Executive Summary

Washington State's 2025 General Election took place on November 4th, 2025, with all 5,082,306 active voters receiving a ballot in the mail. Voters cast their ballots for 2,978 total races, choosing candidates in 9 legislative races, 64 countywide and county council races, 1,067 municipal races, and 722 school board races. Voters also weighed in on 158 local ballot measures, including one statewide measure, 18 countywide measures, 50 municipal initiatives, and 23 school district levies.

Voter turnout in the 2025 election was 39.6%, 0.3% lower than 2021 and 2.7% higher than 2023. Nearly 2 million voters returned their ballot in the 2025 General Election, with the highest turnout in the Olympia Peninsula and the Puget Sound and the lowest turnout in South Central Washington and Southwestern Washington. Considerable turnout gaps by age and race were prevalent throughout the state, with older voters and White voters casting a disproportionate share of overall votes in nearly every district and city. Turnout was higher in 2025 than in both 2021 and 2023 in 41% of Washington's cities and towns, including many cities in the Puget Sound (Seattle, Tacoma, Bellevue, Kent, Everett, Renton, and Federal Way), and lower than both 2021 and 2023 in 34% of Washington's cities and towns, including many in Central Washington (Kennewick, Richland, Pasco, Wenatchee, and Walla Walla). Cities with higher turnout in 2025 were those with more competitive elections on the ballot: on average, places where turnout was higher had ~2x as many contested races, suggesting that the potential for change drove higher turnout in some parts of the state.

Voters overwhelmingly supported progressive candidates throughout the state, in a clear rebuke to center-left and far-right politics. In Seattle, progressives swept every race, with Erika Evans, Dionne Foster, and Eddie Lin coasting to victory with huge margins and Katie Wilson defeating incumbent mayor Bruce Harrell by ~2,000 votes. The only incumbent to finish first in Seattle was progressive city councilor Alexis Mercedes Rinck, who won with over 81% of the vote. In the first open race for King County Executive since 2009, progressive county councilmember Girmay Zahilay defeated fellow county councilmember Claudia Balducci, demonstrating broad support for progressivism throughout the state's largest county. In Spokane, progressives also swept every race, with Sarah Dixit defeating conservative incumbent Jonathan Bingle and expanding progressive control of the city council.

In Sunnyside and Vancouver, progressive incumbents Vicky Frausto and Kim Harless sailed to re-election despite massive opposition spending. The results were similar in contested races for state legislative seats: in districts where appointed Democrats faced Republican challengers, the Democrats easily won their races (Victoria Hunt in the 5th District, Deb Krishnadasan in the 26th District, and Osman Salahuddin in the 48th District), and in districts where appointed progressive Democrats faced moderate challengers, the progressives finished in first (Edwin Obras in the 33rd District and Vandana Slatter in the 48th District).

Data Hub partners made more than 4.7 million voter contacts in the fall of 2025, reaching more than 1.6 million voters across all 39 counties. 27 partner organizations were actively involved in voter outreach work, including deep canvassing, get-out-the-vote efforts, ballot measure advocacy, and local candidate support. The majority of organizations focused their outreach on lower-propensity voters - those who do not typically vote in odd-year elections, particularly young voters and voters of color - and overall, this outreach had a decidedly positive impact on turnout: traditional inperson outreach led to a 9.9% increase in voter turnout, while phonebanking led to a 5.7% increase in voter turnout. Nearly 200,000 voters contacted by partner organizations who did not vote in 2021 voted in this election, emphasizing the power community organizing has at motivating people to vote, vote on time, and potentially expanding the electorate.

Former WCA partners ran for and won elections throughout the state. At least eight individuals formerly with the WCA network ran for office in 2025, and all of them won their races: Bethany Barnard (Pacific County Voices Uniting) was elected Mayor of South Bend; Sarah Dixit (Pro Choice Washington) was elected to Spokane City Council; Mark Figueroa (Poder Latinx) was elected to Pasco City Council; Dionne Foster (Progress Alliance) was elected to Seattle City Council; Alisa Lee (Asian Pacific Islander Americans for Civic Empowerment) was elected to Tacoma Parks Commission; Rick Polintan (Asian Pacific Islander Americans for Civic Empowerment) was elected to King County Public Hospital District; Maren Turner (Win|Win Network) was elected to Lacey City Council; and Katie Wilson (Transit Riders Union) was elected Mayor of Seattle.

