GENERAL ELECTION REPORT





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Summary

Since the start of 2022, Win|Win's network has grown to include 54 partner organizations, working on a range of issues (including racial justice, reproductive justice, economic justice, climate justice, and many more) and working in communities across the state. In the 90 days leading up to the General Election, 22 of our network partners were engaged in direct voter contact. This included six 501c3 partners and sixteen 501c4 partners, who together made a total of 858,477 outreach attempts – including 465,580 mailers, 149,746 phone calls, 131,645 door knocks, and 111,506 text messages. These efforts resulted in outreach to 676,543 unique voters in Washington – voters in 35 of 39 counties, all 49 Legislative Districts, and all 10 Congressional Districts. Across the entire state, voters contacted by a Win|Win partner had a turnout rate 7.1% higher than voters who did not receive any voter contact (70.0% vs 61.9%).

Statewide, voter turnout was lower than in the last midterm election in 2018: just 64.6% of registered voters in Washington voted in 2022, a decrease of 6.7% from 2018 (71.3%). This decrease was not specific to a particular area or group of voters: turnout was lower in all 39 counties, all 49 Legislative Districts, and all 10 Congressional Districts, regardless of age, race, or sex. As in previous years, voter participation increased proportionally with age: turnout was highest among SilentGen voters (81%) and Boomers (80%), followed by GenXers (65%) and Millenials (49%), and lowest among GenZers (36%). Additionally, there was a marked difference in turnout based on race, with much lower turnout among BIPOC voters than White voters:

turnout was highest among White voters (68%), followed by "Other" (including Native and multiracial) voters (47%) and AAPI voters (45%), and lowest among Black voters (40%) and Hispanic voters (33%).


Following the surprising results in the 2022 Primary Election, there was a degree of uncertainty moving into the General Election surrounding which races would end up with close margins. At the Federal level, Washington's 8th Congressional District incumbent Dr. Kim Schrier (D) defeated Matt Larkin (R) to win re-election to her seat with 52.1% of the vote. One of the most surprising outcomes was the victory of Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D), who narrowly defeated Trump-backed Joe Kent (R) with 50.4% of the vote to flip Washington's 3rd Congressional District. Gluzenkamp Perez will be the first Democrat to represent the 3rd Congressional District since 2008 following incumbent Jaime Herera Beutler's (R) loss in the Primary. At the State level, 24 seats in the State Senate were up for election in addition to all 98 seats in the State House of Representatives, with a high number of incumbent retirements. 11 seats in the State House were highly competitive in the General Election – including those in LD10, LD18, LD26, LD28, LD30, LD35, LD42, and LD44 – in addition to five seats in the State Senate - LD26, LD30, LD35, LD42, and LD47. Washington Democrats ultimately expanded their majority in both chambers, with 29/49 (64%) in the State Senate and 58/90 (64%) in the State House. Across all 123 races, only three incumbents lost their races this cycle – one to a within-party challenger, and two to challengers from a different party.


Voter outreach, All types

Total outreach by Congresional District










Voter outreach, Phone calls

In the 90 days leading up to the 2022 General Election, Win|Win Partners made a total of **149,746 phone calls to voters in Washington**. Most of this outreach targeted voters in the North Puget Sound (54,948), Southwest (25,392), and Northwest (21,977), with much less outreach in the Southeast (6) and Northeast (333). Phone calls by Congresional District







phone outreach by age

















text outreach by age














Voter outreach, Mailers

In the 90 days leading up to the 2022 General Election, Win|Win Partners sent a total of **465,580 mailers to voters in Washington**. Nearly all of this outreach targeted voters in the North Puget Sound (328,686), with less outreach to voters in the Northwest (76,881), South Puget Sounds (43,438), and North Central Washington (16,330). mail outreach by location







mail outreach by age












Voter outreach, In-person

In the 90 days leading up to the 2022 General Election, Win|Win Partners contacted **131,645 voters in Washington** with in-person outreach. 


