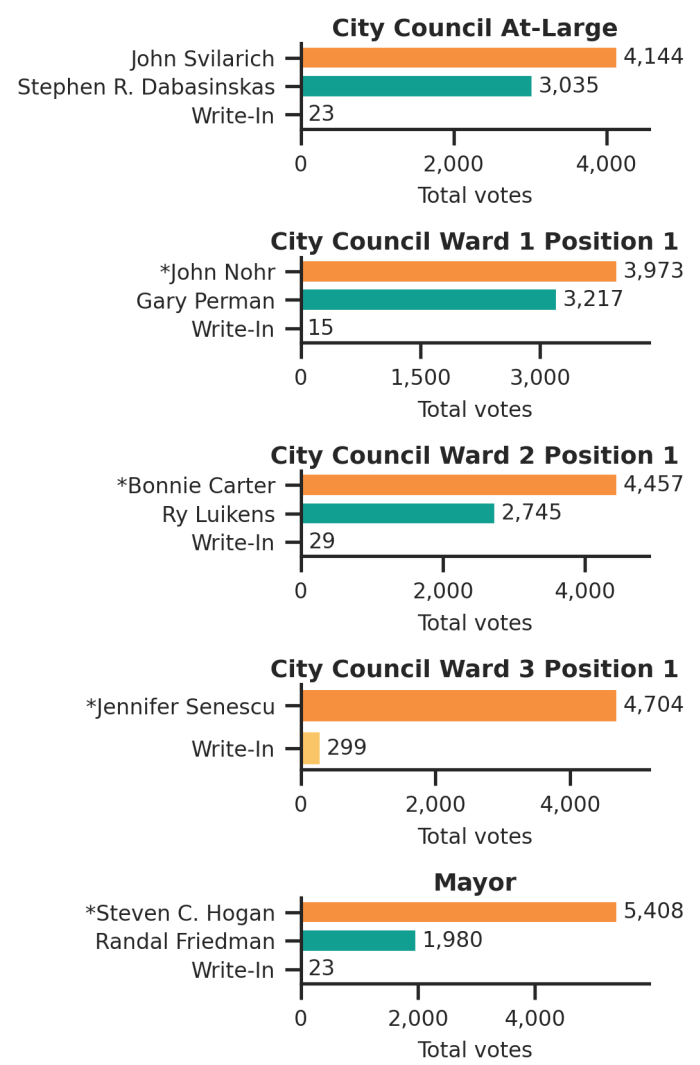


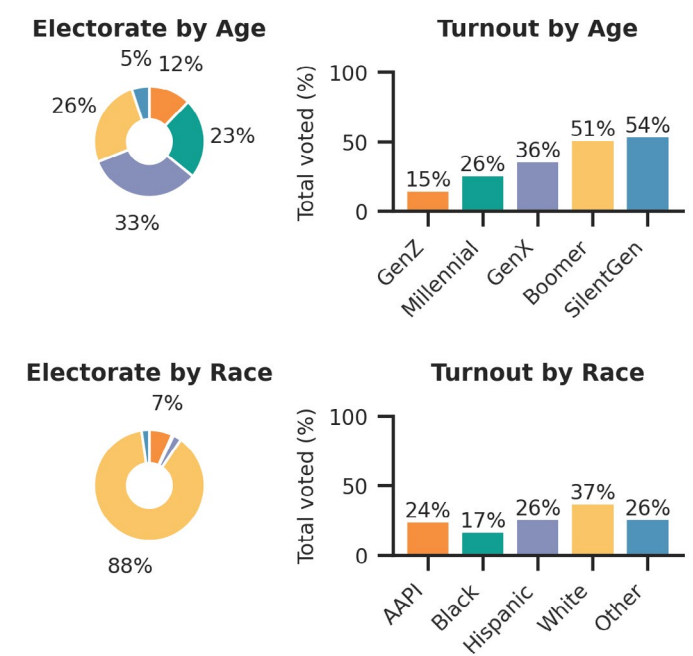
Fig 2 Election results in Camas for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

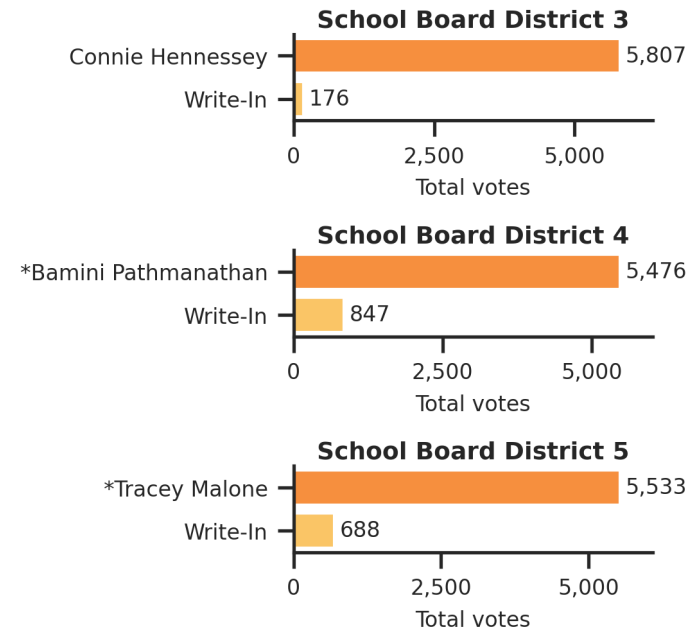

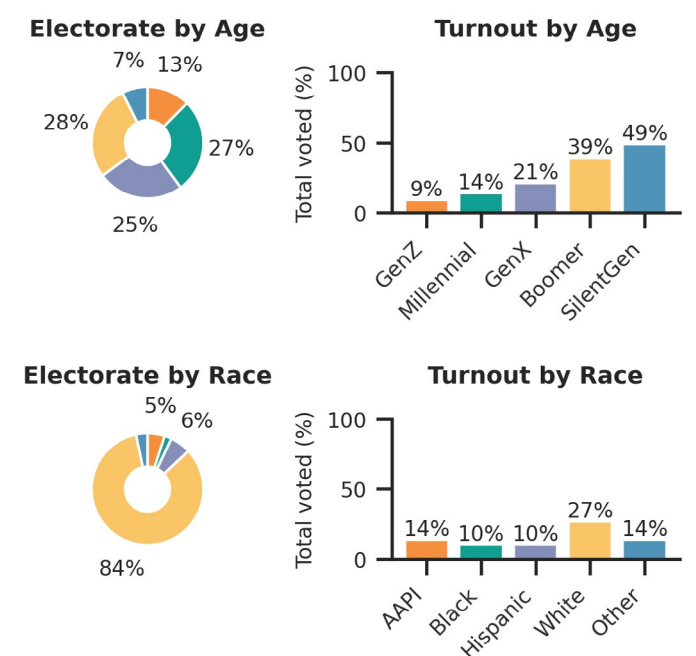


**Fig 2** Election results in Camas School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

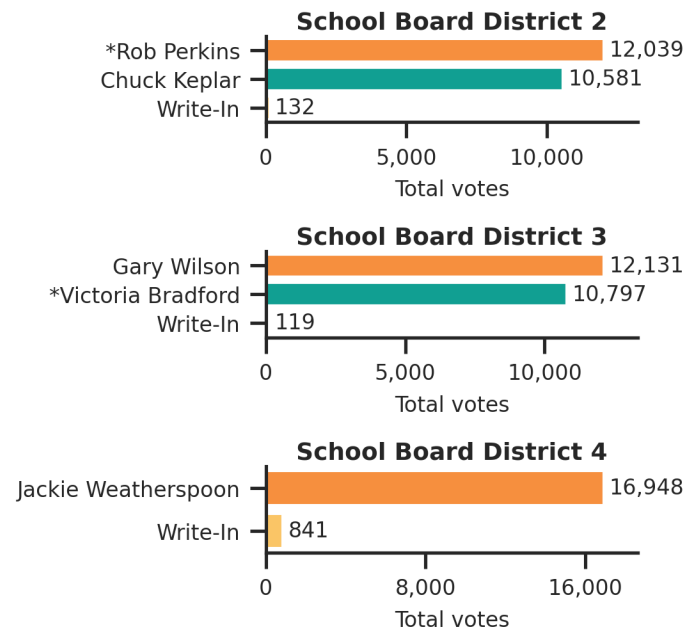

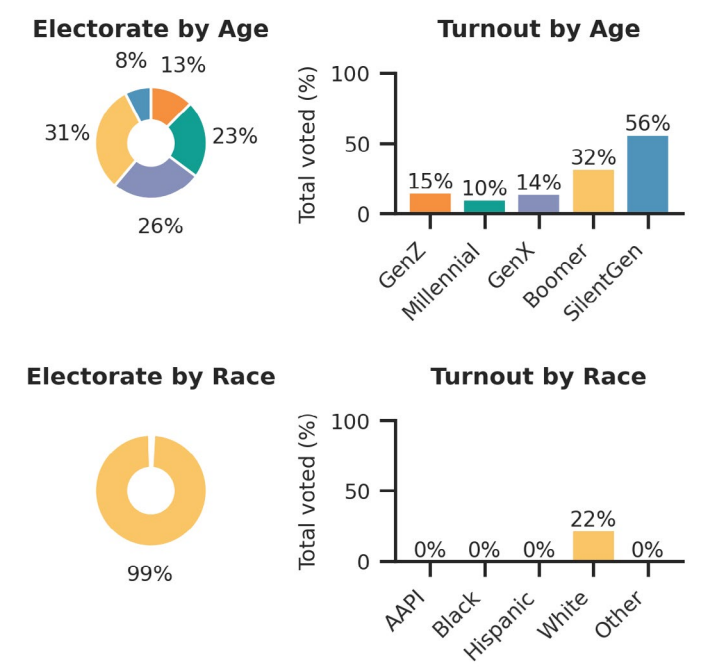


**Fig 2** Election results in Evergreen School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

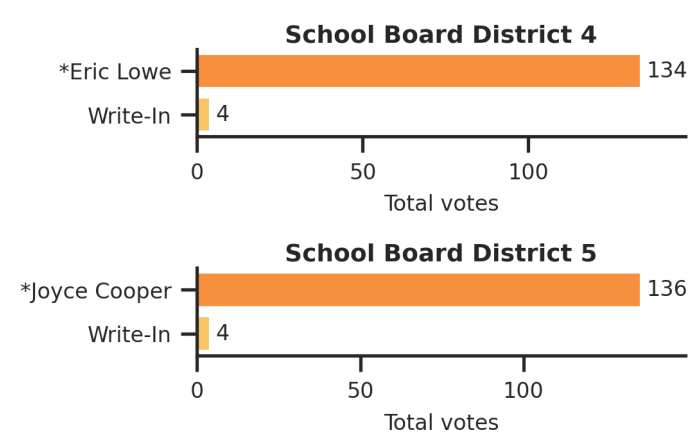

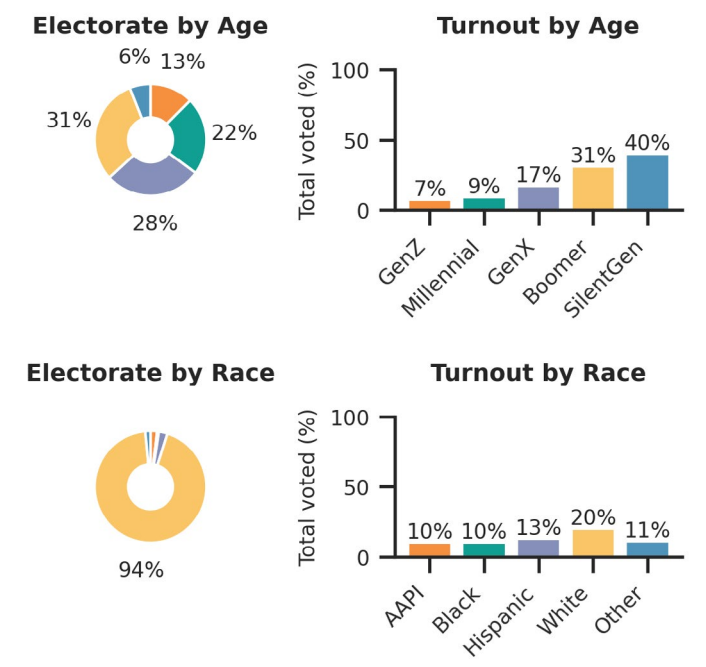


**Fig 2** Election results in Green Mountain School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

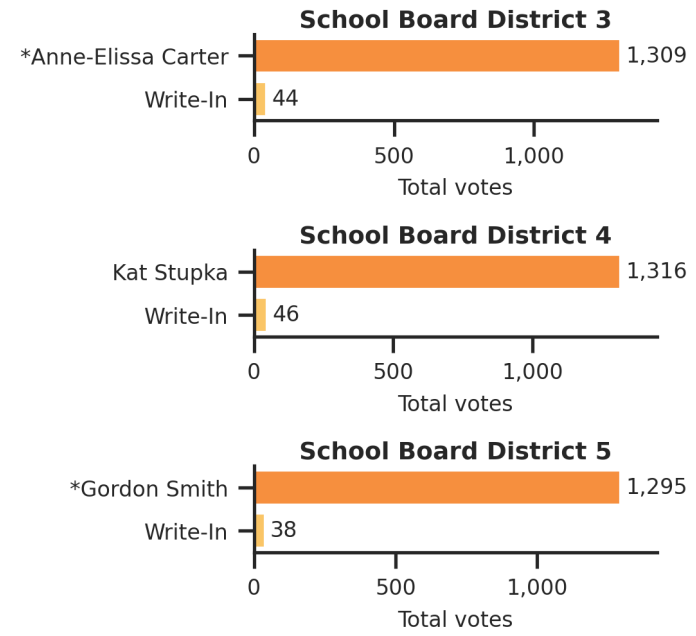

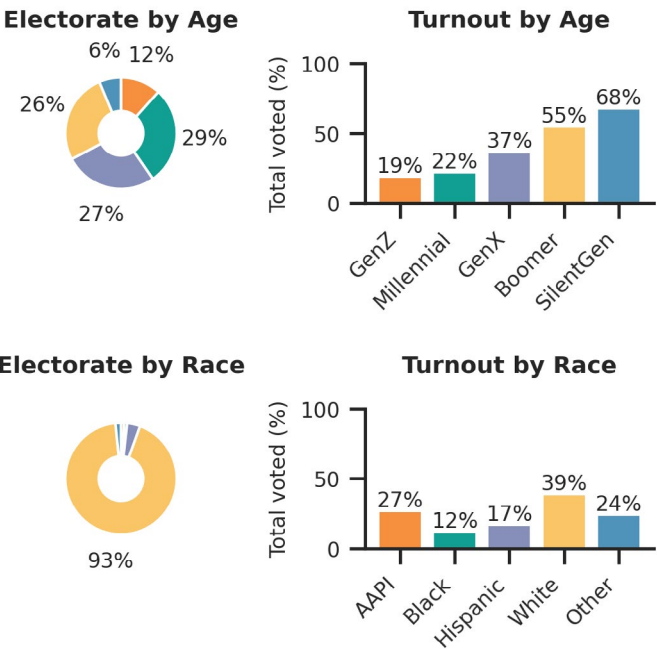


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in La Center for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

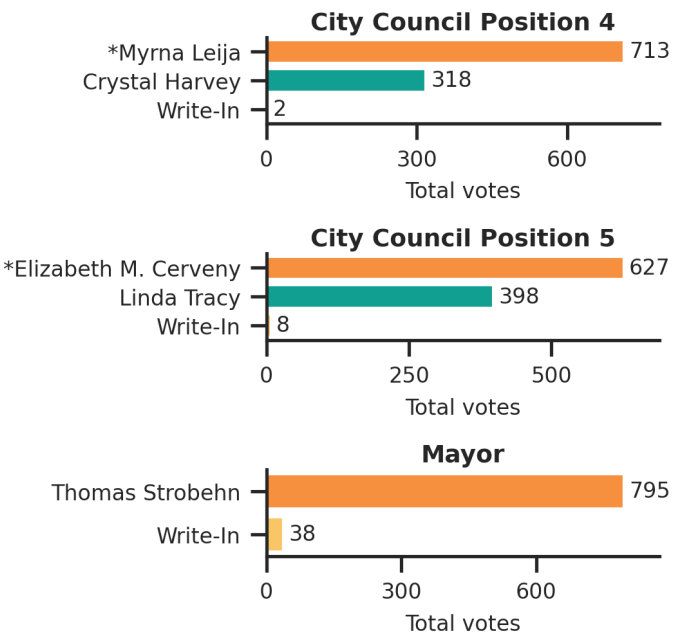


Fig 2 Election results in La Center for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

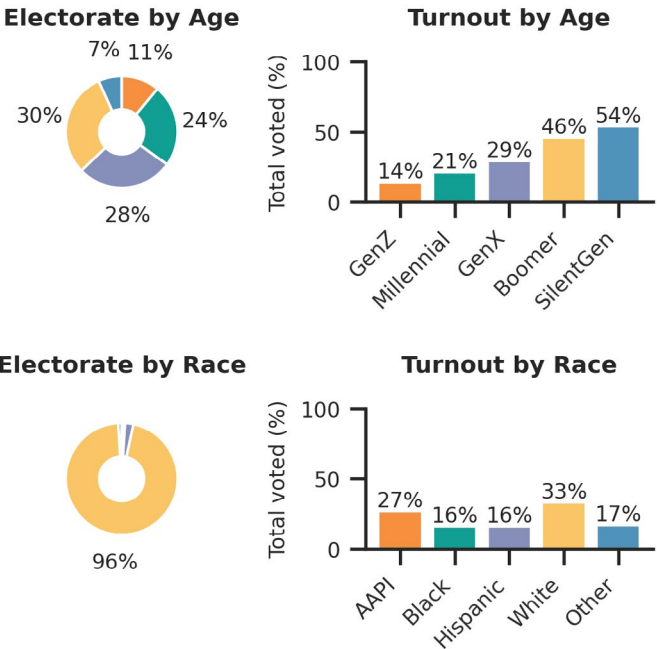


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in La Center School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

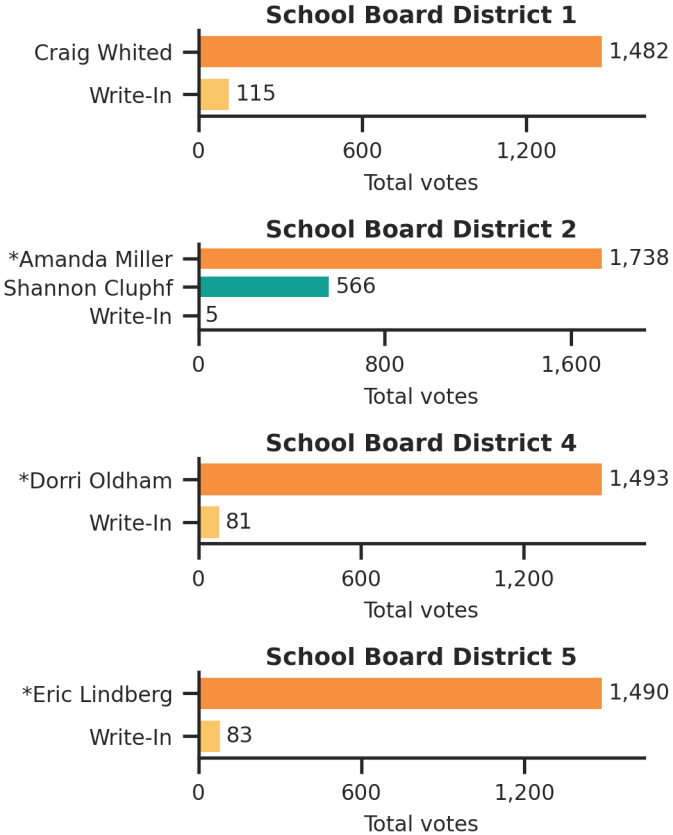


Fig 2 Election results in La Center School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

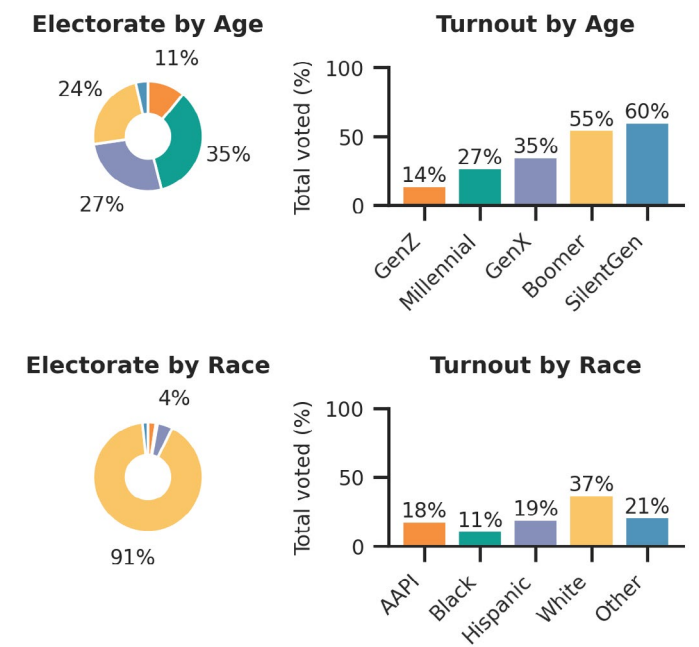


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ridgefield for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

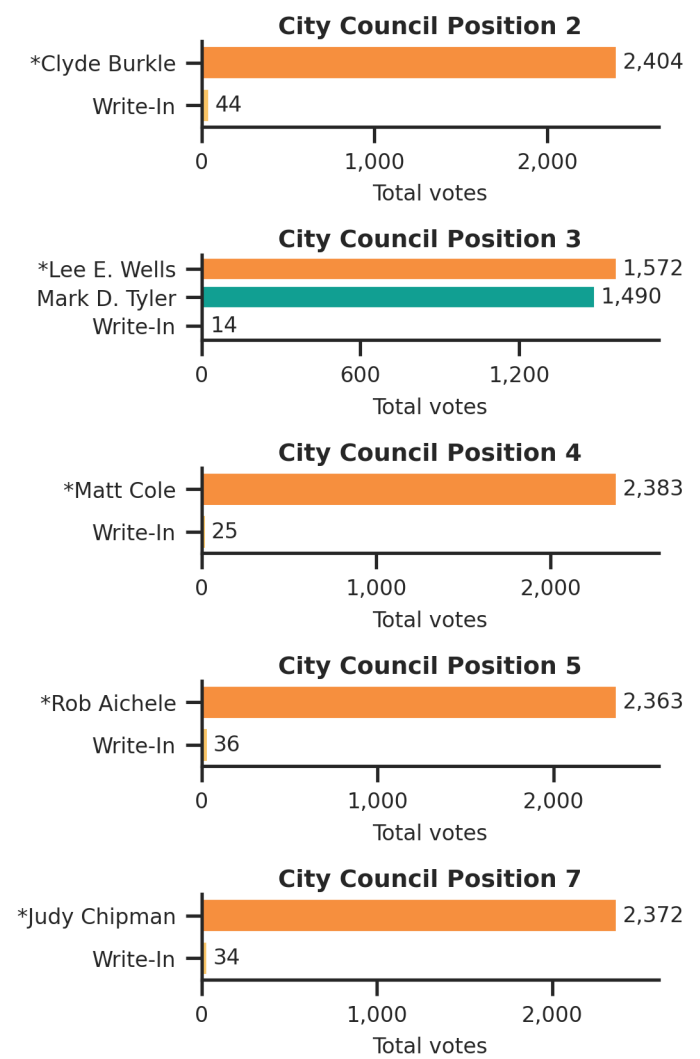


Fig 2 Election results in Ridgefield for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

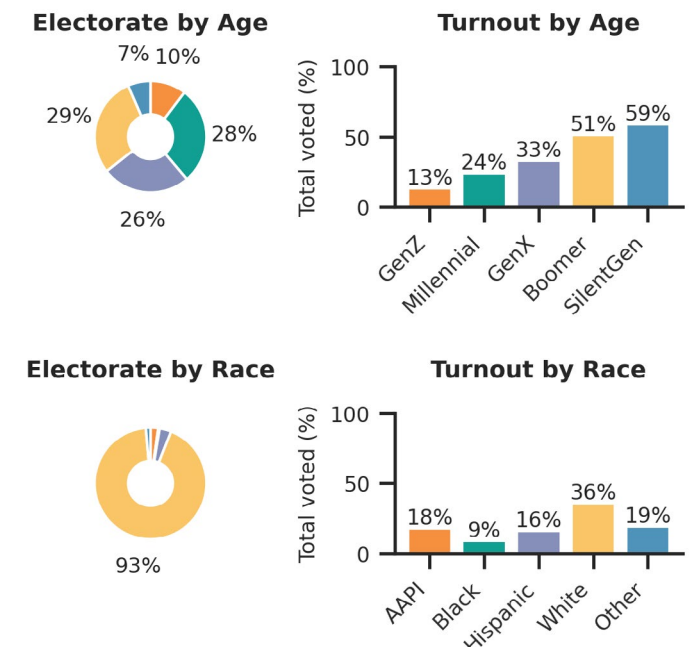


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Ridgefield School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

Election results

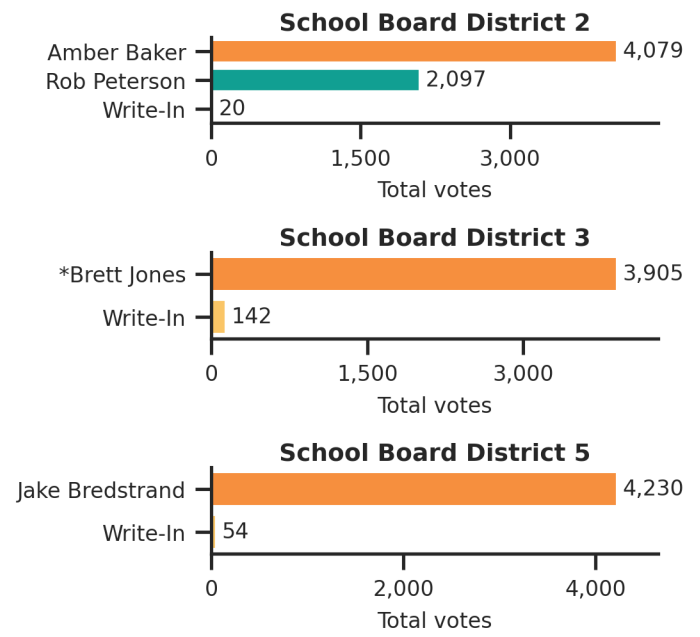


Fig 2 Election results in Ridgefield School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

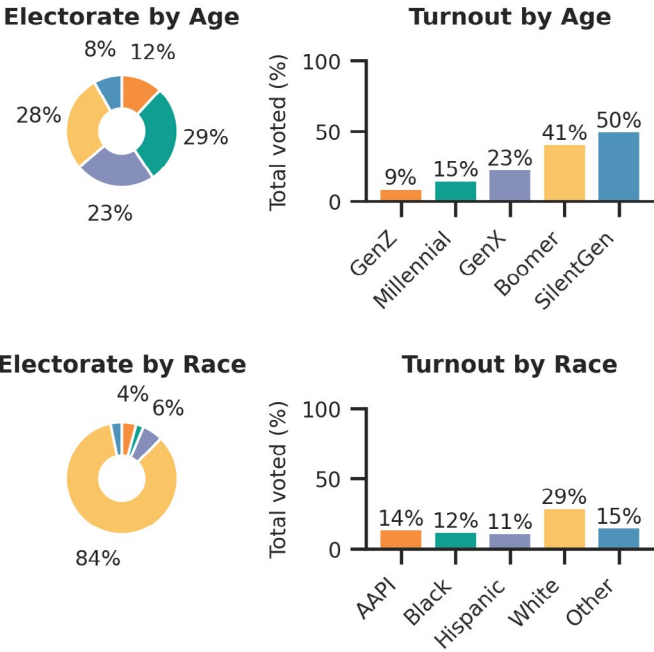


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Vancouver for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

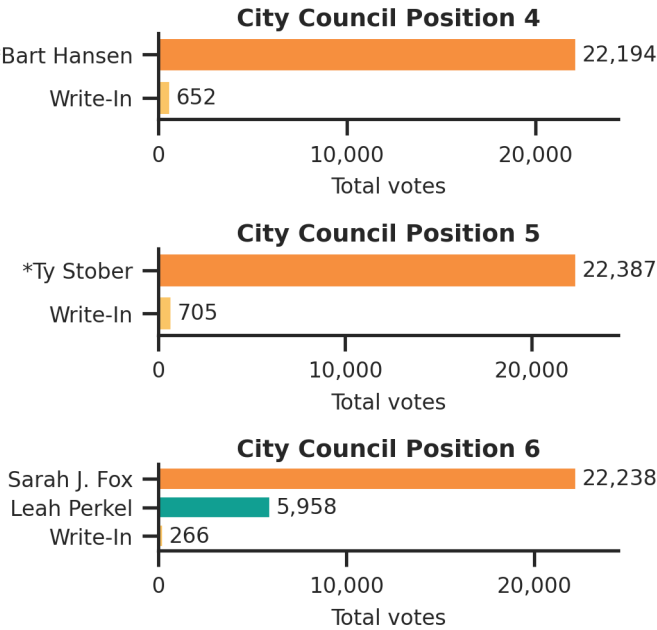


Fig 2 Election results in Vancouver for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

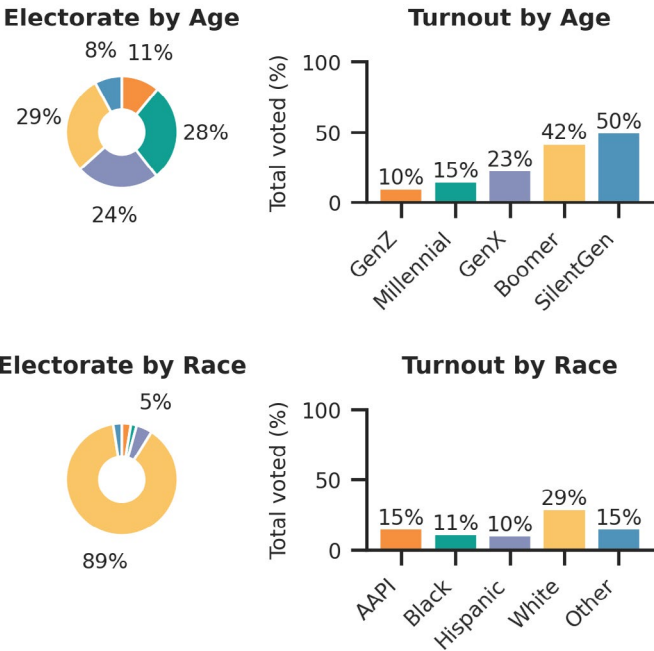


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Vancouver School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

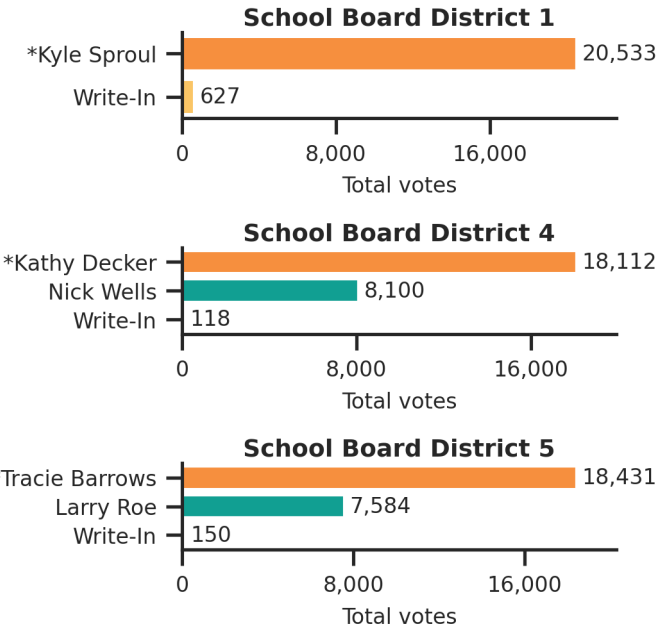


Fig 2 Election results in Vancouver School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

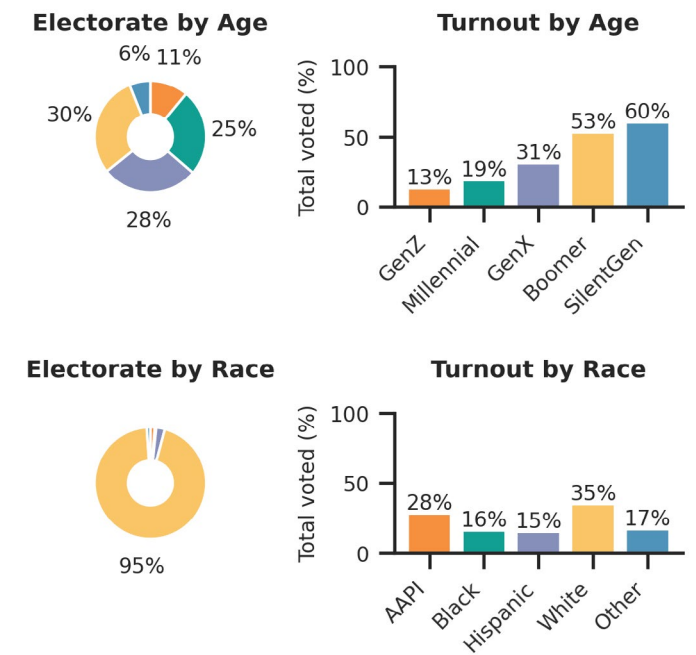


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Washougal for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

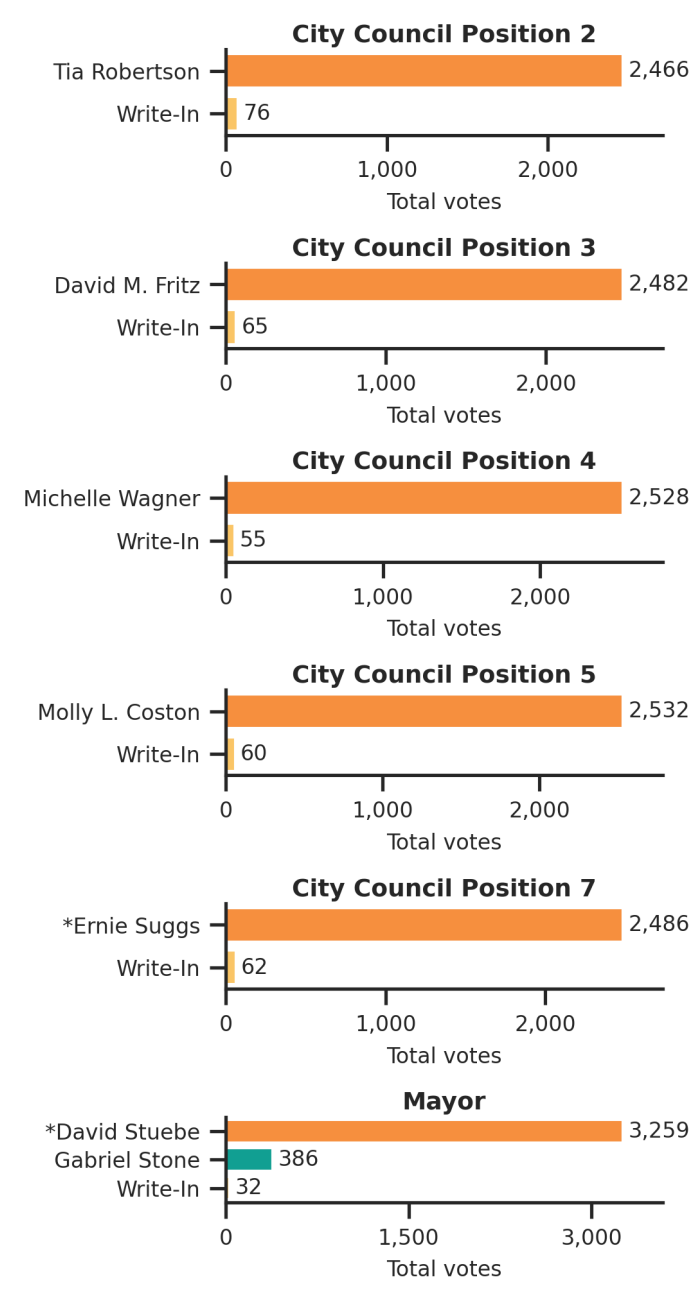


Fig 2 Election results in Washougal for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

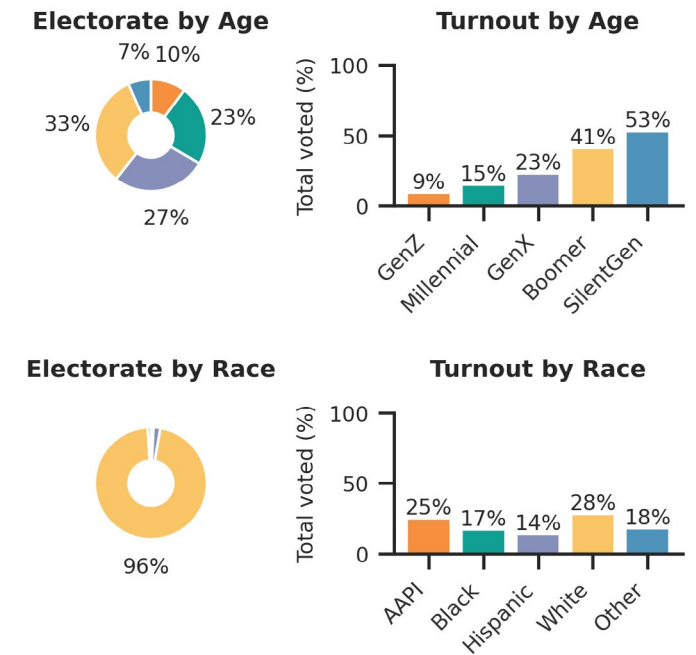


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Washougal School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

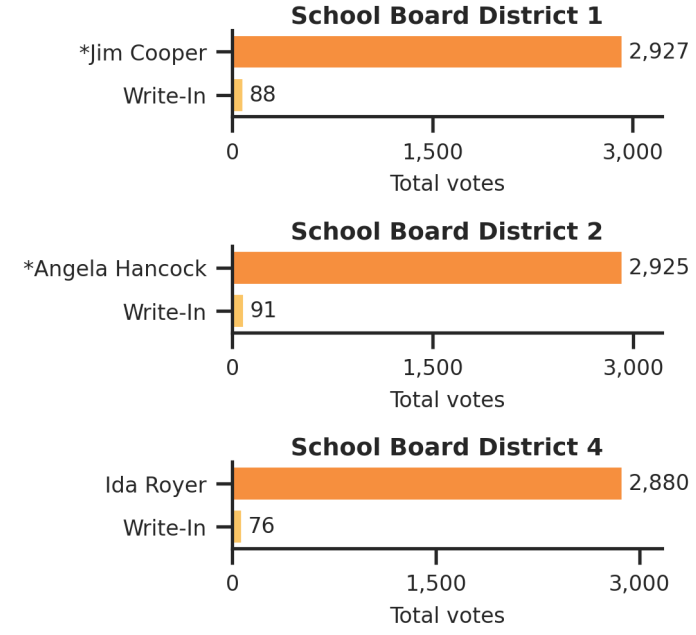


Fig 2 Election results in Washougal School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

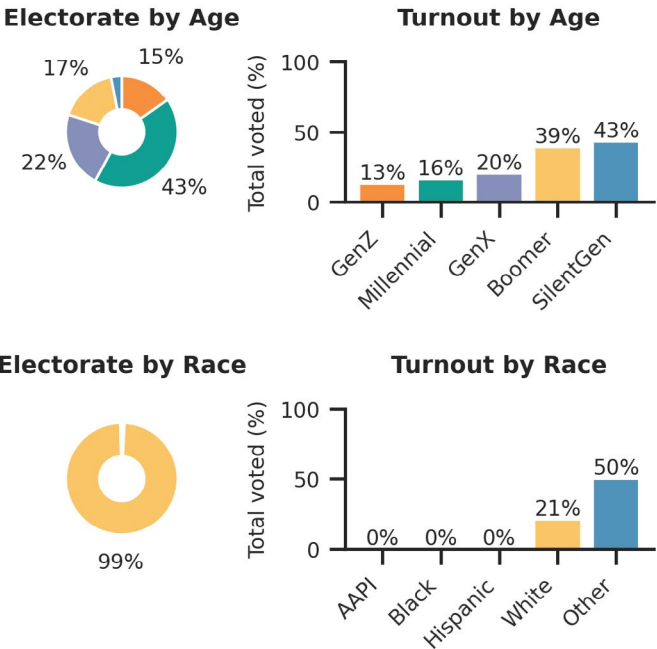


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Yacolt for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

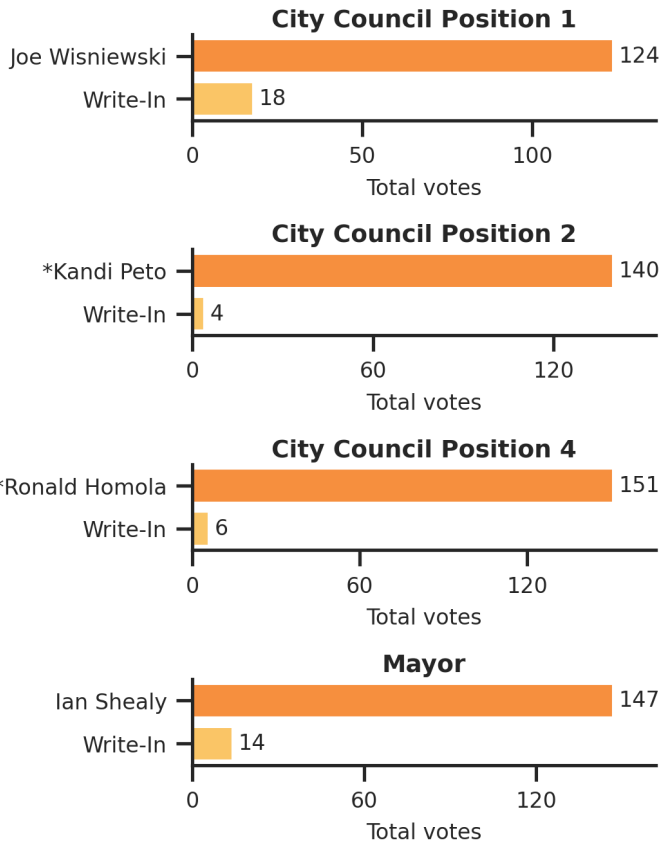


Fig 2 Election results in Yacolt for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

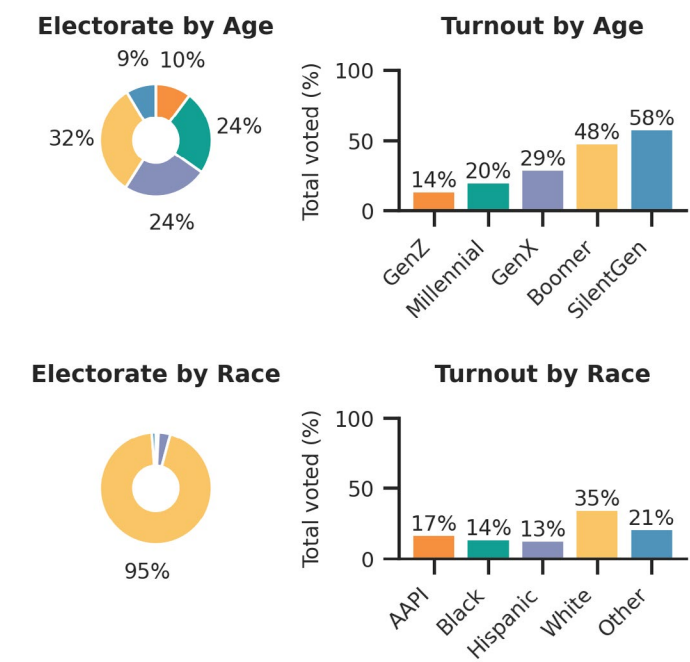


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cowlitz County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

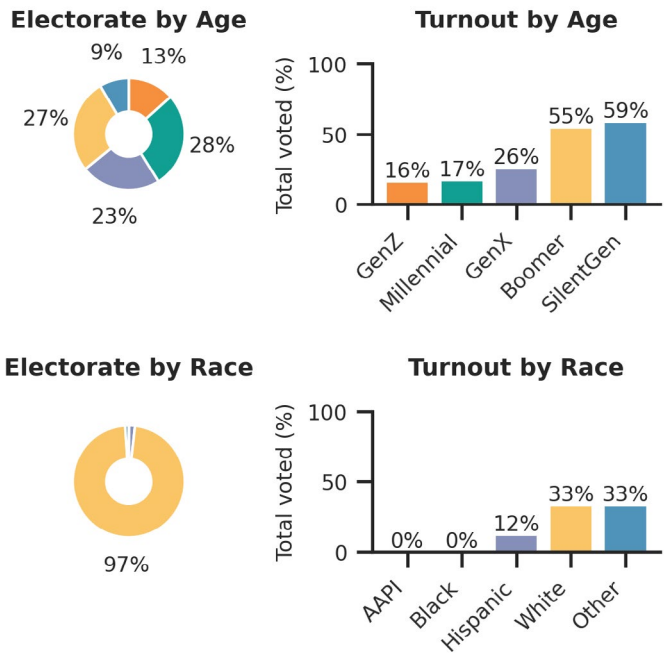


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Castle Rock for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

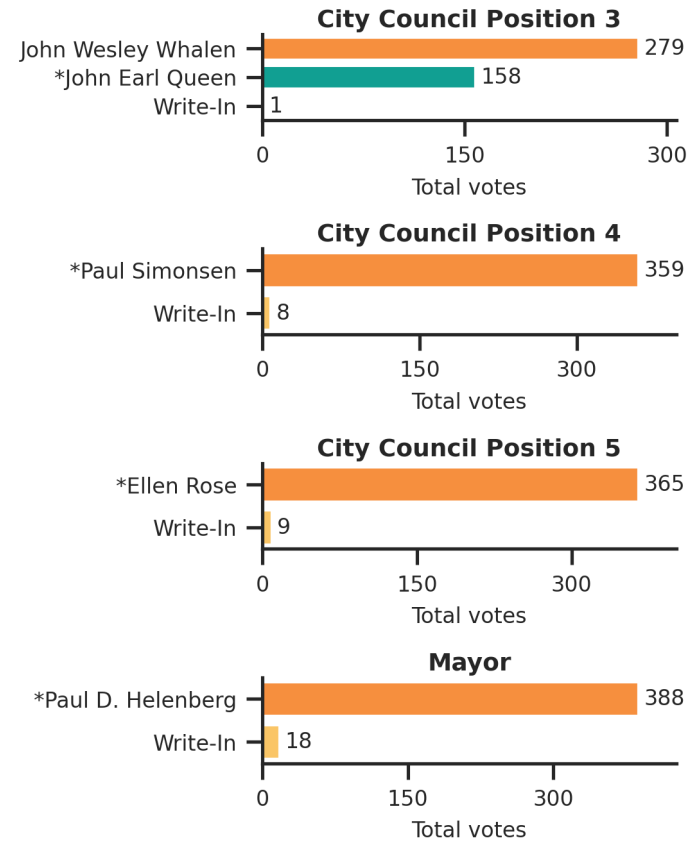
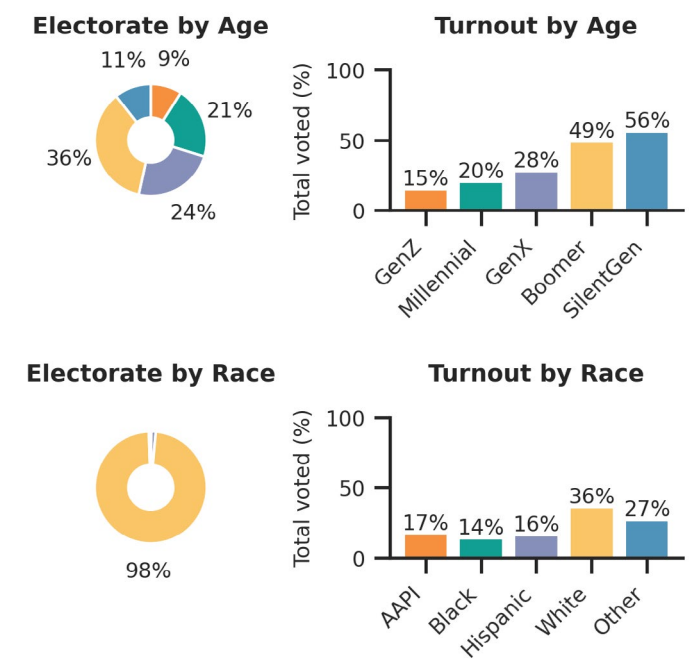


Fig 2 Election results in Castle Rock for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

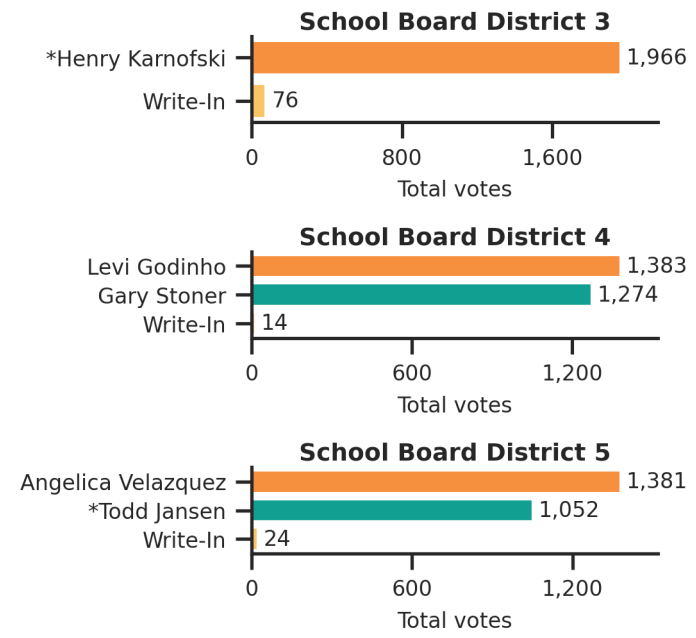

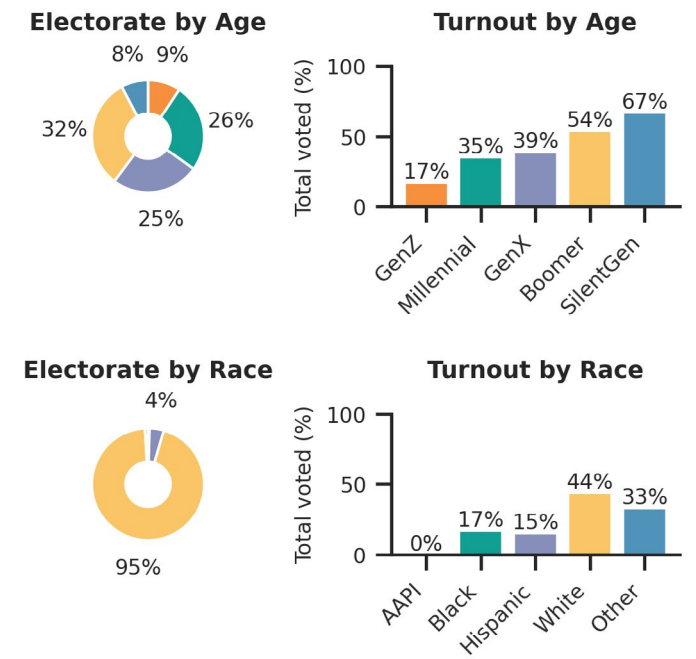

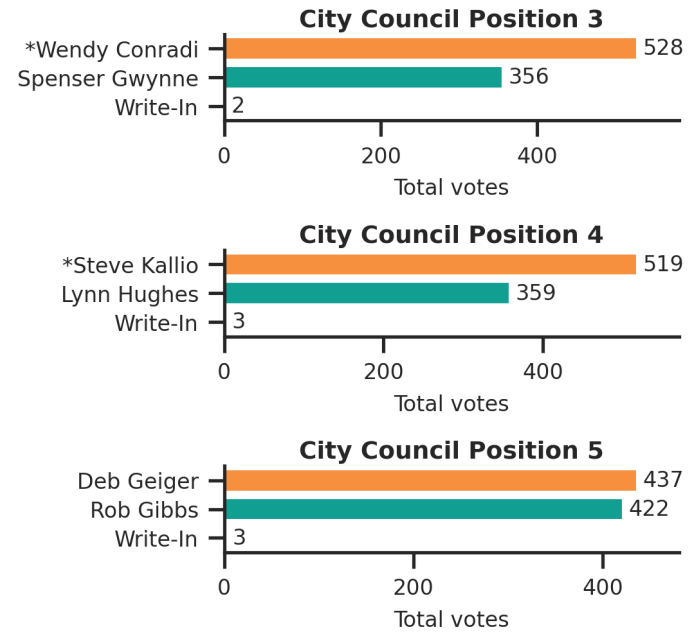

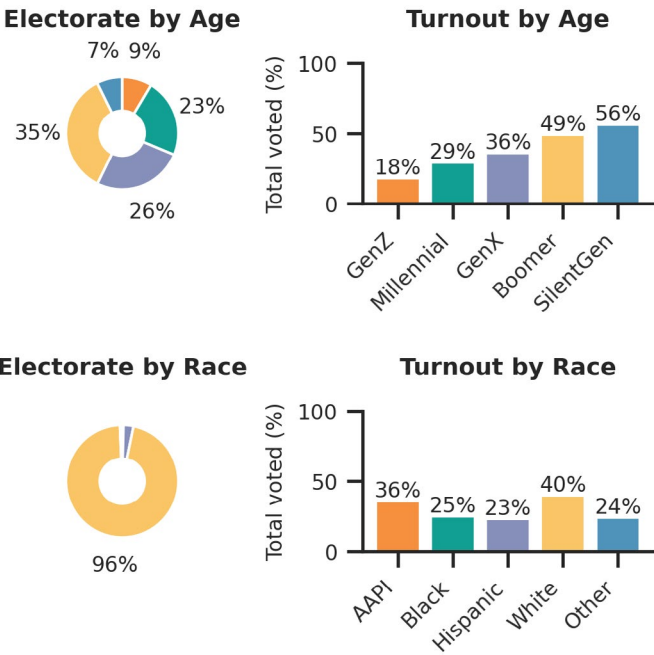

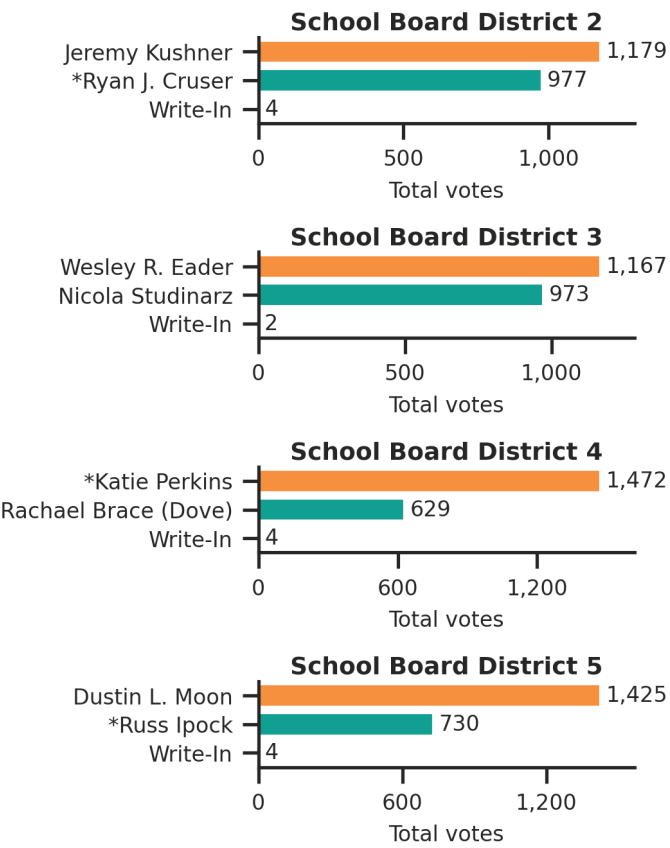

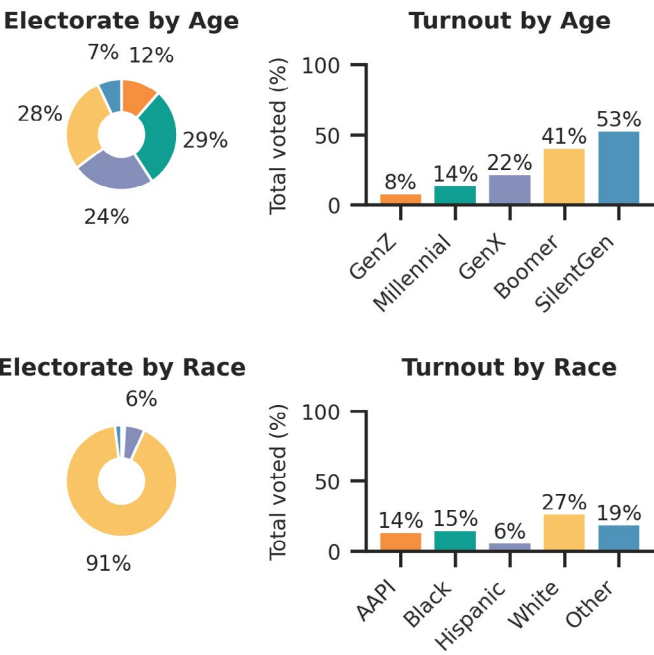

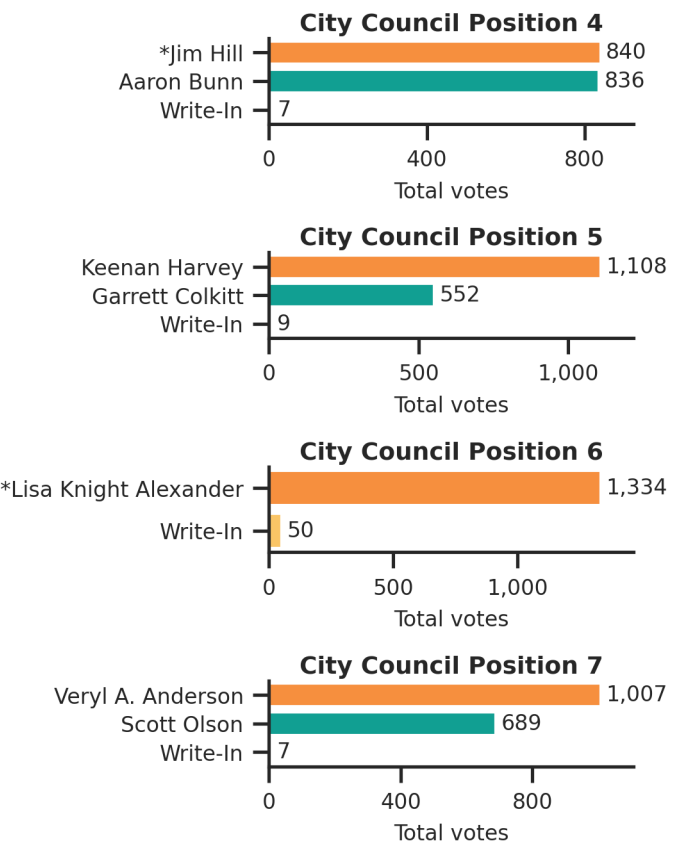

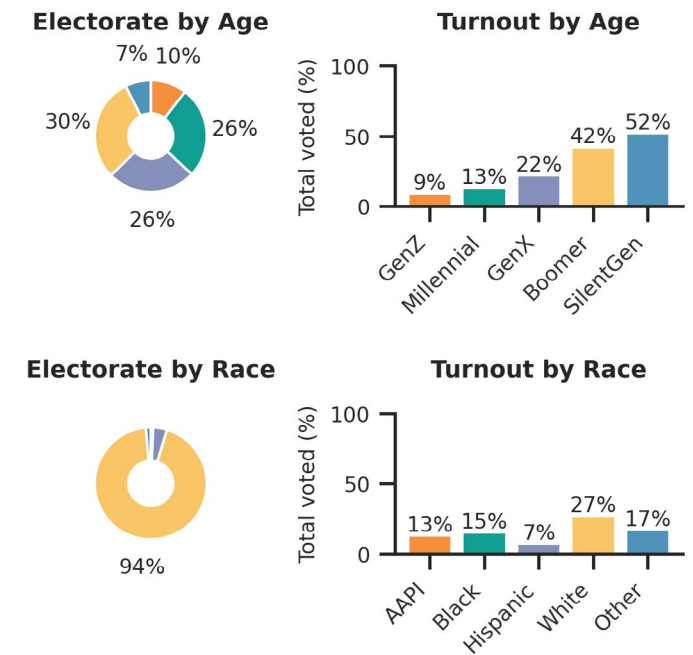


**Fig 2** Election results in Kelso for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

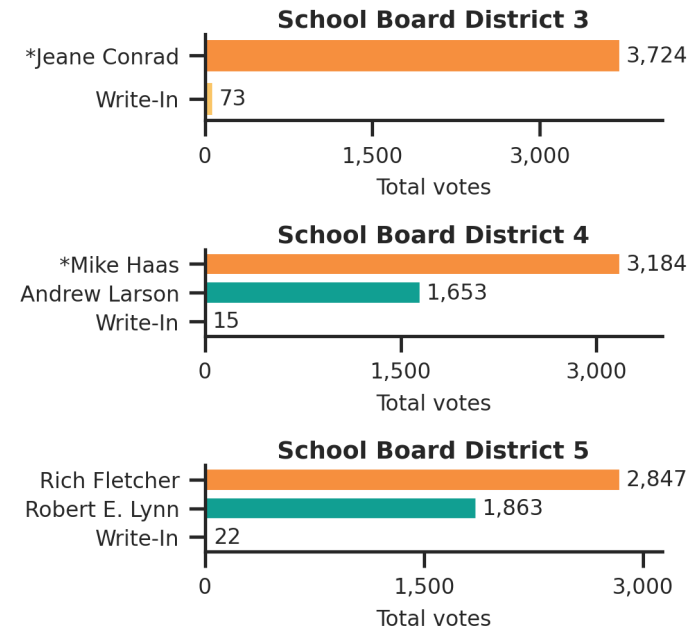

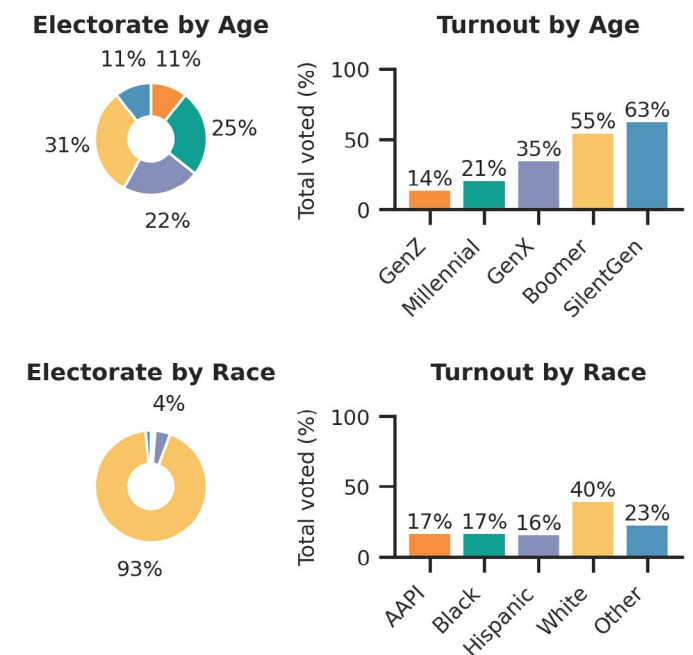

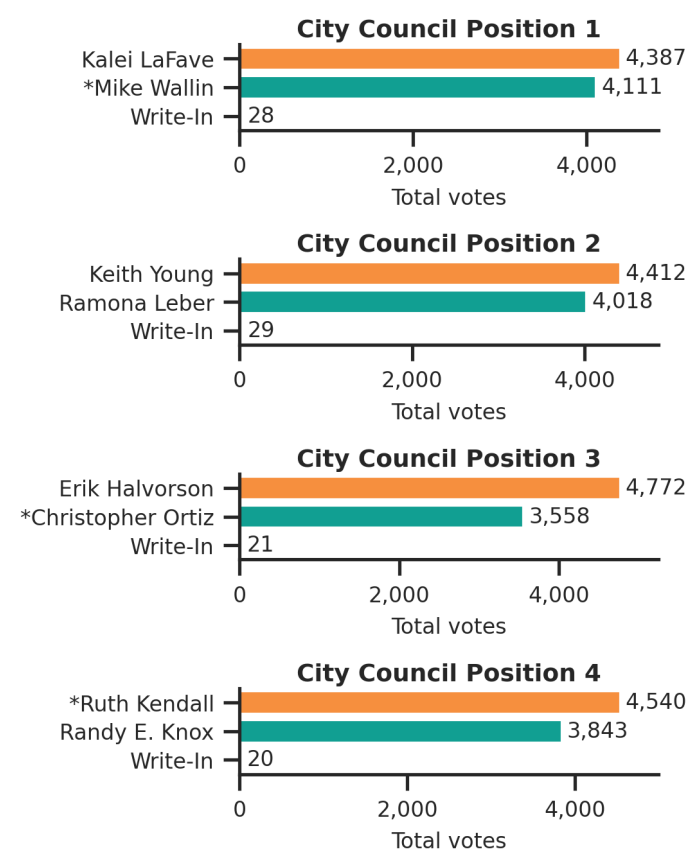

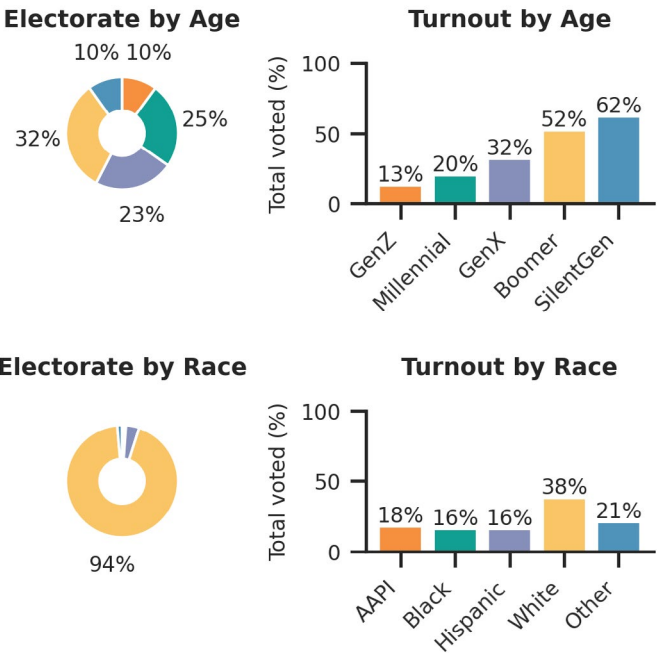


**Fig 2** Election results in Longview for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

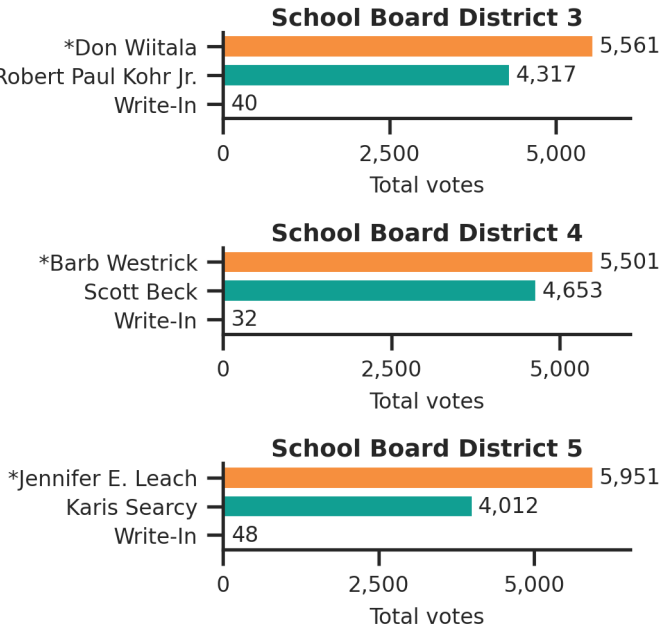

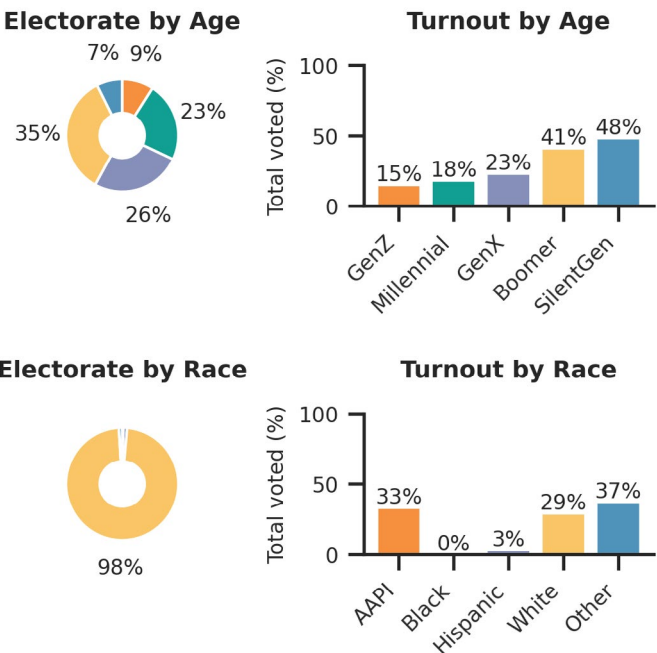


**Fig 2** Election results in Longview School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

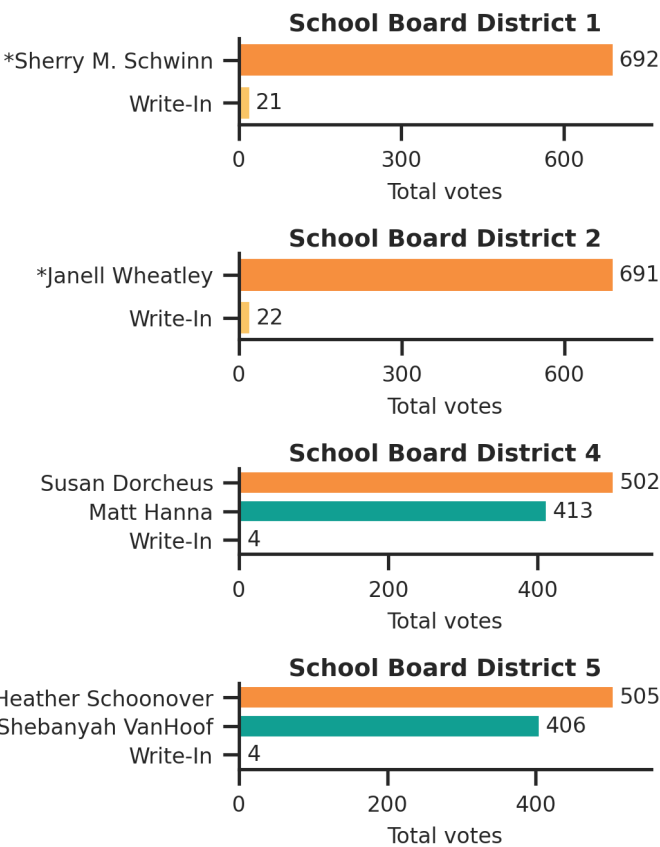

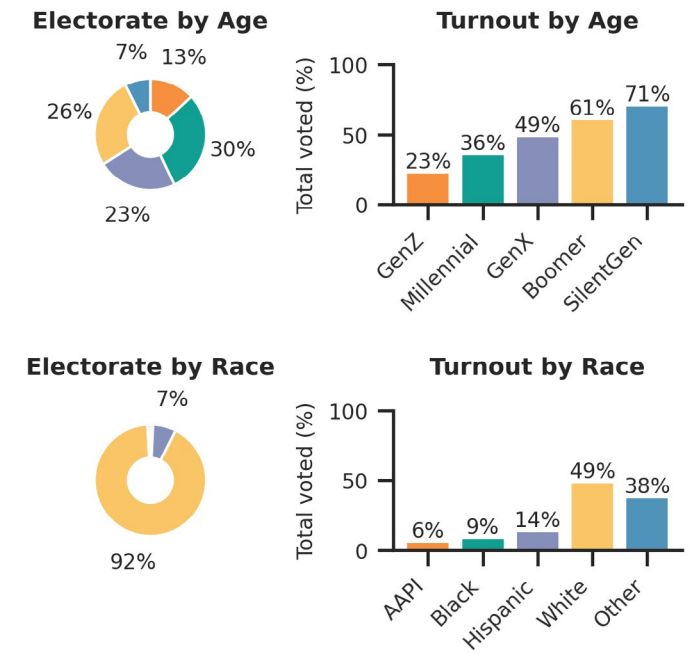


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Woodland for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