Methodology

Electorate and voter turnout

Data on Washington's current population of registered voters ("electorate") was accessed via America Votes' Voter Activation Network (VAN). VAN data related to voter demographics, geography, and vote history was last updated on October 9th, 2025, so demographic data for anyone who registered to vote after that date will not be included in this report; however, precinct information on those new registrants who voted in the 2025 General is included in ballot return data, so counts of new voters who voted in this election are included throughout this report. All data processing and visualization was done using custom-written Python scripts, executed in a local Jupyter environment. Final ballot status reports ("matchbacks") for the 2025 General Election were downloaded from the Secretary of State's website, and voter IDs were mapped onto voter data from the VAN to update vote history data for these elections. To correct for any incomplete geographic information in the voter file, voters' precinct information was mapped onto corresponding district information (county council district, city, city council district, school district), and any missing values were updated.

Data on voters' age and sex were provided from the voter file, and data on voters' race was provided by Catalist, a national data vendor, using mathematical modeling with census tractlevel demographic data and a variety of other sources. Although extensively validated and highly accurate, modeled data is never 100% accurate, so there are minor inaccuracies in individuallevel race data in the voter file; this should be considered when interpreting results and analyses of voter data accessed from the VAN. Throughout this report, race data is grouped using the latest recommendations from those communities, including "AA/NH/ PI" for Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders; and "AI/AN" for American Indian and Alaskan Natives. Race data is particularly inaccurate for AI/AN voters, who are far more likely to report multiracial identities in the U.S. Census. In general, these individuals are categorized as "Unknown", so the true count of AI/ AN voters in Washington State likely includes some percentage of those folks. "New voters" are those who registered to vote for the first time since 1/1/2025.

Voter outreach

Data on outreach work done by WCA Data Hub partners from August 15th, 2025 through November 15th, 2025 was accessed via America Votes' VAN (501c4 outreach) and State Voices' VAN (501c3 outreach). Voter IDs were used to map data related to outreach with the preprocessed voter file to allow detailed analyses. Only data collected by WCA Data Hub partners and returned to the VAN by November 15th, 2025 was included in this report, so the extent of voter engagement work may not be fully represented herein. For in-person canvassing and phonebanking outreach, the impact on voter turnout was assessed by comparing turnout of individuals who were successfully contacted ("canvassed") against turnout of individuals who were not contacted ("no contact").

Election results

Results for the 2021, 2023, and 2025 General Elections were downloaded from the Washington Secretary of State's website, and processed and visualized using custom-written Python scripts. Data on the current incumbent for all races on the ballot this year was downloaded from the Secretary of State's website, and mapped onto the election results. Any incumbents running under different names than the previous time they ran (e.g., Jane M. Doe instead of Jane Doe) will be incorrectly marked as not being an incumbent. Party data for individual candidates was mapped from their self-reported "Preferred Party", and aggregated into four groups: Democratic, Republican, Independent/Other, or None (non-partisan races). Throughout this report, vote totals for candidates will be color-coded based on party affiliation (as applicable). Precinct-level results for General Elections (2012 through 2025) can be explored with the Washington General Election Dashboard, WCA's interactive tool for viewing and exploring election results.

Election results are current as of Friday, November 14th, 2025, and may not reflect final vote tallies. This report will be updated in early December (as needed) following final certification of results by the Secretary of State.


Statewide Electorate


Washington State's electorate grew to 5,082,306 active voters in 2025, a net increase of +85,757 since the November 2024 General Election (+158,995 new voters, -73,238 dropped voters). Similar to recent years, new registrants are predominately young (median age = 35 years old), with a particularly high density in the Puget Sound (46% of all new registrants). Relative to their pre-2025 electorate, Southwestern Washington saw the greatest relative growth in 2025 (+4.0% /+19,931 voters), followed by the Puget Sound (+3.4% / +72,974 voters), South Central Washington (+3.3% / +11,811 voters), and the Olympic Peninsula (+3.2% / +12,018 voters), while Eastern Washington (+2.9% / +13,599 voters), Northwestern Washington (+2.8% / +23,125 voters), and North Central Washington (+2.8% / +5,185 voters) saw the smallest relative growth.

White voters remain the largest voting group in Washington State (3,998,273 voters), but account for relatively fewer new registrants in 2025 (+2.0% / +77,234 voters). Washington's White voters skew older than voters of other races (median age = 51 years old), with 24% under the age of 35 and 29% over the age of 65. White voters make up the largest share of the electorate in every region, with the highest relative share in Eastern Washington (93.3%), the Olympic Peninsula (90.5%), and Southwestern Washington (90.4%), and the smallest relative share in South Central Washington (73.4%) and the Puget Sound (75.3%). White voters are the most reliable group of voters in Washington State: 41% voted in 3 of 4 recent general elections, 45% voted once or twice, and just 14% did not vote.

Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders (AA/ NH/PI) make up the second largest segment of Washington's electorate (339,352 voters), and account for the third fastest growing group of voters (+4.3% in 2025). Washington's AA/ NH/PI voters are slightly younger than the overall electorate (median age: all voters = 49 years old, new voters 35 years old), with nearly 30% under the age of 35 and just 18% over the age of 65. AA/NH/PI voters make up a relatively small share of the electorate in every region except the Puget Sound (11.6%) and Northwestern Washington (6.5%), and account for more than one-fifth of the electorate in cities along the Puget Sound – including Bellevue (29%), Sammamish (24%), Renton (24%), Tukwila (22%), Kent (22%), and Redmond (22%). AA/ NH/PI voters are the second most reliable group of voters in Washington State: 23% voted in 3 of 4 recent general elections. 49% voted once or twice, and 28% did not vote at all.

Hispanic voters are the third largest voting group in Washington State (302,730 voters), and represent the second fastest growing segment of the electorate (+4.7% in 2025). Washington's Hispanic voters are the youngest segment





of the electorate (median age = 36.0 years old), with 47% under the age of 35 and just 10% over the age of 65. Hispanic voters make up sizable segments of the electorate in South Central Washington (23%), North Central Washington (15%), Northwestern Washington (5%), and the Puget Sound (5%), and account for the majority of the electorate in 15 cities in Washington – including Mattawa (88%), Granger (79%), Toppenish (78%), Wapato (76%), Sunnyside (73%), and Grandview (73%). Hispanic voters are the group least likely to vote in Washington's elections: just 13% voted in 3 of 4 recent general elections, 33% voted once or twice, and 54% did not vote at all.

Black voters are the fourth largest segment of Washington's electorate (125,390 voters), and account for the fastest growing segment of the electorate (+4.74% in 2025). Washington's Black voters are relatively younger than the overall electorate (median age = 41 years old), with 35% under the age of 35 and just 12% over the age of 65. Black voters make up less than 2% of the electorate in every region except the Puget Sound (4%), accounting for a sizable share of the electorate in many major cities in the South Sound – including Seatac (16%), Tukwila (16%), Lakewood (12%), Federal Way (11%), Kent (9%), and Tacoma (8%). Black voters overall are among the least likely


to vote in Washington's elections: 22% voted in 3 or 4 recent general elections, 46% voted once or twice, and 32% did not vote at all.

American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/AN) are the smallest segment of Washington's electorate (16,836 voters), and are the second slowest growing share of the electorate (+2.5% in 2025). Washington's Al/AN voters are relatively representative of the overall electorate in terms of age (median age = 46 years old), with 28% under the age of 35 and 22% over the age of 65. AI/AN voters make up less than 1% of the electorate in every region except North Central Washington (1.3%) and the Olympic Peninsula (1%), accounting for the majority of the electorate in just Nespelem (90%) and Coulee Dam (56%). Al/ AN voters are among the least likely to vote in Washington's elections: 18% voted in 3 or 4 recent general elections, 46% voted once or twice, and 36% did not vote at all. Critically, race data on Washington's voter file is modeled and relatively less accurate for AI/AN voters than all other races, so these counts are most certainly underrepresentative of Washington's true AI/AN electorate.

Voter Turnout

Washington State's 2025 General Election took place on November 4th, 2025, with all 5,082,306 voters receiving a mailed ballot from the Office of the Secretary of State. Voters cast their ballots for a total of 2,978 races, including 1,067 municipal races, 722 school board races, 64 county races, 9 legislative races, and 1,114 other local races. Voters also weighed in on 158 ballot measures, including one statewide measure, 50 municipal measures, 23 school levies, and 84 other local measures. In the interest of brevity, this report will focus on voters and election results across four jurisdictions: legislative, county, municipal (city/town), and school district.

Voter turnout in the 2025 General Election was 39.6% (1,956,634 ballots returned), a 0.3% decrease from 2021 (39.9%) and a 2.7% increase from 2023 (36.9%). Turnout was highest in the Olympic Peninsula (42.9%), the Puget Sound (42.6%), and Eastern Washington (40.0%), and lowest in South Central Washington (31.2%), Southwestern Washington (35.7%), and North Central Washington (36.0%). Statewide, turnout generally increased with age (16.5% for 18-24 year olds, 62.9% for voters 65 and older), and turnout of voters 35 and older was 2.2x higher than turnout of voters under 35 years old (46.0% vs 20.8%). The turnout gap between younger (<35 year olds) and older (35 and older) voters varied by region, with the smallest gap in the Puget Sound (22.8%), Northwestern Washington (25.5%), and Southwestern Washington (25.5%), and the largest