Voter Registration

New voter registrations

By Election Day in 2022, **159,936 Washingtonians had registered to vote for the first time**. More than one-third of these newly registered voters live in the North Puget Sound (65,949), with the next largest numbers in the South Puget Sound (27,202) and Southwest (17,300). The regions of the state with the fewest new voter registrations were the Southeast (2,050), North Central (3,892), and Northwest (9,802).

Registrations by Congresional District






Left: total new registrants per CD **Center**: total new registrants per LD **Right**: total new registrants per County




New voter registrations

Voter registration rates in Washington in 2022 were relatively stable throughout the year, with a ramp in registrations towards the end of summer and a spike in the weeks leading up to Election Day. The majority of newly registered voters were under the age of 36, and 70% of all newly registered voters were White.






Left: total new voters this year **Right**: total new voters per week







new voters by race



First-time voters

Of the 159,936 Washingtonians that registered to vote for the first time in 2022, **just 46% (73,266) voted in November's General Election**. More than half of these first-time voters live in the North Puget Sound (31,821) or South Puget Sound (10,873), with over one-third in Seattle.

first-time voters by location






Similar to the overall Washington electorate, turnout among newly registered voters increased with age – with 40.0% turnout among voters under 35 and 53.9% turnout among voters 35 and older – and was disproportionately higher among White voters (51.7%) than BIPOC voters (31.8%).



first-time voters by age












Countywide Results

Ranked-Choice Voting Campaigns

Voters in Clark County, San Juan County, and Seattle voted on initiatives to adopt Ranked-Choice Voting in local Primary Elections. While voters in Clark County and San Juan County rejected these initiatives, voters in Seattle narrowly approved switching to a Ranked-Choice Voting system, despite massive opposition spending. The success in Seattle was driven by large support by voters in neighborhoods with more young and BIPOC voters – the University District, Fremont, Downtown, the International District, and Beacon Hill – with opposition by voters in wealthier neighborhoods – Magnolia, Madison Park, Ballard, Madrona, and West Seattle.





Adams County





Douglas County


Summary

Washington Democrats will retain their majorities in both chambers of the State
Legislature, gaining two seats in the State House of Representatives and one seat in the State Senate.
Across all 123 races, only three incumbents lost their races this cycle – one to a within-party challenger, and two to challengers from a different party.



- results by party -

Of the 123 State Legislative races on the ballot in 2022, just 28 had margins within 15%, and only three seats flipped control: State Representative Pos. 1 in LD10, won by Clyde Shavers (D) by 0.3%; State Representative Pos. 2 in LD10, won by Dave Paul (D) by 4.3%; and State Senator in the LD42, won by Sharon Shewmake (D) by 1.2%. State Senator Emily Randall (D) held LD26 by just 1.7% – the closest margin of an incumbent legislator – even as both State Representative positions in LD26 remained in Republican control.




Summary

The power of incumbency was on display in Washington's General Election in 2022: all nine incumbents that were on the ballot were reelected to another term. Incumbent Jamie Herera Beutler's (R) primary loss in the 3rd Congressional District paved the path for an upset victory by Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D) against Trump-backed Joe Kent (R). With the flip of the 3rd Congressional District in Southwestern Washington, Washington Democrats now hold all Congressional seats west of the Cascades.

Of Washington's ten Congressional District, only two had margins within 10 points: the 8^{th} Congressional District, our perennial tossup district; and the 3^{rd} Congressional District, flipped by Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D) after the Primary defeat of incumbent Jamie Herera Beutler (R). The next closest districts were the 10^{th} Congressional District in Olympia and the 5^{th} Congressional District in Eastern Washington, driven by low voter turnout in both areas.









Summary

Washington voters returned **2,975,420** ballots in the 2022 General Election for an overall voter turnout of 64.6%, a 6.7% decrease from **2018**. Relative to 2018, turnout was lower in every County, Legislative District, and Congressional District, and was lower for every age group and racial group.