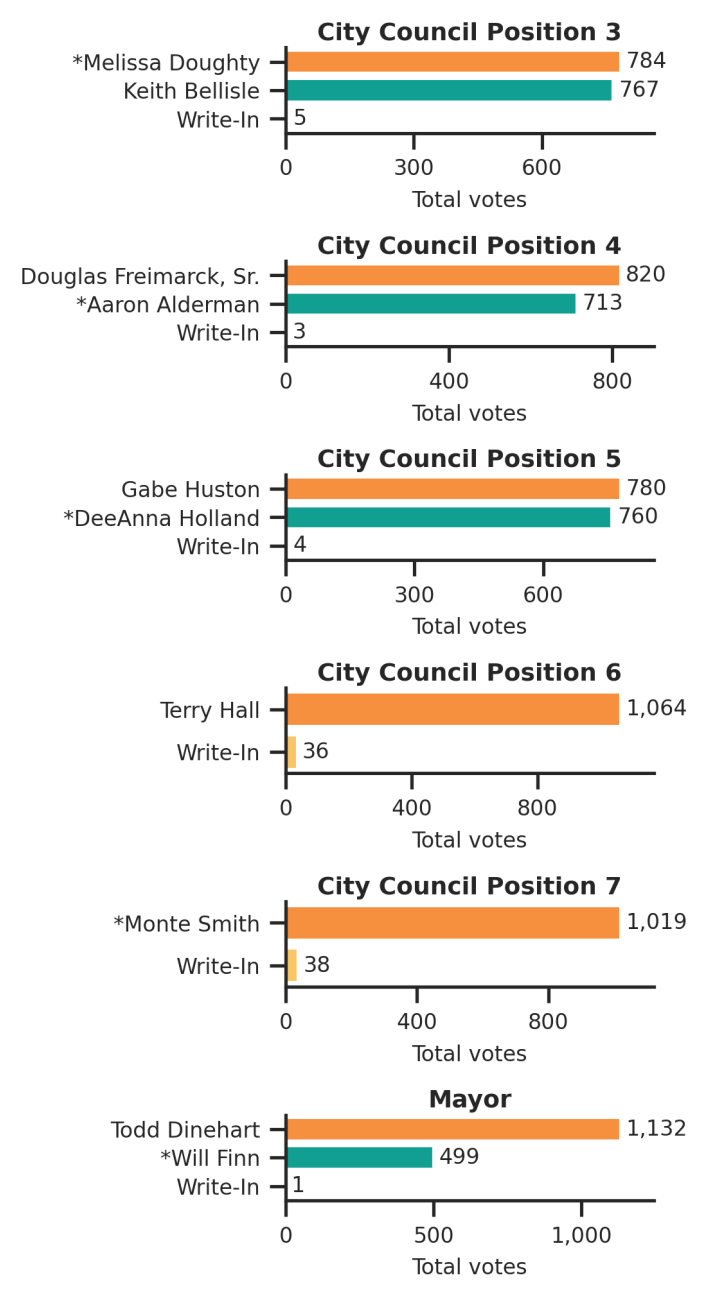


Fig 2 Election results in Woodland for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

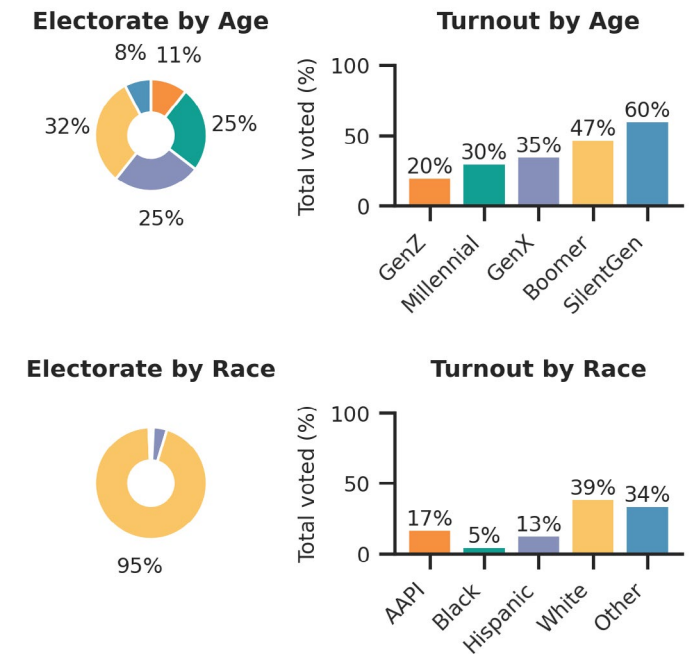


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Woodland School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

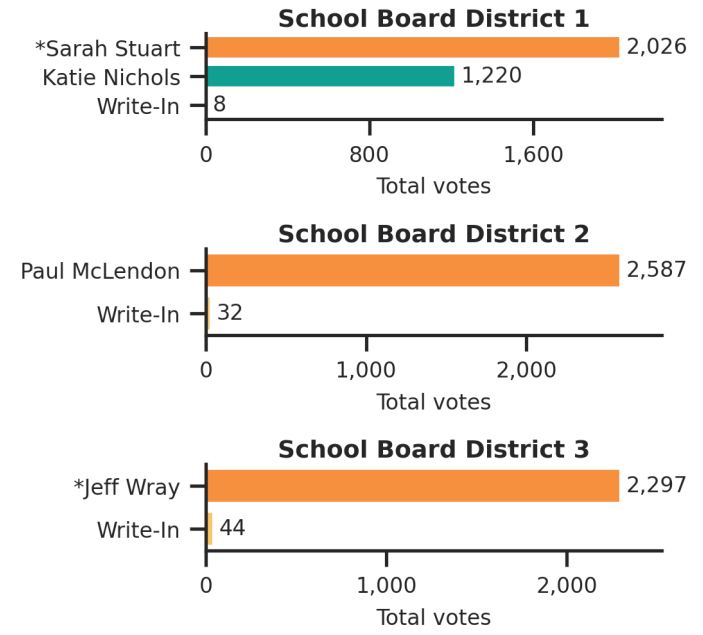


Fig 2 Election results in Woodland School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



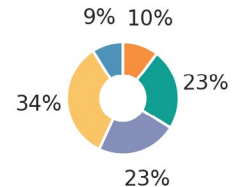

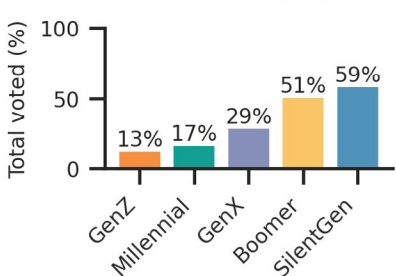

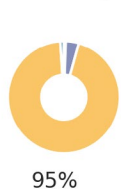
Electorate by Age



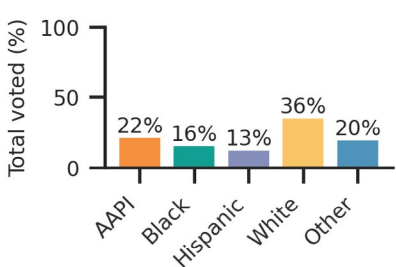
Turnout by Age

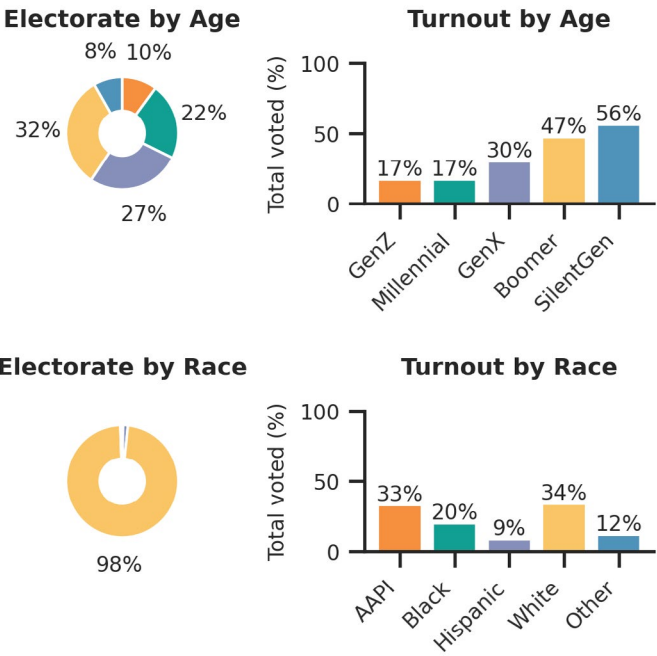
**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lewis County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

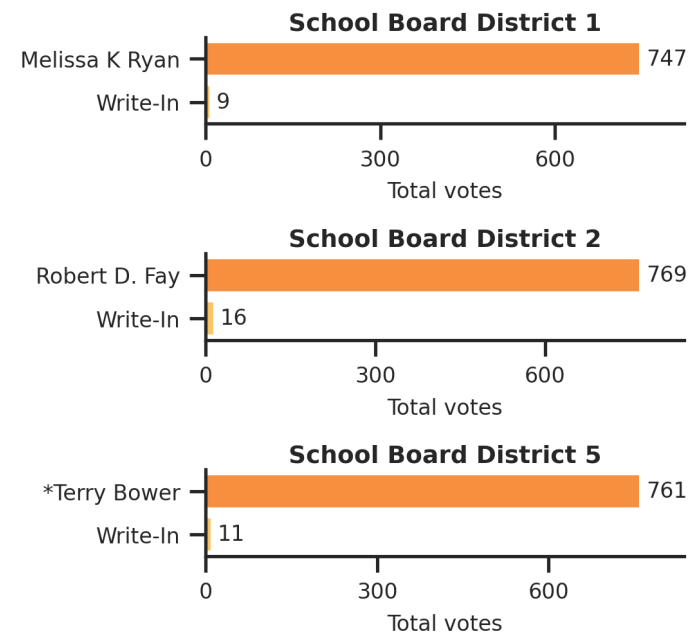

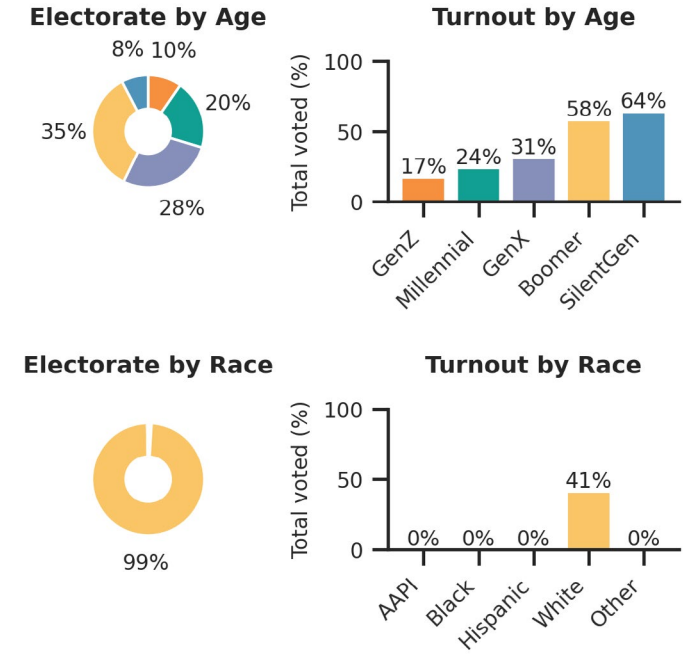


**Fig 2** Election results in Adna School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

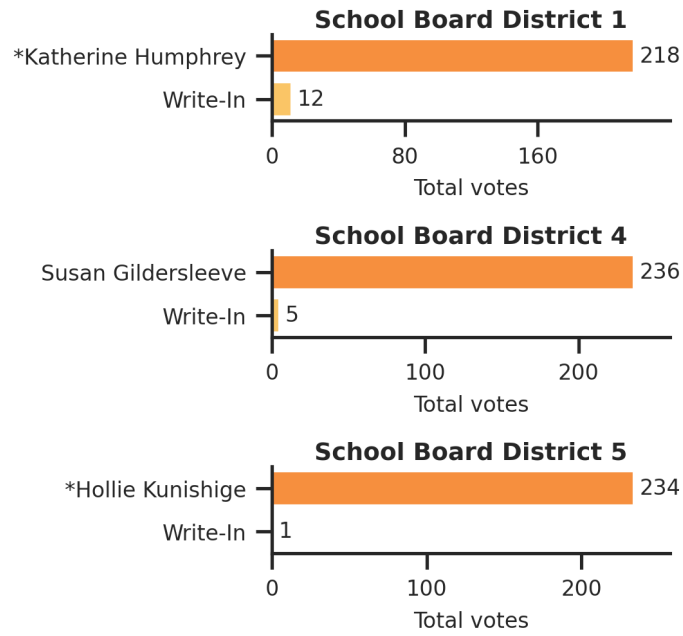

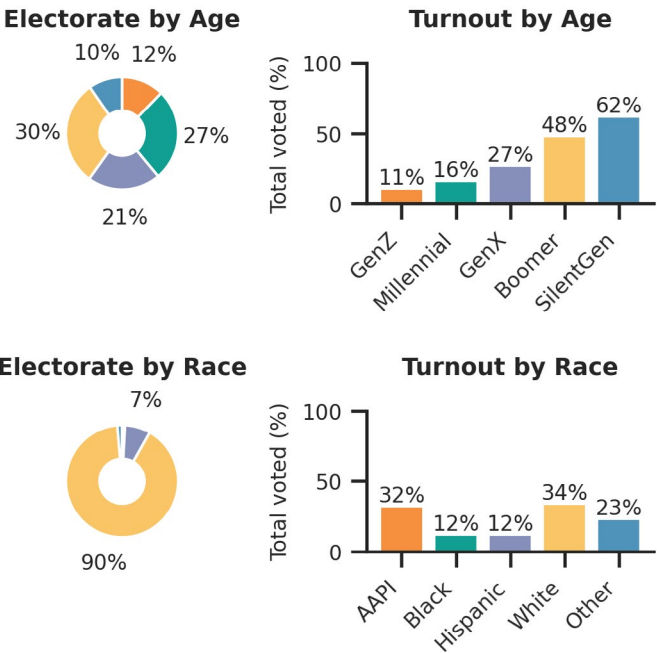


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Centralia for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

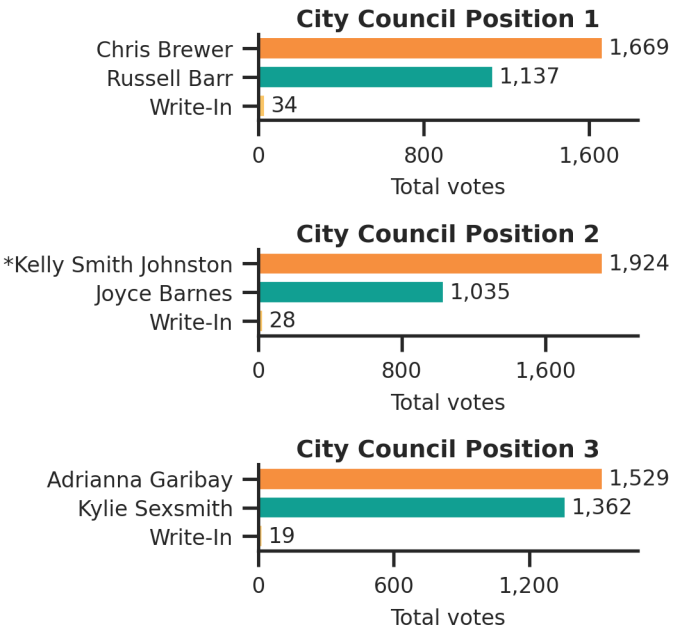


Fig 2 Election results in Centralia for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

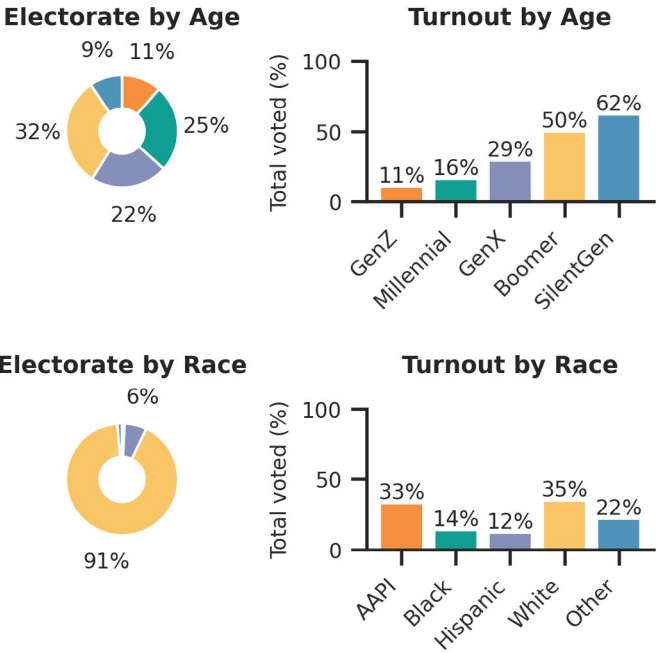


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Centralia School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

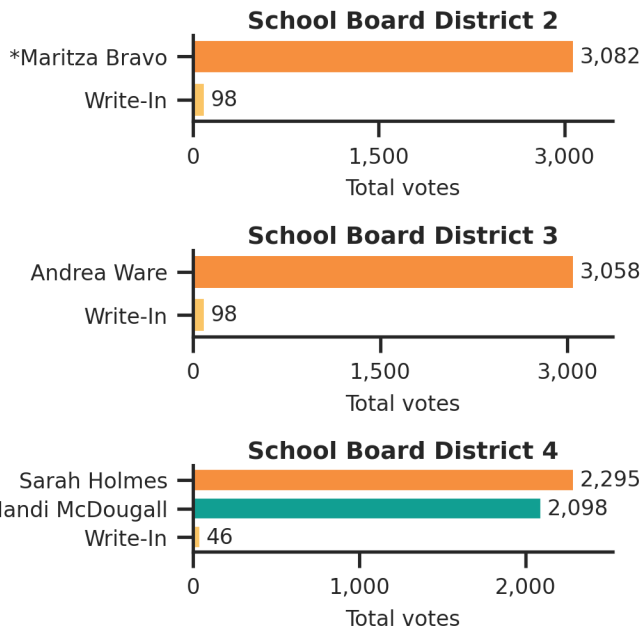
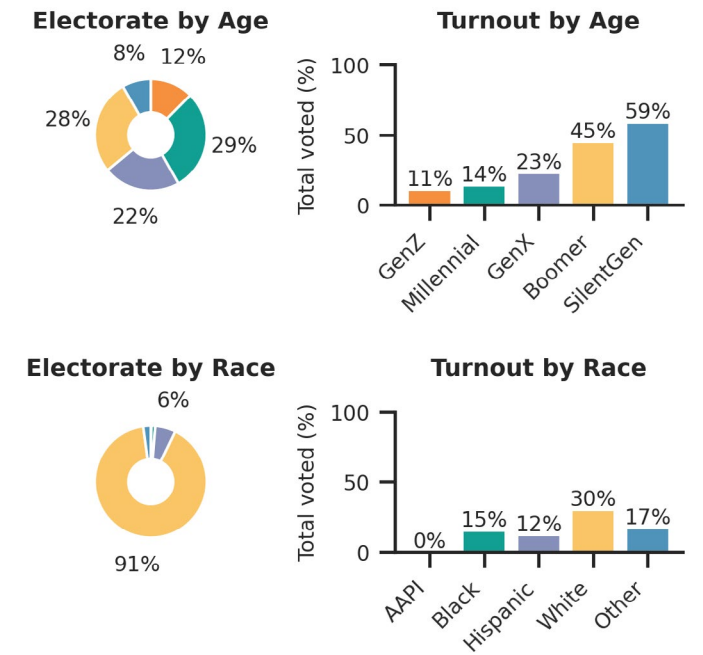


Fig 2 Election results in Centralia School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

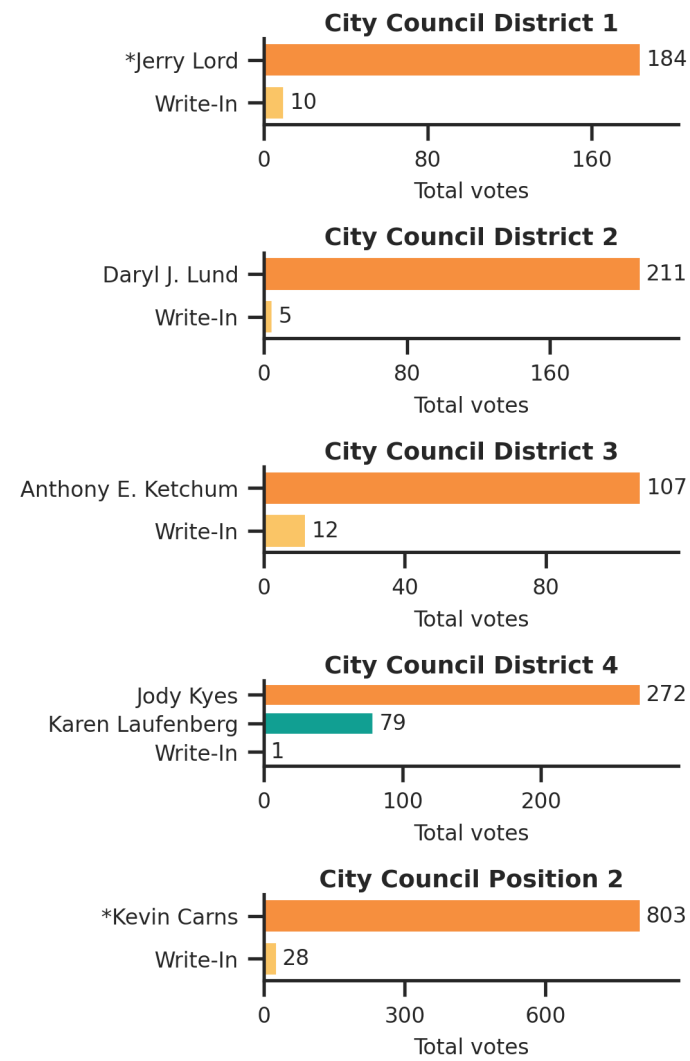


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Chehalis for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

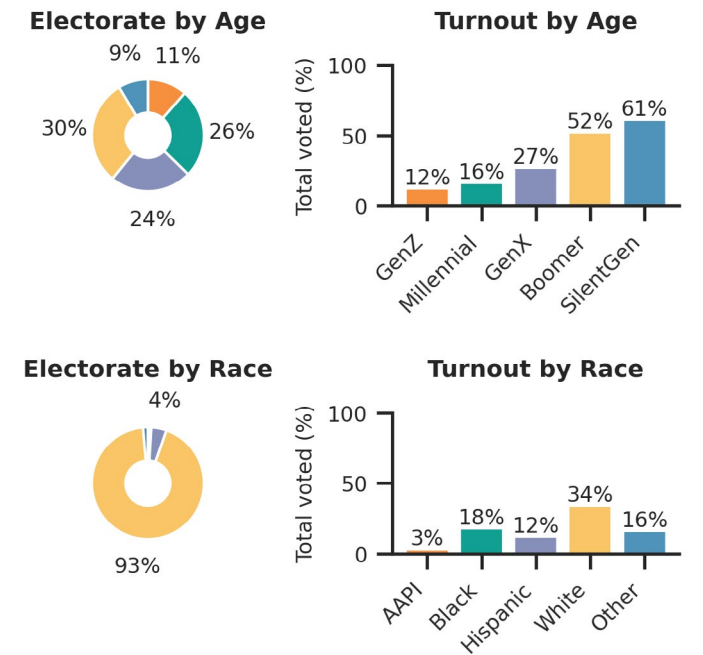

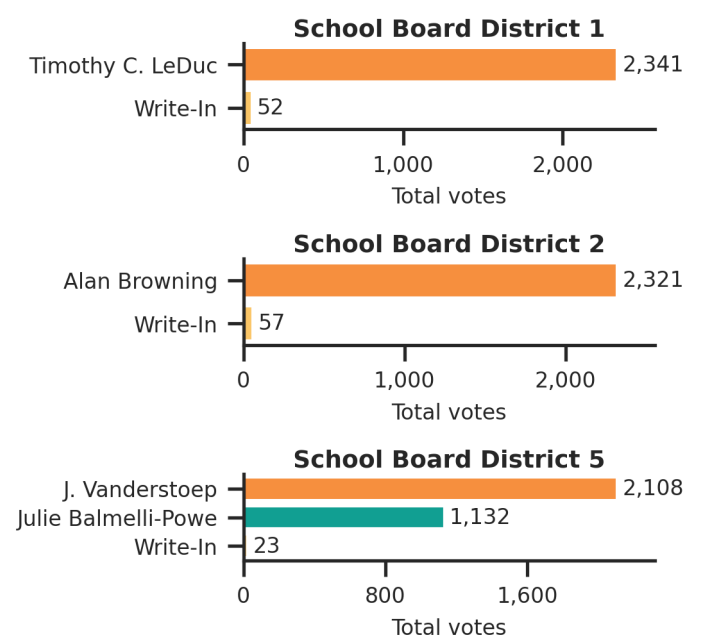

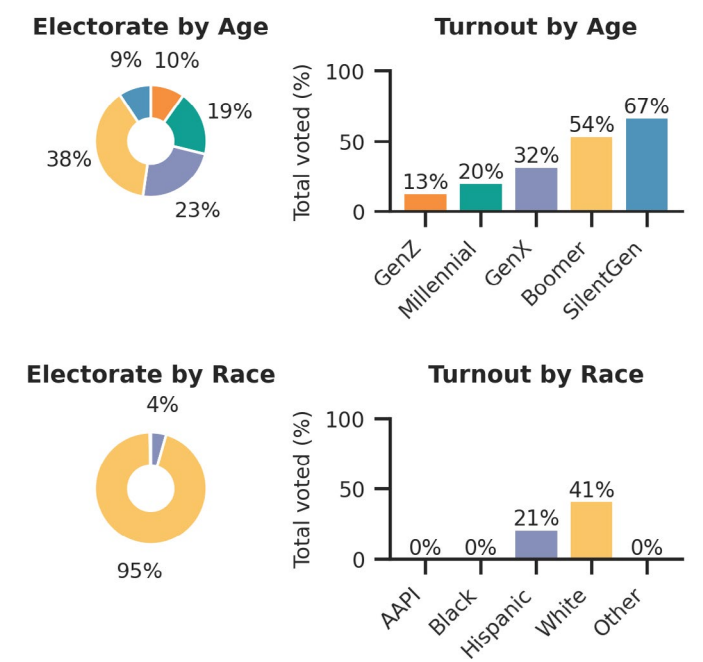

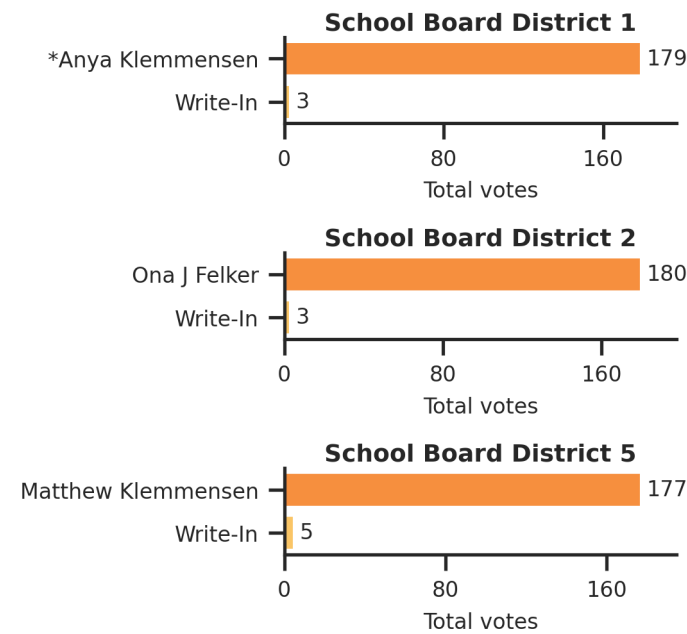

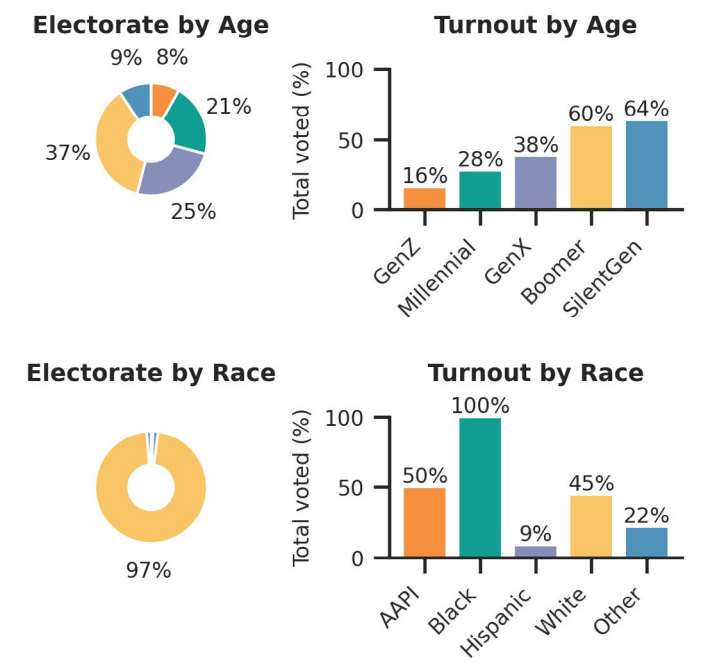

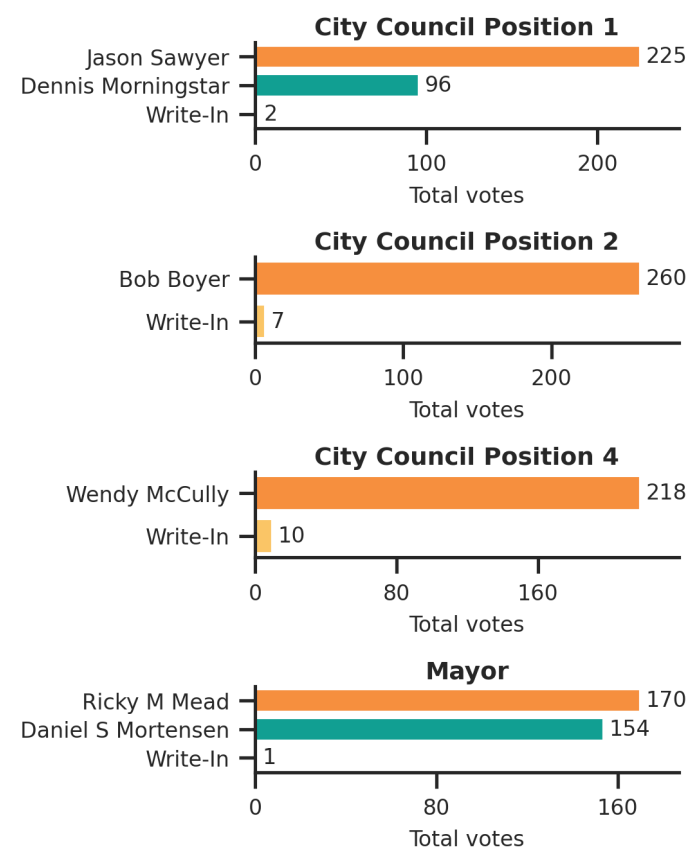

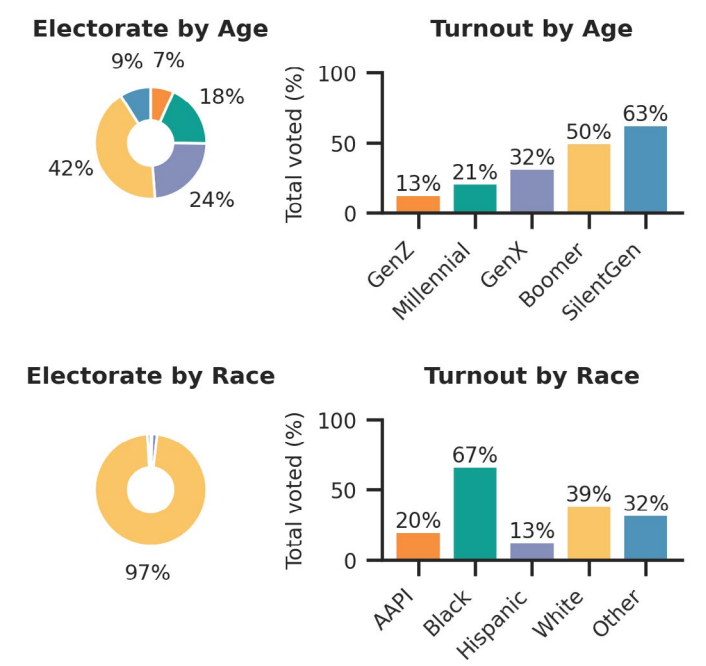
**Fig 2** Election results in Morton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

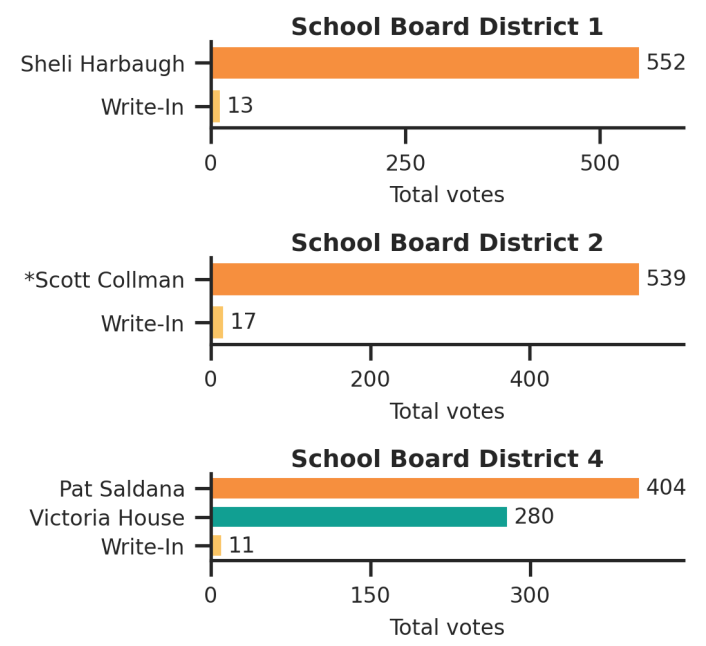

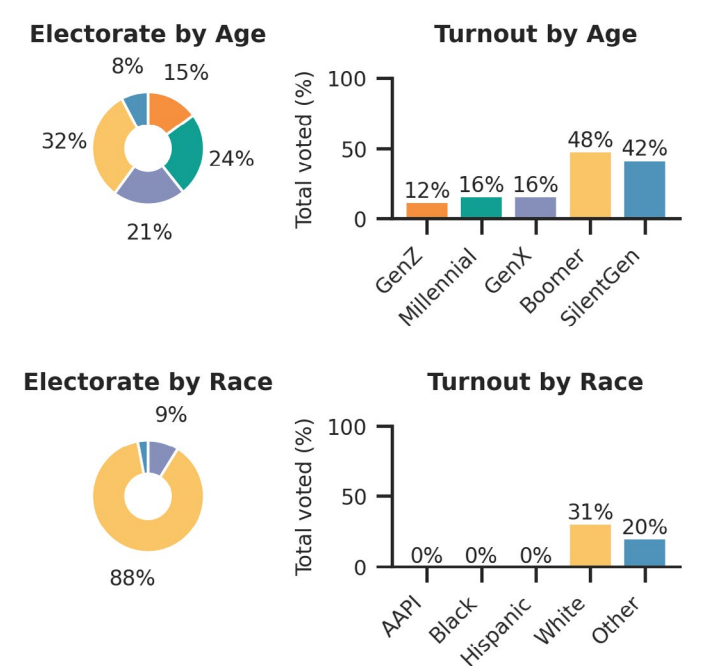


**Fig 2** Election results in Morton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

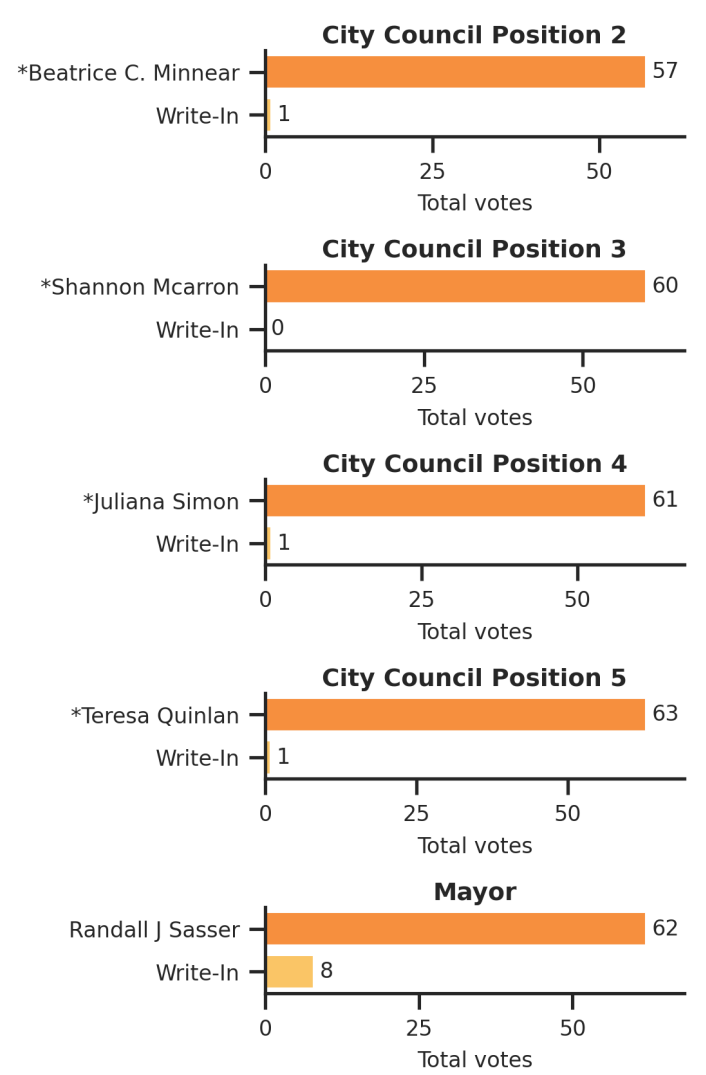


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mossyrock for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

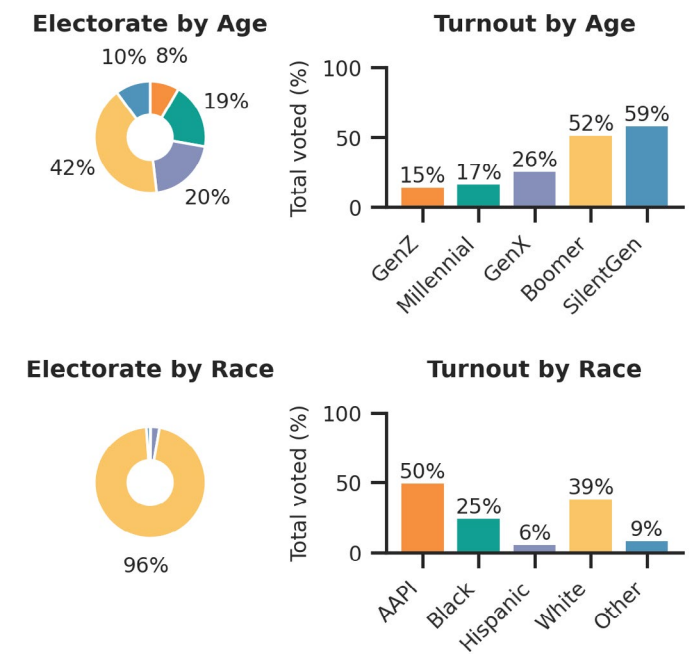

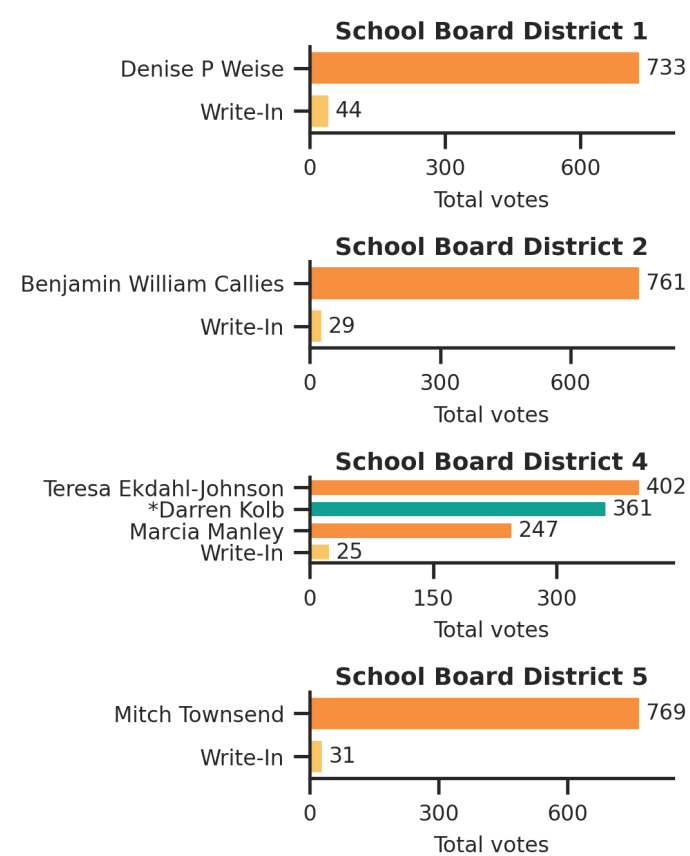

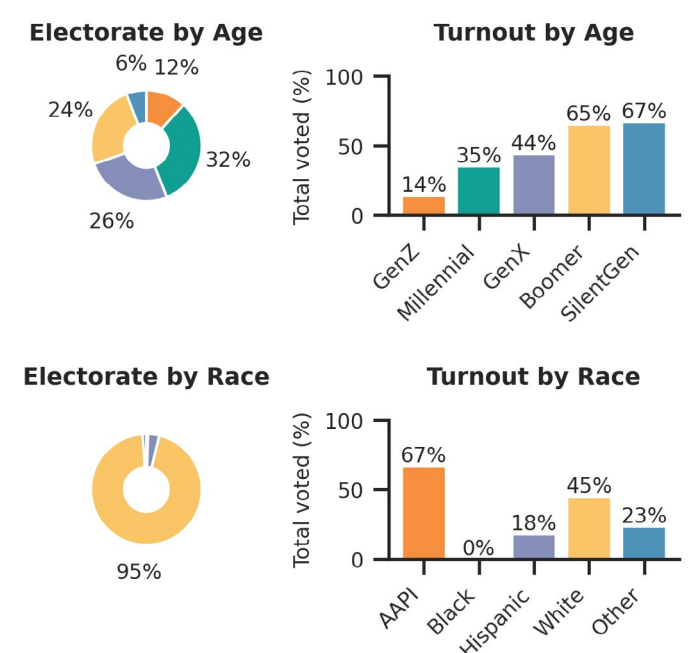

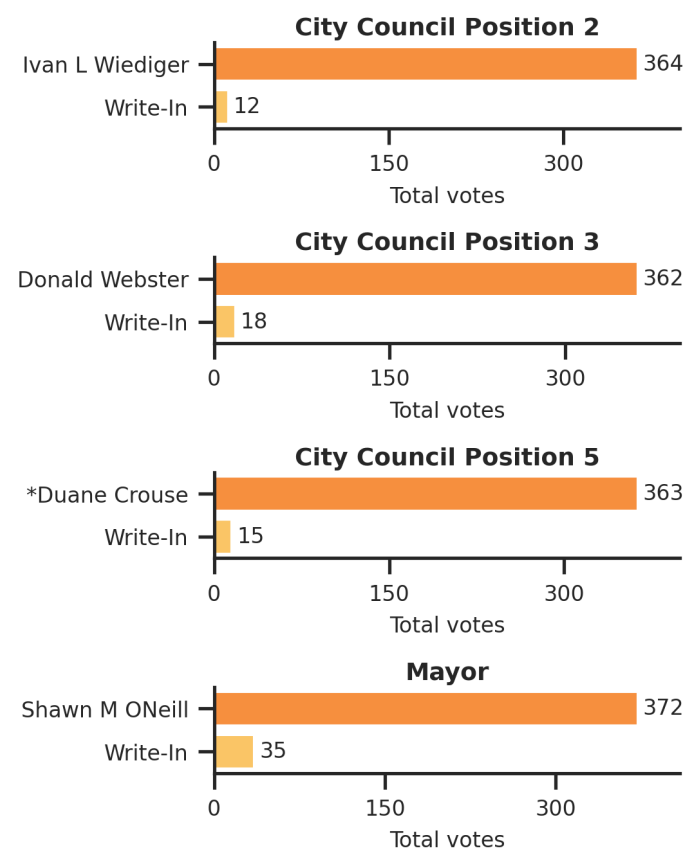

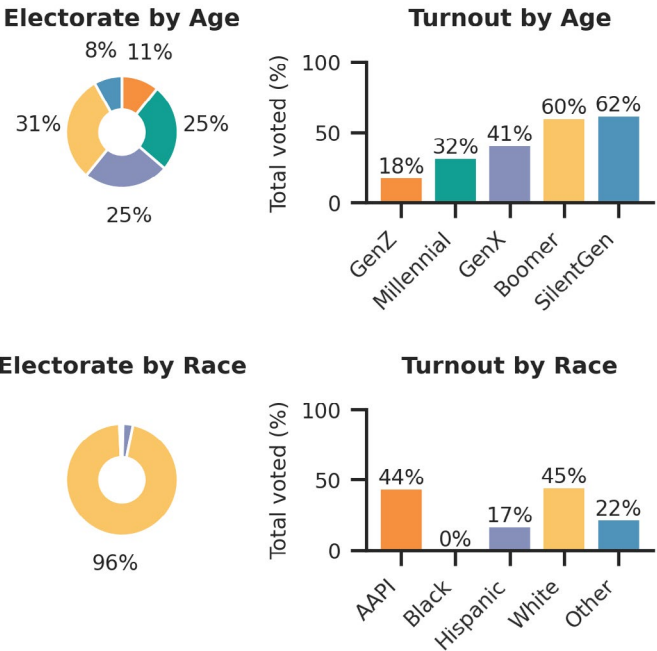
**Fig 2** Election results in Napavine for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

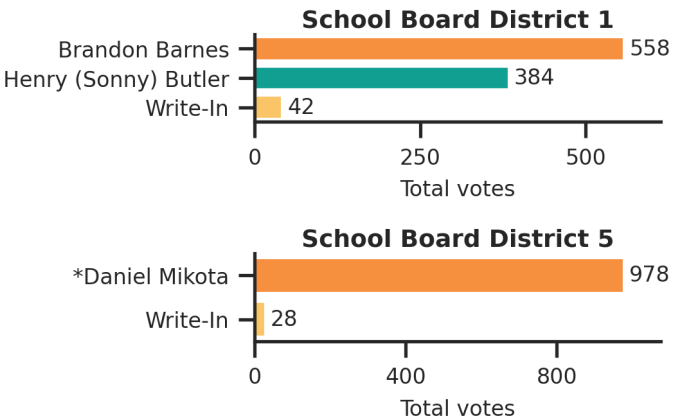

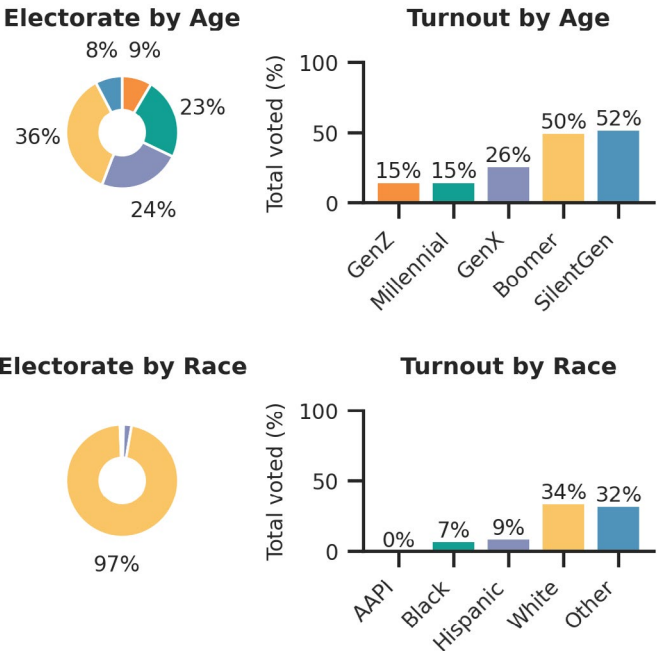


**Fig 2** Election results in Napavine School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

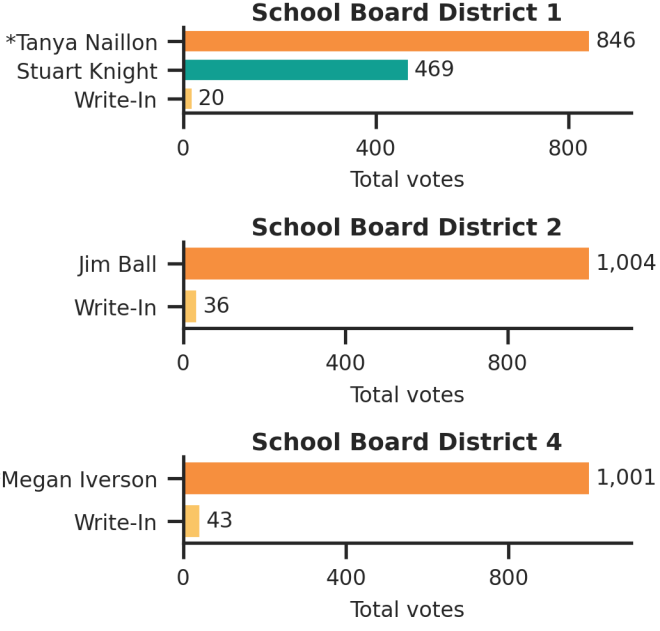

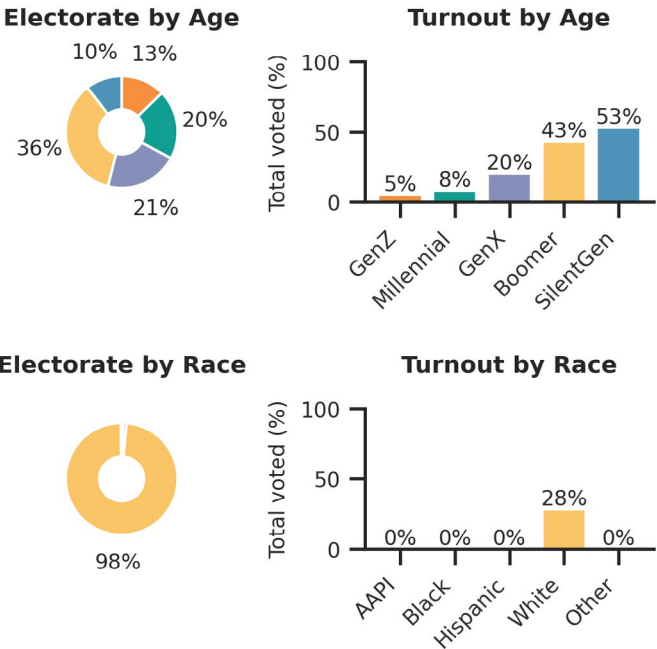


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pe Ell for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

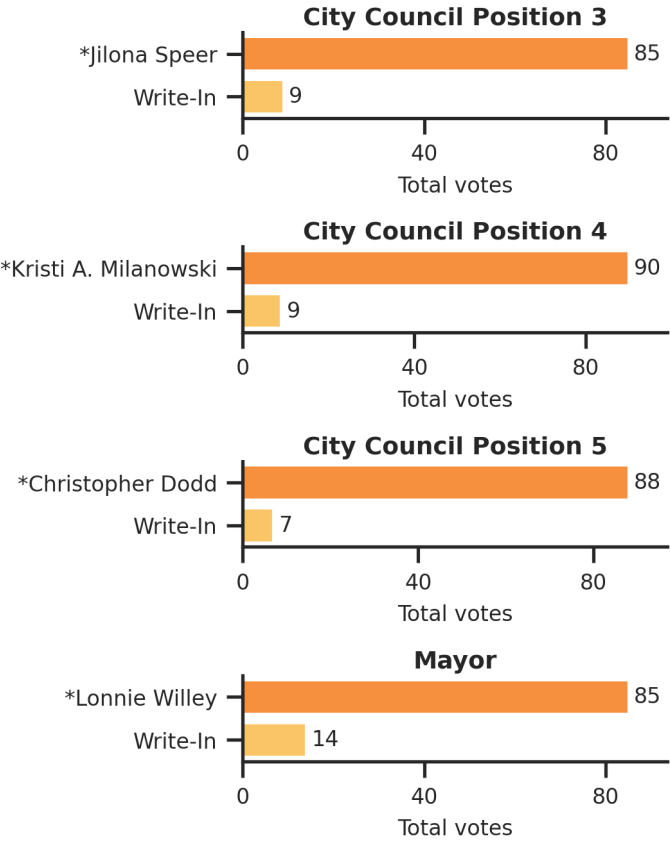


Fig 2 Election results in Pe Ell for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

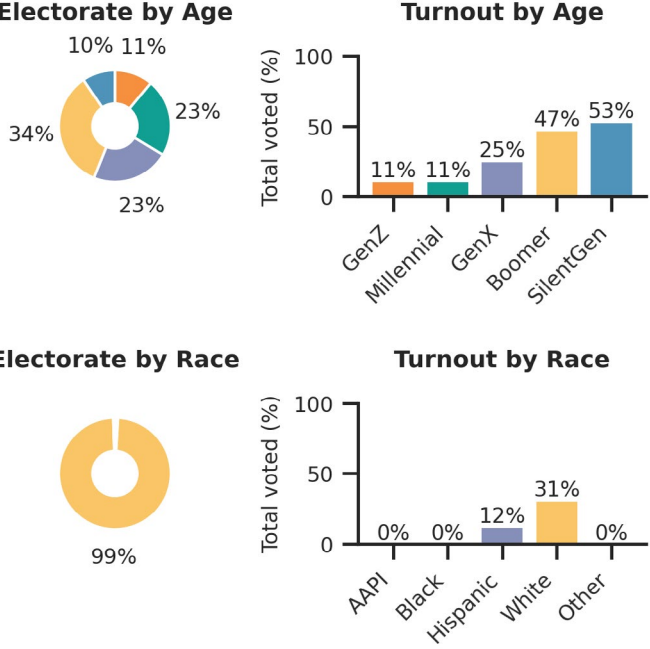


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pe Ell School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

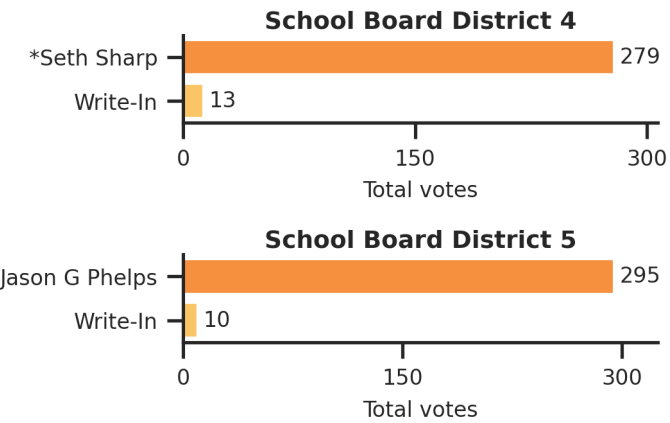
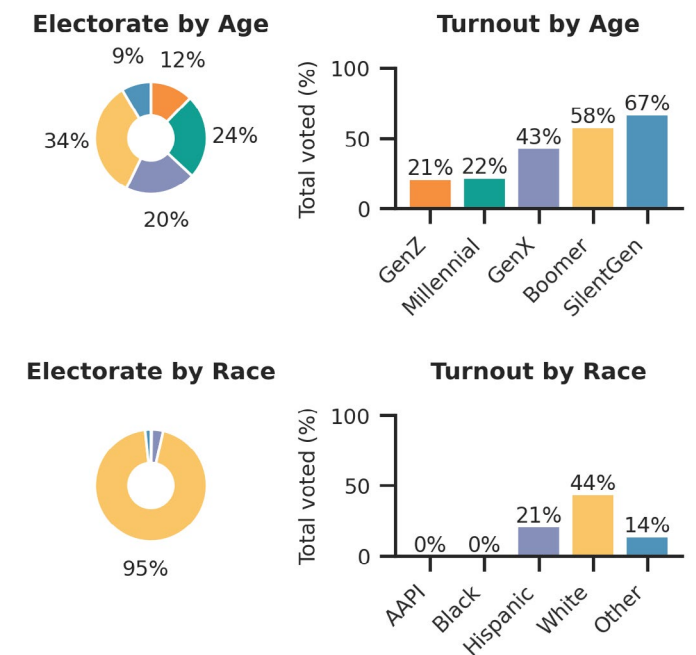


Fig 2 Election results in Pe Ell School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

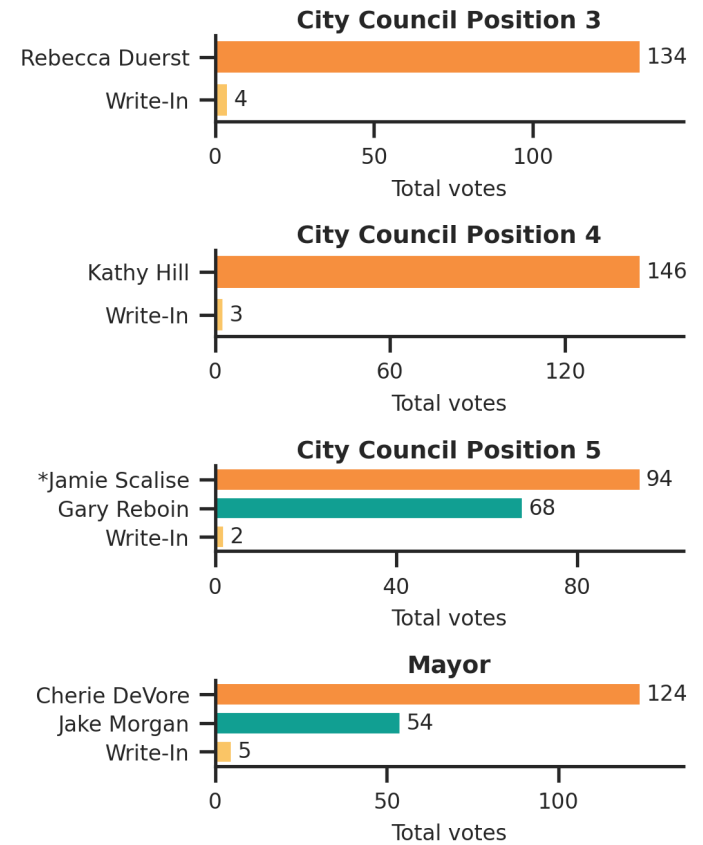

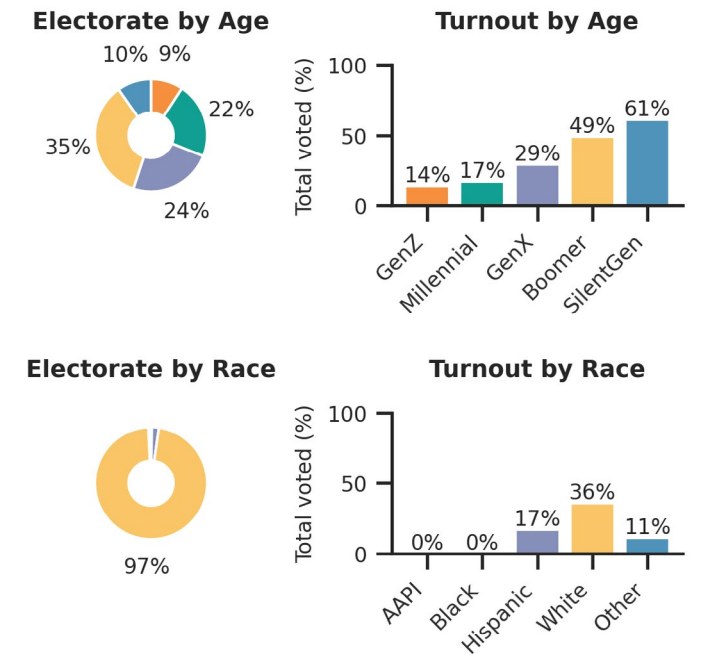

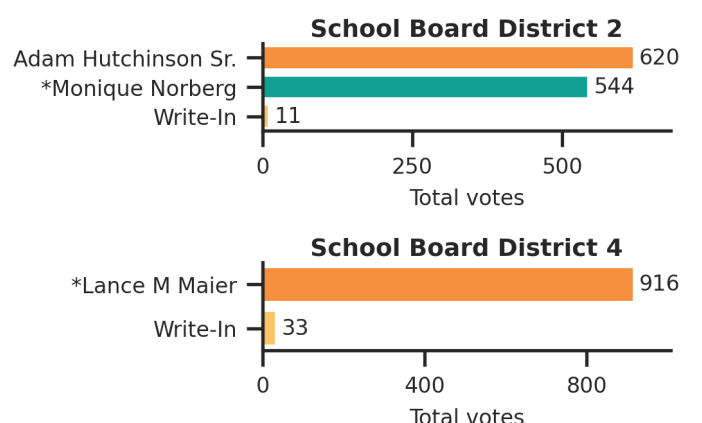

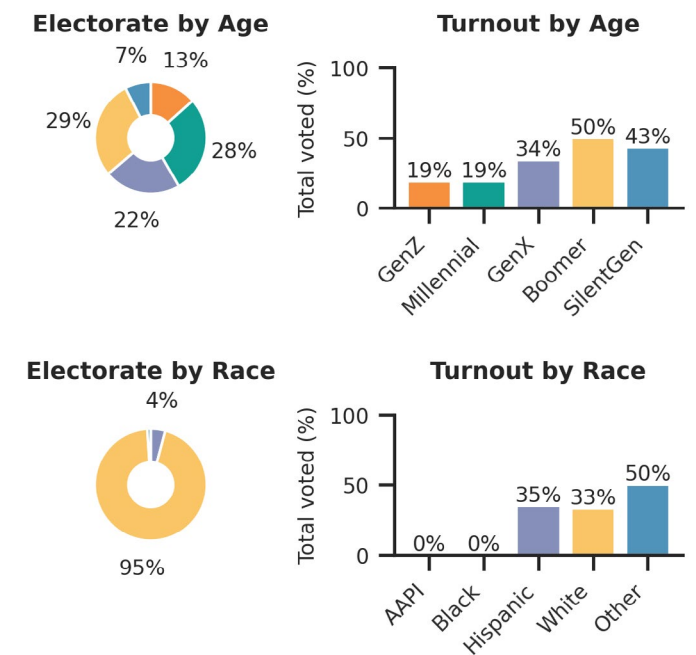

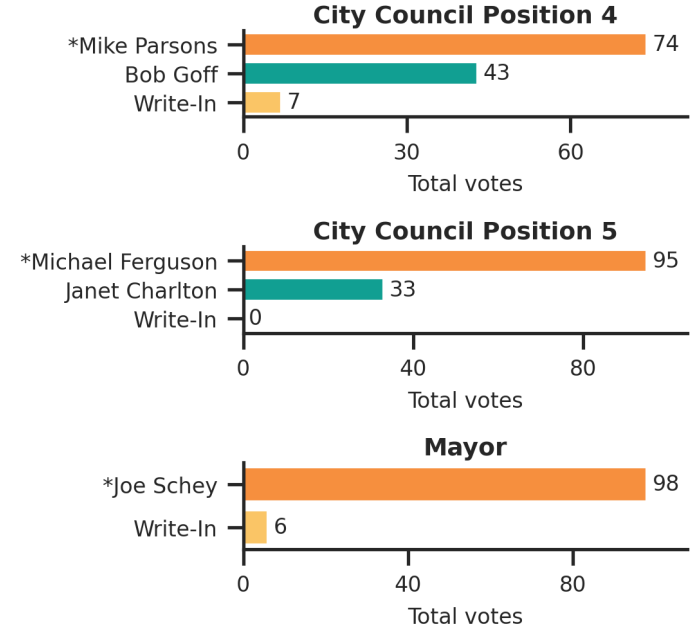

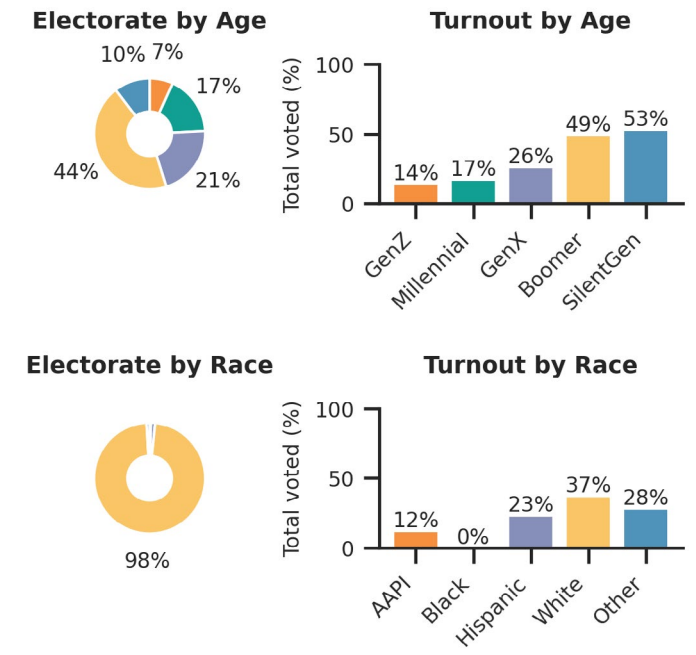

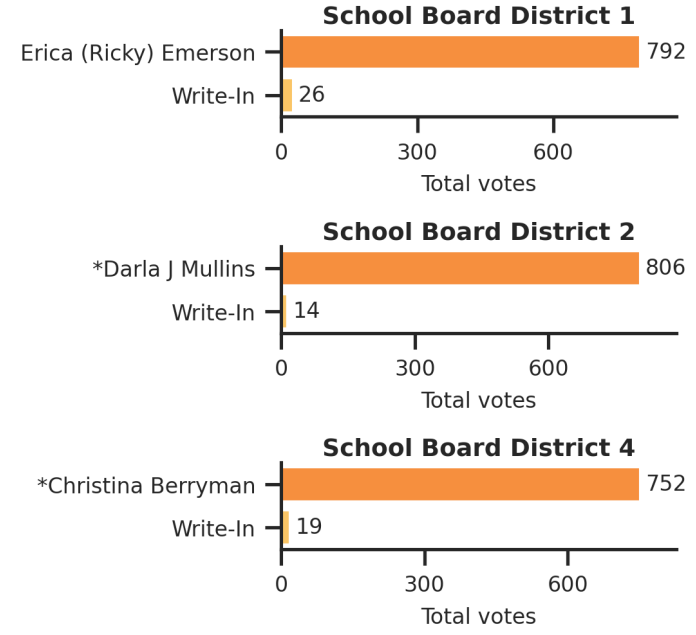

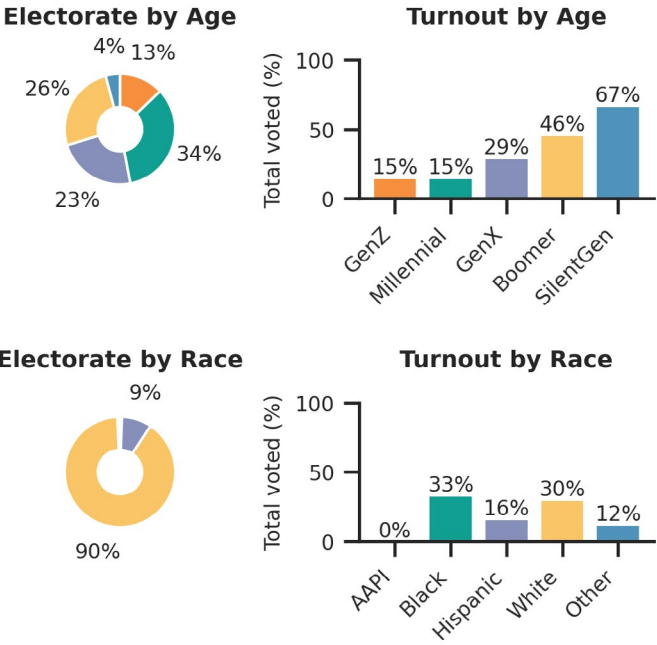


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Winlock for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