gap in North Central Washington (29.6%) and the Olympic Peninsula (31.0%). Turnout of young voters (<35 years old) was highest in Garfield County (31.0%), King County (29.7%), and Whatcom County (35.3%) counties, and lowest in Yakima County (10.5%), Grays Harbor County (10.1%), and Ferry County (6.7%) counties. Turnout of White voters was ~1.5x higher than turnout of voters of color (42.8% vs 29.1%), though this varied by region: the racial turnout gap was smallest in Eastern Washington (7.5%), Southwestern Washington (9.3%), and the Olympic Peninsula (10.4%), and largest in South Central Washington (20.1%) and North Central Washington (20.5%). Turnout of voters of color was highest in Garfield County (55.6%), Jefferson County (50.1%), and San Juan County (49.8%), and lowest in Yakima County (15.2%), Franklin County (15.0%), and Douglas County (14.5%) counties. Turnout of female voters was 2.5% higher than turnout of male voters (40.3% vs 37.8%), with a similar turnout gap across every region of the state.

I,941,832 voters in Washington who voted in the 2024 General Election did not vote in the 2025 General Election. Voter dropoff (share of voters who voted in 2024 that did not in 2025) was highest in North Central Washington (58%), Southwestern Washington (56%), and South Central Washington (58%), and lowest in the Olympic Peninsula (48%) and the Puget Sound (47%). Dropoff was inversely correlated with age, with the

largest dropoff among voters aged 17-24 (77%) and 25-34 (67%) and the smallest dropoff among voters aged 55-64 (47%) and 65+ (34%). White voters overall saw the lowest dropoff from 2024 (48.7%), while Black voters (60.8%), AI/AN voters (67.1%), and Hispanic voters (70.2%) saw the largest dropoff. Statewide, 593,327 voters under 35 who voted in the 2024 General Election did not vote in the 2025 General Election, along with 360,673 voters of color.

In many parts of Washington State, including much of the Olympic Peninsula, the Puget Sound, Southwestern Washington, and Eastern Washington, voter turnout in 2025 was higher than in both 2021 and 2023, with the largest increases in Garfield County (+10.9% vs 2021, +10.5% vs 2023), Jefferson County (+7.1% vs 2021, +9.3% vs 2023), King County (+4.8% vs 2021, +8.3% vs 2023), Clark County (+2.7% vs 2021, +8.5% vs 2023), and Whitman County (+5.3% vs 2021, +6.8% vs 2023). In other parts of the state, particularly much of Central Washington and Northwestern Washington, voter turnout in 2025 was lower than both 2021 and 2023, with the largest decreases in Chelan County (-8.9% vs 2021, -7.5% vs 2023), Island County (-4.2% vs 2021, -5.2% vs 2023), Benton County (-4.0% vs 2021, -2.7% vs 2023), and Whatcom County (-0.4% vs 2021, -5.7% vs 2023). Nearly 80% of the cities and towns in the Puget Sound saw higher turnout in 2025 than 2021 and 2023 - including Skykomish (+27%), Black Diamond (+16%), Gig Harbor (+14%), Olympia (+11%), Tacoma (+10%), Issaguah (+10%), and Seattle (+5.4%) - while 67% of cities and towns in Central Washington saw lower turnout in 2025 than 2021 or 2023 including Wapato (-9%), Toppenish (-6%), Kennewick (-5.5%), Grandview (-5%), Walla Walla (-5%), West Richland (-4%), and Yakima (-4%).


The shutdown of the U.S. federal government through the 2025 General Election (10/1/25 through 11/14/25) led to concern among election officials and community leaders that mailedin ballots might not arrive by election day. Largely via web and social media posts, these groups emphasized the importance of returning ballots via official ballot drop boxes instead of the U.S. postal service, and voters paid attention: 65% of ballots were returned via drop box in 2025, compared to 56% in both 2021 and 2023. Although more ballots were returned in 2025 than either 2021 or 2023 (1,920,218 in 2021, 1,779,294 in 2023, 2,013,924 in 2025), fewer ballots were returned too late (that is, after 8pm on November 4th) to be counted in 2025; (12,942 in 2021, 11,939 in 2023, 9,944 in 2025). Nearly one-third of all challenged ballots were returned by voters in King County (8,049 ballots), while the largest rate of ballot challenging was in Chelan County (3.4%), Walla Walla County (3.4%), and Franklin County (4.9%).