Washington's Secretary of State race featured incumbent Steve Hobbs (D) running against Julie Anderson (I), a former Pierce County Auditor running as a non-partisan candidate. Former State Senator Steve Hobbs (D, LD44) was appointed to the Secretary of State position in November 2021 after previous Secretary of State Kim Wyman (R) was appointed by the Biden administration to serve in an election-security position. Steve Hobbs (D) defeated Julie Anderson with 52% of the vote, becoming the first Democratic Secretary of State elected in Washington since 1964. Hobbs ran up large vote totals in Seattle and Northwestern Washington, while Anderson won every county outside of the Puget Sound.



United States Senator

—— election results ——

Incumbent Senator Patty Murray (D) defeated challenger Tiffany Smiley (R) 57.1% to 42.6%, winning re-election to a 6th term in the United States Senate. While Senator Murray's re-election campaigns have typically been uncompetitive in the past, this year's race was seen as more competitive, particularly as Election Day neared. This narrative, along with polls suggesting a single-digit margin between the two candidates, led both campaigns to collectively spend more money than any other Congressional race in Washington state's history. Despite this outsized attention and spending, Murray won re-election by an even larger margin than in this year's Primary Election, gaining an additional 750,000 votes over her total this August. Murray will make history as the first ever female Senate *President Pro Tem*, making her 3rd in line for the Presidency.




Voter turnout, Total votes cast

— total votes by location





Left: total votes per CD **Center**: total votes per LD **Right**: total votes per County









Statewide turnout in the 2022 General Election was 64.6% in Washington State, though this varied widely across the state. Voter turnout was highest in the Northwest (69.5%), the Olympic Peninsula (67.2%), and the North Puget Sound (63.8%), and lowest in South Central Washington (56.7%), the South Puget Sound (60.7%), and the Southeast (60.9%).







Statewide voter turnout in Washington in the 2022 General Election was 64.6%, but turnout varied widely across different regions of the state. Turnout was highest in the Northwest (69.4%), the Olympic Peninsula (67.1%), the North Puget Sound (63.8%), and the Southwest (63.2%), and lowest in South Central (56.7%), the South Puget Sound (60.7%), and the Southeast (60.8%). Turnout was particularly low in several urban areas in Washington, including Spokane (59.1%), Yakima (49.2%), Olympia (61.3%), and Vancouver (58.8%). These maps show turnout relative to the statewide average, with darker green = more above average and darker yellow = more below average.





Voter turnout in Washington varied by age, race, and sex in the 2022 General Election, but some clear patterns emerged.



Voter turnout, Issue scores











DATA ANALYSIS

Data was processed using SQL, analyzed using Python, and visualized using Python and QGIS. Ballot data was matched onto the voter file to identify voters who did or did not vote in this year's election. Schematics and graphics were made in Adobe Illustrator, and all assets and content were compiled in Adobe InDesign.

Age group | voters were grouped by age to examine generational differences in voting behavior

MODELS & SCORES

Race | estimate of the likelihood of anindividual's race, as WA state does not collect race or ethnicity data during voter registration; scores are cross-referenced with census data and are accurate at the district and precinct levels, but not at the individual level

Pro-choice | estimate of the likelihood that an individual supports reproductive justice; scores range from 0 to 100, with 0 = very likely pro-life and 100 = very likely pro-choice

Climate activism | estimate of the likelihood that an individual supports climate justice; scores range from 0 to 100, with 0 = very likely climate skeptic and 100 = very likely climate activist

Household income | estimate of the likelihood that an individual's household has a particular income; scores range from 0 to 100, with 0 = very likely wealthy and 100 = very likely low-income

Ideology | estimate of the likelihood that a given individual supports progressive issues; scores range from 0 to 100, with 0 = very likely conservative and 100 = very likely progressive