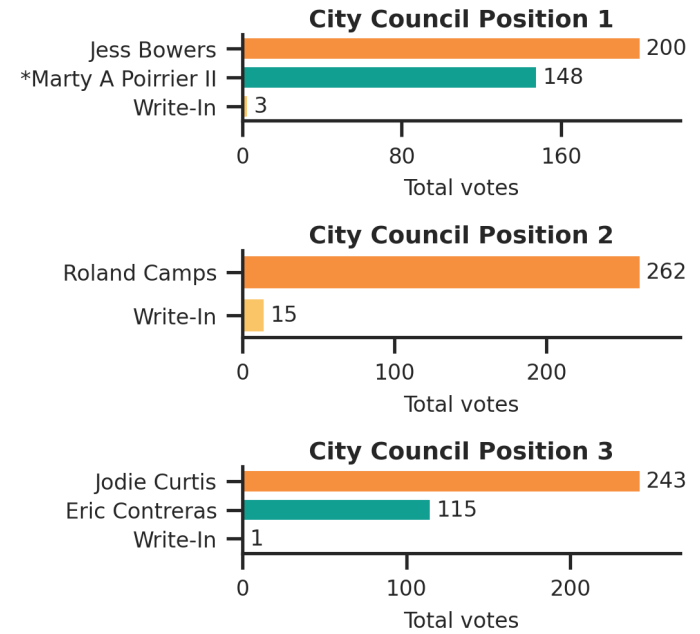


Fig 2 Election results in Winlock for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

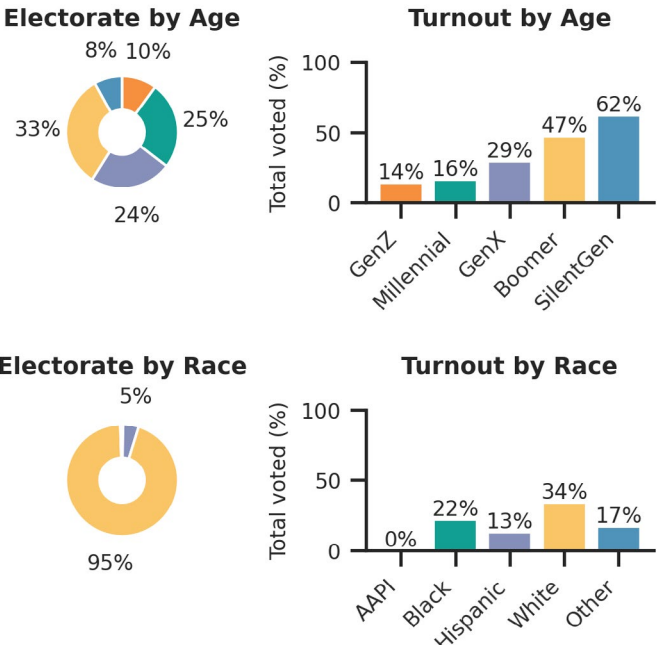


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Winlock School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

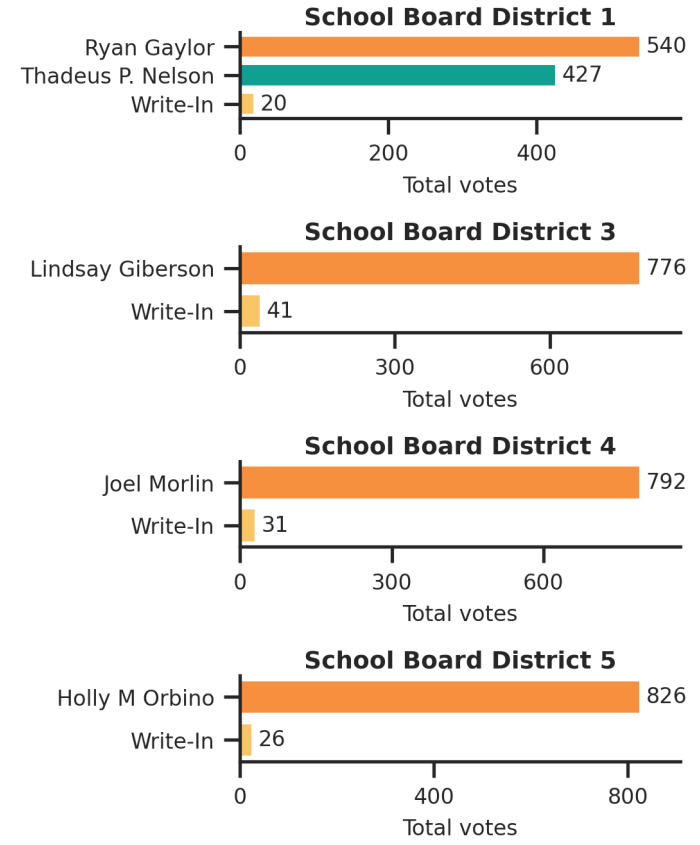


Fig 2 Election results in Winlock School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





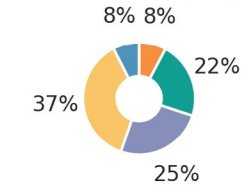

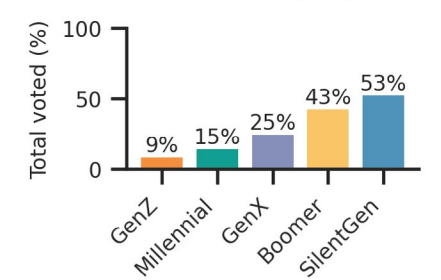

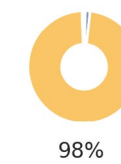

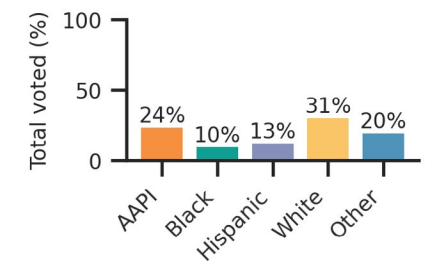

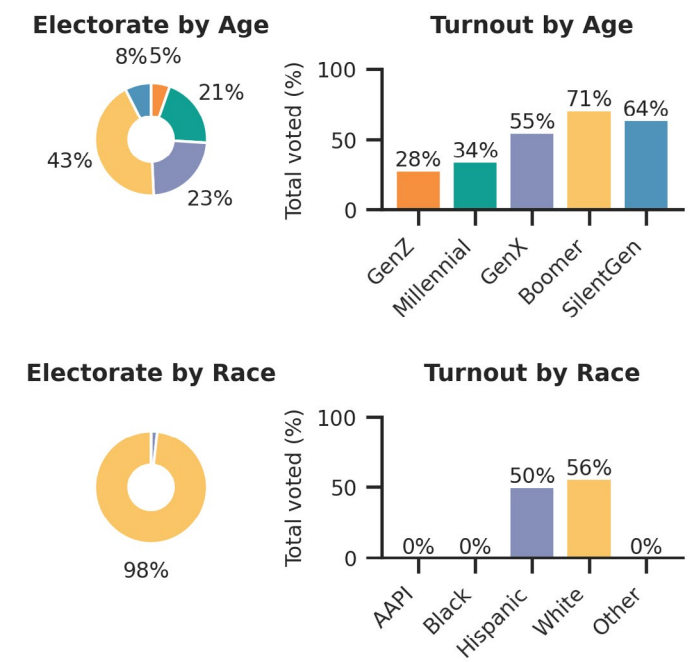
**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Skamania County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

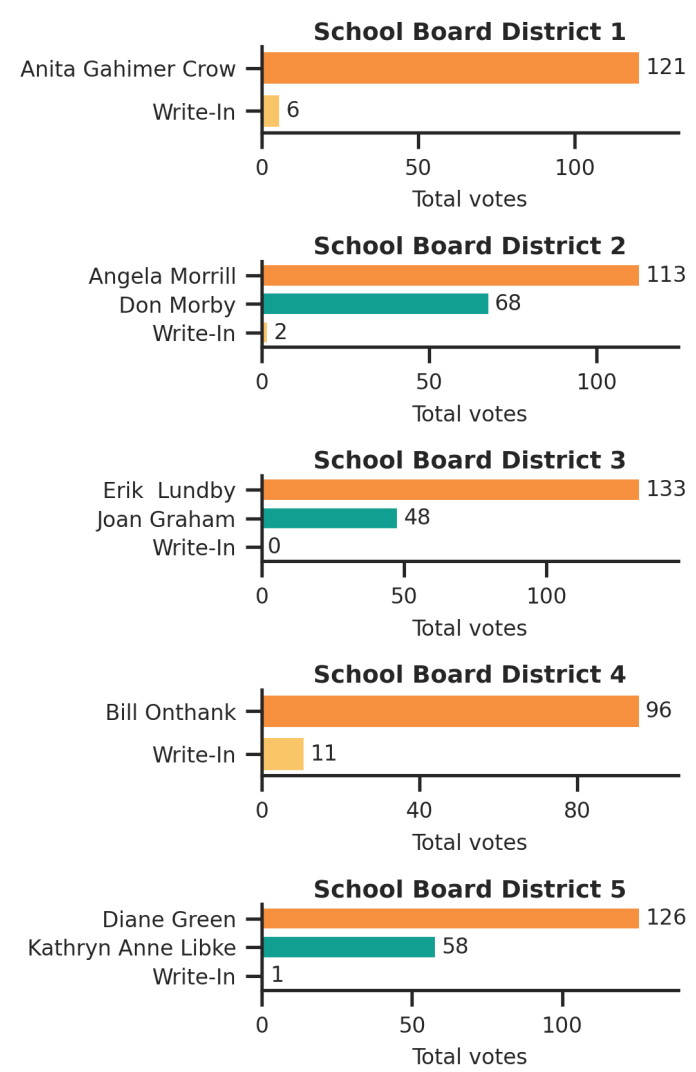


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Milla A School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

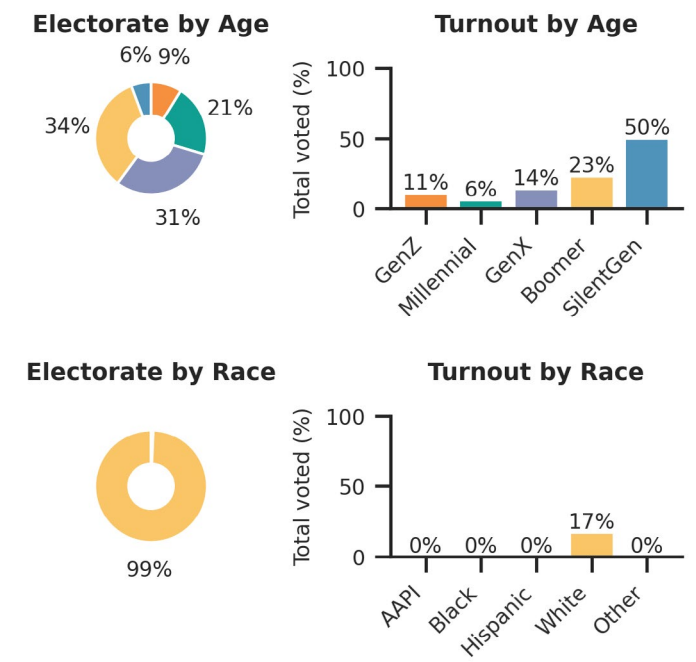


**Fig 2** Election results in Mill A School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

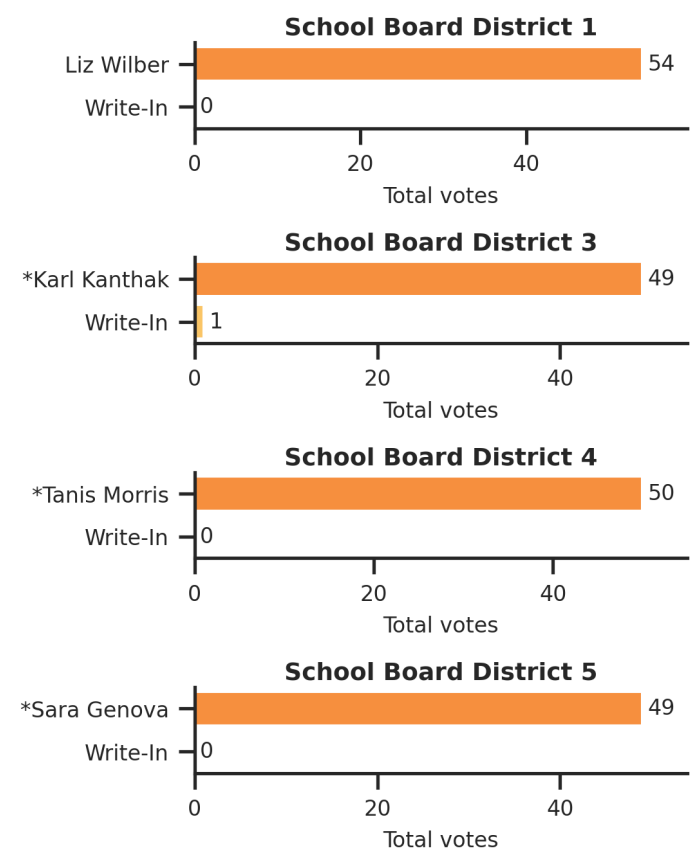

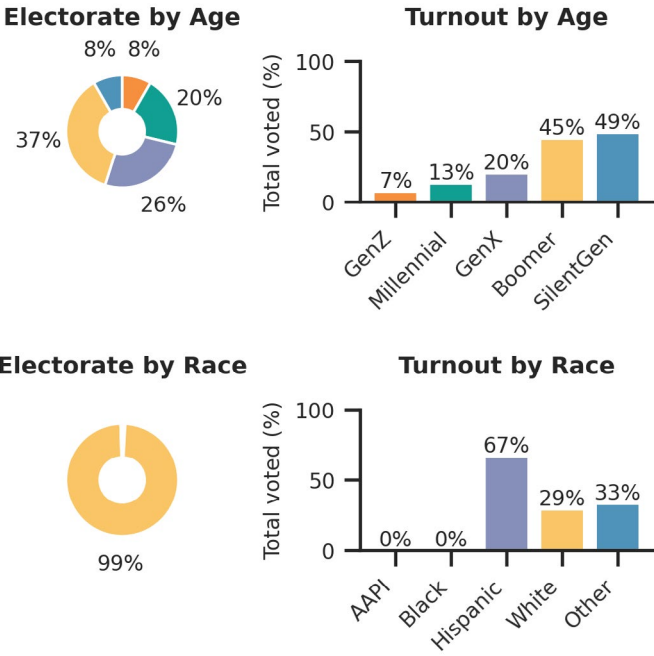


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in North Bonneville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

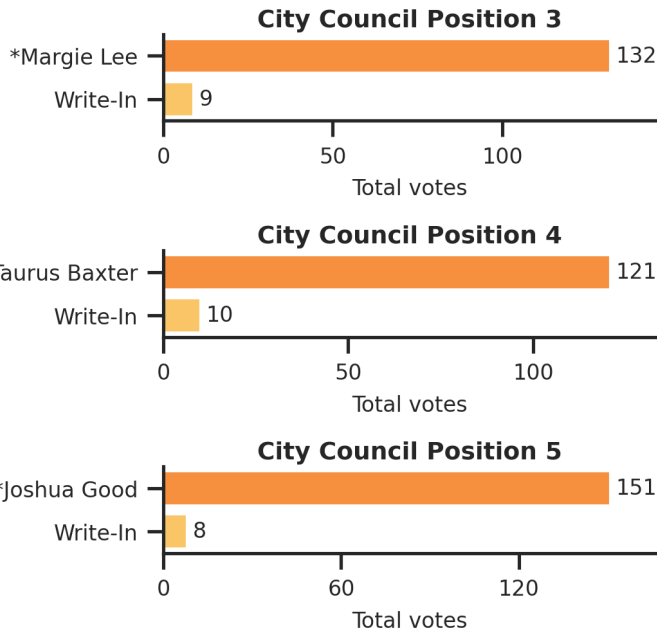


Fig 2 Election results in North Bonneville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

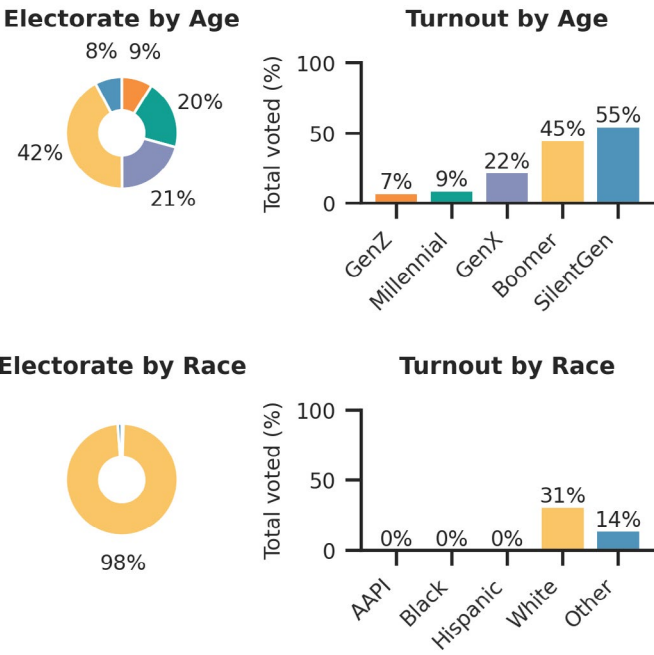


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Skamania School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

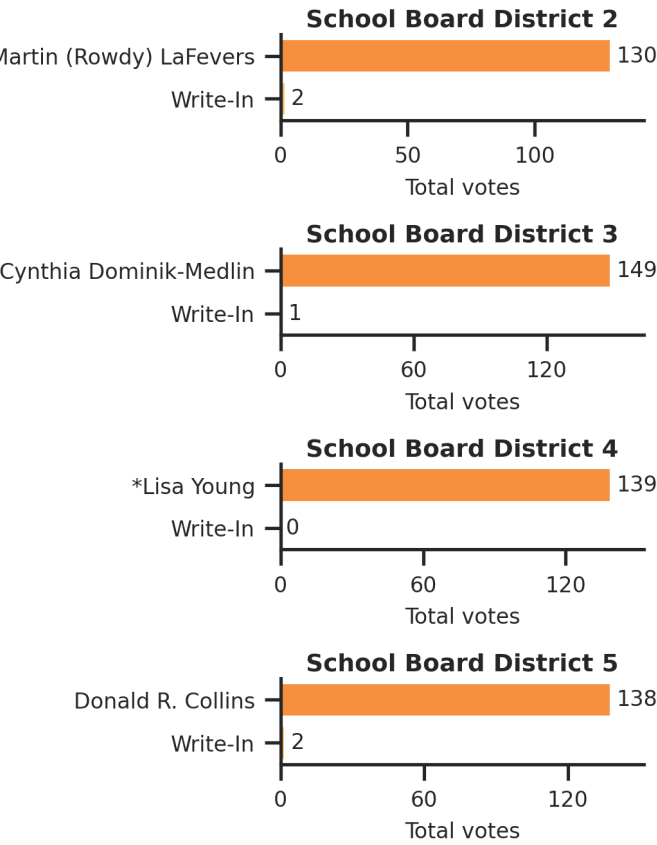


Fig 2 Election results in Skamania School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

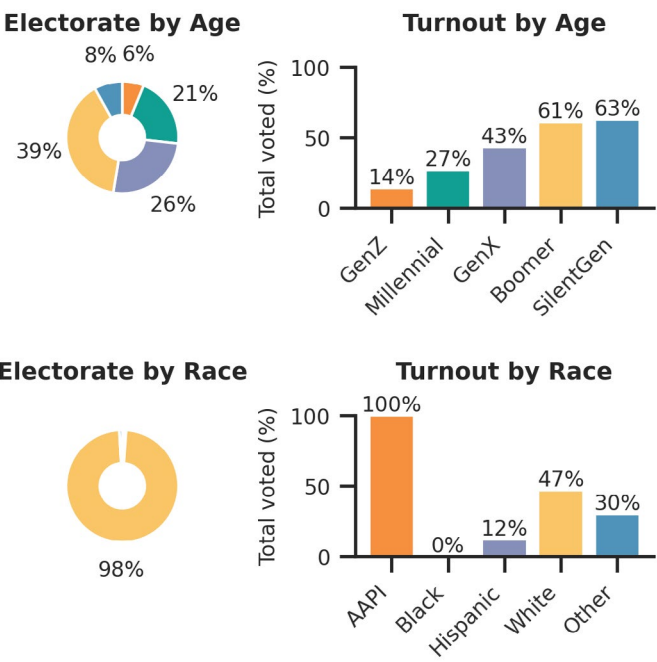


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Stevenson for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

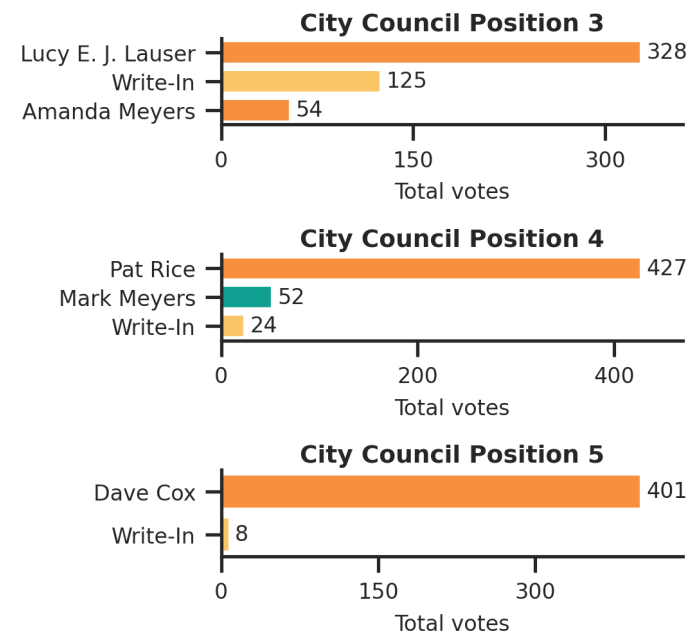


Fig 2 Election results in Stevenson for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

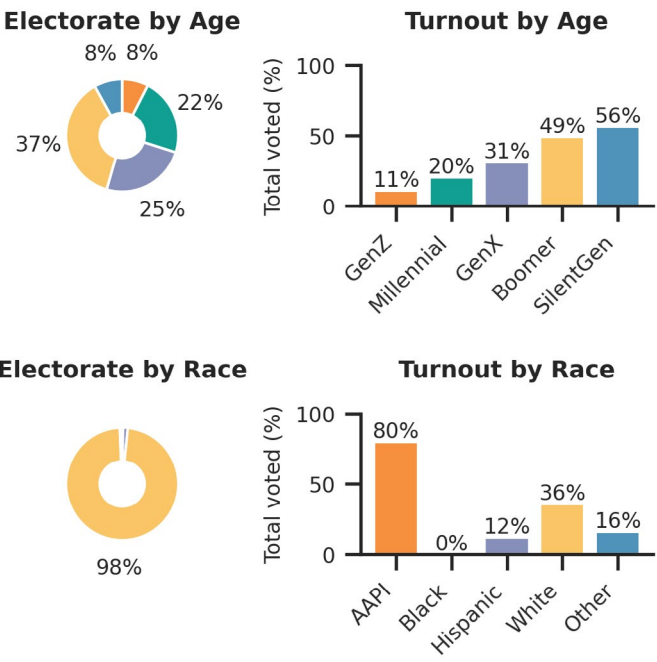


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Stevenson-Carson School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

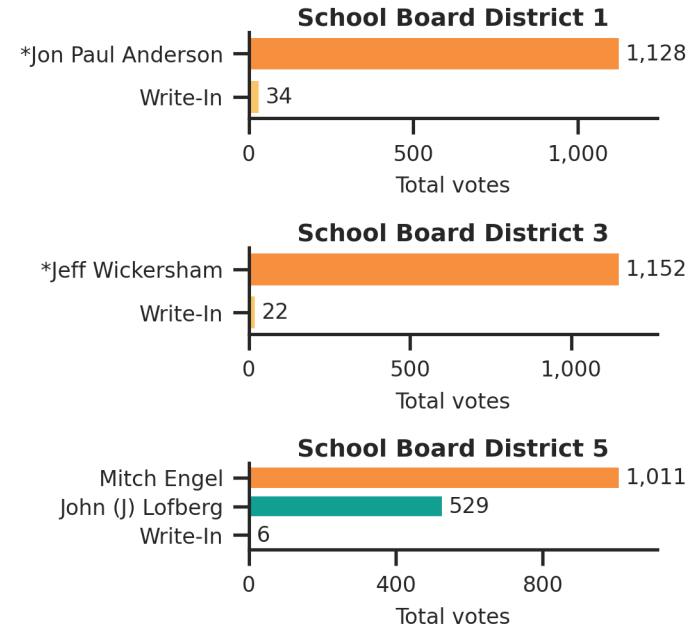


Fig 2 Election results in Stevenson-Carson School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





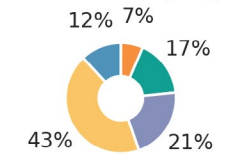

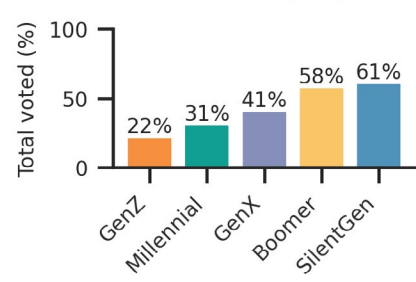

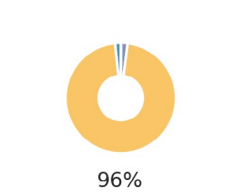
Electorate by Age



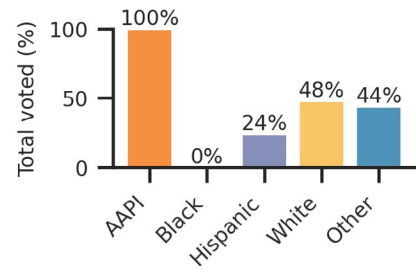

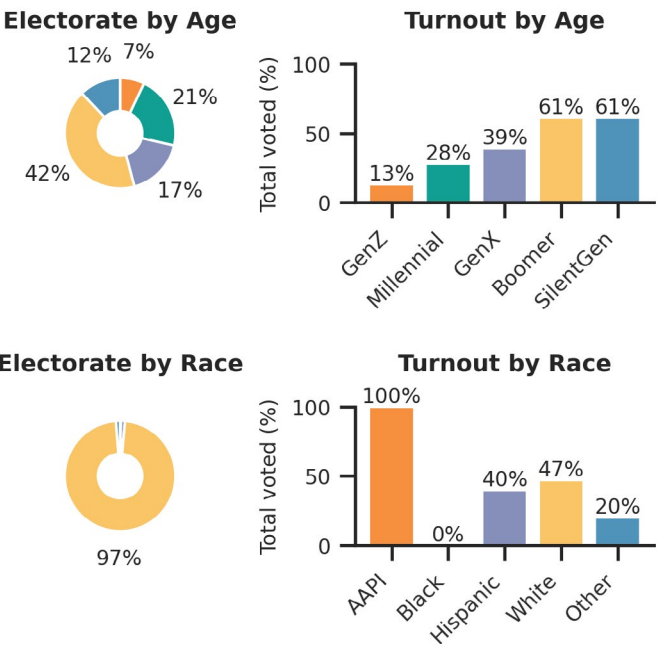


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Cathlamet for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

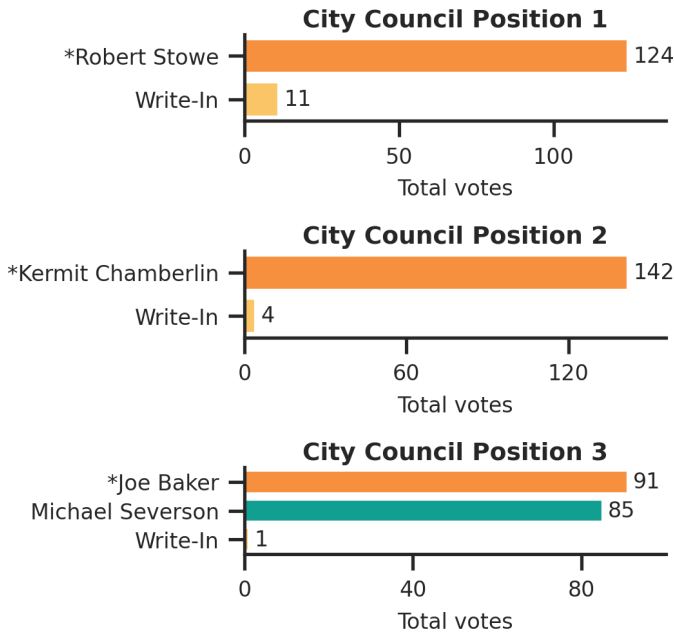


Fig 2 Election results in Cathlamet for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

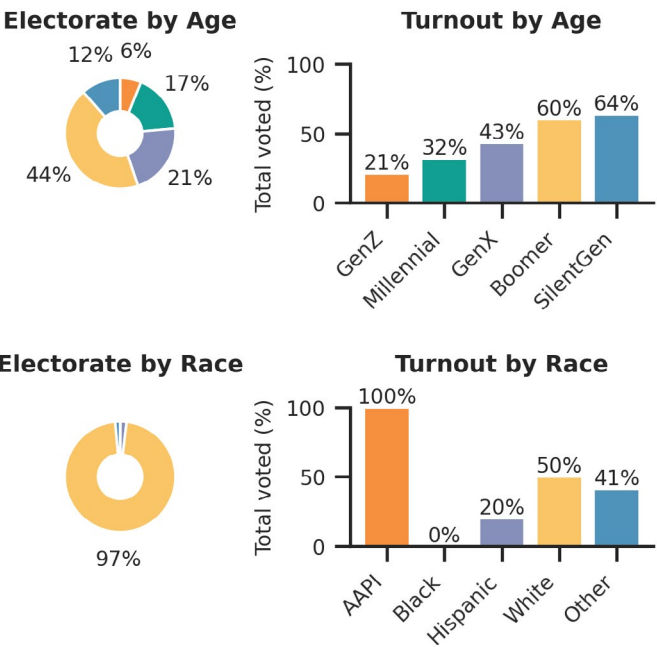


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wahkiakum School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

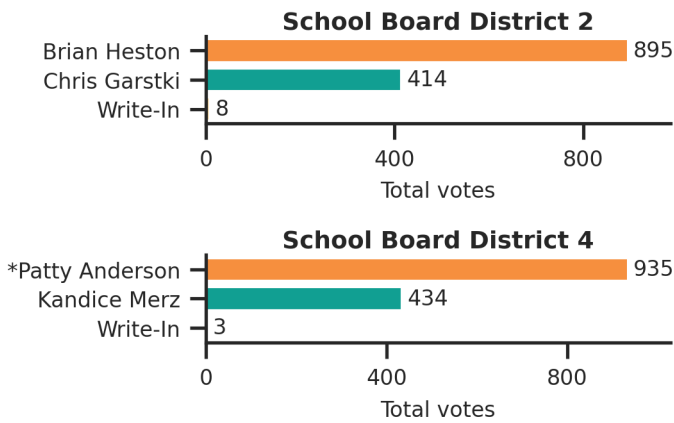
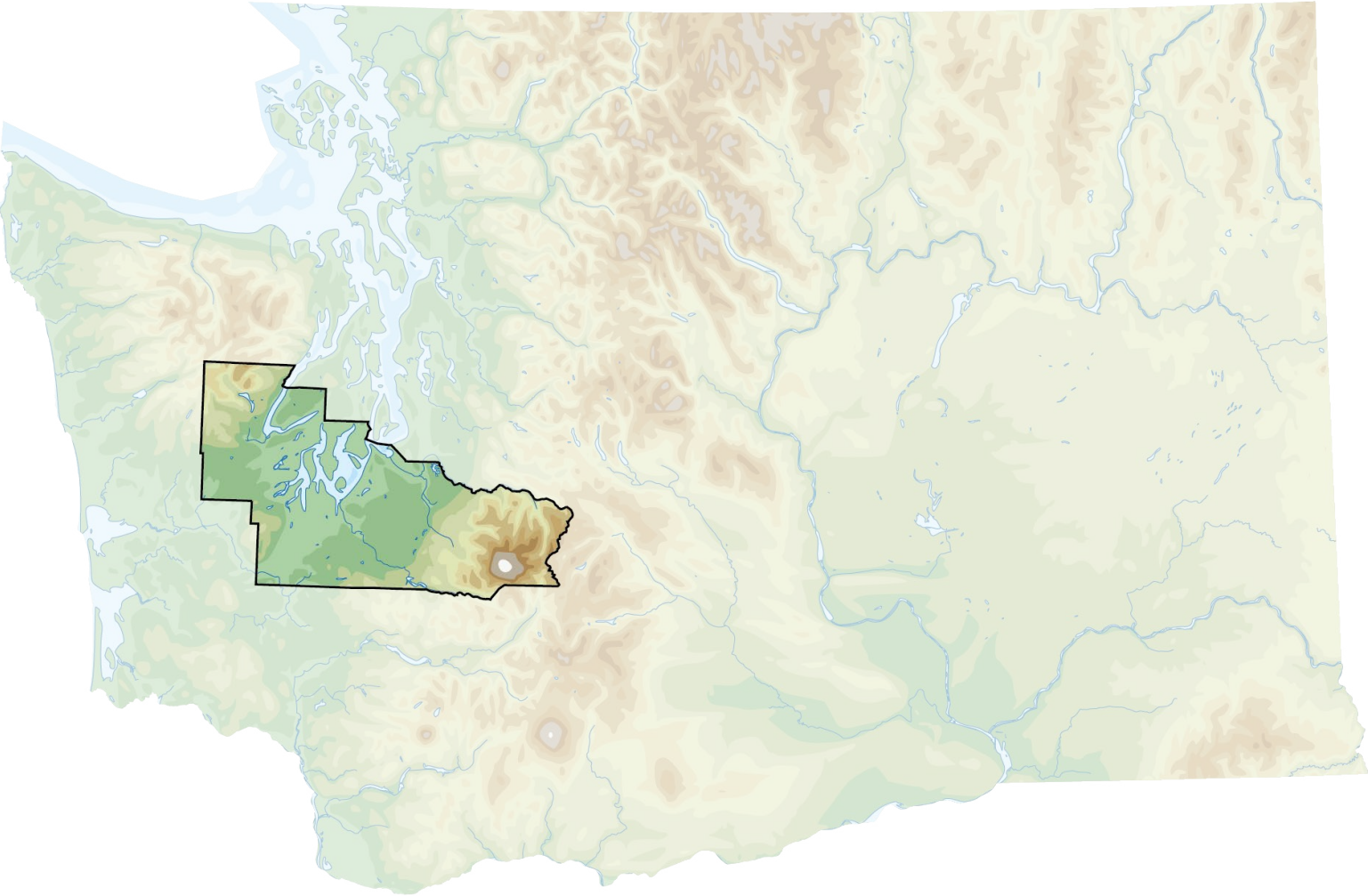


Fig 2 Election results in Wahkiakum School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



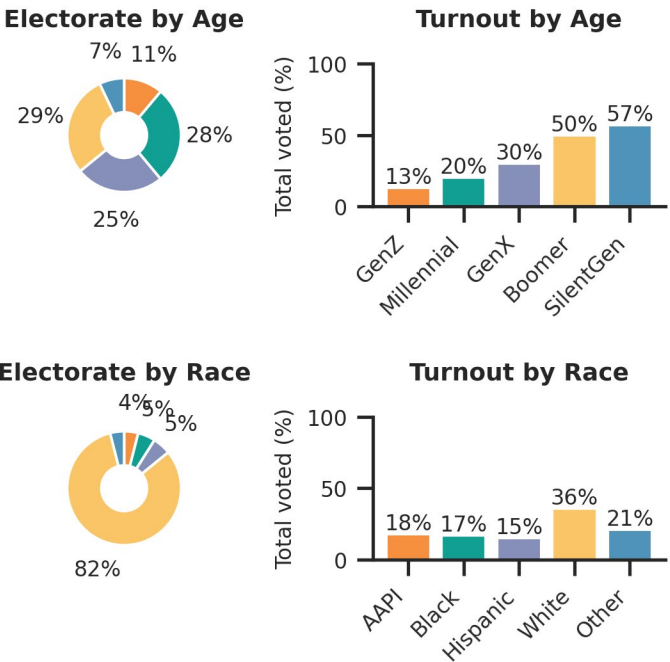

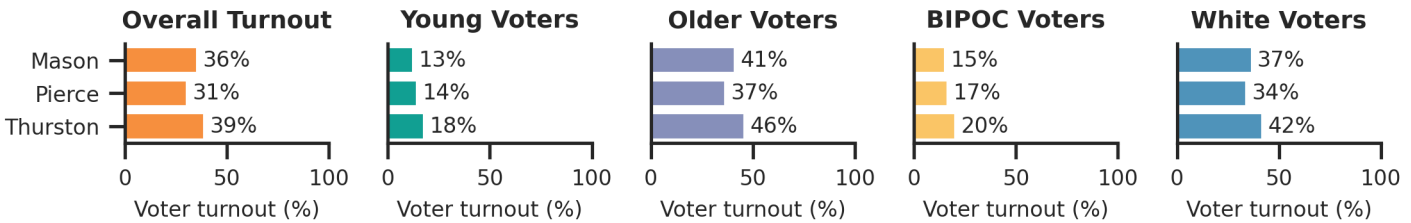
## Overview

### Voter turnout & outreach

There are 778,168 registered voters in the South Puget Sound, including 19,675 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 32.9% – the third lowest in the state. Across the South Puget Sound, voter turnout was highest in Thurston County (39.0%), and lowest in Pierce County (30.5%) and Mason County (35.6%). Young voters make up 26.4% of the electorate in the South Puget Sound (205,505 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 24.0% lower than older voters (15.2% vs 39.2%). The electorate in the South Puget Sound is the third most racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for 18.1% of all registered voters, yet turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 19.0% lower than White voters (17.3% vs 36.3%). From mid-August to mid-November, six WCA Data Hub partners were active in the South Puget Sound, making a total of 74,431 contact attempts to 47,356 unique voters (~0.10 attempts per voter). This included 277 door knocks, 976 phone calls, 47,048 text messages, and 26,130 mailers.

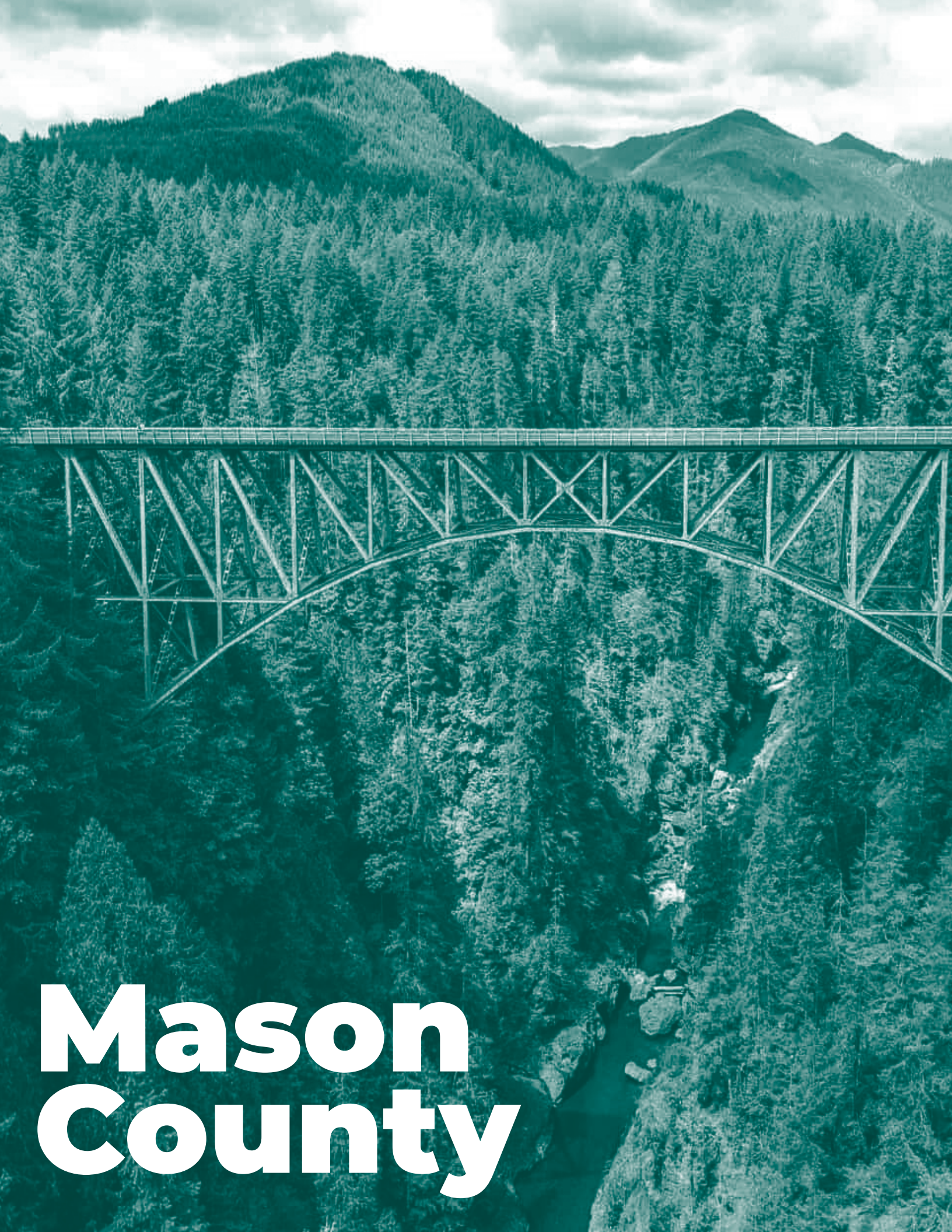


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in South Puget Sound for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.



**Fig 2** Voter turnout by county in South Puget Sound for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.



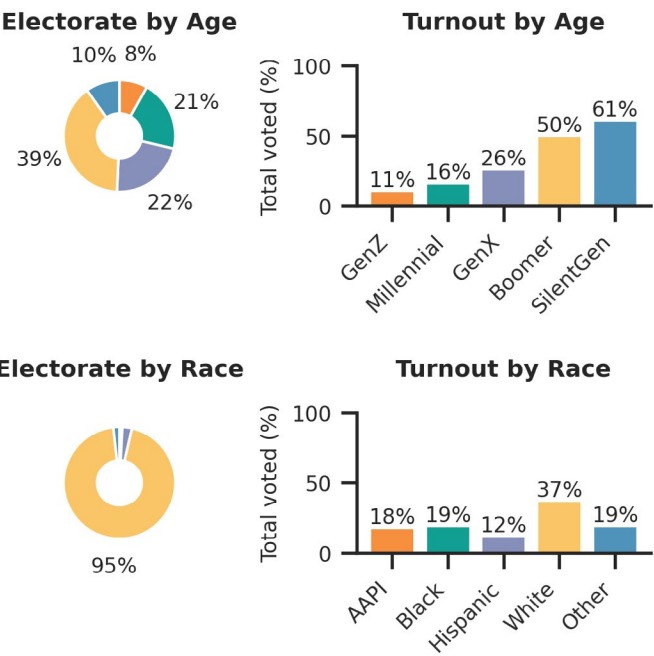

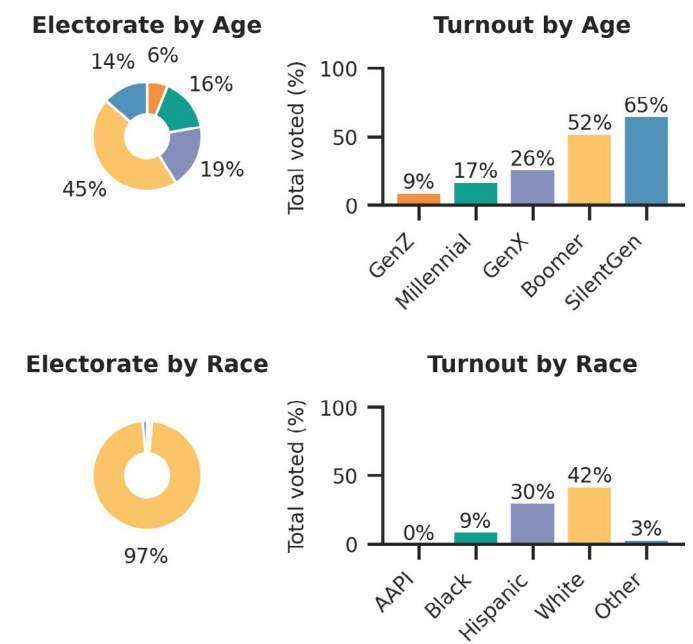
**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mason County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

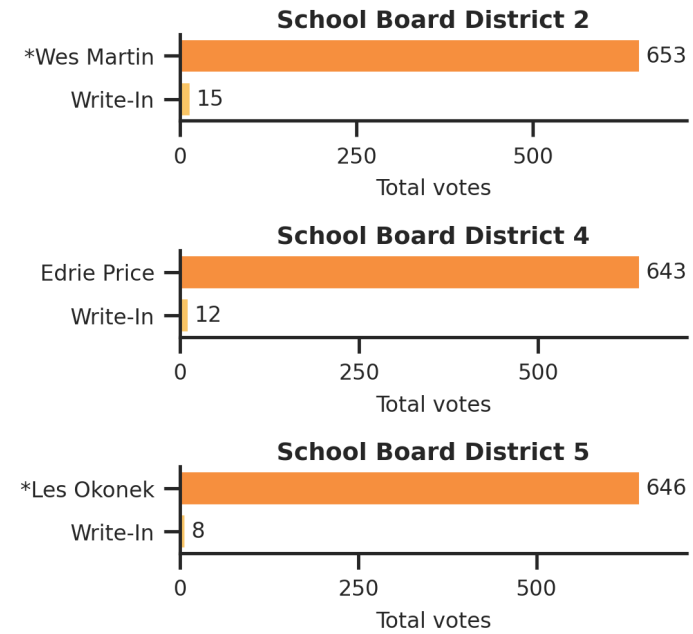

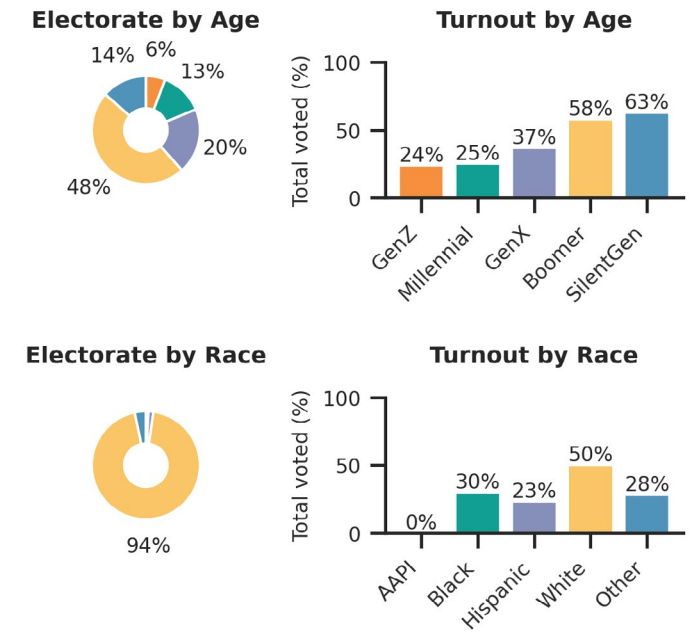


**Fig 2** Election results in Grapeview School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

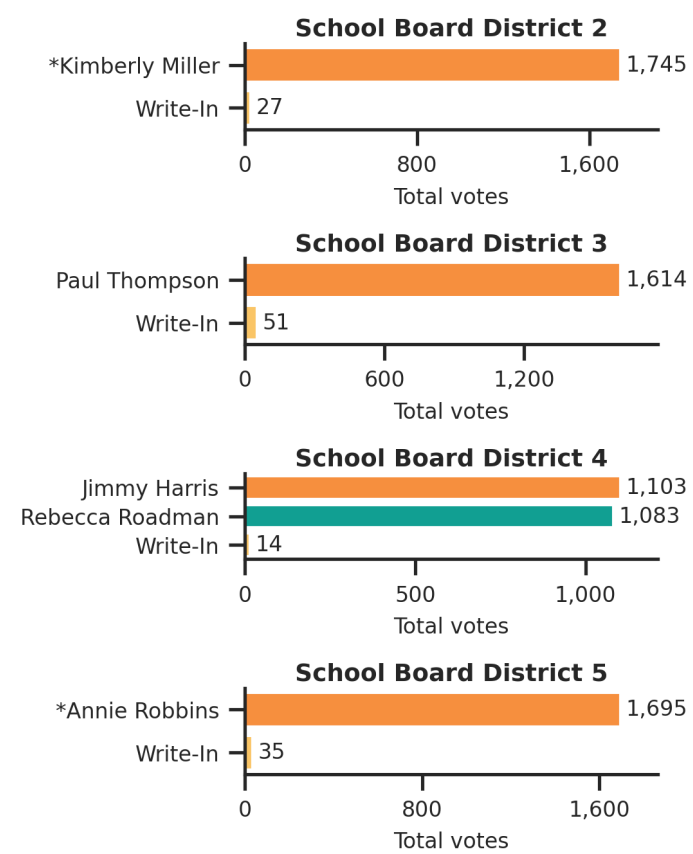

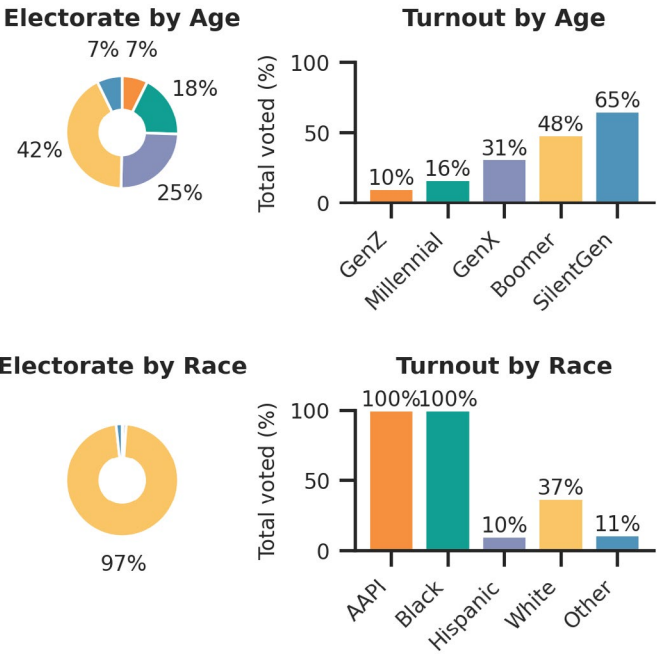


**Fig 2** Election results in Hood Canal School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

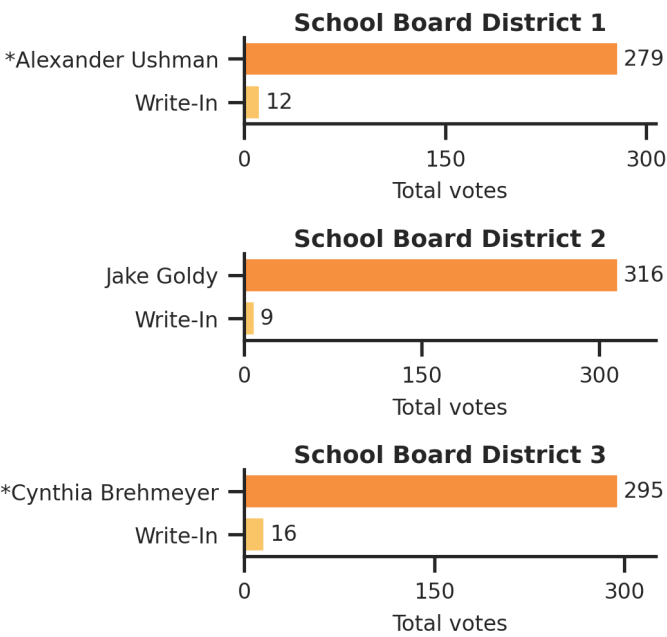

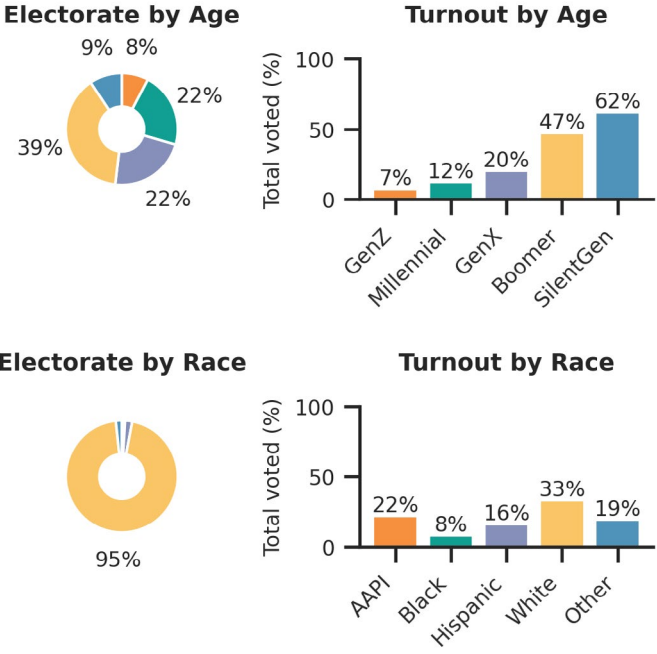


**Fig 2** Election results in Mary M. Knight School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

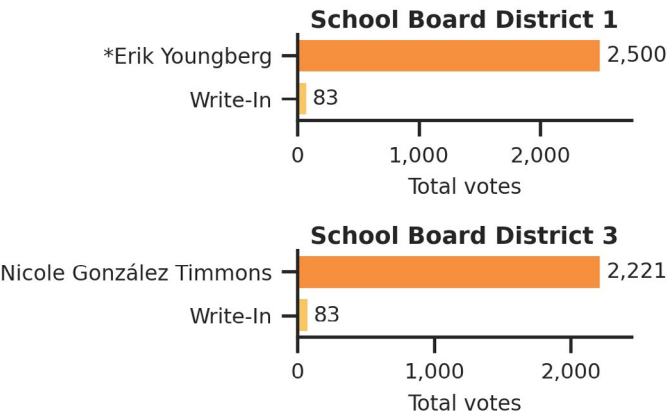

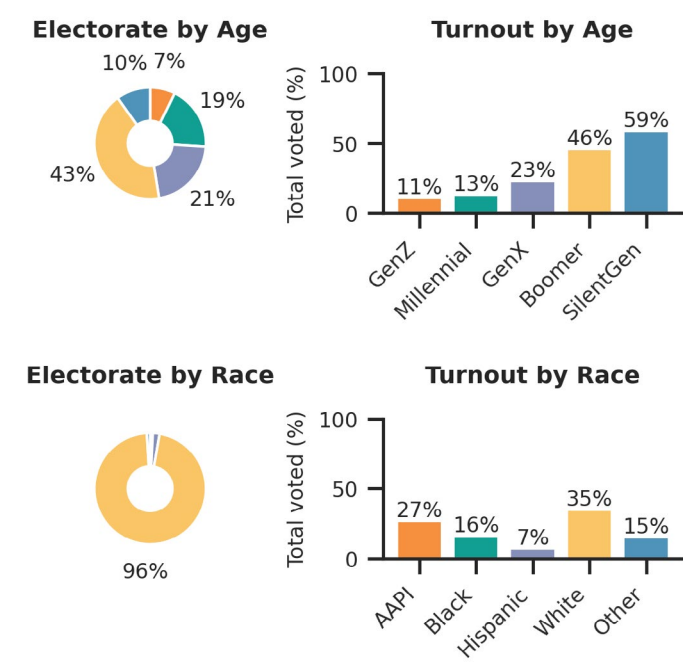


**Fig 2** Election results in North Mason School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

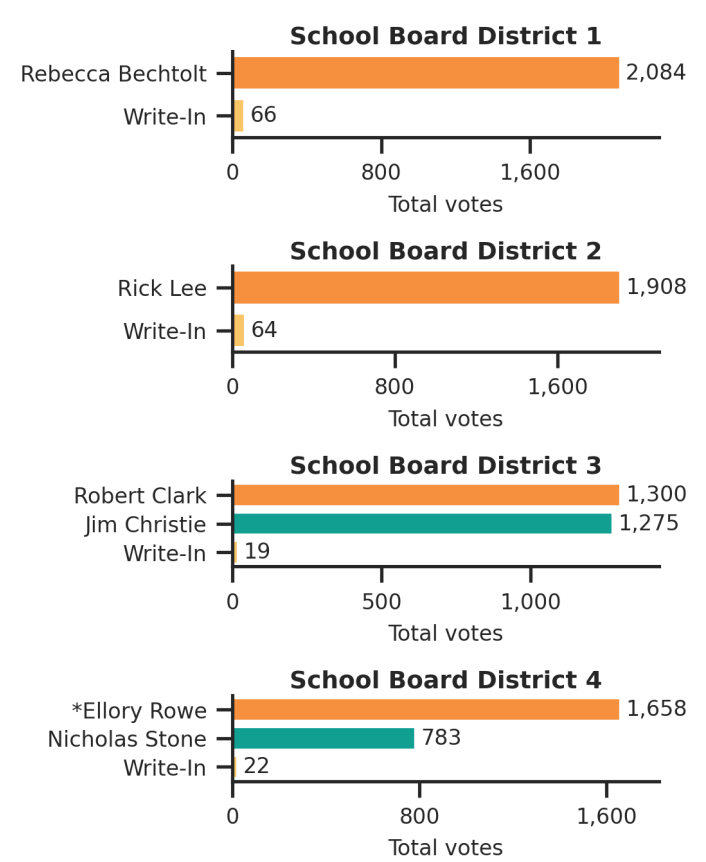

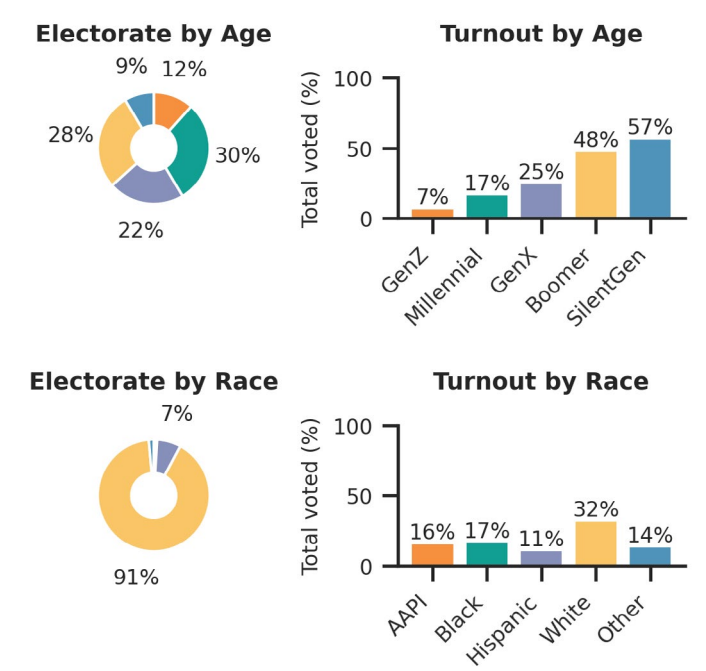

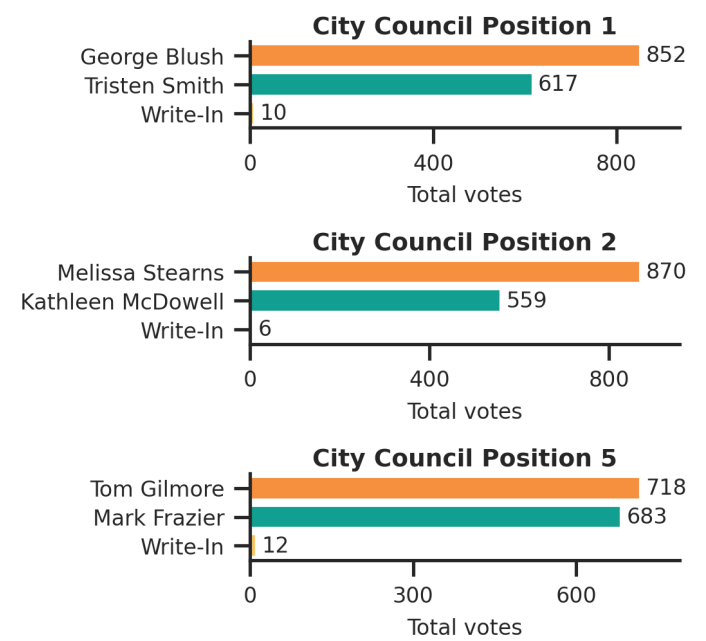

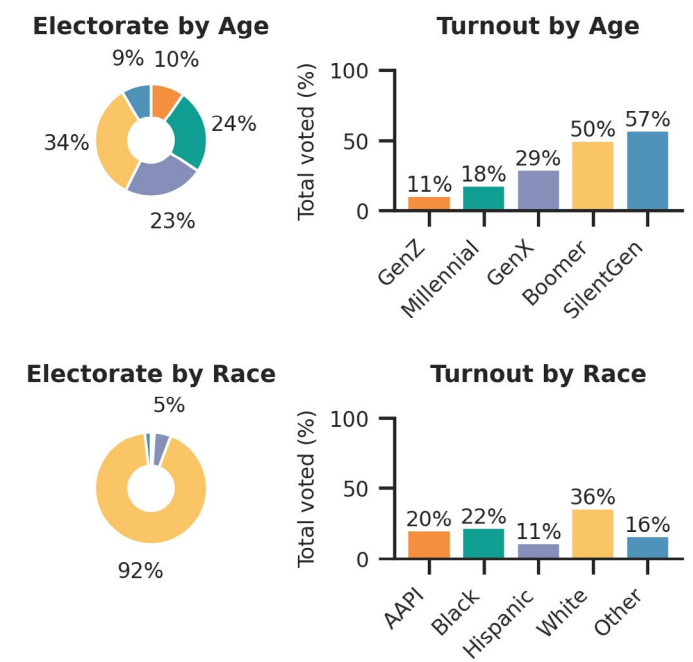


**Fig 2** Election results in Shelton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

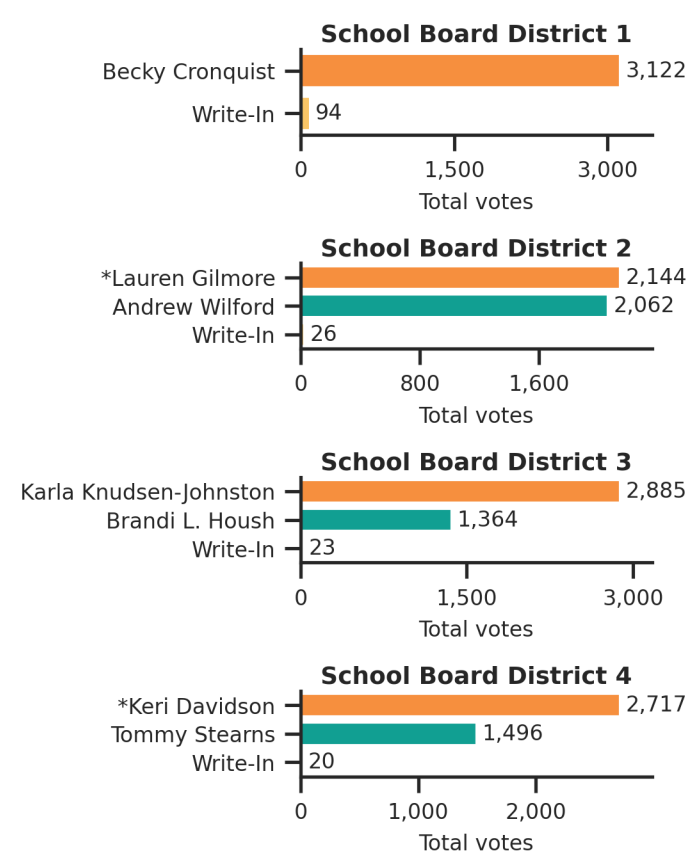

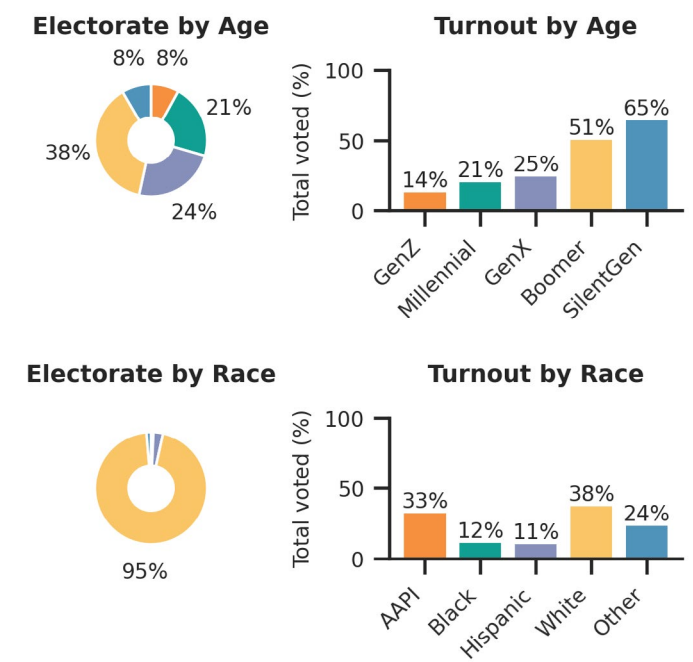


**Fig 2** Election results in Shelton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

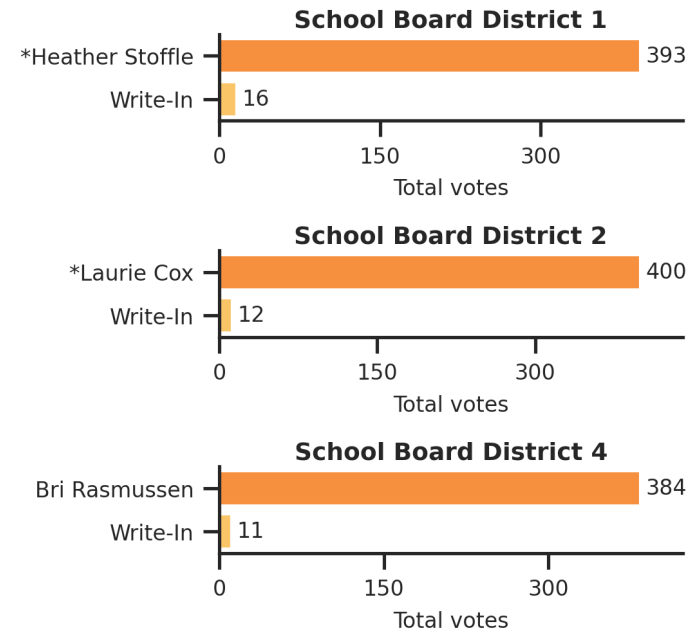

**Fig 2** Election results in Southside School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





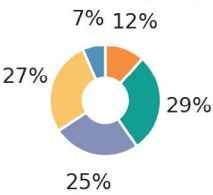

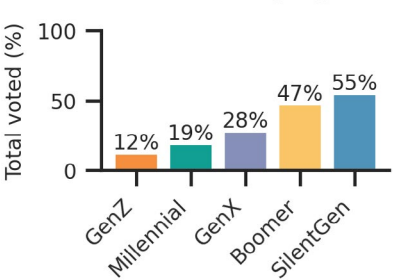

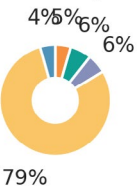
Electorate by Age



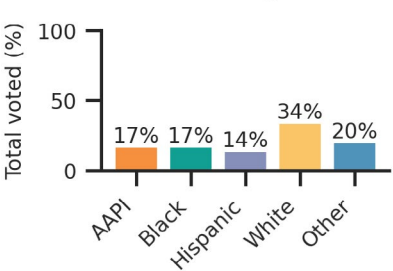

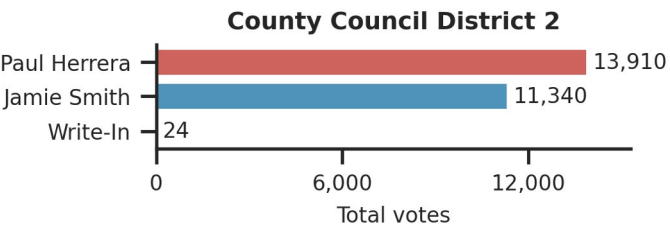

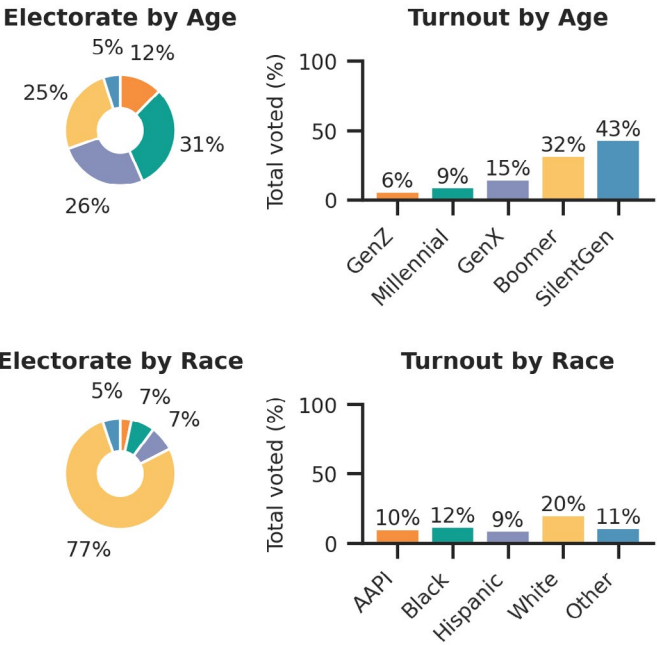
**Fig 2** Election results in Pierce County for the 2023 General Election. Asterisks indicate incumbents.