Voter Outreach

The Washington Community Alliance (WCA) Data Hub supports a statewide network of community-based organizations, labor unions, and ballot measure campaigns with their civic engagement work, providing access to tools and training to ensure work is as impactful and data-driven as possible. Twenty-seven of our partner organizations were involved in direct voter outreach work in the three months leading up to the 2025 General Election (August 15th, 2025 through November 4th, 2025), and collectively made 4,733,087 direct voter contact attempts - including 91,444 door knocks, 189,491 phone calls, 1,413,526 text messages, and 3,020,072 mailers and postcards. This included outreach to voters in all 39 counties, with a large portion contacting voters in the Puget Sound (71%). In-person canvassing remains the most effective method for engaging with voters: 22% of door knocks led to a conversation with voters, compared to 18% of phone calls and <0.5% for text messages. Although it is nearly impossible to know the actual contact rate and impact of texts and mail on voter turnout, research consistently shows that layered canvassing has an additive effect on voter turnout.

While the relative impact of voter outreach efforts varied by a number of factors (contact type, messenger and message, voter demographics), both in-person outreach and phone calls led to statistically significant increases in voter turnout: on average, in-person canvassing led to an 9.9% increase in turnout (t = 5.7, p <0.001; range: +1.1% to +20.7%), while phone calls led to a 5.7% increase in turnout (t = 3.6, p = 0.003; range: +0.4% to +23.1%).

Total voter outreach by county






To highlight the incredible work of our partner organizations, this section will dig deeper into four different forms of voter engagement used ahead of the 2025 General: deep canvassing, get-out-the-vote (GOTV), ballot measure advocacy, and local candidate support.

Deep canvassing

Deep canvassing is widely viewed as the most impactful form of voter outreach, centering long, empathetic conversations between volunteers and voters and creating a space for reflection and understanding to bridge deeply-held beliefs and build authentic, lasting relationships. Pacific County Voices Uniting (PCVU) runs one of the most successful deep canvassing programs in the state, focusing solely on voters in Pacific County who otherwise receive very little electoral outreach. In the fall of 2025, PCVU knocked on more than 700 doors in rural Pacific County, 300 doors in Raymond, and around 100 doors each in Long Beach, South Bend, and Ilwaco, having conversations with over 300 voters. Overall, PCVU's canvassing led to a 9.9% increase in voter turnout in the 2025 General, with a larger impact among voters in rural Pacific County (+13.5%) than in Raymond, Long Beach, South Bend, and Ilwaco (+6.3%). Community First Whatcom (CFW) leads grassroots organizing efforts centered around local ballot initiatives, working to raise wages for workers, protect renters, and build lasting power in communities in Northwestern WA. In the fall of 2025, CFW knocked on more than 5,000 doors in Bellingham and nearly 3,000 doors in Ferndale, having more than 700 conversations with voters in each city. This work led to a sharp increase in voter turnout, including a 9.4% increase in Bellingham and an 8.2% increase in Ferndale, and drove the passage of both Initiative 2501 in Ferndale (prohibiting junk fees for renters) and Initiative 2503 in Bellingham (tenants' rights and protections). Latino Community Fund (LCF) prioritizes outreach to young Latino voters in South Central WA and South King County, working to engage the lowest propensity voters in our elections. In the fall of 2025, LCF led a deep-canvassing program in Yakima and knocked on 350 doors, leading to more than 60 conversations with voters. LCF's canvassing led to a 6.8% increase in turnout in the 2025 General Election, and more than 80% of those who voted in the 2025 General Election had not voted in either the 2021 or 2023 elections.

Get-Out-The-Vote (GOTV)

GOTV outreach is critical, especially in the final days of an election, particularly for engaging lower-propensity voters. Rather than asking voters to support specific candidates or issues, GOTV work is focused specifically on giving voters information on when, where, and how to turn in their ballot, ensuring that everyone's voice is heard on election day.



One of the overarching goals of the WCA network's voter engagement work is building towards a fully representative, inclusive democracy in Washington State. To that end, many of our partner organizations prioritize outreach to segments of the electorate that have historically been disenfranchised, less engaged in our elections, and those who are facing marginalization in our current political climate.

Washington's Hispanic population is one of the fastest growing segments of the electorate, particularly in South Central WA, yet turnout of Hispanic voters is consistently among the lowest in the state. In working towards closing this turnout gap, three organizations with deep roots in the Yakima Valley - Nuestra Casa, Poder Latinx, and Progreso - ran separate GOTV programs ahead of the 2025 General Election. Nuestra Casa focused their efforts in Sunnyside and the surrounding area, knocking on 140 doors and having 20 conversations with voters that led to a 12.4% increase in voter turnout. Poder Latinx focused their efforts in Yakima, knocking on more than 2,200 doors and having more than 120 conversations with voters that led to a 12.7% increase in voter turnout. Progreso led two separate GOTV programs: an in-person canvassing program in Yakima, Sunnyside, and Pasco (1,400 door knocks), and a phonebanking program (31,000 phone calls) focused on Hispanic voters throughout South Central WA and King County. Progreso's in-person canvassing work led to 200 conversations and an 8.8% increase in voter turnout, while phonebanking led to nearly 1,000 conversations and a 0.6% increase in voter turnout.