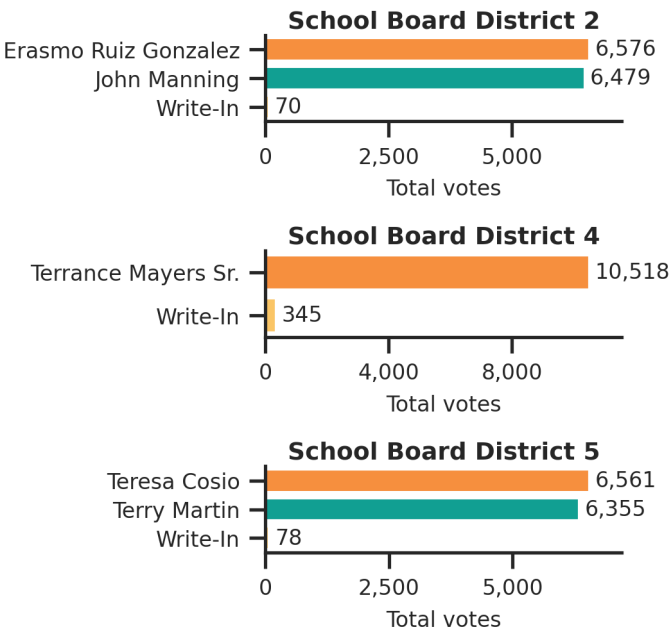

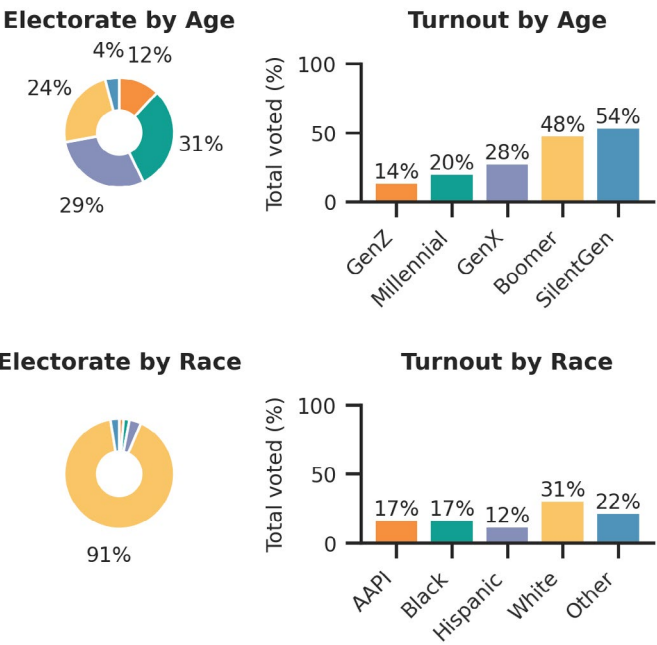


**Fig 2** Election results in Bethel School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

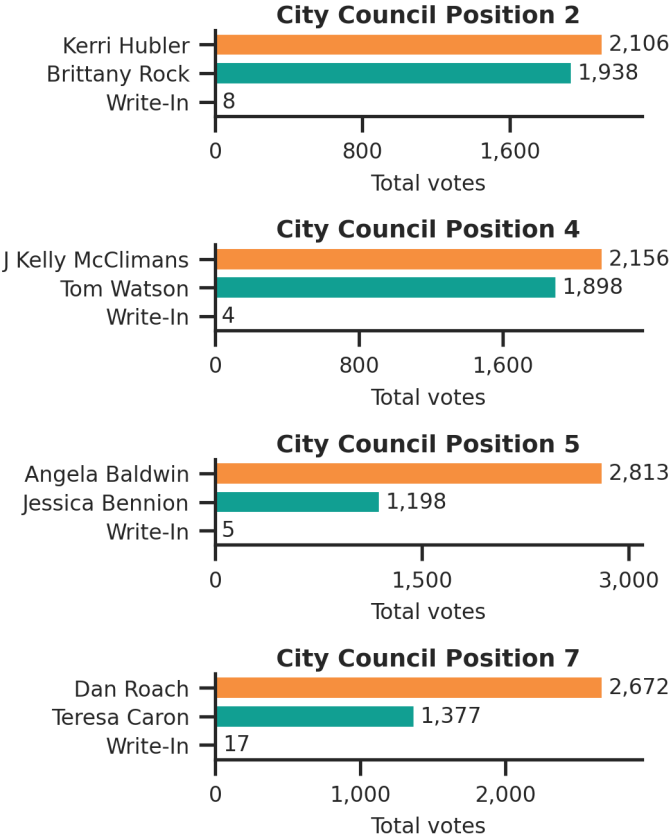

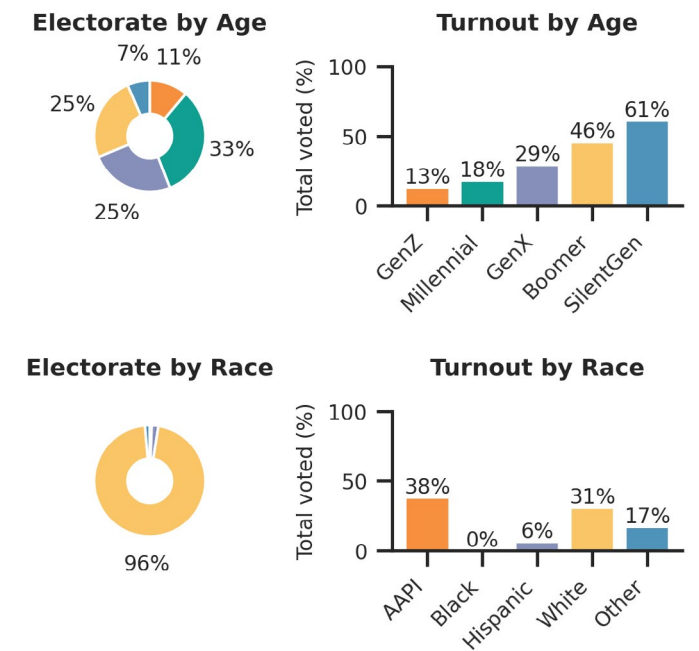


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Buckley for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

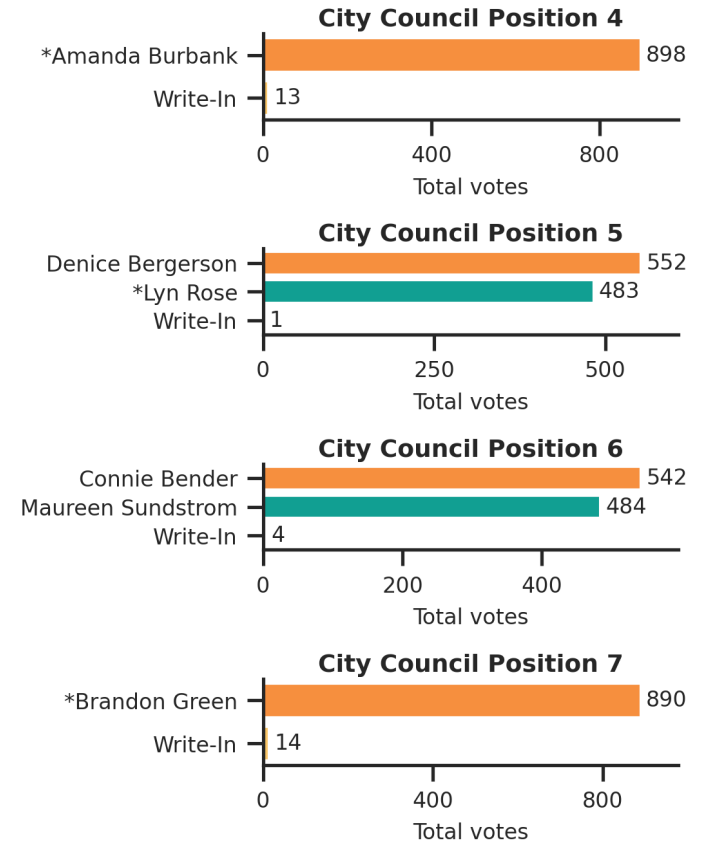


Fig 2 Election results in Buckley for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

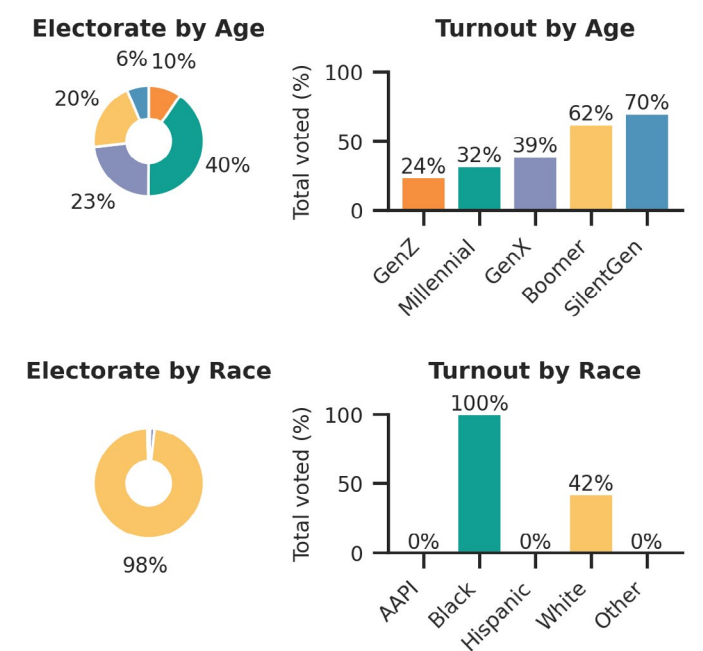


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Carbonado for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

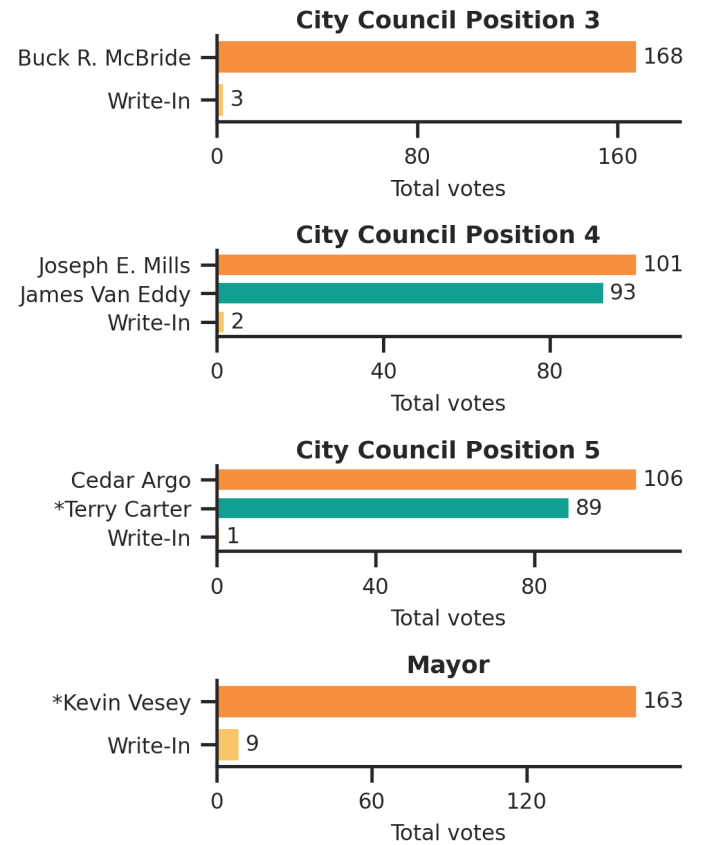
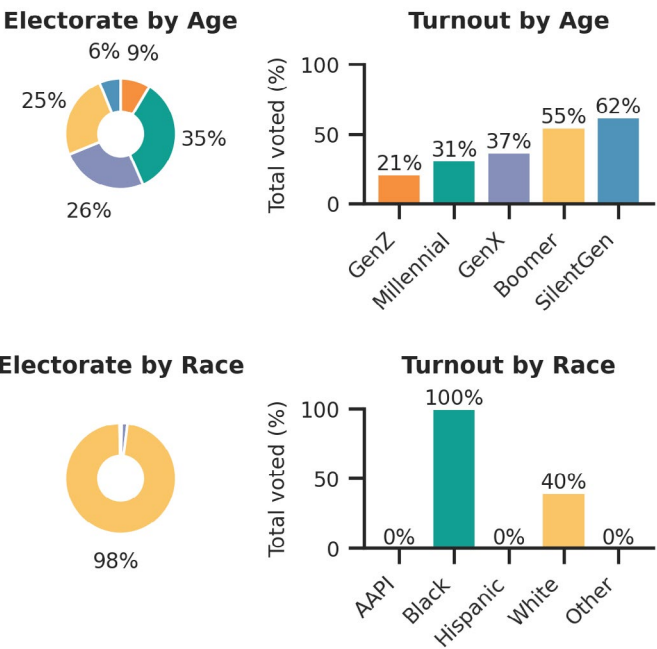


Fig 2 Election results in Carbonado for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

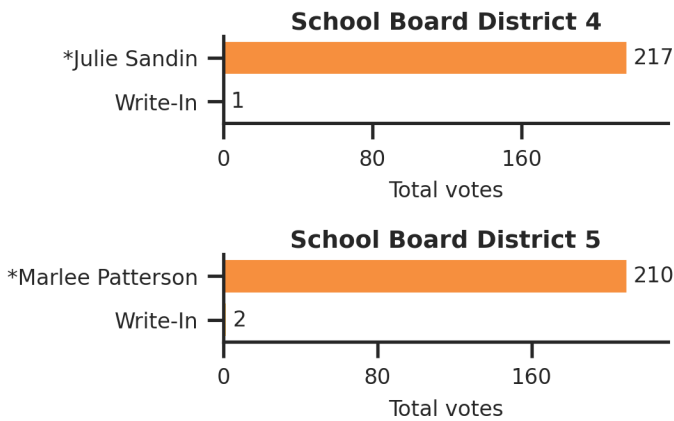

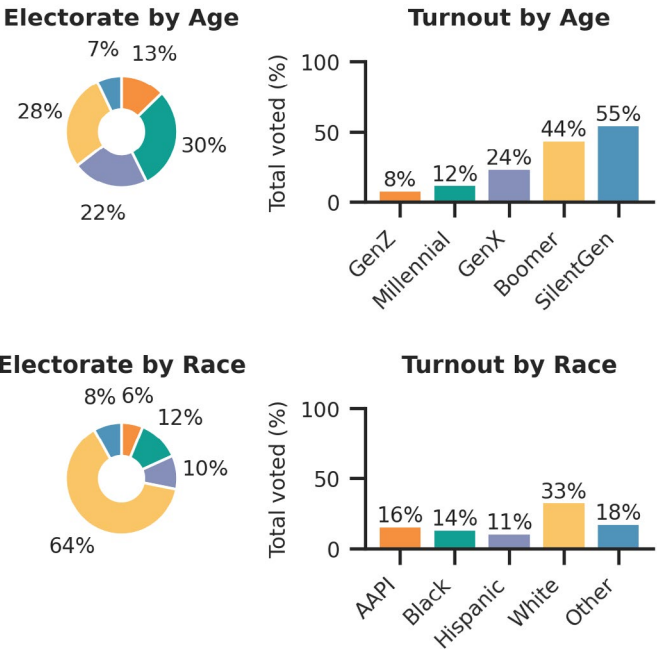


**Fig 2** Election results in Carbonado School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

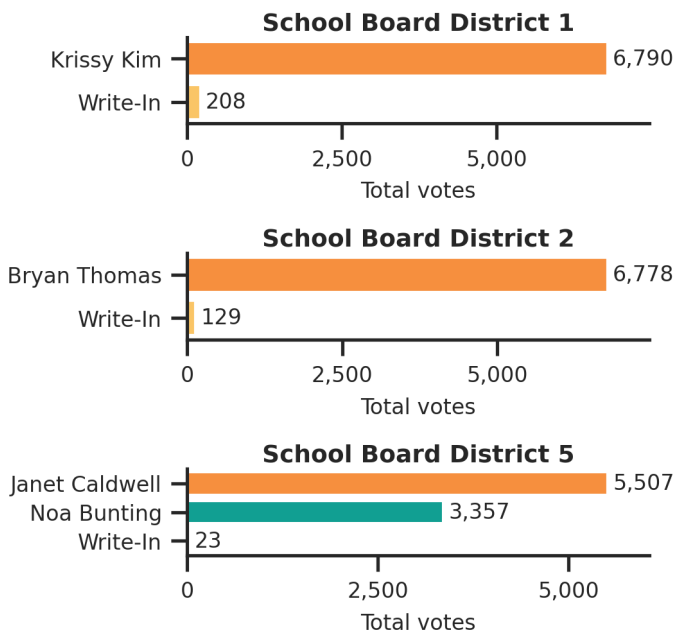

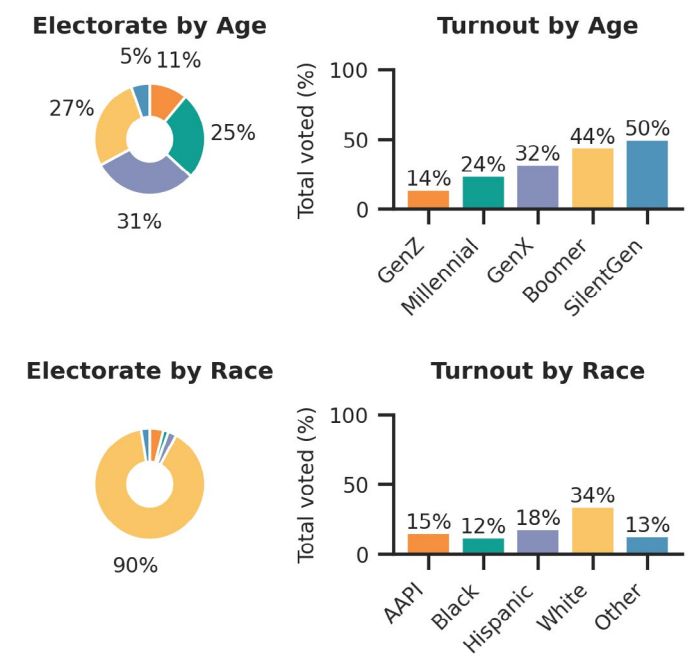


**Fig 2** Election results in Clover Park School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

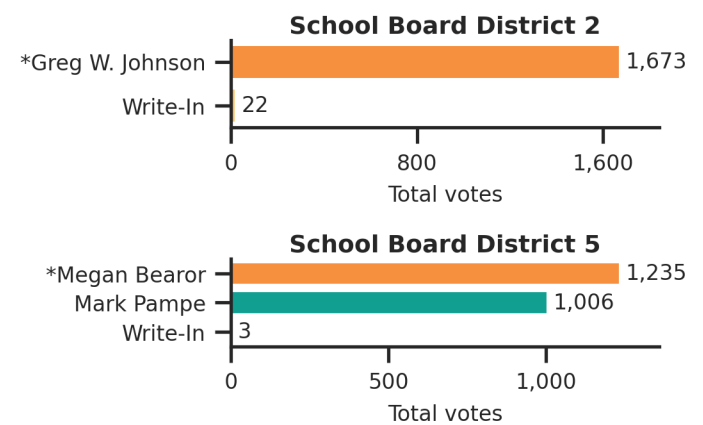

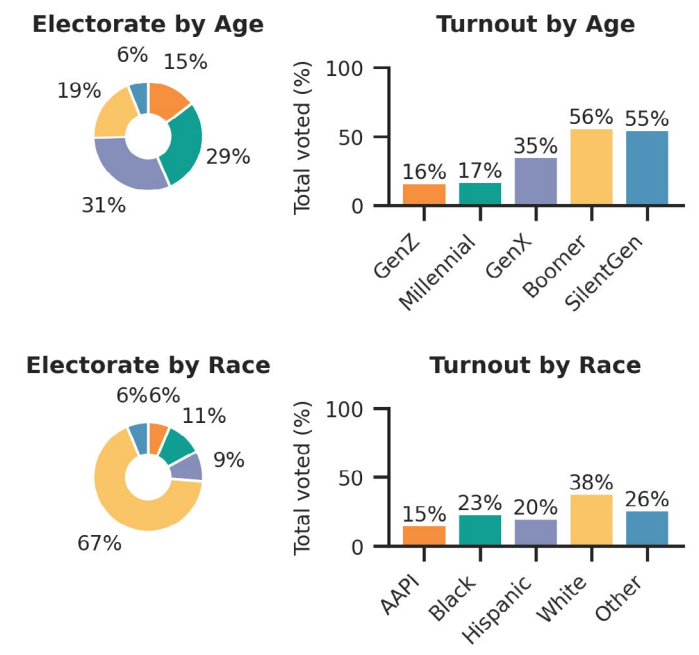

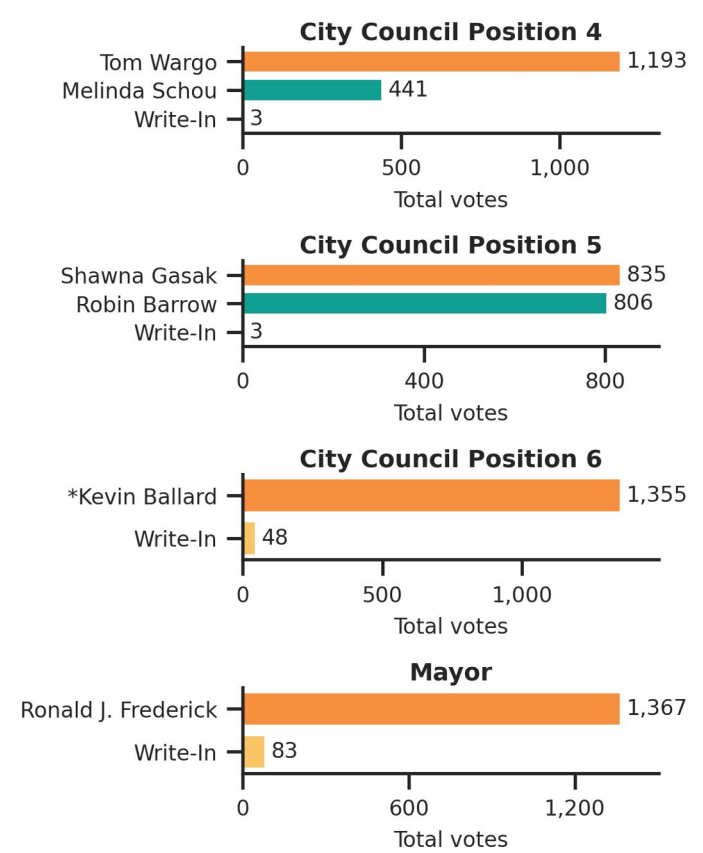

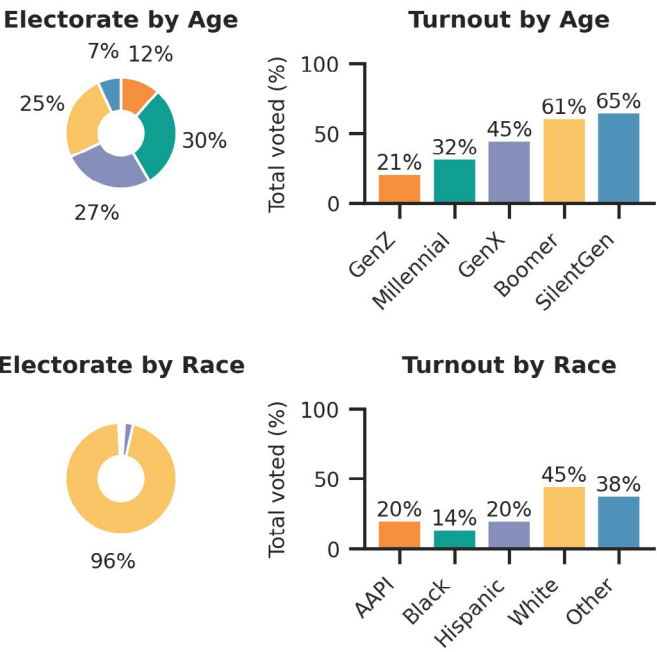


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Eatonville for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

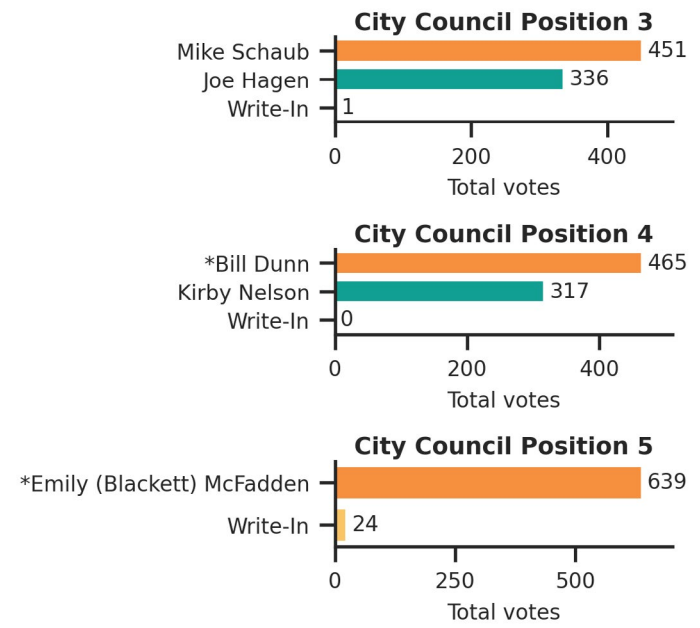


Fig 2 Election results in Eatonville for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

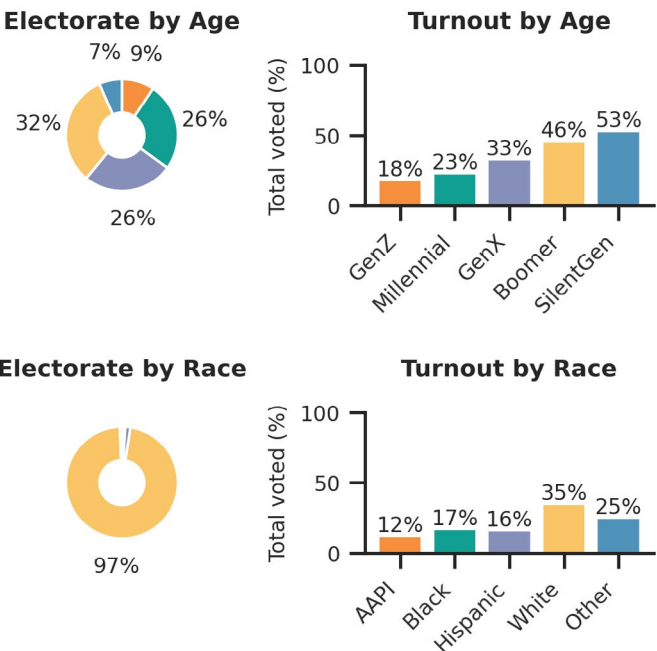


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Eatonville School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

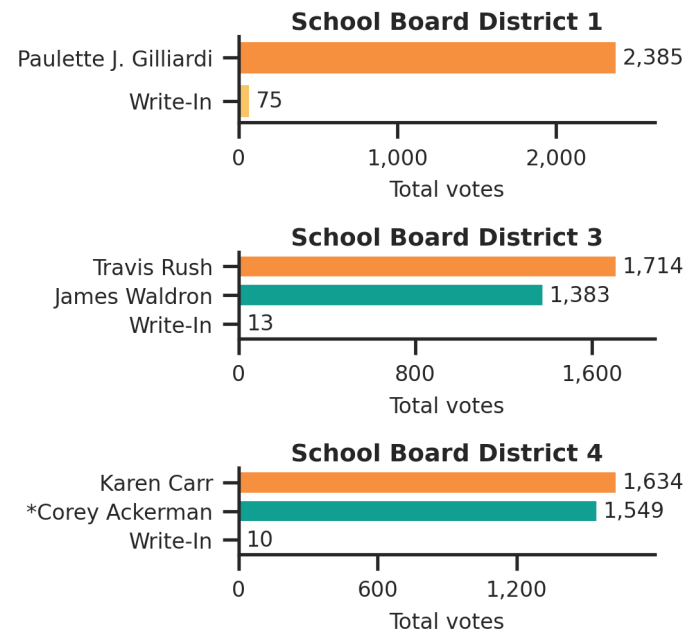


Fig 2 Election results in Eatonville School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

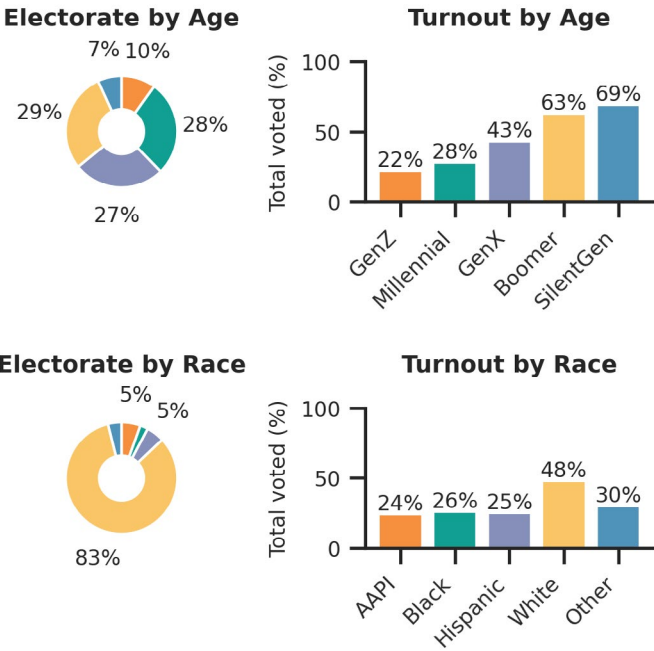


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Edgewood for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

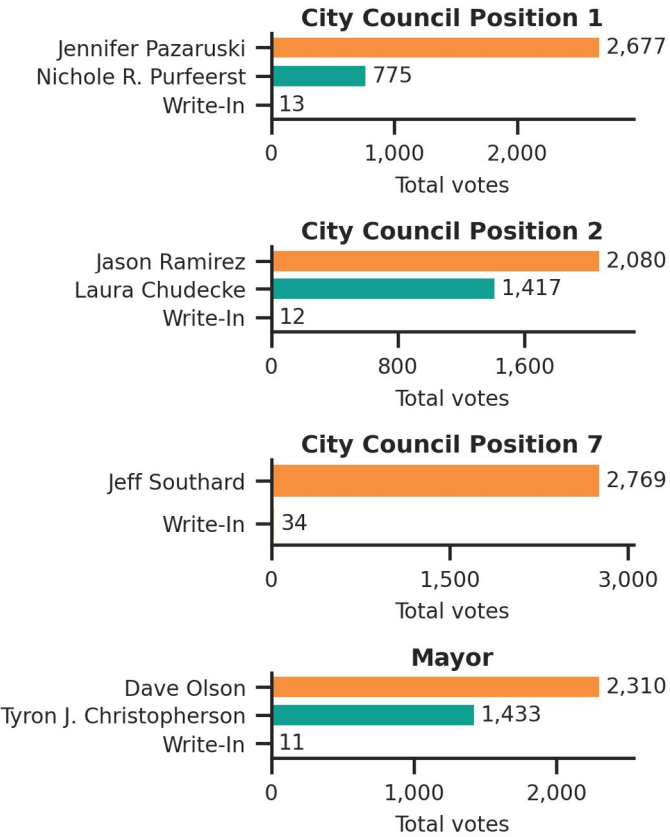


Fig 2 Election results in Edgewood for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

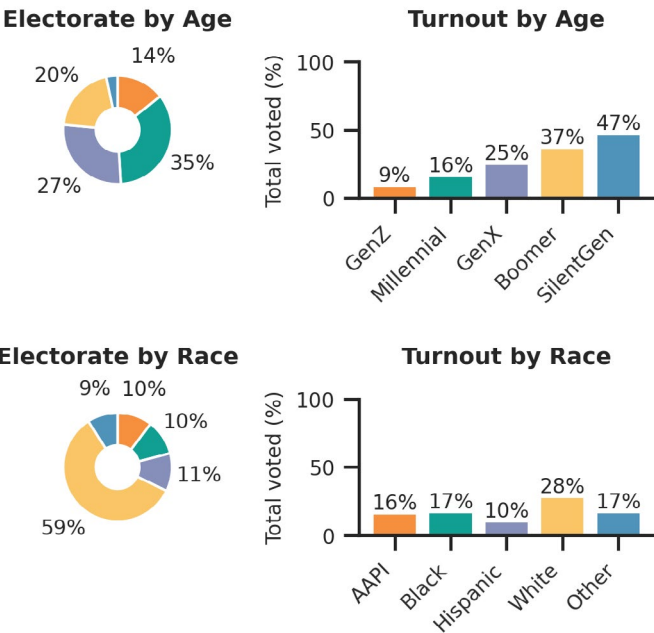


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Fife for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

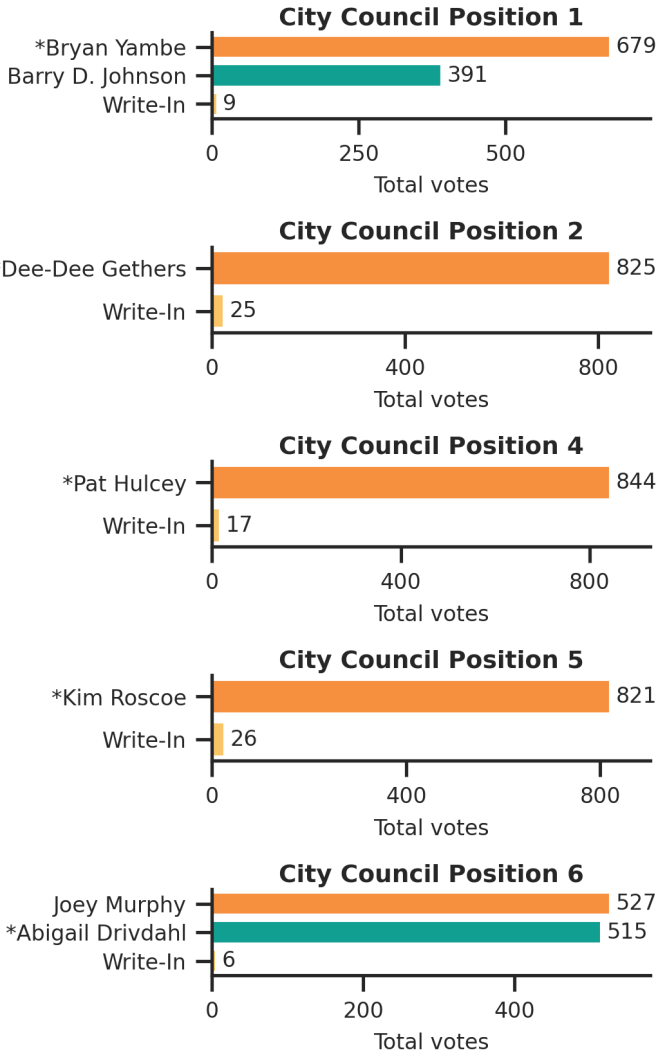
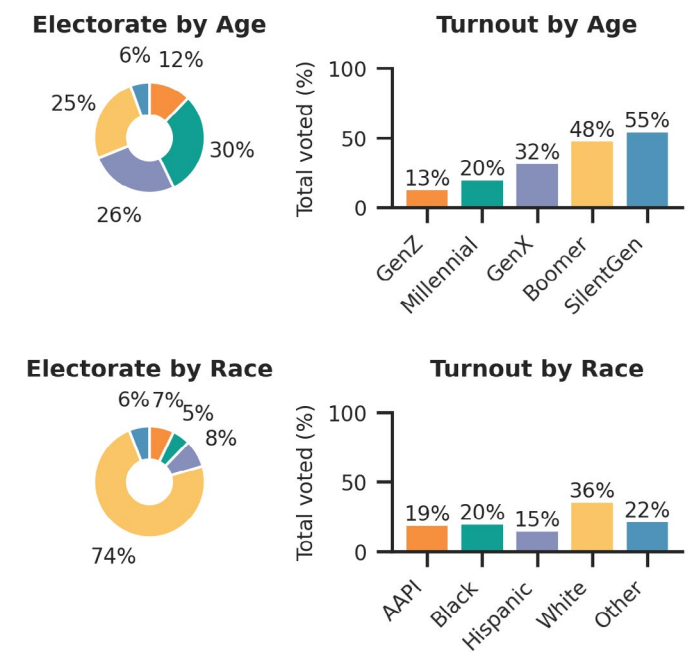


Fig 2 Election results in Fife for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

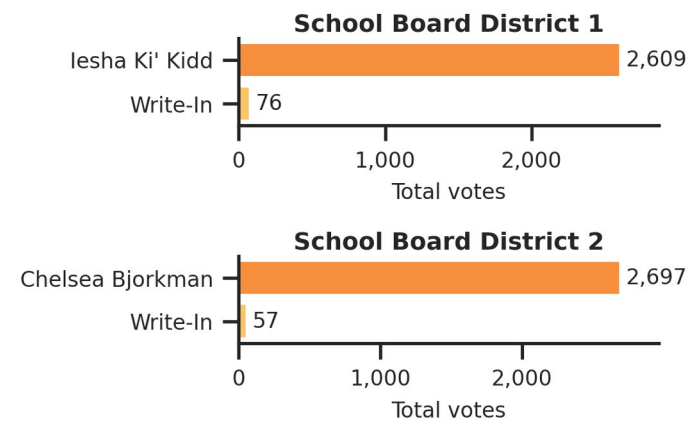

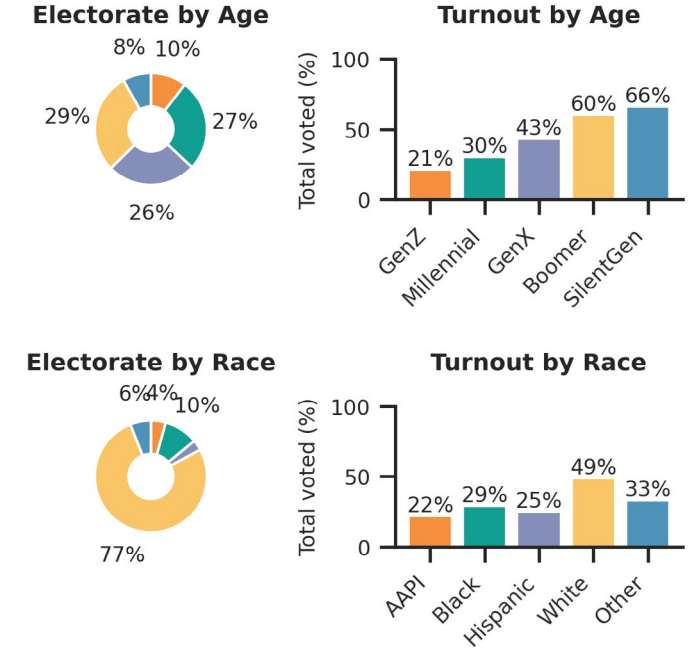


**Fig 2** Election results in Fife School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

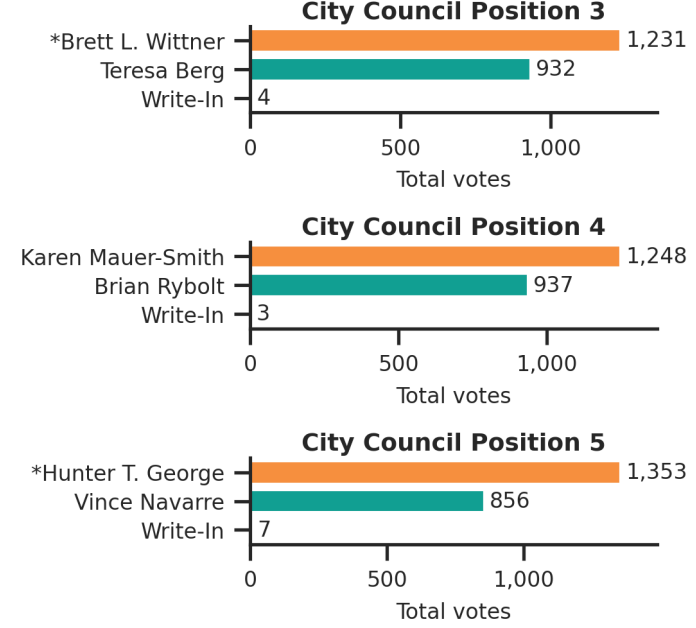

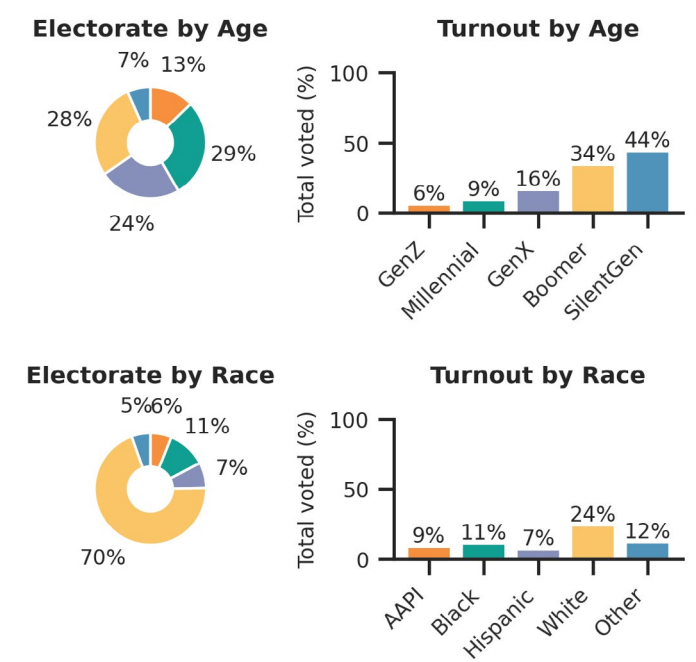


**Fig 2** Election results in Fircrest for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

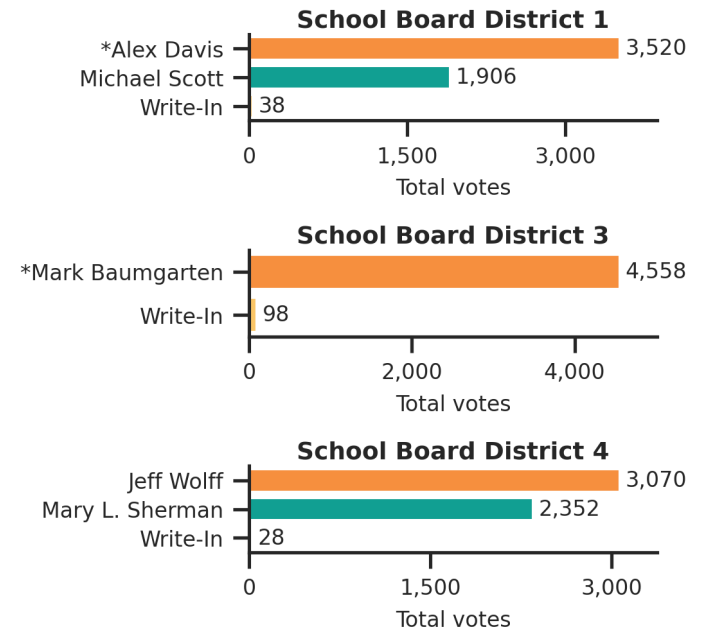

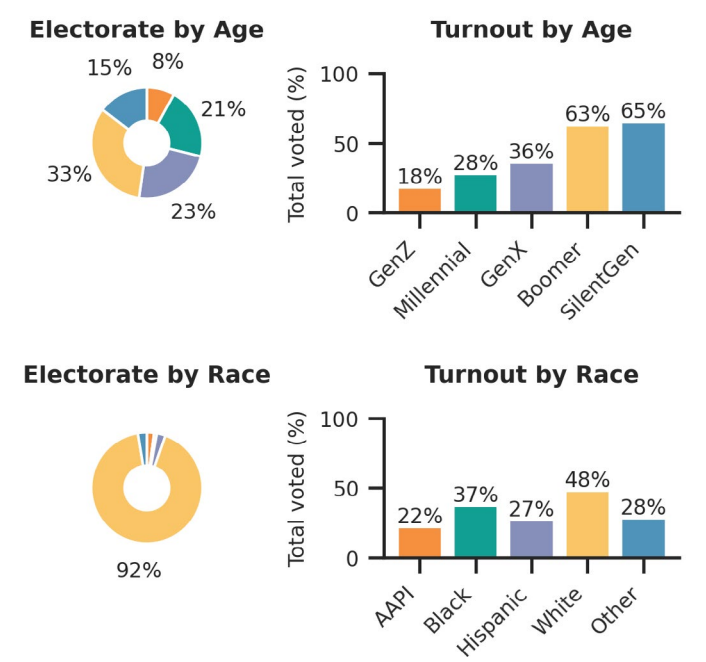

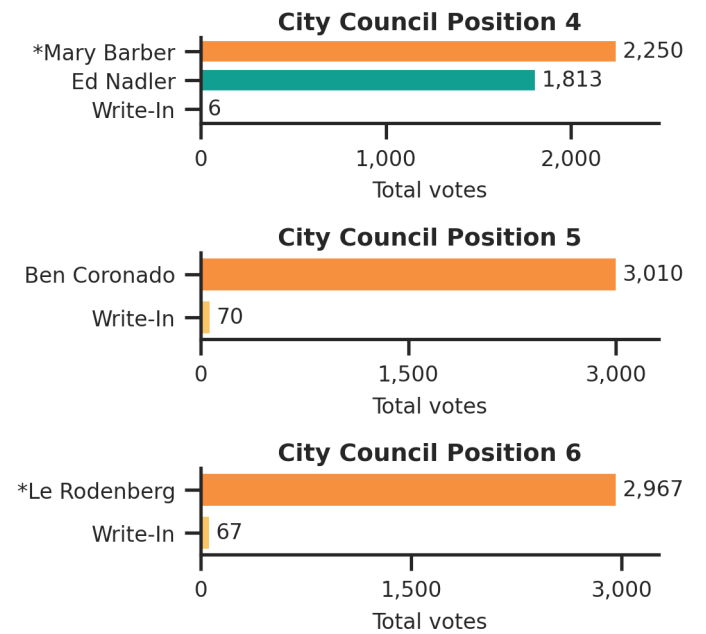

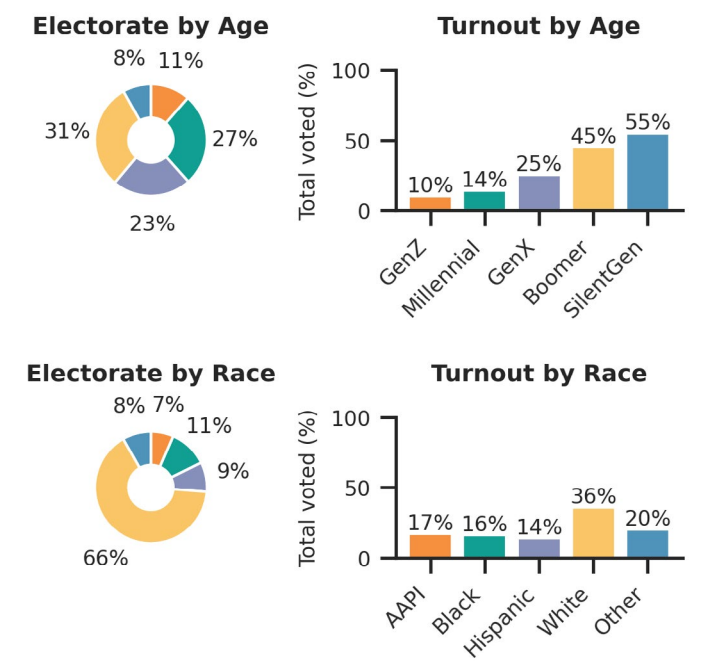

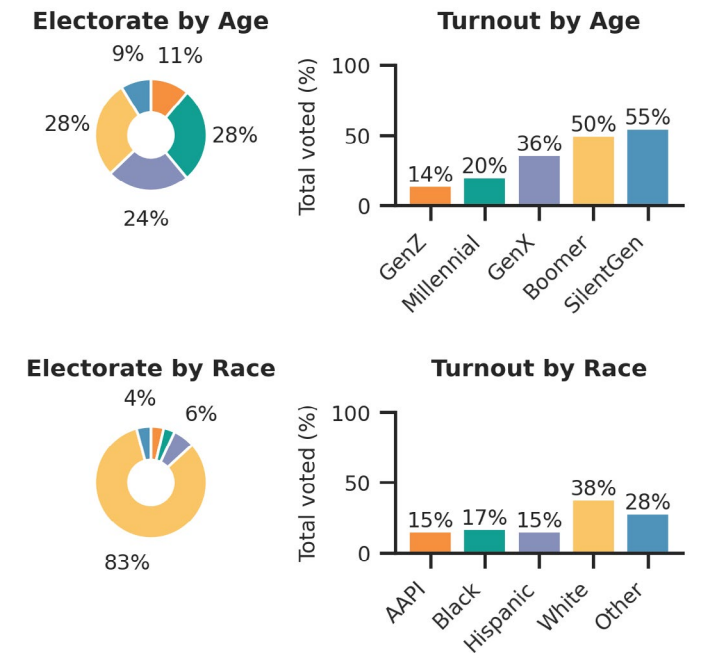

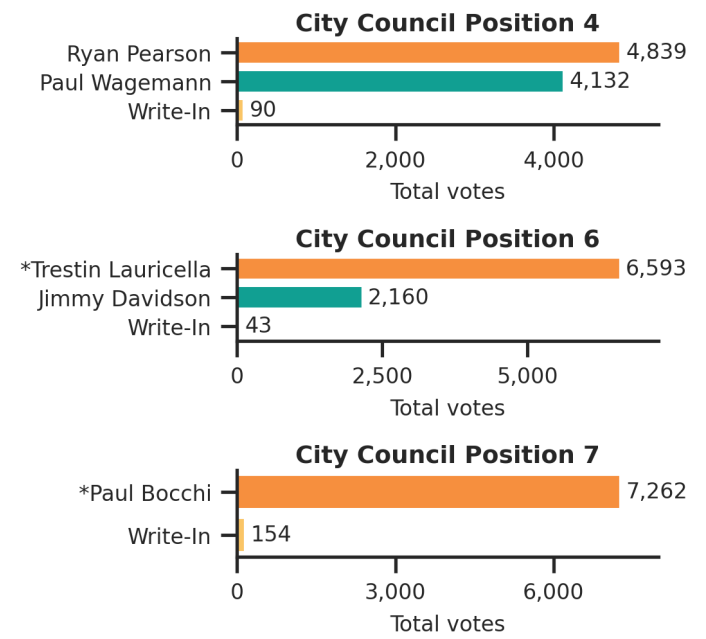

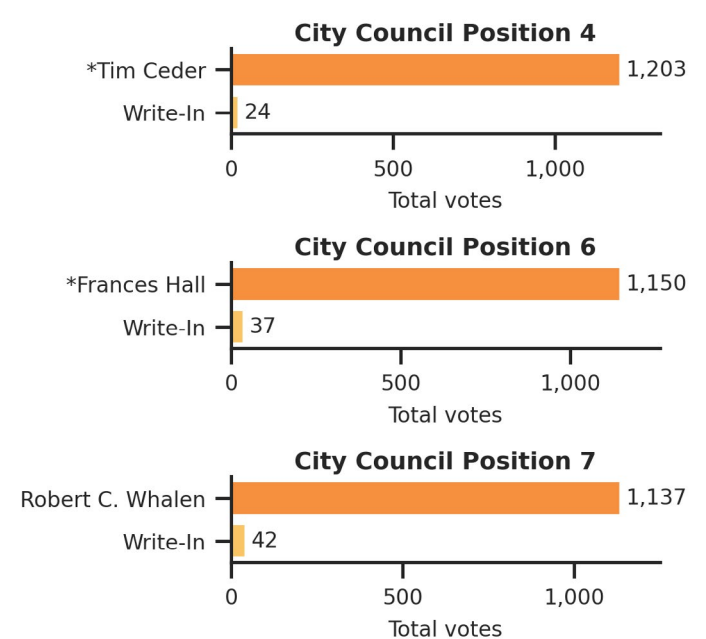

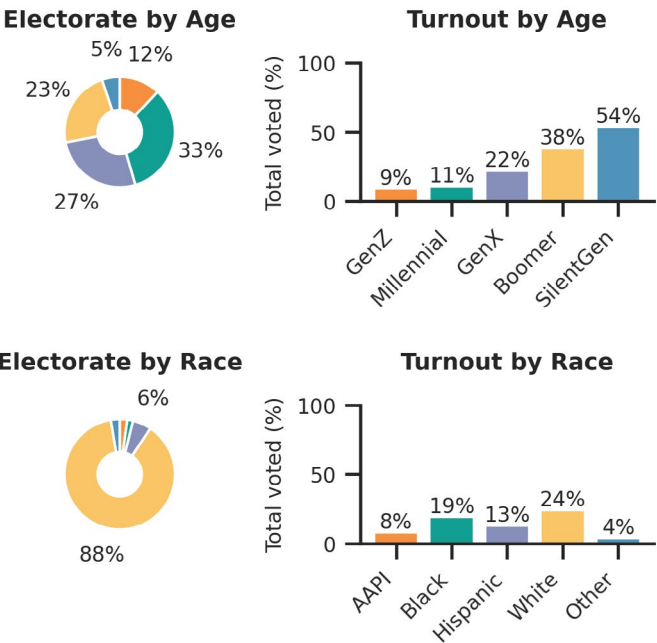


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Orting for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

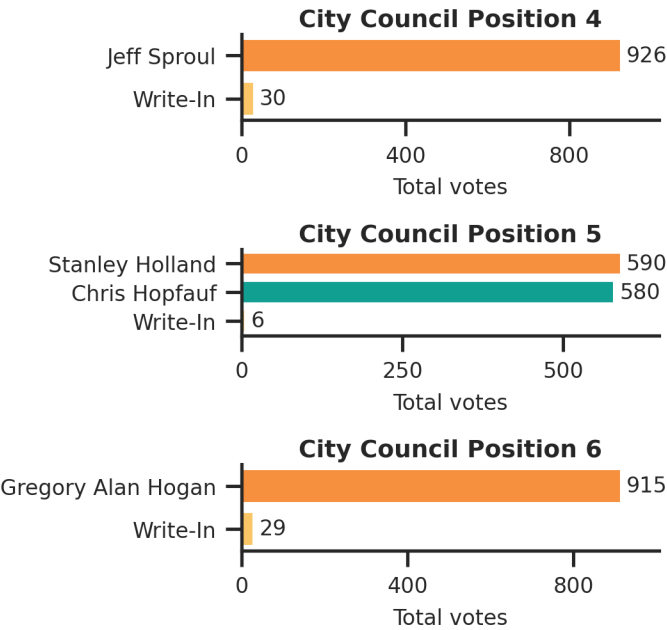


Fig 2 Election results in Orting for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

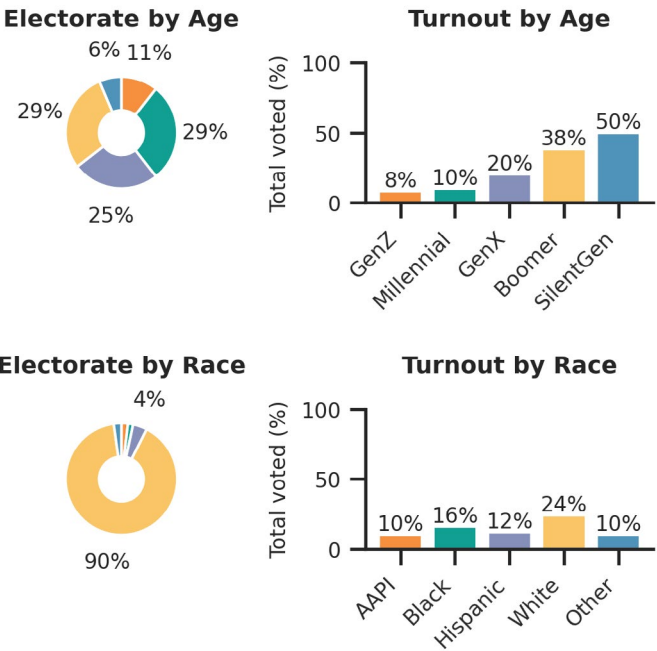


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Orting School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

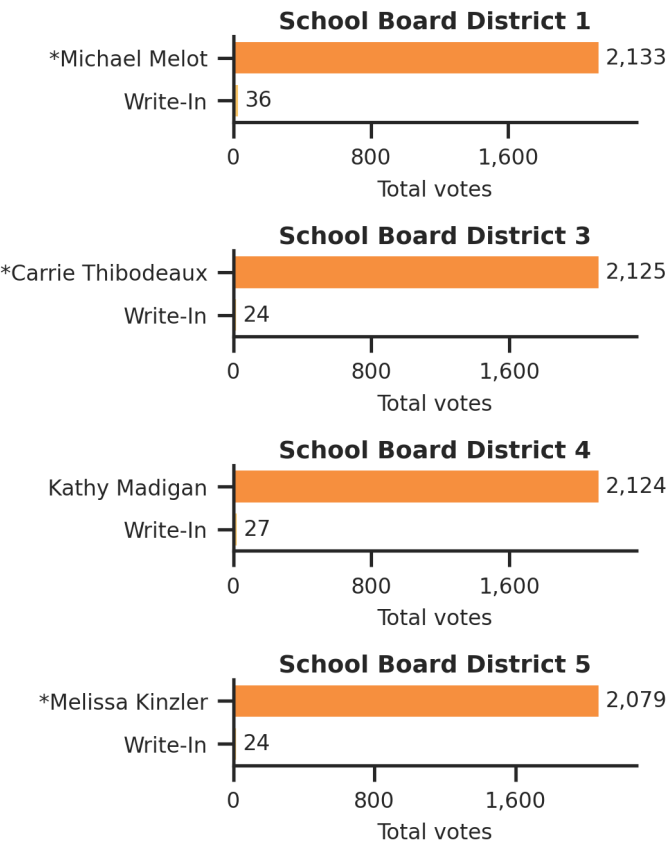
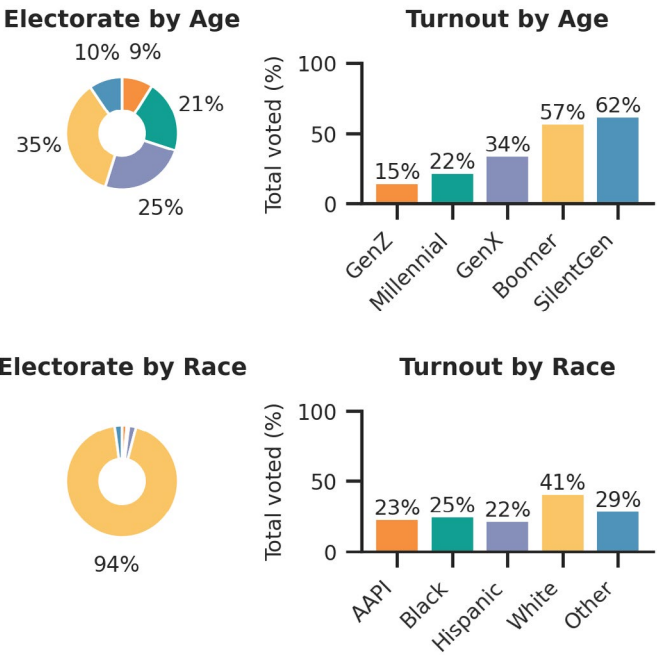


Fig 2 Election results in Orting School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

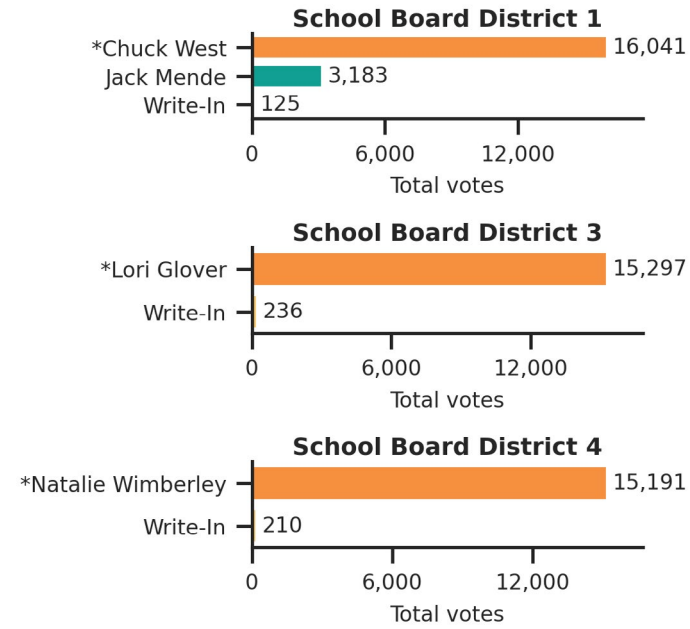

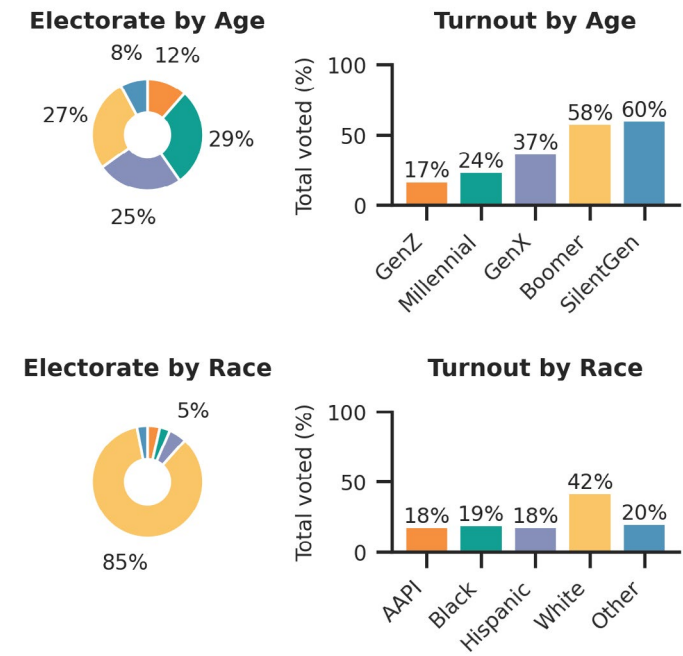

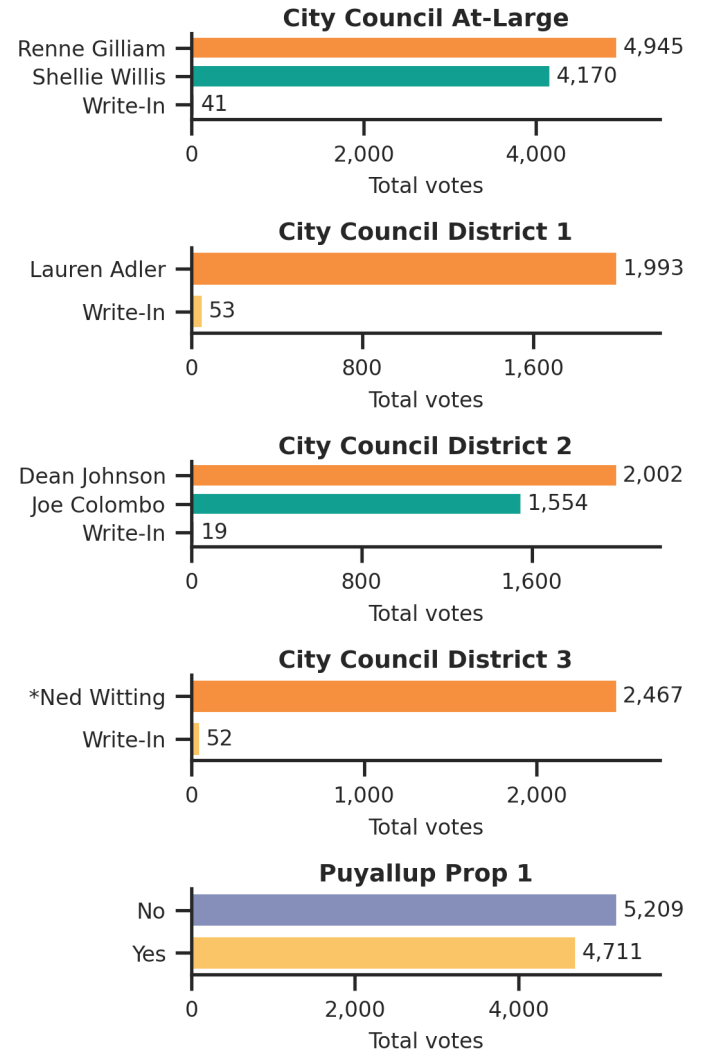


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Puyallup for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

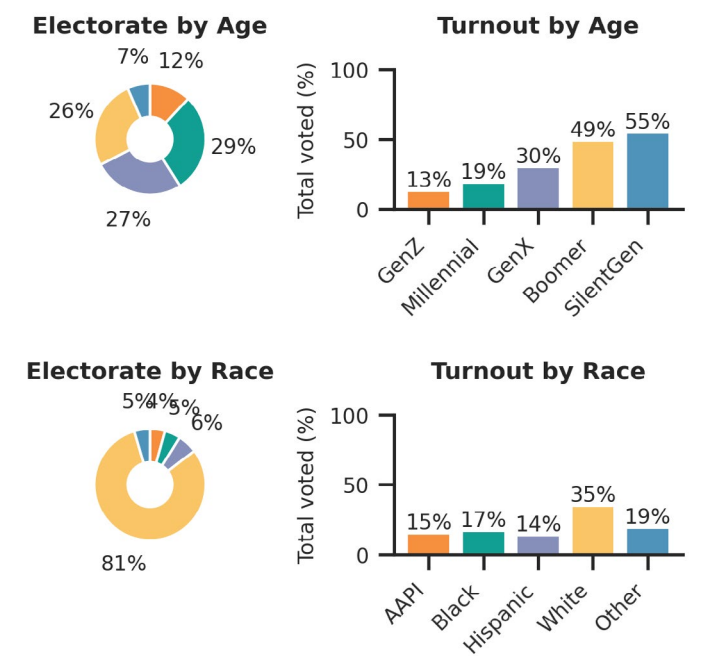


**Fig 2** Election results in Puyallup for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

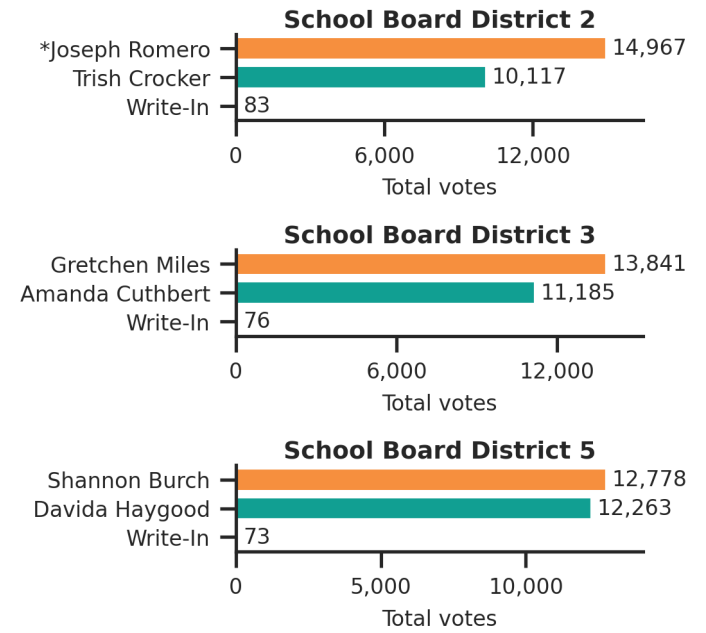

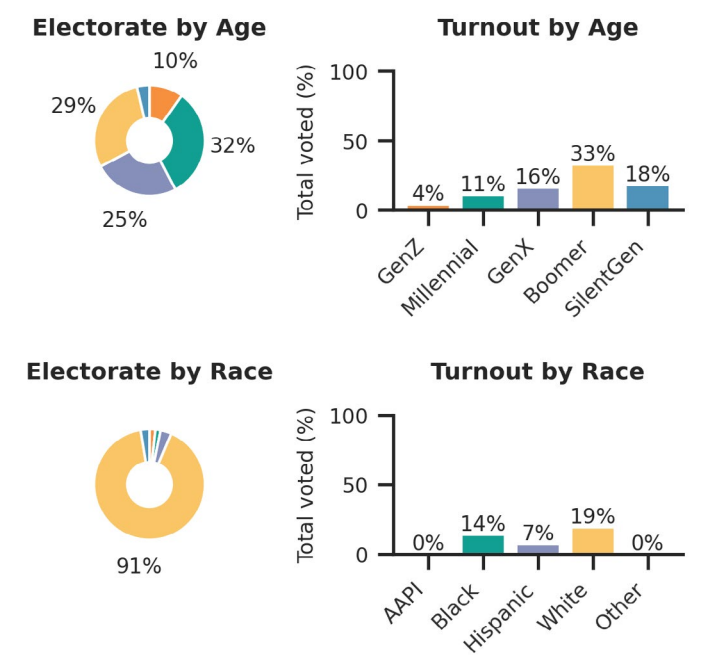

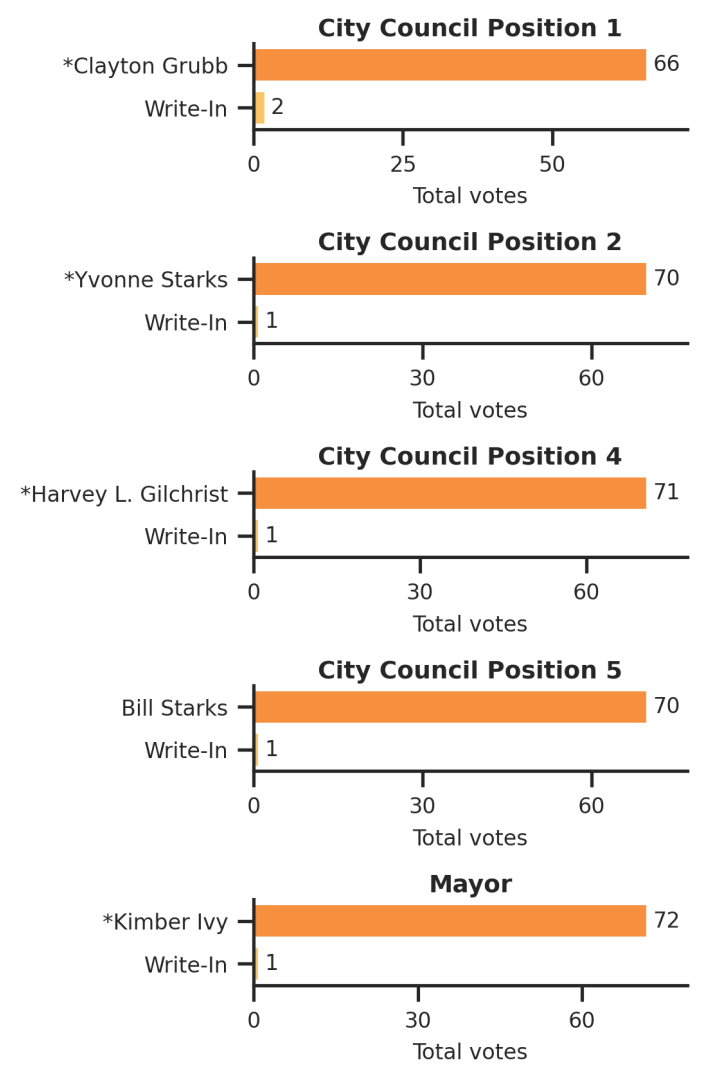


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Roy for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

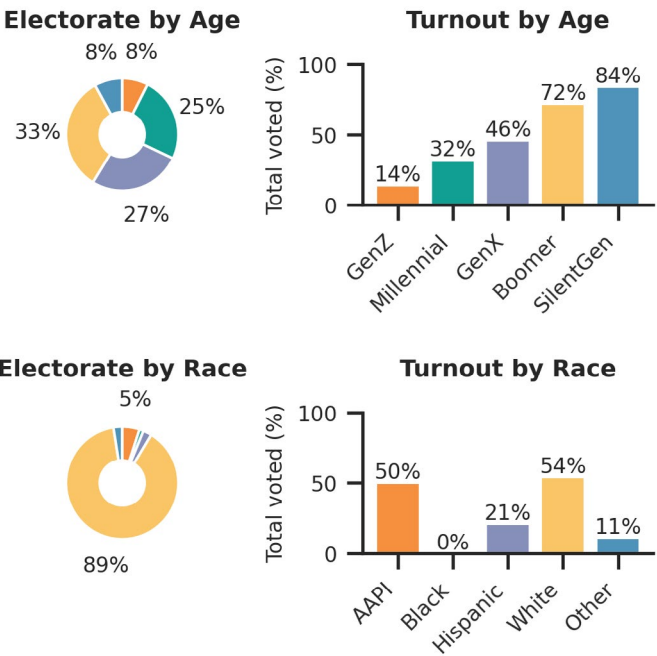

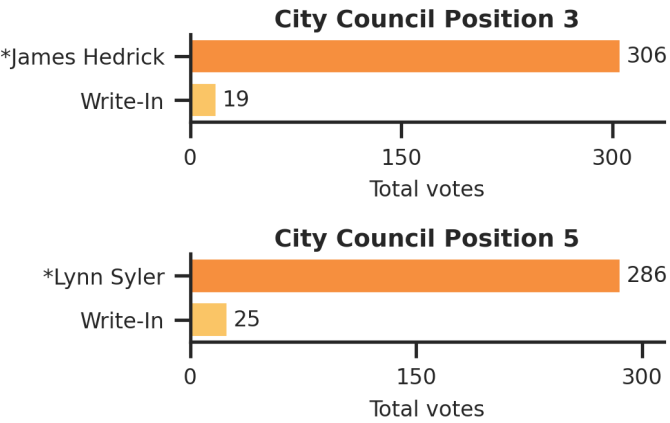

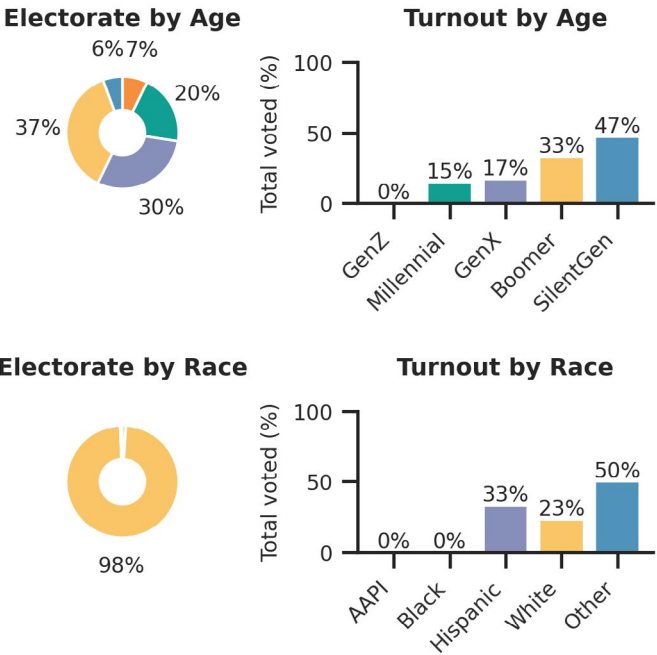

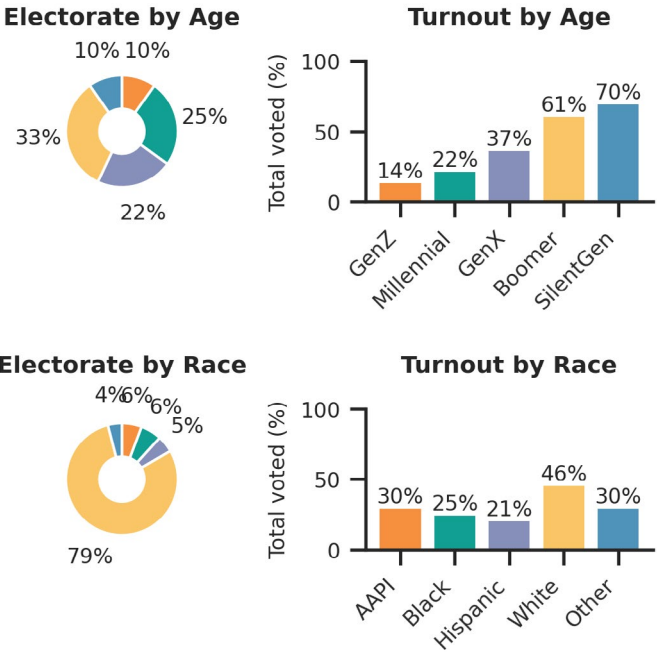


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Steilacoom for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

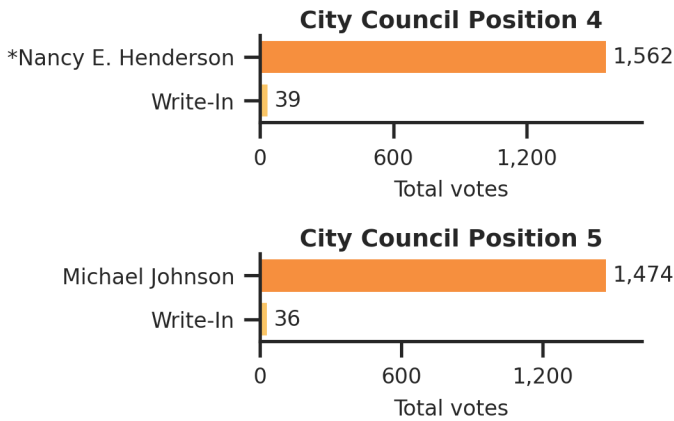


Fig 2 Election results in Steilacoom for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

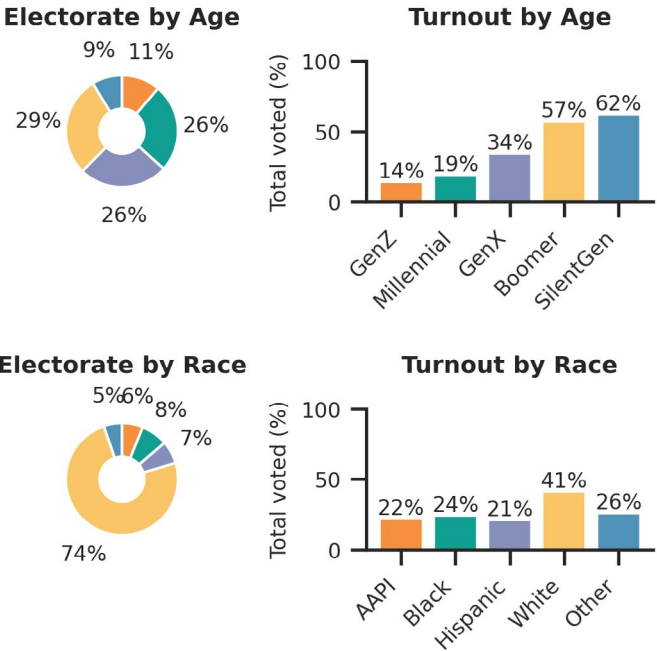


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Steilacoom School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

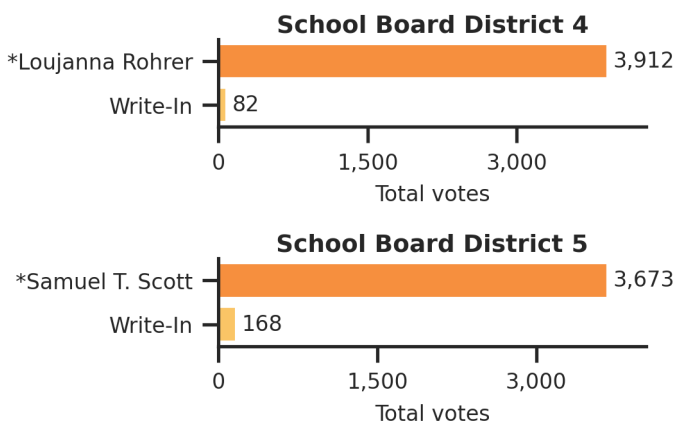


Fig 2 Election results in Steilacoom School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

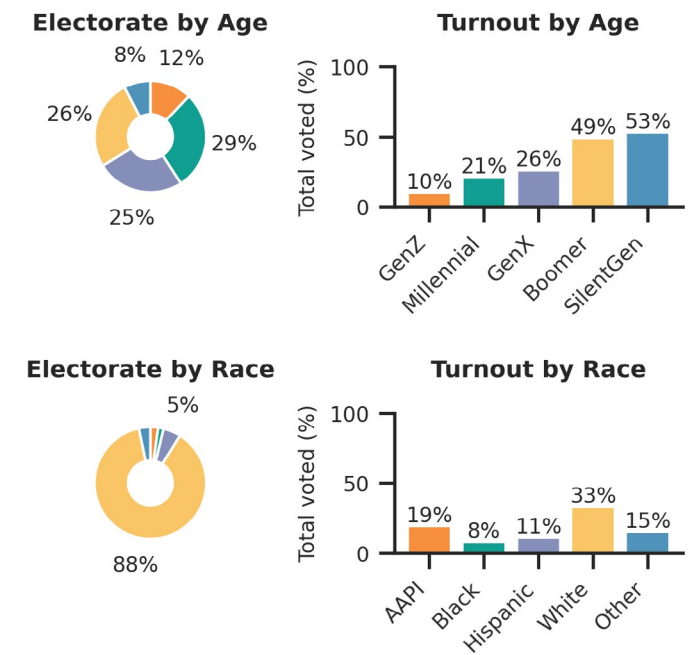


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sumner for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

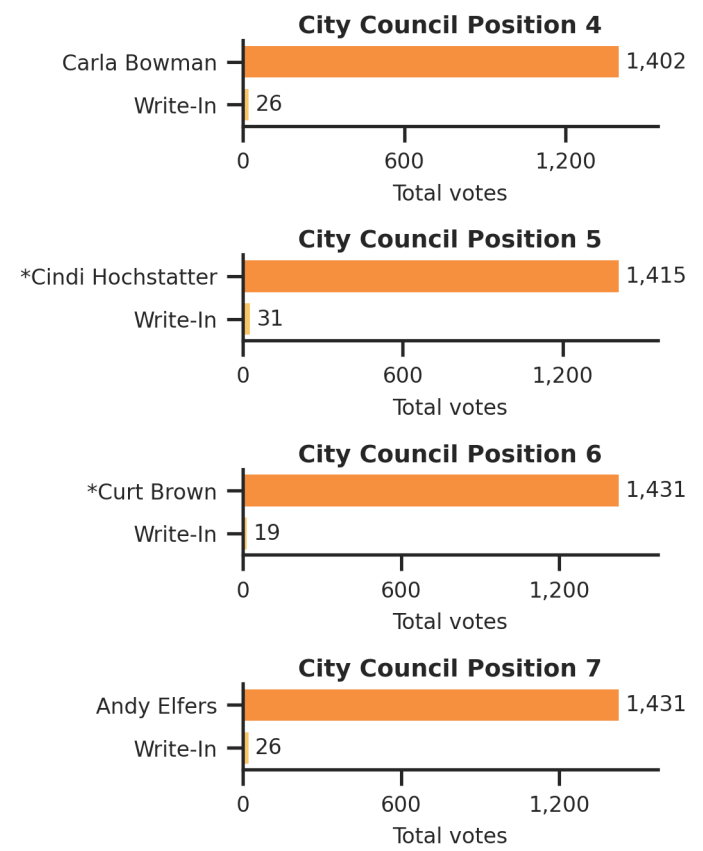


Fig 2 Election results in Sumner for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

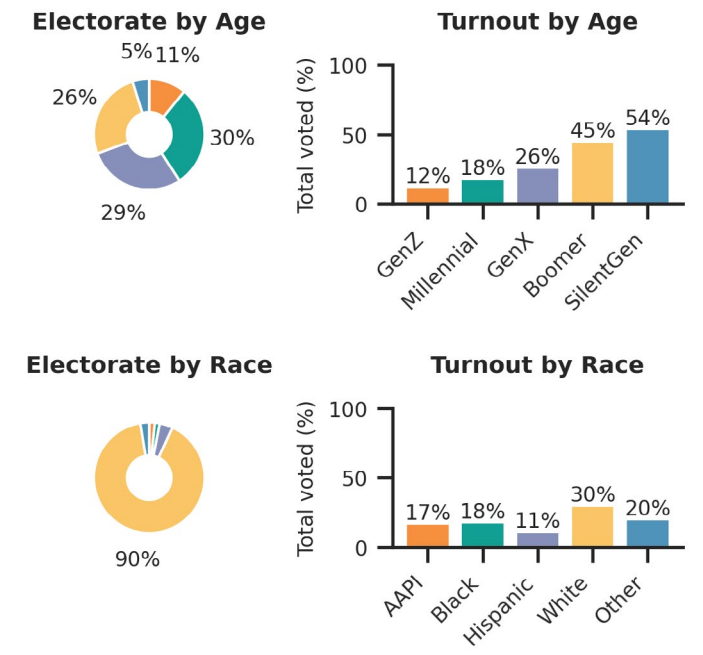


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Sumner School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

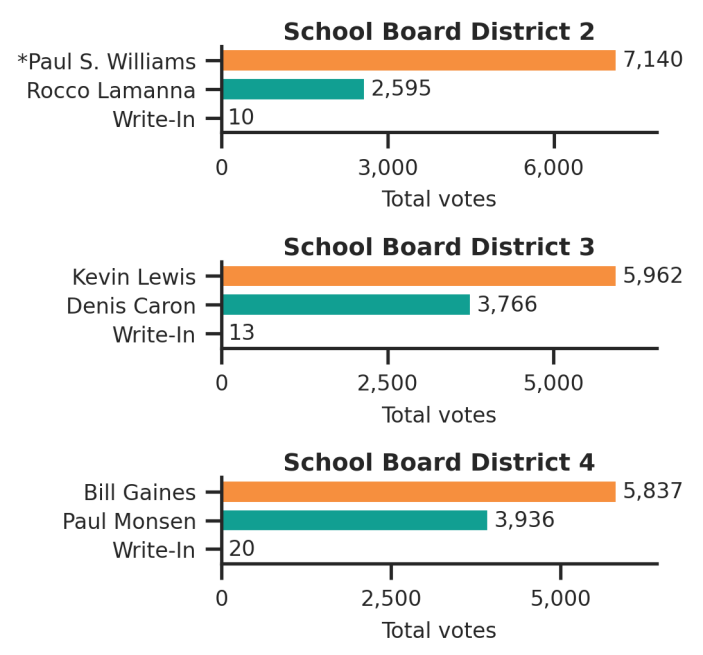


Fig 2 Election results in Sumner School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

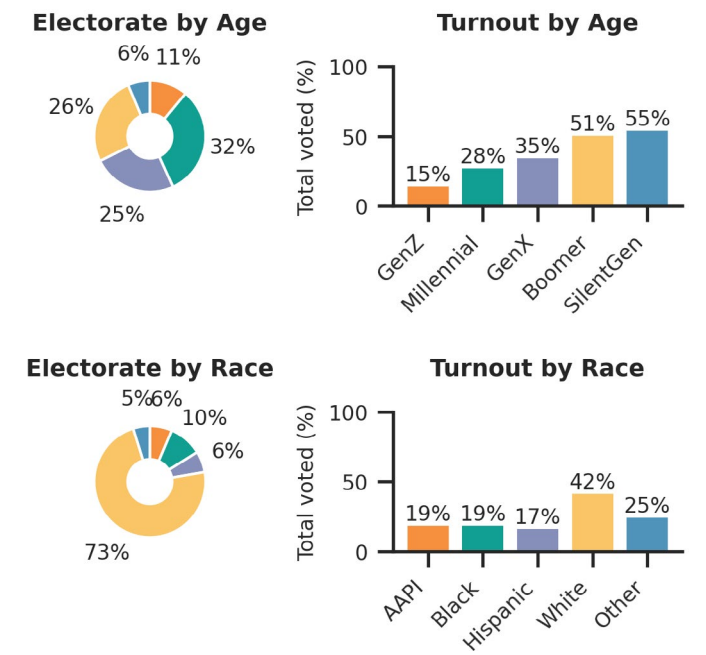


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Tacoma for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

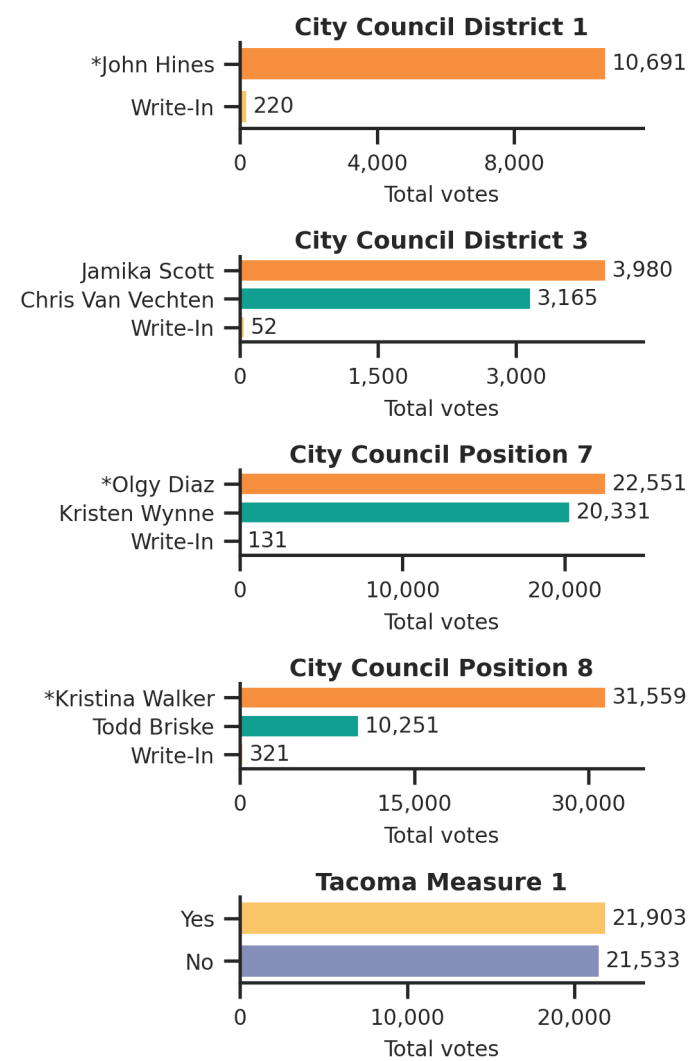


Fig 2 Election results in Tacoma for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

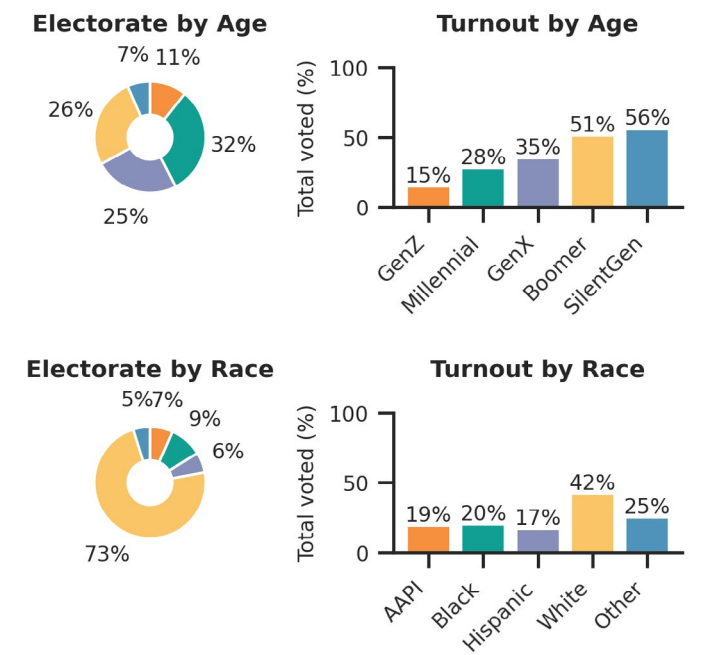


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Tacoma School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

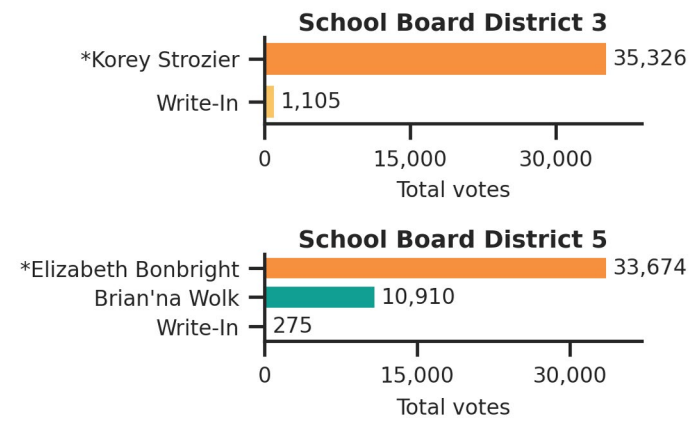


Fig 2 Election results in Tacoma School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

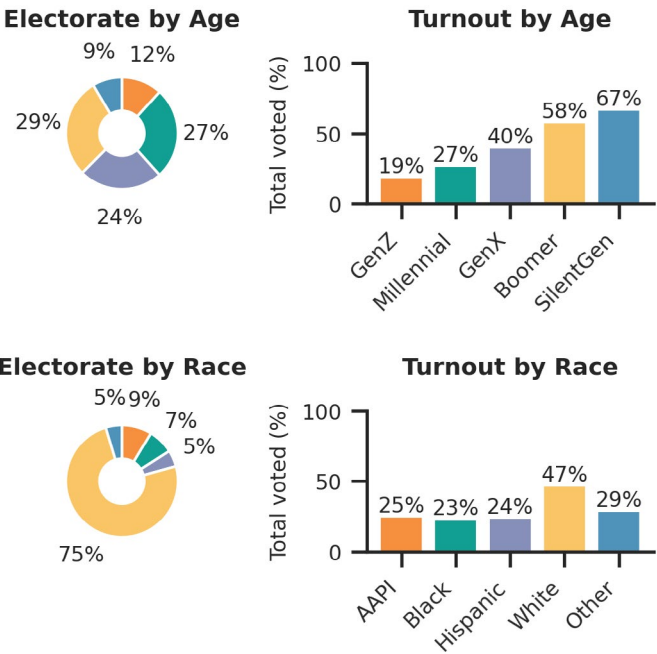


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in University Place for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

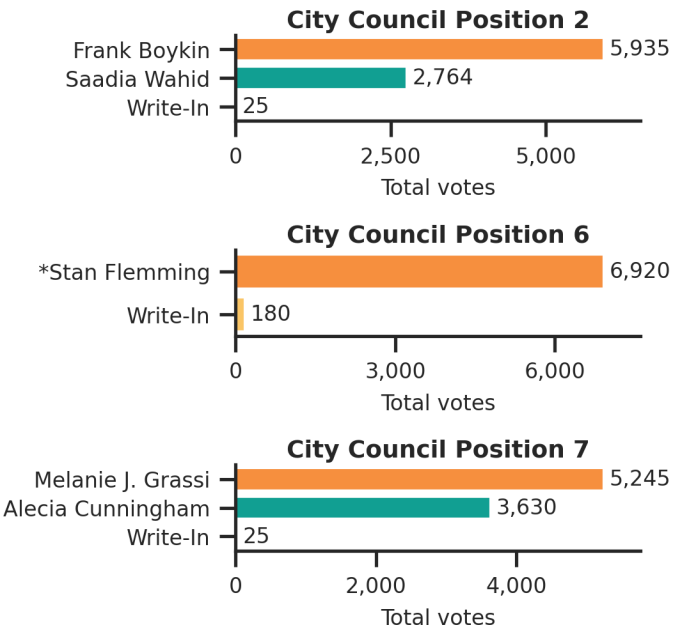


Fig 2 Election results in University Place for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

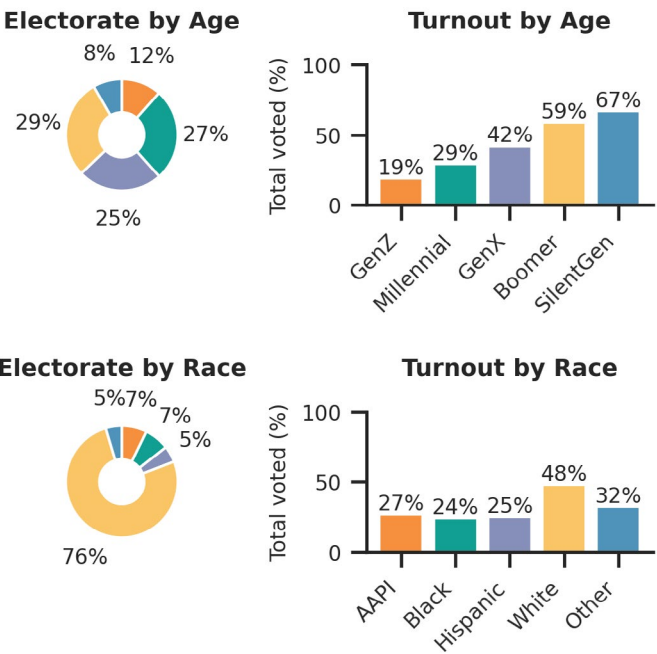


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in University Place School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

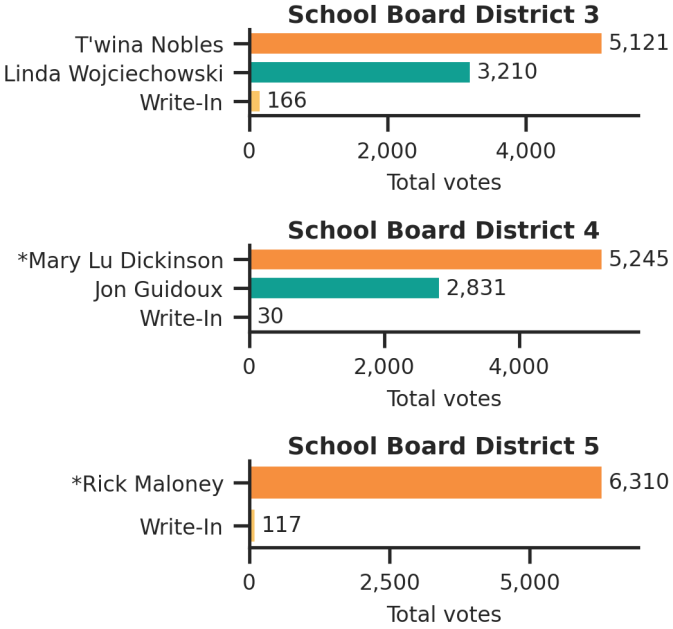


Fig 2 Election results in University Place School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

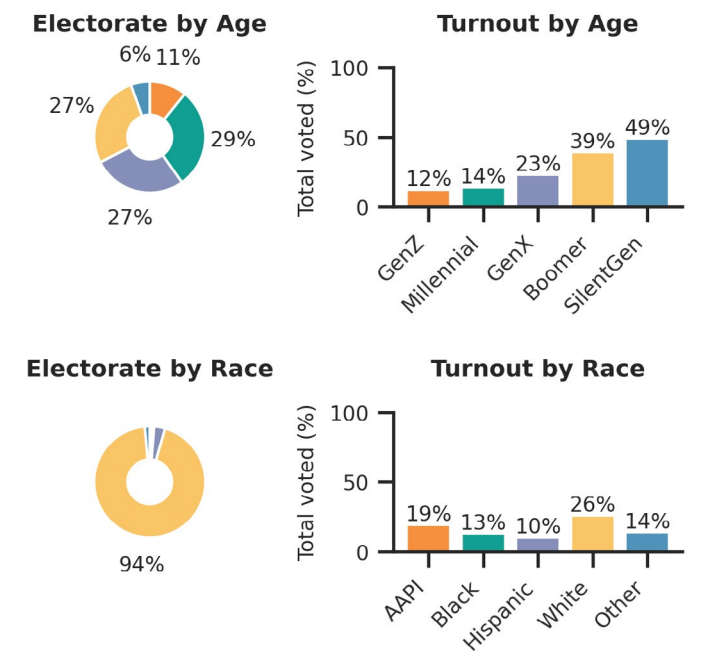


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in White River School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

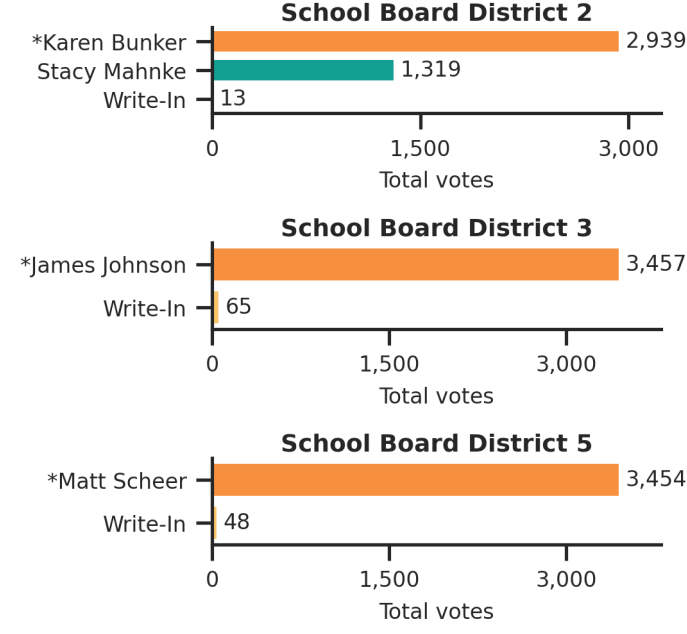


Fig 2 Election results in White River School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

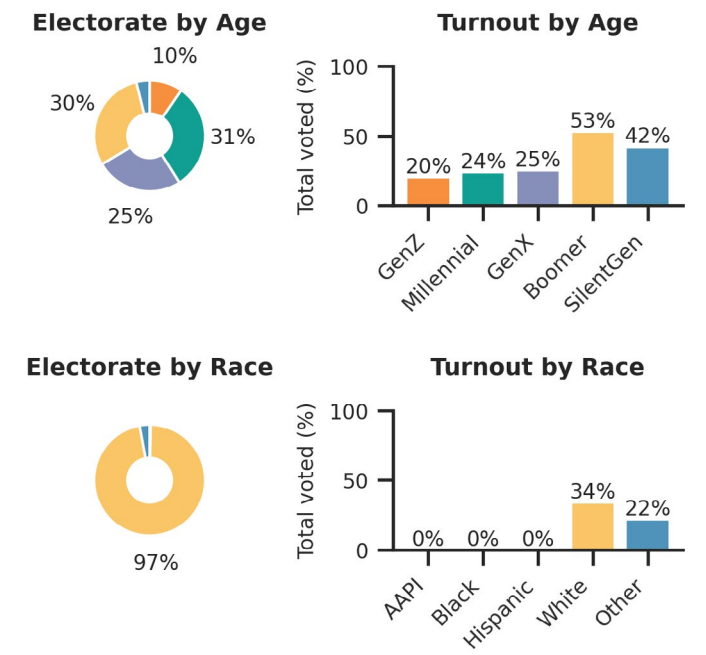


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Wilkeson for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

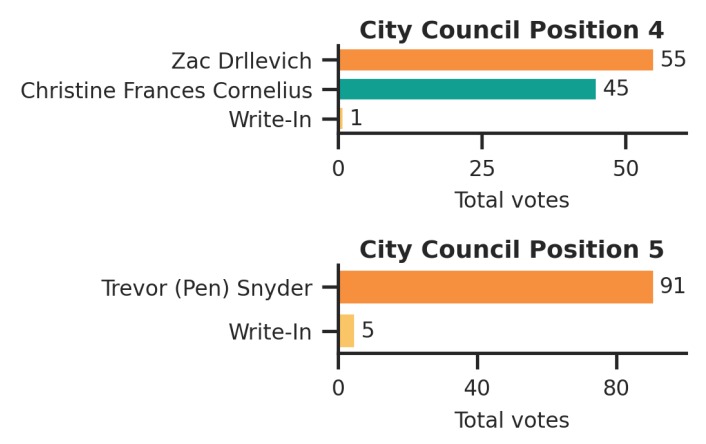


Fig 2 Election results in Wilkeson for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.





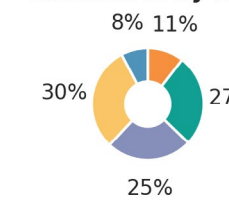

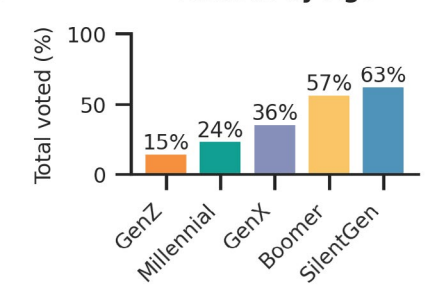

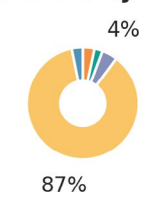

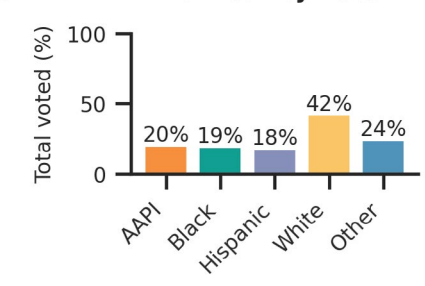

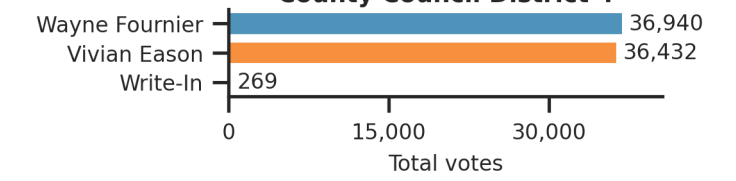


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Thurston County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

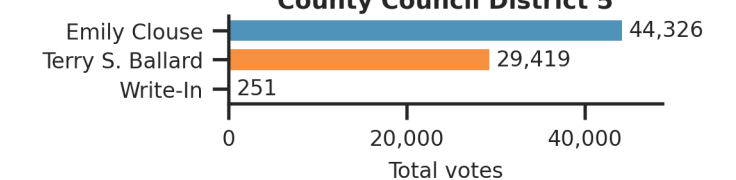

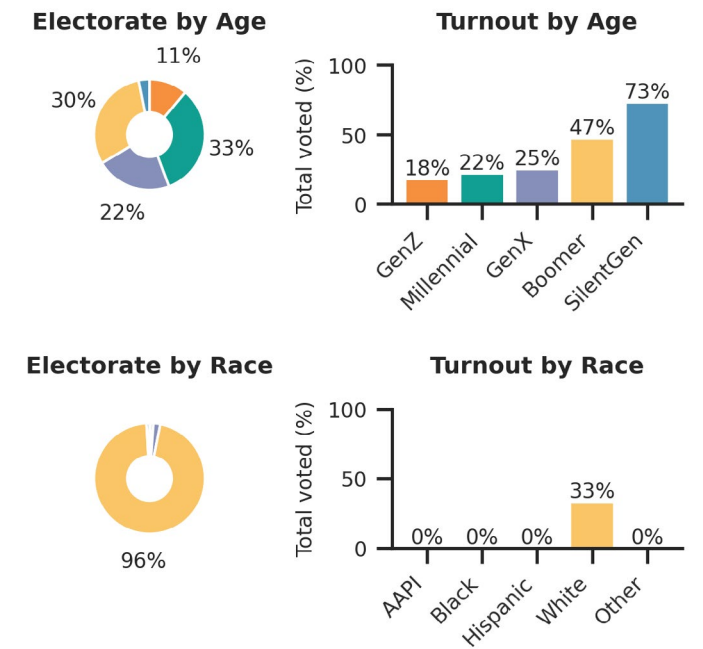


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bucoda for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

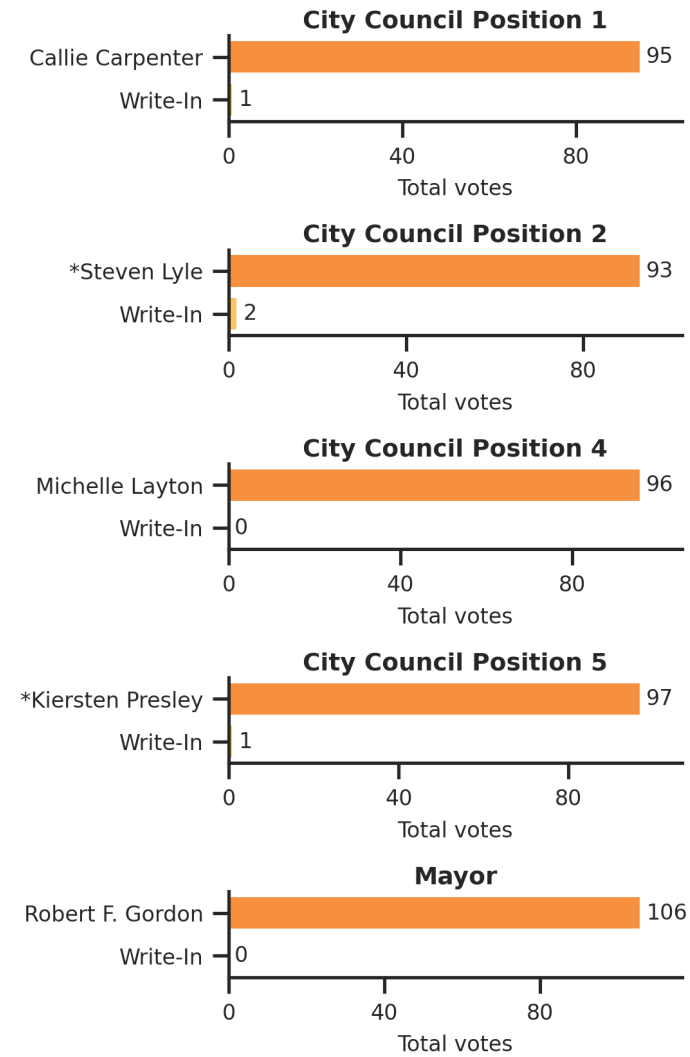


Fig 2 Election results in Bucoda for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

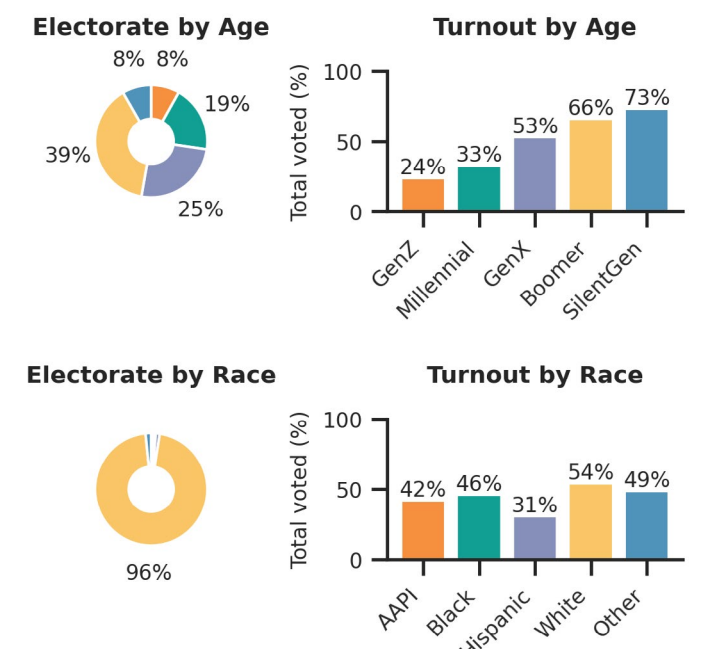


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Griffin School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

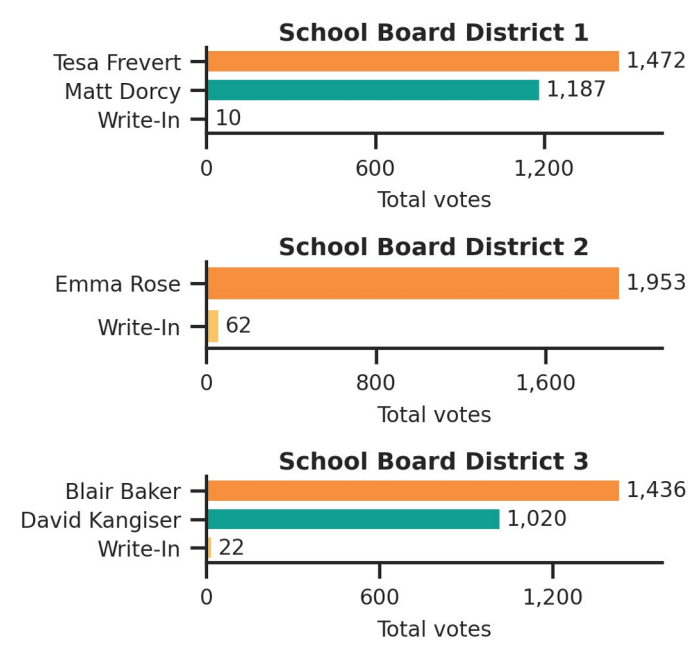


Fig 2 Election results in Griffin School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

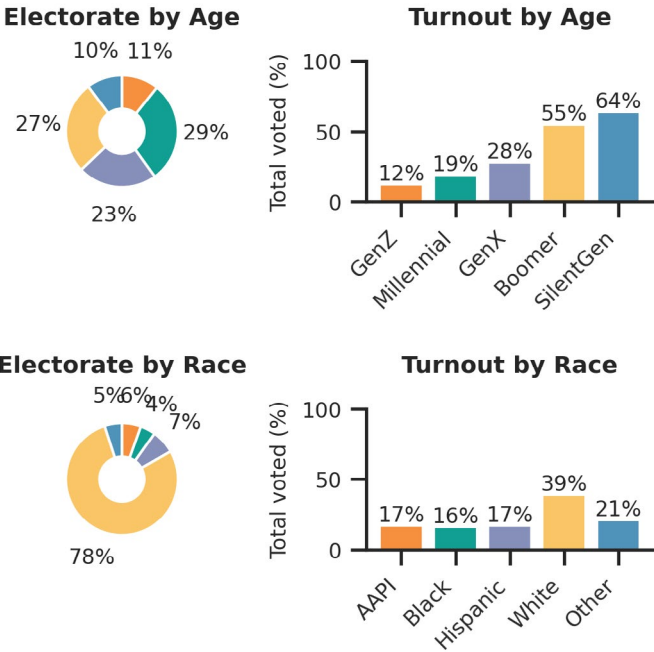


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Lacey for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

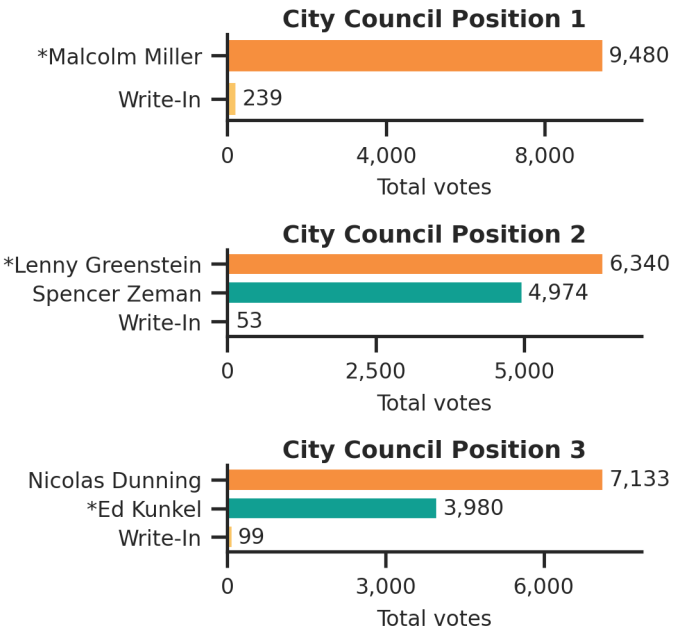


Fig 2 Election results in Lacey for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

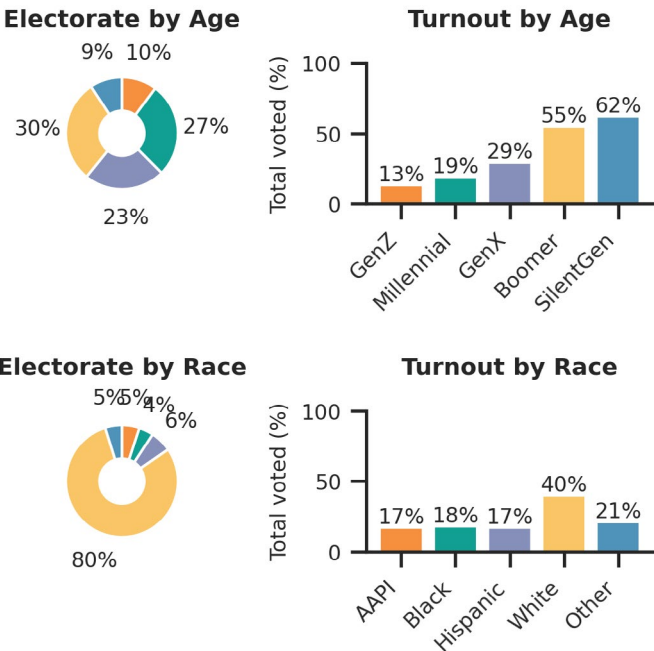


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in North Thurston School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

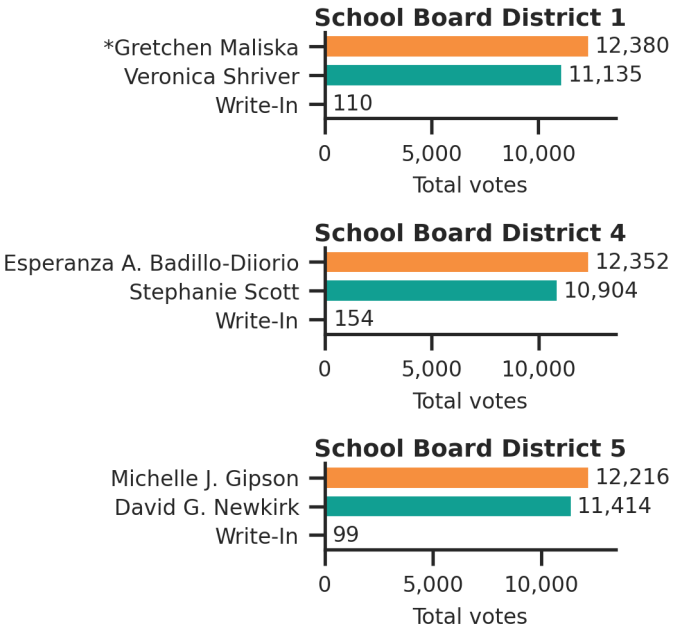


Fig 2 Election results in North Thurston School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

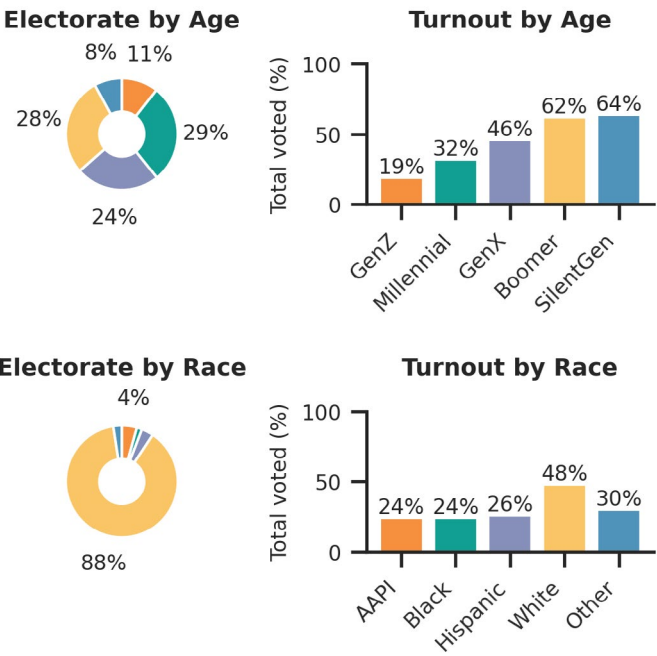


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Olympia for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

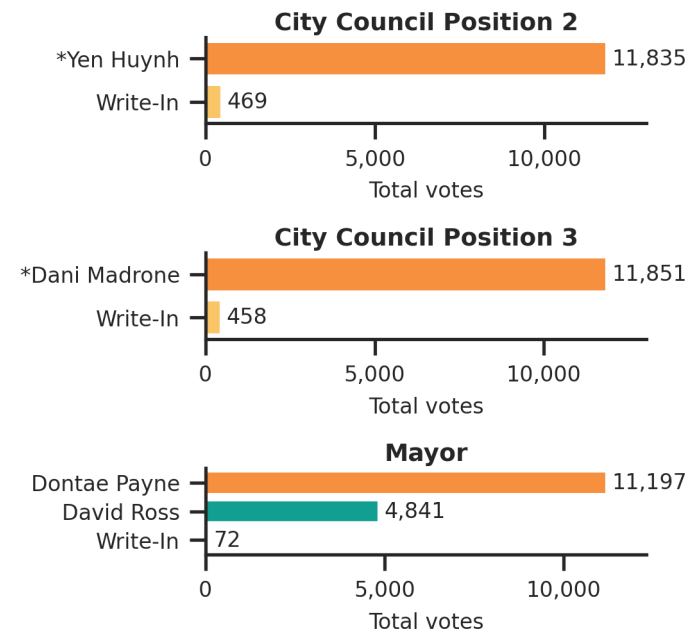


Fig 2 Election results in Olympia for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

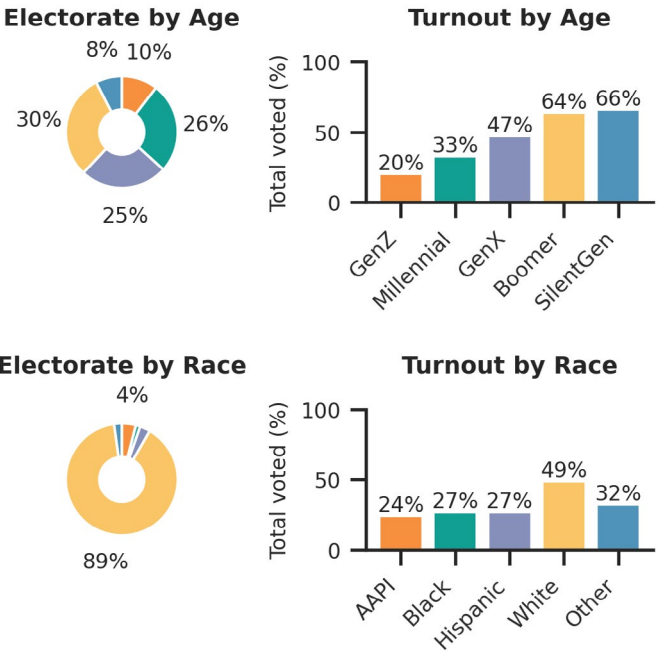


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Olympia School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

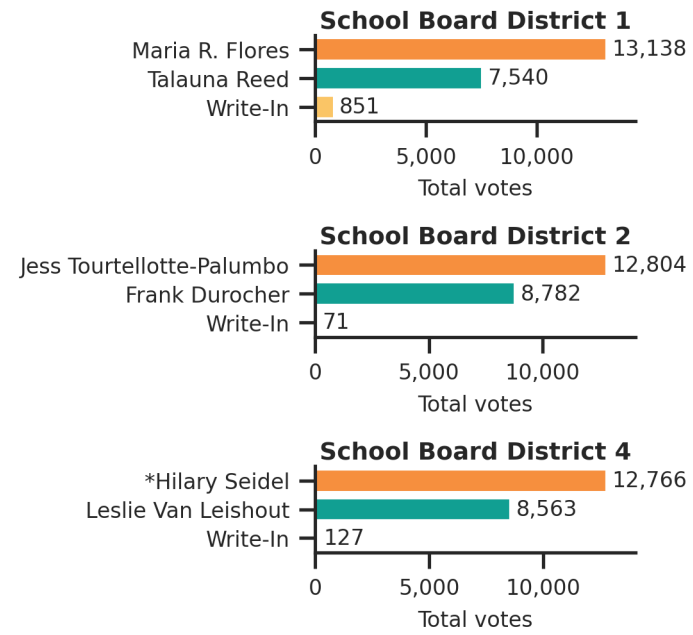


Fig 2 Election results in Olympia School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

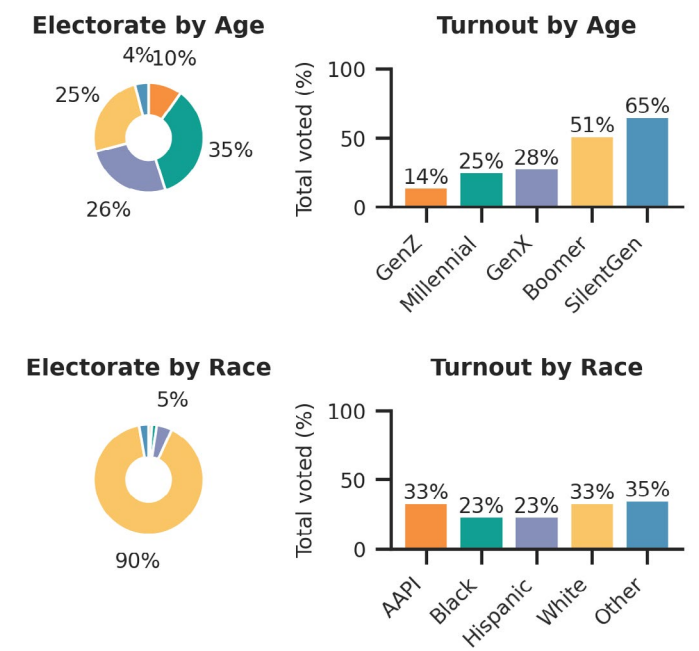


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rainier for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

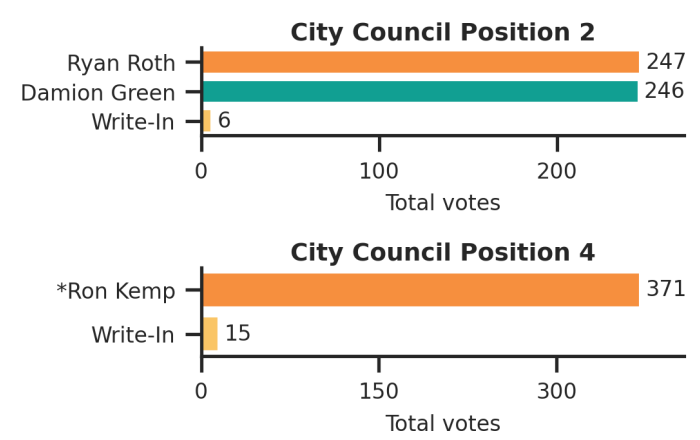


Fig 2 Election results in Rainier for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

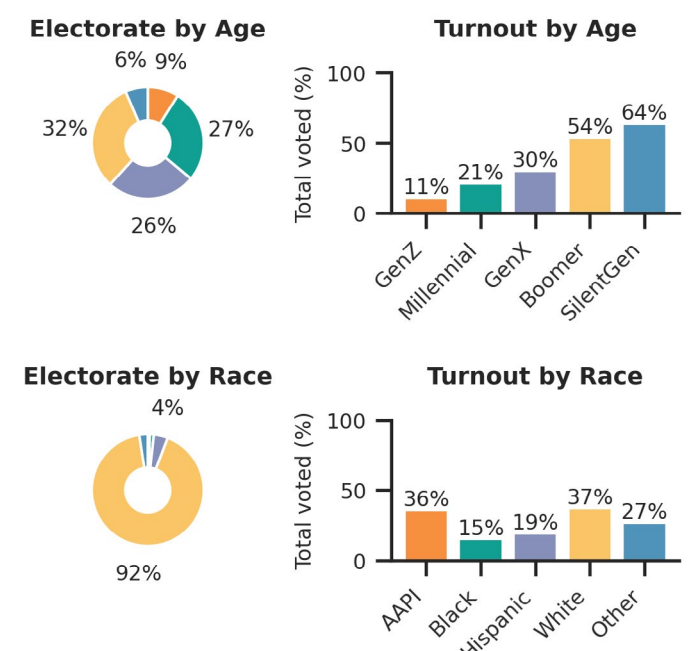


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rainier School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

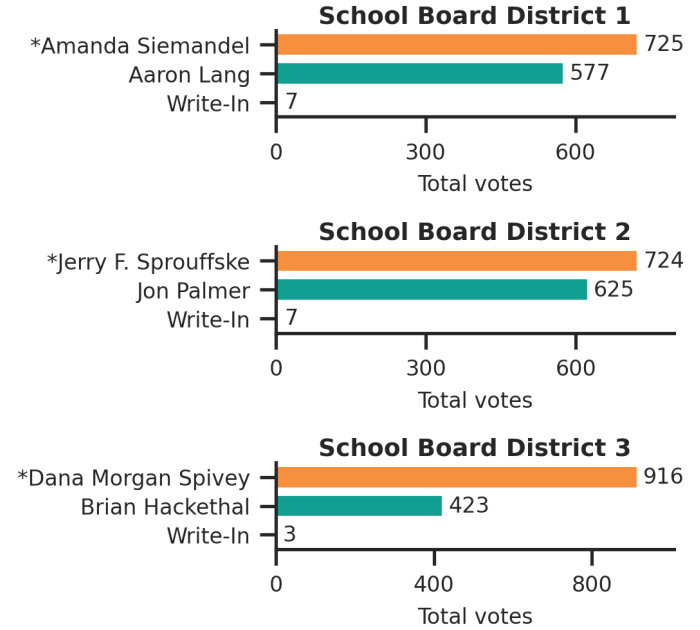


Fig 2 Election results in Rainier School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

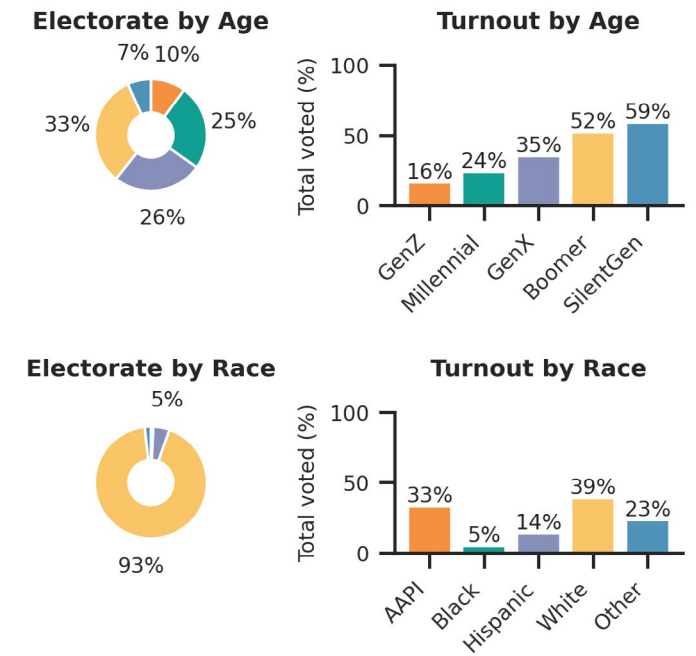


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Rochester School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

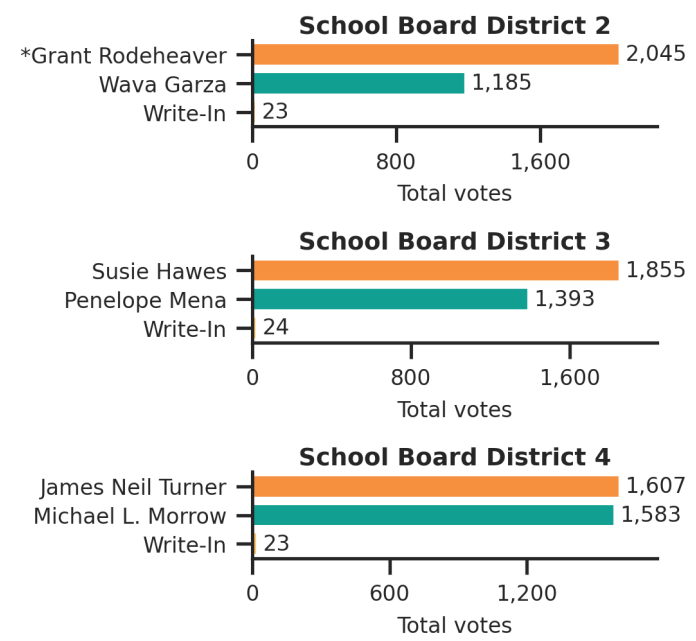


Fig 2 Election results in Rochester School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

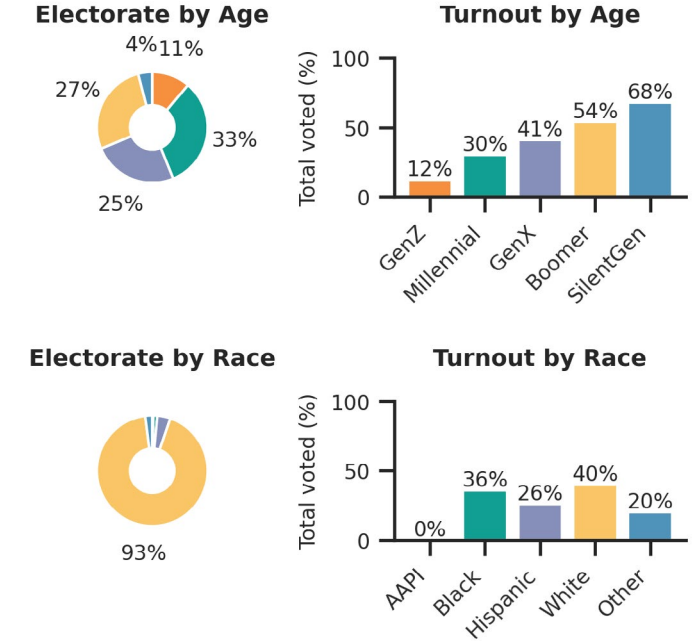


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Tenino for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

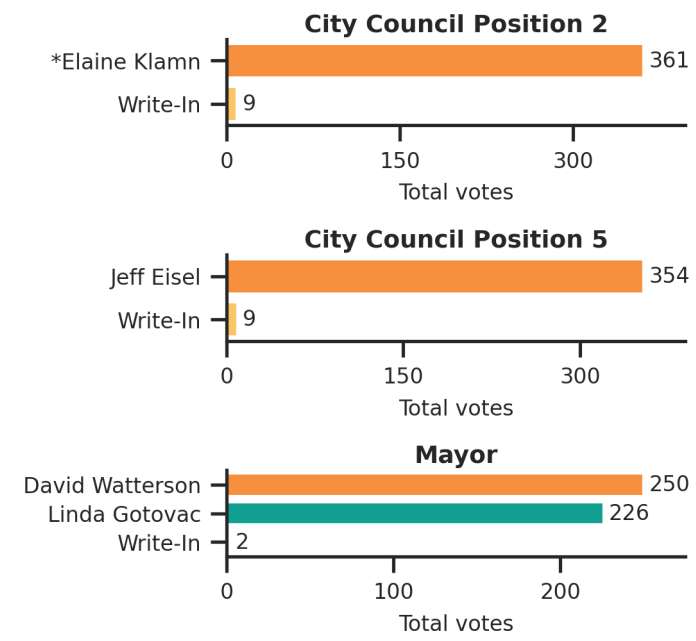
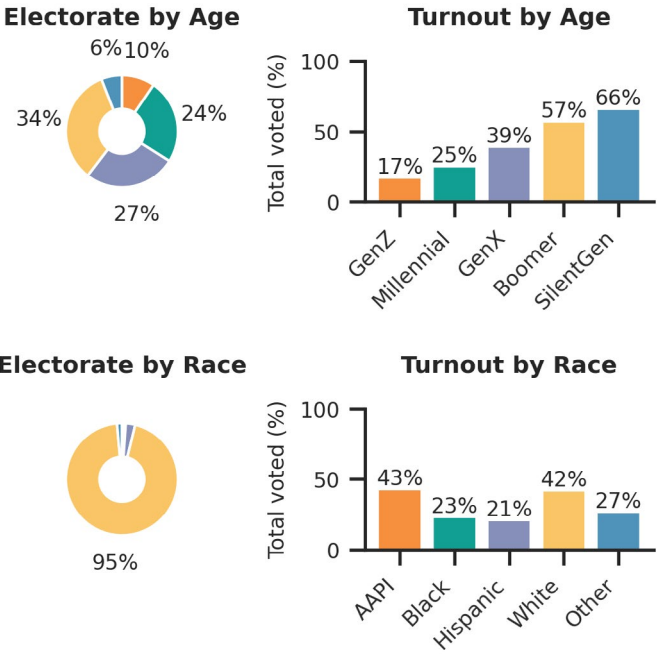


Fig 2 Election results in Tenino for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