American Muslim Advancement Council (AMAC) works to register and turn out Washington's growing Muslim population, using a massive membership model to stay engaged with the community. Leading up to the 2025 General Election, AMAC sent texts and made phone calls to more

than 30,000 Muslim voters across Washington, 8,742 of whom voted in this election - including 4,442 voters who had not voted in 2021, a 200% in turnout among AMAC's membership. Asian Counseling and Referral Service (ACRS) is a direct service organization serving the AA/NH/PI community in the Pacific Northwest, offering a broad range of services from behavioral healthcare to civic education. ACRS made phone calls and sent texts to more than 20,000 AA/NH/PI voters in King County ahead of the 2025 election, 47% of whom voted in this election. ACRS' phonebanking alone led to an 8.7% increase in voter turnout, and follow-up texts to voters canvassed during a phonebank led to an additional 17.2% increase in turnout. Native Vote Washington works to increase political empowerment, education, and engagement of Native Peoples in Washington State, including leading voter registration and GOTV programs. In the fall of 2025, Native Vote WA made GOTV calls to 34,945 Native voters in Port Angeles. Vancouver, and Thurston County, leading to a 2.8% increase in voter turnout. United Territories of Pacific Islanders Alliance Washington (UTOPIA) is a queer and trans people of color-led, grassroots organization working to build power in the Pacific Islander LGBTQIA+ community in South King County. Ahead of the 2025 General Election, UTOPIA Washington made phone calls and sent texts to 16,753 AA/NH/PI voters in Tacoma, Kent, Federal Way, Auburn, Des Moines, and Tukwila. Both phone calls and texts increased turnout among voters (+7.4% for phone, +0.5% for text), but layering a phone call and a text message led to the largest increase in turnout (+8.7%); overall, nearly 2,500 voters contacted by UTOPIA voted in 2025, 80% of whom had not voted in 2021.

The Washington Bus is the largest youth-led organization in the state, working to build and harness political power among young people in the state. Ahead of the 2025 General Election, **The Washington Bus Education Fund** (501c3) knocked 1,463 doors, made 2,040 phone calls, and sent 1,445 texts to young voters in Seattle, collectively reaching more than 1,500 voters.



Overall, in-person outreach led to a 19.2% increase in turnout and phonebanking led to a 14.0% increase in turnout, and 39.9% of voters who were canvassed at all voted in the 2025 General Election. Washington Conservation Action is the leader in Washington's environmental movement, advocating for and mobilizing around environmental progress and justice. In 2024, Washington Conservation Action was critical to the defeat of Initiative 2117, an attempted repeal of the state's landmark Climate Commitment Act. In 2025, Washington Conservation Action sent texts to more than 26,427 voters who had pledged to vote against Initiative 2117, including more than 17,000 young voters who had not voted in 2021. Overall, 30.7% of voters texted by Washington Conservation Action voted in the 2025 General Election, including 4,727 young voters who had not voted in 2021.

Ballot measure advocacy

Ballot measures are a form of direct democracy that uniquely allow voters to weigh in on policies that impact their everyday lives. Voter engagement around ballot measures provides an opportunity for organizers to connect with voters around specific policy issues, empowering citizens with ownership over the direction of policy in their community. In Spokane, voters weighed in on Proposition 1, a levy to fund both the Spokane Parks department and Spokane Public Schools. The "Together Spokane" effort was supported by a wide range of community-based organizations, including Fuse Washington and the Peace and Justice Action League of Spokane (PJALS). Ahead of the 2025 General Election, Fuse sent mailers in support of Proposition 1 to more than 82,000 voters and PJALS made nearly 3,500 phone calls to voters in Spokane. 67% of voters contacted by Fuse and 75% of voters contacted by PJALS voted in this election, and Proposition 1 passed with 55.9% of the vote. In Ellensburg, Proposition 1 ask voters whether to fund the city's public transit system. Transportation Choices Coalition (TCC) led the Yes on Prop 1 effort in Ellensburg, reaching out to more than 3,100 voters with a range of in-person canvassing, phonebanking, and texts. TCC's in-person canvassing and phonebanking increased turnout by 12.1% and 0.9%, respectively, and 48.8% of voters contacted by TCC voted, leading Proposition 1 to pass with more than 65% of the vote. In Olympia, Proposition 1 sought to create a workers bill of rights within the city, increasing the minimum wage, requiring fair schedules, and creating new workplace protections. Washington Community Action Network (WA CAN) led the approval campaign for Olympia Proposition 1, knocking on more than 46,000 doors and having conversations with 11,205 voters. This work led to a 10.6% increase in voter turnout, and 62.7% of voters canvassed by WA CAN voted in this election, including 5,161 voters who had not voted in 2021, but Proposition 1 was ultimately rejected by