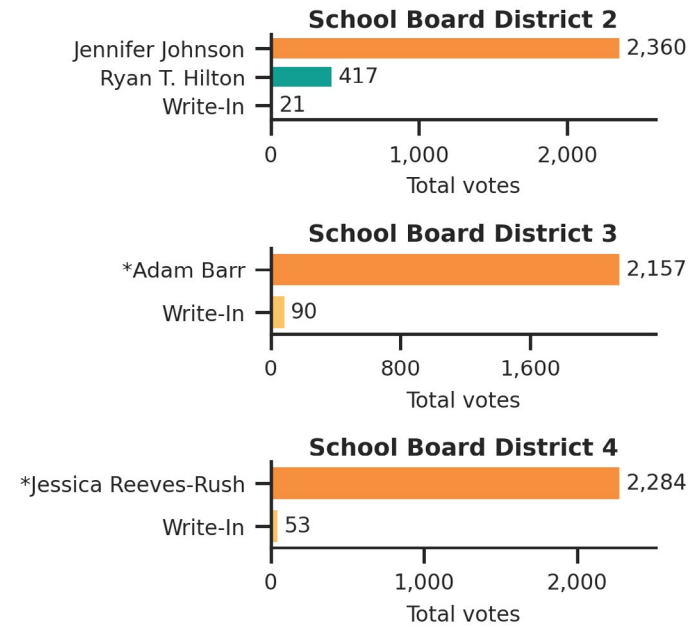

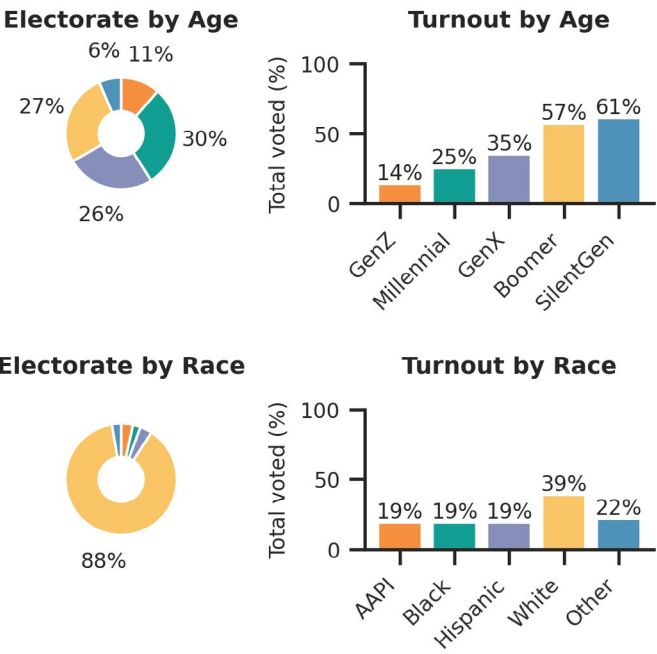


**Fig 2** Election results in Tenino School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

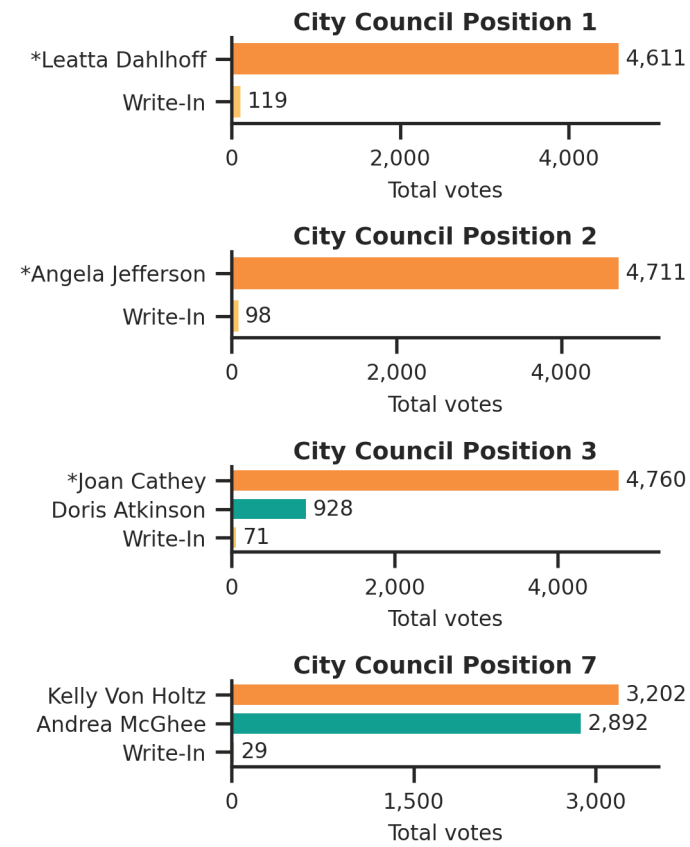

**Fig 2** Election results in Tumwater for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

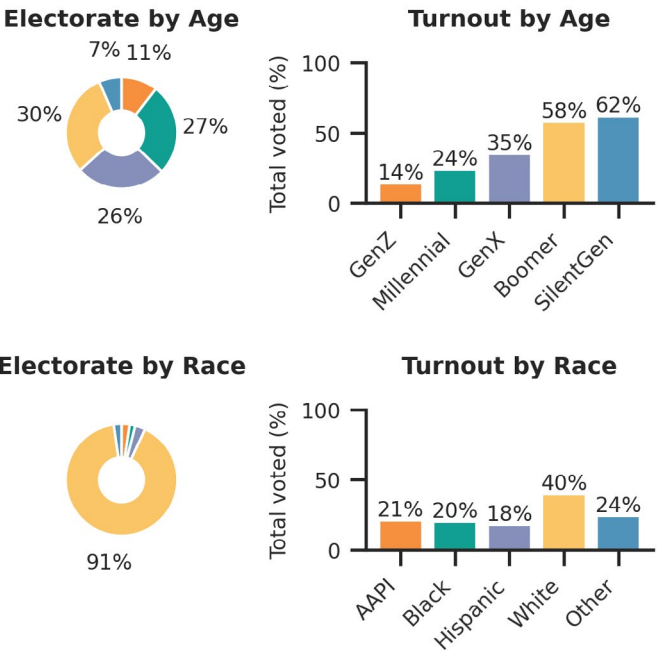

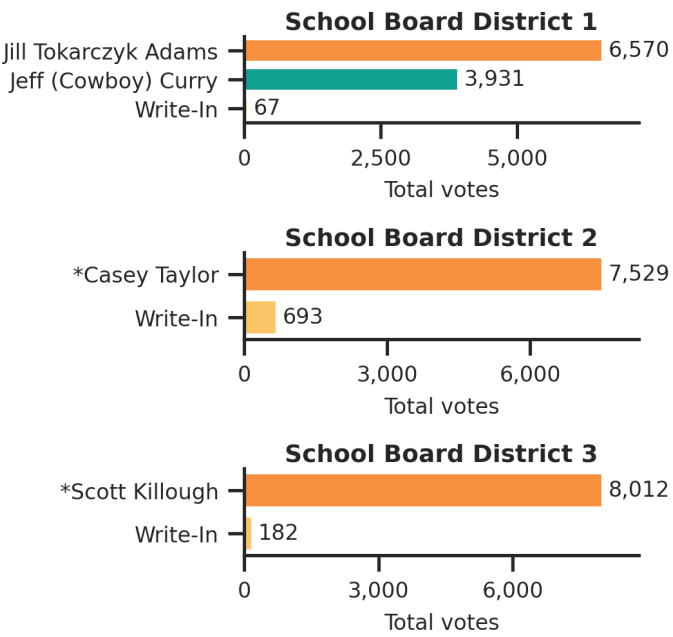

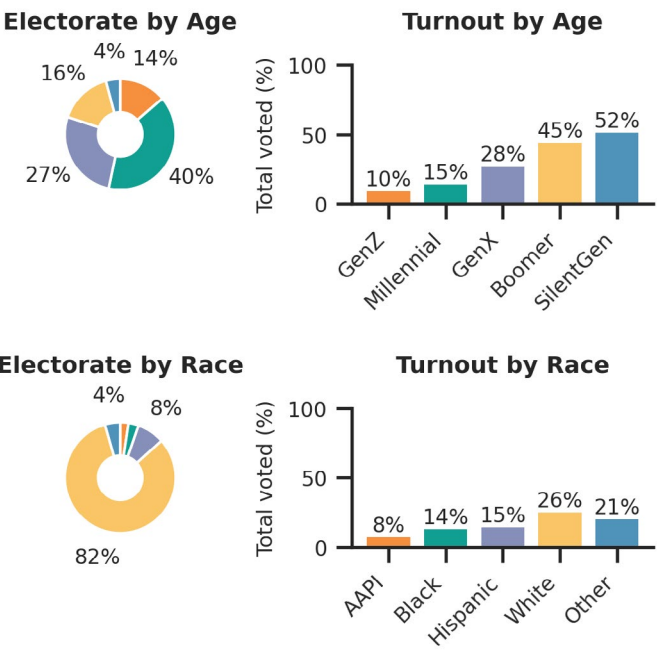

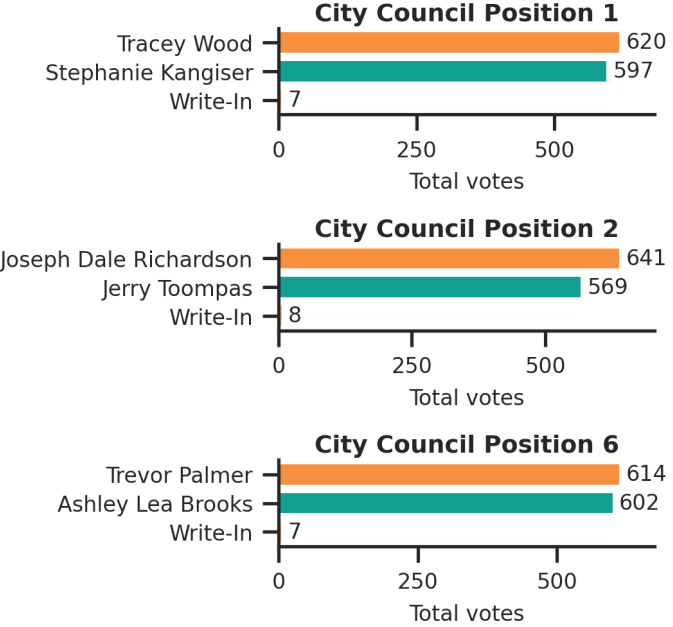

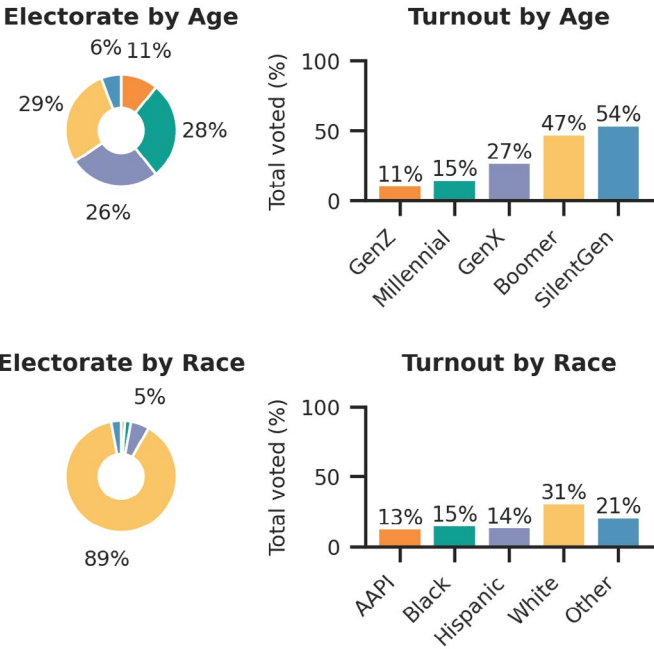


**Fig 2** Election results in Yelm for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

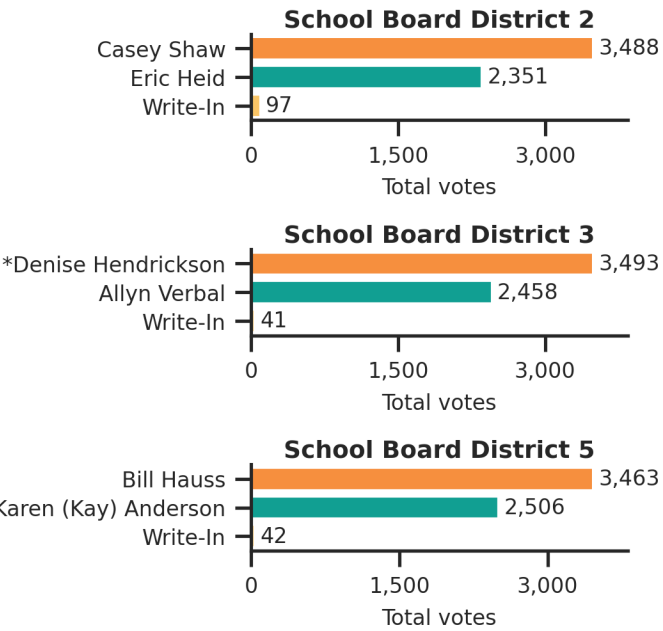

**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Yelm School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

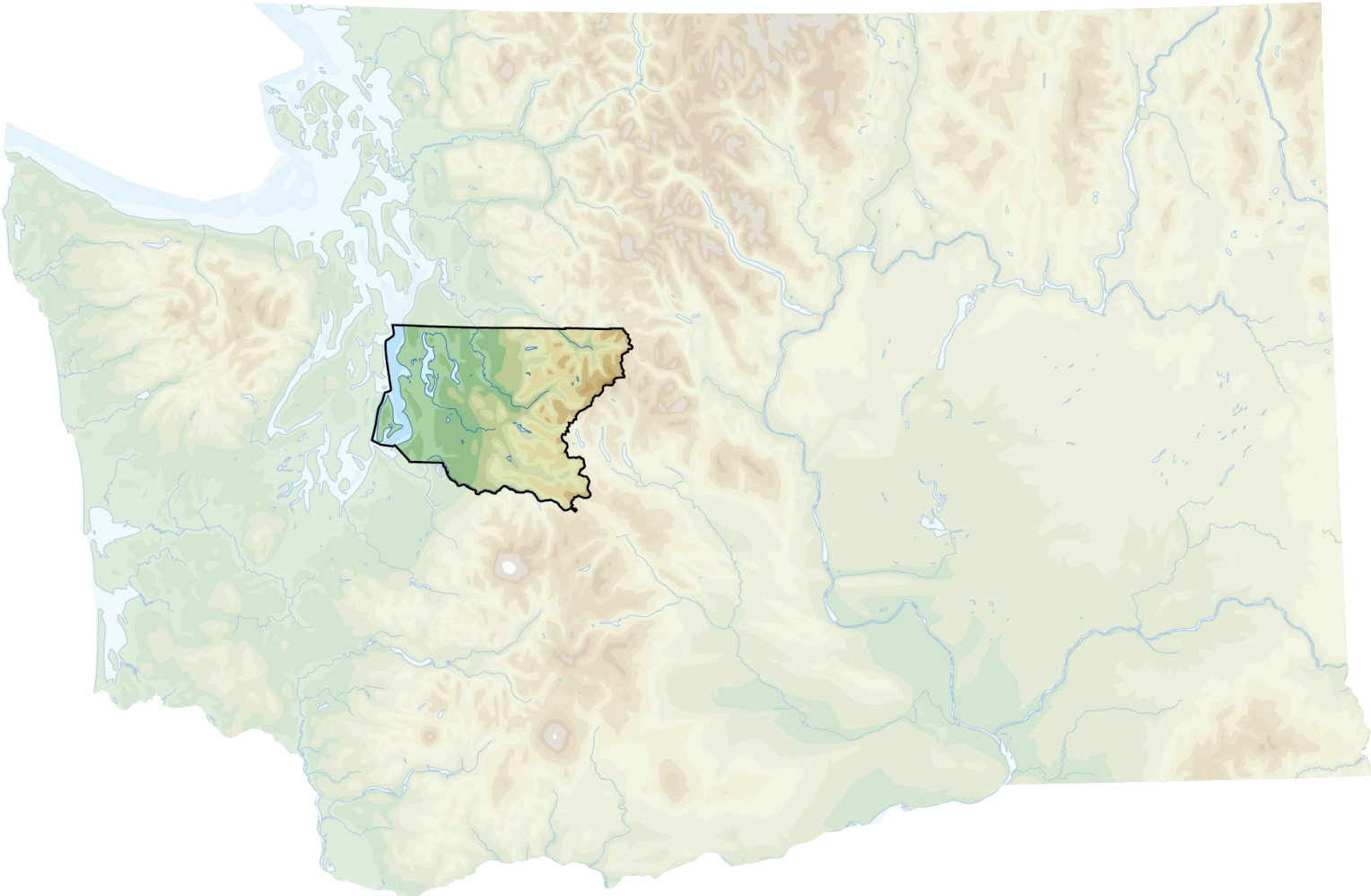

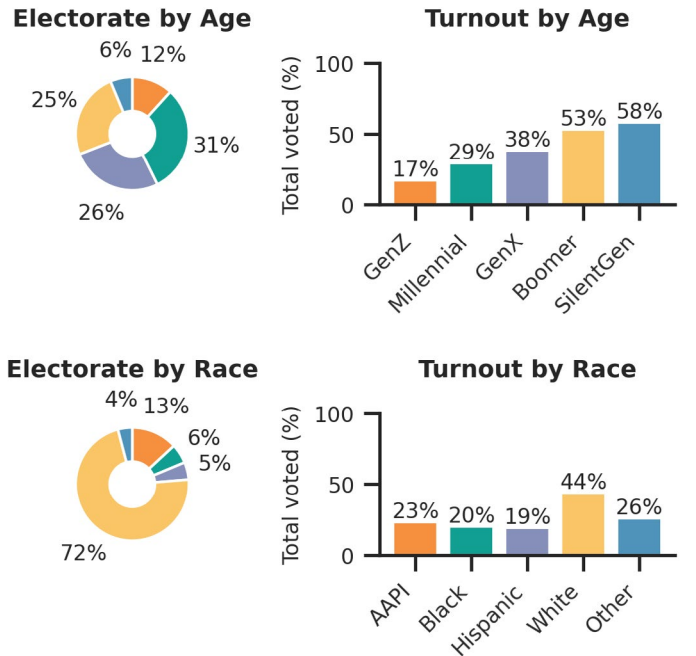

## Voter turnout & outreach

There are 1,341,738 registered voters in King County, including 39,232 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 37.9%. Turnout was 11.2% lower than the 2019 General Election and 27.4% lower than the 2022 General Election. Across King County, voter turnout was highest in North Bend (55.3%), and lowest in Kent (24.9%), Auburn (25.2%), and Federal Way (26.2%). Young voters make up 29.5% of the electorate in King County (396,072 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 21.5% lower than older voters (22.7% vs 44.2%). The electorate in King County is the most racially diverse in the state, with people of color accounting for 27.8% of all registered voters, yet turnout of voters of color in the 2023 General Election was 21.6% lower than White voters (22.3% vs 43.9%). From mid-August to mid-November, eleven Data Hub partners were active in King County, making a total of 277,319 contact attempts to 141,913 unique voters (~0.21 attempts per voter). 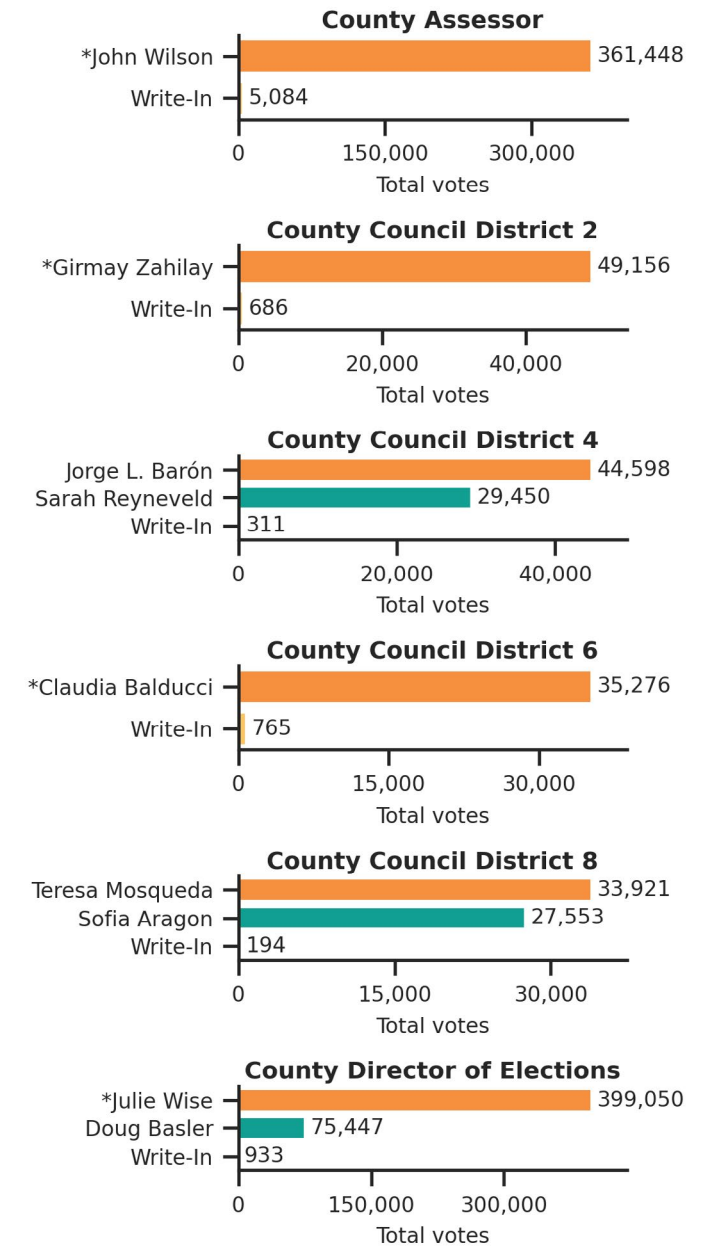


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in King County for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

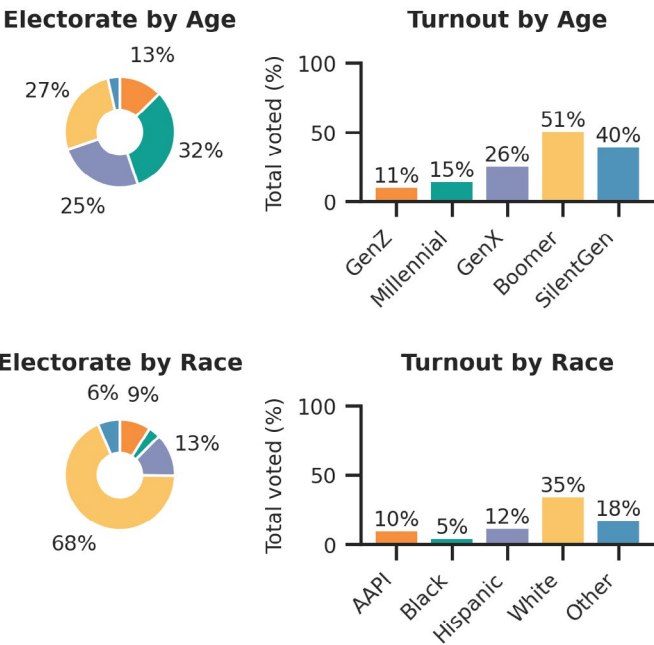


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Algona for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

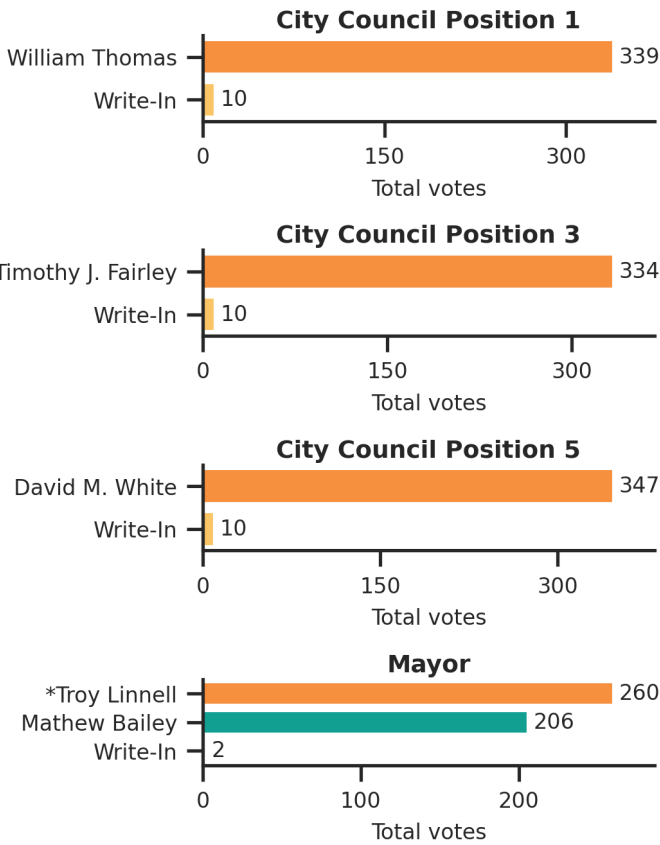


Fig 2 Election results in Algona for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

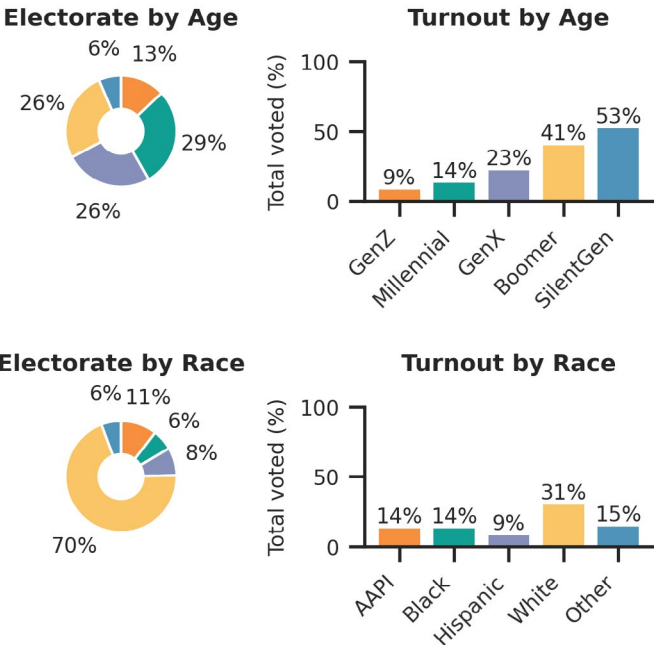


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Auburn for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

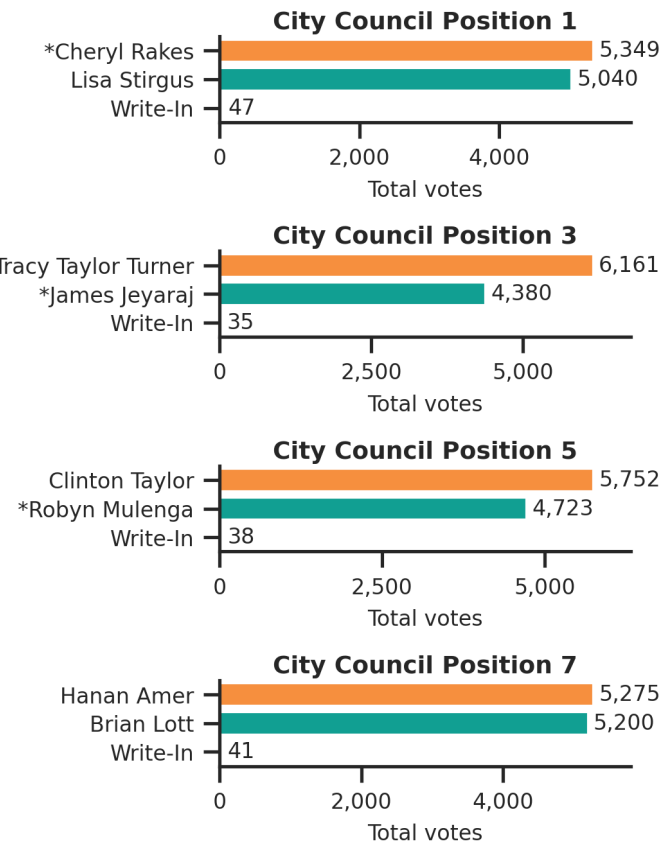


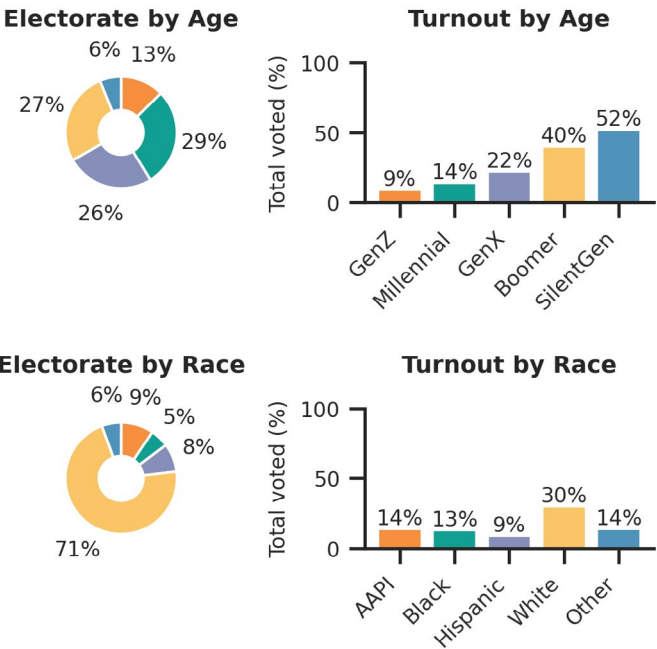
Fig 2 Election results in Auburn for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

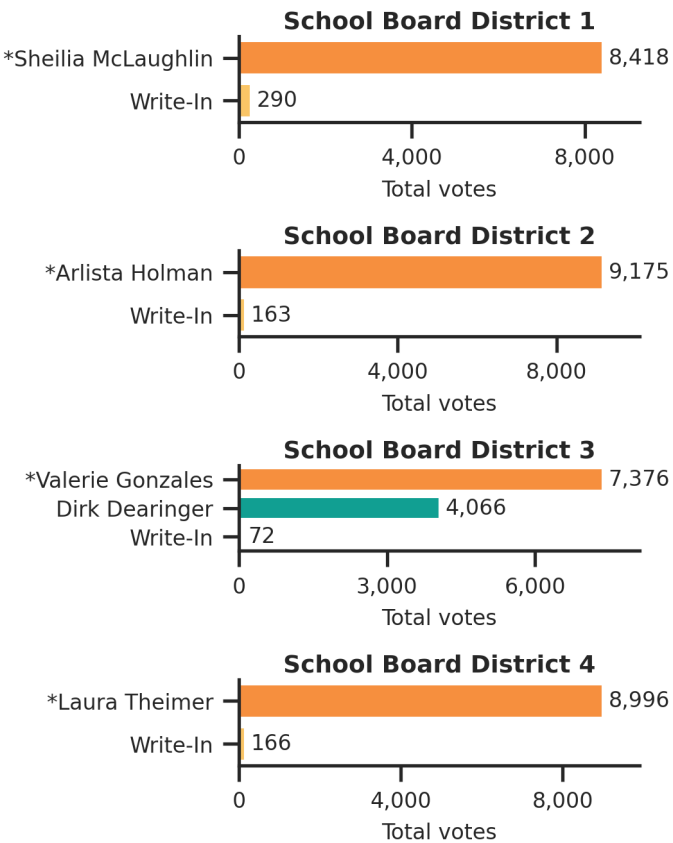

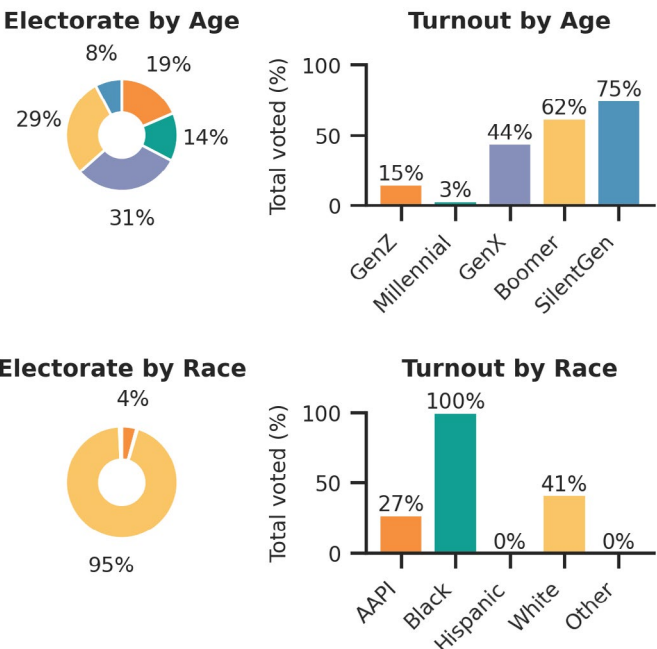


**Fig 2** Election results in Auburn School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

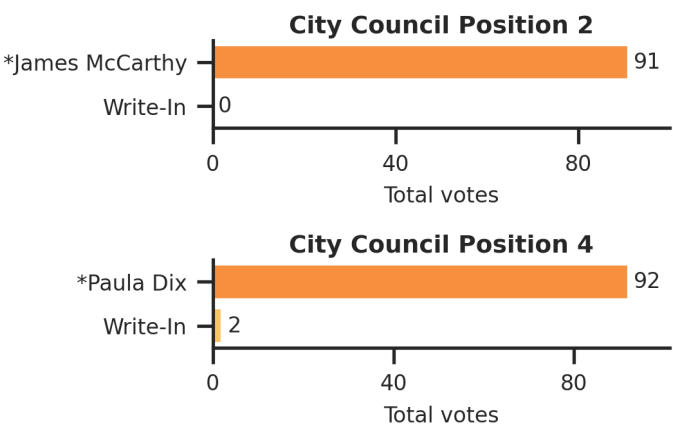

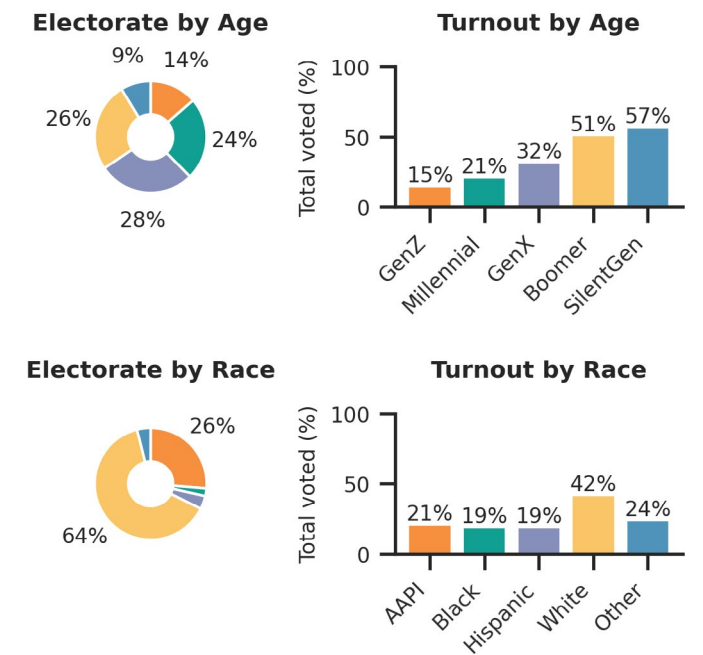


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bellevue for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

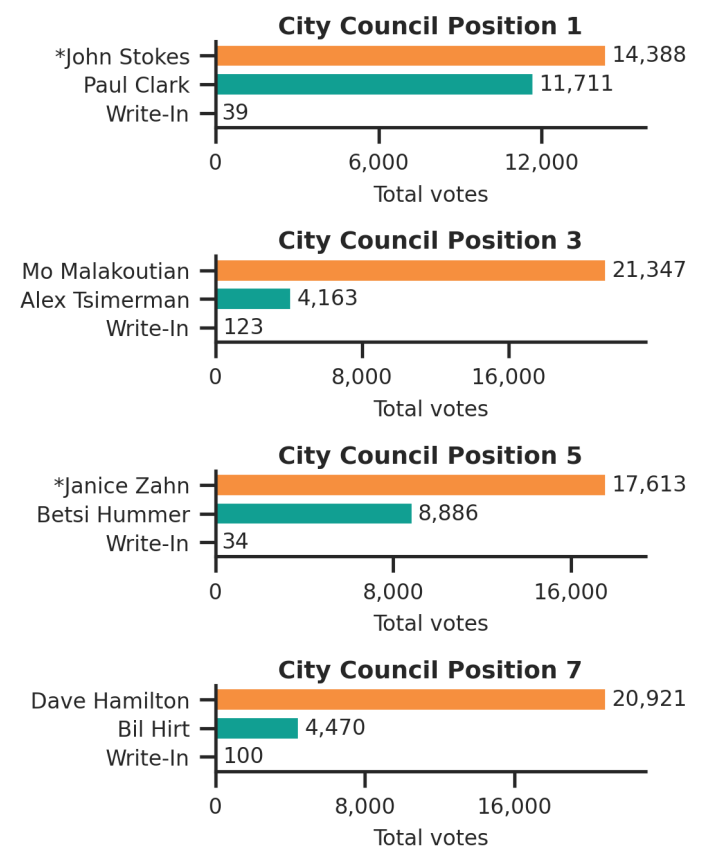


Fig 2 Election results in Bellevue for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

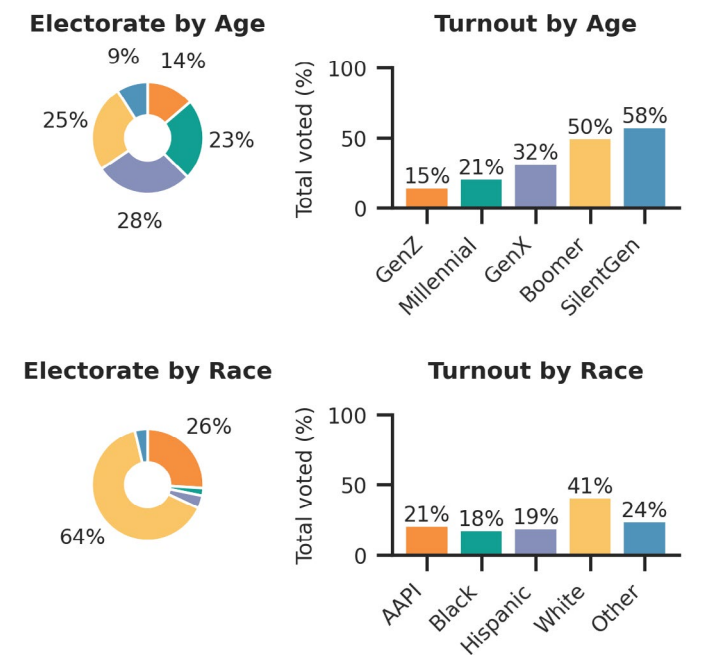


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Bellevue School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

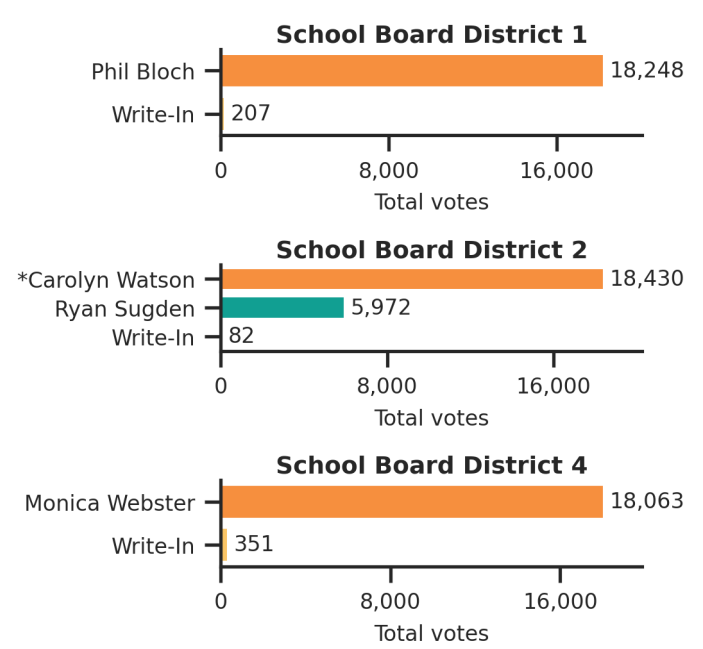


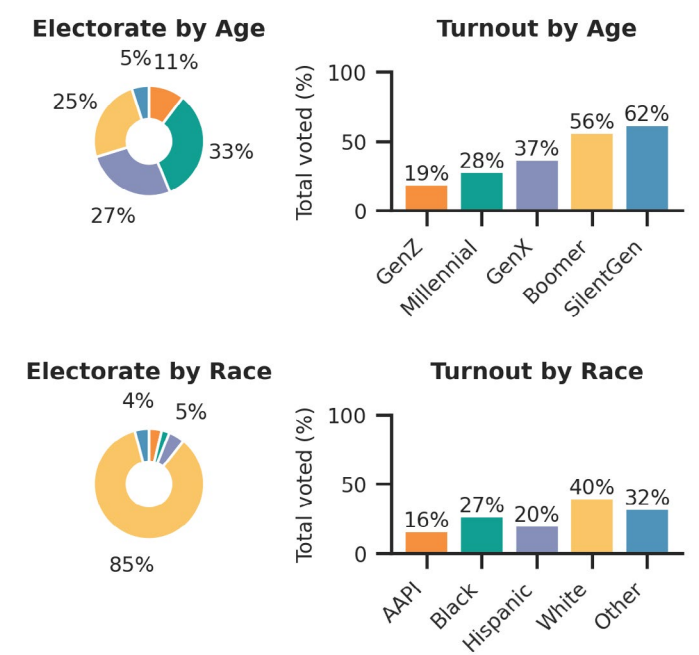
Fig 2 Election results in Bellevue School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

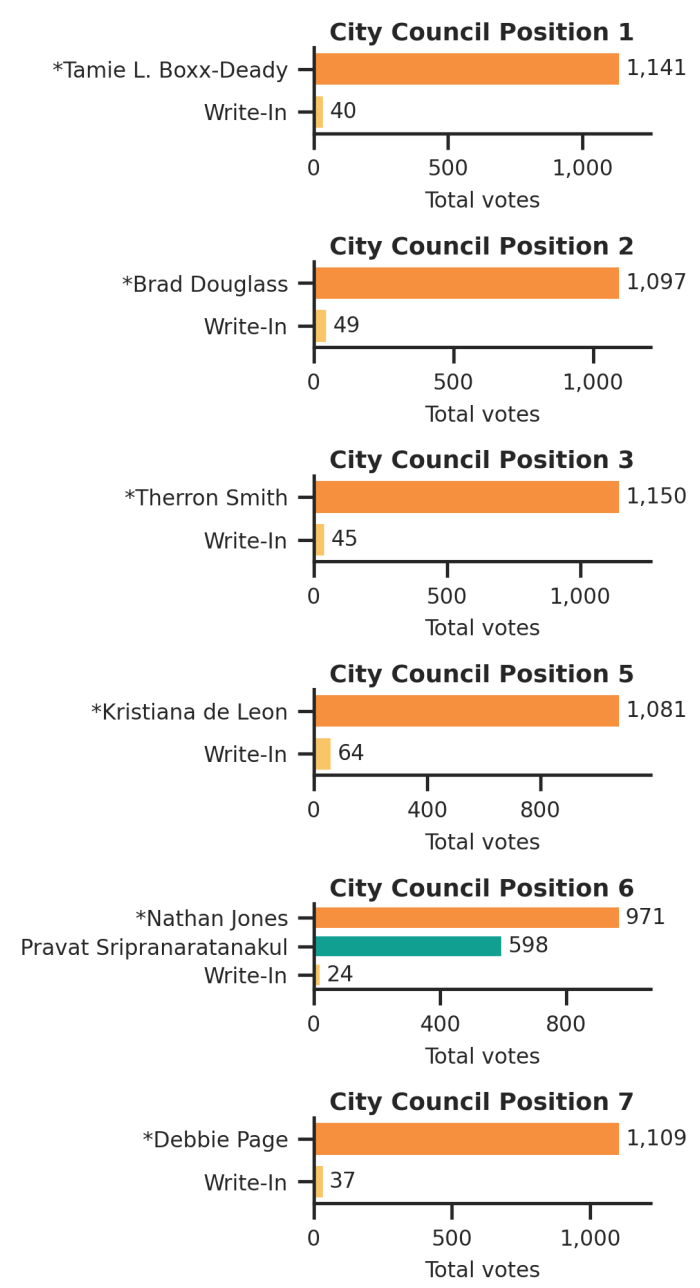


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in Black Diamond for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

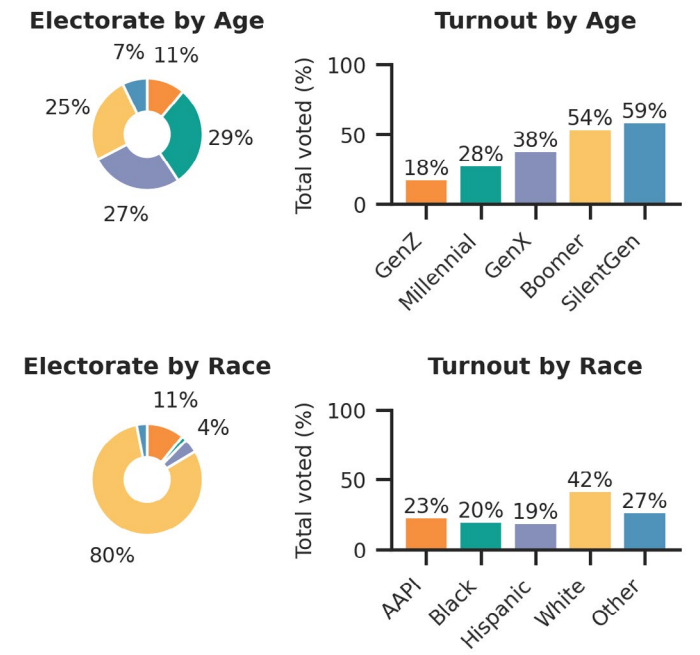


**Fig 2** Election results in Black Diamond for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

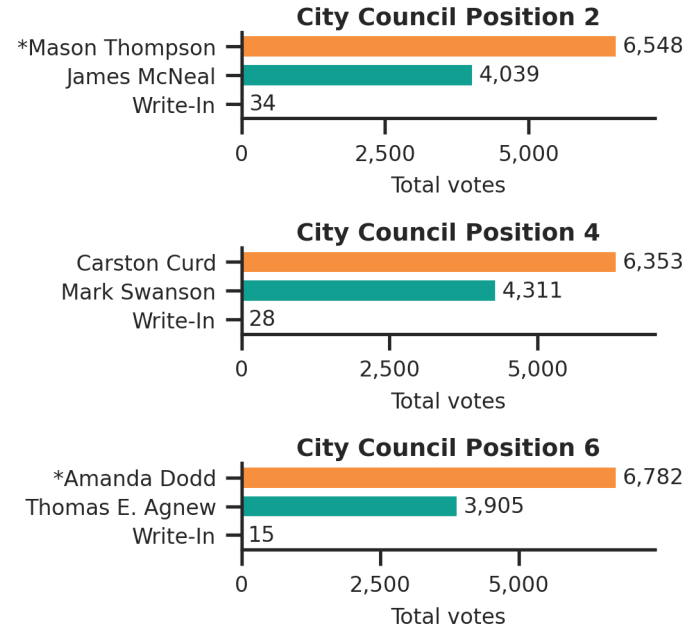

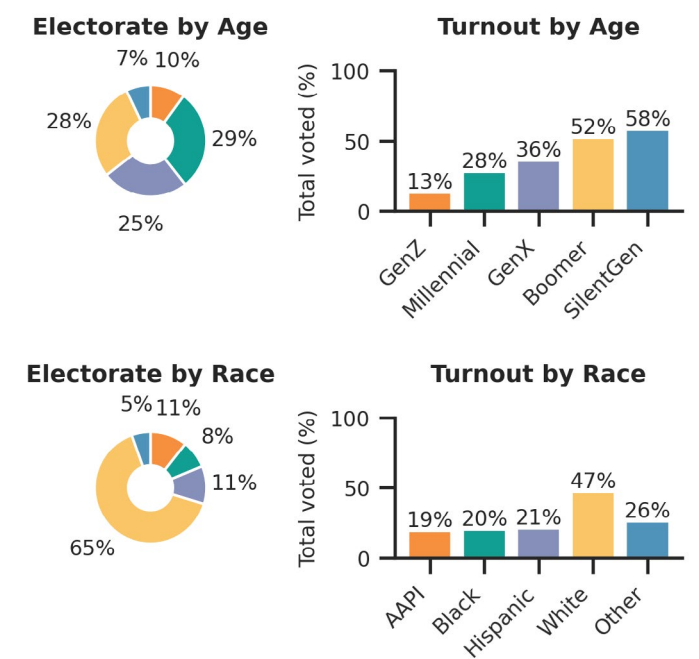


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Burien for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

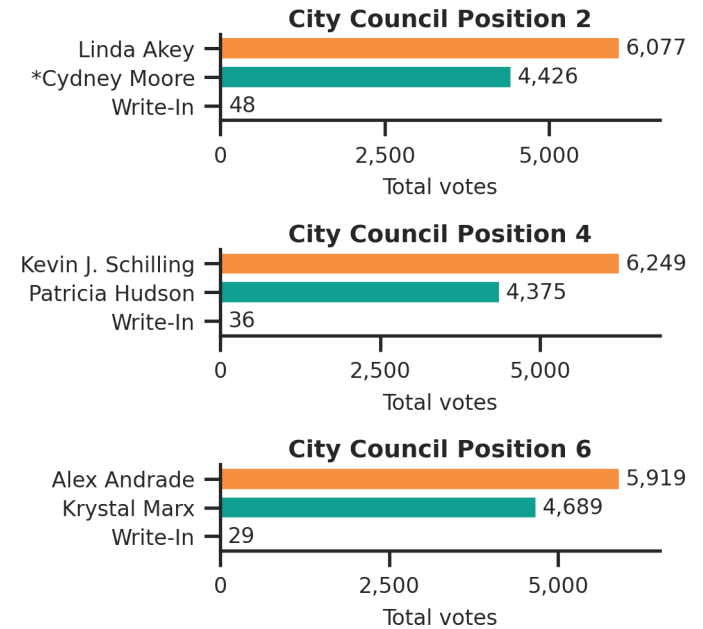


Fig 2 Election results in Burien for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

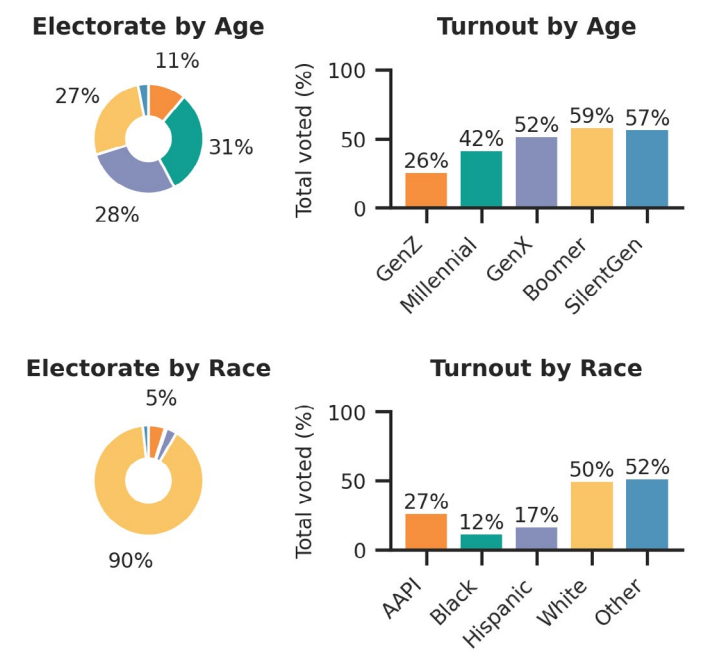


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Carnation for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

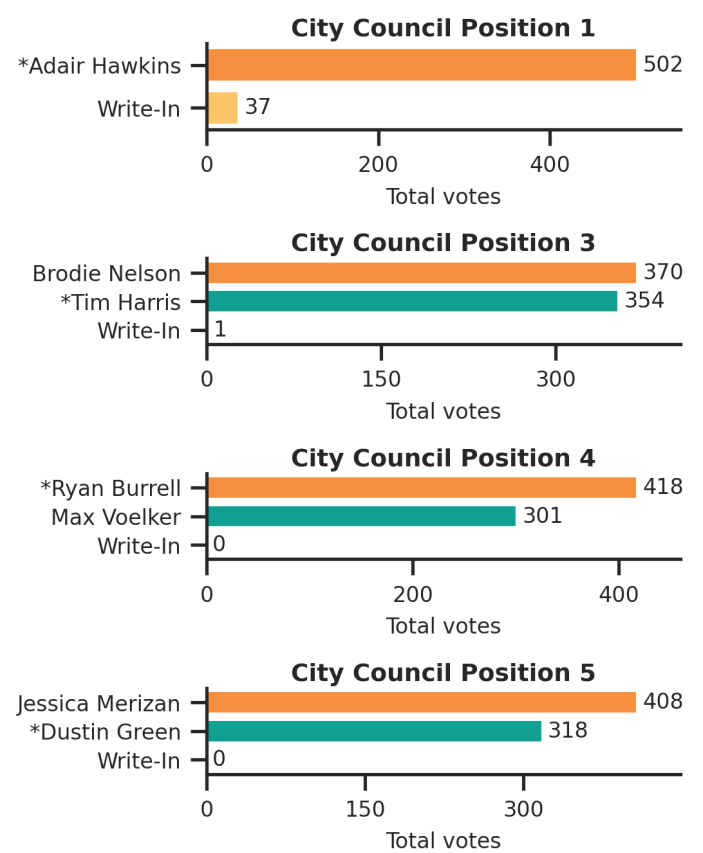


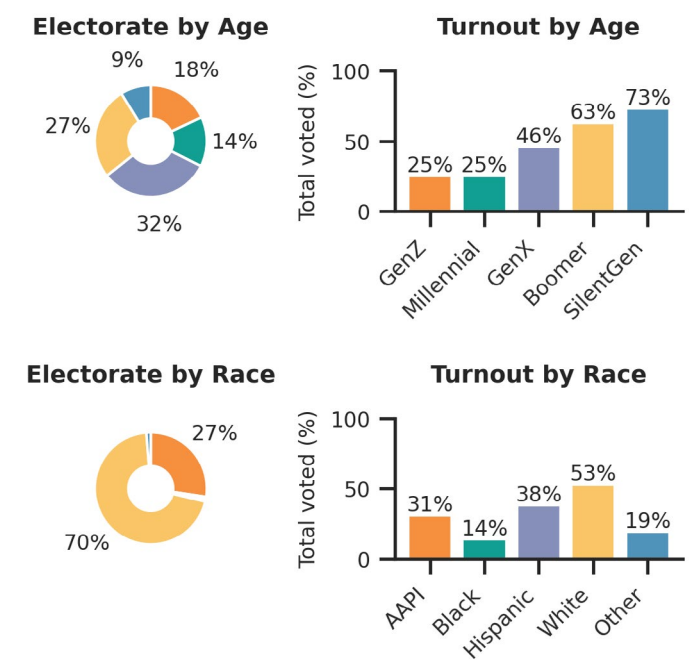
Fig 2 Election results in Carnation for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

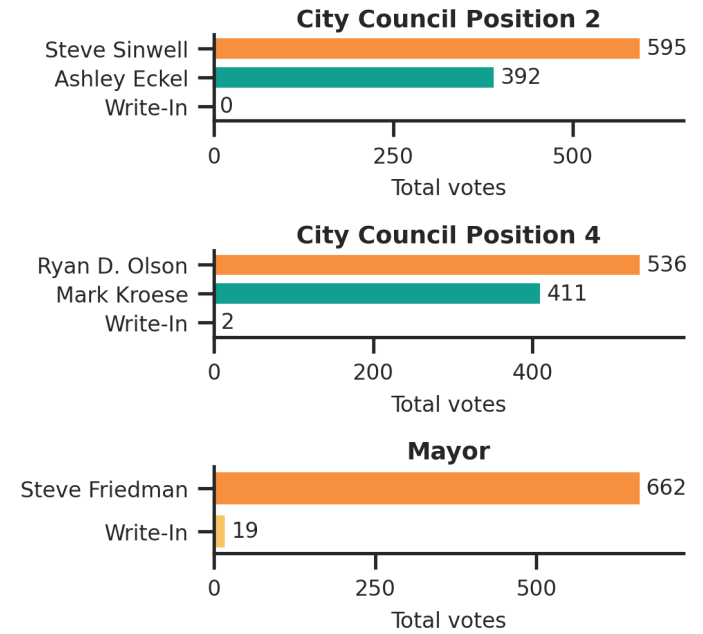

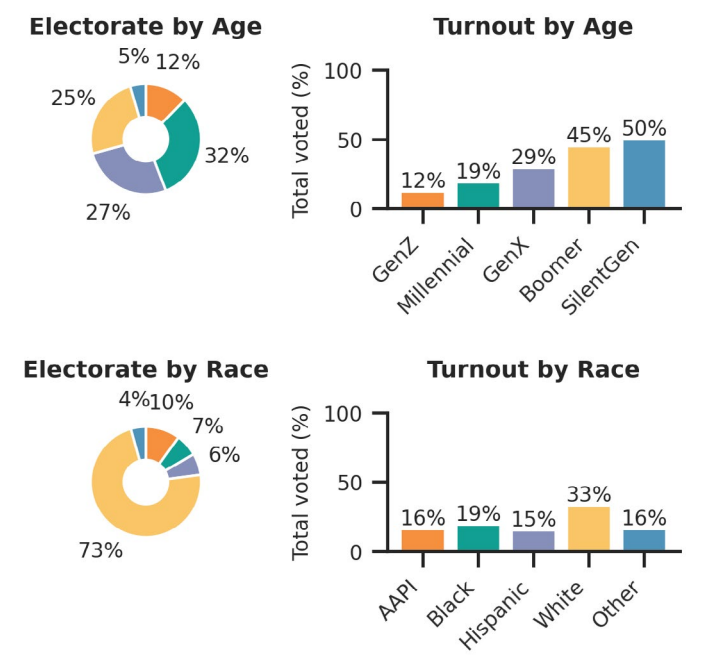


**Fig 2** Election results in Clyde Hill for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

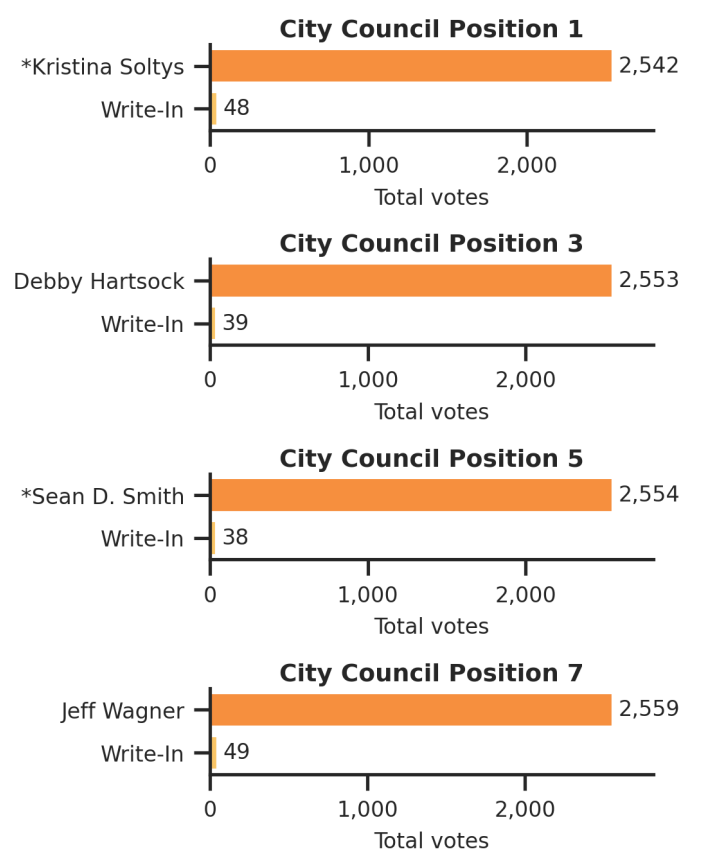

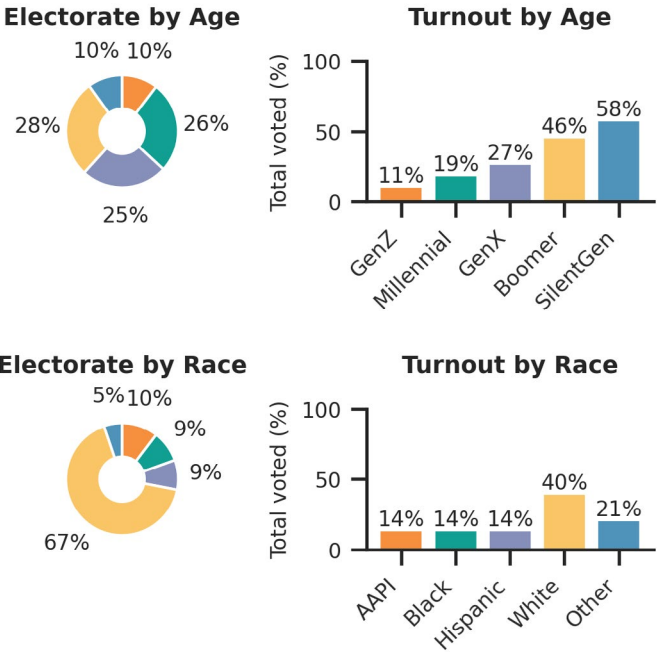


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Des Moines for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

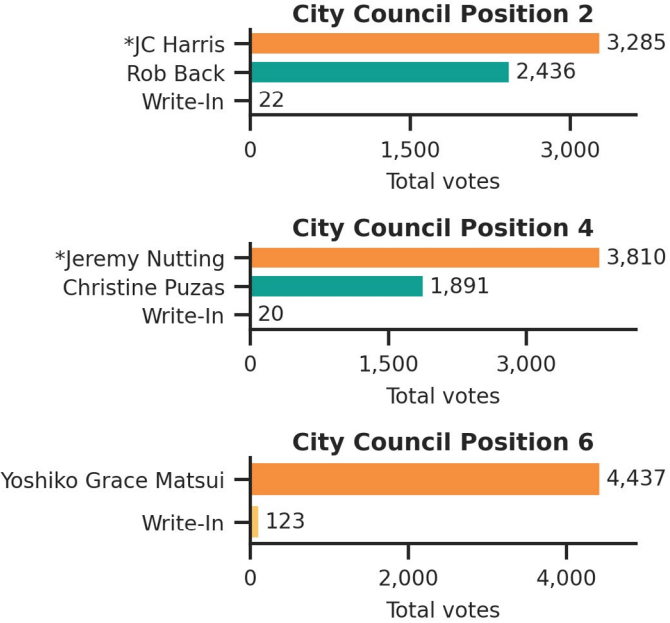


Fig 2 Election results in Des Moines for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

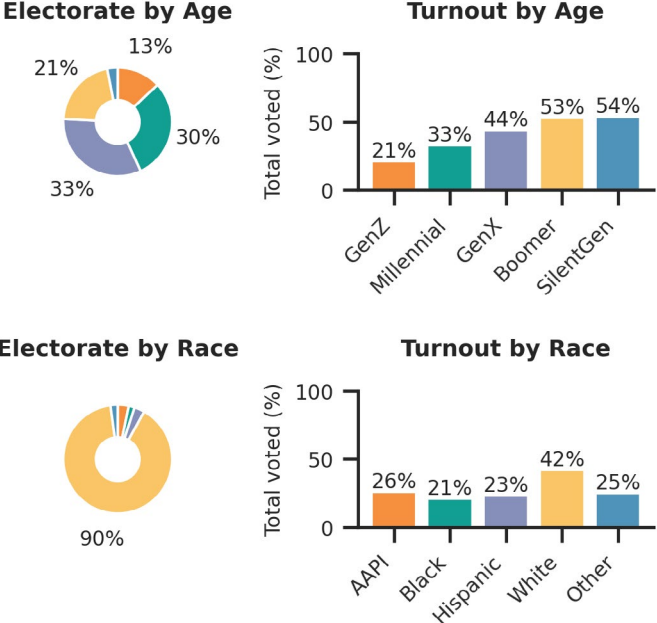


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Duvall for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

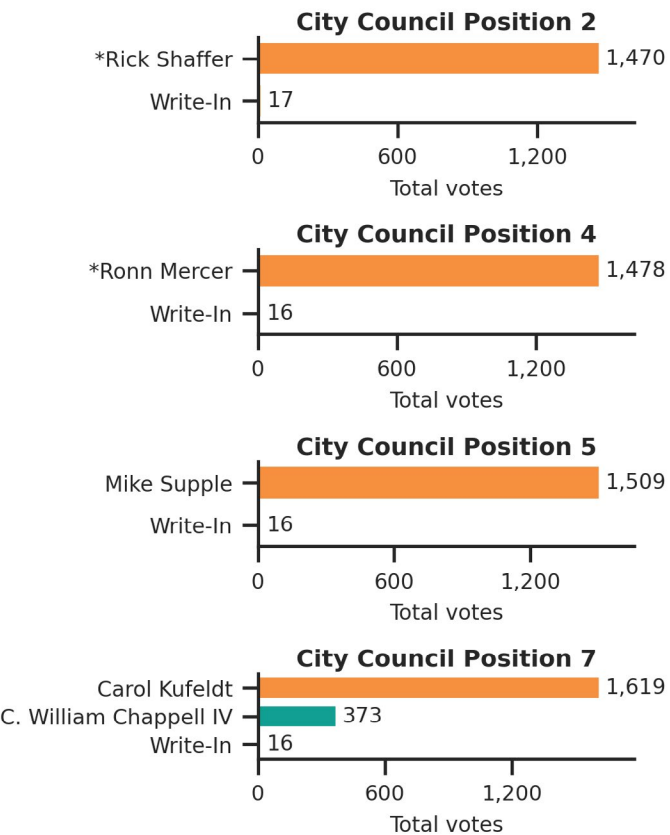


Fig 2 Election results in Duvall for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

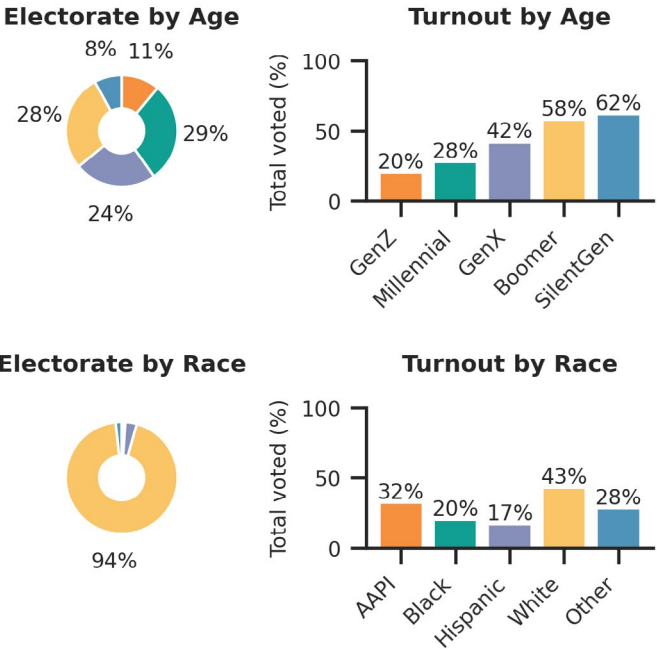


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Enumclaw for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

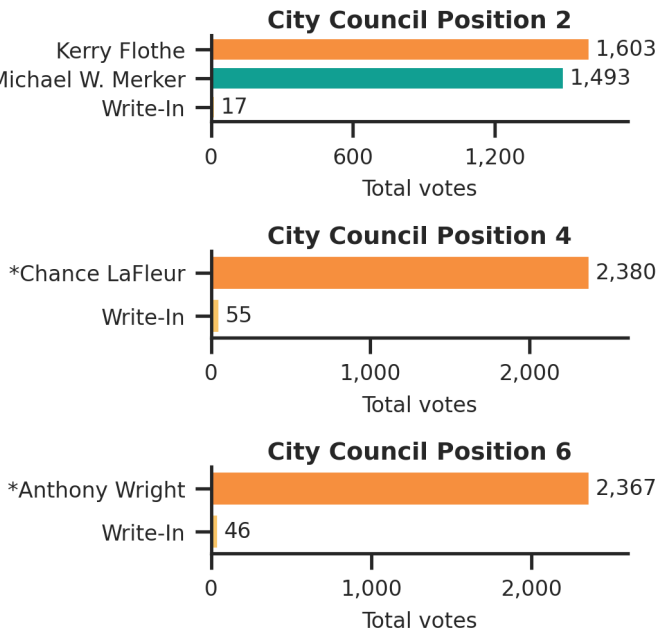


Fig 2 Election results in Enumclaw for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

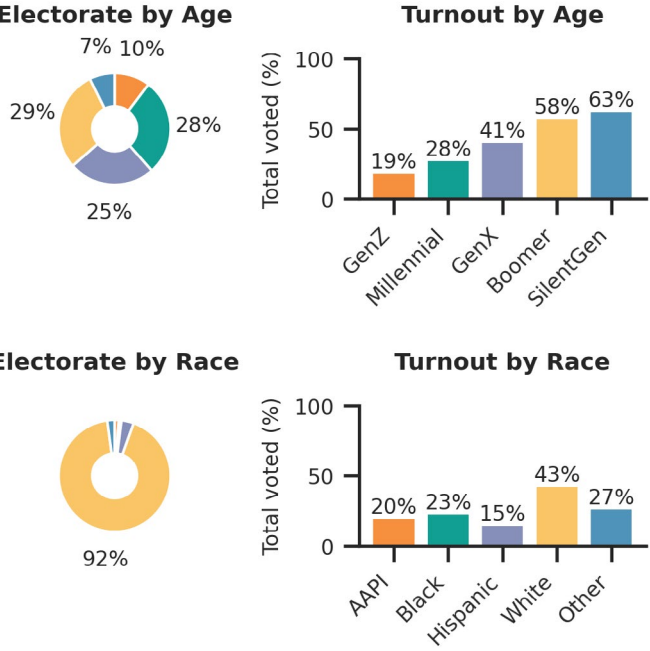


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Enumclaw School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

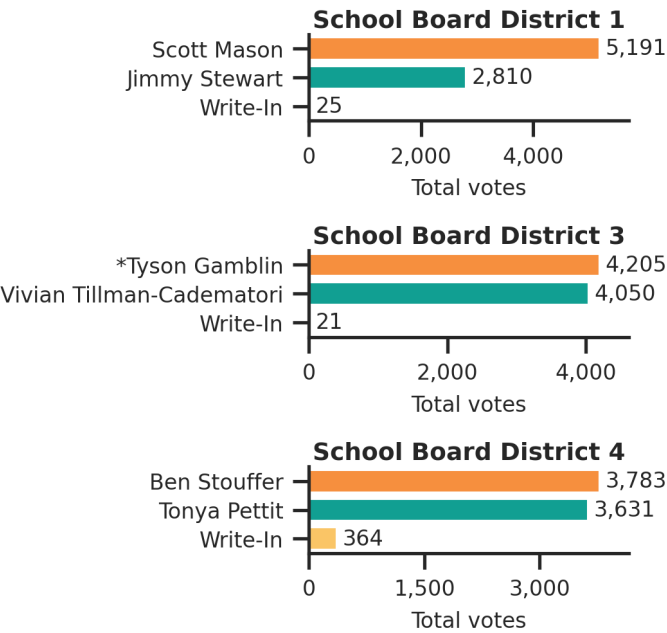


Fig 2 Election results in Enumclaw School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

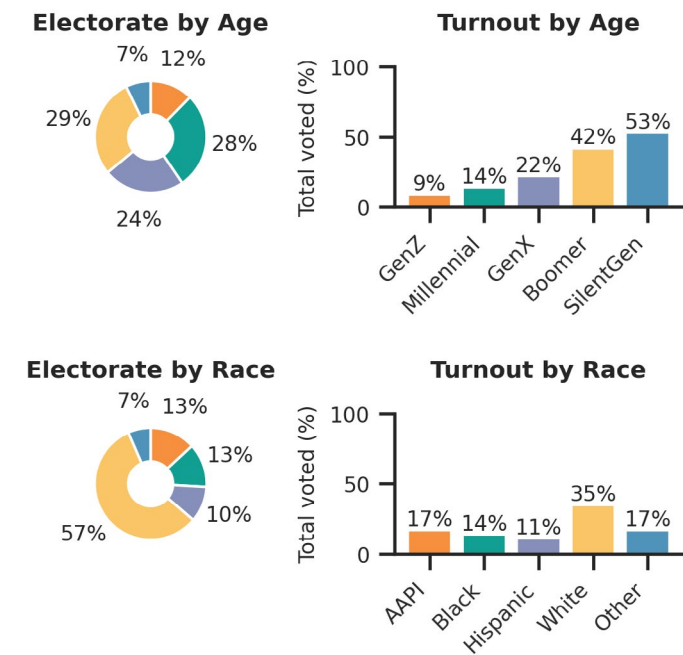


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Federal Way for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

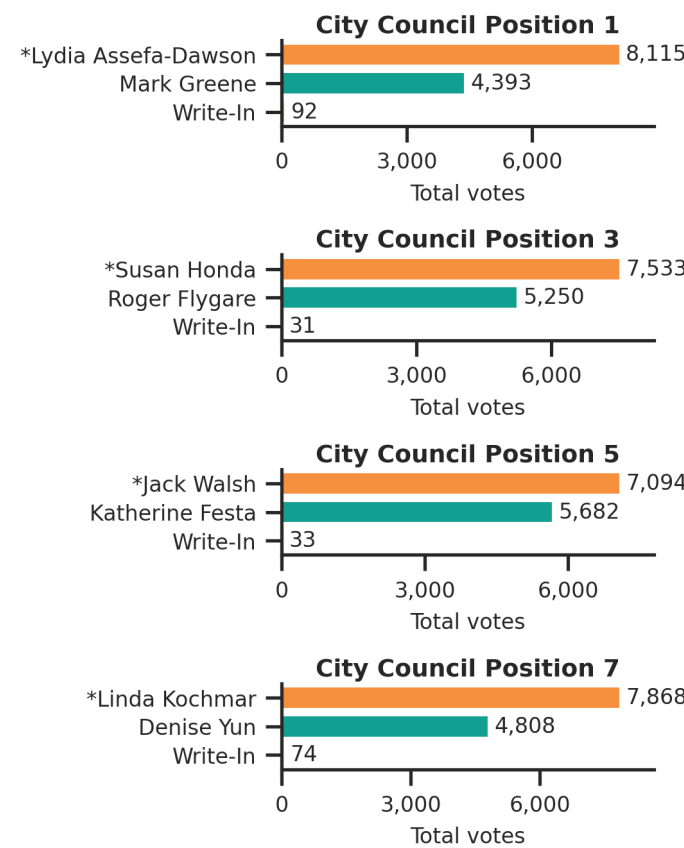


Fig 2 Election results in Federal Way for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

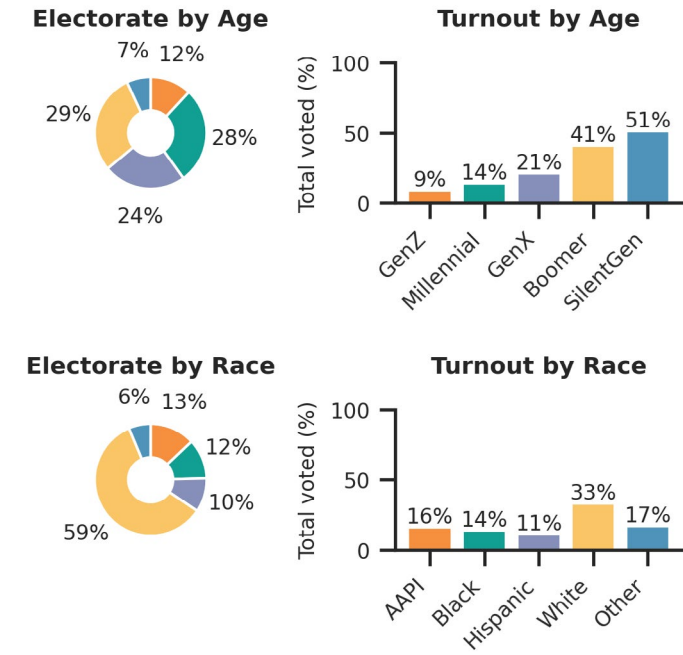


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Federal Way School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

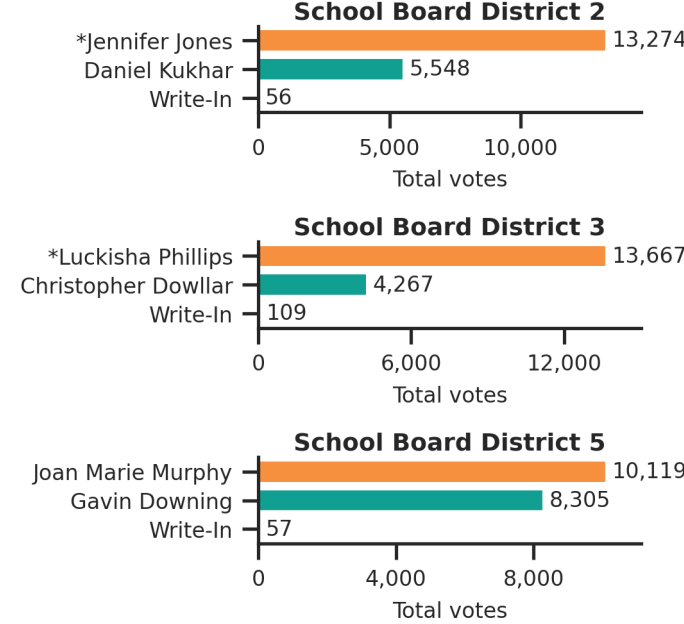


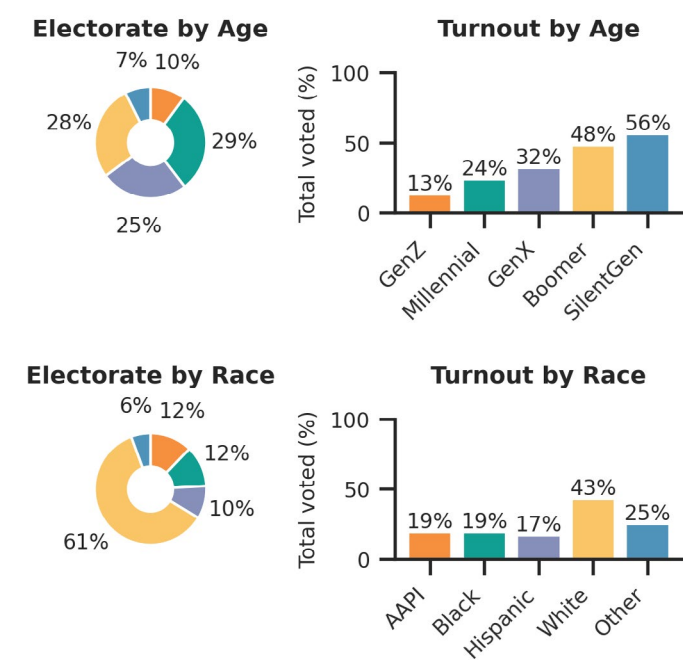
Fig 2 Election results in Federal Way School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

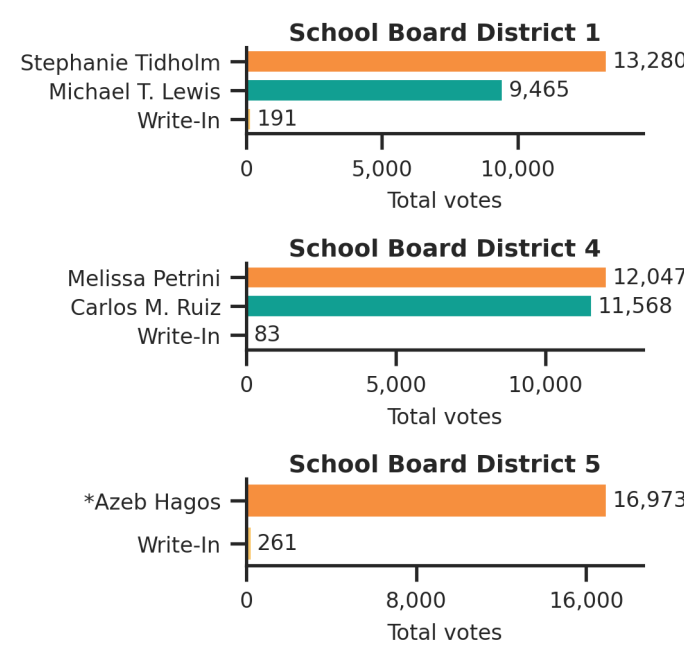

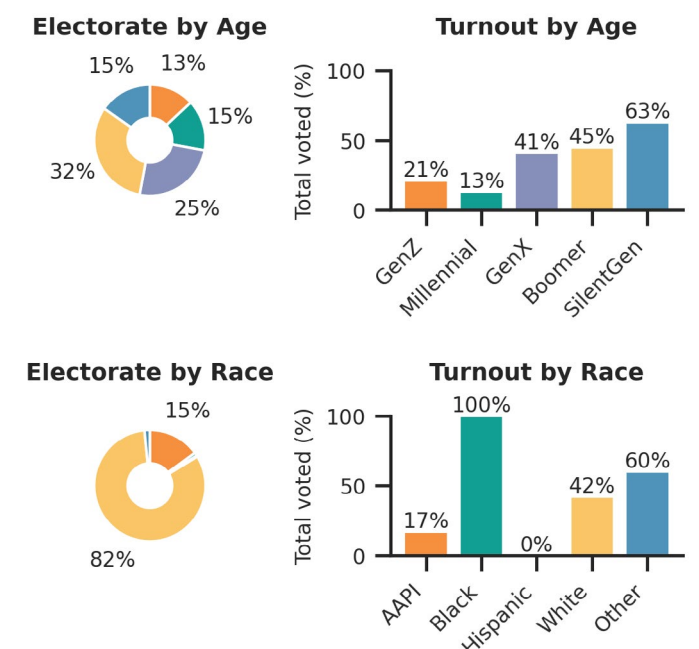


**Fig 2** Election results in Highline School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

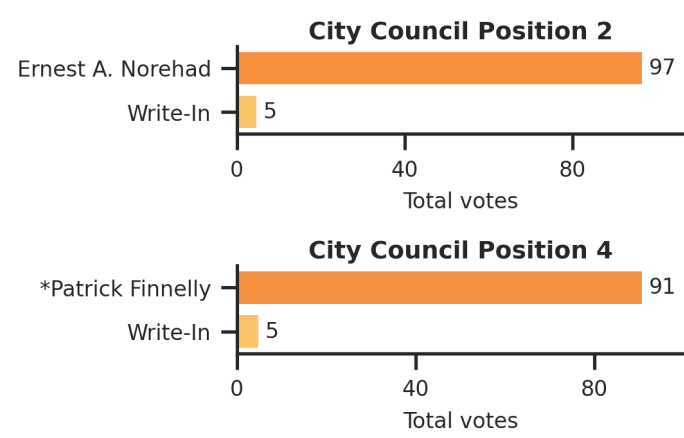

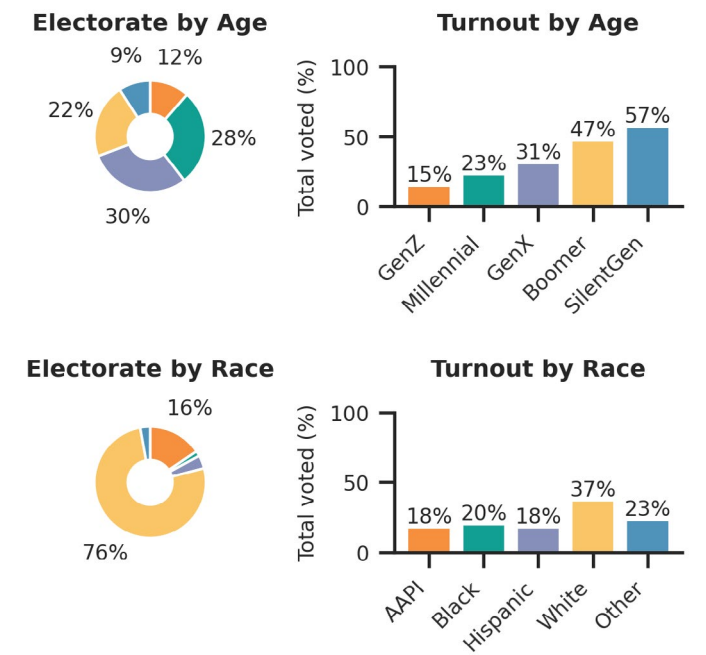

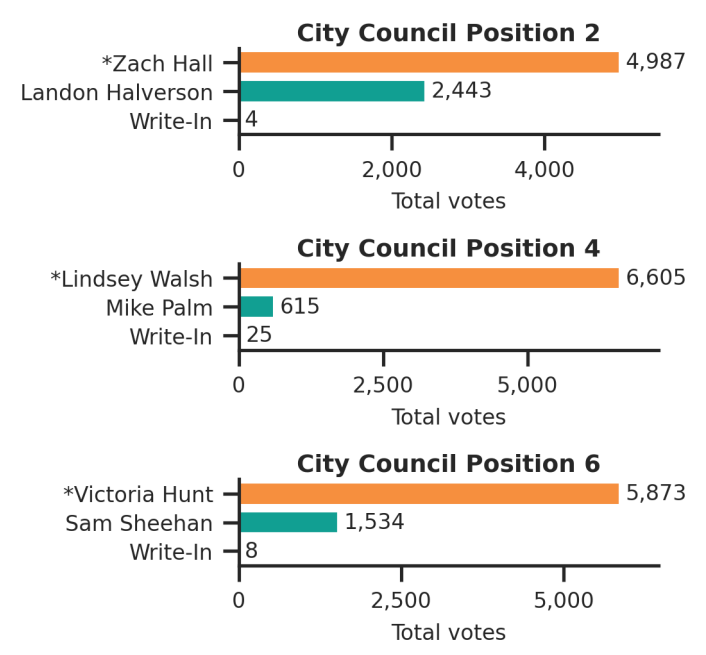

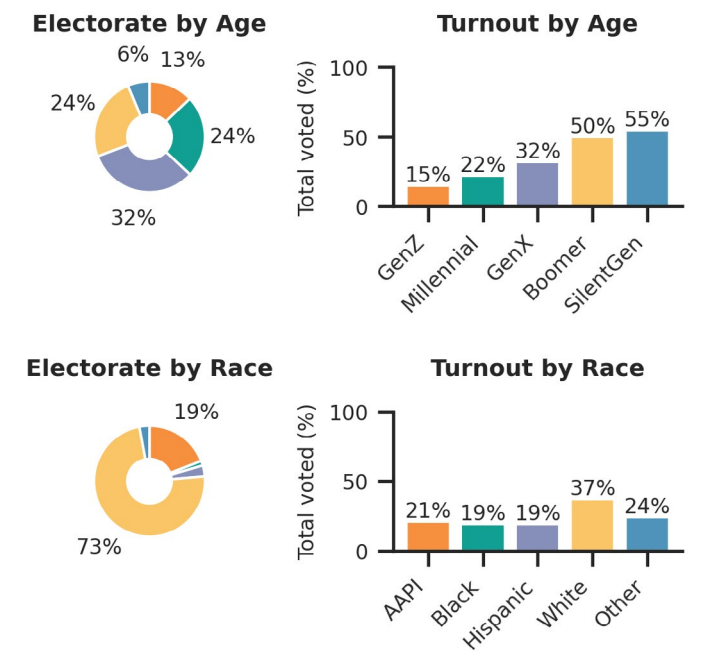

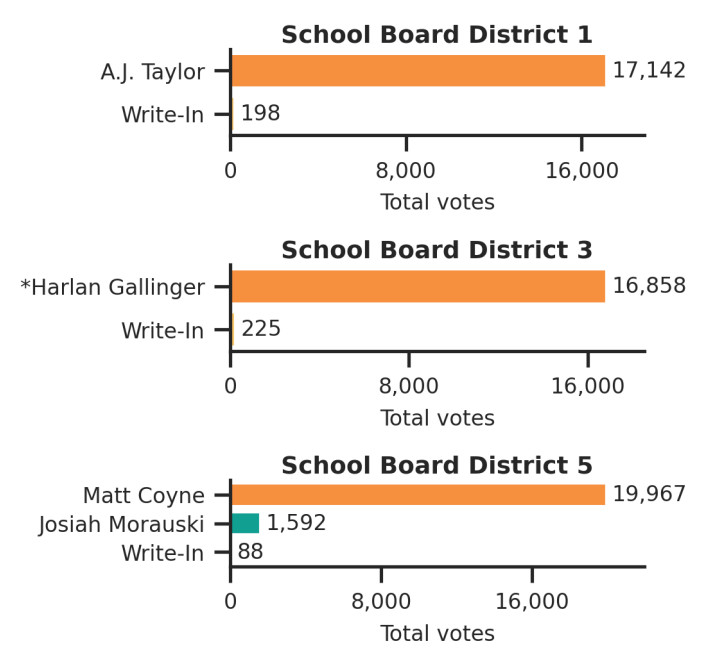

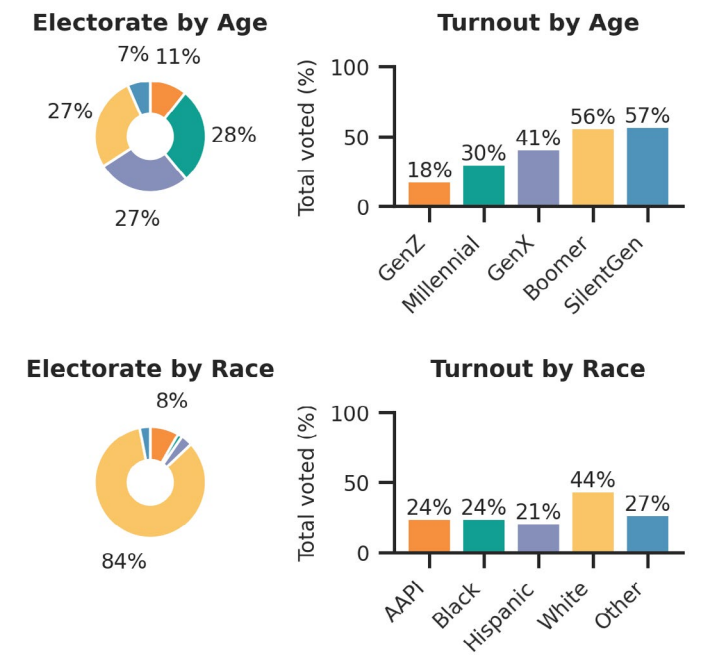


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kenmore for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

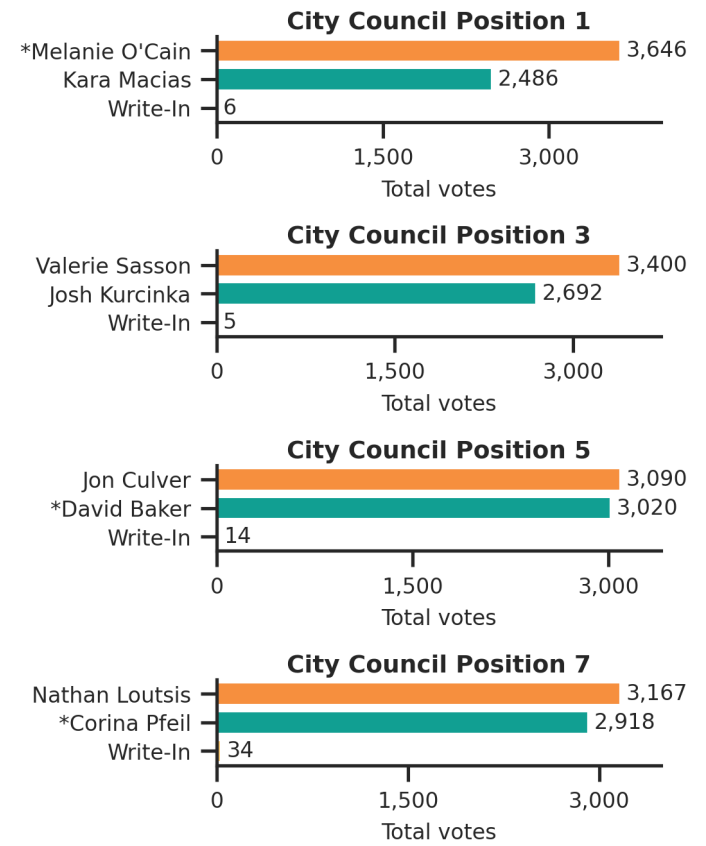


Fig 2 Election results in Kenmore for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

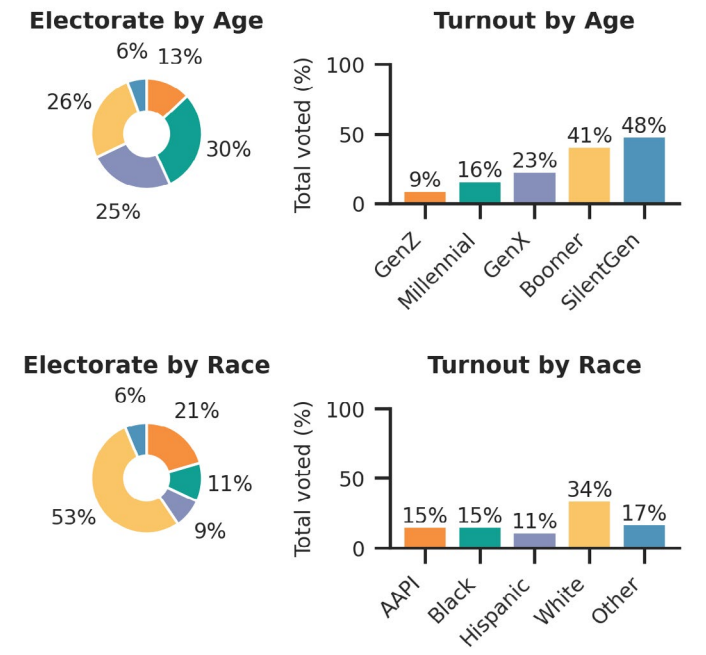


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Kent for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

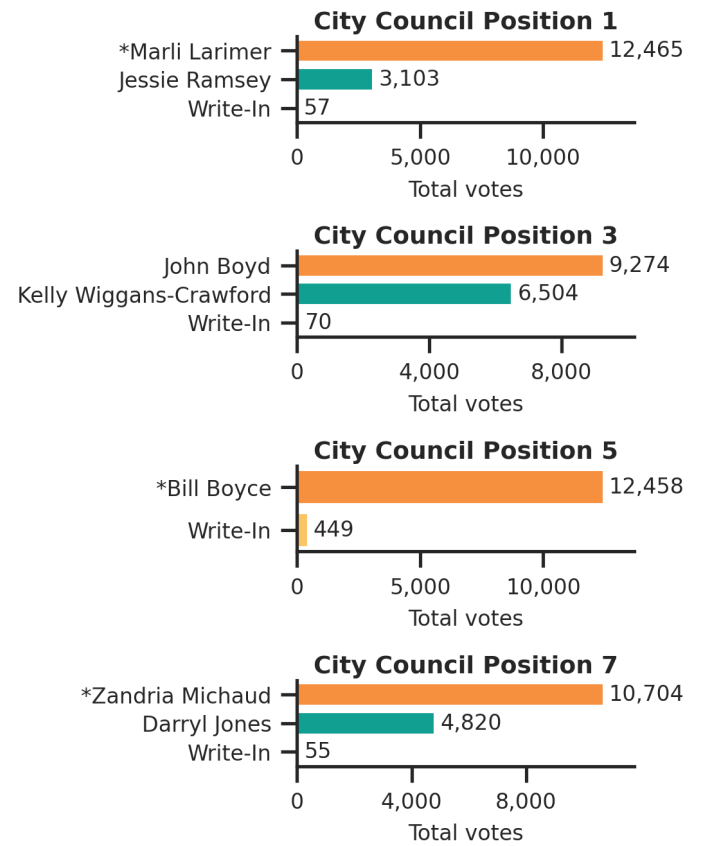


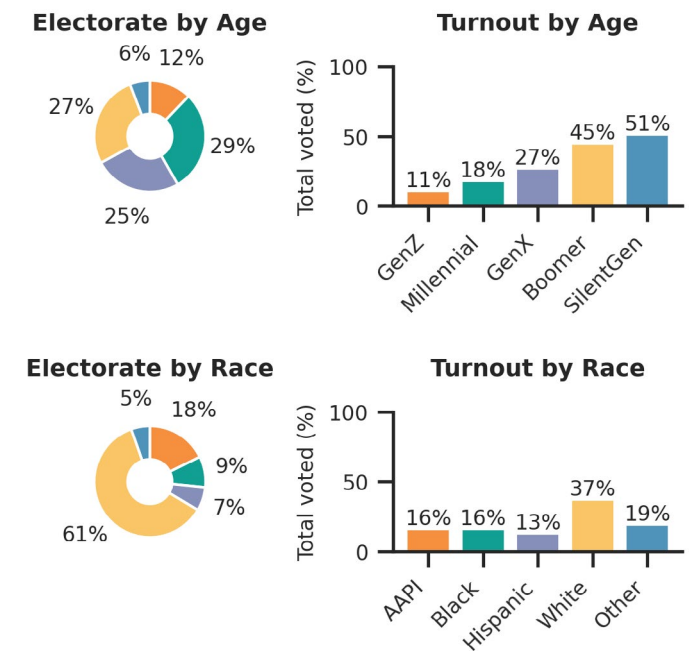
Fig 2 Election results in Kent for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

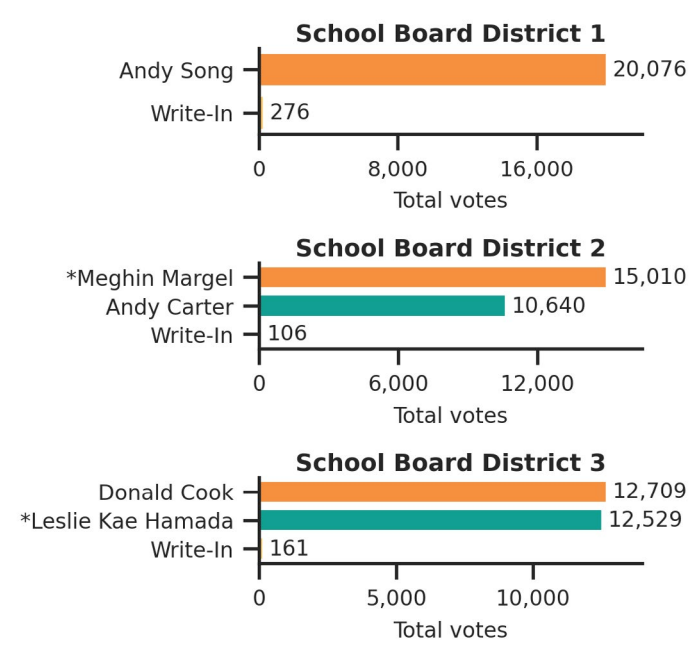

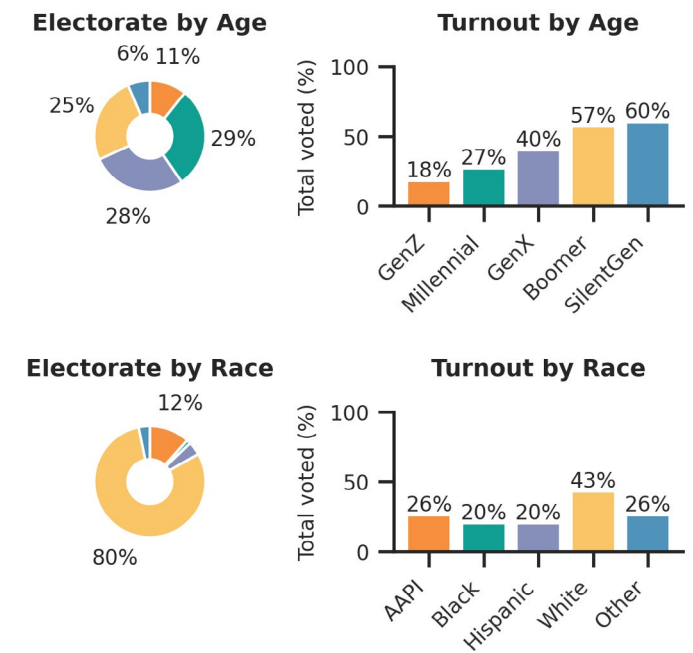


**Fig 2** Election results in Kent School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

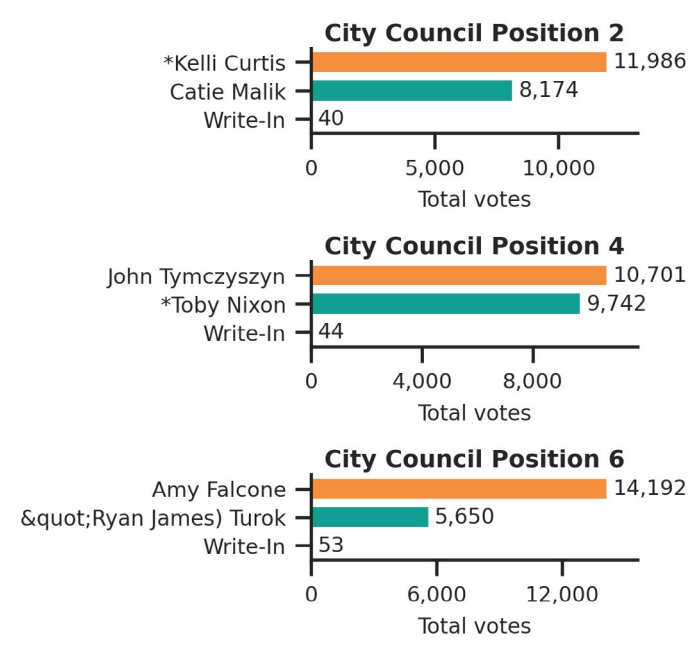

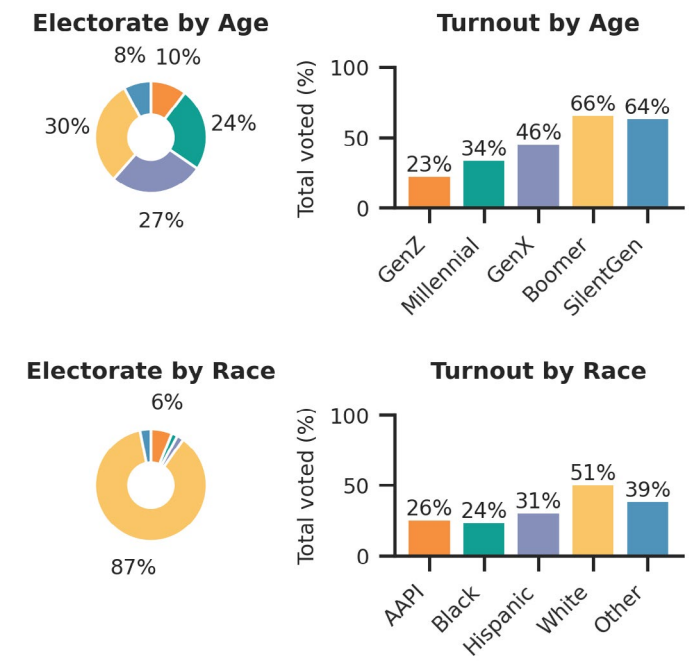


**Fig 2** Election results in Kirkland for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

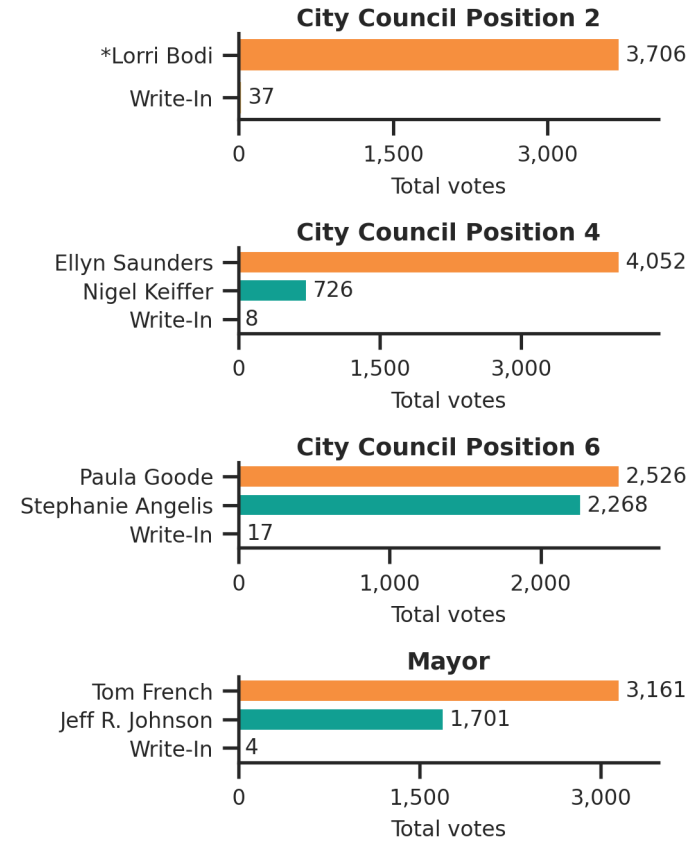

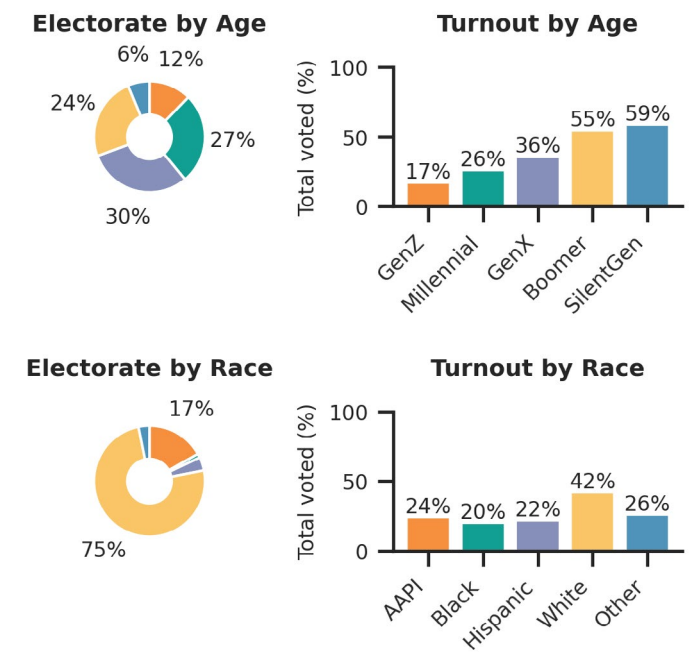


**Fig 2** Election results in Lake Forest Park for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

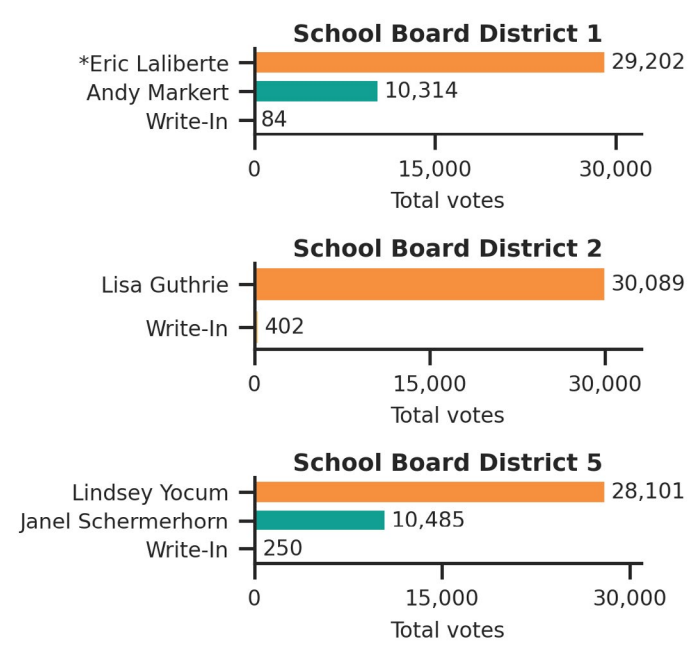

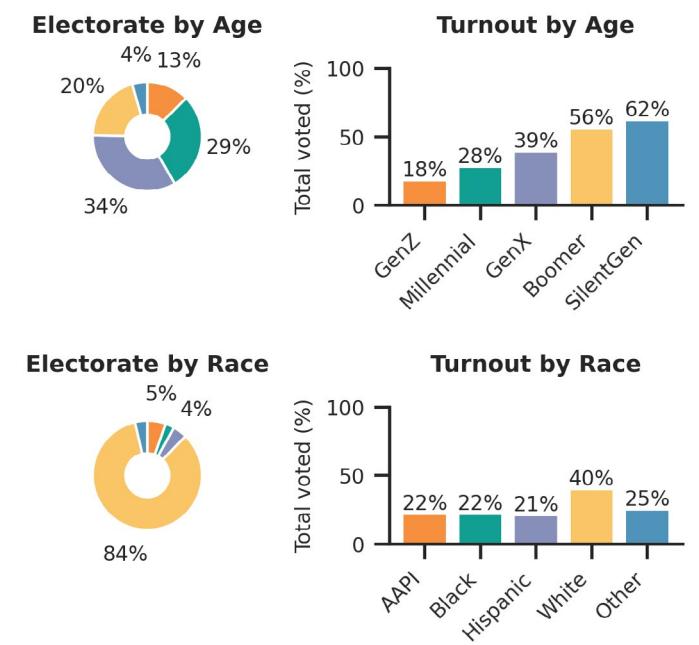


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Maple Valley for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

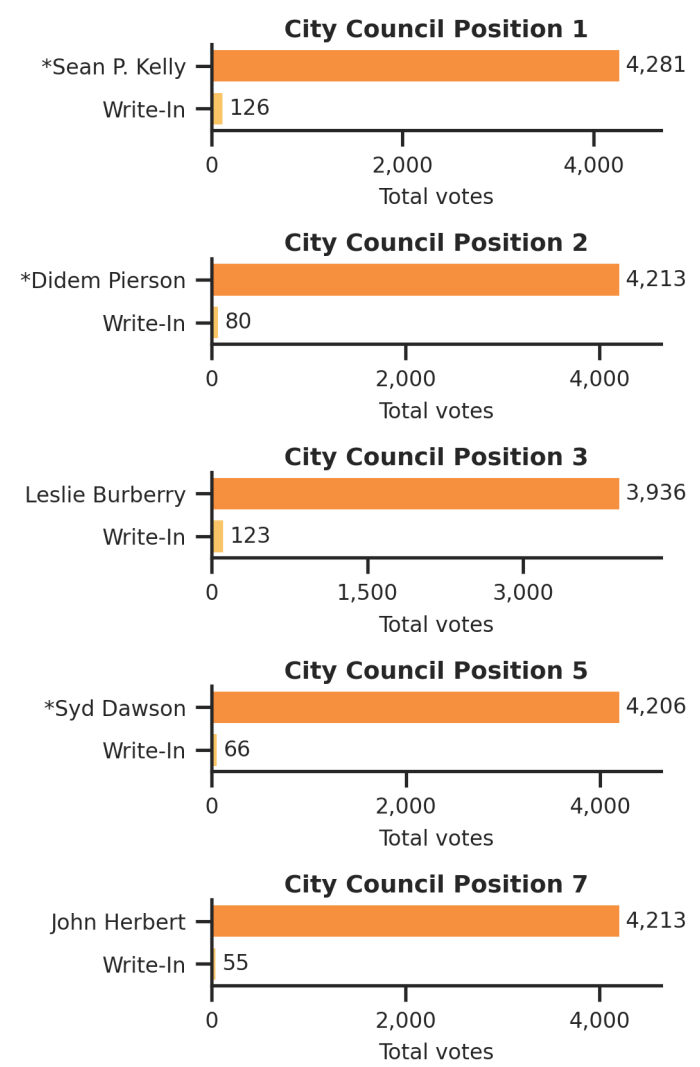


Fig 2 Election results in Maple Valley for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

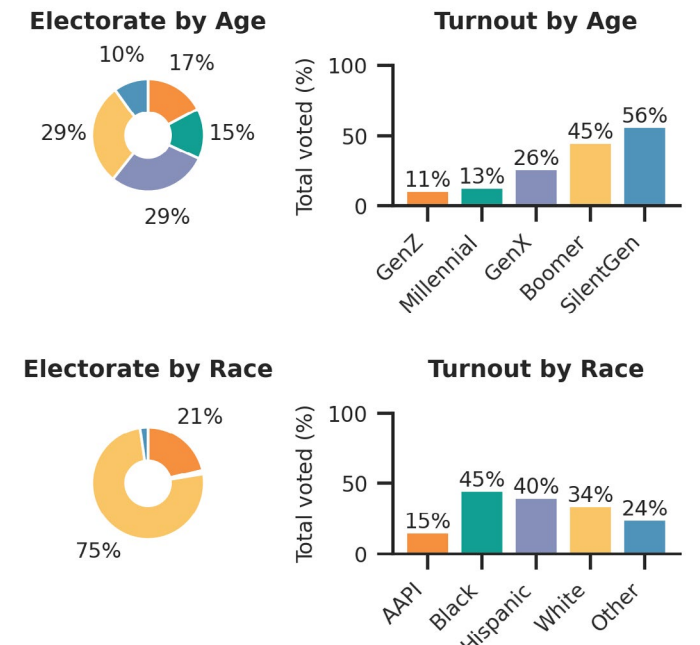


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Medina for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

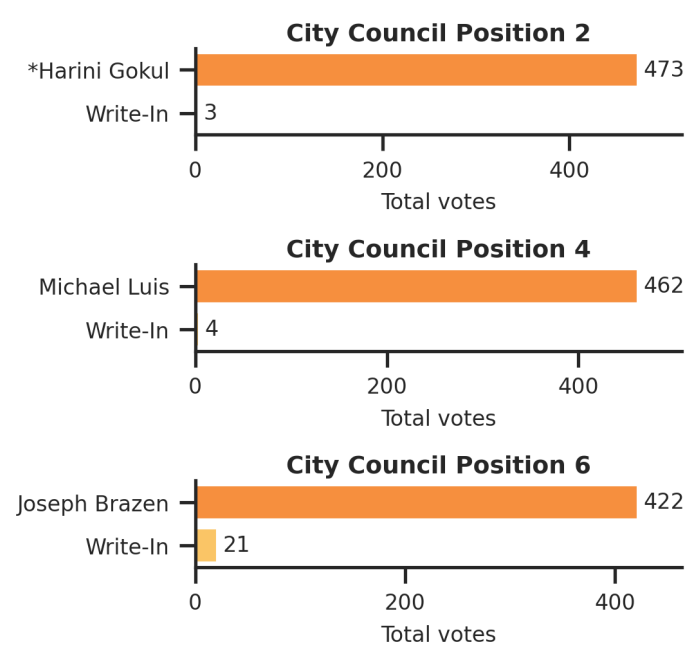


Fig 2 Election results in Medina for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

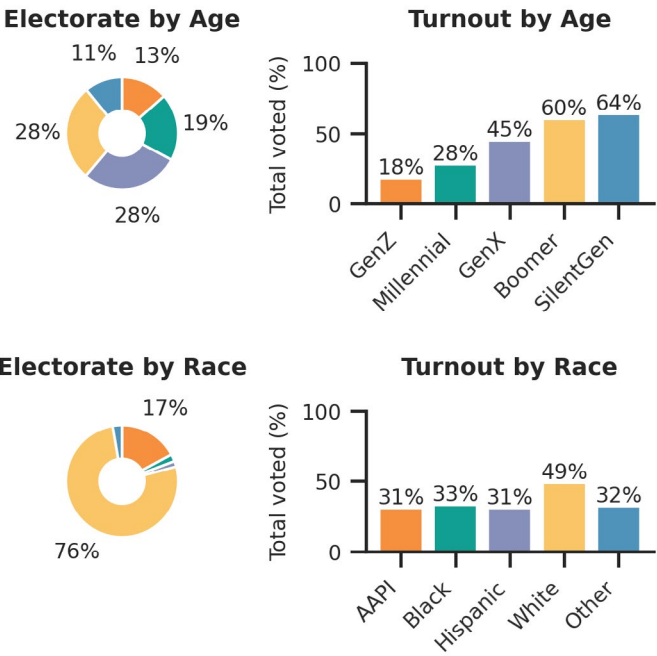


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mercer Island for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

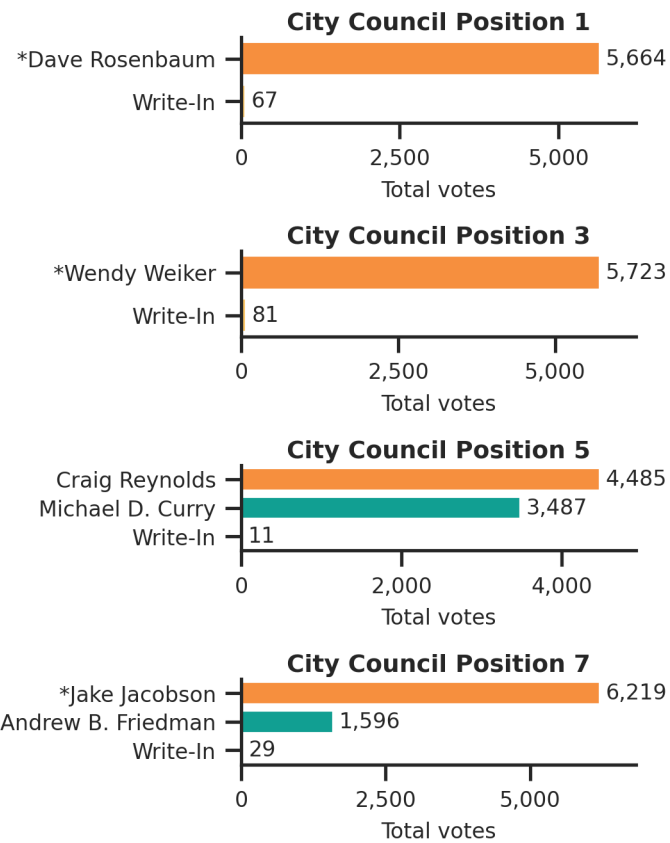


Fig 2 Election results in Mercer Island for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

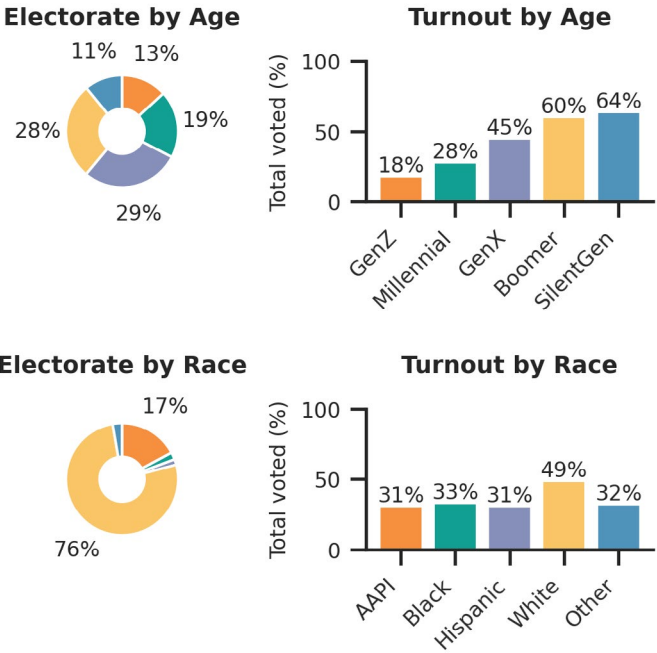


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Mercer Island School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

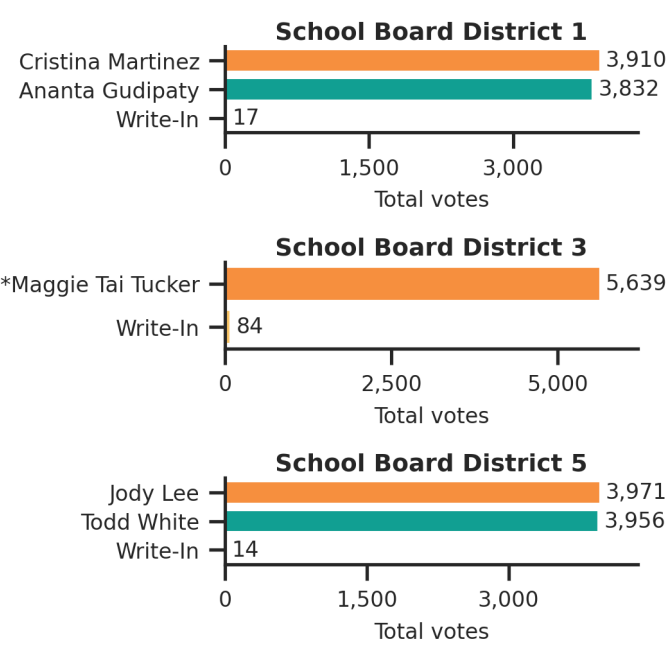
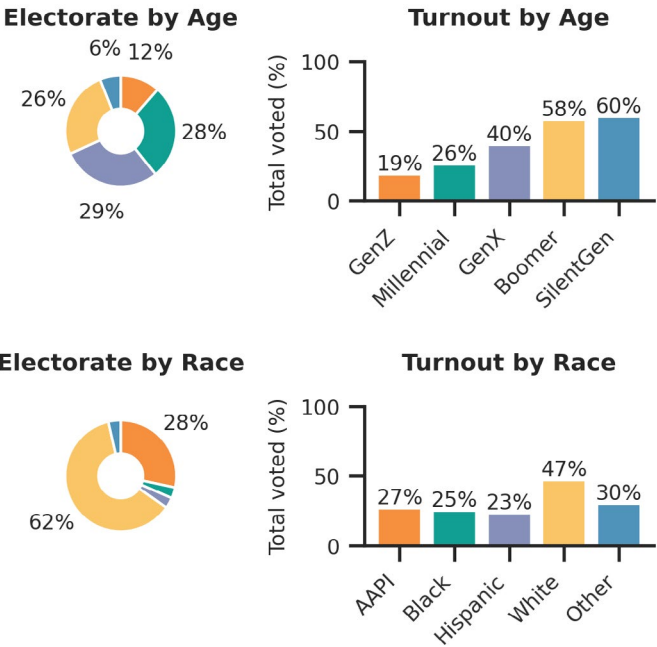


Fig 2 Election results in Mercer Island School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

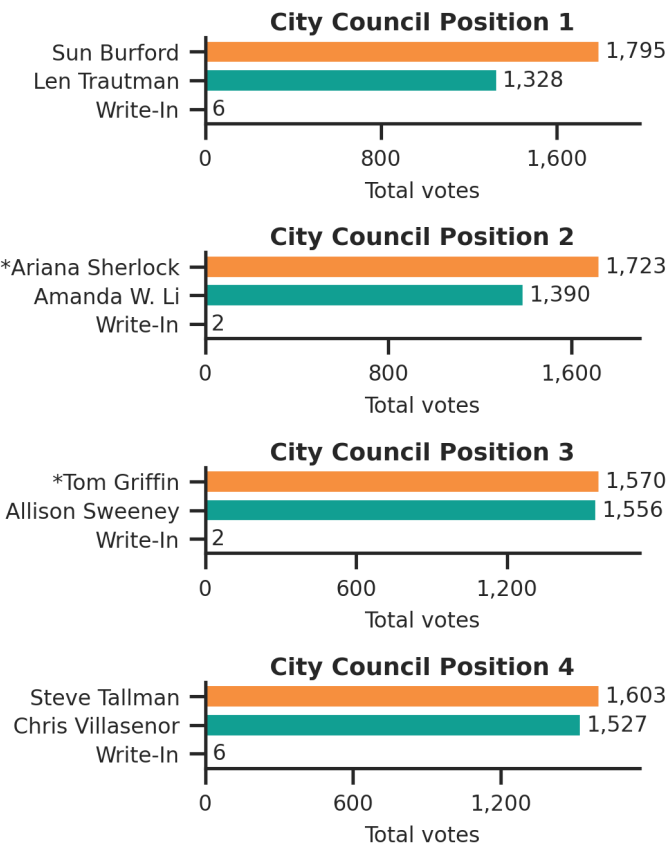

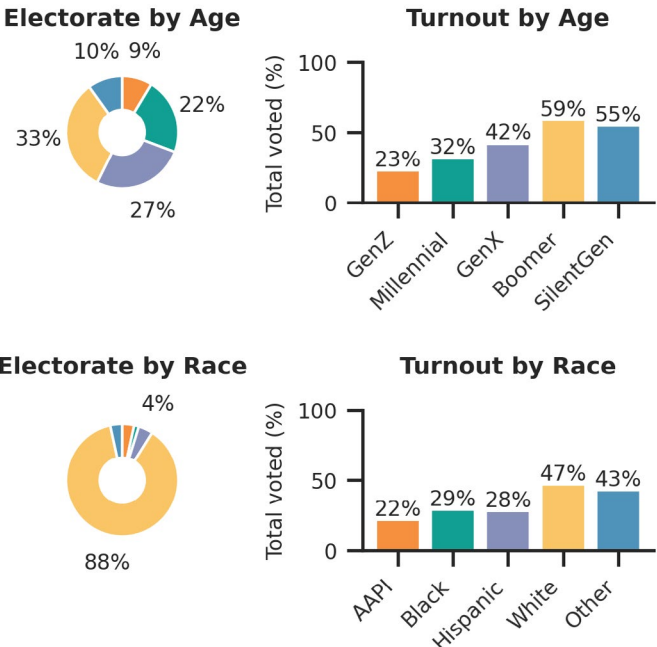


**Fig 2** Election results in Newcastle for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

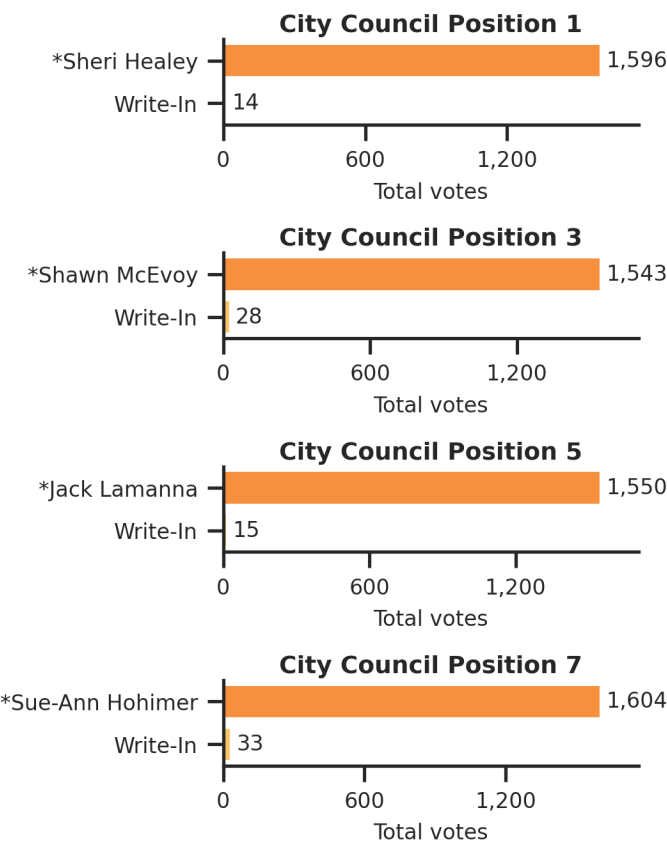

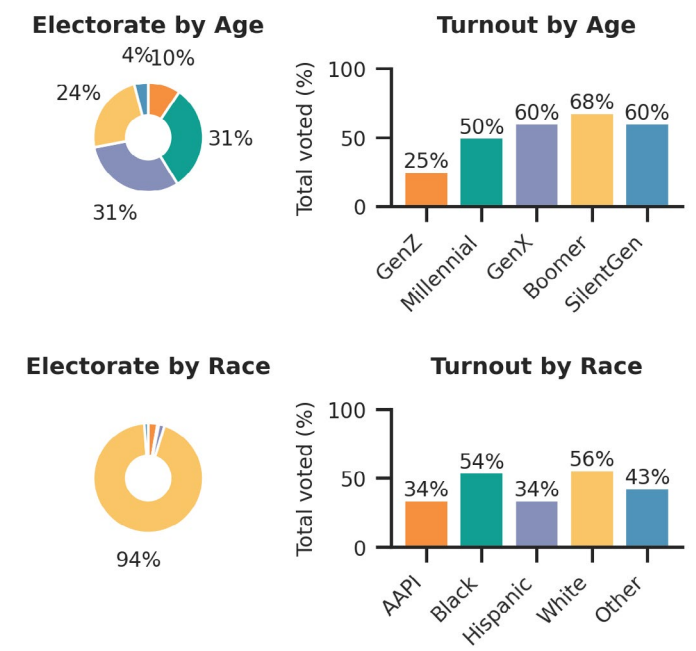


**Fig 2** Election results in Normandy Park for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

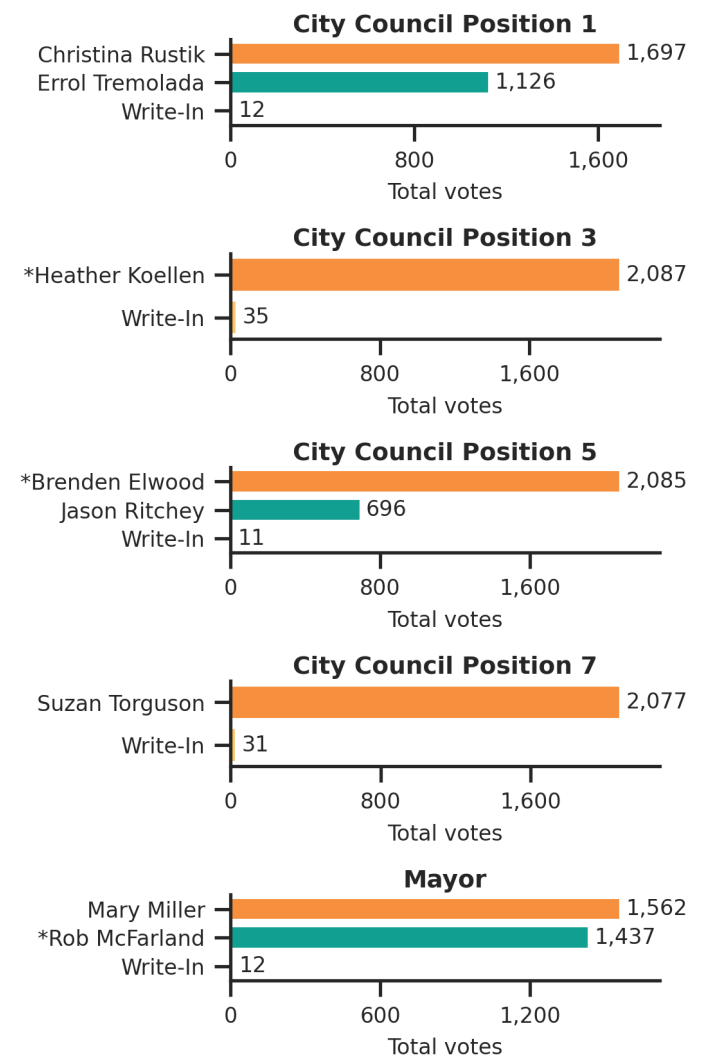


**Fig 1** Electorate composition and voter turnout in North Bend for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

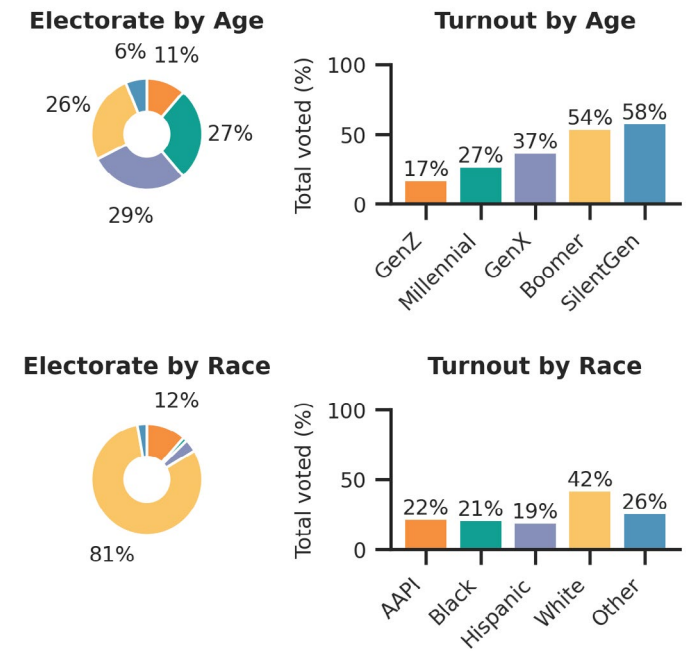


**Fig 2** Election results in North Bend for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

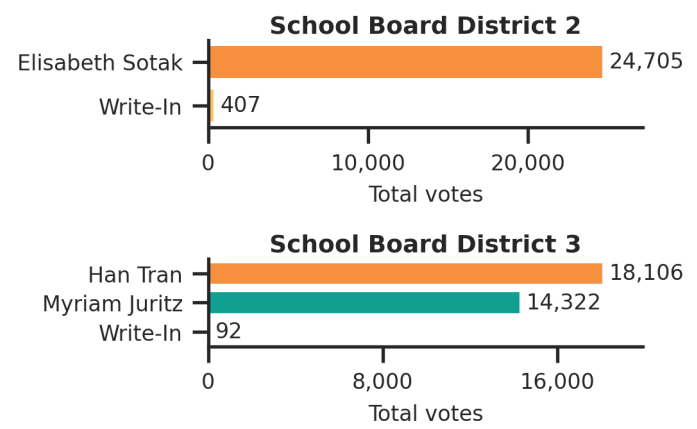

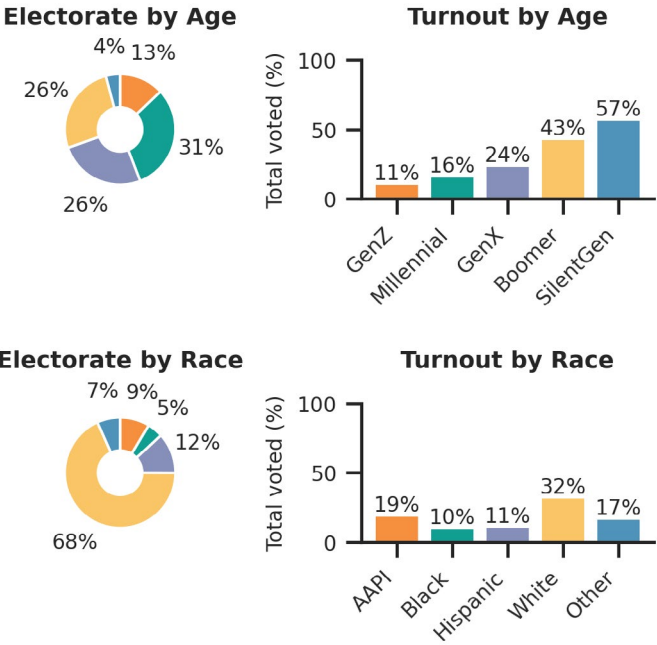


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Pacific for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

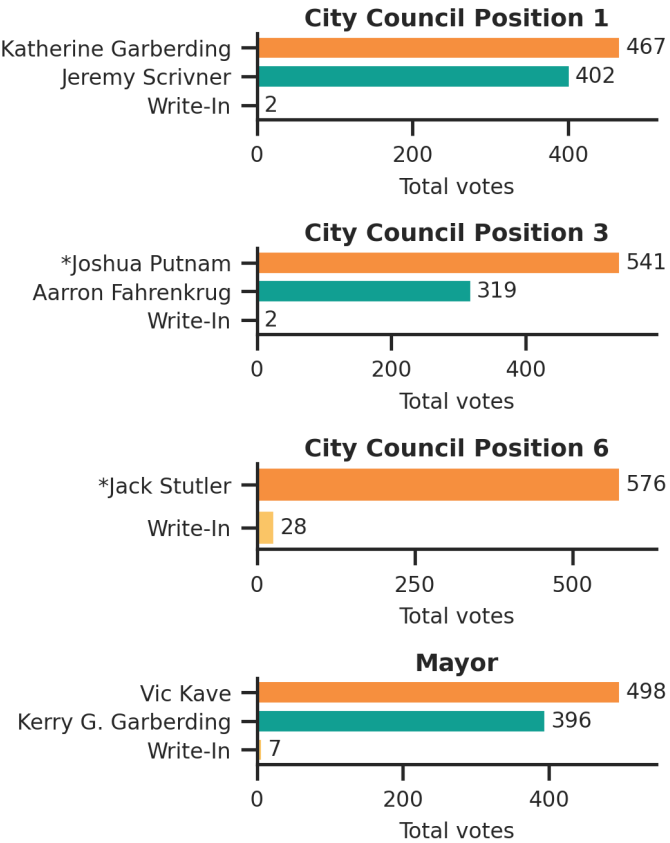


Fig 2 Election results in Pacific for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

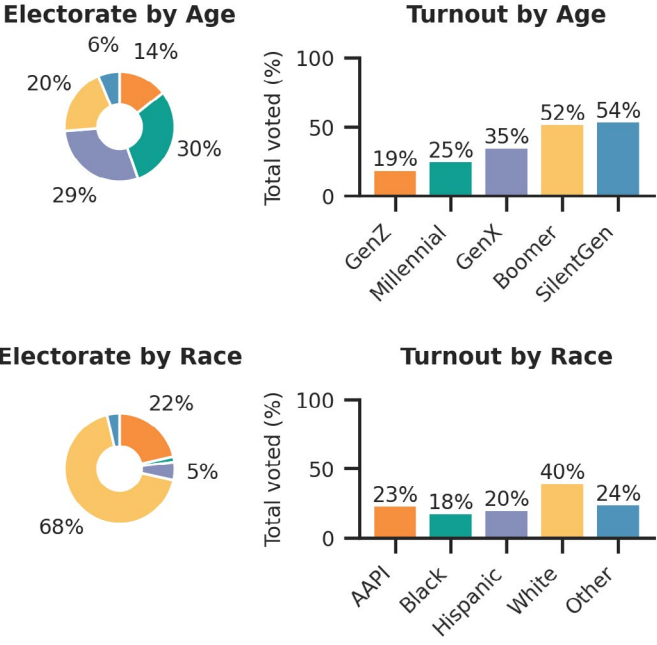


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Redmond for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

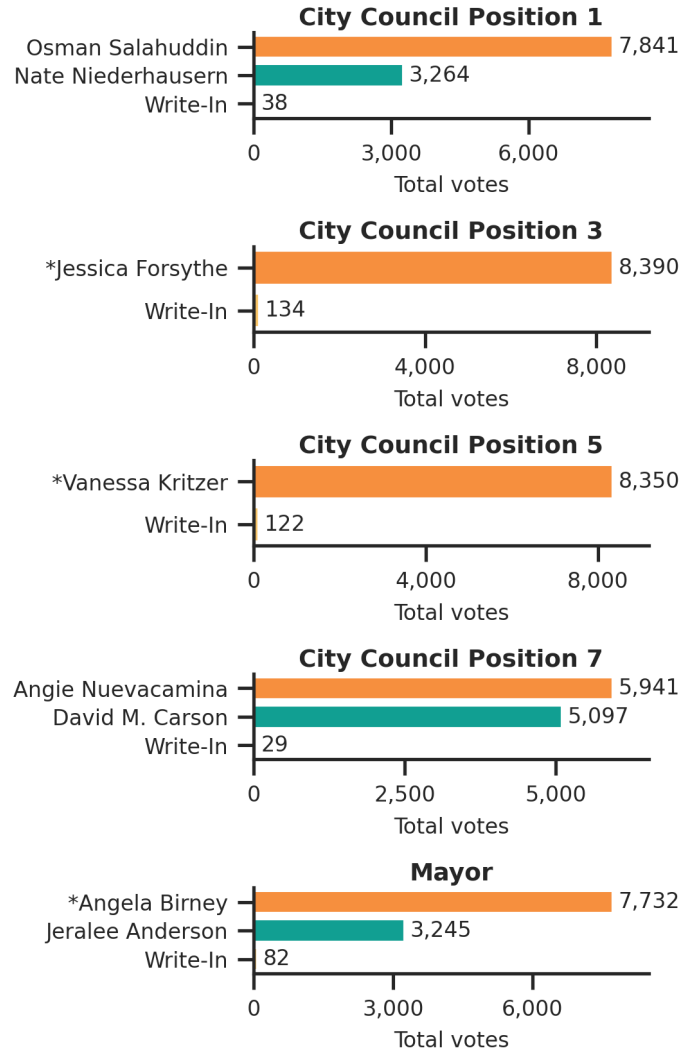


Fig 2 Election results in Redmond for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

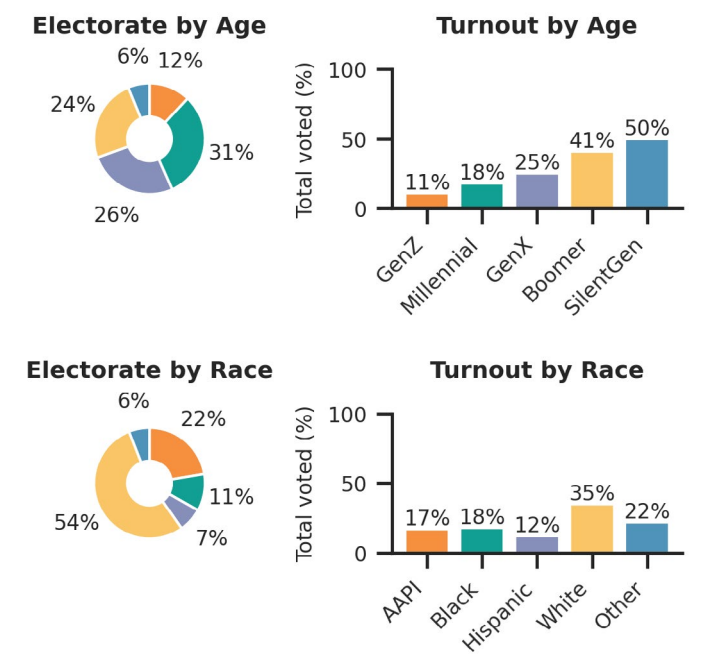


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Renton for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