voters by fewer than 900 votes. State Resolution 8201, the only statewide contest or initiative on the ballot in Washington's 2025 General Election, would allow the state to invest assets of the WA Cares Fund in a diverse portfolio to grow the value of the state's long-care fund over time. Resolution 8201 was widely supported by community organizations and labor unions throughout the state, and Service Employees International Union Local 775 (SEIU 775) sent mailers in support of 8201 to more than 750,000 voters. 75.3% of voters



who were sent mail voted in this election – including nearly 100,000 voters who had not voted in the 2021 or 2023 elections – and 8201 was approved by voters 57.9% to 42.1%.

Local candidate support

Another way that WCA partner organizations can directly impact the direction of their own communities is by building momentum for local candidates who champion equity, justice, and community investment. This canvassing work strengthens grassroots power, and ensures the voices of working families and marginalized communities are centered in local leadership. **ELLA Adelante** is a Latina-led organization that seeks to build political power and hold elected officials accountable across South Central Washington. In this election, ELLA Adelante knocked nearly 3,000 doors and sent more than 13,000 texts to voters in Sunnyside in support of a slate of candidates in Sunnyside, helping elect progressives to the city council and school board. Rural People's Voice (RPV) is a broad coalition of working-class families, young people, seniors, immigrants, students, and laborers working for a better future in rural Washington. In this election, RPV knocked 3,402 doors, made 322 phone calls, and sent 8,147 mailers to 8,980 voters in Chelan, East Wenatchee, Aberdeen, Leavenworth, and rural North Central WA, supporting community organizers running for office and working to pass critical levies across the region. In addition to their 501(c)3 voter registration and education work, The Washington Bus also runs 501(c)4 electoral programs, specifically working to elect candidates who will fight for young people in Washington. In Spokane, The Washington Bus (501c4) knocked more than 1,300 doors and sent over 1,110 texts to young voters who do not normally vote in municipal elections, helping elect progressives to the city council and school board. Washington

Education Association (WEA) elevates the voice of educators and works to best serve students throughout Washington. In this election, WEA sent 50,000 mailers in support of school board candidates in Highline, Kent, Issaquah, Peninsula, and Tumwater school districts, working to elect educators to these critical positions. SEIU775, the largest union representing long-term care workers in the Pacific Northwest, sent more than 500,000 mailers and 230,000 texts to voters in Seattle in support of their endorsed slate of progressive candidates, 70% of whom voted in this election and helped deliver victories to working families in Seattle.

Election Analysis

The 2025 General Election was the first major election since the 2024 Presidential election offering voters throughout Washington the opportunity to weigh in on the political direction of their local governments. Voter turnout statewide was similar to the 2021 General Election, but turnout of younger voters surged in many cities throughout the state. In nearly every contested election, voters decisively chose the more progressive candidate in the race – from city councils and school boards, to county and legislative positions. The results of this election were a profound rebuke of centrist, moderate politics, demonstrating an eagerness for new leadership and bolder policy at every level.

This progressive wave was particularly apparent in Seattle. where progressive candidates swept every office on the ballot. Katie Wilson, organizer and founder of the Transit Riders Union, defeated incumbent Bruce Harrell in the race for Seattle Mayor by ~2,000 votes (<1%); former assistant U.S. Attorney Erika Evans defeated incumbent Ann Davison in the race for City Attorney by a 2-to-1 margin (67% to 33%); Dionne Foster defeated city council president Sara Nelson by more than 25%; and progressive Eddie Lin defeated moderate Adonis Ducksworth in the race for District 2 City Councilor by more than 37%. The only Seattle incumbent to finish first was progressive Alexis Mercedes Rinck, who defeated Racheal Savage with more than 81% to win re-election to her first full term on the city council. Elsewhere in King County, former city councilor Anders Ibsen was elected Mayor of Tacoma, defeating moderate John Hines by nearly 15%; Naren Briar was elected to the Bellevue City Council, defeating a 32-year incumbent by ~2,000 votes and becoming the first Kurdish woman ever elected in the U.S.; and progressive county councilmember Girmay Zahilay was elected King County Executive, defeating fellow councilmember Claudia Balducci by >54,000 votes (~9%).