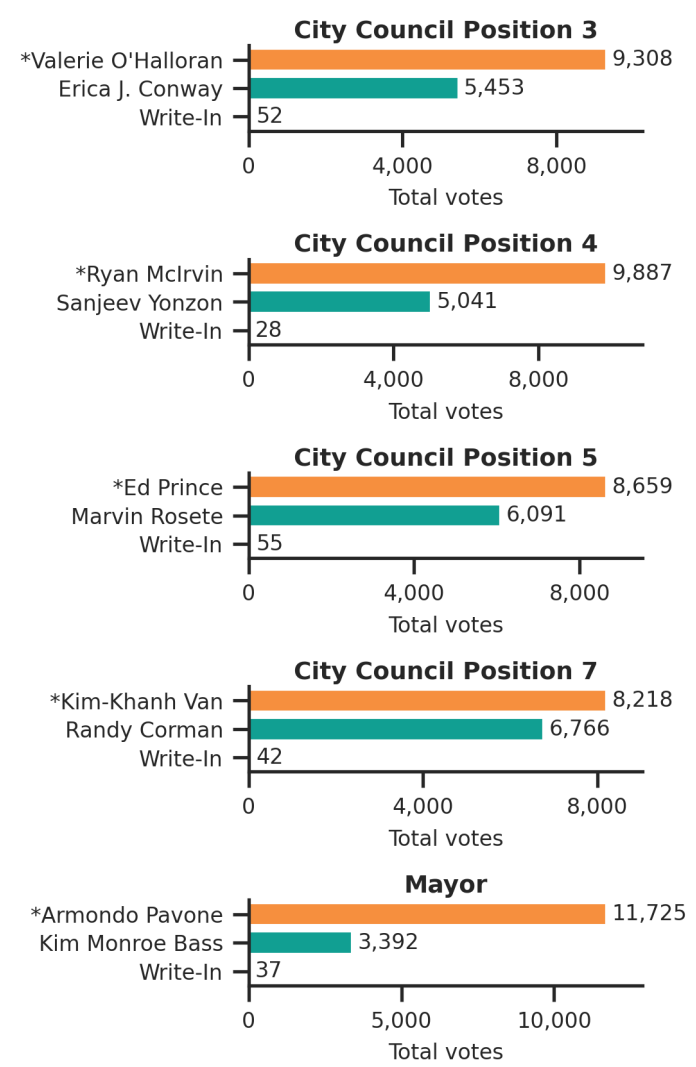


Fig 2 Election results in Renton for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

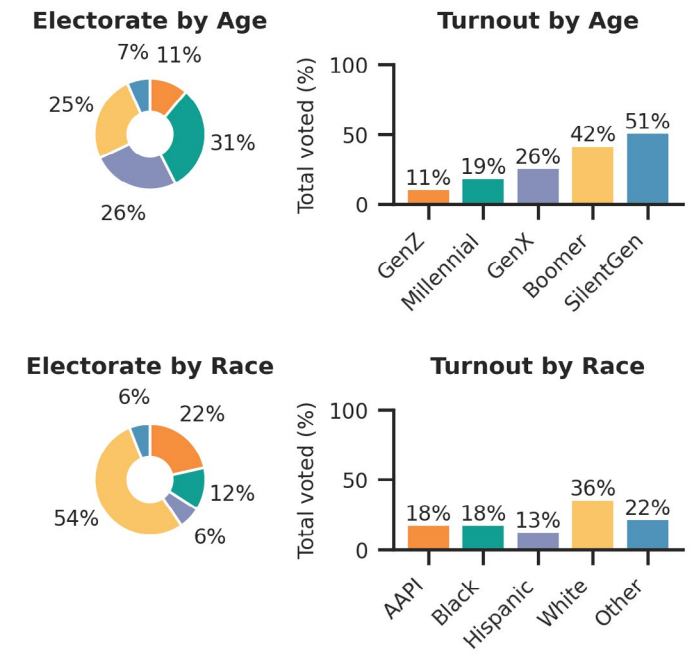


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Renton School District for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

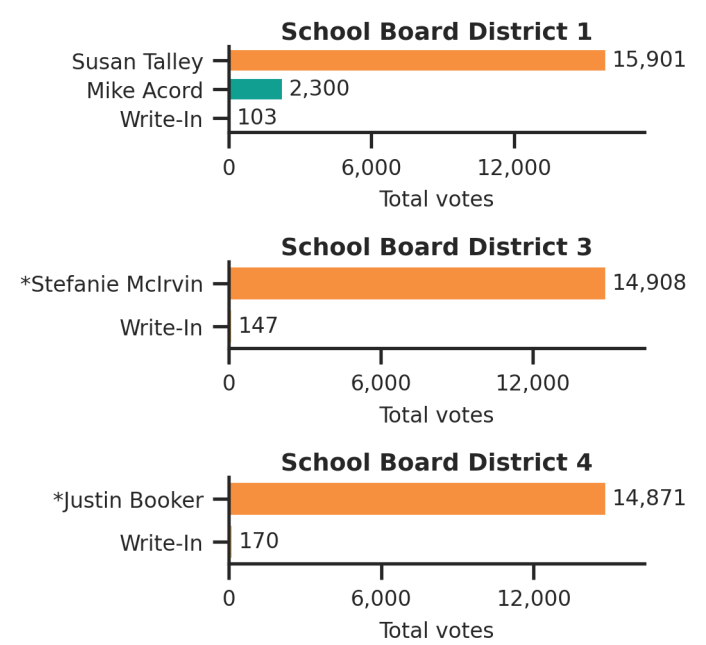
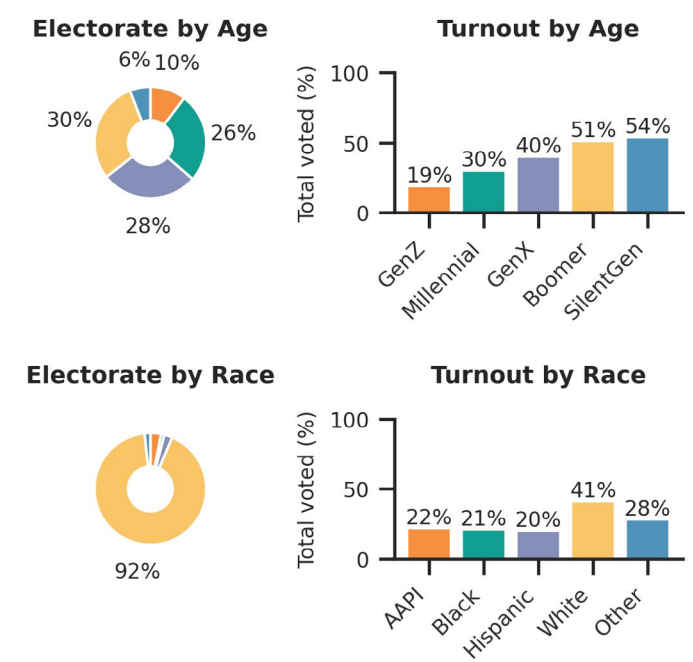


Fig 2 Election results in Renton School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

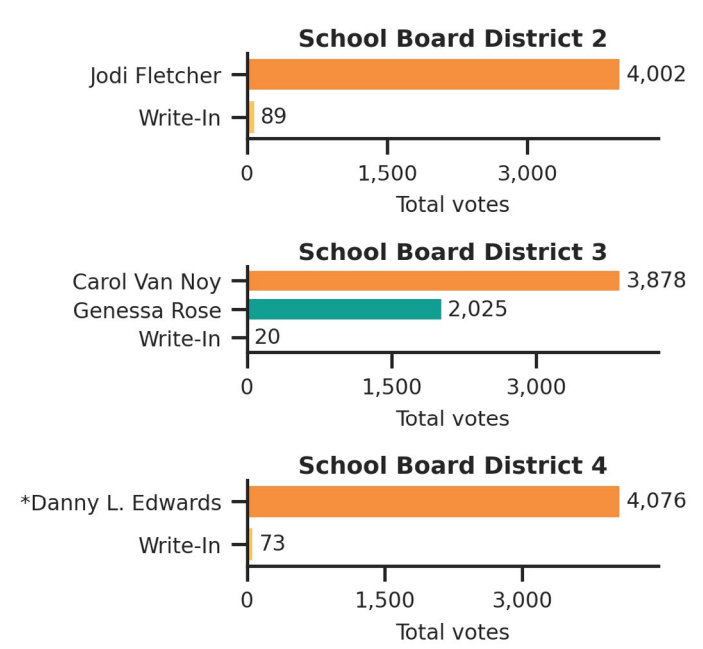

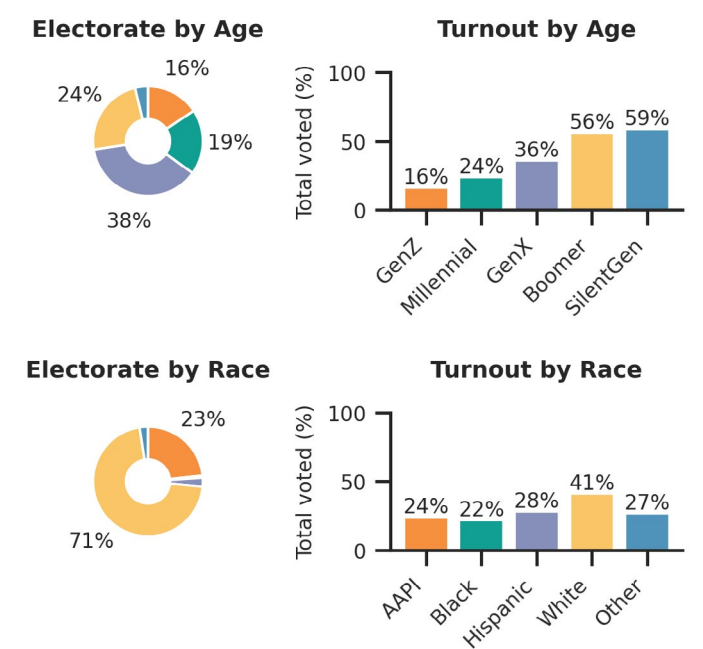

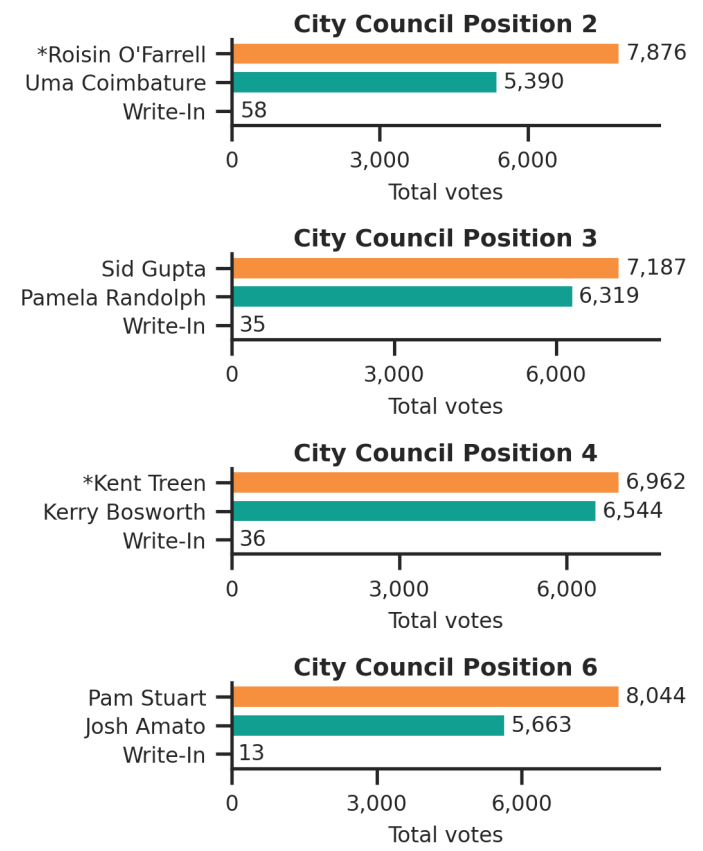

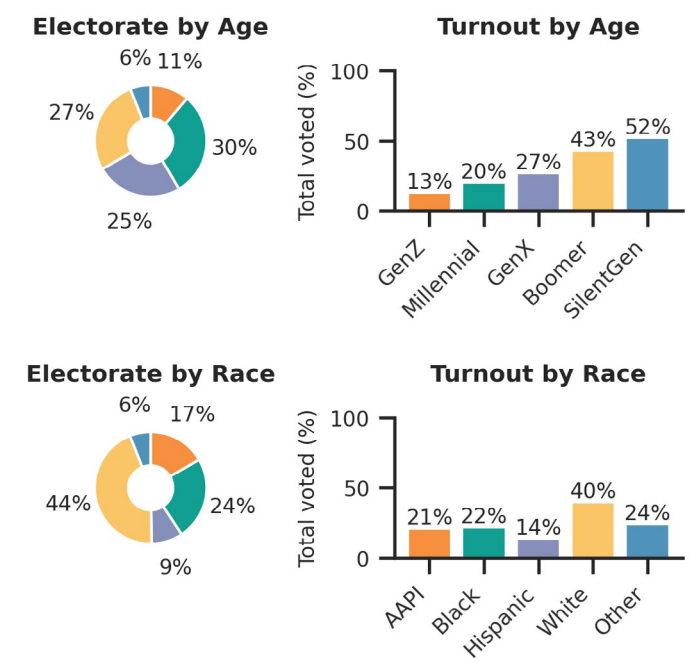


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in SeaTac for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

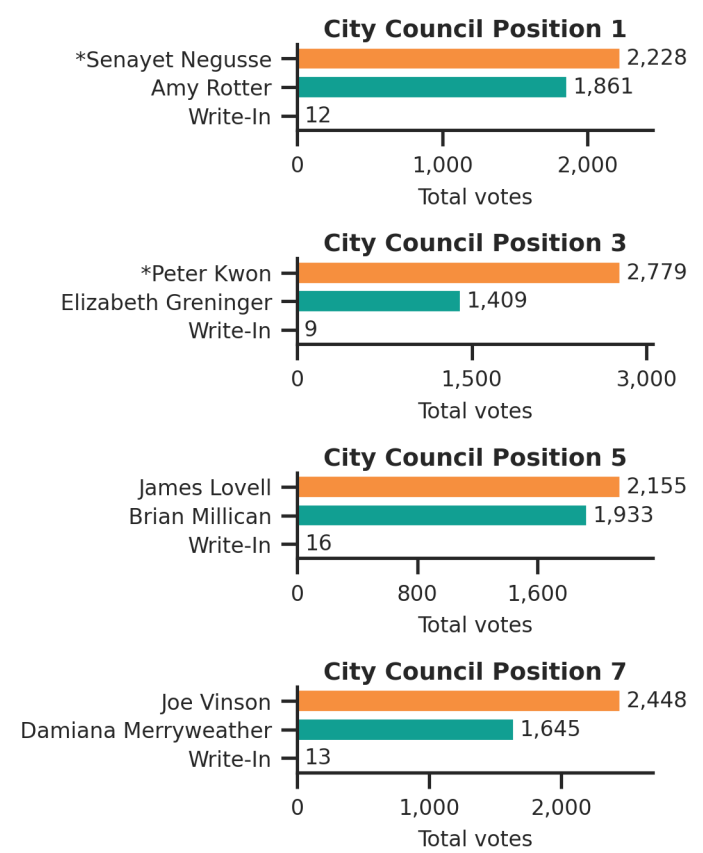


Fig 2 Election results in SeaTac for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

Voter turnout

There are 466,544 registered voters in Seattle, including 16,625 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 46.5%. Young voters make up 34.4% of the electorate in Seattle (160,659 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 23.3% lower than older voters (31.2% vs 54.5%). Seattle's electorate is 23.9% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 21.5% lower than White voters (30.1% vs 51.6%).

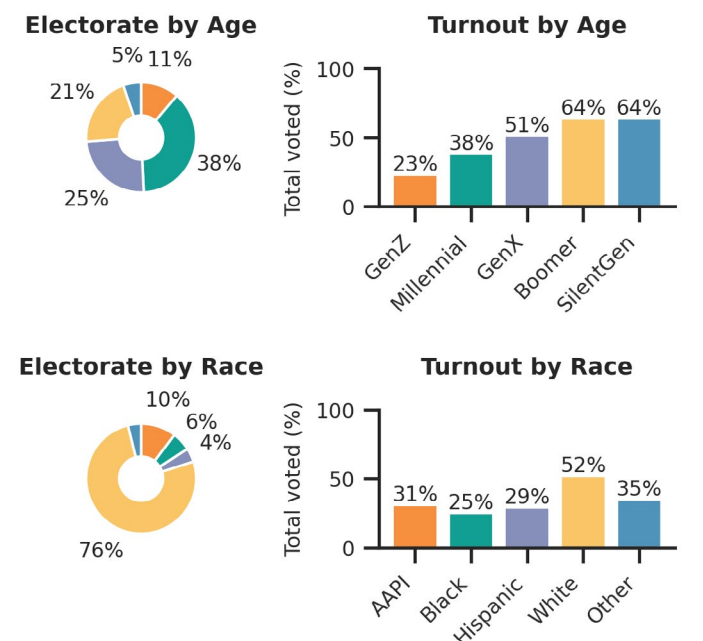


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Seattle for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

Election results

Voters in Seattle cast their ballots for seven municipal races and one initiative in the 2023 General Election: Rob Saka defeated Maren Costa 54.2% to 45.5%, winning election to City Council District 1; incumbent Tammy J. Morales defeated Tanya Woo 50.7% to 49.1%, winning re-election to City Council District 2; Joy Hollingsworth defeated Alex Hudson 52.9% to 46.7%, winning election to City Council District 3; Maritza Rivera defeated Ron Davis 50.3% to 49.4%, winning election to City Council District 4; Cathy Moore defeated ChrisTiana ObeySumner 64.1% to 35.6%, winning election to City Council District 5; incumbent Dan Strauss defeated Pete Hanning 52.3% to 47.2%, winning re-election to City Council District 6; Bob Kettle defeated incumbent Andrew J. Lewis 50.8% to 48.9%, winning election to City Council District 7; and Prop 1, renewing the Housing Levy, passed 69.2% to 30.8%.

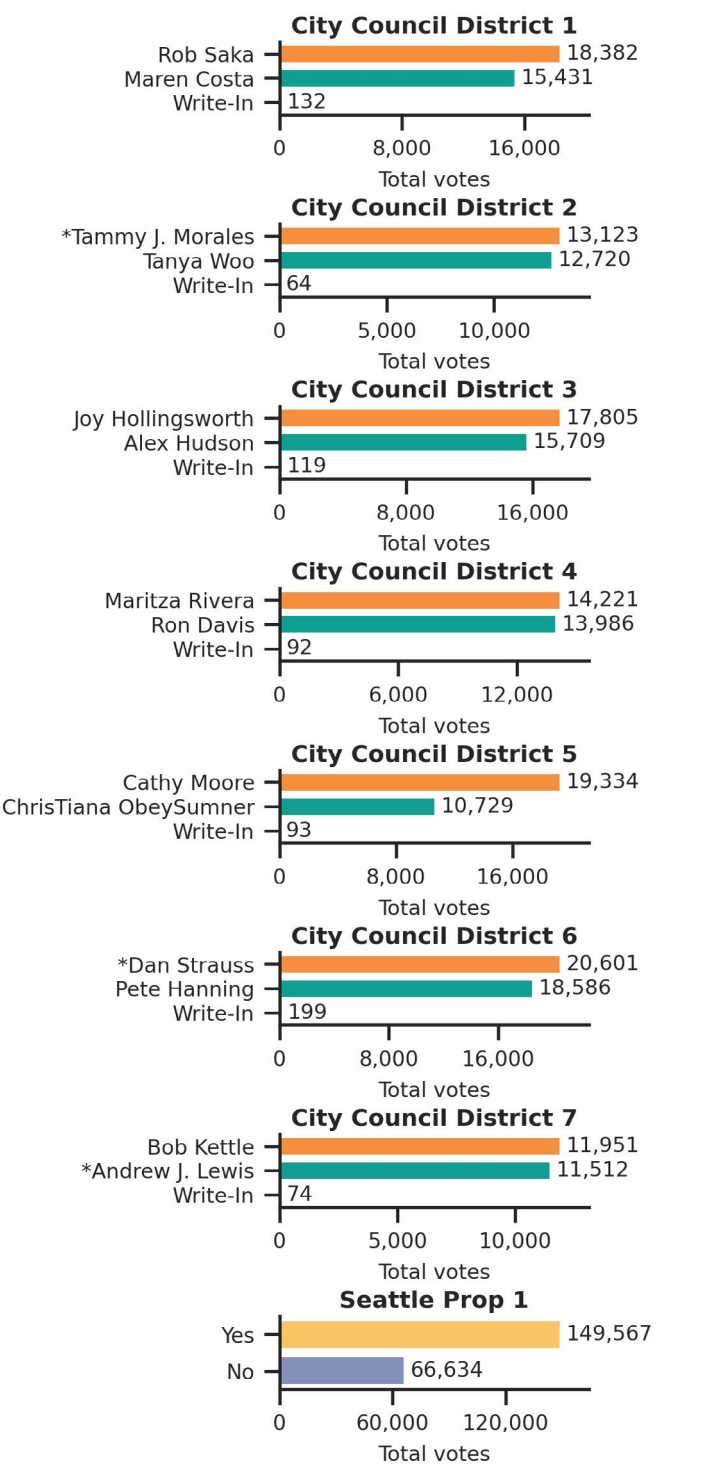


Fig 2 Election results in Seattle for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

Voter turnout

There are 463,008 registered voters in Seattle Public Schools, including 18,864 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 46.5%. Young voters make up 34.8% of the electorate in Seattle Public Schools (161,017 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 23.3% lower than older voters (31.3% vs 54.6%). The electorate in Seattle Public Schools is 23.9% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 21.5% lower than White voters (30.1% vs 51.6%).

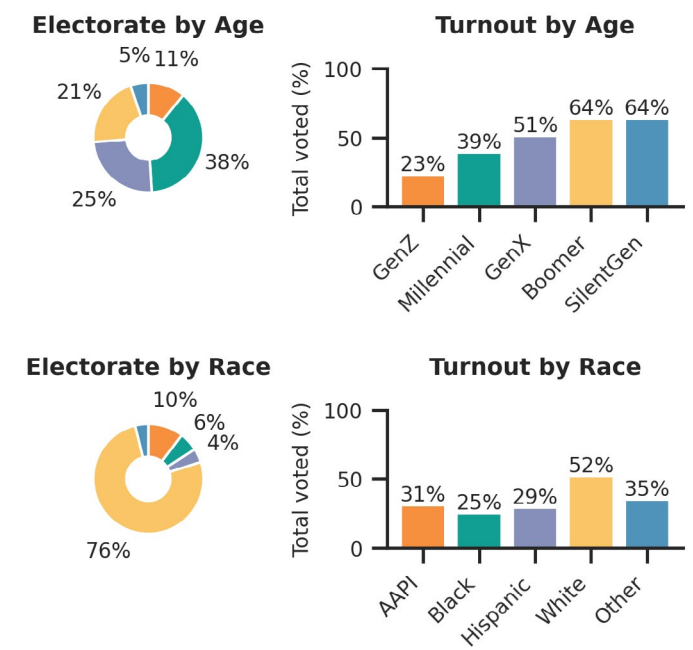


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Seattle Public Schools for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

Election results

Voters in Seattle Public Schools cast their ballots for four school board races in the 2023 General Election: incumbent Liza Rankin defeated Debbie Carlsen 62.8% to 36.8%, winning re-election to School Board District 1; incumbent Lisa Rivera Smith defeated Christina Posten 71.2% to 28.5%, winning re-election to School Board District 2; Evan Briggs defeated Ben Gitenstein 55.7% to 44.0%, winning election to School Board District 3; and Gina Topp defeated Maryanne Wood 88.6% to 11.1%, winning election to School Board District 6.

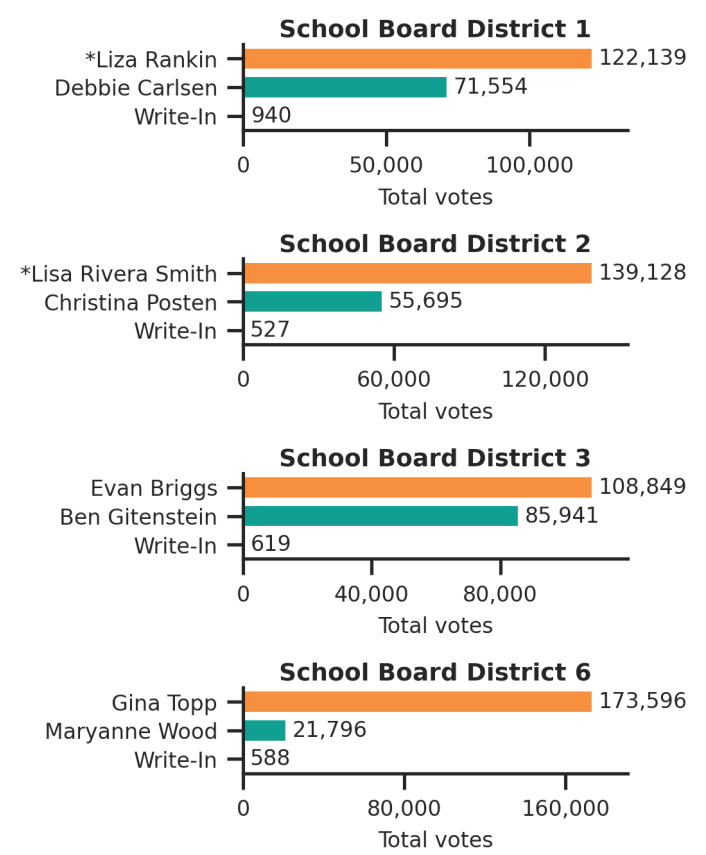


Fig 2 Election results in Seattle Public Schools for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

Voter turnout

There are 38,359 registered voters in Shoreline, including 756 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 34.5%. Young voters make up 25.4% of the electorate in Shoreline (9,742 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 19.6% lower than older voters (19.8% vs 39.4%). The electorate in Shoreline is 24.8% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 19.2% lower than White voters (20.0% vs 39.2%).

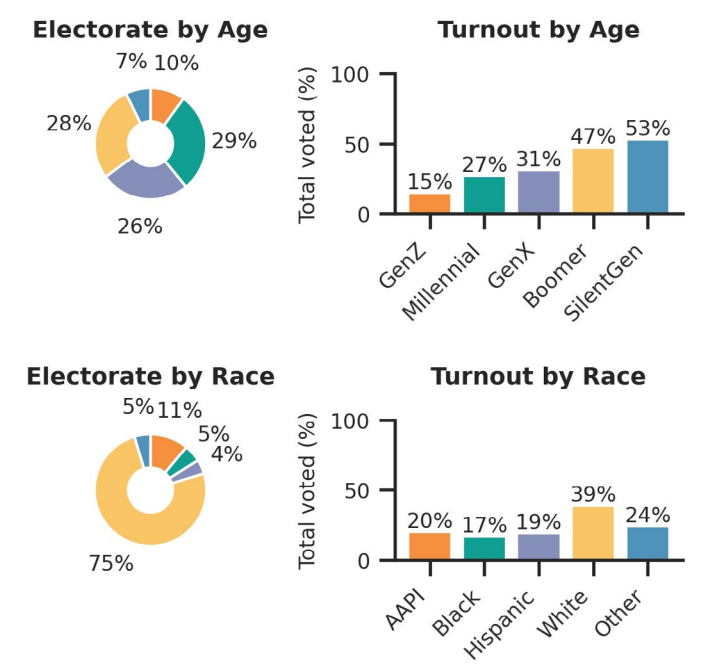


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Shoreline for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

Voters in Shoreline cast their ballots for three municipal races in the 2023 General Election: Keith Scully ran unopposed, winning election to City Council Position 2; Annette Ademasu defeated incumbent Doris McConnell 55.1% to 44.4%, winning election to City Council Position 4; and incumbent Betsy Robertson ran unopposed, winning re-election to City Council Position 6.

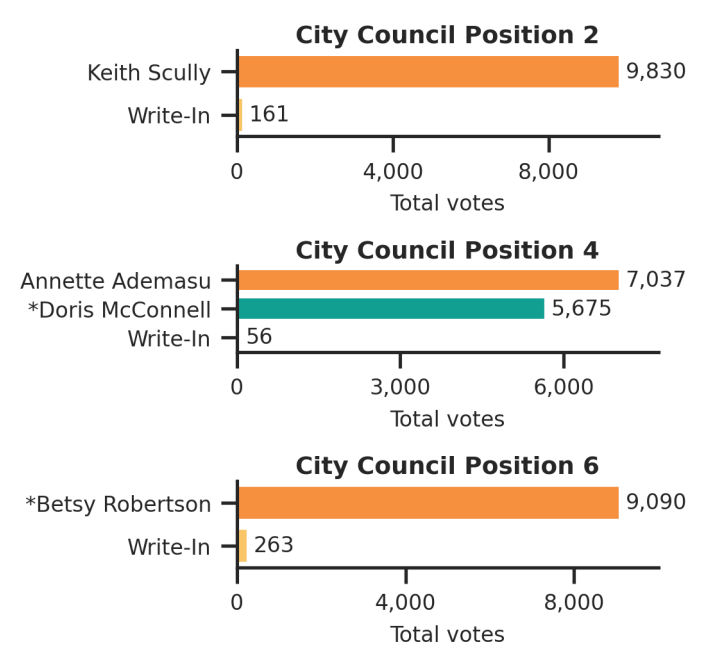
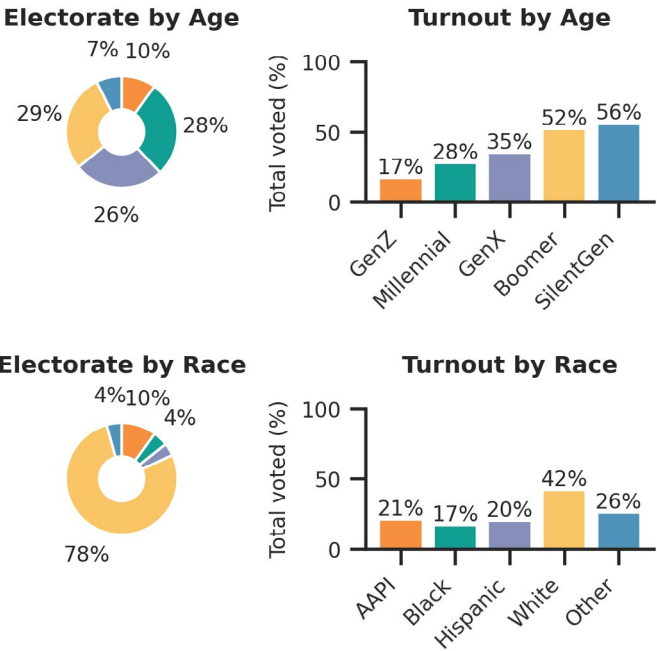


Fig 2 Election results in Shoreline for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

## Voter turnout

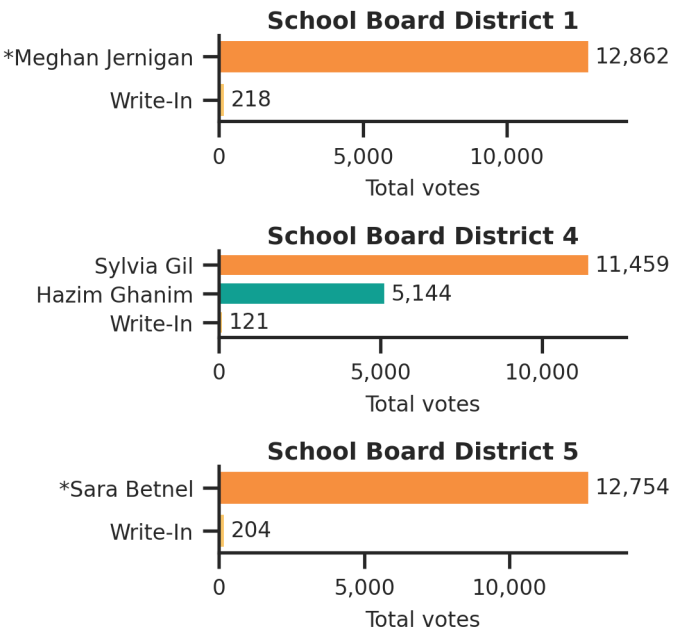
There are 48,063 registered voters in Shoreline School District, including 1,051 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 37.4%. Young voters make up 24.9% of the electorate in Shoreline School District (11,978 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 21.7% lower than older voters (21.1% vs 42.8%). The electorate in Shoreline School District is 22.4% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 20.8% lower than White voters (21.2% vs 42.0%).

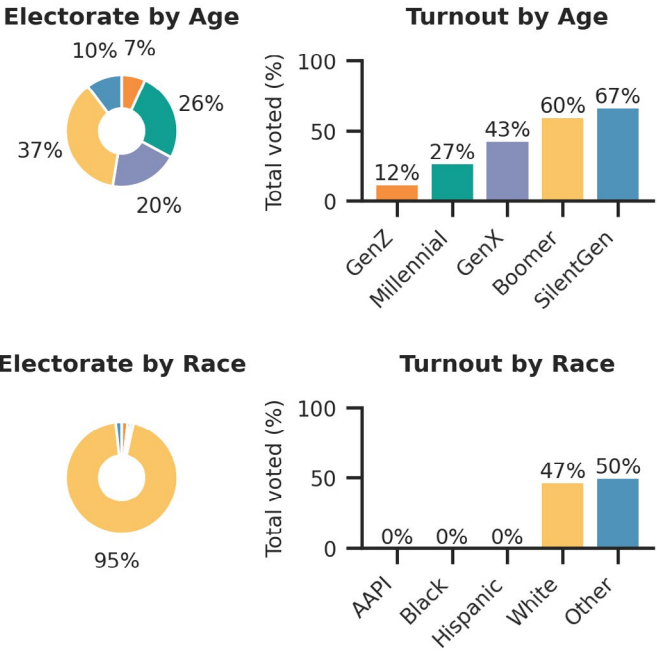
Voters in Shoreline School District cast their ballots for three school board races in the 2023 General Election: incumbent Meghan Jernigan ran unopposed, winning re-election to School Board District 1; Sylvia Gil defeated Hazim Ghanim 68.5% to 30.8%, winning election to School Board District 4; and incumbent Sara Betnel ran unopposed, winning re-election to School Board District 5.

## Voter turnout

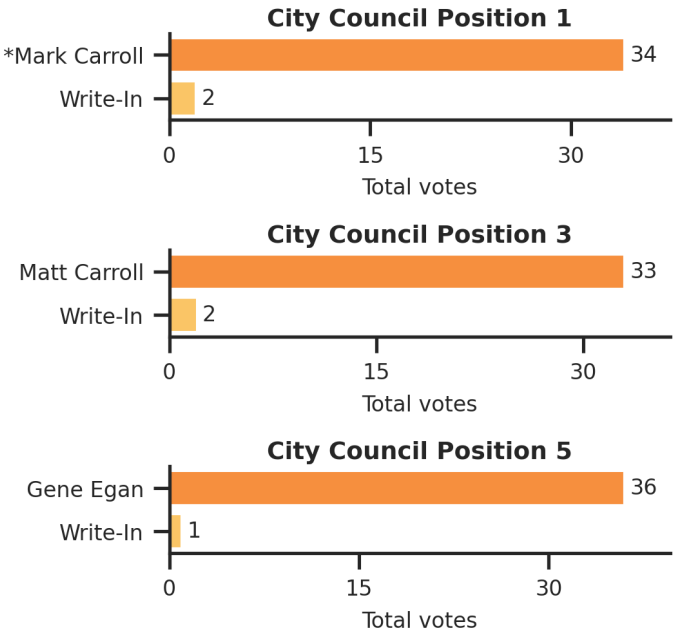
There are 116 registered voters in Skykomish, including 6 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 45.7%. Young voters make up 23.3% of the electorate in Skykomish (27 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 30.6% lower than older voters (22.2% vs 52.8%). The electorate in Skykomish is 5.2% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 30.6% lower than White voters (16.7% vs 47.3%).

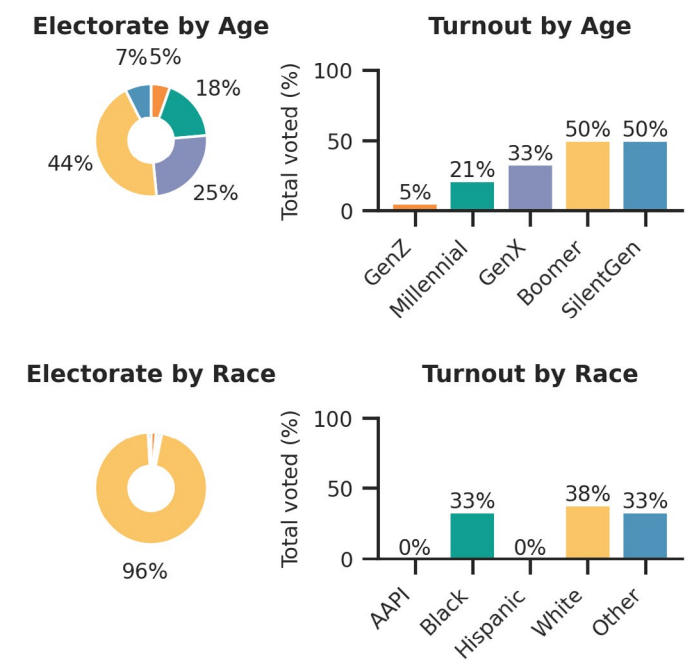


**Fig 2** Election results in Skykomish for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.



## Voter turnout

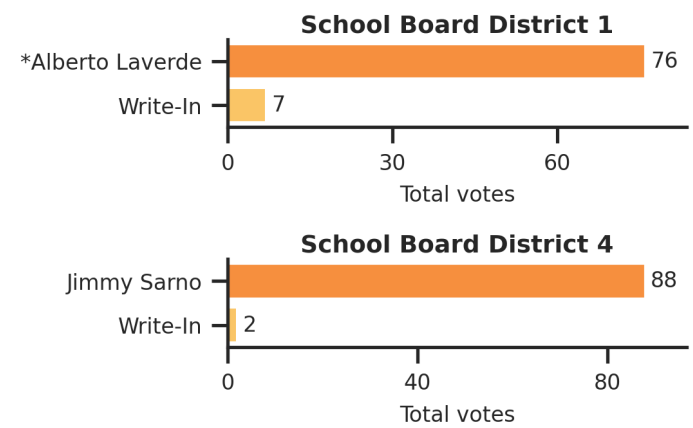
There are 351 registered voters in Skykomish School District, including 12 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 37.3%. Young voters make up 17.1% of the electorate in Skykomish School District (60 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.0% lower than older voters (13.3% vs 42.3%). The electorate in Skykomish School District is 4.0% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 24.0% lower than White voters (14.3% vs 38.3%).

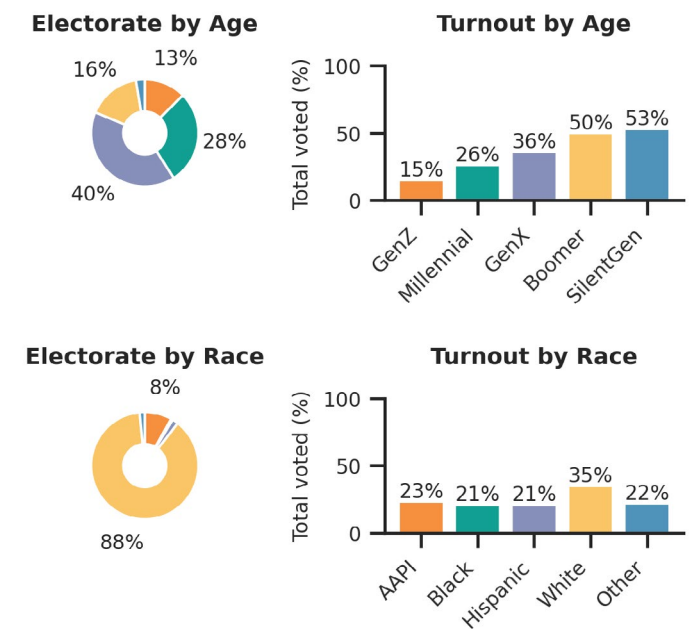

## Voter turnout

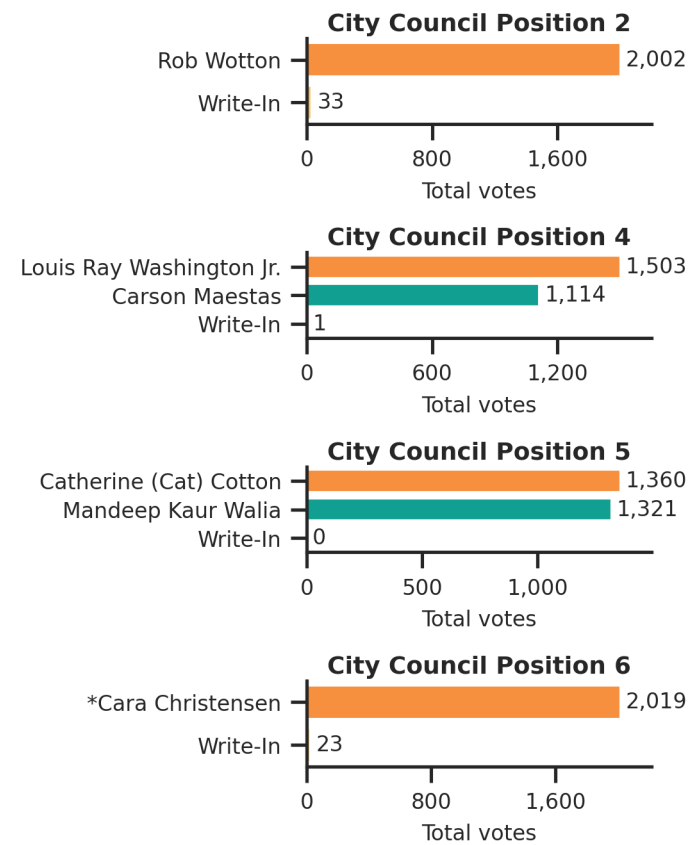
There are 8,199 registered voters in Snoqualmie, including 197 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 33.4%. Young voters make up 24.5% of the electorate in Snoqualmie (2,006 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 18.7% lower than older voters (19.3% vs 38.0%). The electorate in Snoqualmie is 12.1% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 12.7% lower than White voters (22.3% vs 35.0%).

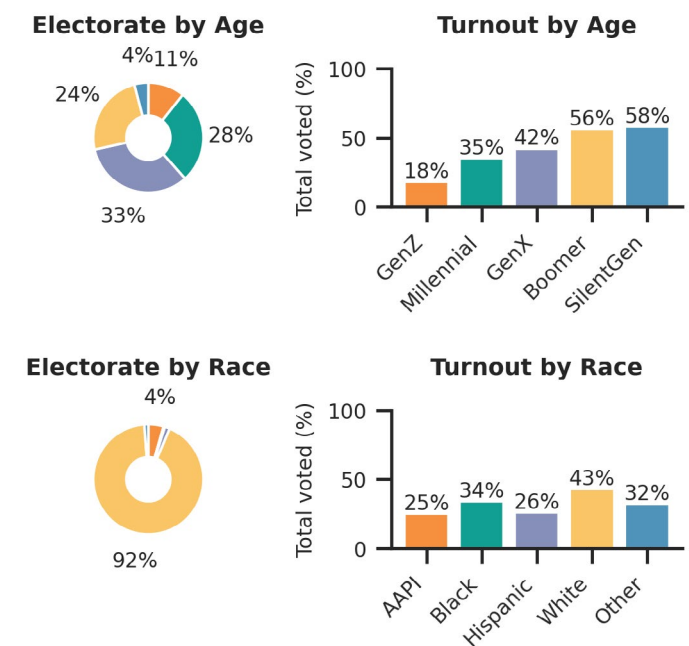


**Fig 2** Election results in Snoqualmie for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

## Voter turnout

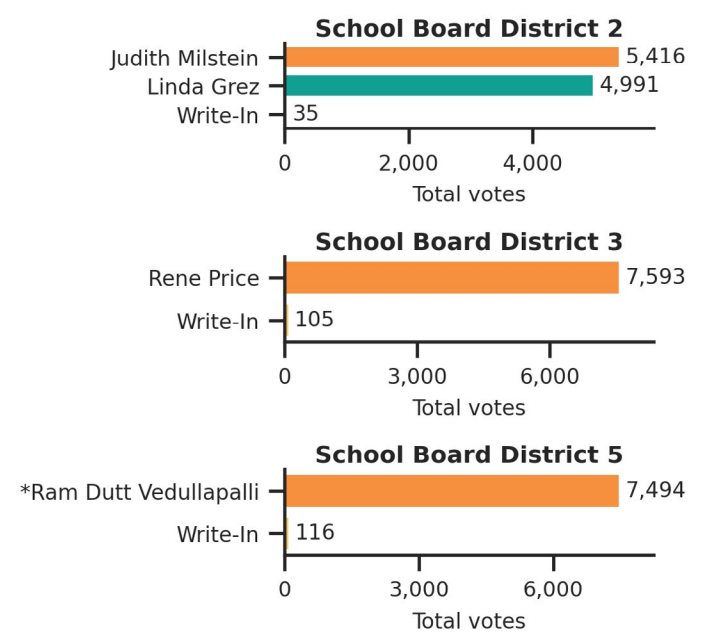
There are 28,221 registered voters in Snoqualmie Valley School District, including 572 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 41.5%. Young voters make up 24.3% of the electorate in Snoqualmie Valley School District (6,858 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 22.0% lower than older voters (24.9% vs 46.9%). The electorate in Snoqualmie Valley School District is 7.5% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 15.9% lower than White voters (26.8% vs 42.7%).

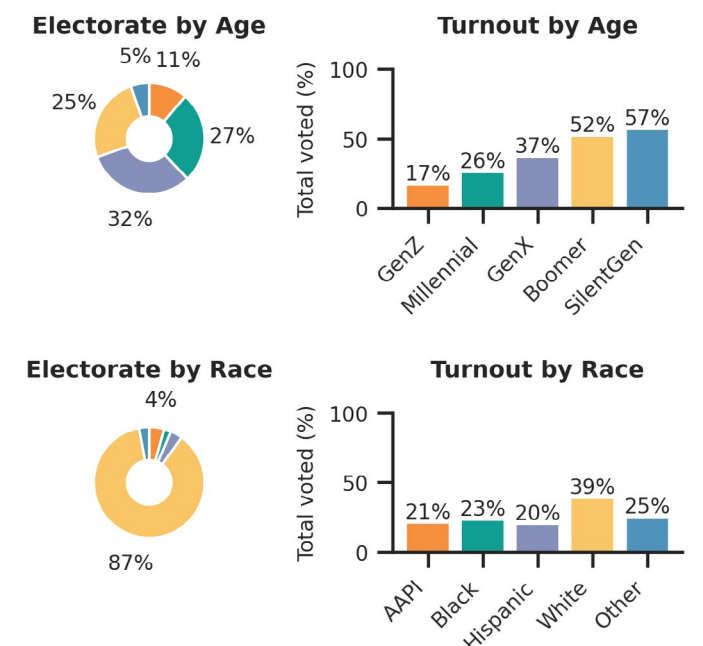


**Fig 2** Election results in Snoqualmie Valley School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

## Voter turnout

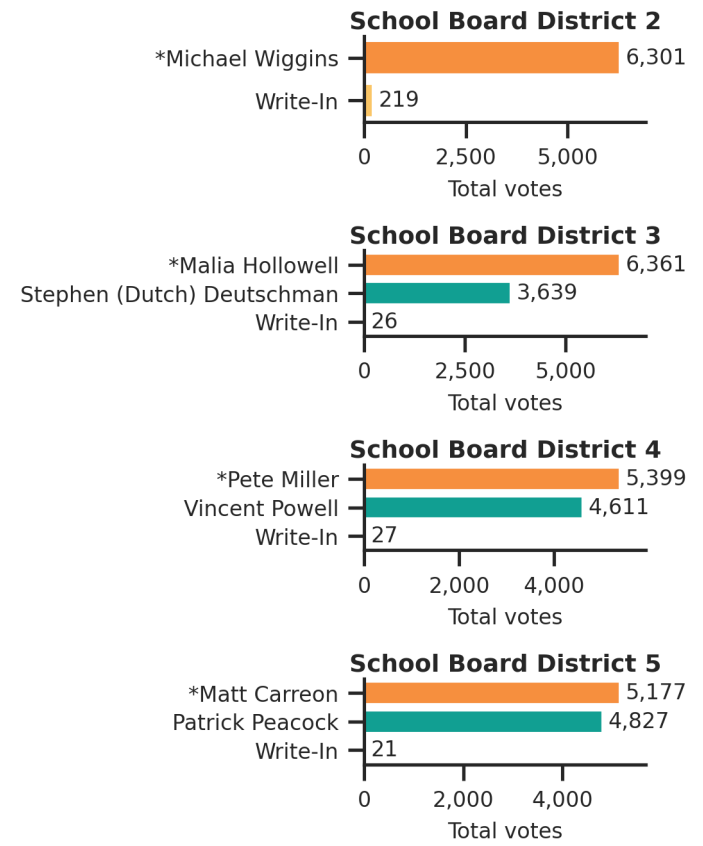
There are 28,499 registered voters in Tahoma School District, including 614 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 36.6%. Young voters make up 24.3% of the electorate in Tahoma School District (6,913 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 23.6% lower than older voters (18.7% vs 42.3%). The electorate in Tahoma School District is 12.9% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 16.9% lower than White voters (21.9% vs 38.8%).

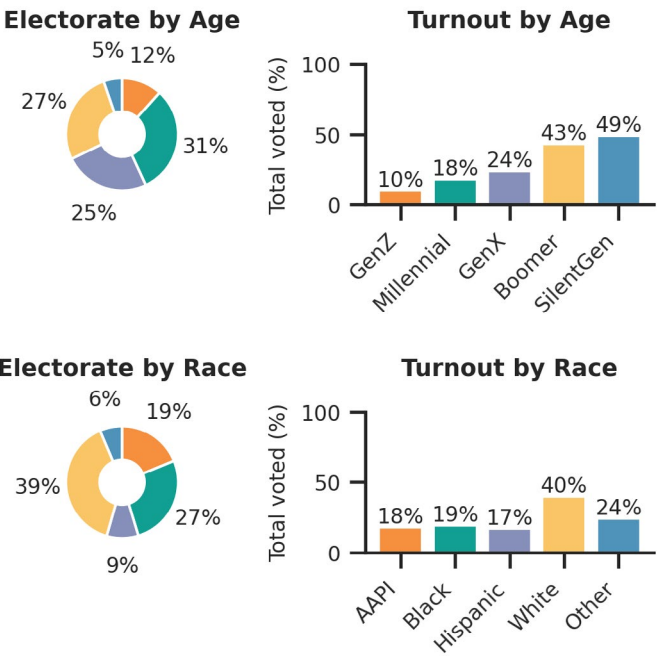
Voters in Tahoma School District cast their ballots for four school board races in the 2023 General Election: incumbent Michael Wiggins ran unopposed, winning re-election to School Board District 2; incumbent Malia Hollowell defeated Stephen (Dutch) Deutschman 63.4% to 36.3%, winning re-election to School Board District 3; incumbent Pete Miller defeated Vincent Powell 53.8% to 45.9%, winning re-election to School Board District 4; and incumbent Matt Carreon defeated Patrick Peacock 51.6% to 48.1%, winning re-election to School Board District 5.

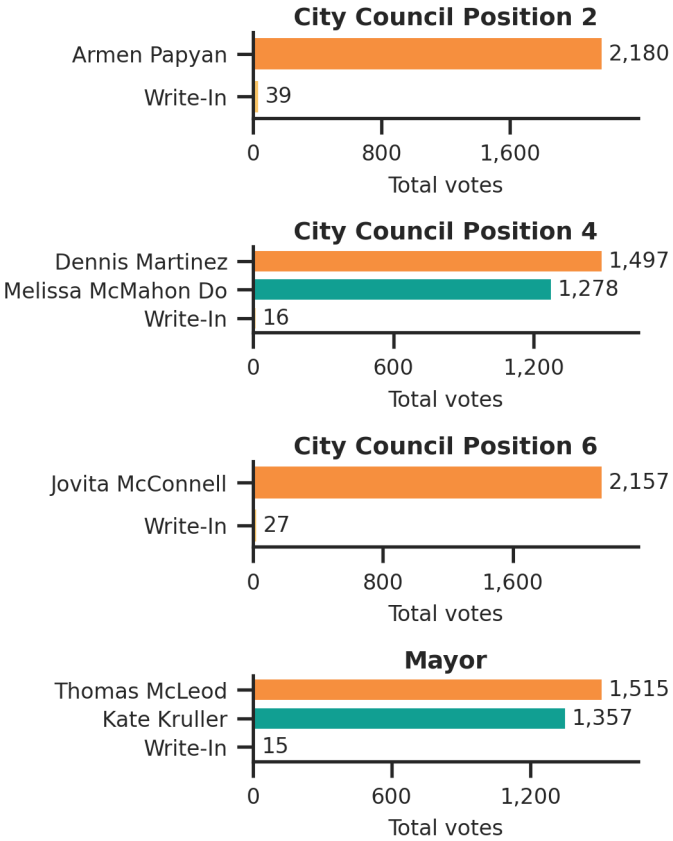
There are 10,650 registered voters in Tukwila, including 342 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 27.0%. Young voters make up 29.3% of the electorate in Tukwila (3,121 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 18.6% lower than older voters (13.9% vs 32.5%). The electorate in Tukwila is 60.9% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 21.0% lower than White voters (18.8% vs 39.8%).

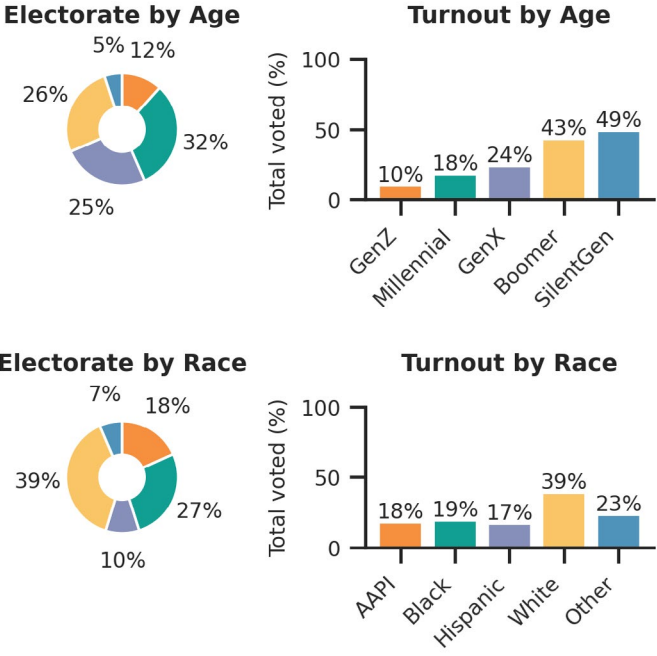

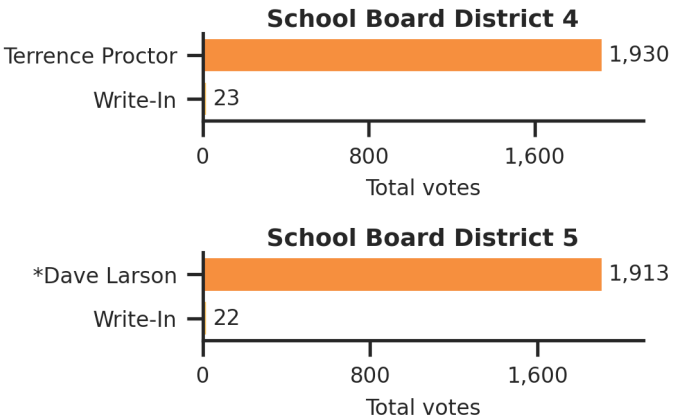
There are 9,740 registered voters in Tukwila School District, including 379 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 26.5%. Young voters make up 29.7% of the electorate in Tukwila School District (2,896 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 18.2% lower than older voters (13.7% vs 31.9%). The electorate in Tukwila School District is 61.3% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 20.7% lower than White voters (18.5% vs 39.2%).

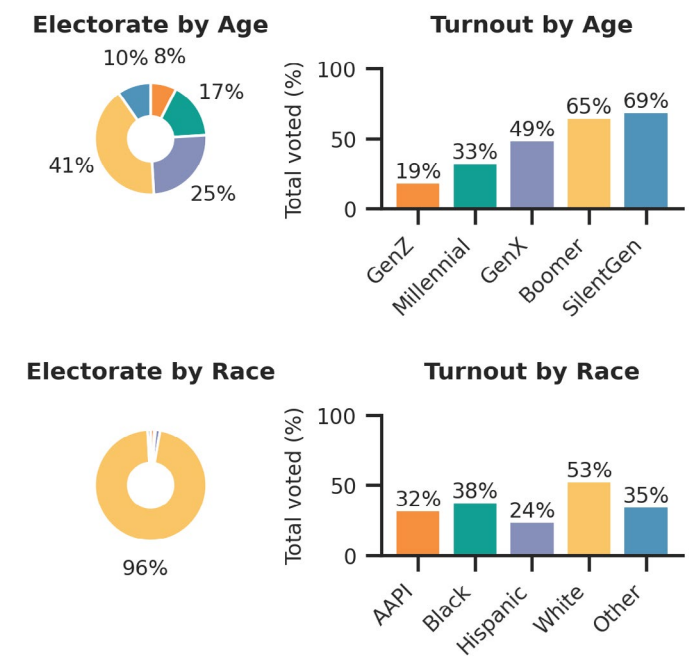


**Fig 2** Election results in Tukwila School District for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

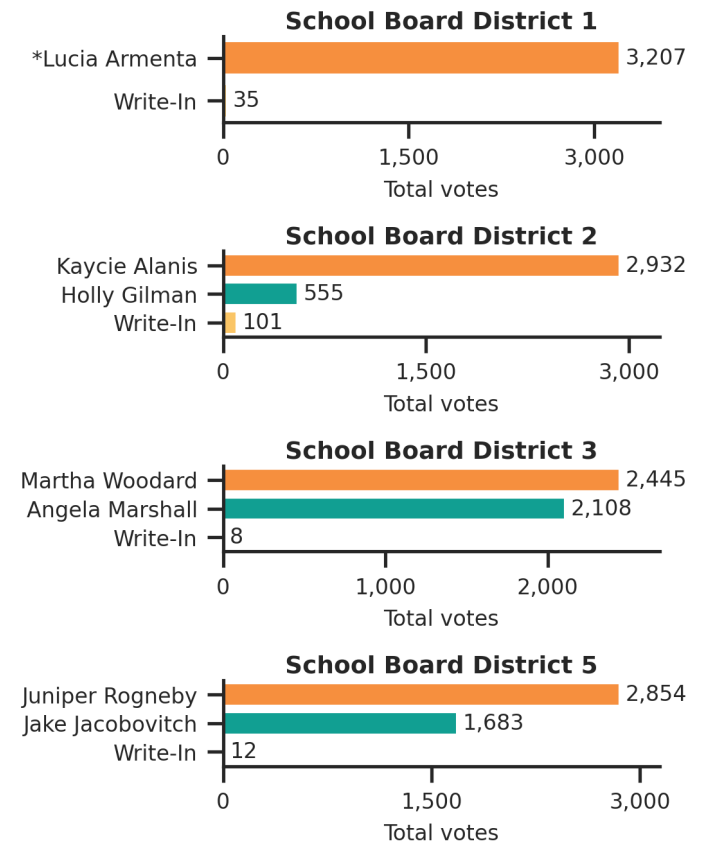

Young voters make up 15.6% of the electorate in Vashon Island School District (1,408 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 34.5% lower than older voters (23.2% vs 57.7%). The electorate in Vashon Island School District is 3.6% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 23.0% lower than White voters (30.2% vs 53.2%).

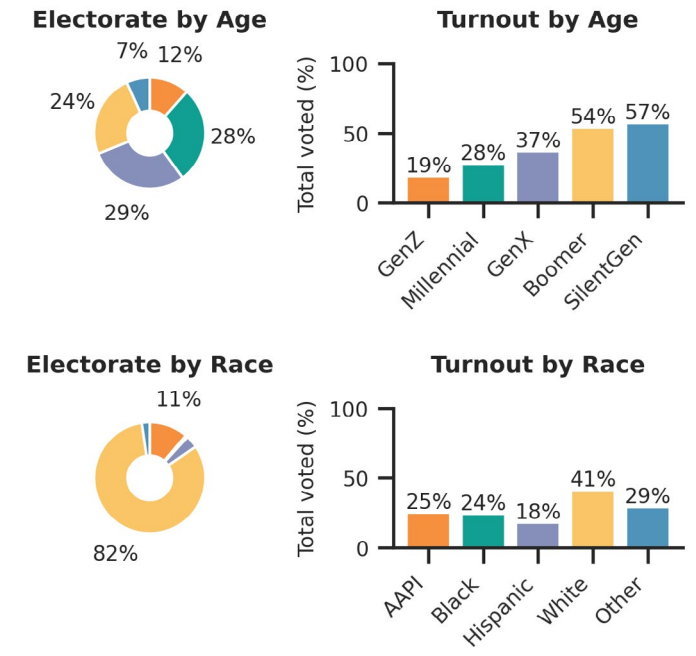

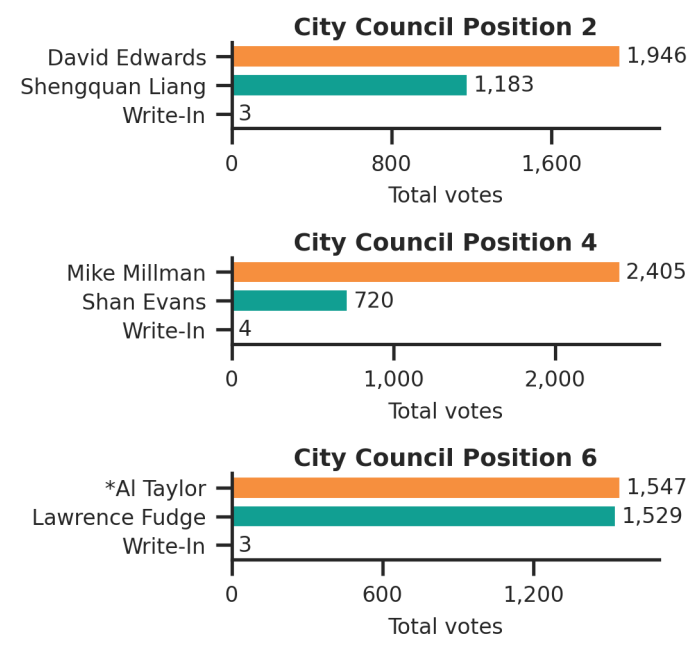
There are 8,406 registered voters in Woodinville, including 233 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 37.8%. Young voters make up 26.6% of the electorate in Woodinville (2,233 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 21.7% lower than older voters (21.9% vs 43.6%). The electorate in Woodinville is 17.8% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 16.6% lower than White voters (24.2% vs 40.8%).

Voters in Woodinville cast their ballots for three municipal races in the 2023 General Election: David Edwards defeated Shengquan Liang 62.1% to 37.8%, winning election to City Council Position 2; Mike Millman defeated Shan Evans 76.9% to 23.0%, winning election to City Council Position 4; and incumbent Al Taylor defeated Lawrence Fudge 50.2% to 49.7%, winning re-election to City Council Position 6.

Voter turnout

There are 885 registered voters in Yarrow Point, including 11 new voters, and voter turnout in the 2023 General Election was 34.8%. Young voters make up 26.9% of the electorate in Yarrow Point (238 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 27.5% lower than older voters (14.7% vs 42.2%). The electorate in Yarrow Point is 21.9% BIPOC, and turnout of BIPOC voters was 14.2% lower than White voters (23.7% vs 37.9%).

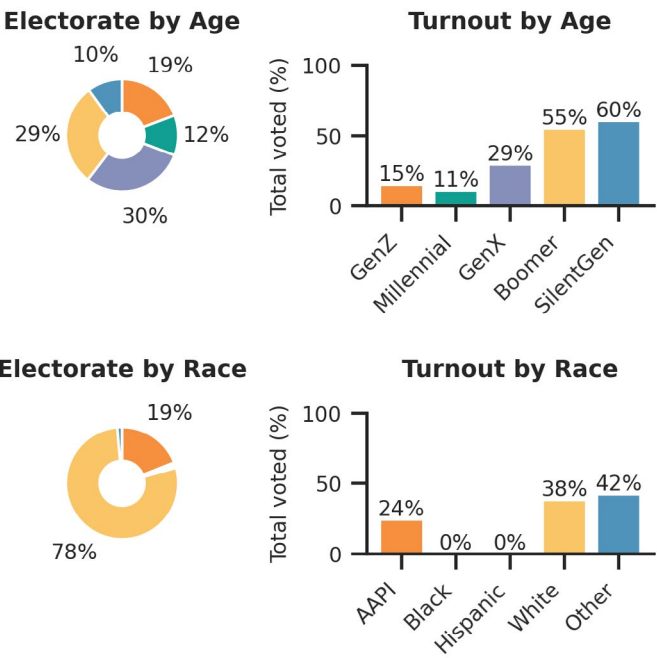


Fig 1 Electorate composition and voter turnout in Yarrow Point for the 2023 General Election, aggregated by age group and race.

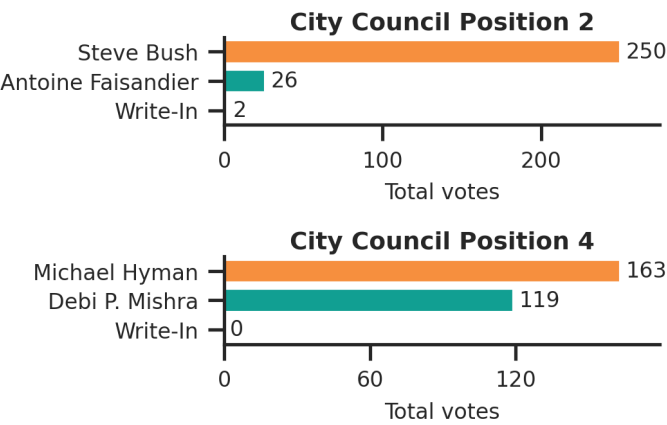


Fig 2 Election results in Yarrow Point for the 2023 General Election. All races were non-partisan, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

Electorate analysis

Data on Washington’s population of registered voters (“electorate”) was accessed via America Votes’ Voter Activation Network (VAN). VAN data related to voter demographics, geography, and vote history was last updated on 10/16/2023, so data for anyone who registered to vote after that date will not be included in this report (39,928 people). All data processing and visualization was done using custom-written Python scripts, executed in a local Jupyter environment. Final ballot status reports (“matchbacks”) for the 2023 Primary Election and 2023 General Election were downloaded from the Secretary of State’s website, and voter ID’s were mapped onto voter data from the VAN to update vote history data for these elections. To correct for any incomplete geographic information in the voter file, voters’ precinct information was mapped onto corresponding district information (county council district, city, city council district, school district), and any missing values were updated. Using county and city data, voters were grouped into eight regions, enabling regional analyses of voter behavior.

Data on voters’ age and sex were provided from the voter file, and data on voters’ race was provided by Catalist, using mathematical modeling with census tract-level demographic data and a variety of other sources. Although extensively validated and highly accurate, modeled data is never 100% accurate, so there are minor inaccuracies in individual-level race data in the voter file; this should be considered when interpreting results and analyses of voter data accessed from the VAN. Because data on Native American voters is particularly inaccurate, voters classified by Catalist as “Native American” have been grouped with voters classified as “Other” or “Unknown” as a single group, “Other”. For some broader analyses of voting behavior and outreach impact, data on age and race was used to further categorize voters as “Young” (age = 18-35) or “Older” (age ≥ 36) and “BIPOC” (race = Black, AAPI, Hispanic, Native American, or Other) or “White” (race = White). “New voters” are those who registered to vote for the first time since 1/1/2023.

Voter outreach

Data on voter outreach work done by WCA Data Hub partners throughout 2023 was accessed via America Votes’ VAN (c4 outreach) and State Voices’ VAN (c3 outreach). Voter ID’s were used to map data related to outreach with the preprocessed voter file to allow detailed impact analyses. Only data collected by WCA Data Hub partners and uploaded back into the VAN by 12/1/2023 were included in these analyses, so the extent of voter outreach may not be fully represented in this

report. Available data was clustered by contact method (in-person, mail, phone, or text). result (canvassed, left message, mailed, texted, or no contact), demographics (age and/or race), and geography (region, city, etc) to assess the impact of various methods of voter contact on voter participation in the 2023 General Election. In general, turnout of voters who were successfully contacted during outreach (“canvassed”) was compared with voters who were not contacted (“no contact”) rather than with the broader electorate, enabling a more precise comparison since both groups of voters (“canvassed” and “no contact”) originated from the same universe of voters. Since the only outcome of mail outreach was “mailed”, detailed analysis of the impact of mailers on voter turnout were not possible.

Election results

Results for the 2023 General Election were downloaded from the Washington Secretary of State’s website, and processed and visualized using custom-written Python scripts. Rather than including every jurisdiction that had an election this year, this report will focus on four types of races: countywide races, citywide races, school board races, and ballot initiatives. Data on the current incumbent for all races on the ballot this year was downloaded from the Secretary of State’s website, and mapped onto the election results. Any incumbents running under different names than the previous time they ran (e.g., Jane M. Doe instead of Jane Doe) will be incorrectly marked as not being an incumbent. Although the vast majority of races on the ballot this year were nonpartisan, party affiliation data for a subset of candidates was accessed from the raw results file, and updated to cluster voters into three parties: Democratic, Republican, and Independent/Other. Throughout this report, vote totals for candidates will be color-coded based on party affiliation. Although this report will focus on overall results, precinct-level results can be found in the Washington [General Election Dashboard](#), WCA’s interactive tool for viewing and exploring election results.

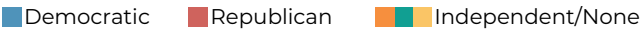


Fig 1 Color-coding of election results by stated party preference.