A similar pattern played out in contested races for state legislative seats. In districts where appointed Democratic candidates faced Republican challengers, the Democrats handedly won their races: Deb Krishnadasan (D) defeated Michelle Caldier (R) by more than 5% in the 26th Legislative District (Bremerton, Gig Harbor), Victoria Hunt (D) defeated Chad Magendanz (R) by more than 12% in the 5th Legislative District (Issaguah, Southeast King County), and Osman Salahuddin (D) defeated Dennis Ellis (R) by more than 40% in the 48th Legislative District (Bellevue, Sammamish). In districts where progressive Democratic candidates faced moderate Democratic challengers, the progressives claimed victory: Edwin Obras (D) defeated Kevin Schilling by more than 5% in the 33rd Legislative District (Kent, Burien), and Vandana Slatter (D) defeated Amy Walen (D) by more than 17% in the 48th Legislative District (Bellevue, Redmond)

Outside of the Puget Sound, progressives also fared well in the 2025 General Election. In Spokane, Sarah Dixit defeated conservative incumbent Jonathan Bingle in the District 1 city council race by 156 votes, flipping the district and giving progressives a 6-1 advantage in Washington's second largest city. In Vancouver, progressive incumbent Kim Harless defeated moderate Pooneh Gray by more than 21% to win re-election to the city council, despite being outspent 5-to-1. In Sunnyside, progressive incumbent Vicky Frausto defeated Luis Ochoa by more than 26% and was re-elected to the city council, and progressive Sandra Zesati defeated incumbent Steve Berg by 12% and was elected to the Sunnyside School Board, flipping the school board to a progressive majority.

The 2025 General Election also saw a wave of community organizers running for, and winning, local elections throughout Washington. At least eight candidates previously with the WCA network were elected in 2025: Bethany Barnard (Pacific County Voices Uniting) was elected Mayor of South Bend; Sarah Dixit (Pro-Choice Washington) was elected to Spokane City Council; Mark Figueroa (Poder Latinx) was elected to Pasco City Council; Dionne Foster (Progress Alliance) was elected to Seattle City Council; Alisa Lee (Asian Pacific Islander Americans for Civic Empowerment) was elected to Tacoma Parks Commission; Rick Polintan (Asian Pacific Islander Americans for Civic Empowerment) was elected to King County Public Hospital District; Maren Turner (Win|Win Network) was elected to Lacey City Council; and Katie Wilson (Transit Riders Union) was elected Mayor of Seattle. These wins highlight the power of community organizing for building trust with voters, with voters choosing to support community leaders over big money-backed candidates.

Voters throughout Washington State cast their ballots for a single statewide measure in the 2025 General Election: State Resolution 8201, which will allow the state to invest money from the long-term care fund (WA Cares) in stocks and other equities, was approved 57.8% to 42.2%. At the local level, voters were also very supportive of ballot measures: in Seattle, voters approved Prop 1, renewing and expanding the school and education levy, and Prop 2, restructuring the Business & Occupation Tax to shift the tax burden from small businesses to big businesses; in Ellensburg, voters approved Prop 1, renewing transit funding; in Ferndale, voters approved Initiative 2501, banning junk fees for renters; in Bellingham, voters approved Initiative 2503, expanding tenant rights and protections; and in Spokane, voters approved Prop 1, expanding funding for Spokane Public Schools and the Spokane Parks Department. Notably, some measures were rejected by voters, including Olympia Prop 1, a workers bill of rights that would have raised the minimum wage and establish labor standards; and Vancouver Charter Amendment 13, which would have restructured the city council to a district model instead of the current at-large model.



There are 9,981 active voters in Woodland School District (296 new voters), and 3,365 voted in this election (33.7%). Young voters make up 25.1% of the electorate, and turnout of young voters was 24.1% lower than older voters; voters of



color comprise 8.1% of the electorate, and turnout of voters of color was 6.8% lower than White voters; female voters account for 50.0% of the electorate, and turnout of female voters was 2.5% higher than male voters. 4,700 voters in Woodland School District who voted in 2024 did not vote in 2025.



Voters in Woodland School District cast their ballots for three contests: Marie Wodaege defeated

Stephen Blum for School Board Pos. 3, 53.8% to 45.7%; incumbent Trish Huddleston ran unopposed for School Board Pos. 4, receiving 89.5% of the vote; incumbent Tom Guthrie ran unopposed for School Board Pos. 5, receiving 97.8% of the vote.
